Next week's weather

MARCH 5 TO 12

Windy and cold but mainly sunny to start the week, with some snow. For this Full Moon it is normal to have a heavy snowstorm two days before and another two days after the Full Moon because of a sudden drop in solar flare and sunspot activity. Cold rains and snow starting when the barometer is high, often take us by surprise.

Warming mid-week with drizzle, snow and bright periods in the south. Snowstorms in the north and east, 5 to 10". Mainly sunny and milder to end the period.

\$900,000 project:

Three shafts due for Greene avenue

Traffic on Greene avenue will be under added pressure this summer when work on three different sewer shafts is underway.

Actual work on the first shaft began this Tuesday just south of Western avenue.

The work is all part of the \$921,332 sewer program which the city undertook several weeks ago.

The Greene avenue sites are in Area No. 1 while Area No. 2 consists of the Victoria avenue district mainly in the southwest section of the city.

Area No. 1 work is being done by Spino Construction at a total cost of \$698,813. The work already completed in this area consists of laying larger mains from St. Catherine street and Atwater avenue west to Greene avenue. This is completed as is the lane south of Dorchester between Greene and Hollowell avenues.

Work is just underway on the section from Greene and Sherbrooke to Prospect, while Sherbrooke and Elm to Mt. Pleasant is scheduled to begin July 7th. On August 1st work on the Hillside Lane will commence. The sewer will run from St. Catherine to Hillside and then east to Hollowell avenue.

As for Greene avenue, besides the shaft which is already taking shape south of Western avenue, there will be another between Sherbrooke and Western as of the 1st of June that will take three months to complete. A third will be located south of Dorchester and will take three months also. This means that Greene avenue during the summer will be very congested.

Although a large part of this work will be done underground, the shaft alone will cause considerable traffic friction. Drivers are asked by city officials to be aware of the shafts and show good judgment in any traffic delay that may develop during rush periods.

Open cut work, or construction done above the ground, will be

seen on Sherbrooke and Elm to Mt. Pleasant from July 7 through the 28th.

AREA No. 2

In Area No. 2, where Beaver Construction is doing \$231,591 worth of work, a major part of the job has been completed.

The locations which are completed are: Victoria avenue from Cote St. Antoine to Westmount avenue. Work is well underway at St. Catherine and Prince Albert to Glen Road, while work has not yet started on DeCourcelles and St. James.

Traffic obstructions in this area during the coming months will be lighter than on Greene avenue. A shaft will be dropped at St. Catherine and Victoria which will take two months to complete and another on Glen Road south of St. Catherine. This shaft will only take three weeks to establish.

Meanwhile, a third shaft will go in at DeCourcelles and St. James which will take a month.

As a member of the Bryn Mawr College Canadian Scholarship Committee she has an extensive acquaintance with schools in Canada, Europe and the United States. In 1964 she arranged exchanges between English and French speaking children in the Province of Quebec — a service later taken over by Les Visites Interprovinciales.

the former Edith Browning Brand, he was mostly educated in the United States where his father was professor of church history at Oberlin College, Ohio.

He graduated from Edinburgh University with an MA degree and became an Anglican priest, serving various parishes in London.

Specializing in Freemasonry, Father Hannah wrote a book, "Darkness Visible," which was published in 1952 and became the centre of heated controversy. It was an indictment of Freemasonry as inconsistent with Christianity.

After 20 years in the Church of England, Father Hannah decided to leave when the Church of South India was acknowledged by the Anglican Communion.

He studied for four years at the Beda College in Rome and was ordained a Catholic priest March 14, 1959. Later that year, he was transferred here to St. Patrick's parish and was assigned to the Catholic Inquiry Forum.

He later served in St. Willibrord's Parish and in St. Malachy's before being transferred to the Church of the Ascension of Our Lord, Westmount, 18 months ago.

Father Hannah made frequent radio and television appearances between counselling

changed to Verdun Protestant Hospital.

Today under president S. H. Dobell, 536 Mt. Pleasant avenue, the proportion of patients who can be discharged is continually rising. This has been brought about by medical and psychiatric research, by new methods of therapy and treatment designed to reactivate and rehabilitate.

"Douglas has indeed developed beyond the dreams of its founders," says its president, "but it is not static, and we do not expect it to be. With continued understanding and friendly director both government and public we look forward to being of even greater service to that section of the community for which we exist."

We Say

Qu'est-ce que c'est: privileged minority

PRIVILEGED minority. That masterful coiner of phrases, Hon. René Lévesque, used that term last weekend.

At last he seems to have epitomized, in a two-word epithet, his long-boiling attitude toward les Québécois anglais.

How pat and succinct!

How utterly wrong!

The trouble with Mr. Lévesque is that he is making molds into which people can't and won't conveniently fit.

Any more than he could readily admit to being categorized in a corollary "underprivileged majority."

Such terms, or molds, are nonsense. Like saying everyone is either a good Liberal or a bad Conservative (or National Unionist). Many are neither, or either — with fully interchangeable qualifying adjectives.

Privileged, underprivileged; yes. Canadian society, including Quebec, has both. We like to think that the Government of which Hon. René is a member is making giant strides toward equality of opportunity for the Province's people.

Minority, majority; yes, if it serves any useful purpose to so label sets of people by mother tongue. About the only relevance would be if there was oppression of one set of numbers by the other.

Or perhaps myopic Quebec English eyes fail to see oppression in either direction, either within our province or in the wider Canadian context. What Mr. Lévesque sees may be something else.

Another respected French-origin citizen, Hon. Jean Marchand, suggested last week that everyone would be hap-

pier if the English in Quebec simply learned to be a minority.

Our answer: Pourquoi?

Garbage

Collection of garbage is made twice weekly, in the eastern section of the City on Mondays and Thursdays and in the western section on Tuesdays and Fridays. A line drawn north on Lansdowne Avenue to Cote St. Antoine Rd., thence diagonally to Westmount and Sydenham avenues and from there north to the City limits roughly defines the western section. The southeast corner of the City, south of Dorchester and west to Greene Avenue, and all of the City south of the Canadian Pacific tracks also has Tuesday and Friday garbage collection.

Biography of Streets

Barat Road

Fifth in a series

Barat road runs between Holton avenue and Sherbrooke street and starts at 3410 Atwater avenue and goes west as far as 425 Wood avenue.

This street, which originally formed part of the Sulpicians' property, was named by a by-law of the City of Westmount passed on April 26, 1927, a few months after the adjoining land, registered in the name of the Montreal Development Corp., had been subdivided.

The name was suggested by the Sulpicians to commemorate **Madeleine Sophie Barat**, the foundress of the **Order of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart**.

Born in France, in the small town of Joigny in Burgundy, in 1779, of a modest family whose main occupation was the cultivation of vines, Marie Sophie Barat went through the difficult times of the French Revolution.

Her brother and godfather took charge themselves of her education and for that purpose brought her to Paris, where she led a very austere life.

When only 21 years old, she founded the Order of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart, whose principal object is to educate young girls from good families.

The Order which has its mother house in Rome, has since developed and spread until now, both in Europe and America, it has some 180 convents directed by some 8,000 nuns.

The first convent built in America was in 1818 in Saint-Charles,

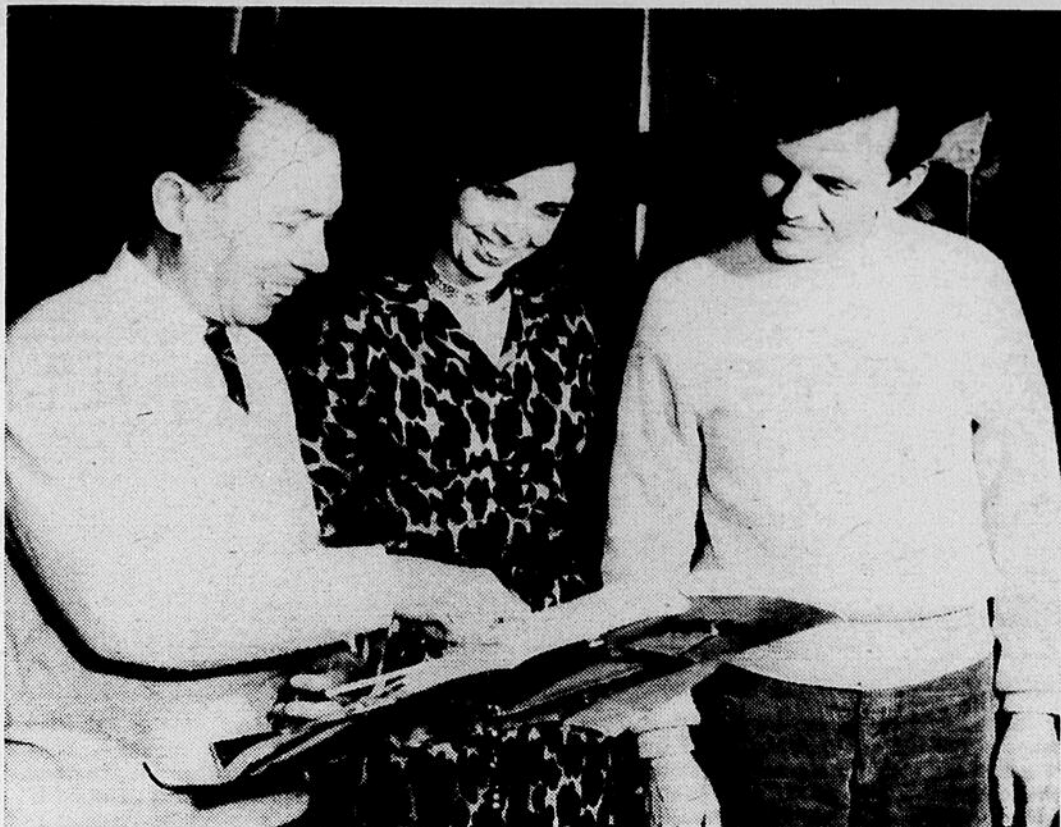

and weekend parish works, and lectured at Loyola College and Marianopolis here and at the Universities of Ottawa and Sudbury.

He was a regular book reviewer for the Canadian Register and wrote in the Western Catholic Reporter and the United Church Observer. He was a driving force behind the foundation three years ago of the Challenge here and his column, Point-Counterpoint, appeared in every issue of the newspaper.

His journalistic works also appeared in the Tablet and the Catholic Herald in London, and American publications America, the Ecumenist, the Critic, and Theological Studies, and the English edition of Herder Correspondence.

He contributed to the edition of the Catholic Encyclopedia now being revised.

Father Hannah is survived by two brothers, John M. Charles and James Brand Julius, and several nephews and nieces.

His late father was a president of King's College Nova Scotia, from 1902 to 1904.

He later represented the riding of Wolverton-Hampton in the House of Commons from 1935 until his death in 1944.

Father Hannah's body is at the Clarke Funeral Home, 5580 Sherbrooke street west. Interment will be at Côte des Neiges Cemetery.

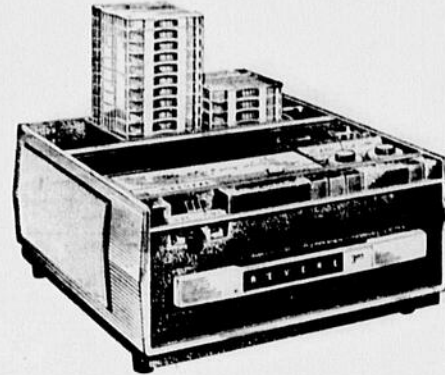

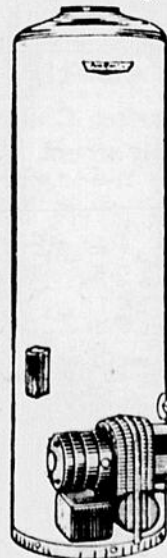

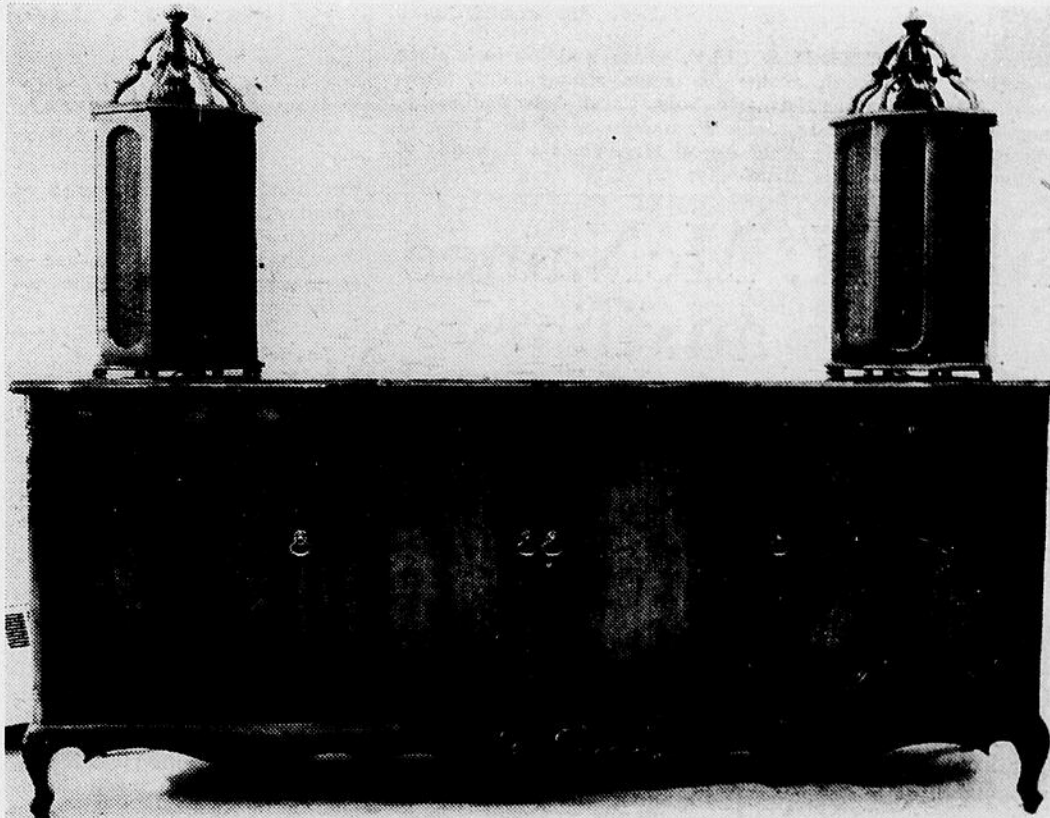

Presbyterial installs officers

Douglas Hospital auxiliary holds 6th annual meeting

"The Heart of a City" — a social psychiatric study of central Montreal — was the topic of a speech given by **Dr. Raymond H. Prince** at the sixth annual meeting of the Auxiliary of Douglas Hospital held recently in the Y.W.C.A. Dr. Prince is on the staff of the Montreal Hygiene Institute, and is Research Director of the Urban Social Redevelopment Project.

A cheque for \$10,000 was presented to **S. H. Dobell**, Chairman of the Board of Management of the Hospital by **Mrs. H. H. Jasper**, President of the Auxiliary, as the first installment toward the cost of the bowling alleys in the soon-to-be opened Recreation Centre. Almost \$15,000 in all, representing the profits from the Auxiliary's various projects as well as membership fees, has been donated to the Hospital during the past year.

Mrs. Jasper, in her annual report, stated that the year 1965 had been one "filled with activity, a sound sustainment of effort, and some expansion."

It was reported that 396 of the 441 "forgotten" patients at the hospital have been sponsored now by friends in the Montreal area, throughout the Province of Quebec, and in a few cases from Ontario.

Individual membership, which includes both men and women, now stands at 980, which is an increase of 120 over the previous year. In addition, group membership now numbers 100 organizations interested in the welfare of the mental patient.

The Corner Store continued to provide patients in the hospital with the opportunity of buying new and good used clothing and sundries at a reasonable price.

The proceeds from the Corner Store make it possible for the Clothing Service Centre to provide utility clothing at no cost to indigent patients — this year \$3000 was turned over to the Centre.

The Snack Bar operated by a

total of 179 volunteers served patients needs throughout the year.

The Christmas Committee was responsible for providing 1500 individually wrapped gifts for patients at Christmas as well as for two parties attended by over 600 patients. The gifts were either donated or bought, and were sorted and wrapped by 63 volunteers who worked 621 hours.

Mrs. Jasper reported that all four chapels had been completed and are "now an integral part of hospital life with well attended regular services being held in each."

The Children's Clothing Service Centre, a new project organized by the Auxiliary during the past year, provides the same clothing service to indigent children and is operated in the same manner as the main Clothing Service Cen-

tre. This new project is located in a bright, gaily decorated room, with even a jar of lollipops on hand.

Another new enterprise of the Auxiliary was Coffee Party Day. As a result of the parties, which were held on a single day in various parts of the city and which were attended by Auxiliary members and friends, the Auxiliary membership was increased by 100.

MacLaurin, Roslyn avenue, Mrs. Drummond Giles, Barat road, Mrs. N. K. de St. Croix, vice presidents; Mrs. M. Godel, recording secretary; Mrs. J. Preston Robb, Roslyn avenue, corresponding secretary; Mrs. C. Douglas Reid, treasurer.

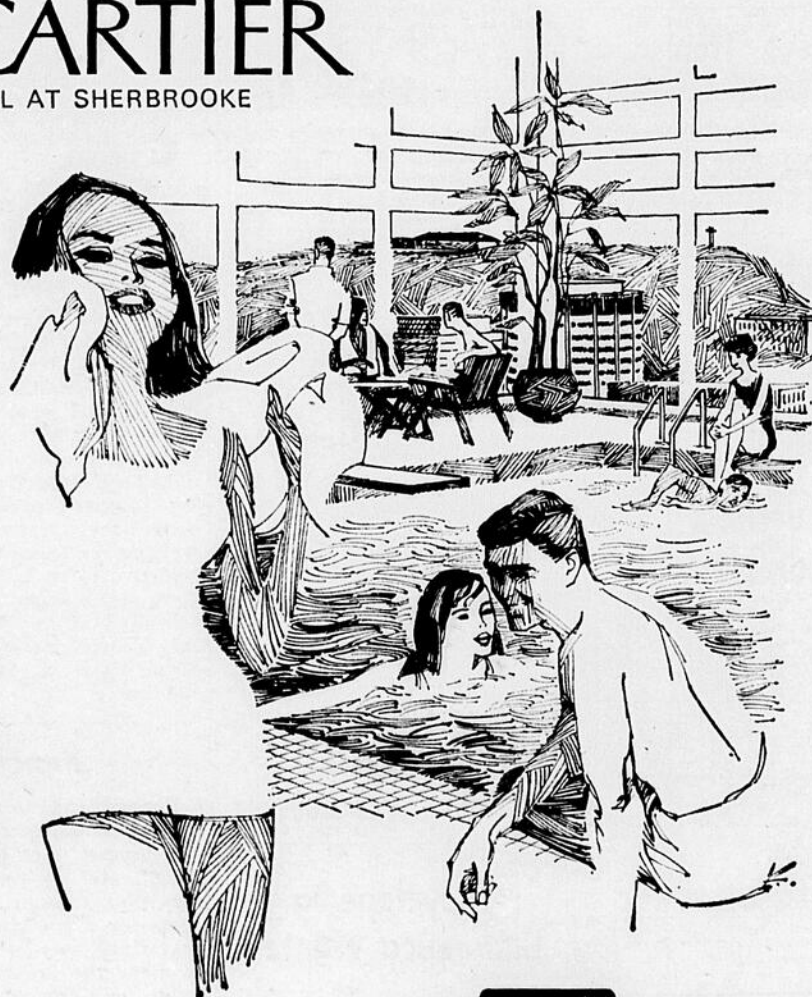
