September the Deadline

SEPTEMBER will be a month of many memories for the majority of the population. It will leave a bad taste in the mouth of not a few, but it will also mark the beginning of a new era in our war time life. It may come to be known as the black month or it may come to be known as the month which showed the silver lining through the clouds.

In any event, several new regulations will come into effect during September which will vitally affect our lives. Selective service registrations will commence next month and it is understood that women will be the first to register. Payments under the new Income Tax will commence in September and deductions at the source will come from the pay envelope of the first pay day in the month. Also during this month the new ration coupon books will be issued, bearing the individual serial number, which we are told has a significant meaning. Just what the serial number will mean has not been disclosed, this fact may become known after the issue.

The first two of the September events may be considered as highly important and should receive every attention. In another part of this issue will be found facts concerning the difficulties in that direction and is published in order to give our readers every possible help. There is not much which can be said about the Income Tax that is not already known, unless it be about the deduction amounts, and as stated, this is covered elsewhere in this issue. It is well-known that the new tax is the most severe ever experienced in this country and it is on a par with the one in force in England. So in this case we can say we are doing our equal share along with the mother country. One feature that we believe is commendable, is the savings plan whereby a certain amount of the tax paid in, will be returned after the war. Such money to come to us after the war may well mean the keeping together of many a home and of providing the means for replacement of worn-out articles, which in turn will keep workers employed. In regard to Selective Service, very little of what is really to happen, is known at the moment. But from what is known it would appear that registrations will take place and workers will be drafted to essential occupations vital to the war effort.

Hundreds of workers are needed for vital work and the demand for workers is increasing daily as the war effort continues to grow. As the situation is at present, this demand cannot be filled. Thus we have a shortage of labor for vital war industries. It is the intention therefore, to draft as many women as possible into war work in order to fill the gaps and to replace those men who will be called for service with the armed forces. Then again, there are a number of industries using materials and employing labor for work that is considered unessential to the war effort. It is the intention to regulate these even to the point of closing them down, in order to release the workers and the materials so that they may be put into a more vital industry. At first the system will be of a voluntary nature, but if sufficient workers are not forthcoming in a very short time, compulsion methods will be used.

Canada's war effort must not be allowed to stalemate. Our armed forces depend on the war worker at home to provide them with the materials with which to fight the enemy abroad. Our liberty, our very lives, depend upon seeing that the fighting men are kept well supplied with all they need. With the shipping hazard, the rate at which materials are used and all the other factors, we cannot afford to lose even thirty minutes in non-production. Slowing up in production for any reason whatever, may mean the loss of countless lives unnecessarily.

The position in which the United Nations find themselves is both very critical and very grave. The situation calls for redoubled efforts on the part of everyone, and there is no doubt but that September will mark the point where this will begin. Thus we will need money and manpower, we shall have to do without many articles which before the war were considered absolutely necessary, in order to get this money and the manpower. It might even be possible that before we have achieved victory, we shall be down to the basis of producing only for war and the bare necessities of living. All other work and manufacture may be discontinued entirely, in order to assure that victory.

The way the war is going at the present time, many things can happen that will swing us into the greatest struggle we have ever experienced. If such were to happen, the tempo of our fighting units would be increased which would mean that our war production effort would have to be kept going at greater volume in order to keep them supplied.

Thus, we believe that September will prove to be the deadline for an all-out war effort, the period when we shall experience the most discomfort in our every day lives since the war began.

A New Hunting Ground

THE dissension and undercurrent mutterings which have recently been credited to Quebec Province, have provided the excuse for

the proposed entrance of new politics into this field. Dissatisfaction and discontent always provide a fertile field for new and radical ideas to be spread. Such a situation is provided in this province at the present time and since the Plebiscite, and in consequence, at least two political parties with radical ideas have signified their intention of invading this new hunting ground.

There is a tendency on the part of a few men to stir up racial and religious feeling in this province, and the effect of this is being felt in numerous ways. It would be far better if these men would seek to show the people how they can live in harmony, and how it is in the best interest to help the war effort in every way.

The fall of France can be attributed in no small measure to the failure of the majority of the nation to follow one lead. It will be remembered that once certain elements began to make themselves heard in this great country, the government changed by the month, by the week and even overnight. This happened at a time when the country should have been wholly united to face the impending disaster which was about to take place. Unfortunately, the enemy was at the gates and still the chaos was going on within. Thus with a fight going on within its own ranks, dissension, dissatisfaction, lack of unity, and the enemy clamoring at the gates, the country of France was sold into the bondage it lives under today. The leaders of the country who pleaded for unity, were shouted down and dismissed, to be replaced by others of more radical tendencies. Much the same state of affairs is going on in this province today. There are those who want to create a chaotic condition in Quebec, arouse the people against the better judgment of the leaders, and demand an action that might result in bloodshed.

Some of the less educated people are being aroused against answering the call for compulsory training, with the result that the police are called upon to deliver the calling-up notices in person. Certain cases have been reported whereby the cars in which the officers have ridden, have been fired upon. It is not known if such cases were by design or by accident, but in any case such incidents should not occur. It is the duty of every citizen to comply with the law and regulations, and to do everything possible to help the war effort for final victory. The police officers are only doing their duty, one which they are obliged to do because of the failure of certain persons to observe their obligations to their country and to their fellow citizens. It is an unpleasant duty for the officers, but one in which they are given no choice, it does not help matters if resistance is offered, it just makes the unpleasant duty more so.

Medical examinations of any kind seem to arouse suspicion in the minds of a number of persons, as they are afraid that these will lead to a person being forced into the army. Such suspicion finding root in the mind of the uneducated person, naturally breeds a fear and much trouble is caused thereby. Recently, there were a number of Victory Bonds taken to the banks and cashed. Persons intending to cash bonds were persuaded not to do so, if they did not actually need the money. In the majority of cases it was known that the money was not needed, but apparently some fear for the safety of the money had been given these persons.

Such evident feeling of distrust would seem to indicate that an undercurrent of some sort is working in this province, and the people are being misled by it. What better time for parties with radical tendencies to come to this field and sow their political propaganda, than when such a feeling exists.

In view of these things it would seem that the time has come when the people of Quebec should try to realize that they are not being mistreated, as some of the recent agitators would have them believe. The government should also realize that Quebec needs an educational policy rather than one of appeasement. The educated people cannot be so easily led to believe things, but the under-educated have to believe them because they have no means of knowing anything different. Such a state of affairs comes about because of the non-compulsory educational system which prevails here. It is easier to produce subjection through fear when the people lack education and it is upon the uneducated that the practice of sowing seeds of distrust will be worked and have been worked. The educated person can dissect the facts and analyse them so that he or she is not misled.

We suggest therefore that the people of Quebec do not let themselves be stamped in to something they will have cause to regret. Let us all weigh very carefully what the agitators say before we allow ourselves to believe it all. Let us think if all will benefit, or whether it will be only the few. This land is still free, it can be kept so if we unite and take a stand for victory.

Complaints Re Noise

IN an editorial in this column published in the issue of July 8th, and headed "A Check-up Needed", we drew attention to the unnecessary noise made on the streets late at night. Since that time many complaints have been registered that this noise is still continuing and causing much annoyance to residents who have retired for the night. The complaints are not secluded to one part of town alone, but come from various parts. It would appear that the main cause for complaint comes from the fact that persons returning home in the late evening and early morning hours have a habit of shouting and screaming. To the person awakened from a sleep, this noise is quite terrifying to say the least. Further, such conduct is totally unnecessary and unbecoming. It has been suggested that something ought to be done to stop this nuisance and it is believed that there is a by-law in effect which prohibits this state of affairs. A warning might serve as being sufficient to stop the noise, but if that proves of no value, the offenders should be apprehended and made an example of. If these persons have not the common decency to respect the feelings of others in a commonsense manner, then it is high time something was done in an official capacity. Unless such disturbances are checked, they can become an increasing annoyance and need harsh treatment before they can be stopped. Immediate action is the only remedy and will earn the thanks of those being annoyed.

MRS. GEO. PRINGLE (Continued)—Being the first house on the Bay, all who landed came to it and often they were strange customers. Once a party of Indians came and had liquor along with them. They got drunk and terrified the family by brandishing their scapling knives. Fortunately they exhausted their liquor and getting sober, left. Another time, when alone, a deaf and dumb man frightened mother, she fearing his infirmity was affected. The change from Glasgow was great, but still mother was provoked when the Coteau people would express their wonder at her staying in such a place. The idea, she would say, of the inhabitants of a place like Coteau pitying us: If they had come to a city like Glasgow. One day she was with father logging, when in one of his excursions driving the oxen, when she saw a man come whose face she thought she knew. Recognizing him as an old Glasgow acquaintance, Mr. McFarlane, a merchant, she burst into tears, as she thought of the change since they had last met. But they were young, healthy and hopeful, and mother told me she felt her situation more when her family grew up and there was no church or school. The Thompsons, Moores and others who came out in the same ship and stayed in Montreal, all got rich, and so might father, had he taken Cowan and Molson's advice and gone into business there. He had no grain until the land was plowable, which was quite a while. Father then moved to Trout River, where he had drawn Fred Wallis' lot and Bruce Lam's, but Bowron gave both over their heads.

Father had to go to Fort Covington with his grist and several times to St. Timothy. If not Beauharnois. Once he was eight days away, being storm-stayed on the Bay. The provisions mother had given him were exhausted. He baked a cake in the dipper he had for baling the canoe, but could not eat it for the same reason. Finally the wind went down and he got home. Wylie was a mason and so was Dorie, who did not come for several years after father's. My uncle James went to Quebec, where he got much employment for the government in drawing plans for lighthouses and the like. He lived there a number of years and died suddenly. He knew nothing of surveying beyond what he might have picked up. Why he was not kept as agent I do not know. After the war, when settling, father built where the homestead is and moved west of his old place. On a child dying, mother had it buried on the island, as being safe from cattle and the like. The settlers buried there until the dam was built, when the water rose high and the bodies were changed to a burying-place made on father's place. McArthur, a silk weaver, was some years after the others. Returning from a bee in Newfoundport he did not reach home, and years after father found a skeleton below a fallen tree and from the buttons it was identified as McArthur's. Some had doubts as to the Irish having killed him, but the likelihood is he strayed while drunk and been killed while sleeping below the tree. Gillis married his widow. On her relatives to come out, father told them to bring a lot of rags to mend his clothes, at which they wondered, for he had taken a great stock. A pilot, they thought was of great service to him.

When I came to Huntingdon Bowron was very poor, the mills out of his hand, and living pretty much on borrowed money. He had a dislike to Scotchmen. The settlers about Huntingdon were divided and some were very uppish. If a party was held, private in the Volunteers, though equal if not superior, were not asked at the same time as the officers. The great divisions was among Lothians and Aberdeenshire.

CUTTING RED TAPE

While we may not like their sometimes blunt and direct methods of diplomacy, there is much to admire in Yankee forthrightness. An important business man recently returned from a visit to the West Indies necessitating conferences with a highly placed Government official of the United States, in Washington, and with a certain secondary official in one of the West Indies colonies tells that while it took him six days to secure an appointment with the West Indian official, it took him only a few minutes to get in to see the very much more important Washington official and to obtain action with an absence of obsequiousness and red tape.

There is every need for us today to recall the letter written in 1810 by the Duke of Wellington to Lord Bradford, Secretary of War, chief of which Gen. Marshall, Chief of Staff of the American Army, has distributed to the chiefs of his army bureau. Ired by official red tape and bureaucratic humbugs, Wellington wrote:

"My Lord:
"If I attempted to answer the mass of futile correspondence that surrounds me, I should be debarré from all serious business of campaigning.
"I must remind Your Lordship—for the last time—that so long as I retain an independent position, I shall see that no officer under my command is debarré by attending to the futile drivelling of mere quill-driving in Your Lordship's office, from attending to his first duty, which is, and always has been, to train the private soldier under his command that they may, without question, beat any force opposed to them in the field!
"I am,
"Your obedient servant,
"(Signed) Wellington."

SCREENS FOR CAR WINDOWS?

Why is it that respectable members of the community who would not dream of throwing paper bags or burning cigarettes through the windows when they are seated in their living rooms, do so with complete nonchalance when driving in the family automobile.

Paper littering the streets is just as much an eye sore as it would be on the front lawn, yet out the car window goes the tissue paper that covered ice cream cones, or the wrapping of the chocolate bar. RUMOR CLINIC

Published by the Canadian Column. To Combat our Mounting War Effort, Hitler Tries Lies in Canada

Hitler's espionage system has kept him advised of our growing war effort. Before the war Canada was flooded with German and Italian newspaper men, engineers, professors and shipping experts. Some of them jumped out of Canada just before war was declared. Many went to internment camps—but German propaganda broadcasts during the last few years prove that Hitler is still getting valuable information to add to the records of Canada which are certainly not gathering dust and cobwebs in Herr Goebbels' office.

Powerfully, insidiously and with the unwitting aid of Canadian citizens Hitler is using a weapon fashioned and truly tried in all the invaded countries of Europe in an attempt to wreck our war effort.

Thousands of rumors circulated day after day, worming their way into the minds of Frenchmen, Norwegians, Danes, Belgians, Austrians, Dutch, Czechs and Poles, created a feeling of frustration and distrust. How many rumours did you hear during the past week that might have been part of Hitler's whispering campaign in Canada?

Hundreds of false and vicious rumors are now being circulated in Canada. Recent statements by leaders of our armed services and police forces show that these rumors are interfering with the war effort. Hitler's technique is now being applied to Canada.

Facts are the best weapon with which to kill rumors. Here are some current rumors and the facts which kill them:

RUMOR: "Several prominent Montrealers have been arrested by the Police and are being held for having supplied gasoline and oil to enemy submarines in the Gulf of St. Lawrence."

FACT: Commissioner S. T. Wood, R.C.M.P., Ottawa:—"The story is entirely false; no such arrests have been made." Officer Commanding, R.C.M.P., Montreal:—"Definitely untrue." Commissioner M. Gaboury, Quebec Provincial Police:—"Entirely false."

(Note: The above rumor was widely circulated and the names of several prominent persons were mentioned as having been arrested, or about to be arrested. The object of such rumors is obviously to undermine public morale and confidence.)

RUMOR: "A method has been perfected whereby beef blood can be used for human transfusion, thus making it unnecessary for citizens to volunteer as blood donors."

FACT: Dr. Jonathan Meakins, Faculty of Medicine, McGill University:—"Nothing can be more erroneous. The bottleneck in all blood transfusion services to the Armed Forces or to civilian population whether it be for whole blood or its derivatives, is the limited number of human donors that are available. Thousands and tens of thousands, even hundreds of thousands of donors are required in order that the bottleneck might possibly be avoided. Scientists have been striving valiantly to use the blood of lower animals to replace the human donor. As yet this accomplishment has not been attained in anything like its entirety. It is true that probably in the near future small fractions of beef blood may be used for human purposes; but, according to our present knowledge, it will never replace whole blood in anything like its entirety. It is only applicable to a minute part."

(Note: Here is a splendid example of how a seemingly innocuous

rumor may cost men their lives through lack of human blood transfusion. It is viciously aimed at halting the flow of volunteer blood donors. These are still urgently needed.)

RUMOR: "England is interested only in protecting England and keeps most of her Army sitting idly at home."

FACT: This rumor is an Axis favorite and has been widely circulated in the U.S.A. and Canada. The "Rumor Clinic," a column carried by the "Boston Herald" recently warned against this rumor and carried the following comment by Howard M. LeSourd, Dean, Boston University, Graduate School.

Professor LeSourd says: "This is not to excuse British blunders of leadership but in all fairness and as a matter of accuracy certain facts should be kept in mind. The British are now almost in their third year of war and are spending 60% of their national income on war. Of their troops in England, 2,000,000 are Home Guards, most of whom work full time in war industries. The others, about 1,500,000 are regular troops whose job it is to protect 3,000 miles of coast against invasion from sea or air. Meantime the rest and most of the British regular army have been fighting from the Arctic Circle, Europe, Africa, and Near East and Far East down, in fact, to the Equator. It has had many failures but among these has not been inaction. At the end of 1941, of all the casualties inflicted on British troops, more than 70% were suffered by troops from Great Britain. The British must maintain immense and long supply lines. In the case of Libya, for example, the Germans are able to get troops to Libya from Western Europe in three weeks, mostly by rail, while the British must travel three months. In the spring of this year, England was sending 80% of its war product overseas somehow."

The general public can help in fighting Hitler's rumors in several ways. First, by telling the rumor monger that he may be adding the Nazis by spreading the story; secondly, by immediately writing to the Canadian Column and giving details of the rumor; thirdly, by spreading facts published in connection with these rumors and thereby helping to build a flood of truth under which to bury Hitler's rumor campaign.

The Rumor Clinic will examine the latest symptoms of Hitler's

Children's Snacks Should be Nourishing

These vacation days when children come round the kitchen for mid-morning and mid-afternoon snacks, mothers would do well to see that something nourishing is on hand so that young bodies will have extra health and resistance built up when school begins again.

A glass of milk with raisin-filled cookies or tomato juice and graham wafers are tasty alternatives with plenty of goodness, or a packet of peanuts and raisins make a convenient hand-out.

A good sandwich filler is made of peanut butter thinned with milk and mixed with chopped raisins. Put in a cool place this will keep for several days. Spread on whole wheat bread, it makes a nutritious sandwich for a lunch box as well as a snack. Sandwich cheese mixture spread on nut bread is also very nutritious.

Any between-meal eating should merely supplement the day's diet and should not be regarded as sufficient to stand alone advises Nutrition Services, Department of Penitents and National Health. It should provide enough energy to offset that tired feeling but should not be large enough to spoil the appetite for the next meal.

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Jig Saw Puzzle Experts Show Talent as Mechanics



The jig-saw puzzle craze of lush peacetime is yielding wartime dividends. A few years ago nearly every dining-room table was cluttered with oddly shaped pieces to be fitted together into coloured pictures. People thought of jig-saw puzzles as a somewhat exasperating pastime. No one thought they could have a worthwhile purpose.

But the psychologists of the army have shrewdly put them to use. They help to evaluate the mechanical ability of men entering the Mechanic's Training Centre at London, Ont. If a man shows skill in fitting bits of cardboard into their proper places, he will probably be good at putting parts of a gasoline engine together. Such things are known as "aptitude tests."

Sure-handedness, mental speed and brain-muscle co-ordination are measured this way. How accurate are the tests? Instructors say they are correct in 85 per cent of cases. The other 15 per cent includes some men who are as good as the machines as the tests promise and some who falter with the puzzles but prove excellent with the real thing.

IMPACT OF WAR ON BRITISH EDUCATION

In the attempt to bring order out of the confusion following evacuation of thousands of school children, the authorities have tried to find a way to fit new needs, and these differed in different localities. In London medical care was reconstituted early and emergency schools were opened. Sheffield and other cities developed a system of "home tuition" whereby small groups of children were taught in private houses. Some towns, of which a portion was considered evacuable and another portion neutral—neither calling for evacuation nor yet suitable for receiving resident evacuees—packed their pupils from both areas into the neutral schools. The need for care during out-of-school hours produced the Shelter Club and the Play Centre, again often financed by gifts from the States and Canada.

Food rationing led to thinking of the special needs of growing children, and this in turn brought rapid growth to a "milk-and-meals" scheme for school-children. Today about 80 per cent of the children in government-aided schools receive a daily ration of milk at a reduced cost or free, in addition to that allowed by the general rationing, and the same privilege is available for other schools. In just over a year the number of children taking a midday meal at school was doubled, being 300,000. Last fall it was announced that a grand drive would be made for school lunches, and the target a million schools meals daily by this fall of 1942. The scope of the British Government's effort is better realized if one remembers that statistics for 1939 show 94 per cent of British children being educated in schools either wholly or partly maintained by the public authorities. Maintenance allowances, travelling expenses, and book grants are paid to secondary school pupils who need them, and in 1939 over 41 per cent of all university students were assisted by the state.

Before the war it was recognized that the educational care of boys and girls who left school at fourteen, to go to work, was grievously inadequate. During the past two and a half years much has been done to remedy this. The British are sometimes accused of being slow, even by some of their own nation, but as early as October, 1939, a committee had been set up to advise the Government on problems of juvenile welfare in wartime, and a special juvenile division established in the Board of Education. In December that Board launched the "Service of Youth," urging a survey of the leisure-time needs of young people and provision to meet them. The national voluntary youth organizations were called upon to co-operate with the Board of Education and the local authorities, to promote the welfare and prevent the deterioration of youth such as occurred during the first World War. Grants for this plan now total about \$1,000,000 a year. Many youth centres, and clubs have been set up with the necessary premises, equipment, and instructors.

All young people between 16 and 18 have been registered for the encouragement of spare-time voluntary war work or training. The education department became responsible for everything after the registration and thus for the education and welfare of all children and young people up to the age of eighteen. Mr. Dent says, "The establishment of this principle is an important educational advance of great significance for the future."

The young people themselves have played a great part in the Service of Youth, making it a Service by Youth. The Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts (our "Guides"), and other youth organizations threw themselves with the greatest enthusiasm into voluntary war work, acting as messengers in civil defence posts, and hospitals, collecting salvage, making splints and bandages, knitting for the troops, and so on. Youth Service Squads emerged spontaneously and have been widely copied in rural areas to which these small groups are especially well suited.

The Air Training Corps is a magnificent cross-section of British boyhood. Very large numbers of 17-year-old boys are in the Home Guard, and many others are on the land this year—potato digging, harvesting, and fruit cropping. The National Association of Girls' Training Corps is overwhelmed with recruits.

During the air raids evening sessions of institutes were suspended, work at week-ends being substituted. The Council for the Encouragement of Music and the Arts (C.E.M.A.) develops concerts, plays and exhibitions of pictures in shelters and war factories, finding everywhere an enthusiastic reception.

The war revealed a grave shortage of skilled workers in Britain, but the technical schools and colleges have supplied the remedy. Working day and night in three shifts they have trained tens of thousands of factory workers and service tradesmen, and yet maintained their day and evening classes.

Here are a few of the conclusions of Mr. Dent: First, the present ferment of ideas in the educational world has had no parallel in British history. Second, educational reform is no longer discussed "in vacuo," but in its relationship to every other kind of reform, political, economic, sociological and religious. Third, educative care of all the young and a comprehensive system of adult education are well within the grasp of practical politics. These are fine ideals for the era of reconstruction. And if fine for Britain, why not for Quebec Province?

In the same manner as a merchant plans to fill his shelves to meet the fall and winter demand, the home-maker should plan to fill her shelves according to the needs of her family.

WILL ROGERS BEST-LOVED HORSE

In her biography of her husband, "Uncle Clem's Boy," Mrs. Will Rogers writes often of horses. No true biographer could do otherwise, since horses played such an important part in the life of the cowboy-humorist. From the days of his childhood on his father's Oklahoma ranch to the time of his tragic death in Alaska, one of his interests and deepest devotions was horses.

But of all the ponies that galloped and raced through his active life, the one that Will Rogers loved best was "Teddy." And Teddy well deserved his master's affection, for it was he that co-acted with Will in his early vaudeville days and launched him on a successful stage career.

Teddy had a heroic namesake to live up to, for Will named him for President Theodore Roosevelt. He was reared on an Oklahoma ranch, and it was necessary for Will to economize for some time before he was able to save the one hundred dollars that was Teddy's purchase price. He was a beautiful little pony dark bay, with black mane and tail—and as bright as a new dollar.

Will would call out to him, "Right!" and he would start instantly, and just as quickly would he stop. Will bought him a beautiful dark blue blanket, banded with gold, and the name "Will Rogers," in large gold letters across it. The cowboys who assisted Will in his act would ride the little horse, dressed in his fine blanket, from the stable to the main thoroughfare. Then he would dismount and Teddy, without a halter of any kind, would follow him down the crowded street and up to the stage door.

When Will and Teddy finally separated, the parting was a sad one. Teddy was shipped back to Oklahoma and placed on pasture with the other horses on the Rogers' ranch. There were instructions that he was to have the best of care, but one day the fence was broken down. The ranchman found that the horses had escaped. Eventually they were all rounded up except one. No-where could Teddy be found!

When Will Rogers, far away in the east, learned of the disappearance, he was heart-broken. He wired his nephew to make an immediate and thorough search for the pony. Neither time, trouble, nor expense was to be spared. Teddy must be found!

Months passed and at last Teddy was discovered. In a cornfield, pulling hard at a plow, with an old Indian driving him, they found the little pony that had been the idol of thousands of boys; that had worn

Laurentians Are Enticing

Guests at Chantecler, Ste-Adèle en haut Intrigue Your Editor

How often it happens that we travel distances feeling that the distant fields are such as to be envied. Such was brought home to your editor who has on several occasions visited and spent holidays at many of our noted resorts across Canada when attending newspaper association conventions. This year we were unable to attend the annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association, so spent a few days at "The Chantecler, Ste-Adèle en haut. This was our second holiday to be spent in the Laurentians, and with the lapse of years that intervened between these pleasurable weeks we can truthfully say holiday conditions and facilities have made tremendous strides in that delightful playground for Montrealers.

As far as Mrs. Sellar and myself are concerned our physique demand of us that we keep away from high altitudes. Ste-Adèle proved to be ideal in this respect. The Chantecler, a delightful hotel for both summer guests and skiers in the winter, rests upon a mountain slope at an altitude of 1200 feet above sea level. Just sufficient altitude to make the air embracing yet not sufficient thin air to affect those with indifferent heart conditions. We certainly can recommend this hotel with its French architecture and appointments to our readers.

The Chantecler affords accommodation to 45 guests some may have their sleeping quarters within the lodge, or in cabins built along the lines of French Canadian homes, such as we so often see sketched on Xmas cards with snow scenes. These cottages, as they really are, are delightfully located on bluffs not far distant from the lodge. The cottages are built of stone, and stucco; whilst the inside walls are finished off in pine. The cottages are made very cheerful through the use of pastel shades of paint, each room being decidedly different. Each cottage has a large open fire place built of native stone, whilst for the comfort of the winter guests a pipeless furnace is found in each cottage. The exterior walls of the cottages and the roofs are done in bright colors, so as one views the Chantecler from little Lake Rond, you get a really picturesque view of what one might believe was a picked scene of France.

Once established at The Chantecler the guests immediately forget business and turn their minds to relaxation. No one leaves The Chantecler a fatigued individual, but anxious to return and regale his visitor with which to catch up on their tasks. Many interesting people were found at The Chantecler during our stay.

A Commandant of the French Navy was sent to the Laurentians following the occupation of St. Pierre and Miquelon. This Frenchman has been in the French Navy for 30 years. We had many a fine visit. He was indeed, an extremely nervous man, but after spending several weeks in the Laurentians he is about ready to return to active duty. He has been in charge of a large transport boat, the fifth largest to the Normandie, in the French fleet. He told me many incidents which I believe should not be published at this moment, but I do feel it is quite within my rights to recall a few of his comments.

With some 3,000 troops on board, off North Africa, around 4 p.m., he was coming on duty, when behold, a sign was given that the ship was being trailed by a submarine. A V-12 was ahead of the ship, whilst the submarine was approximately a mile in the rear. The submarine commander must have been a novice, according to my informant, else he would not have permitted the periscope being made visible. It so happened that the sun was glaring down upon the periscope and made it shine like a silver ball. The Corvette chased it, dropped a number of depth charges and that was the last seen or ever to be heard of the Nazi submarine, or its occupants.

Our informant told of the occupation of St. Pierre and Miquelon, and how it was his duty to organize the local fishing fleets to participate in the occupation. The people were more than anxious to co-operate. The climate at St. Pierre and Miquelon did not agree with our informant, for during his thirty years going about the world he spent most of his life in the tropics. Canada has the ideal climate, and we all love the Laurentians, said the Commandant.

Last spring we put in to Boston, but as the United States did not recognize Free France, we were unable to leave our ship and go on land. We were glad to get away from Boston, even though we were fighting battles for the United States as well as ourselves. At a later date we went to Newport News to have work done to our boat, and on arrival there, we were all shipped to Canada. The crew have enjoyed the Canadian hospitality, the weather, and life in the Laurentian resorts.

The people in Free France who are able to take up arms have already done so. Very few people are now in Free France who are still able to serve in the army. The people in Vichy France would certainly like to take up arms but they are suppressed. When the day comes to invade France, our informant feels certain the French, male and female, will take up arms for the Allies.

"Who" he asked about The Chantecler, for among the guests were three outstanding Irishmen, Kerling, Keenan and Casey, all as breezy and fresh as their names might imply. Their jokes were original, and so refreshing that everybody about the hotel came to know them as though personal friends for years. Mr. Kerling has a heart condition that is not good, but for all of that, he took on the "ping pong" players or "horse shoe pitchers" and was usually found to be the victor. Mr. Marin, the Chantecler manager is a real good ping pong player, so when the guests saw Marin and Kerling heading for the table, a regular stream of guests would head their way to the ping pong room to witness their games. Keenan felt he was the best man at pitching horse

New Income Tax Form Is Simple

One Page, Three Main Headings For Particulars

Income tax form T.D. 1, which most employees are required to fill in and file with their employers not later than September 1 under the new tax collection system, is a simple one-page form with three main headings for information.

The form, sent out by the Department of National Revenue to all post offices and revenue tax offices, need not be filled out by single persons without dependents and who are not making payments within the year for superannuation or life insurance or for principal payments on mortgage or sale agreements.

Its purpose is to inform employers by what amount the refundable or savings portion of the new tax may be reduced. Reduction of up to 90 per cent. of the refundable portion is permitted for savings by the taxpayer in the form of insurance premiums, superannuation or pensions fund payments, payments made on principal of a mortgage and trade union payments other than dues. Savings in excess of the refundable portion are not counted.

The three main headings are for information dealing with the employee's marital status, number of dependents and amount of employee's savings being made through such payments.

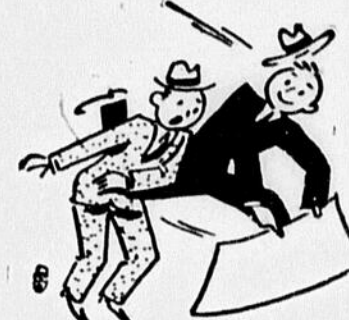

Report of Crop Conditions And Agricultural Pests SUMMARY

CROP CONDITIONS: A small proportion of hay is still to be cut; the total crop was heavy and stored in good condition. Actual conditions of principal field crops are as follows: Hay of clover and alfalfa, very good; cereals, potatoes and roots, good; pastures, fairly good; corn, varying from good to mediocre, due to cool nights. Milk production is maintained at a high level in feeding dairy cattle with green forage and commercial mixtures, in the districts where pastures are drying up.

AGRICULTURAL PESTS: Grasshoppers were numerous in some localities during the past two weeks. Corn borer, which had a slow development due to cool weather, is now very active. Corn flies are very abundant. Codling moth and stem borer are seen in several plantations. Early blight of potatoes caused more damage than last year. Mildew and blight are threatening everywhere. Tomato blight, bean anthracnose, club root and blight of cucumber are plentiful this summer. Bacterial blight is general in orchards throughout the Province. Apple scab is seen on trees where spraying has not been done.

CHATEAUGUAY VALLEY

DISTRICT NO. 12: Beauharnois, Chateaugay, Huntingdon, Lacolle, Napierville. — Cutting of cereals is nearing completion, threshing has commenced and yield is good. Owing to cool nights, growth of corn is very slow and pastures are poor. A heavy crop of peas for canning is now over. Gathering of apples is under way; crop is satisfactory in volume and quality and prices are good. Beneficial rains improved all crops.

Use Leather Scraps

Use scraps of leather from gloves, bags or discarded leather jackets to sew over points of wear in children's and men's clothing or to line jackets for extra warmth. A small strip of leather will make an excellent button loop on a garment where the loop gets hard wear.

Government to Help Remedy Lack of Nurses

Position Acute, Will Give Loans and Bursaries to Increase Numbers

Plans are now being formulated by the Canadian Nurses Association to overcome the acute shortage of well qualified graduate nurses in Canada which will become even more alarming as the months pass, Miss E. Flanagan, president of the Quebec, Registered Nurses Association, announced this week.

"The situation today can be explained briefly, as follows," Miss Flanagan said. "Normally we have about 23,000 graduate nurses in Canada."

"The average number of students enrolled in Schools of Nursing in Canada is 11,250 annually but approximately 30 per cent marry within two years of graduation and are lost to the profession."

"Since the war started about 1,500 graduate nurses have enrolled in the armed forces or for service in South Africa while, during this period, the demand for competent nurses in hospitals, industry, and public health work, has increased by an appreciable margin."

"At present there is an alarming shortage which can only be remedied if parents, and daughters who show inclination, and who have the educational background, will interest themselves in the honourable profession of nursing which so well fits a girl for shouldering responsibilities all through her life."

"Nursing today offers many more opportunities than it did a few years ago. Hours are shorter; salaries, generally, are better; than they were a few years ago."

"At the same time married and retired nurses who are physically fit can assist by reporting back for duty and, when necessary, take refresher courses which are now being planned."

"The Canadian Nurses' Association, with the assistance of the Dominion government, is now considering quite substantial loans and bursaries designed to increase the number of qualified nurses and the number of those who can be trained, and fitted, for educational and special work."

The Association is also studying clinical services in hospitals with a view to setting up standards for post-graduate experience and is planning the establishment of a nurse placement service or bureau at national headquarters which will be invaluable in the post-war period.

"All the efforts of the Association, however, cannot overcome the shortage unless eligible young women and their parents realize that, upon them, to a major extent depends whether this alarming situation will be remedied."

Granted Service Pay Pre-enlistment Students

Service rates of pay have been granted to men taking pre-enlistment courses for the Royal Canadian Air Force, effective August 16, it was announced recently.

Hitherto these men, studying in technical schools and similar institutions under the war emergency training plan, have received a subsistence allowance ranging from \$8 to \$15 per week, depending on their marital status.

Starting this week, they will get \$13.00 a day plus a subsistence allowance of \$1 a day, exclusive of dependents' allowance.

Gestapo Victim

How the Nazi Gestapo held a Y.M.C.A. Secretary prisoner for months and tried to wring from him by torture political secrets he did not possess, was revealed recently, by the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. of Canada.

"The man is James W. Brown, for many years Y.M.C.A. representative in Rumania," it was stated. "We are now at liberty to state the facts as conveyed to us by our National Council in New York, because Brown is safe. He returned to the U.S.A. in an exchange of our diplomats and nationals for those of our enemies."

"Brown had been 21 years in Rumania as staff worker for the International Committee of the Y.M.C.A. His welfare efforts for Rumanians and for Polish refugees probably put the Nazis on his trail. The Gestapo first arrested him on August 20th of last year on charges of espionage for the British. He was held for 48 hours."

"Just before Rumania declared war on the U.S.A., Mr. and Mrs. Brown left Bucharest for Turkey. But at Sylvania in Bulgaria they were detained and turned over to the Gestapo and sent back to Bucharest under guard. There Mrs. Brown was permitted to return home, under house arrest, but Brown was taken to the German Secret Police Jail where, after six days in solitary confinement, his ordeal really began."

"I was questioned and beaten the first night from 10.30 until 4.30 a.m., he says. 'I was stripped and hung to a rod by the wrists while the stool was pulled from under me. They kicked me in the kidneys and hit me. They said I could give them information about the work of our legation and the Commission for Polish Relief. I hung there for 45 minutes. In pulling me down one of the guards twisted my wrist so that the bone cracked. I was pretty much of a wreck by the time they returned to my cell. I had only black bread and watery soup during the next five days of my imprisonment.'"

"Intercession by the Rumanian prime minister procured Brown's release from the secret prison on

Time and Energy Savers Are Needed

Homemakers need more than ever to conserve time and energy to meet the growing demands made on them in their capacity as defence workers—saving and salvaging in every direction and giving up leisure to community war activities.

Although waste paper is needed for salvage, it will sometimes pay to use old newspapers and magazines or catalogues to lighten cleaning operations in the kitchen. Use newspapers on the work table when preparing fruits and vegetables and the garbage can be quickly cleared and wrapped for disposal. Catalogue or magazine pages are a convenient size for wiping out utensils before washing, especially if they are greasy. Keep one within easy reach.

Fold all articles that do not require ironing as they are taken from the line.

Use trays or small table on wheels or casters for setting and clearing the table.

Keep cleaning equipment such as dusters, and polishing cloths, whisk, cleansers and dustpan in a basket that can be conveniently moved from place to place.

Keep your kitchen knives and food choppers well sharpened.

Have your fuel box a convenient height to save stooping.

A work table that is too low for comfort can be raised with wooden blocks.

Christmas Eve, Mrs. Brown was trimming a little tree as a spiritual link with her husband, when he walked in. 'He had aged so much that I was frightened,' she says.

"The Browns remained in their home, closely guarded, never sure of their safety, until the diplomatic train that was to take the staff of the American Legation out of Rumania was ready to leave. The last night they spent at the legation itself. Colonel John Ratay, American military attaché in Bucharest, took them into his own compartment on the train to protect them from being kidnapped by the Gestapo at the Bulgarian border. A day later they reached Lisbon and safety."

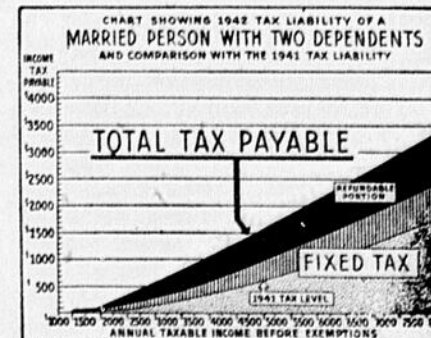
In the fourth year of war, Canada will need almost four billion dollars. This is the equivalent of nearly \$350 from every man, woman and child in the country.

Even with the highest income tax in history, 52% only of the money Canada needs will be raised by taxation. The rest will have to be borrowed by means of War Savings Stamps, Certificates and Victory Bonds.

Starting with the first pay period in September representing September earnings only, your employer is required by law to deduct your income tax from your wages or salary, and send it promptly to the Government. Everybody will pay his share as he goes along.

It's going to be tough . . . but not too tough! Here are some good features:

1. You will pay as you earn, so that you will not be faced with a large lump sum payment next year.
2. The National Defence Tax already deducted during the first 8 months of this year has been taken into account in the Table of Tax Deductions.
3. Though the income tax rates show a sharp increase over last year, a large portion of this increase is actually savings, to be paid back to you with interest after the war.
4. The money you are paying for life insurance premiums, annuities, principal repayments on your home, or into a pension fund may be deducted (up to a certain maximum) from the savings portion of your income tax. In many cases this may be sufficient to make payment of the savings portion of the tax unnecessary.



Unless you are single, without dependents, and not making payments of the types mentioned in paragraph 4 above, you should file Form TD-1 with your employer. Otherwise, you may not be allowed the credits to which you are entitled. DO NOT DELAY. File Form TD-1 with your employer at once so that you may get the full allowances from the start.
