The vessels employed on these stations are all of the finest description, and are the property of joint-stock companies in the City. Aberdeen, besides its Colleges, has numerous benevolent and charitable institutions, including Gordon's hospital for the education of the sons of decayed burghesses, and the Royal infirmary. Distant from Edinburgh 130 miles. Population about 65,000.

DUBLIN.—The Capital of Ireland, in the County of Dublin, and situated on the River Liffey, close to its entrance into Dublin Bay. It is the centre of all the political, ecclesiastical, legal, educational, fiscal, commercial, and military institutions of Ireland. The Liffey divides the town into two nearly equal parts, intersecting it from west to east, and is embanked with granite. lined on both sides with spacious quays, and spanned by nine bridges, seven of stone and two of iron. The City is surrounded by a highway, called the Circular Road, 9 miles in extent, which may be considered its entire circumference. In the centre of the south half of the city is the Castle—an edifice, of different ages, built on an elevated site, and containing an arsenal, armory, the Government offices, and the State apartments of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. The modern part of the city is well built, but the other part, lying south of the river, is composed of narrow streets, lined by mean houses. Dublin is decorated with several historical statues. Its University, chartered in 1591, is situated in Trinity College, and possesses a library of 150,000 volumes. The principal exports are linen, cattle, corn, meal, flour, provisions, sheep, hogs, woollen and cotton manufactures, hides, and eggs; imports, colonial produce, tea, timber and wine. The Bay of Dublin is noble and picturesque, and is esteemed one of the finest in the United Kingdom. It is about 7 miles in breadth at its entrance between Howth Head on the north and Kingston on the south, with a lighthouse. The harbor, formerly a very indifferent one, has been lately so much improved that vessels of large burden may now unload at the quays. The Docks connected with the Custom House, on the north side, cover an area of 8 acres, have 16 feet depth of water, and 1,200 yards of quay, with ample stores, and are capable of accommodating 40,000 tons of shipping. The docks on the south side afford commodious wharfage for upwards of 100 sail. Steam packets ply regularly to Holyhead and Liverpool, London, Bristol, Cork, Glasgow, &c.; and by the Grand and Royal Canals, connecting the Liffey with the Shannon, supplies are carried to the interior, and grain, potatoes, &c., brought to the

capital. It is about 135 miles west of Liverpool, and distant from Quebec about 2,435 miles, from Montreal about 2,605 miles and from Toronto about 2,338 miles. The population of Dublin, in 1851, was 254,850.

DUNDEE.—A Royal Burgh in the County of Forfar, Scotland, situated on the Estuary of the Tay. It is the chief seat of the Scotch linen manufacture. The amount of tonnage belonging to the port is over 60,000, the vessels being principally employed in the importation of flax and hemp from the Baltic, Archangel, &c.; besides which a large quantity of jute is brought from London and Liverpool, either coastwise or by railway. The importation of textile materials amounts on an average to considerably over 22,000 tons. These, being first converted into yarns, are manufactured, either by hand or power-loom, into the various fabrics for which this enterprising port is famous. The average annual exportation of canvases, sheetings, bagging, &c., amounts to 362,000 pieces, besides that required for home consumption. The principal markets for these goods are North and South America, East and West Indies, Australia, &c. Canada receives a large share, though the importation is only partially direct, a great portion being bought in New York and thence transmitted to Western Canada. Besides the manufactures above alluded to, Dundee contains large and important works in almost every branch of industry: foundries, engine and machine shops, and other similar establishments abound, while it has been long celebrated for the manufacture of gloves, &c. The extensive and elegant docks are the admiration of strangers, and the crowded and busy streets evidently show that a large amount of trade is being carried on; and the tourist will find much to occupy his attention in localities connected with Scottish history. Distant from Edinburgh 49 miles, and from Glasgow 62 miles. Population about 90,000.

It is remarkable for the number and magnificence of its hospitals, charitable institutions, and public monuments. These, combined with the general excellence and elegance of the buildings, the striking and romantic appearance of the City itself and the picturesque scenery around it, makes it a place of generally acknowledged beauty; whilst its past history is one of important interest. Distant from Glasgow 42 miles, and from London 333 miles. Population about 158,000.

GLASGOW.—The principal commercial City in Scotland, situated on a gentle declivity sloping towards the banks of the Clyde, in the County of Lanark. Three large stone and two handsome suspension bridges connect the city proper with the ancient suburb of Gorbals on the left bank. Glasgow has many public buildings of great architectural merit; many of the streets are handsome and spacious; and the new crescents and squares present as beautiful specimens of modern domestic architecture as can be seen. The University is in the Elizabethan style, and dates about the middle of the 17th century. The Cathedral of St. Mungo, a fine old Gothic building, founded in 1136, has a crypt unequalled by any in the kingdom. The Hunterian Museum, the new County buildings, and the Tontine Exchange, are worthy of much attention; but the most magnificent of the public buildings is the Royal Exchange, in the Corinthian style, surmounted by a handsome circular clock tower having a lofty octostyle portico, three columns in depth, and adorned on the sides by engaged columns, giving the whole building a singularly noble appearance. The Glasgow Gallery of Art and Corporation Hall, purchased from the executors of the late Archibald McLellan, Esq., at an expense of £40,000, constitutes one of the finest suite of rooms and picture galleries in the kingdom. Glasgow has 96 miles of well-paved streets, lighted by 8,000 gas lamps. The total annual quantity of gas used in the city is nearly 450,000,000 cubic feet, and of water 12,000,000 gallons per diem. Within the last three years, Glasgow has acquired the noble parks and pleasure grounds of Woodside, on the banks of the River Kelvin, which have now become the most fashionable resort of the city. The grounds have been beautifully laid out and decorated from designs by Sir Joseph Paxton, while the summit is surrounded by a quadrangle of beautiful terraces, affording a splendid panoramic view of the far-famed Kelvin Grove and the Vale of Clyde. The Green of Glasgow is a large and beautiful park, comprising 140 acres of smooth, verdant lawn, adorned with rows of noble trees; and the Necropolis, with its terraces of monuments rising one above the other, has a striking appearance, and will compare favorably with the celebrated Père la Chaise. The staple manufactures of Glasgow are cotton, woollen, and silk goods, and iron, with their endless varieties of name, form and purpose; also glass and stoneware. In 1849, 475,000 tons of pig iron were produced and manufactured into land and marine engines, railway wheels, axles, rails, presses, mills, anchors, and innumerable other articles. Glasgow has large potteries, tobacco-pipe manufactories and distilleries. In 1852, over a million of pipes were being manufactured weekly. In the art of embroidering muslins, Glasgow now stands pre-eminently, and in this class of labor her enterprising citizens employ a vast portion of the population, not only of their own country, but also that of Ireland. The annual consumption of coal in this city is calculated at two million tons, which, besides a large quantity exported, is principally derived from large coalpits in the neighbourhood. The harbor below Glasgow bridge is usually crowded with vessels from all parts of the world. The quays lining each side of the river are 10,873 feet in extent, furnished with long ranges of sheds, and capable of accommodating vessels of 1,000 tons burthen. The aggregate tonnage of vessels entering and sailing from this port is over 1,200,000 tons per annum. Besides being the seat of a great amount of trade arising from its native manufactures, Glasgow is a general mart for all the manufactures of Scotland, and most of those of the North of Ireland. It has an extensive foreign and coasting trade, for the accommodation of which, there are numerous and spacious bonded warehouses and granaries, the former in the vicinity of the quays. Distant from Edinburgh 43 miles, from Quebec about 2,770 miles, from Montreal about 2,940 miles, and from Toronto 3,273 miles. Population in 1851, 329,097.

LIVERPOOL.—A very important Commercial Town, in the County of Lancaster, situated on the right or eastern bank of the River Mersey, about 4 miles from its confluence with the Irish Sea. It is, next to London, the principal seaport of England. It stands partly on flat ground along the margin of the river, and partly on a gentle acclivity. Its length from north to south is $\frac{1}{2}$ miles, its greatest breadth a little more than $\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and its area 5,002 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres. In the older parts of the town the streets are narrow and ill-built, but in the more modern portions they are spacious and well-paved, with handsome squares and crescents. The most important public buildings are the Town Hall, an elegant Grecian structure, founded in 1749; the Exchange Buildings, having three interior façades, and an arched basement, and surmounted by a range of Corinthian pilasters supporting a handsome cornice and balustrade; the Revenue Buildings, covering an area of 6,700 square yards; St. George's Hall, a magnificent building in the Corinthian style; and the Philharmonic Hall, a noble and spacious building erected by a company of gentlemen for the performance of high class concerts and oratorios. The town has excellent markets. The most remarkable feature of this great seaport is the number and magnificence of its Docks, corresponding with the extent of its vast commerce. They lie along the margin of the river, or between it and the town, most of them being parallel with the Mersey, but some at right angles to it. There are in all 30 docks, and the length of the river wall which fronts them is 5 miles, the total area being 200 acres (179 acres of wet docks and 21 acres of dry basins). The total quay space is 14 miles, and the principal docks are the Huskisson, Prince's, Queen's, and Brunswick. In the value of its foreign exports and the extent of its foreign commerce, Liverpool is the first port in the world. In 1850 the foreign exports amounted to nearly £35,000,000. Cotton forms an important branch of the commerce of Liverpool, 1,748,946 bales being imported in 1851. The town has, since the recent gold discoveries, a great trade in the precious metals. The Irish and coasting trade is also very large. 6,000,000 tons of goods and merchandise pass through this port annually, the shipping employed in transmitting it amounting in 1850 to 6,011,870 tons. Liverpool is the great point of departure for emigrants from Great Britain and Ireland. It is connected by railway with all the principal towns and ports in the kingdom, and its trade is further facilitated by an extensive net work of canals connecting it with the great seats of manufacturing and mining industry. It has regular communication by steam vessels with Glasgow Belfast, Londonderry, Dublin, Cork, Holyhead, and numerous places on the coast of England and Wales; also with Havre, the Mediterranean, New York, Boston, Halifax, Quebec, Montreal, &c. Distant from London 210 miles, from New York 2,980 miles, from Quebec 2,570 miles, from Montreal 2,740 miles, and from Toronto 3,073 miles. Population, in 1851, 375,955.

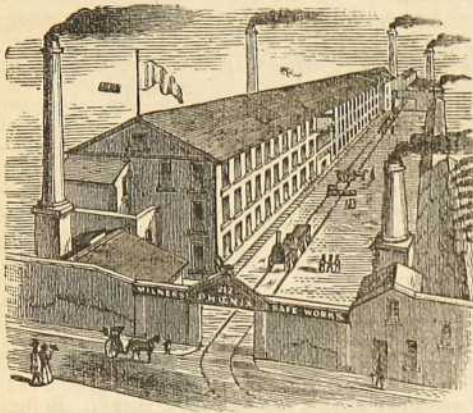

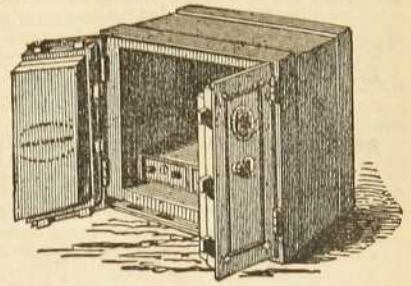

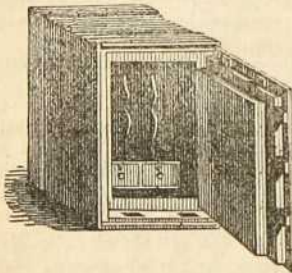

LONDON.—The Capital of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the first city, and, as it has been well styled, the Metropolis of the World, is situated in the south-east of England, on the River Thames, about 40 miles from its mouth. On the north bank, where the principal part of London stands, the site rises gradually at the rate of 36 feet per mile; while on the opposite bank, the houses cover an extensive flat, lying in some places several feet below the highest tides. The City, strictly so called, is but a small portion of the metropolis; the limits of which, as defined by law, enclose an area of 116 square miles, having in 1851, the period of the last census, a population of 2,361,640. The metropolis includes the cities of London and Westminster, and the Parliamentary boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Southwark, Lambeth, Finsbury, and Marylebone; formerly distinct, but now, with their extensive suburbs, combined into one vast mass of houses. London stands on alluvial deposits, consisting of beds of clay and gravel, below which is the hard clay stratum known to geologists by the name of "London clay." It is considered healthy, as indicated by the low rate of mortality; and will be probably rendered more so by the means which the Legislature has lately taken to cleanse it of its enormous sewerage, amounting to over 10,000,000 cubic feet per diem. A corporate body, created by Parliament for the purpose, is about to carry into effect a plan for regularly draining the sewerage, either to the German Ocean, or to a point in the Thames whence it cannot reflow with the tide; it being at present discharged at all points directly into the river, thereby vitiating the water and the atmosphere, upon the purity of which must depend, in a chief measure, the health of the inhabitants. The metropolis is intersected by long and spacious lines of streets in every direction, the principal leading from East to West, and affording an unbroken line of communication for many miles. Within a short walk of the heart of London are situated Hyde Park, containing about 400 acres, having on the south side a large artificial lake called the Serpentine, which is spanned by a handsome bridge of five arches, and leading to Kensington Gardens, a beautiful park, well wooded and finely laid out; St. James Park, 83 acres in extent, bounded in part by Buckingham Palace, and containing a lake ornamented and studded with islets; the Green Park, 71 acres in extent; Regent's Park, on the North, with an area of 403 acres; Victoria Park in the East; and Battersea Park in the South. These Parks are surrounded for the most part by streets and squares of handsome construction, the town residences of the nobility and merchant princes of England. The Palace of Westminster, a magnificent edifice, in the Tudor Gothic style, containing the Houses of Parliament, covers an area of eight acres, and the façade overlooks the river and is 900 feet in length. It is pannelled with rich tracery and profusely decorated with statues and shields of arms of the Kings and Queens of England from the Conquest to the present time. It has three lofty towers, the highest being 75 feet square and rising 340 feet, being supported upon four pointed arches 60 feet in height. The Tower of London, of much historic interest, lies also on the banks of the Thames,—a part of it, the White Tower, having been erected so far back as the year 1078. It contains the regalia of Great Britain, the Wellington Barracks, Queen Elizabeth's Armory, and the church of St. Peter and Vincula, where lie the remains of Edward V., Anne Boleyn, Thomas Cromwell, the Dukes of Somerset and Monmouth, and the decapitated bodies of kings, queens, statesmen and warriors. Westminster Abbey, the Temple Church, the Bank of England, the Royal Exchange, the British Museum, and the Guildhall, are all noteworthy edifices, claiming attention for magnitude, architectural beauty, and in some instances for antiquity. The metropolitan prisons are deserving of remark. Some of them can accommodate 2,000 prisoners, and the discipline is perfect. They differ in their character, some being for debtors, others for criminal offenders sentenced to various terms of imprisonment and to transportation, penal servitude, &c. The Metropolitan termini of the various Railways are colossal buildings, of considerable architectural beauty, and adapted to accommodate a large goods and passenger

traffic. Hence radiate lines of railway to every town in England; and it may shortly be expected that all these termini, now necessarily separated, will be united by a grand metropolitan line. The Thames is crossed in several places by handsome stone and iron bridges, one of which is now in course of reconstruction; and two miles below London bridge is a brick tunnel, an engineering wonder, nearly 1,000 feet in length, constructed entirely under the Thames; and while persons are passing through this tunnel, steamers and other vessels are actually sailing over their heads. It took 18 years to build this magnificent tunnel, which has now been open for some time for foot passengers, who enter it by a cylindrical shaft at either end with 100 steps. London has very extensive docks, with wharves, vaults, and storehouses of gigantic capacity. The trade and manufactures of the metropolis are of such an extensive and varied nature as to preclude the possibility of specific detail here. Here are the largest breweries, distilleries, and manufactories of every description, in the world. Five million tons of shipping annually enter the port of London, whence steamers and other vessels of all kinds leave daily for all parts of the commercial world. London is supplied by 20 companies with 15,000,000 cubic feet of gas per diem, and by 7 water companies with 44,573,979 gallons of water daily. 7,000 public vehicles ply daily in the streets of the metropolis. The city returns four members to Parliament. This necessarily very brief notice of London would be incomplete without a glance at its civil government. The system of police devised some years ago by the late Sir Robert Peel is the most perfect ever yet established. It suffices to protect the capital of the kingdom and to aid in suppressing any provincial disturbance, thus rendering resort to military authority of very rare occurrence. At the same time, especially in its detective branch, it is admirably adapted to repress crime, and to discover its authors when committed. This system has very recently been adopted in Paris as the basis of a new French police. From the heights of some of the lofty buildings in the metropolis may be obtained a panoramic view unequalled of a vast multitude of human beings, portraying to the mind some small idea of the crowded and active population, the unceasing and enormous traffic, the wealth, and the commerce of the "Great World of London." It is distant from Liverpool 210 miles, from Quebec 2,780 miles, from New York 3,190 miles, from Montreal 2,960 miles, and from Toronto 3,293 miles.

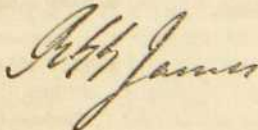

The water has cut these deep pits almost through the pipe, and not only upon the portion which we have illustrated, but has formed similar chasms throughout the entire length.—*Expositor*.
