BRITISH OCCUPY BRANDFORT

Important Position Now Secured.

May Mean Co-operation with Buller.

Provides an Advance Base of Supplies.

London, May 4.—(Special)—The British to-day occupied Brandfort without opposition. This news is considered the most important since the capture of Cronje and the relief of Ladysmith.

The fact that the position gives the key to one of the main roads leading to the Drakensberg Passes, which possibly may be the means of co-operation with General Buller later on, provides an advance base of supplies, and at the same time menaces the Boers now south-east of Bloemfontein, is obviously the reason for the importance attached by all hands to the intelligence.

Thaba N'Chu, May 3.—(Special)—The Boers have evacuated Thaba N'Chu hill, and are believed to be still trekking, though one gun has shelled the camp indiscriminately.

Scouts report that some of the Boers have returned towards Wepener. They believe the Boers evacuated the position during the night.

BOERS CONTINUE TO HARRASS BRITISH.

London, May 3.—The immediate objective of Lord Roberts is to establish a line of British posts from one frontier of the Free State to the other at right angles with the railway, thus preventing Boer raids southward.

It is essential, therefore, that the Boers should be expelled from the rugged Thaba N'Chu district and be forced to retire to Ladybrand.

As the result of the desultory firing Monday and Tuesday, the Boers were pushed back a few miles, but nothing decisive appears to have been yet attained.

The Boers continue to follow their harassing tactics. One well-horsed commando, operating in the neighborhood of Sannas Post interferes with the British convoys going from Bloemfontein to Thaba N'Chu, the enemy nearly captured a convoy Tuesday, but they were driven off after a brisk fight.

PREPARE FOR AN ADVANCE.

Preparations for an advance continue at Kimberley. Sir Alfred Milner has written to the mayor of Kimberley, assuring him that the relief of Mafeking has not ceased to occupy his attention and that of the military authorities, and nothing will be left undone to raise the siege at the earliest possible moment.

General Pole-Carew's division, composed of the Guards, and General Stevenson's brigade, with several batteries of artillery, all in winter clothing, left Bloemfontein Tuesday morning.

Lord Roberts with Lady Roberts and their daughter, reviewed the division in the Markets Place.

Later Lord Roberts while reviewing Roberts' Horse, congratulated the men upon their bravery, spoke of the gallantry of the colonial troops and expressed the hope that he might soon review them in Pretoria.

SUPPLIES ARE GOING FORWARD

The British garrisons along the railway to Warrenton have been strengthened and supplies are going forward. A mounted force has gone to Barkley West, in consequence of the Boers having occupied Windsorton. A thousand Boers threaten the communications between Boshof and Kimberley.

Malala, chief of the Taungs, has informed the British that the Boers are preparing to resist their advance at Phokwani, twenty miles north of Warrenton.

A correspondent at Lorenzo Marques cabled Tuesday that a large part of the investing force at Mafeking had been withdrawn. General Buller continues quiet. The Boers assert that they are delaying an attack upon him in the hope that all the horses of the British will die of horse sickness.

According to a correspondent of the Daily Telegraph with Lord Roberts, President Kruger is again asking peace terms.

Lord Roberts has telegraphed to the War Office from Bloemfontein under to-day's date that news had been received from Colonel Baden-Powell, the British commander at Mafeking, saying all was well there on April 20.

HOTTEST OF THE SIEGE.

A despatch from Mafeking describing the Boer attack of April 11, says:—

"The bombardment of the Creusots was the hottest of the siege. Many shells entered the hospital and women's laager. Under cover of the artillery a large force, com-

manded by Cronje (the younger), including the German corps advanced close to Fort Abrams. The garrison laid low until the Boer force was at close range when they fired a volley, killed five, wounded many, and the attack was repulsed. The bombardment then ceased. The Boers, under a Red Cross flag were permitted later to recover their dead.

Windsor is in holiday attire to-day and decorated from end to end in honor of the naval brigade of the British cruiser Powerful, which assisted in the defence of Ladysmith. The naval men have been summoned to the castle to be inspected by the Queen. The band of the Grenadier Guards met the naval brigade at the railroad station and played them to the castle through cheering throngs of people.

The Powerful were presented to Her Majesty, who thanked Captain Lambton and the brigade for their noble services to the Empire. The captain replied that they had done was nothing to what the navy was prepared to do for Her Majesty.

The Queen saw the bluejackets entertained at dinner.

MAY NOT LAST LONG.

A despatch from Bloemfontein, dated Tuesday, chronicles the prevailing opinion among the townspeople there that the war is not likely to last more than six weeks after the British advance shall begin.

A despatch from Pretoria gives the text of President Kruger's proclamation expelling British subjects from the Transvaal. It says:—

"As numerous burghers insist upon the removal of the British and as the Government is desirous of complying with the wishes of the burghers and others favorable to the republic, all Britishers residing in the district and town of Pretoria and the Witwatersrand gold fields must leave the state within thirty-six hours from noon April 30. Exception will be made in the case of those obtaining special permits."

HARDSHIPS AT MAFEKING.

RESERVING MULES UNTIL THE LAST.

London, May 1.—Lady Sarah Wilson, telegraphing from Mafeking, April 19, says:—

"The investment is so close that no runners have entered or issued forth for ten days. There was a terrific bombardment on April 11, but with the exception of destroying some houses, it was harmless. The Boers then made a determined attack on the southwestern forts, which was successfully repulsed.

"The Boers have formed a new laager on the south. Many horses were dying of horse sickness. Trees are being cut down for fuel. The garrison is now eating ambulance oxen, reserving the mules until the last. The daily ration is now six ounces of gritty oat bread, a pound of bully beef, and a quart of skilly."

IS NOW A MILLIONAIRE.

London, Ont., May 2.—Francis E. Brooks, machinist, living in a small cottage in this city has fallen heir to nine million dollars in California through the death of an uncle. The estate comprises the California Central Railway besides several fine residences, and a large amount in stocks. Mr. Brooks has already drawn on the executors for one thousand dollars and will shortly leave to take possession of his property.

MOE'S RIVER.

There will be services in the Universalist church on Sunday, May 6, at the usual hour, 3 p. m. Rev. E. Smiley will be in attendance.

IDENTITY OF PRIVATE CULVER.

Quebec, May 2.—Private J. W. Culver, of the first Canadian contingent, reported wounded at Israel's Post, April 25, was, before his enlistment, a clerk in the Chateau Frontenac. He enlisted under the name of J. W. Raymond.

SEVEN DAYS FROM LONDON.

An English mail arrived at the Montreal Post Office on Wednesday morning via New York, which brought newspapers and letters up to the 25th of April, just a week ago. This is one of the fastest deliveries made in Montreal for several years. The mail came by the German steamer Kaiser Wilhelm.

DESPATCHES CONFIRM TWO DEATHS.

Toronto, May 2.—The Evening Telegram's special London cable says:—The War Office has been notified that Private H. C. Barr, of the 21st Essex Fusiliers, died at Nasuport, Cape Colony, from enteric fever. He belonged to "B" Company, of the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry. The death of Shoemith McMillan, of the Canadian Mounted Rifles at Bloemfontein, is also confirmed.

DISKASED CATTLE KILLED.

Liverpool, May 2.—Two cattle boats from the Rio de la Plata, with 400 bullocks and 200 sheep, arrived in the Mersey this morning, all the animals being affected with the foot and mouth disease. Although the order prohibiting the importation of South American cattle came into operation to-day, the Board of Agriculture permitted the landing of the animals, which were immediately slaughtered, the heads and feet being buried at sea.

The Courage of Hawks.

One female bird in her first season
took 32 rabbits, 3 hares and 2 magpies,

six birds in succession, for they do not
tire like falcons. Nothing comes amiss to
them. Hares, landrails, pheasants,

tonishing. They will charge into a
quickest hedge till they have to be cut
out, or dive among rocks and bow-

stuck to a hare till it twice rolled head
over heels. Then the hawk flew after
it again and was shaken off, while the
hare escaped into a flock of sheep. The
same bird, pursuing a rabbit, flew right
down a large hole in the side of a
quarry and dragged the rabbit out of
it. The "small" with which a big ha-
goshawk goes into an evergreen tree
after a pigeon sounds as if a football
had been violently kicked into the
branches.—London Spectator.
