COURT OF APPEALS.

Present—Chief Justice Sir A. A. DORRIS, Hon. Justices MONK, RAMSAY, THERRON, Cross and Baby.

ISAIE FRECHETTE, Appellant, and LA COMPAGNIE MANUFACTURIERE DE ST. HYACINTHE, Respondent—The respondent was the proprietor of a lot of land on the River Yamaska adjoining a lot of land belonging to the appellant, and several others.

The CANADA PAPER COMPANY, Appellant, and DUGALD J. BANNATYNE, Respondent—This is an appeal from a judgment rendered by Hon. Justice Rainville in the Superior Court.

Richard Wilson, Appellant, and the GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY COMPANY, Respondent—This was an appeal from the interlocutory judgment rendered by the Court of Review, on the 31st January, 1879, granting the motion made by the respondents to have the findings of the special jury rendered on the 9th July, 1878, at St. Johns, condemning the Company, set aside, and a new trial ordered.

Mr. George Macrae, Q.C., on behalf of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, gave notice that they would appeal to the Privy Council of England.

F. X. BEAUDRY, Appellant, THOMAS LUPIN, Respondent—This was an appeal from a judgment of Hon. Justice Torrance, in the Superior Court, on the 19th April, 1881. The respondent rented from the appellant, by lease, on the first day of May, 1880, the house, No. 296 St. Lawrence street, for three years, at \$6 per month.

The MERCHANTS BANK OF CANADA, Appellants, and GEORGE WHITEFIELD, Respondent—This was an appeal from a judgment rendered by Judge Gagnon in the Superior Court, district of Iverville, on the 1st of September, 1879, dismissing the action of the Bond against the defendant, Whitefield, as to a note for \$10,000 and reasons.

LA CORPORATION DU VILLAGE DE L'ASSOMPTION, Appellant, and HOMER BAKER, Respondent—This case was decided in the Court of Appeals against the appellants.

Mr. PICHÉ gave notice of appeal to the Privy Council of QUEEN'S BENCH.

The Court of Queen's Bench opened at ten o'clock Saturday morning. Present—Hon. Justices MONK & CROSS. Messrs. C. P. DAVIDSON, Q. C., and J. A. OUBET, Q. C., represented the Crown.

Hon. Justice Cross sentenced George Cullen, who pleaded guilty to indecently exposing his person, to \$10 fine, to be imprisoned until the fine was paid.

THE FUTURE OF MONTREAL.

It will be readily admitted that the citizenship of Montreal has given ample evidence of its anxiety about the future. Up to the hour when stagnation had commenced all over the world, the commercial metropolis of the Dominion held its own, and though her merchants were, in every branch, crippled for years, still, all the business she had any claim upon, was controlled in this market. We probably lost nothing, even if we had active and intelligent competitors, and our faith has never weakened, that, when the time came, we would have our full share of any improvement in the commerce of the country. With three exceptionally good harvests, and foreign demand for our lumber, our people have been fortified financially to an extent which could not have been anticipated. It is easy now to define our position as the head of ocean navigation, and the main outlet to Europe. We have established our supremacy by the energy and ambition of our merchants whose efforts are visible to-day, making Montreal a second New York on this Continent. But while we may be content with the state of things as they exist now we have not been without our anxiety about the Great North-West, which, up to this period, has cost an enormous amount of money. Should we realise but a fraction of that which has been promised by the growth of this new territory, Montreal will have no reason to complain; but in this connection we would rather deal with facts than the criticisms of those who simply read encyclopedias. We are led to make these remarks by the fact of our having received from our Winnipeg correspondent an advance sheet of the crop reports made by Station-masters, Post-masters and others, in various parts of Manitoba and the North-West. As far as it goes the report is as complete as might reasonably have been expected; indeed, we could not have looked for such satisfactory details had the work of preparing the information not been entrusted to an officer of the road who has had every experience in preparing such information for our greatest railway corporation, the Grand Trunk, in former years. The report, which covers a good deal less than one half of the land under culture, would occupy one page of our paper, a space we cannot afford to sacrifice, but we have made a very careful perusal of the details, and have extracted all, in the meantime, which will be of interest to intending settlers. The reports are from 68 localities, and the general expressions in these are: "A first-class yield of cereals," "splendid root crops, far exceeding expectations." Emerson says:—

DOMINION.

FOREIGN.

The Belgian Guard has been ordered to wear mourning eight days in memory of President Garfield.

It is officially announced in Berlin that Dr Korum, the new Bishop of Treves, has entered upon the discharge of his functions.

The delay of Cherif Pasha, the new Egyptian Premier, in naming a period for the dispersal of the troops, begins to cause uneasiness.

A Sepoy who escaped from Herat, and arrived at Quetta, says that four British soldiers, captured at the battle of Maiwand, were sold into slavery there.

A despatch from Bombay says the Ameer has abandoned his position on the Cabul road, and formed a new camp from which he commands the Herat road and every approach to Candahar.

The Engineers of the Great Govern-

ment have arranged to test all the well-known systems of lighting by electricity, including those of Farmer, Maxim, Weston, Edison and Jablochokoff, with the view of putting the electric light in practice.

A letter from Stanley, the African explorer, dated Congo River, July 4th, says the writer was seriously sick all through May. On the 15th day of his illness he gave, as he thought, his last orders to his European companions, but the crisis passed and he is now strong and hearty.

—The Geographical Congress has awarded to the American Section letters of distinction for various topographic and hydrographic surveys and publications by Government officials, and for a series of publications by the Post-office Department; also a diploma of honour, second-class. Agricultural Commissioner Honorable mention is made of the Treasury Department reports.

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AMUSEMENTS

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.

As we expected and said in Saturday's issue the second presentation of Mr. L. O. Davidson's original dramatic and emotional drama, for which he has chosen the above very wide title, was much more successful than the first. The audience was not large, but the maddness of the streets and the number of counter-attractions, fully account for this being many seats vacant. In some respects Mr. Davidson has been very successful in the selection of his company, but in several of the leading parts a change will have to be made if full justice is to be done to his really excellent production. In his choice of a subject for dramatization the author has been very fortunate—his play was the most critical in the history of the American revolution, the personages whose names are immortal, the events overflowing with romantic and thrilling incident. It is not easy to recall another period so inviting to the pen of the playwright, and it is not surprising that he has not long ere this furnished the world with a drama of the highest type. What more exalted or interesting characters for portrayal than Washington, Lafayette, or as his character and his acts appear now, the ill-fated Andre? What more stirring incident than the attack on Fort Mifflin, the flight to West Point, its failure, and the noble resignation which Andre met his doom. A theme like this offers the rarest opportunities for the expression of lofty sentiments, for the display of personal emotion, and for imposing scenic accompaniments. For an author the selection of such a theme was a Herculean task, but he has done it with a sure and steady hand, and when the representation of the play is placed in more competent hands we predict popularity for it. He has entered thoroughly into the spirit of the great epoch; he has an understanding of the feelings of the time, and he has drawn the most conspicuous actors in its stirring events. He has escaped the temptation, to represent Andre as a reckless cavalier, on the one hand, or a skilful intriguer on the other, and has simply made him appear, what we believe to have been, a high-minded and earnest patriot, who was not everything and danger nothing; but with a temperament of extreme sensitiveness and tenderness. Mr. David has succeeded well in the depicting of this interesting complex character. For the portrayal of Washington, the arrangement of the play within the limits of the one act, and the fact that we get a momentary glimpse of "the Father of his country," and on no occasion does he appear before us in the full grandeur of his stern devotion to duty and his spirit of self-denial and singular clearness of perception. We do not mention this as a defect, for it is a pity that we do not get a more extended view of the man who shall move. Besides, it is not talent but genius which should undertake to portray a Washington. Lafayette, as he appears in the play under notice, is a rather uninteresting character. The treachery of Benedict Arnold, his discovery, his flight, and the well-represented episode of the stirring story. The plot of the play is well conceived and well constructed, and will appear to much greater advantage when it comes before the public with a Company worthy to be entrusted with it, and with such accessories as will give it more effect to its many highly dramatic situations. On a large stage, with a numerous corps of well-drilled "sups," and a more rapid rendering, the play cannot fail to enjoy a large measure of popular approbation. If anything, there is too much declamation, and too little movement, and it is too unconsciously American to be quite to the taste of a Canadian audience—necessarily so, we allow; but we understand that it has been prepared specially for representation on the other side, where it will doubtless meet with the full approval it deserves.

HAZEL KIRKE.

The manager of the Academy has shown great judgment in selecting for its second presentation, this week, the great Madison Square success, "Hazel Kirke," which will be presented as it was played in the Madison Square Theatre, N. Y., nearly 1,000 consecutive nights, achieving by far the longest run on record. "Hazel Kirke" is a domestic drama of the highest merit. An accomplished critic says:—"It is touching to a point of sympathy which the morbid effects of the French drama cannot approach. The Shamrocks won the toss and chose to play down the field. The first game was started at 3.15. The ball was drawn by the Shamrock man and sent to quickly in front of the Independent goal where after a brief struggle it was hurled through by Farmer after two minutes play.

The second game was almost immediately started and again resulted in favour of the Shamrocks in less than five minutes play. In the third game, which lasted for about twenty-five minutes, some very fine playing was shown. Dillon and Blacklock distinguished themselves on the Independent side, and the Shamrocks on the Shamrocks side. Then, again, a good soldier must be regular in his attendance on drill, a quality which he knew was not very prevalent now-a-days. Another essential quality was that the soldier when he entered the ranks must be in sympathy with the men he would do it as faithfully as they would themselves. The best essentials, perhaps greater than all the rest, were loyalty to their sovereign and obedience to their superiors. If they wished to be good soldiers they must be loyal for one enemy in the camp was more dangerous than a hundred without. So, also, if they wished to be good soldiers they must show implicit obedience to their officers' commands. As it was with the soldier of the Queen so it was with the soldier of God. He, too, must be of fine physique, able to endure hardness, he also must enlist into his master's service and carry on the good work which he must be regular in drill, studying his regulation book the bible. He also must be in sympathy with his cause or he would never be successful and he must also stand by his colours. Lastly, he must show implicit obedience to the orders of the great captain of his salvation, and aim to finish the work which he took part in the service. At the conclusion of the service the different corps reformed, and accompanied by the Sixth Fusiliers Band, marched to the Champ de Mars where they filed off to their different armories and dispersed.

NEW PUBLICATIONS.

THE INTERNATIONAL REVIEW for October, New York, A. S. Barnes & Co.

The October number of the International Review opens with a very able article upon "The Treasury and the Banks," by Mr. H. W. Richardson, editor of the Portland Advertiser. It is an exhaustive and exceedingly interesting discussion of the currency problem, and will be sure to attract the attention of all bankers, as well as those less intimately connected with the present greenback system. Mr. Wm. Myall, by this time well known to the readers of the Review, contributes a critical and biographical essay upon "John Wesley." The author of the best recent book upon Carlyle, Mr. Edwin D. Reed, is entirely at home in a scholarly essay upon "Immanuel Kant" dealing with the subject in a dual capacity—Kant the man, and his philosophical doctrines. This article is timely, in view of the fact that the Kant centennial has just been celebrated. A third biographical article is "Roscoe Conkling," by Wm. W. Phelps. The author reviews the whole of Mr. Conkling's political life, and seeks therein a cause for the great qualities claimed for the New York ex-Senator. Mr. Wm. E. Dugge, of Atlanta, Ga., replies to an article recently published in this Review upon "The Solid South," by Mr. Edward Atkinson. It seems this article of Mr. Atkinson's has been the cause of considerable excitement in certain circles at the South, and the reply here published is one of many offered to the editors. Though not as closely reasoned as might be desired, it is evidently meant to be fair and candid, and is valuable because of its Southern point of view. The Southern Educational Problem," by Mr. Walter H. Page, shows how far behind Northern ideas education has been at the South, but suggests better prospects for the future. The number, as a whole, is above the average in solid and enduring qualities, as well as discussion of matters of present interest.
