Abbott To Present Trophy For Best Exhibit At Hobby Show On Saturday

Three-Day Exhibition Now Open

Hon. D. C. Abbott, Minister of Finance, and MP for Westmount, will present the D. C. Abbott Trophy for the best exhibit entered in the 1953 Westmount Boys' and Girls' Hobby Show at the official closing of the show tomorrow evening. Winner of the trophy has not yet been named.

Prizes will also be distributed by Mr. Abbott to other exhibitors entered in the show, immediately following an exhibition by the Montreal YMCA's gymnastic team.

Perhaps the most unusual aspect of the local show is the extensive range of exhibitions. The co-sponsors of the show—The Westmount YMCA, the Boys and Girls' Hi-Y clubs and the Westmount Leaders Corps—are of the opinion that anything a youngster spends a great deal of time on may be considered a hobby.

Ultimately, the exhibitions are far from limited to handicrafts alone, with swimming, music, basketball and badminton prowess; and pet animals regardless of pedigree being exhibited among others.

MRT 'Reading' Follows Growing Theatre Trend

The undertaking of a "reading" by the Montreal Repertory Theatre's Studio inevitably brings to mind the "reading" of the First Drama Quartet at Her Majesty's two seasons ago, and of Emilyn Williams this past winter. In presenting James Bridie's "Mr. Bolfrey", however, the Studio Committee has deviated somewhat from this pattern, because "Mr. Bolfrey" has a plot, as well as humor and the discussion of ideas.

The background is the home of a Free-Kirk minister in the West Highlands, a home of stern, Scotch principles and strict-Scotch behavior. Billeted in the house are two English Tommies of the last war, and visiting her aunt and uncle is the minister's brisk young niece. The three young people are bored and restless on a rainy Sunday afternoon, and they argue with the minister as to the rightness and wrongness of his convictions on proper behavior for the Sabbath.

Left alone, the niece and the two soldiers idly consult an ancient book which gives a formula for producing the Devil in human form. They hold an impromptu seance with the immediate and startling result of the arrival of a windswept, rain-soaked, top-hatted gentleman, carrying an umbrella. This is Mr. Bolfrey, Prince of

Final Respects Paid Sqdn-Ldr M. L. Doyle

Friends and relatives gathered to pay final respect to the memory of Sqdn-Ldr. Michael Lawrence "Larry" Doyle, DFC, 64, a First World War pilot who re-enlisted in the Second World War to head civilian auxiliaries devoted to RCAF welfare.

Sqdn-Ldr. Doyle, of 251 Kensington avenue, Westmount, died last Thursday. Funeral service was held in The Ascension of Our Lord Church, Tuesday morning.

Sqdn-Ldr. Doyle was born in Doyleville, N.B., and moved to Montreal when a youth. He enlisted in 1915 with the Irish Canadian Rangers. When overseas, he transferred to the Royal Flying Corps and led more than 80 raids over enemy territory.

In civilian life he worked for a number of enterprises and in 1940 formed his investment banking service. Shortly after, he joined the RCAF to serve five years.

A son, Flt.-Lt. Michael Doyle, with the 2nd Canadian Fighter Wing in France, is flying home to attend the funeral. Sqdn-Ldr. Doyle is survived also by his wife, Rose (Smith) and a daughter, Rosemary.

Funeral service was held Tuesday at 2 p.m. in Trinity Memorial Church. Interment was in Mount Royal Cemetery.

In his 56th year, Mr. Crankshaw was a senior partner in the well-known Montreal law firm of Asselin, Crankshaw, Gingras, Trudel and Saylor. He was also a lecturer in criminal procedure at McGill University until illness forced him to take a rest early this year.

Born in Westmount, Mr. Crankshaw was the son of the late James Crankshaw, K.C., and Hannah Harris. Mr. Crankshaw's fa-

The Late John E. Crankshaw

Lawyer, Sportsman, Political Figure
 Widely Mourned

A career which was rich in achievement and in promise came to an end last weekend when John Edwin Crankshaw, Q.C. died at the comparatively young age of 55 in St. Mary's Hospital here after a long and serious illness.

This brilliant career, which reached its apex in the law, was directed, for brief periods of time, toward sports, toward the newspaper business and toward war, and included a lifelong interest and a prominent position in the provincial and federal political scene.

A native of Westmount, where he was educated at Westmount Academy and West-

mount High School, Mr. Crankshaw became one of this city's most prominent lawyers and became known throughout Canada for his revision of the famous legal handbook, Crankshaw's Annotated Criminal Code, which his father, the late James Crankshaw, K.C., wrote.

After completing his high school studies, he served as warrant officer with the RCNVR in the North Atlantic Squadron during the first world war. He worked as a newspaperman before obtaining his BCL degree from McGill University and being called to the bar in 1920.

During the course of his law career, he read law with the late George H. Montgomery, K.C., served as secretary of the Bar of Montreal, and was Senior Crown Prosecutor for the District of Montreal between 1936 and 1939. He was a lecturer on criminal procedure at McGill University's Faculty of Law until shortly before his death.

He was a prominent sportsman in his younger days, being a member of the M.A. A.A. senior rugby team in 1913 and of the Westmount Rugby Football Club teams which won provincial championships in 1920 and 1921.

He was prominent in political circles in the west end of Montreal and in Stanstead, Que. as a supporter of the policies of the Progressive Conservative and National Union parties.

His many friends, admirers and business associates throughout the west end will feel his death keenly.

BOOK REVIEW

THE MATURE MIND, by Professor Harry A. Overstreet. Publishers, W. W. Norton & Company Inc., New York, and Distributed in Canada by George J. McLeod Ltd., 73 Bathurst Street, Toronto.

Dr. Overstreet is also the author of the now famous book ABOUT OURSELVES and INFLUENCING HUMAN BEHAVIOR and it is not over praise to say that anyone, who will read his latest book will look at himself or herself from a new point of view. They will see the damage caused by psychological immaturity and will realize how maturity can bring a fuller and happier life.

He shows us what it means to be mature and describes how our immaturities of attitude and action cause most of our difficulties and conflicts and how such immaturities, widely shared, have led to the tensions and confusions of these times. He shows us how the process of becoming mature takes place and how maturity of mind can help us move forward into new confidence and wisdom.

The author explains how the modern science of psychology has given us a new insight that is penetrating our common consciousness — an insight of such great importance that it may, he said, to be the master concept of our time. And as the author puts it: "So far in the history of the world, there have never been enough mature people in the right places."

Dr. G. Brock Chisholm, Canadian leading psychologist and thinker, commends the author's book and adds: "Never in the history of the world has the need been so urgent for people who can think and act with minds that are mature." Readers will see more sharply the effects of the immaturity around him or her and will, it is hoped, determine to discard what he finds of it in himself.

In his preface he quotes the wise words of Alfred North Whitehead: "Mankind is now in one of its rare moods of shifting

its outlook. The mere compulsion of tradition has lost its force. It is the business of philosophers, students and practical men to re-create and re-enact a vision of the world, conservative and radical, including those elements of reverence and order without which society lapses into a riot, a vision penetrated through and through with unflinching rationality."

This excellent book gives us an insight that comes chiefly out of the psychological and psychiatric sciences and centers in our mental, emotional, and social maturing. It helps us to understand the forces that have created our predicaments and brought us close to destruction; and it affords the clue to our possible advance out of chaos.

That the volume before me has had a wide appeal is shown by the fact that this is the twenty-third printing.

That he has a very high opinion of Dr. Brock Chisholm is shown

by the fact that he quotes him on five occasions.

The author was born in San Francisco, one of the most attractive of the many attractive cities in America, and was educated at the University of California and later at Oxford. For many years he headed the Department of Philosophy at the College of the City of New York, a position from which he recently retired to devote himself to lecturing and writing. He has always (as should all philosophers) been deeply interested in fundamental economics and has the faculty (as this useful volume shows) given to few of being able to analyze abstract theories in concrete terms.

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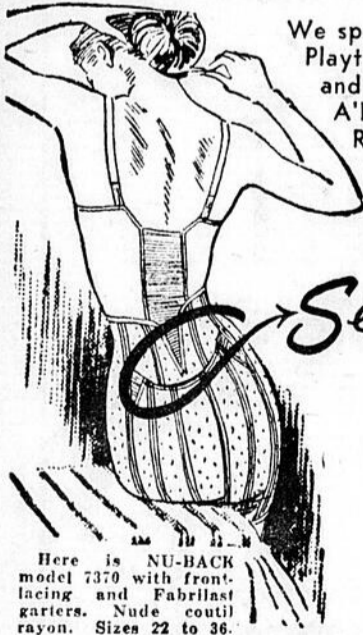

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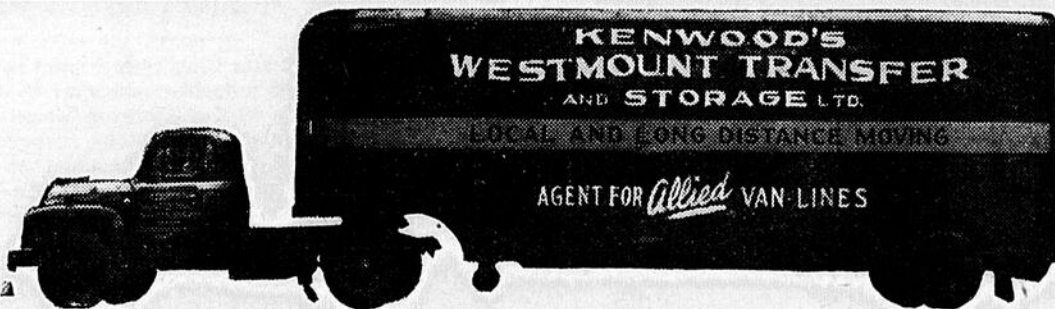

candidate, he never ran for office. Mr. Crankshaw took his early studies at Westmount Academy and Westmount High School. He obtained his B.C.L. degree from McGill University in 1920 and was called to the Bar after reading law with the late George H. Montgomery of Brown, Montgomery and McMichael.

During the First World War he served as Warrant (Wireless) Officers, R.C.N.V.R., (North Atlantic Squadron.)

He was named a senior Crown nah Harris. Mr. Crankshaw's father put out the first annotated Criminal Code in Canada in 1893, prosecutor in 1936, a post he held until 1939. He was made a King's Counsel in January, 1938, and McGill-University honored him with the post of lecturer in criminal procedure in May, 1950.

Mr. Crankshaw put out the fifth edition of Crankshaw's Criminal Code in 1924 and he put out the sixth and seventh editions at regular intervals since. He had been working on the eighth edition when he was taken ill.

He was secretary of the Montreal Bar 1929-30. A prominent sportsman in his younger days, he was a member of the M.A.A.A. senior rugby team in 1913 and on the Westmount Rugby Football Club's team that won the provincial championship in 1920 and 1921.

He is survived by his wife, the former Marjorie Stewart of Caithness-shire, Scotland; one son, John S. Crankshaw, and a daughter, Miss Heather Crankshaw, all of Montreal.

A statement issued by the Jewish Committee of the Progressive-Conservative party of Montreal read in part as follows: "Mr. Crankshaw's keen understanding of the problems of this country, his erudition and deep intellect, his sympathy for all minority groups, and his good judgment in the

interests of Canadians will be sorely missed not only in this city but wherever his influence was felt."

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
