THE PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS.

(Montreal Herald, October 24th.)

Our friends throughout the Province may just as well make up their minds that whether the general election be next month or next year it will be sprung upon the Province with the briefest possible notification. The announcement will come with the suddenness and all the startling and bewildering effect of a flash of lightning. It is imperative, therefore, that the friends of good Government should make immediate preparation for the work which is certain to be precipitated upon them, and for which they should not be found unready. Their antagonists have the advantage in choice of time for the appeal to the electorate, but they have the disadvantage of confronting the electorate without a single decent excuse for presuming to rule. The advantage is decidedly on our side if our friends are vigilant and energetic. They will stand opposed to the supporters of a Government which has brought the Province into such a state, financially that on the hustings the followers of the Ministry can only apologize, if they have the assurance to do that. Our Provincial Treasury is empty. That is one fact for our friends to rely upon in claiming for their candidates the suffrages of voters in their several constituencies. It is not a very gratifying thing, to be sure, but reformers have generally to do with unpleasant things and they commonly manage to dispose of them in a way which justifies them, if not immediately, at any rate in the long run. There is no reason in the world why our Treasury should be empty. There are millions due from municipal corporations, and from the occupiers of Crown lands. With an honest and sensible administration of our Provincial finances there could be no such thing as an impoverished Treasury. But it is the sense and the honesty which we are unhappily lacking, and which we fervently trust the next general election will give us. We are saddled with what (for want of a better term) we must look upon as an asset, \$13,000,000 invested in the North Shore Railway. This road is now doing a splendid business—far beyond our anticipations—yet it does not yield to the Provincial Treasury one cent upon the investment. This is a most curious circumstance, and one which the electorate will, no doubt, inquire into. If the Government had sold the road, say for \$7,000,000 or \$8,000,000—placing the price at the minimum, as it could easily have been disposed of at that sum—there would have been an annual return to the public coffers of \$3,000,000. Better terms than these could have been obtained; but, no; Mr. Chapleau and his friends could not find it in their hearts to part with such a magnificent piece of patronage, even to be enabled to give the Province a budget which they would not have occasion to blush at. The Premier and his associates have been wantonly impoverishing the Province. We wish the electors of Montreal especially to take note of this charge, and to ascertain, for themselves whether it is well-founded or not. There is a special reason for insisting on this, because, whenever the Provincial supply goes dry, Mr. Chapleau turns at once to the richly yielding milk cow, the much enduring city of Montreal. Surely the public opinion of the Province will assert itself in the forthcoming election against the tyranny which has been endured so long. We call on all who wish to see the reins of Government in upright, steady, skilful hands, to organize for the overthrow at the polls of an Administration which is not upright, not stable and not skilful except in the art of obliging to power.

The schooner *Synalator*, 78 tons, owned by Edward Milliken, of Shediac, sailed from the Bay of Islands, Nfld., on Monday, Oct. 10th, with 685 bris. Labrador herring, 160 quintals dry codfish, and a few thousand feet pine boards. On Monday night the schooner struck on the Goose Shoals, P. E. I., and soon sprung a leak and filled. The crew managed to hold on to the rigging till daylight, and by that time the wind and sea had gone down much so that they were able to get the boat hauled up and managed to reach the shore safely. There was no loss of life on the vessel or cargo, which were valued at about \$7,000, and all will be a total wreck.

HEAVY WEATHER AT SEA.

St. John's Nfld., Oct 24

The steamship *Hibernian*, Captain Wylie, has just passed through the Narrows after having experienced one of the severest storms ever encountered on the Atlantic by an Allan Liner. The passage from Liverpool occupied eleven days, during which time the steamer constantly encountered adverse gales and had her decks swept by the waves. The hurricane reached its maximum violence on Tuesday last, the barometer standing at 28.40 noon on that day until the corresponding time on the next day. The *Hibernian* was driven backwards nine miles, her two midship boats—one on the port and the other on the starboard side—were broken into staves and washed away. One of the life-boats was also demolished. A heavy sea broke in over the port quarter and made a complete breach through the companion way over the saloon, sending drenching spray into the cabin. While the captain and the second officer were watching the ship's behaviour from the bridge three tremendous seas broke in over the starboard bow, rising high above the steamer's bridge and sweeping clean over the funnel. Captain Wylie and the other officer in charge narrowly escaped with their lives, having been swept down to leeward with great violence. The bridge was all unstruck and carried away and the iron stanchions, chumps and bolts twisted and broken in every direction. The passengers and ship's company are all well. The *Hibernian* left for Baltimore via Halifax on Sunday morning.

A MAN OF WAR IN THE GALE.

Her Majesty's war ship *Fantom* arrived here at noon today from Twillingate, in Notre Dame Bay. She left that port on Tuesday morning with the English schooner *Flamingo* in tow. On Wednesday she encountered a fierce gale of wind from the east-north east, accompanied by a furious snow storm that lasted down to Thursday morning. During the height of the gale the man-of-war parted the towing cable and lost the *Flamingo*. The log was very thick at the time, and accordingly no attempt was made to reconnect with the schooner. The *Fantom* was immediately put ahead to the eastward and steamed out to sea, three days being occupied in making a distance of 175 miles through a heavy snow storm.

A soft wind, with summer warmth, has followed the wintry storm. The *Cromwell* line steamer *Canima*, from New York and Halifax, is now overdue at this port.

ANNUAL FAIR OF THE ALGOMA ELECTORAL DIVISION AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The exhibits this year were more numerous and in greater variety, and of a better class, than at any previous exhibition. The attendance was very large; weather, fine but cold. The Society's spacious hall, although extra accommodation had been provided, was crowded to its utmost capacity. The display of fall and spring wheat, oats, barley, and peas was quite equal to the best samples shown at the Industrial or Provincial Fairs. Vegetables were a splendid show, the potatoes exceptionally fine. In the fruit department the grapes and apple show prove conclusively that fruit will shortly be grown here equal to any portion of Ontario. In butter there was a large exhibit. It was shown to have been good by the analysis exhibited by so many to become purchasers of the different samples. In ladies' work the exhibit was very large, and merits more than a passing notice. The agricultural implements manufactured at the work of Mr. Watson, of Ayr, attracted considerable attention from the farmers. The live stock was not so good as might have been shown. The horses especially were poor specimens, and show the necessity of improvement. Taken altogether the exhibition reflects great credit upon the management, and cannot fail to convince the most sceptical that this section of Algoma is destined ere long to take front rank as an agricultural country.

A fine illustration of woman's devotion was witnessed in Colongre County. A certain resident became so helplessly drunk that he lay in the open air, under a side being powerless to process any further. His wife found him, and procuring a doctor, she made use of her hot-water, placed him in it, and then wheeled him home.

IN THE UPPER AIR.

Voyage of the Aeronauts Who Left Chicago 9640 Feet in the Air—Landing in a Cranberry Marsh.

The signal off or who accompanied King telegraphs that five minutes after leaving the earth they reached an altitude of 4,500 feet, moving southwest. A few minutes later they reached an upper current, moving slowly west. A puff of air finally sent them southwest, and they were becalmed several hours over a small city, which they judged to be Peoria. On Friday the balloonists passed over Spring Valley, Wisconsin, startling the natives, and having a shot sent after them. They then hovered about Platte Mounds for some hours and later were buried in the clouds in the upper air, 4,000 feet above the ground. They raked the trees in passing Little Falls, Wis., scaring the inhabitants, and animals. On Saturday the voyagers lost sight of earth in the clouds, and passed through a heavy rain storm. At 12.45 they reached an altitude of 9,600 feet. They spoke to a man about 1.30, and learning they were forty miles from St. Paul, descended, and were soon lost in a cranberry bog. The icy water was knee deep, and every step was full of peril and discomfort. The fifth day they reached the Flambeau River, and were safe.

A correspondent relates that the husband of a poor German who had suffered a relapse in her illness through the excitement caused by the passage of President Garfield's funeral cortege under her widow going to view the remains at the Capitol, brought back to his wife a bud that he caught as it loosened and fell from Queen Victoria's lovely wreath on the casket. It bloomed by her bedside, disclosing a dove in the centre, and the poor woman, calling in the Christ flowers sent from the dead President to heal her, began to mend immediately. It was an orchid, the *Espirito Santo*, and as they are usually sold at the price of twenty dollars a blossom, it gives one an idea of the royal prodigality of the wreath.

A newly appointed employee in the bag room of the Ottawa Postoffice also does duty conspicuously as coachman to the Hon. John O'Connor.

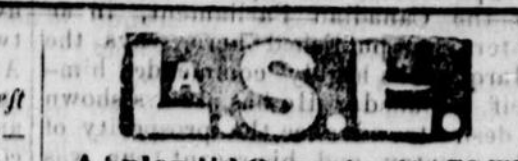

Lieutenant-Governor Cauchon, of Manitoba, is expected here from Winnipeg in a fortnight.

Mr. A. M. Sullivan, M. P., is reported as having said that common law furnishes abundance of precedents for the League's suppression, and that while the League may have been a lawful body last winter, it may have been quite unlawful a week ago.

Regarding Canadian Railway stocks the London Economist of last week says:—Grand Trunk and Great Western have been depressed, though closing at prices above the lowest points. Toronto, Grey, and Bruce bonds are 2 1/2 better, and Quebec Central 20 lower.

Senator Macpherson and his family have sailed from England for home. "The Speaker of the Canadian Senate" (says an English journal) "has arrived in London, and is sitting to Mr. Chas. Mercier for the portrait which has been voted by the Canadian Parliament, and which is so hang in the Senate House." This is how Canadian artists are protected.

The Bank of Montreal has declared a semi-annual dividend of four per cent with a bonus of one per cent. The manager states that the bank will issue its annual statement to the shareholders at the end of the half-year. The statement upon which the dividend was based was very much of an estimate, as returns had only been received from the branches and agencies up to September 30th, whilst for the remainder of the half-year they had to make an estimate of the probable profit. In giving the present dividend, the general manager stated that they were acting on the principle enunciated by the president at the last annual meeting of not increasing the dividend beyond ten per cent. per annum until the reserve was considerably augmented. With regard to the result of the business for the past four months, the general belief is that the bank has made at the rate of something over twelve per cent. per annum. The profits are not so large as was expected, so that there was a decline in the stock of three per cent. after the dividend was declared.

Mr. John Walter, proprietor of the London Times, is described by the Chicago paper of the same name as a gentleman 63 years of age, of remarkable physical activity, so that he appears at least 10 years younger, and as his face is shaved clean, but a white side beard extends down under the chin after the Peter Cooper style. He is below the medium height, is rather slimly built, dresses plainly, wears a light felt hat, is very unpretentious and unassuming in his manner, and would be taken by almost everyone for an English farmer. He speaks in a quiet tone of voice, is extremely urbane in his address, and delivers his sentences with a concise diction which shows much previous reflection.

QUARTERLY MEETING.—The veteran institution, the Quebec Board of Trade, is to go through the solemn ordeal of a quarterly meeting, and weather and a quorum permitting, on the 29th November. The body, though it was growing old, as we never hear of it except at the regular stated quarterly periods. This should not be, as there are some five men on the Board, and we can't understand why it does not show more energy.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A laborer named Carpenter, of Montreal, had his foot crushed between two cars whilst coupling them yesterday evening at Leclercvilliers Station, on the North Shore Railway, and died a couple of hours after the accident, notwithstanding all the care given to him by Drs. J. Maynard, of Deschambault, and J. P. Pelletier, of Ste. Anne de la Pointe. An inquest was held this afternoon.

TELEGRAMS.

London, October 24. The Whitehall Review says the Marquis of Lorne comes home from Canada by express command of Her Majesty. I have reason to believe the Marquis has given complete satisfaction to the Queen and also to the Imperial Government in the performance of his duties as Governor-General of Canada, and his unexpected visit to England is not altogether connected with his official position. Mr Macpherson, member of the Canadian Parliament, in an interview published here, says the Marquis has highly commended himself to Canada. He has always shown a desire to advance the prosperity of the country, and his recent tour was most politic and will bring immense advantage to Manitoba and the Northwest. Macpherson praises the movement in favor of fair trade, which he says has proved so beneficial to Canada. Lloyds publish a list of 238 vessels reported on their "loss" book, between the 12th and 19th inst. The list includes nothing less serious than vessels dismasted. It is now learned that nobody was lost by the stranding of the Norwegian vessel at Ballycotton yesterday.

The new sea wall at East Bourne gave way on Sunday; damage £4,000. Eight fishing boats belonging to Yarmouth were lost with all hands; also several smacks with six hands each.

Birmingham, Oct. 25. The Liberal Eight hundred passed a resolution approving of the action of the Government in Ireland.

THE STREETS.—Under the influence of a steady rain all morning, the Corporation mud has again come to the front, and the streets are in a wretched condition. There is now another splendid opening for our contemporary to treat the public to one of those thrilling catastrophes which he so graphically described in yesterday's issue. But this time he might enlarge on it and give us half a dozen catastrophes, as there is ample room to locate them. Mr. Macbilly, (as our contemporary playfully styles the honored chairman of the Finance Committee), will no doubt, in the course of time, come down with the "stamps" to do some repairs.

LABRADOR FLEET.—Seven schooners, comprising most of the annual fall Labrador fleet, arrived in port yesterday, bringing 527 barrels of seal and 8 barrels cod oil, 541 barrels harrings, and a few barrels of cod fish. Fishing has been a complete failure, which accounts for the small quantity brought as compared with other years. The only article plentiful is seal oil, fair quantities of which have arrived.

St. Peter's.—The Harvest Thanks giving Service in this church was held on Sunday morning. Harvest hymns were sung, and the interior of the church was neatly decorated with grain, fall leaves and berries, &c. A splendid collection of vegetables surrounding the base of the font. The sermon was preached by the Lord Bishop.

A GRAND MASTER ROBBED.—Dr. Graham, Grand Master of the Freemasons of Quebec, while in Montreal last week, was robbed of his gold watch when giving a gratuity to a woman who professed to be in distress. The police subsequently found and arrested the thief, and got back the watch.

TIMBER BUSINESS IMPROVING.—Singleton, Dunn & Co.'s monthly timber circular, dated Glasgow, 8th October says business is slowly improving; but transactions are on a limited scale. Shipbuilding is very brisk, but other departments are inactive. Stocks are much heavier than had been anticipated, and the consumption for the past three months was smaller than importers looked for. It is worthy of note that stocks of North of Europe goods are unusually light, and prices hardening. This will assist Clyde stocks materially. An auction sale of timber which held this week, but results were not satisfactory; even at low prices buying was restricted.

SHIPPING TODAY.—Fame Point.—Sailed; two schooners inward, Little Metis Eastward; one three-masted steamship outward. Father Point—SS Hurworth inward at eleven p.m. yesterday. Cap Chat—Light E. Wind, one steamship, Temporary line, inward at 8 30 a.m.

Mabel Wilberforce has been found guilty in London of forgery and sentenced to seven months.

LOSS OF THE STEAMER CLAN MACDUFF.

London, Oct. 24. The steamer Clan MacDuff, from Liverpool for Bombay, foundered on Thursday night on the Welsh coast. She carried 22 passengers and a crew of 39. Three survivors who landed near Ballycotton on Saturday report the boat in which they reached land contained 25 persons; when launched from the steamer the boat capsized but righted immediately, yet only five persons came up with her, two of whom died from exposure. About forty persons are missing. The steamer Palestine, from Boston, which arrived at Liverpool, picked up a boat containing seven passengers and four seamen of the MacDuff. Four of the boats while being launched were smashed by the gale. The gig and cutter containing 17 persons were safely landed. A steamer arrived at Plymouth on Sunday with 16 of the crew. Between twenty and thirty persons in all were drowned. Some of the passengers belonging to a theatrical company have been rescued. The disaster was caused by a leak and the water extinguishing the fires in the furnace.

BANQUE NATIONALE.—The name of Dr. St. Jean, M. P. is prominently mentioned in connection with the vacant Managership of La Banque Nationale at Ottawa.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT ON THE GRAND TRUNK.—The passengers by the Western train from Chicago, who should have arrived here yesterday morning, did not get in until late last night, owing to an accident which happened to their train a few miles beyond Battle Creek, Michigan, at 5:30 Saturday morning. Three sleepers and two coaches left the track and ran down an embankment ten feet high, one of the sleepers turning completely over. Forty passengers were in the sleepers, and beyond the scare and a few bruises, no one was hurt. The cause of the accident is supposed to be the spreading of the rails from rotten ties.—Star.

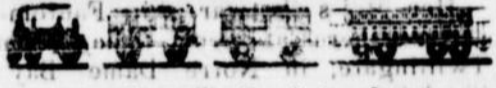

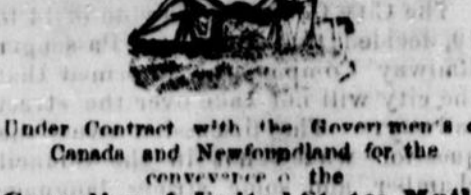
