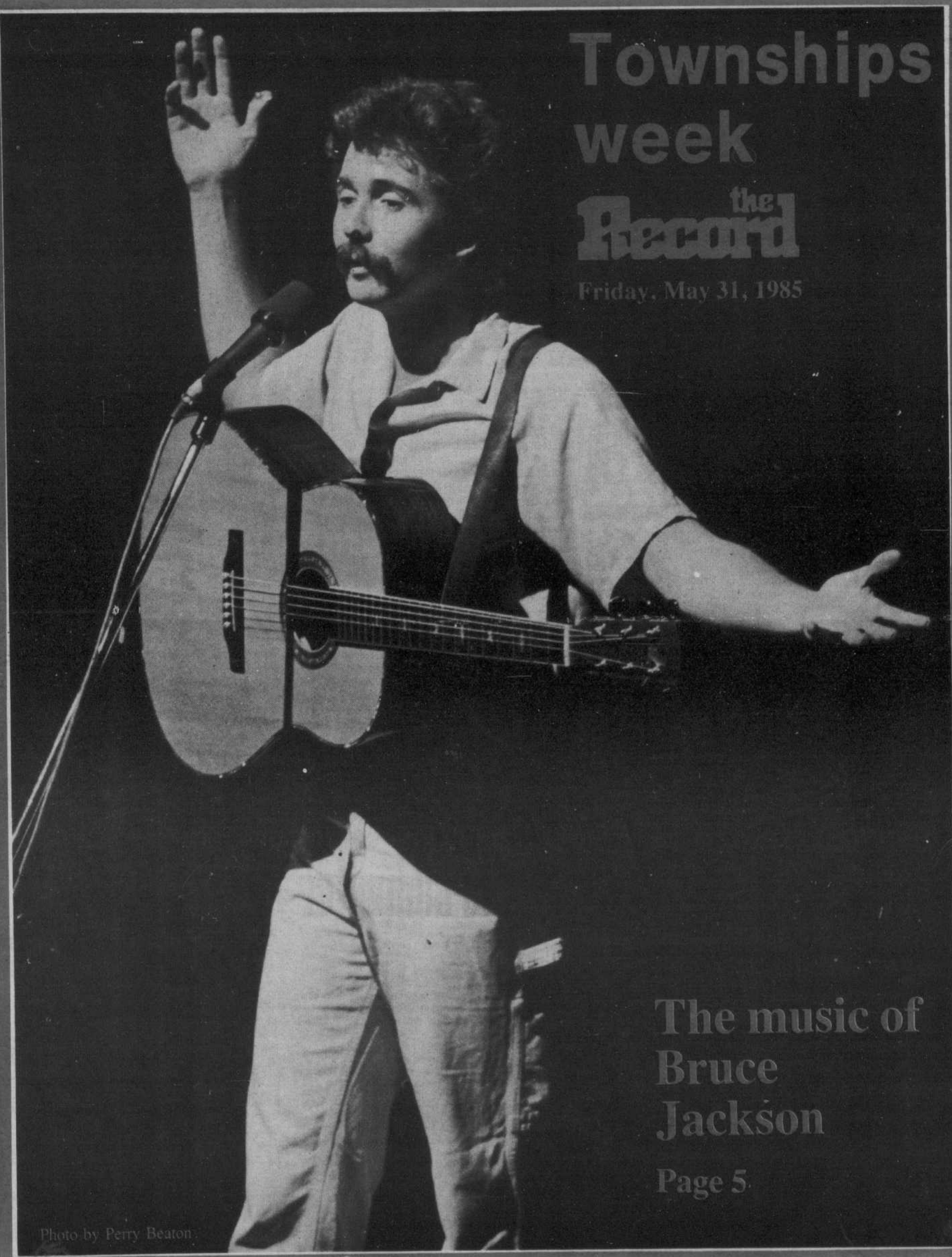

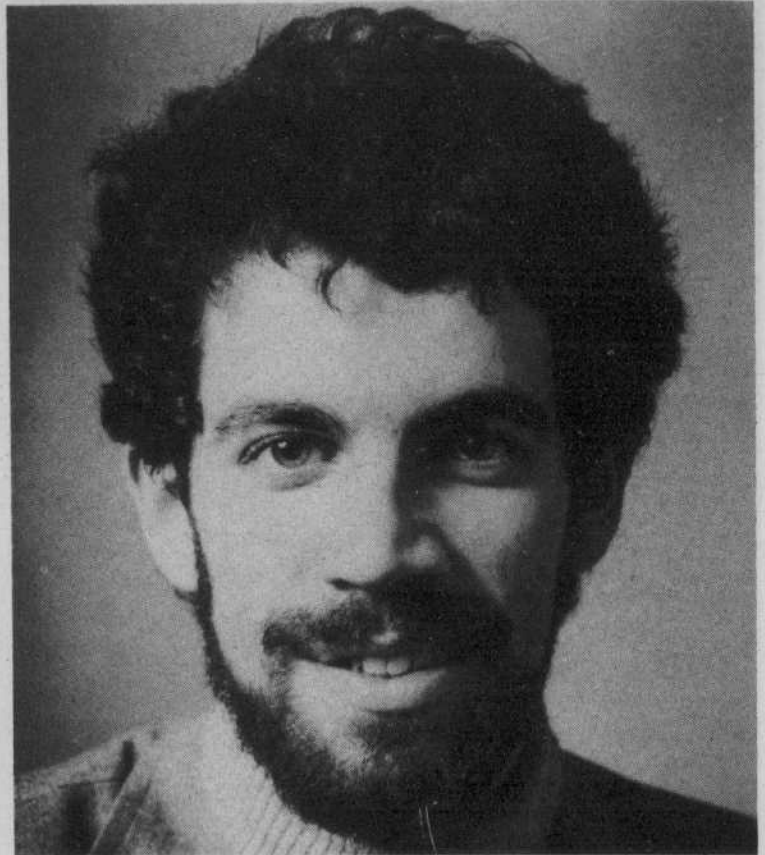

Bishop's introduces new Steinway with concert

The Department of Music at Bishop's University ends its 1984-85 season of concerts with a double celebration. Through the generosity of the S.M. Blair Family Foundation of Toronto, the Department has recently acquired a new Hamburg Steinway concert grand piano. This superlative instrument will be formally inaugurated at a public concert

on May 31 at 8:30 p.m. in Centennial Theatre on the campus of Bishop's University. Sharing the spotlight with the new piano that evening will be pianist Marc Widner, whom the University welcomes back for his second solo recital in as many years. An evening of great celebration, the concert is not to be missed by connoisseurs of fine music.

A legend among pianos, the German Steinway is an instrument unmatched in quality of materials and meticulous craftsmanship. From its ivory key facings (modern technology has substituted plastic in even the finest North American-built instruments) to the Bavarian spruce which supplies its sound-board, every material which has gone into the instrument attests to centuries-old traditions of quality in piano building. Every one of the 7,000 parts has been handcrafted and assembled. At 7' 4", the Hamburg Model C acquired by Bishop's is the preferred size as a recital instrument, speaking with a fullness and roundness of tone and yet fully capable of the intimacy of expression desirable in a chamber instrument. The addition of the Hamburg Steinway to the University's already fine collection of performance instruments, including its French double harpsichord and Baroque portative organ, brings the Music Department's resources to a par with even the largest music schools in the nation.

among young Canadian musicians. Winner of the silver medal at the 1975 Geneva Competition, Widner went on to win first prize in the 1981 Canadian Music Competitions. He has been heard in recital and broadcast across Canada, the U.S. and Europe. His vast solo repertoire with a strong representation of new music has been heard recently in the World Music Days in Toronto and at the Centre George Pompidou in Paris. In addition to solo performances, Widner has appeared frequently with such prestigious

chamber ensembles as the Orford Quartet and the York Winds. For the inauguration of the new instrument at Bishop's Mr. Widner has selected a widely divergent programme including piano sonatas by Robert Schumann, Scriabin, and Mozart, as well as a selection of works by 1985's anniversary composers, Domenico Scarlatti, G.F. Handel, and J.S. Bach.

Tickets for the May 31st concert are available now through the box office of Centennial Theatre (563-4966) at \$5 each.

Correspondence course a helpful innovation

I have always been a firm believer in the art of self-teaching. I am particularly keen on this method when it comes to the understanding and appreciation of wine. Experience has shown me that only considerable reading and even more tasting will allow a wine enthusiast to become familiar with his subject.

Don't misunderstand. The many classes that are offered by wine societies, colleges and universities are all excellent ways to become more knowledgeable but for most of us they are not practical.

Those that are inexpensive and are held at night are usually only introductory in nature while those that are part of the college curriculum at places like the Davis Institute of the University of California take a professional commitment.

Thus, I was very pleased recently to receive in the mail a booklet from the German Wine Information Service entitled *German Wine* and subtitled *A Correspondence Course*.

The 56-page book "is designed to help you learn more about the wines from the world's northernmost vineyards. It explains where German wines grow, how they develop, and what differentiates them from other wines. It also provides you with helpful information about buying, storing and serving German wines."

Each section, and there are three, comes complete with a set

of study questions to help you review what you read and to insure that you have understood. The first part consists of a general overview examining land, vine types, vintage and other topics of a broad nature. The second section involves an examination of the various regions producing wine in Germany, while the third and final chapter discusses the practical aspects of buying, serving and storing.

There are also included a pronunciation guide — an essential when dealing with German wines — and a final examination. This final exam can be sent to the Wine Information Service where it will be marked by officials there and the results communicated to you. If you pass, you will receive a certificate acknowledging your newly-developed understanding.

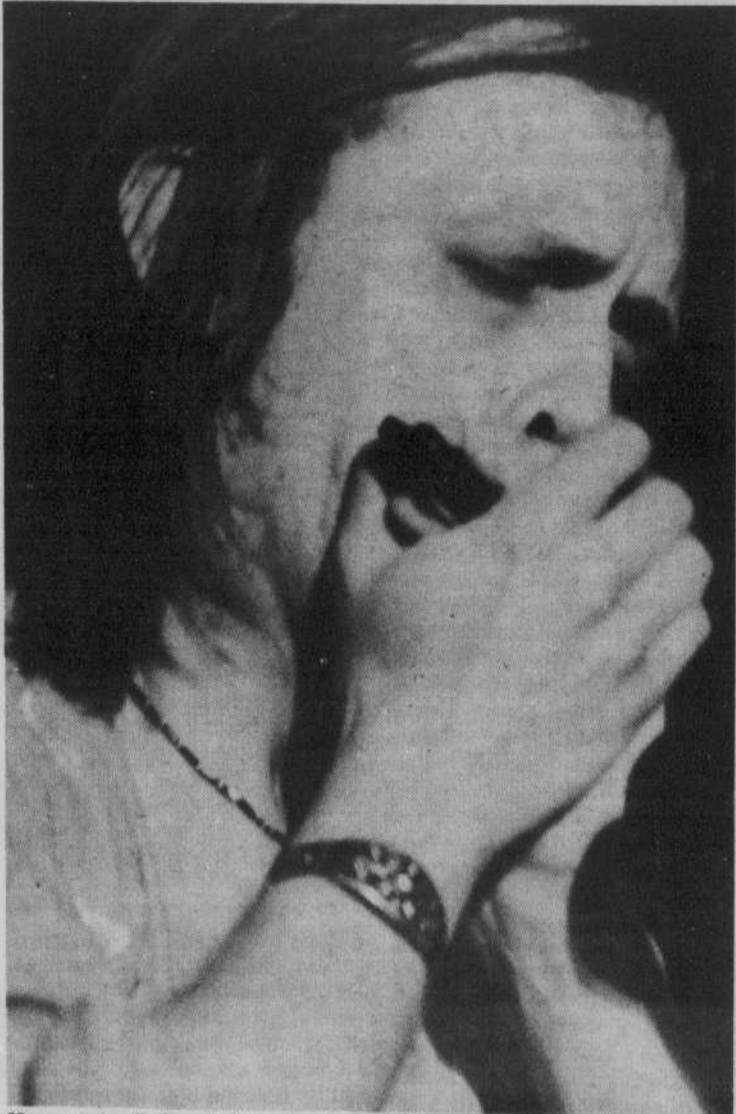

Harmonica Zeke: "Getting back to whisky again"



Harmonica Zeke sticks to the roots of North American blues and will be performing next week at Sherbrooke's Le Pigeonnier

"The voice is getting back to whisky again." With these words, Harmonica Zeke re-affirms his commitment to the blues.

Harmonica Zeke is one of those rare birds — a young white kid who's taken to the blues with a remarkable fury, and has transcended the cultural barriers to make this this home-grown music his own.

Zeke came out of the midwestern United States in the early 70s determined to make his mark in the music world and reached a personal apex in the summer of 1984 when he toured the province of Quebec with blues legend Brownie McGhee. "That was a very good tour," Zeke says. "We played a lot of good halls and got a chance to really get down to it."

Zeke's involvement with McGhee didn't end there, however, and plans are in the works for a joint album "to be recorded here in Quebec probably next year."

"I've always stuck pretty close to the basic blues," Zeke says, "but I've put a lot of myself into it, too. Even the old standards that I

do have been metamorphosed a little bit, but that's the nature of this kind of music. You have to put some of yourself into it or it's empty."

Zeke has become something of a legend in the Canadian blues world, and has played at times with some of the biggest names in the music business including Joan Baez and Bob Dylan, besides with Brownie McGhee. Combining acoustic guitar and harmonica with his unique vocal stylings, Zeke has managed the difficult task of tackling a personal style within the confines of a disciplined musical tradition. His soaring slide guitar technique has earned him praise across the country and his enthusiasm and feel for his music, have made him an exceptionally popular concert attraction.

"I'm going to have a pretty good summer," Zeke says, "including a couple of gigs in Montreal at the Blue Note and Station 10. Then I head out west in July for the Jasper Folk festival which I'm really looking forward to."

Like many local musicians, Zeke rarely has the opportunity to play in his own hometown, and

for this reason he's particularly pleased about an upcoming engagement at Sherbrooke's Le Pigeonnier theatre June 6 and 7. "I'm pretty happy about this one," he says, "because it really is a nice little house. It combines the best of theatre and a café-type atmosphere and it has a lot of intimacy. I am also happy that it finally looks like something is going to happen to give the music business a little kick in the pants in this part of the world. It's about time. There's an awful lot of talent in this region and yet you hardly ever get a chance to see it. I'm hoping that will change."

"As for me, well, the voice is getting back to whiskey again. For a while there I was toying with very crisp, clean vocals but I find myself getting a lot more gutsy again lately. It's just the blues breaking out."

Zeke will be performing his 'whisky' blues this coming Thursday and Friday evenings (June 6-7) at Le Pigeonnier, at 138 Wellington Street north at 8:30. Tickets are \$5 and are available at the Pigeonnier box office or can be reserved by calling 564-2060.

New Travis McGee novel has all the right stuff

The Lonely Silver Rain by John D. MacDonald (RANDOM HOUSE): \$22.50, 232 pp.

The creator of investigator Travis McGee, John D. MacDonald, appears to be second-guessing many of his hero's critics and detractors, when he has a very surprising minor character offer a stinging rebuke to the Florida tough guy with the colourful longevity. In **The Lonely Silver Rain**, McGee's twenty-first appearance, he is faced with the following profile of his fictional existence: "I've made a study of your life and times, Mr. McGee. I can't think of anything more pathetic than an aging boat bum — beach bum — who won't or can't admit it or face it. You are a figure of fun, Mr. McGee. Your dear friends around here are misfits or burn-outs, and I don't think there's one of them who gives a damn about you. You're a womanizer, and you make a living off squalid little adventures of one kind or another. You have that dumb-looking truck and this dumb-looking houseboat and nobody who cares if you live or die."

There just happen to be a lot of readers out there who do give a damn about McGee, and his latest squalid little adventure is the best example of MacDonald's success with the series. This one involves some topical scams such as cocaine running from Yucatan, the disappearance of one of Travis's best friend's luxury yachts, a minor dalliance with the requisite romantic element, some interesting minor character portraits, and a truly grisly triple murder of teenagers caught up in the white-snow trade.

When Travis McGee comes across the missing yacht in a remote stretch of mangrove swamp, MacDonald's ability to describe memorable, atmosphere-drenched set pieces comes to the fore. The wily captain of the "Busted Flush" has seen some horror in his salvage investigations, but the sketch of McGee encountering the decomposing bodies stands out as particularly effective writing.

The novel also has enough of the familiar detail that gives a series continuity — such as Travis's exchanges with friend Meyer, and the docking of his houseboat at Slip F-18, Bahia Mar Marina in

Kaleidoscope

Fort Lauderdale — although there is less of the verbosity and introspection that sometimes caused a few of the books in the 60's and 70's to labour along rather heavily. The psychological probing is kept to a minimum in **The Lonely Silver Rain**, and the novel gets down to what John D. MacDonald does best — develop an action-laden plot for one of America's favourite amateur sleuths.

Prize Stories 1985: The O. Henry Awards, ed. by William Abrahams (DOUBLEDAY): 423.95, 319 pp.

The sixty-fifth volume in the O. Henry Memorial Award series, a collection of the "best" short stories published in North America between the summer of 1983 and the summer of 1984, has a degree of excellence and of mediocrity as most of these competitive selections do. Many readers would not agree with the choice of jointly awarded First Prizes going to "Lily" by Jane Smiley (**The Atlantic**) and "Hot Ice" by Stuart Dybek (**Antaeus**). The first of these is about Lily Stith, who is entertaining a pair of old friends, Kevin and Nancy Humboldt, and in the process finds out as much about herself as she does about the marital strain being endured by her college pals. In "Hot Ice", the emphasis is on a childhood legend about a girl who was drowned and thought to be preserved in an ice house, and the young boys whose youthful antics revolve around this central symbol.

As good as the winning stories are, far more vivid in memory is a story such as "The Crow Woman", by Steve Heller, which is set in his hometown of Yukon, Oklahoma. In this very traditional tale a father becomes distressed when his twelve year old son Curly is being dogged by a demented old Czechoslovakian woman who talks to birds and gives out squawks that sound like the caw of a crow. The story catches the Okie locale and brings the Kellerman family to life with an ease not present in other stories here.

Several of the stories here are significant in that their authors are in the process of having longer works published this year. Such a story is "Saint Marie" by Louise Erdrich, whose **Love Medicine** has been recently published. Wright Morris is an established author, a Nebraskan, whose **A Cloak of Light** the third volume of his memoirs has just been released. His story "Glimpse Into Another Country" (**The New Yorker**) is a curious adventure of an academic who has flown to New York City to consult a medical specialist and encounters some bizarre events in Bloomingdale's and other locales.



The twenty-one stories collected in **Prize Stories of 1985** reveal that the literary reviews continue to welcome new fiction from young writers, and established magazines such as **The New Yorker** harbour the work of recognized names such as Ann Beattie, John Updike and Morris. A reader of these stories would tend to agree with editor William Abrahams that "it is the sense of variety... along with the refusal of writers to be categorized that makes reading contemporary stories so stimulating and makes generalizations not only difficult, but often suspect. One story does not define a trend, nor does an overpublicized tendency intimidate writers who are indifferent to it and pursue a vision of their own."

John Cafferty & The Beaver Brown Band TOUGH ALL OVER (SCOTTI—CBS)

A lot of listeners to the Beaver Brown Band may not make the connection between this group from Narragansett, Rhode Island and the sleeper cult movie **Eddie & The Cruisers**. In fact, just as this album was being cut, the HBO television exposure of the **Cruisers** movie brought on the re-issue of the great tune from the flick, "On The Dark Side". Subsequently Cafferty and his band are receiving some of the decade of gigging in East Coast venues such as New Haven, The Cape, and even Asbury Park, the Boss's hangout. The title track here, plus "Voice of America's Sons" and "Strangers In Paradise" are brassy big tunes in the "Born To Run" mode.

While the Beaver Brown Band had to sit back and watch their music performed by actors in the **Cruisers** film, it is obvious that on this record there are few bands who can play their musical parts. The hard edge comes from Gary Gramolini's guitars and the fact that Cafferty's voice is not unlike Springsteen's when he's cleared

his throat. The saxophones of Michael "Tunes" Antunes help to cement the 50's R&B flavour that peeks through several of the tunes. But this ain't the kinda band to rely on Motown licks — the order of the day is raw, energized, pulsating doses of street rock. The Cafferty Crew have paid long dues and accrued a full measure of savvy during their tour of hauling amplifiers across the New England topography, and the resulting musical product is the stuff of platinum dreams — these guys should move from cult status into the charts with their first, non-soundtrack studio elpee **TOUGH ALL OVER**.

The Carpenters **YESTERDAY ONCE MORE** (A&M)

There was a unique quality to the music of Karen and Richard Carpenter — their exquisitely produced and meticulously played and sung compositions brought them 12 Top 10 singles, three #1 singles, 10 Gold singles and 3 Gold and 5 Platinum-selling albums. That considerable stretch of soft rock success was accumulated between 1969's "Ticket To Ride" and 1983's "Voice of the Heart". With the death of the crystal-voiced Karen in February of 1983, the music of the Carpenters was sadly quieted, but Richard has performed a labour of love for fans of the duet.

Because technology has so advanced since the debut of the Carpenters in 1969, tracks between that year and 1972 have been Dolbyized to remove some of the tape hiss and make this retrospective



impeccable in sound for its transfer to compact disc. Also, some of the finest songs have been transferred from 16 track to 24 tracks — "Yesterday Once More", "We've Only Just Begun" and the dirtiest guitar solo in rock that can be heard on "Goodbye To Love". The piano work on a number of tracks has been re-recorded in stereo, plus remixing — on "Superstar", after performing the song with an orchestra on the road, Richard felt that addition of more French horns and bass trombones would add extra bottom end to fill the song out.

Another added feature of this deluxe two-record set of Carpenters memories is that Richard selected the material carefully, sequenced it according to the keys of the songs, assuring the melodic sequences are smoothly dovetailed, so that the blend of the material is far more pleasing than the usual jamming of hits onto an album in random order. The twenty-seven tracks here include some of the prettiest melodies that rock has produced — "(They Long To Be) Close To You", "For All We Know" and "I Won't Last A Day Without You." This record set is far more than a compilation of hits — the re-recording and subtle improvements enhance these tracks to the extent that even those Carpenter fans already possessing these songs on disc will be anxious to own these doctored tracks that utilize contemporary processing and noise reduction.

The song remains the same as Bruce Jackson reaches out

SHERBROOKE — "The carpet will change now and then but it'll always be Bruce Jackson."

The times they are-a-changin'. Jackson is redecorating his musical foundations. The writer/musician used to perform his one-man-shows with a bare stage behind him and an acoustic guitar up front. But his latest foray into the music business is going to change that image: he's introducing a back-up band. "I'll be doing my next show with a back-up band, which I don't normally do. And the back-up band is me," says Jackson.

He's using a prerecorded digital soundtrack in his act for the first time — to help break into a new market, he says. "Myself and Dave (Lapp, who often performs with Jackson) have noticed

our audience is getting older. The people who discovered us six or seven years ago have stayed with us. But we haven't managed to tap into today's 18 and 19 year-olds. Just playing acoustic guitars alone are fine, but there's a technological void there. They (young audiences) are expecting more."

So Jackson has recorded a rhythm section to flesh out his sound on computer synchronized tracks he switches on or off with the help of a remote-control unit attached to a microphone stand. "The key element is to bring in new sounds to help you stay fresh," he says.

"I wanted to keep the human element of me there with the guitar... 'The song remains the same' but there's rhythmic support given by drum and bass.

He says there's been no

compromise of musical morals: "I've never been the countrified Pete Segar type — I've always enjoyed pop music." A common complaint among owners of recording studios is that "people like me who wanted musical support would show up with something already out-of-style, out-moded. So by using digital recordings, I've come up with something up-to-date. It's not innovative or ahead of its time, but its up-to-date," he confesses.

"The only drawback is that I have to be as good as the drum machine." As the perfect timing of electronically reproduced sound leaves no room for error, that's a pretty tall order. "The arrangement is taped, so you can't freely express yourself on stage. It tightens up the act. It's a question of 'feel' — move with the soundtrack. Artists can normally vary pitch and rhythm according to how they feel, although you can't do that if you're in a band. But in folk music you get away with murder.

"I've thrown myself into the world of musical precision," Jackson says.

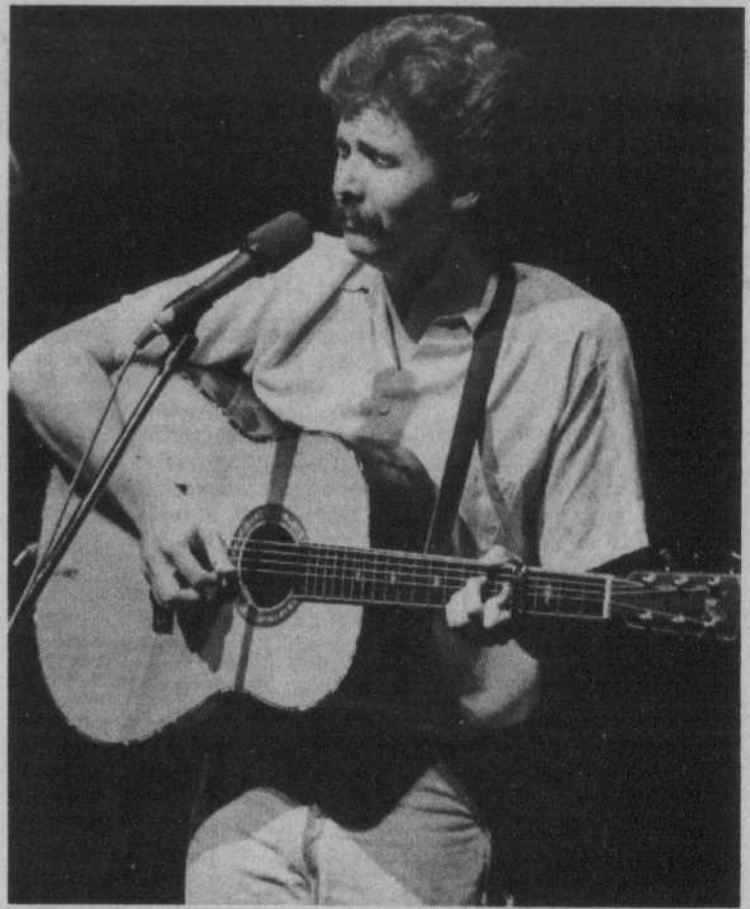
The new sound has meant spending a lot of time reworking old standbys. "Every song will sound new. I had to relearn many of my songs. Shows will be 20 per cent new songs and 80 per cent old songs reborn, that have different arrangements."

Jackson is taking the tape machine on the road, with premiere performances tonight and Saturday at Sherbrooke's Le Pigeonnier, on Werlington Street. He'll continue on to Montreal and Quebec city this summer, showcasing his talents and testing audience reaction to the change in style. The two songs best responded to will be released on a single in the fall. Cassettes, he says, just don't get radio airplay.

He has credits on the record sleeves of four albums, "none of them Bruce Jackson albums," he laments. They include the first solo outings by Bertrand Gosselin, Charlie Cover, Jim Corcoran, and most recently partner Dave Lapp (currently recording an LP).

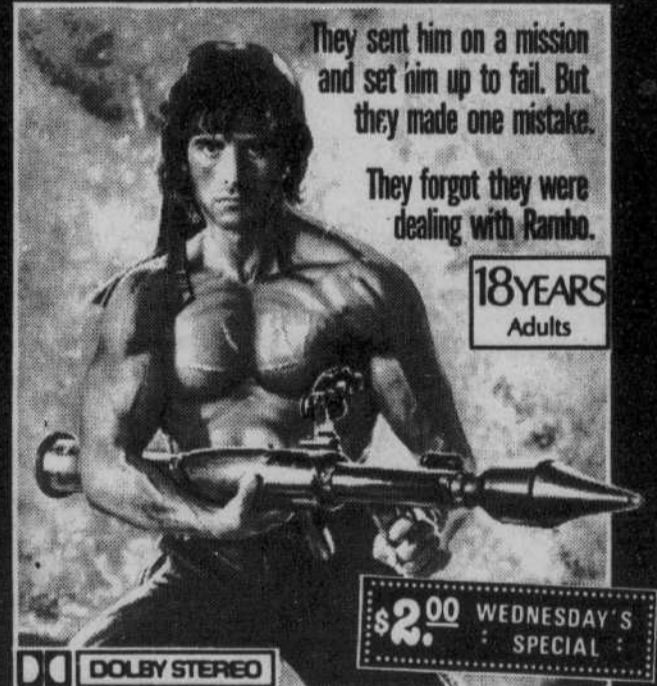
Jackson has been in the Eastern Townships and show business since 1973, when he registered at Champlain College. Now 28 years old, he has been teaching at Granby CEGEP for the past two years and has just received his masters in English literature from the University of Sherbrooke.

He juggled music, gainful employment and his studies, performing alone and in such local bands as the legendary Lennox (with Lapp, Cover and Corcoran) and taking part-time courses. "One is the back-up of the others." In the last two or three years, he says, music has taken the back seat. Now he's a bit more more established and has a steady income — and is ready to continue with music.

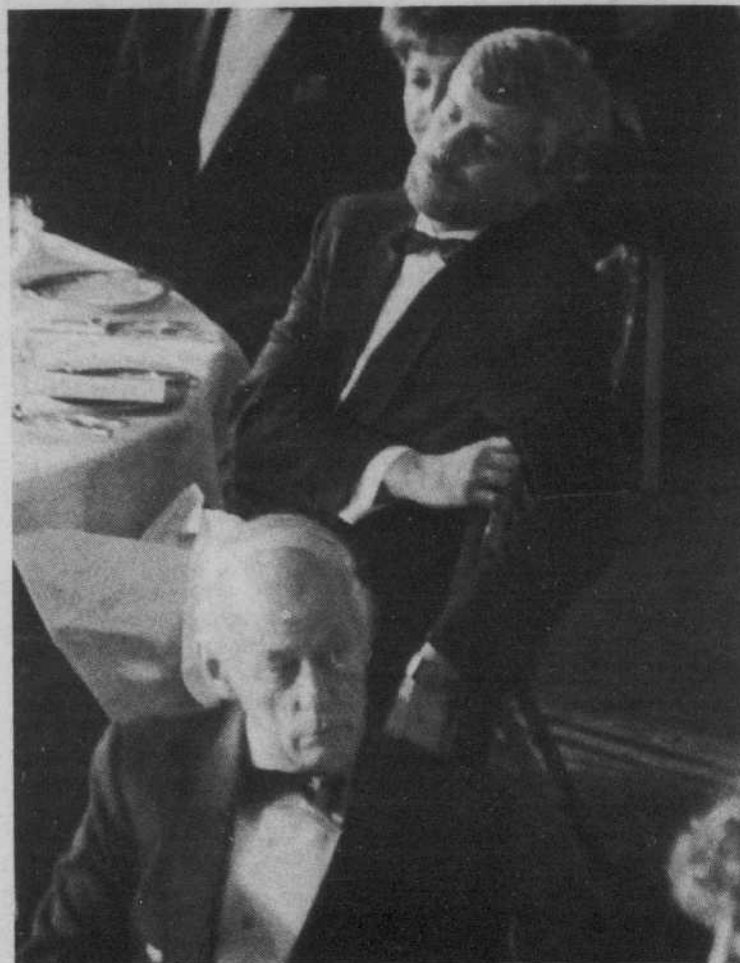

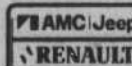

Parc Safari weathers financial woes to fight back

Little over a year after a near-bankruptcy, Parc Safari in Hemmingford is doing well enough to have added several new attractions this spring, says public relations director Marie Papillon.

Parc Safari is a park through which visitors may drive and observe exotic animals either roaming loose or in large fenced enclosures.

The park began bankruptcy proceedings in January 1984, but three employees who would have lost their jobs if the park had been closed decided to buy it and all its debts for \$1 from the American company that owned it.

The park's creditors agreed to the park paying them 50 per cent

of the money owed.

All the debts scheduled to be paid last year were paid, said Papillon.

Bankruptcy for Parc Safari would have been "extremely detrimental" to the Hemmingford area, said Papillon, since it employs 20 people full-time, and 150 in the summer.

Having the park Quebec rather than U.S.-owned is better for business, said Papillon. "When the park was American-managed, very often we had to comply to certain conditions we didn't approve of," she said. Quebecers have different tastes in restaurants and recreation, for example.

New attractions at the park in-

clude a water play area with white sandy beach, a new theatre, a deer trail, a miniature horse farm, a pet's corner, and a 'Monkey Jungle Tour Bus' which goes through woods full of Japanese macaques and American black bears.

The park has increased its monkey population over the past few years, to replace the baboons which were too hard on vehicles.

Last year's season was "extremely successful" said Papillon,

with about one third of a million people visiting.

The miniature horses, from South Carolina, are entirely new to the park this year, as are the white peacocks from Sri Lanka.

Papillon says the park is against the concept of cages, and this seems to be good for the animals. There is a good rate of reproduction, so there are always baby animals to be seen, and often visitors will get to see a birth.

"The well-being of our animals

remains the priority," she said. "We would not hesitate to call anywhere in the world for a medical consultation."

The park is open now, but the new features will not officially begin until June 22. The park stays open seven days a week until Labour Day, and then weekends after that, weather permitting.

The cost is \$7.95 per person, or \$23.95 per car. Children under three are admitted free.

The **HORACE** gallery in Sherbrooke has just kicked off another good show featuring the impressive photography-painting-sculpture etc. installation of **Chantal Dupont** and the graphic flights of fantasy of Sherbrooke's **Pierre Jeannotte**. Dupont is a native of **St-Jacques-le-Mineur** on the South Shore, but she has spent a lot of time in the Eastman and Cherry River sections of the Eastern Townships and she has chosen scenes from these parts as a central theme in her outstanding work. This installation attempts, and succeeds, at saying all kinds of things about perception, space, shape and form and has weaved an impressive pattern. 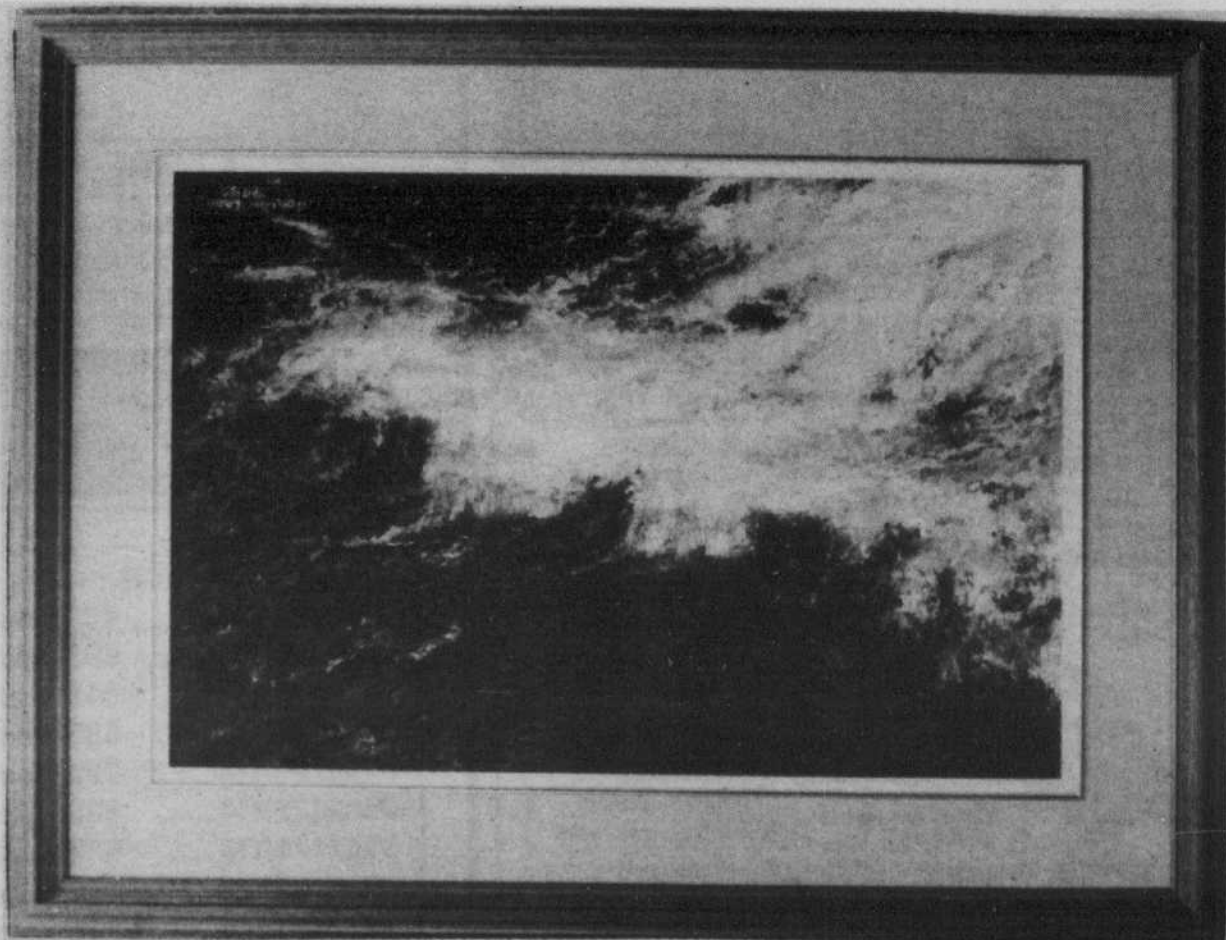
Movies

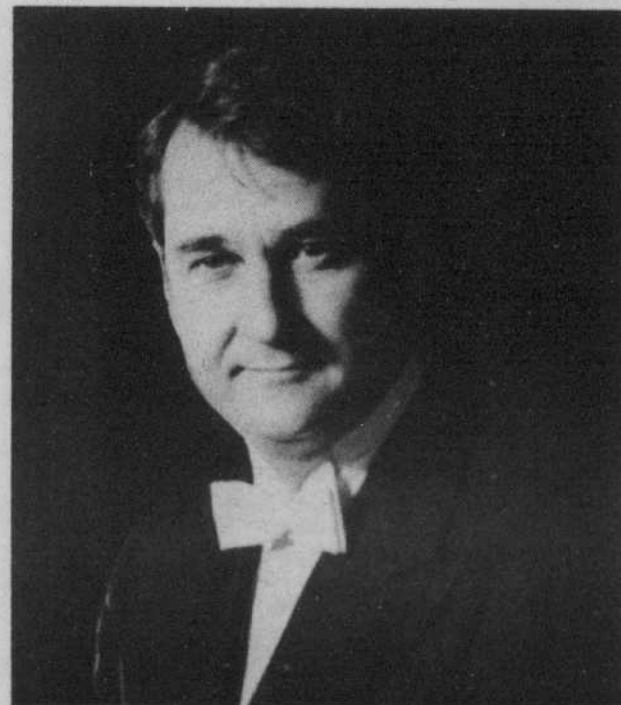
At 11:05 on CBC Radio *Radio Active* focusses on the music of Quebec songstress Louise Portal. Jeanette Kelly hosts.

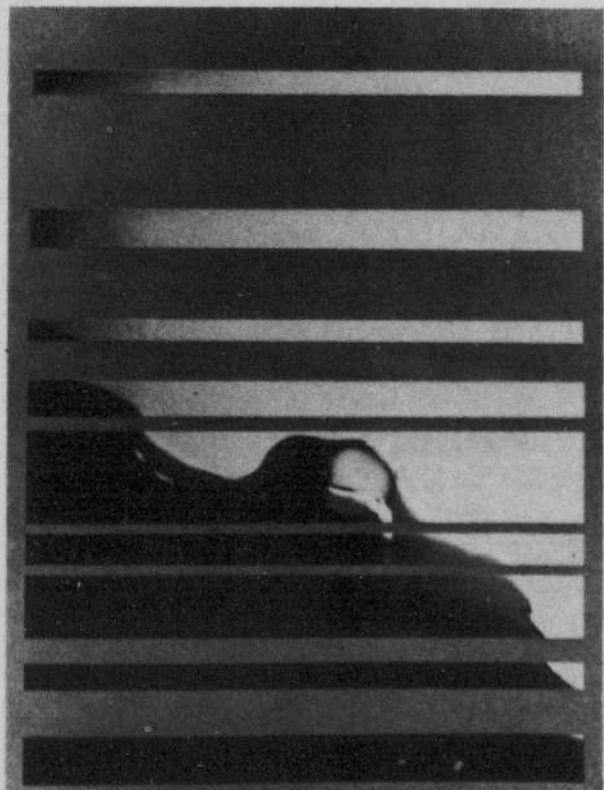

Canton serves as the gateway to modern China

CANTON, China (Reuter) — Known historically as the southern gateway to China, Canton is booming as the country swings open its doors to foreign businessmen and travellers.

A 45-minute plane hop from Hong Kong, the city accepts capitalist decadence as easily as it attracts foreign investment in modern hotels and factories.

No industry in Canton is growing like tourism. The city has 11,000 hotel rooms and officials say the average occupancy rate is 80-90 per cent. The best and biggest are joint ventures with Hong Kong firms.

The Garden Hotel, the biggest hotel in China, has just opened. It expects about 70 per cent of its 1,000 rooms and 720 apartments will eventually be filled by foreign corporate clients.

The waitresses at the hotel wear black bow-ties and red jackets.

"They were chosen for appearance," said manager Evan Pavlakis.

One of the women at the front desk of the rival White Swan Hotel is this year's Miss Canton beauty pageant queen.

IT'S EFFICIENT

For foreign businessmen, ex-

hausted by the rigors of operating elsewhere in China, Canton is an oasis of efficiency and comfort. Phones work. Hotel booking is computerized. At bars, they even chill the beer glasses.

If Canton does have a problem, it is the traffic jams that paralyse its downtown.

At rush hour, Liberation Road, the main artery cutting through the city, is packed with buses, trucks, motorbikes and taxis. Canton has a fleet of 6,000 gleaming taxis that cruise the streets night and day.

In Peking and Shanghai, travel by taxi requires endless waiting

and filling out forms. Taxis in Canton screech to a halt at the wave of a hand and the drivers prefer payment in Hong Kong dollars. It is illegal, but foreign currency changes hands freely here.

PLAN SUBWAY

City planner Zhu Bingheng said vehicle numbers have increased tenfold over the last few years. The city has built seven overpasses and five pedestrian bridge crossings but is still struggling to control traffic flow.

"The long-term plan is an underground railway," said Zhu. "There is already an underground system of bomb shelters we could use."

Canton youth listen avidly to music. The British rock duo Wham! recently played in Canton. In taxis, Taiwan love songs blare on stereo cassette recorders.

"Why should I want to live in Hong Kong?" asked the boat boy on the jet catamaran that plies the Pearl River route to the British territory. "It's just like Canton."

In the disco of the luxury China Hotel, local girls in tight jeans and T-shirts lounge around tables sipping beer. Songs like Girls Just Want to Have Fun and Like a Virgin bring them on to the dance floor.

They drift away after midnight, arm in arm with their boy-friends.

EXPLOIT TIES

It would be hard to find a Canton family that has no relatives in Hong Kong and the association is exploited for all it is worth.

"Hong Kong finance plays an important role in Canton's economy and a lot of trade goes through it's banks," said Zhu.

In imperial times, China was closed to the world except for Canton, which was the country's only channel for trade.

British opium merchants who forced open the Chinese market set up warehouses outside the city when they came in the last century.

"It is still the ideal jumping-off point for China," said leading economist Zhu Geng.

Economic officials here said that half of all Hong Kong's businessmen are originally from Canton. They are now busy investing in factories in their home city to take advantage of cheap labor.

Revitalizing the core of old Havana should help boost tourist industry

HAVANA (AP) — In hopes of attracting more tourists, the Cuban government is restoring Old Havana, a six-square-kilometre area of decaying and overcrowded historic buildings.

Tourism is now bringing \$100 million a year to the Caribbean island nation. Hotels previously used by the armed forces are being turned over to tourism.

Old Havana's foundation dates back to 1519 and colonization by Spain. Its small main plaza is surrounded by a fortress and the old Home of the Captain-Generals. They are colonial constructions of baroque architecture with Moorish-like patios and the traditional "aljibe" — tile-covered water well.

Groups of European tourists troop through museums and plazas in the restored area where streets are still being dug up to replace cobblestones. Most of the area is now a pedestrian zone.

But in a city where housing is a serious problem, most of the buildings in the old quarter had been taken over by squatter families even before the revolution that brought Fidel Castro to power in 1959.

RELOCATE SOME

Leandro Romero, a researcher

for the National Museum, one of the organizations working on the restoration, said many of the families, some of whom live in single rooms, will have to be relocated so that those who stay can have a livable space.

A four-storey building that housed a girls' school in the pre-revolutionary days later became a tenement occupied by 16 families. It is now almost restored, and only four families live there.

"Those who live in the buildings are given the option to buy the home," Romero said. Buying a home is a new concept in Castro's Cuba, permitted by a law passed only recently.

Live-in owners keep their houses in better condition, Romero said as he pointed to the many flower pots and hanging plants on the balconies.

The restoration includes touches from Spain's colonial days in the Caribbean. The place where the first barber shop was set up has been restored; it is again a barber shop with the official diploma of the original barber on the wall.

There is also a replica of the first pharmacy.

BECOME MUSEUMS

Many of the buildings are being

turned into museums or cultural exhibits of different countries friendly to Cuba.

The restoration, Romero said, is financed by the Cuban government and is in its second five-year-plan. Forty-one buildings have been restored.

"It is difficult," said Romero, noting the country's economic problems. "There are times when something is delayed because we lack simple things like nails or paint. But we all love Old Havana."

"We want to give a new sense to the old part of Havana. We do not want a Hollywood-type appearance, but a city that lives in accord with its inhabitants."

The Cuban government is doing other things to increase tourism to the island. Jesus Jimenez Escobar, vice-president of the Tourism Institute, said 206,000 tourists came to Cuba in 1984 and that number is expected to increase by 25 per cent this year. Of those who came last year, 168,000 were from western countries, mainly Canada, Italy, Mexico and Spain.

The government is planning to build 5,000 new hotel rooms in the next two to five years and is making agreements with Spanish companies to train personnel in the tourism industry and to improve services.

Historical Society open

The Brome County Historical Society located at 130 Lakeside in Knowlton will open its doors to the public for the summer season on Saturday June 1. The museum is open daily Monday to Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is charged - \$1.50 for adults, .75 for students and children. We also encourage group visits (students, Golden Age etc.)

A visit to the Museum comprises: The Knowlton Academy built in 1854. At the turn of the century it ceased to be used as a school and in 1903 was turned

over to the Society for a Museum as a Memorial to the donor, the Hon. Paul Holland Knowlton; The Martin Annex houses war relics and a W.W. I German Fokker DVIII; Country Store; Farm Equipment; and Tea Room where refreshments are available during museum hours; the Society also owns the Tibbits Hill Pioneer School which contains articles from early rural schools - this school is open on Sunday afternoons from 2 to 5 p.m.

A trip through the museum will prove interesting and instructive to the whole family.

Crater heads Negev tourist attractions

MITZPE RAMON, Israel (Reuter) — The world's largest natural crater, which shelters wild animals and crumbling remains of ancient civilization, is drawing tens of thousands of visitors to Israel's Negev Desert.

Created over 80 million years, the Ramon Crater provides a rare geological window on the earth's evolution as well as a view of life under harsh desert conditions.

The Israeli government has opened a visitors' centre perched on the edge of the reserve with a panoramic view. It has also set up trails and marked remnants from the Canaanite, Judean and Nabatean periods for tours of the eight-by-40-kilometre crater, formed by slow, steady erosion.

Desert goats, leopards, horned vipers and golden eagles live among the ruins of human habitation whose occupants left the area long ago. More than 1,200 species of plant, some of which stay underground for four years at a time, eke out an existence among the black, ionized dolomite hills.

TOUR CRATER

Visitors tour the crater by jeep and foot, although horse and camel caravans are expected to be organized soon. Tourists follow parts of the ancient highway built by the Nabateans from their capital at Petra, now in Jordan, down to Gaza.

The road is clearly discernible and its distance markers have been restored. Every 35 kilometres there are remains of a hostel, always near a water source. The ruins show the hostels included amenities such as a bakery.

The Nabateans, who abandoned the central Negev in the second century BC, proved unusually adept at desert farming through water runoff collection and underground storage. Today's garden at the visitors' centre is irrigated in the Nabatean system.

Ramon is rare in that its formation is exclusively the result of erosion by water. The crater has only one drainoff point, causing maximum erosion from the water.

Only 10 such craters are known to exist, all of them in the Negev or neighboring Sinai Desert.

ONCE UNDER SEA

Menachem Marcus, chief geographer for Israel's Nature Reserves Authority, says the Ramon Crater — in so dry an area today that tourists must drink hourly to avoid dehydration — used to be covered by water.

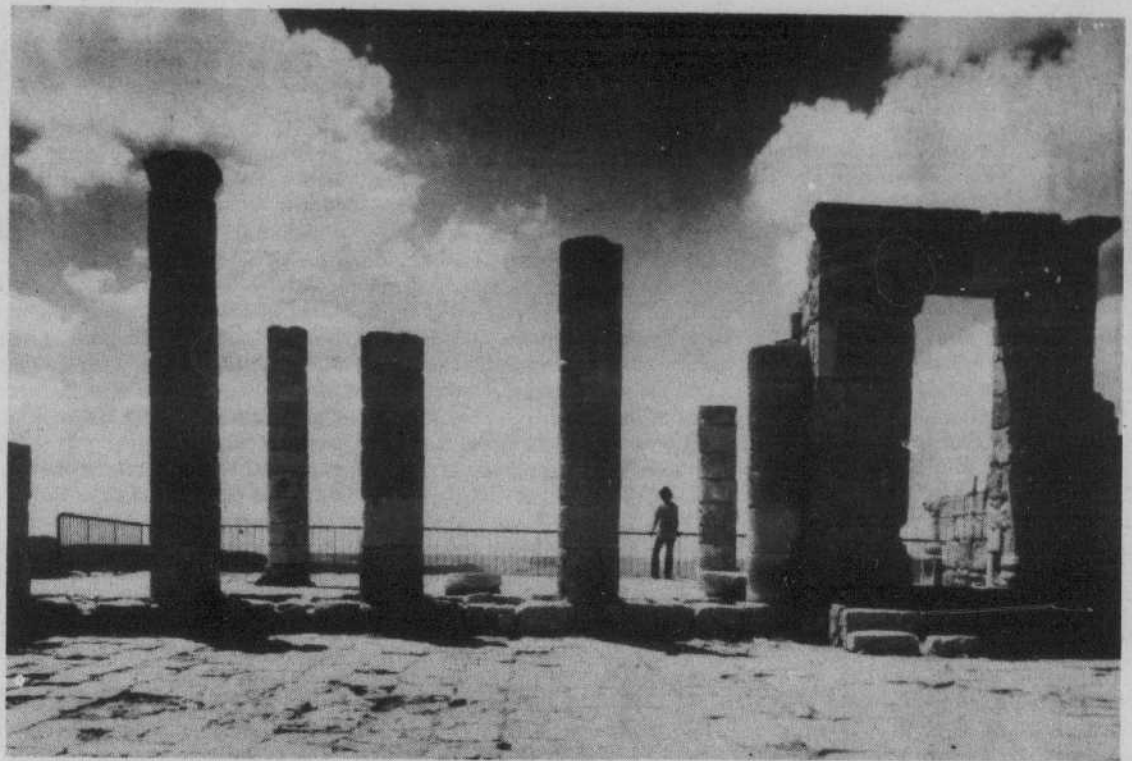
The Thetis Sea washed over the vast canyons for millions of years before slowly draining away.

The 395-metre-deep scar it left behind includes fossils clinging to rock edges, hexagonal basalt columns and flint clay with hues of grey, green and red.

Around the new visitors' centre, geologists are fixing a rock garden, with labelled examples of fossils represented.

Yael Shoham of the Nature Reserves Authority says more than 60,000 people have visited the centre since it opened in January. In the long term, up to a million a year are expected.

Apart from providing tourists with an interesting stop on their way to the Red Sea resort of Eilat, Ramon Crater Park plans to become a research centre with laboratories and a library.

Montezuma still getting even with the unwary

It may have such exotic names as tourista or Montezuma's Revenge, but there is nothing like a case of the runs to spoil a vacation.

Though usually associated with travel to tropical climes, tourista may strike wherever disruptive bacteria are lurking to be consumed in food or drink.

The traditional advice to tourists travelling to the Caribbean or Central and South America has always been: don't drink the water. That still applies.

But even if you're careful and don't eat raw vegetables and fruits that may have been washed in untreated water, you can still pick up a nasty bacteria — and diarrhea.

Before heading for the sun, many tourists ask their doctors to prescribe something for a possible attack; other travellers swear by non-prescription medications.

But these medications only alleviate symptoms — they're not a cure.

Dr. Pierre Viens of Montreal's Hotel-Dieu Hospital, author of a pamphlet for travelling Quebecers, says there is an effective treatment for tourista that's cheap and easy to prepare.

STOP SOLIDS

Tourista is an irritation of the small intestine, producing frequent bouts of diarrhea but little if any fever. Viens writes that victims should stop eating solids until the diarrhea stops, avoid milk and dairy products, and take a potion of salt, sugar and the juice of one lemon or orange after each bout of the runs.

The recipe is contained in his *Voyager en sante sous les tropiques* (Travelling in Good Health in the Tropics), published in French by the Quebec federation of general practitioners.

Although the sugar-and-salt beverage is internationally known for treating the often fatal dehydration caused by acute diarrhea, most North Americans don't know about it.

International aid organizations such as the United Nations Children's Fund distribute packets of the ingredients to mothers of young sufferers in developing countries.

However, Canadians travelling abroad can take their own ingredients.

The recipe, writes Viens, is simple: mix a teaspoon of salt and eight teaspoons of sugar with the juice of one orange or lemon

in 32 ounces (909 millilitres) of potable water — but not mineral water.

Add half a teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda if available.

Adults should drink 12 ounces (about 340 millilitres) of the preparation after each bout of diarrhea, children half that amount. Babies might not drink the solution because of the taste, Viens says. If so, try a flat soft drink, especially a cola. Give them as much as they'll drink.

LASTS 24 HOURS

"Tourista treated like that should rarely last more than 24 hours," writes Viens. "And this procedure helps with all kinds of diarrhea, even those accompanied by a fever."

Of course, once you feel better, it's important to resume the intake of solid foods gradually.

If the diarrhea persists for a few days, it makes good sense to see a doctor. One per cent of diarrhea cases are caused by more dangerous bacteria.

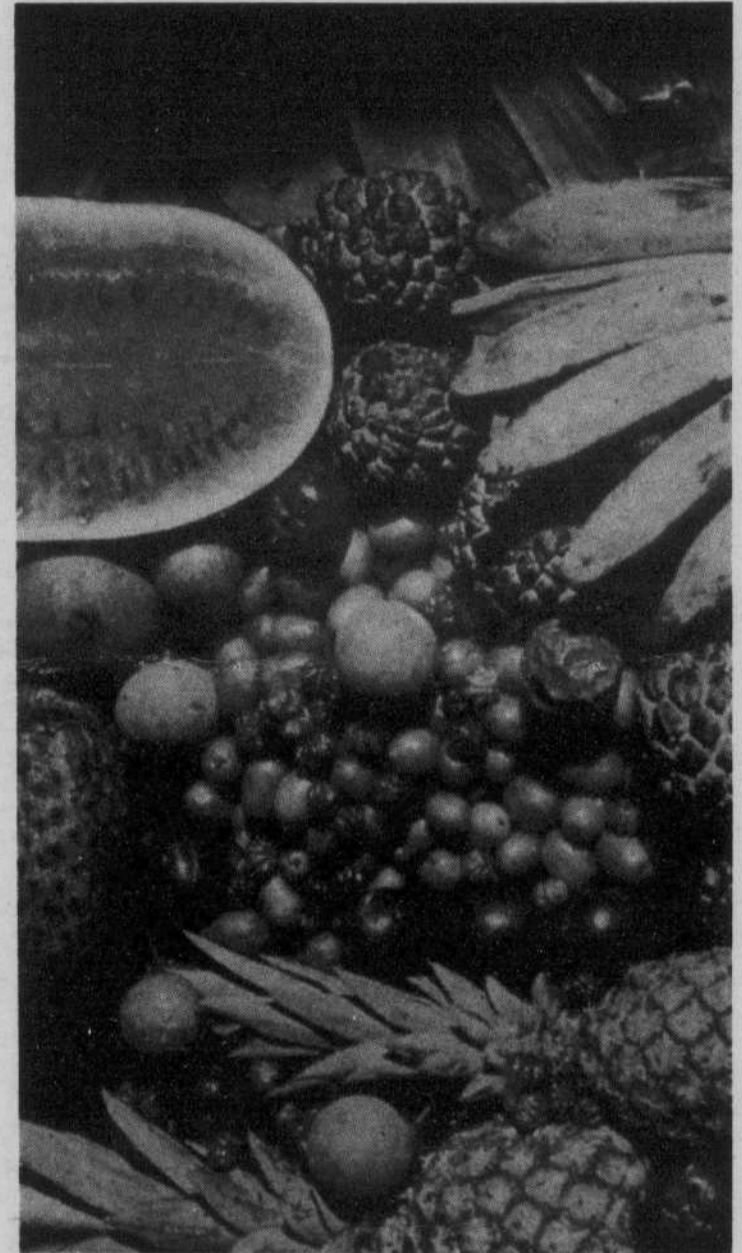
When diarrhea attacks are frequent, writes Viens, say 10 to 20 times a day, accompanied by a temperature of 38.5 degrees or higher and a general feeling of fatigue, a traveller should seek medical attention, preferably in

a well-equipped hospital.

Viens holds a PhD in parasitology from the University of London and spent 1964-68 practising in the Ivory Coast. His 76-page pamphlet, written in layman's French, is now in its ninth printing and has sold more than 38,000 copies in Quebec. It offers plenty of helpful hints about travelling in tropical climes, as well as information about vaccination requirements.

It has advice for travellers in different age groups and deals with a range of hazards, from insect bites and heat rashes to sexually transmitted diseases and exotic tropical parasites.

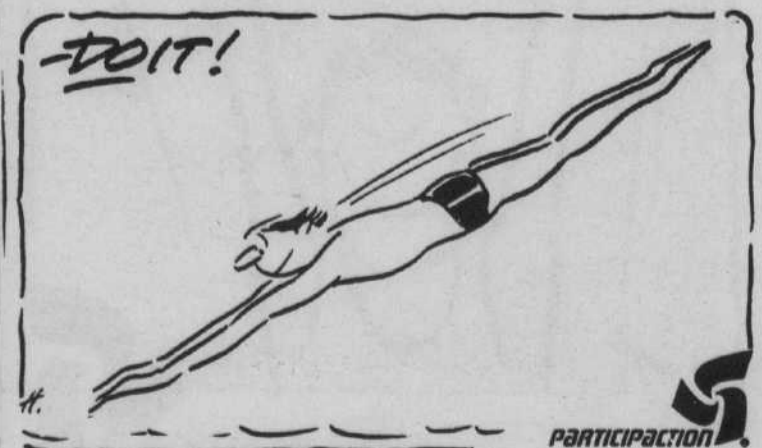

Ramses II display a summer treat for Montrealers

MONTREAL — Governor-General Jeanne Sauvé headed a Who Who's from the governmental, diplomatic, arts, academic and business worlds as she officially inaugurated the stunning **Ramses II and his time** exhibition last night at Montreal's Palais de la Civilisation.

A delegation of Egyptian authorities, headed by Dr. Mohamed Radwan, Minister of Culture of Egypt, flew to Montreal to be on hand for the opening — the first-ever presentation in North America of the priceless Ramesside

the presentation of the Ramses treasures in Montreal, and Mme Sauvé spoke at the inauguration. Some 1,000 guests attended.

Other foreign dignitaries at the opening included Egyptian Ambassador Tahseen M. Basheer, Egyptian Consul General Adel Abdel Salam, and Christiane Desroches Noblecourt, one of the world's greatest experts on Egyptian art and honorary inspector general of the Musées de France, who is acting as scientific advisor for the Ramses presentation.



treasures from the permanent collection of the Egyptian Museum, Cairo. The delegation includes Dr. Ahmed Kadry, Secretary of State for Culture of Egypt and president of the Egyptian Antiquities Organization (EAO), Dr. Gamal Moktar, vice-president of the EAO, Ambassador Ali Shawki El-Hadidy, Under-Secretary of State for Cultural Relations, Department of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Mohamed Saleh, director-general of the Egyptian Museum, etc.

Judge Jacques Vadboncoeur, commissioner-general of the exhibition, Dr. Radwan, Mayor Jean Drapeau, who negotiated

The exhibition — the first presentation of irreplaceable Egyptian treasures in America since **Treasures of Tutankhamun** in the late 1970s — headlines a summer of events without equal since Expo 67. With more than 100,000 advance tickets for Ramses sold as of two weeks ago, the exhibition is expected to produce major economic benefits for Montréal. Groups from throughout the United States and Canada as well as individual visitors from Europe have already purchased tickets for the exhibition, which has won broad sponsorship from government and the private sector alike.

The objects, crated in 34 cases

with a total weight of 22 tonnes, arrived in Montreal via EgyptAir May 17 on the airline's inaugural flight between Cairo and New York. Curators and conservators accompanied the treasures. Police Helicopters, patrol cars and motorcycles from three forces — the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the Québec Police Force and the Montréal Urban Community Police Department — guarded the treasures as they were transferred from the Montréal International Airport at Mirabel to the Palais de la Civilisation. The two largest pieces of the exhibition were flown to Montréal May 18 aboard a special Air France aircraft.

The treasures range in size from a colossus 2½ metres tall to a pocket-size rake comb.

An estimated 600,000 people from within a 500-mile radius of Montréal are expected to visit the exhibition, which will be open to the public from June 1 to Sept. 29. The exhibition has been organized by the City of Montréal in cooperation with EAO.

A major art coup, the presentation consists of 69 exhibits, some including several works, ranging from the lid of the tomb in which Ramses was reburied to monumental statuary and priceless gold jewelry. Also featured are objects from everyday life of the era.

The exhibition site, the Palais de la Civilisation, is the former Expo 67 pavilion of France on Ile Notre-Dame. It is located amid a series of lush gardens which are the heritage of the 1980 **Floralies internationales**, the first world horticultural exhibition in North America.

The forecast attendance is based on figures of the Tutankhamun exhibition in eight North American cities as well as attendance at Man and His World. Staged from 1977 to 1979 in seven U.S. cities and Toronto, the Tut exhibition drew from 780,187 to 1,349,724 visitors in each of the eight museums included in the tour.

Tutankhamun died about 50 years before Ramses' reign. The objects in the Tut exhibition, like those in **Ramses II and his time**, were from Cairo's Egyptian Museum.

Tutankhamun, due to his early death, was a minor figure in Egyptian history until his tomb was discovered intact. Ramses, on the other hand, is a dominant personality of ancient Egypt. Many of his great works survive today, some 3,300 years after his death, aged about 90.

A Ramses exhibition at the Grand Palais, in Paris, in 1976 drew 1.2 million visitors. The Montreal showing, in content, largely parallels the Paris presentation.

Admission to the Palais de la Civilisation exhibition is \$4.50 for adults and \$3 for children, students and senior citizens. The exhibition will be open seven days a week — Sunday through Thursday, from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., and

Friday, Saturday and the day preceding a holiday, from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m.

Net profit from the exhibition, after the city completely reimburses itself from admission fees, sale of catalogues, etc. for all the funds it advances for the organization and presentation of the exhibition, will go to the EAO to help it pursue its archaeological and research activity. The Tutankhamun exhibition produced a significant profit in each of the eight cities it toured.

Ramses II and his time will also be shown at EXPO 86, the international special-category exhibition to be held in Vancouver from May 2 to Oct. 13, 1986. EXPO 86 is building a special temporary museum on Vancouver's False Creek site to house the Ramses artefacts.

The exhibition was arranged by Mayor Drapeau and Dr. Kadry. Approved by the Gouvernement du Québec, the agreement underlines the fact that the EAO wishes to "intensify friendly and cultural relations" with Montréal. It notes that the city hosted Expo 67, the Summer Olympic Games of 1976 and the **Floralies internationales**.

Ramses II and his time is witness to a century of Egyptian civilization during the reign of a great pharaoh who left a peerless heritage.

Third king of the 19th dynasty of Egypt, Ramses II had a long and prosperous reign — the second longest in Egyptian history — from 1290 to 1224 BC. His was a golden age in Egypt and he un-

dertook extensive building programs, including the two rock temples at Abu Simbel and the Ramesseum at Thebes. He sired perhaps as many as 150 children — a number of his children predeceased him — with his many wives, the favorite of whom was Nefertari. A life-size photographic reconstitution of part of the tomb of Nefertari — a display which alone has drawn countless visitors throughout Europe and South America — is part of the Ramses exhibition.

Sub-themes within the Montréal presentation facilitate understanding of the treasures: Son of the Sun God, the builder king, science, letters and religion, daily life and the craftsmen of the royal necropolis, the fate of Ramses, etc.

The works are presented in a series of pyramid-shaped modules on two floors of the Palais de la Civilisation. The building underwent a major interior overhaul to make it worthy of the great pharaoh. The changes include the addition of an Egyptian-style garden.

The Ramses treasures, in addition to those made of gold, are of silver, granite, alabaster, sandstone, limestone, papyrus, terracotta, frit, cornelian, shale, wood, bronze, and bone.

Complementing the exhibition will be film and slide projections, lectures, an Egyptian restaurant and a tea room, a cafeteria, a boutique, a bookshop and satellite shops for printed materials, including the 200-page catalogue, mini-catalogue, etc.

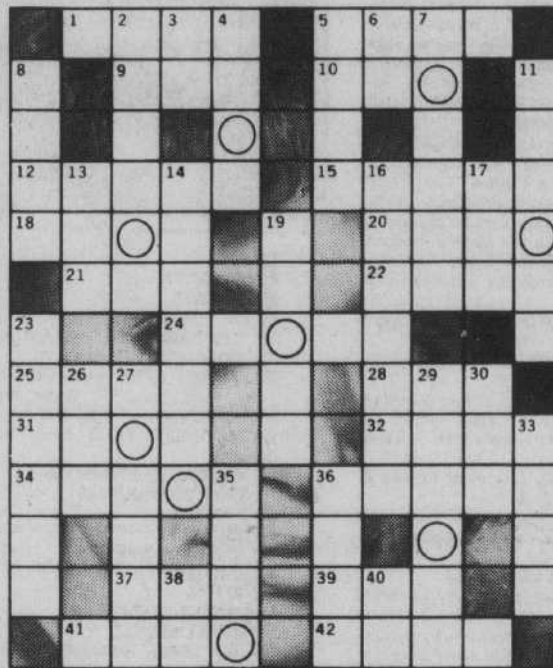

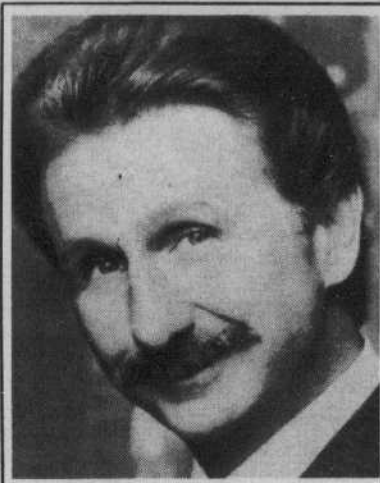

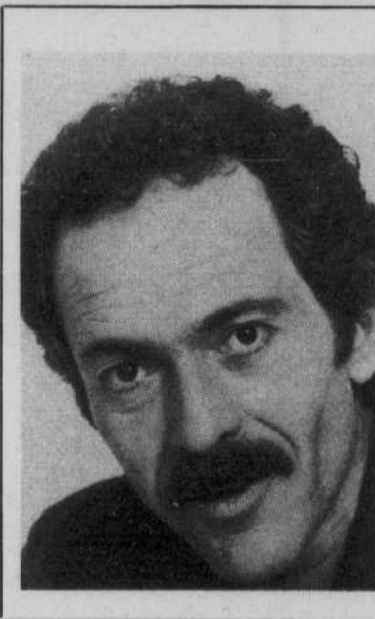
