

Church of Advent Plans Anniversary Sunday October 7

Church of The Advent, Western and Wood avenues, will be the scene of special services marking its 64th anniversary on Sunday, October 7. The Church was dedicated on Advent Sunday in 1892.

The Revd. Alexander Mellor, Rector, has announced that three Anglican clergymen from other parishes will participate in the special services of the "Dedication Festival."

The services will commence on Saturday, October 6, with a "Quiet Afternoon" from three to 5 p.m. to be conducted by the Revd. Barry Valentine, B.D., from Beauharnois.

Following the 8 a.m. Holy Eucharist on the Sunday, a Parish breakfast will be served by the women's guild in the parish hall. Sunday school is held following the 9.30 a.m. Holy Eucharist.

Special preacher at the service of Solemn Eucharist at 11 a.m. will be the Revd. Canon F. C. Ireland, B.A., former rector of St. Phillips for many years, who is now serving as assistant at the Anglican church in Dorval.

The Revd. H. J. Isaacs, B.A., B.D., assistant priest at St. Thomas' will be the special preacher at the 7 p.m. Solemn Evensong service.

The Advent was first established as a chapel to serve the west end of the parish of St. James The Apostle. In 1896 it was made a separate parish "bounded on the east by Fort street, on the south by Dorchester, on the west by Greene and on the north by the (then) city limits." Today its supporters come from all parts of the island of Montreal.

A special feature of The Advent's services has always been the music of the boys' and men's choir which was the first in Montreal to become affiliated with the Royal School of Church Music. Choristers in particular come to the church from Montreal's most outlying suburbs, attracted by the musical training they receive.

The ranks of the choristers have recently been depleted by the inevitable process of boys growing up and losing their soprano voices and The Advent is currently conducting a search for new choir boys. Organist and choir director of the church is W. Steers.

Teachers To Convene Oct. 4 & 5

The largest gathering of teachers, principals, education officials and administrators since the founding of the P.A.P.T. in 1864 is expected to meet for the two-day conference on October 4 and 5 in one of the oldest school buildings on the Island, the High School of Montreal. Over 3,000 teachers are expected to register from every corner of the province, most of them travelling at their own expense, since only some 125 voting delegates have their expenses paid by the association. Parents and school trustees are invited to attend any of the sessions or educational exhibits of Convention. One of the two business meetings of the P.A.P.T. is also open to the public.

Final Tribute Paid To Aristide Demers

Final tribute was paid this morning at St. Leo's Church to Aristide Demers, a resident of this city since 1909.

President of P. Demers and Son until his retirement in 1950, he was 85 years of age.

Well known in the automotive equipment field, he joined the firm his father founded in 1860, and rose to the presidency.

He is survived by his wife, the former Irene Duchesneau; a son, Jean J.; four daughters, Mrs. Roger Belanger, Marguerite, Ninette, and Lucette, all of Montreal.

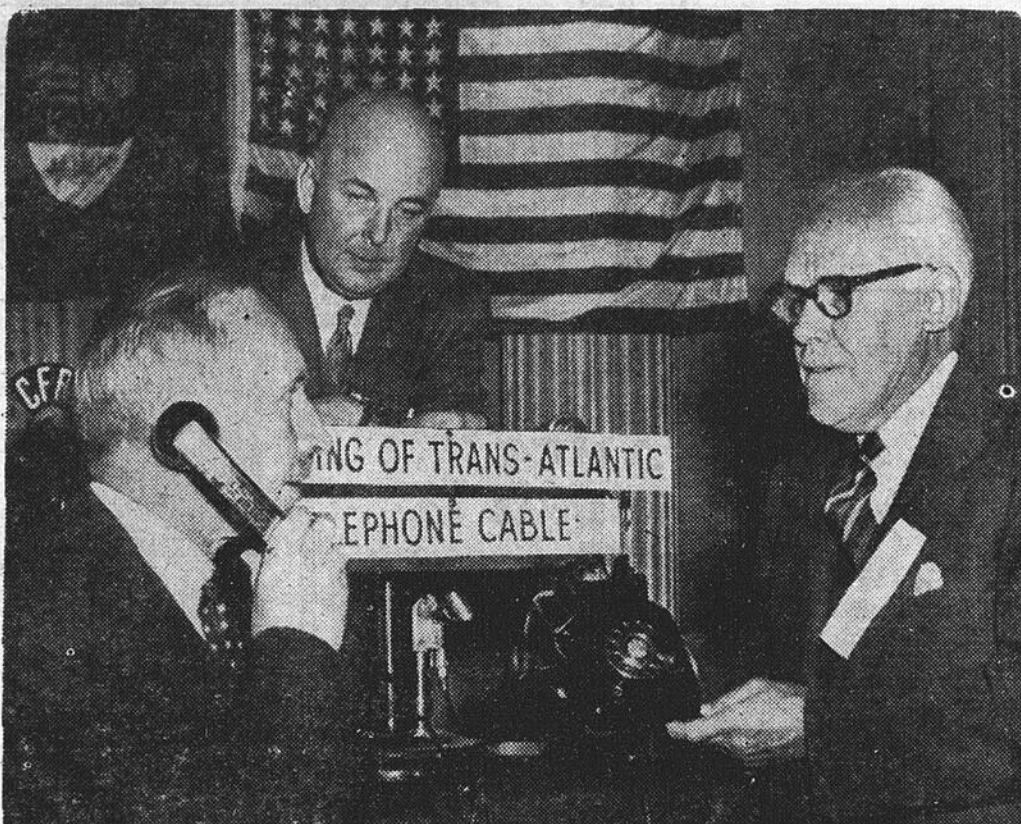

Other classes will be announced next week for Badminton, Business girls gym classes and swimming instruction.

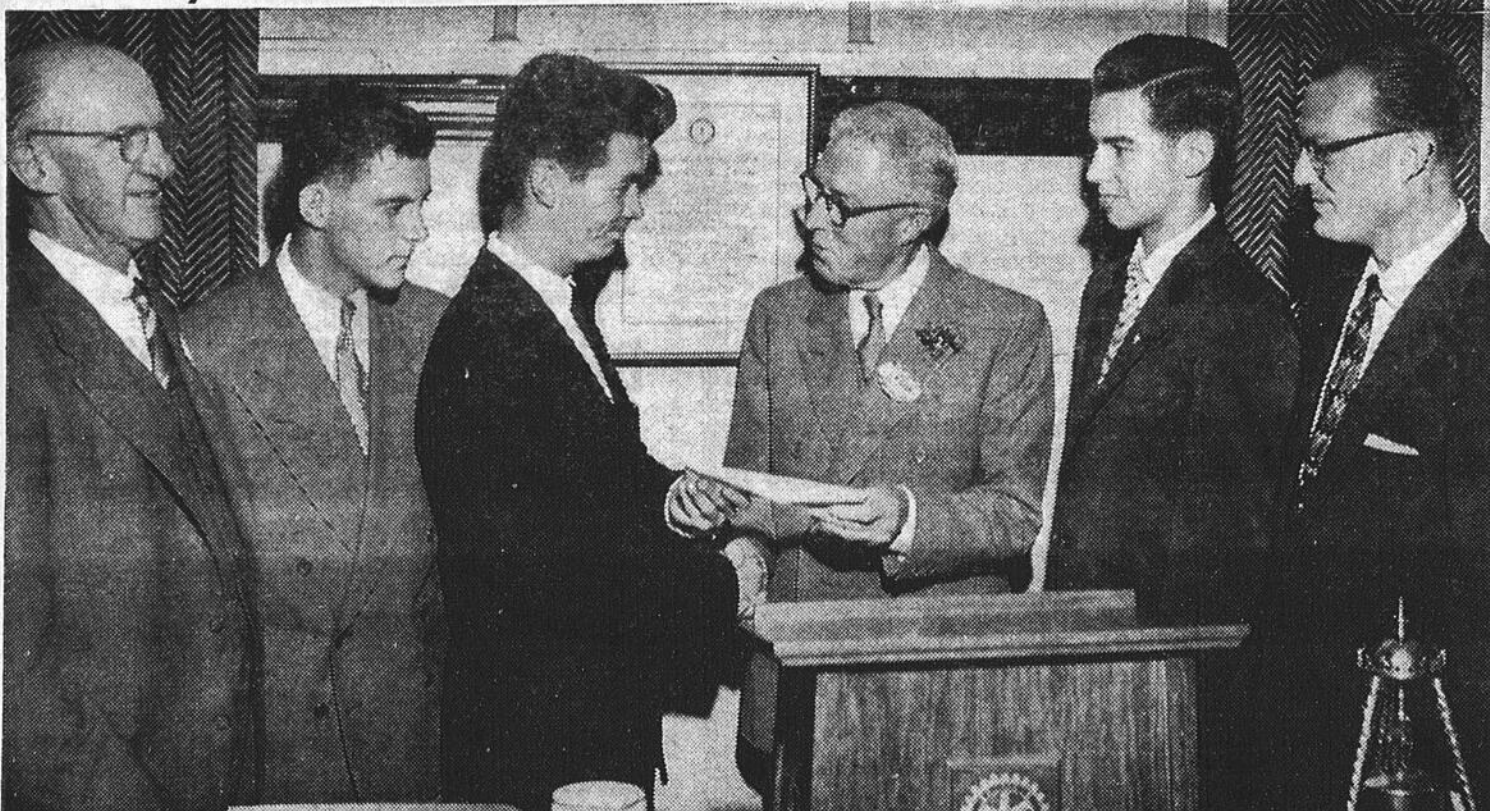
Westmount "Y" welcomed three young people to their staff this week when recently appointed Fellowship Secretaries joined the staff.

Lecturers from various universities, schools and colleges, and different fields of accomplishment will collaborate in giving the unique series of Thomas More Institute Evening Courses which start Monday, October 1, in the D'Arcy McGee building, 220 Pine avenue west.

G. Emmett Canon Carter, Principal of St. Joseph's Normal School and President of the Thomas More, and Charlotte Tansey, Registrar as well as foundress of the Institute, will lead a discussion course entitled Motivation and Choice: A Study of the Human Will; Mr. Stanislaus Machnik, teacher with the Montreal Catholic School Commission and his wife will give a second course in the same subject.

Accent On Commerce At McGill Outlined

The young man preparing for a business career today should have a program of study that integrates a liberal education with courses in business fundamentals.

This is the prescription given by Eric W. Kierans, director of the School of Commerce at McGill University, in an address to the Kinsmen's Club of Montreal at its dinner meeting at the Mount Royal Hotel. Professor Kierans is a member of the speakers committee of the McGill Fund — 1956, which is seeking to raise \$6,000,000 for five urgently-needed construction projects at the university, to meet the increasing number of students. McGill is preparing to receive 7,500 students from Montreal and suburbs such as Westmount and other Provincial centres by 1965.

Such a program, said Prof. Kierans, enables "the students to take his place in society as a responsible citizen, equipped to

provide the leadership expected of him by his fellow men."

In a five-point platform, Professor Kierans outlined how the ideal school of commerce can help a student to get ahead:

1. Familiarize a student with the basic economic laws, principles and forces that work in and through our business system.
2. Teach a student to think clearly, particularly regarding economic and business problems.
3. Show him those methods of management and executive principles tested by experience.
4. Stress the constant pressure in business for improved methods and procedures.
5. Emphasize the social obligations and public responsibilities of business.

The November Mission II The Great Missioner

Above all others, Our Lord was the Man with a mission. He came to seek and to save. To use the expression of last week, He came to put the various relationships of life — with the material world, with man and with God — into their proper place, and to give them their proper values. And Our Lord through His Holy Spirit still remains the Great Missioner. His mission to seek and to save, never changes. But He uses human agents for His task as He always has done. *

The first of those human agents was His Forerunner, the man who came before Him to prepare His way; John the Baptist. He becomes the pattern of all those who try even today to continue to prepare for His coming.

It is hard for us to realize the impression John made on his contemporaries. There had been no prophet in Israel for centuries, when the Word of the Lord came to him in the wilderness. Yet prophecy was an essential part of the religion of Israel, and it was not long before the people were accepting John as a prophet. It made authority very way in dealing with him. He did not claim the title; he described himself as the voice of one crying in the wilderness; but the very manner of his coming and the quality of his message marked him as one to whom the Word of the Lord had come in the old prophetic style.

John had spent his years in the wilderness. He came out from it into the busy life of Palestine as Elijah had come centuries before. He even adopted the dress of Elijah. We should have found him a rough, uncouth character. And his way of life would not have pleased us

either. He was an ascetic, avoiding wine, and living on the plainest of the foods that the wilder-

ness provided. He made no claim to follow his father Zacharias in his priestly office where he would have found a life of holiness, but along with it the ease and security that so many men desire. Obviously he was not a time-server, but a man who openly reproved vice and was ready to suffer for his plain speaking. He made a great stir in Israel, but eventually fulfilled his mission by encouraging his disciples to follow a greater Master, with the quiet comment that he must decrease while the Greater One should inevitably increase. The great missionary does not build up a following for himself. He is only a forerunner, pointing the way.

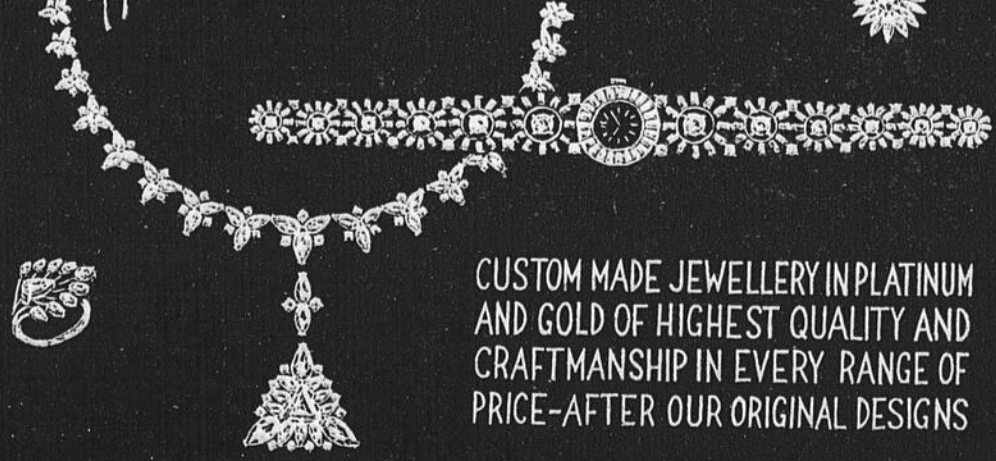

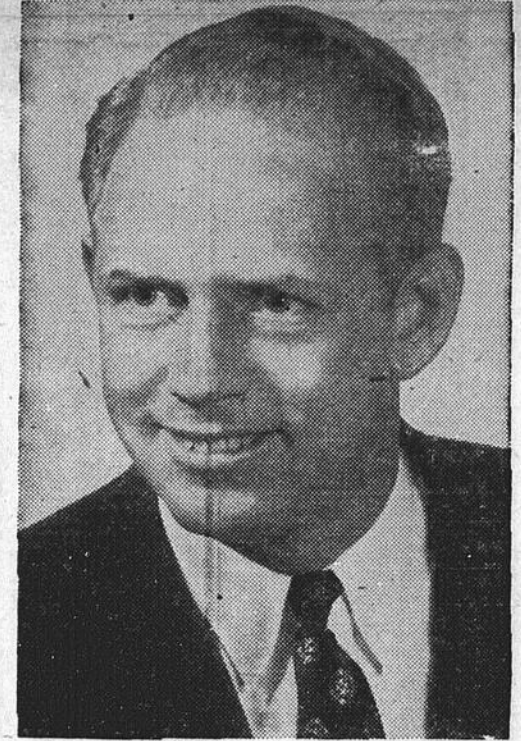

Children's Service Centre Authorized To Increase Payments To Foster Homes

The Budget Committee of Welfare Federation has granted an increase in board rates to the Children's Service Centre, which has been authorized to raise payments to foster homes by two dollars a month. The announcement was made today by A. H. Rowland, chairman of the committee which allots funds to Red Feather agencies here. The committee had had to agree to the increase "most reluctantly", in view of the Federation's poor financial position, Mr. Rowland said. The increase has been granted because of rising costs of food and other household necessities which must be met by foster families caring for the children. Even with the increase, foster home rates paid by the Children's Service Centre lag behind rates paid by similar social agencies operating in the city, it was pointed out.

The new board rates go into effect on October 1 and will result in monthly payments of \$37 to city homes in which children are boarded and \$35 to country homes. The new rates will add about \$20,000 a year to the Children's Service Centre budget.

The increase has been granted after careful review of the situation the Red Feather children's service faces, Mr. Rowland said. Maintaining foster children is not a paying proposition for foster parents, but it cannot be done at a sacrifice on their part, it was pointed out. An acute shortage of foster homes has hampered the work of the Children's Service Centre, which cares for homeless children, now numbering 855, all ineligible for adoption.

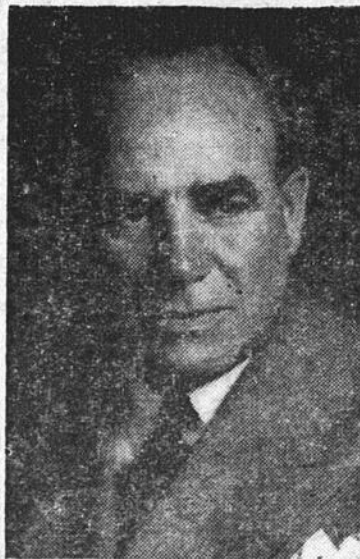

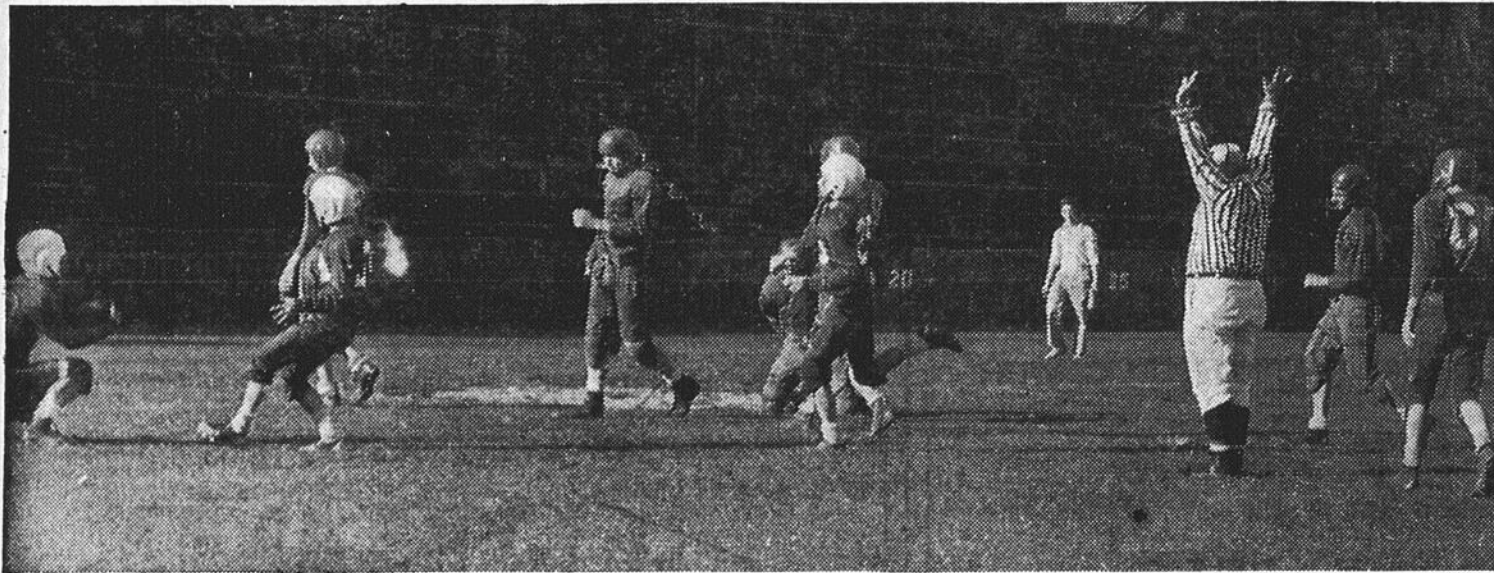
