GENERAL ORDER.
His Excellency the COMMANDER of the FOR
CES, has received from Major-General De Rotten
burg, through Major-General Vincent, the Report of
Lieut. Colonel Williams, 13th regt. commanding St.
Johns and the posts in advance, on the Richelieu
River—stating that the outposts on the Communi
cations leading from Odell Town to Burtonville and
La Colle Mill were attacked at an early hour on the
morning of the 30th inst. by the enemy in great
force, collected from Burlington and Plattsburg, un
der the command of Major-General Wilkinson. The
troops retreated in good order, before the superior
numbers of the enemy, disputing bravely. The
advance on the Burtonville road was not persevered
in; and the whole of the enemy's force was directed
against the post of La Colle, entrusted to the com
mand of Major Hancock of the 13th regt. who re
ports that his pickets, from a mile and a half in ad
vance, being driven in, the enemy shortly after ap
peared in great force, and established a battery of
three 12 pounders, which was opened on the Mill
Block house.

Major Hancock, receiving intelligence of the ap
proach of the two Black Companies of the 15th Regt.
to his relief, ordered an attack upon the enemy's gun
which, although executed with the greatest gallantry,
could not succeed, in consequence of the surrounding
woods being filled with Infantry for their support.
Another opportunity presented itself, and was instant
ly seized by the Grenadier Company of the Canadian
Fencibles and a Company of Voltigeurs, who having
followed the movement of the enemy from the Bur
tonville road, with a view to reinforce the point attacked,
made a spirited attempt, to get possession of the
enemy's guns; but altho' foiled in this object, from
his very superior numbers, succeeded in gaining the
Block house.

Both these gallant attacks have been attended
with the loss of several brave soldiers. Captain El
lard, 10th Regt. was wounded while leading his com
pany to the Assault; and Major Hancock, regrets
the temporary loss of his able services. He ex
presses himself highly indebted to Capt. Ritter of the
Frontier Light Infantry, who, from his local know
ledge of the country, was enabled to afford him the
most essential service and information.

Major Hancock speaks in terms of the highest
praise of the detachment of Marines under Lieutenants
Caldwell and Burton; and expresses the strong obli
gations he feels himself under to Captain Pring of the
Royal Navy, for his prompt and able support, in
bringing a sloop and the Gun Boats from the Isle
aux Noix to the mouth of La Colle River; from
whence his fire was most destructive, and gallant
to the enemy; and to Lieut. Creswick, (R. N.) who
was most active and zealous in landing two field
pieces and stores, and getting them from the boats to
the Mill Block house. The enemy persevered in his
attack until night fall, when he withdrew his guns
and retreated by the road to Odell Town, having
sustained severe loss.

His Excellency the Commander of the Forces most
cordially agrees in the high tribute of praise bestowed
by Lieut. Colonel Williams on Major Hancock, for
his most judicious and undaunted defence of the post
entrusted to his charge, and to all the troops im
mediately engaged in its defence, for their spirited and
encouraged good conduct.

The Flank Companies of the 13th Regt. the Gren
adiers of the Canadian Fencibles, and the Company
of Voltigeurs secured with avidity the opportunities pre
sented them to signalize their entire devotion to the
service.

in general, you will not fail to express His Royal High
ness's Most Gracious Approbation of their meritorious
and distinguished Services. His Royal Highness has
commanded me to inform you by the first safe oppor

HALIFAX FEB. 25.
The *Procyon*, Capt. Sir J. P. Berrisford, which
sailed from hence Nov. 31, arrived at Portsmouth
Dec. 28.

Admiral Sir Alexander Cochrane, Bt. was ex
pected to sail for this station in H. M. S. *Asia* 74, in
10 or 12 days after the Packet.

The *Dedalus* frigate, Capt. Maxwell, with a con
voy for the East Indies, and within four days sail of
Madras, struck upon a rock, and soon after found
ered, but the officers and crew were fortunately saved.

A conspiracy has been detected at Amsterdam, by
a spy taken at one of the gates by a Corsick. It is
said to have consisted of 4000 conspirators, who had
had a plan to set fire to the town in several places,
and to have destroyed the Engines; on which signal
the French General Molitor, with the French troops
from the different fortresses, were to have fallen on
the city, and might easily have put every soul to
death. But all is now quiet and out of danger.

Rottterdam, Dec. 13. The important fortress of
Breda is taken by the Russian troops. The French
garrison 1800 men, attempted to reach Antwerp,
but were overtaken by the Russians, and 600 of
them made prisoners. It is reported that the Rus
sians have taken post within a mile from Antwerp.

MESSAGE of the GOVERNOR.

Gentlemen of the Senate, and
Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

SINCE the last Session, I have not received any communication from the general government or can I give you any information, not already in possession of the public, relative to our national concerns. The critical situation of our affairs from the war, and the earnest desire of our citizens for peace, will undoubtedly attract the attention of the General Assembly, and induce them to adopt such measures, if any are within their power, as will avert the evils of the one and accelerate the blessings of the other. I know not, however, that the General Assembly, have the power, or the means, of interfering with any effect for the protection of the coast, or for the restoration of the blessings of peace and commerce. The constitution has confided to Congress and to the President the control of commerce and the power of directing the national means to the public defence. We have repeatedly addressed the officers of the General Government on the exposed condition of the sea-coast, and the necessity of preparation adequate to the emergency; the coast is notwithstanding, still much exposed, and the means of repelling invasion are neither strengthened nor increased.

Although the United States are still afflicted by the dreadful scourge of this unhappy and unsuccessful war, and, in addition to the heavy loads of debts and taxes under which they and their posterity are to toil and labour, many have to lament the death of near friends, and the destruction of their habitations and means of subsistence; we have abundant reason to be thankful to the merciful Ruler of the Universe for a bountiful harvest; and for the quiet and tranquillity which this State has enjoyed. In alleviation also of the otherwise unavoidable privations and sufferings of our citizens, they have found employment and subsistence in our increasing manufactures, and in the neutral commerce.

Of the small remnant of trade with foreign countries which neutrals have carried on since the declaration of War, and of the Coasting Trade, we are in danger of being deprived by an Embargo of a most alarming and dangerous character. In addition to the almost entire extinction of foreign trade, it subjects the trade between ports in the same State, and even the passage of rivers and ferries, to the power and arbitrary discretion of Custom House Officers. Even the intercourse by land is subjected to their interference by land is subjected to their inquisition; and in recent instances payments made in New-York, in the regular course of trade, have been arrested in their progress, by the arbitrary and unreasonable interference of a Collector.

This State has always shown a commendable readiness to submit to, and comply with all the constitutional measures of the federal Government; it is a disposition which does us honour; but the grievous burdens imposed on the nation, and the extraordinary means adopted, and obstinately persisted in, to support a ruinous war, must excite the most gloomy apprehensions. We should however indulge the hope, that our national rule will remember, that the end is a point at which oppression must stop, and that notwithstanding our respect for the laws, and our strong attachment to the union of the States, there may be evils greater, than can be apprehended from a refusal to submit to unconstitutional laws.

All these discussions upon the duty of submission and the right of resistance, may, I fervently hope, be made unnecessary by the speedy conclusion of peace, and by the restoration of our former prosperity.

In this hope all good men will unite, and we may indulge the pleasing expectation that the same Almighty God, who protected and guided our fathers, will continue his goodness and favour to us.

In all such measures as the Assembly may adopt for the defence of the State, they will find my hearty assent, and ready execution of their orders; they will recollect the very limited means in our power, and that the enormous loans and taxes for the present year are probably to be expended, as in the past not in the protection of the coast, but in offensive war, and attempts at conquest.

Extract from the Defence of General McClure, late Commander on the Niagara Frontier.

"I have been a zealous supporter of the present War; I believe the cause to be just, and the love of country was my only motive in accepting a command. But how have I been treated, how supported, while I had the command of the most important district on the Canadian borders. As soon as regular troops joined me, they were immediately ordered below to join the grand army. I called for volunteers, or detached militia; but in vain. Even with less than five thousand of that species of troops, I should have been this day in possession of the Heights of Burlington and York, the former a post, at the present stage of the war, of as much consequence as Montreal."

"But I will dismiss the idea of conquest, while I speak of the shameful neglect of Forts Niagara and George. These posts, together with forty miles of an important frontier, were left on the 10th day of December, to be guarded by 220 effective men."
