MIDDLETON'S LATEST MOVEMENTS—HIS RETURN TO CAMP.

(From Witness Correspondent.)

CHIPPWAYAN MISSION, near Beaver River, Tuesday, June 16, via Battleford, June 18. General Middleton, with his mounted force, arrived here today, having made the eighty miles from Fort Pitt via Frog Lake in three days. His arrival was attended with considerable excitement. The force turned out to receive him, and as the General rode into the camp, he was loudly and heartily cheered by the men, who have confidence in him.

This little place is now the base of operations against Big Bear and the force which has been concentrated here is a large one. The column now consists of 300 cavalry, 300 infantry and artillery, two Gatling guns and one 9 pounder. No immediate movement is probable as the scouts who are out looking up Big Bear have not all returned and those who have returned found no traces of him. Till his whereabouts are discovered there will be no movement beyond placing troops on trails and at crossings to prevent the Indians escaping.

Capt. Smith, with two hundred men of the 92nd Winnipeg Battalion, left camp for Cold Lake, seven miles north of the Beaver River, and from there he will strike east to Lac des Isles which is thirty-five miles from Cold Lake. Captain Constantine, of the Winnipeg regiment, left yesterday afternoon with two Chippewyan guides to scout along the wood trail south of the Beaver and eastward in the direction of Leon Lake, where he was fought by Major Steele and where he was last seen.

Poundmaker was greatly impressed by the number of soldiers he saw at the Fort and told Big Bear they were thicker than mosquitoes.

THE ENGLISH CABINET

LONDON, June 20.—The negotiations between the Liberals and the Conservatives are proceeding through the medium of the Queen. The Marquis of Salisbury urges that if the Redistribution of Seats Bill is finally passed the Conservatives will be deprived of the constitutional alternative of appealing to the country should the Liberals unfairly hamper the conduct of public business. Therefore the Marquis of Salisbury unexpectedly, after taking the best legal advice on the subject decided not to allow the Seats Bill to go into a law until further consideration has been had. It is impossible for the new bill to come into operation before November, hence Lord Salisbury insists upon having Liberal pledges to not obstruct wilfully the conservative leaders.

In the Lords last evening Salisbury asked Granville to consent to an adjournment till Tuesday. He said the conferences of Liberals and Conservatives had not yet reached a stage to enable either side to make a statement. The Marquis further objected to the Redistribution of Seats Bill because when passed in its present form it would prevent even in case of necessity an appeal to the country. The motion of the Marquis was adopted by 124 to 56.

The Commons also adjourned on motion of Mr Gladstone.

NEW ENEMIES FOR THE FARMER

PARSONS, Kan, June 17.—There is now making its appearance in this vicinity a scourge equal to the grass hopper. Large fields of corn, standing on an average eight inches high, looking fresh and green in the morning, before night become withered and dead. Examination discovers in each hill a myriad of worms, ranging from one inch and a quarter down to one eighth of an inch in length. Apparently they become completely distributed over a field, then commence simultaneously to work, and within a very short time the whole is devastated. Every piece of corn is more or less infested. The eggs from which the worms are hatched are supposed to be deposited by a small yellish white moth. The worm is by the farmers termed the wet worm.

Young Mr Haubi, a clerk in the House of Commons Post Office, Ottawa, and a native of New Brunswick, was drowned in the Ottawa, about 7 last evening, while bathing.

THE PRIMATE'S CROZIER.

The historic library of Lambeth Palace has witnessed recently a striking scene—namely, the presentation to the Primate of All England of a cross which, originally suggested by a few friends in the Tiara diocese on his translation to the see of Canterbury, has been subscribed for by some thousands of churchmen throughout the dioceses of the southern province. The cross, in silver gilt, is of rather unusual style, namely a modification of a Maltese cross, which had been in use among the English archbishops from the time of Chichele; downwards. It has two tiers of statues under elaborate canopies above the knob and beneath the short truncated spire which supports the base from which sprouts the cross itself. In the lower tiers of niches are placed the statues of the four evangelists, St Peter and St Paul, and immediately above rises a second coronet of tabernacle work containing the figures of St Augustine, the first Archbishop of Canterbury; St Vergilus, Archbishop of Arles, from whom St Augustine received consecration; St Theodore of Tarsus, seventh Archbishop of Canterbury; St Hugh, Bishop of Lincoln, and St Pirran (or Kyrran) and St Petros, missionaries to Cornwall. From this point the design changes into the short spire mentioned above which is ornamented with crocket, till it reaches the foliated cap which supports the cross. The cross itself is naturally the richest part of the design and glitters with pearls, diamonds, and sapphires. On one side sapphires and diamonds, and on the other clusters of diamonds and rubies, the whole being provided from a special fund collected by the Rev Dr Finch. Delicately engraved representations of the Agnus Dei, and the piteous in her piety, form the central subjects on either side of the cross. The entire design is hexagonal in plan, and the jewels reappear on two sides of the hexagon, below the tiers of statues, in order to recall the colouring of the cross. Here an emerald and some rubies and diamonds have been introduced on one side of the hexagon to contrast with the sapphires on the side opposite. The actual staff is treated spirally, and gradually diminishes in size towards the ferrule at the bottom, and is divided into compartments by bosses, enriched with minutely worked roses and ornamental engraving.

VICTOR HUGO'S BELIEF

In a speech on public instruction, in 1850, Victor Hugo said:—"God will be found at the end of all. Let us not forget Him, and let us teach Him to all. There would otherwise be no dignity in living, and it would be better to die entirely. What soothes suffering, what sanctifies labour, what makes man good, strong, wise, patient, benevolent, just, and at the same time humble and great, worthy of liberty is to have before him the perpetual vision of a better world throwing its rays through the darkness of this life. As regards myself, I believe profoundly in this better world, and I declare it in this place the supreme certainty of my soul. I wish, then, sincerely, or, to speak more strongly, I wish ardently for religious instruction."

The Hon. L. O. Taillon, of Quebec, has forwarded one hundred dollars to the Mayor of Montreal to be devoted to the Volunteers' Patriotic Fund.

SIR PETER LUMSDEN has arrived in London. Honors such as have been showered down upon General Komaroff by the grateful Czar—jewel bilted swords, pensions and official thanks—unfortunately, awaited not the returning head of the English Afghan boundary commission. Sir Peter Lumsden could hardly permit himself to be made the hero of a flattering reception that would be equivalent to a condemnation of his employers. He therefore arrived home like any other good citizen and faithful servant of the Empire, and will have to be satisfied with telling his story to those who sent him to Afghanistan to perform a certain work, and then summoned him away without permitting him to perform it. Official representations of the incidents to which we refer would vain give them a different color.

There is a certain form of honor, knows as the honor of the soldier, and it cannot often have been tried so sorely as it was during the retreat of Sir Peter Lumsden after the battle of Fenjeb. He found himself flouted by the very persons with whom he had been despatched hundreds of miles to negotiate, while at the same time the flouting was done in so masterly and so indirect a manner that he was denied the natural resource of outraged dignity, an appeal to the sword. General Komaroff thrashed the Afghans before his face, and he had to stand by and see them massacred. When they fled he had to fly also—fly without having fought, fly without having resisted. The *Standard* says: "It is a dismal story; and those who figure in this lamentable incident are not likely to forget its details."

Sir Peter Lumsden will be able to tell his comrades at home, with ample particulars, how it fares with the chief of an English military commission when confronted with a Russian army. Nothing is to be gained by dissembling in any degree the ignominy and vexation to which the commission was exposed. It is better, much better, that all should know exactly, and to the full, the amount of opprobrium to which the honor of England has been subjected in Central Asia. The Afghan who have felt the sharpness of the sword of General Komaroff; and witnessed the retreat of the English Commission, will not be deluded by the generous make believes that do duty for facts upon platforms at home, where the speakers have to make out as good a case for the Government as they possibly can.

The non talkers, have in the end, to do as the talkers tell them, and the native courage and decision of men like Sir Peter Lumsden are merged in the rapid apologies of the House of Commons. For instance, the late exploit of the Marquess of Hartington before Parliament rose for the White House recess was to state that what is now being done in Egypt and the Sudan is being done in council with Lord Wolseley. Yet it is an open secret that every thing done was done in spite of Lord Wolseley, and in the face of his protests. He, too, returns to England with pretty much the same sort of story to tell as Sir Peter Lumsden. Lord Dufferin, Lord Northbrook, Sir Gerald Graham, Lord Wolseley, Sir Peter Lumsden were one and all sent out to perform tasks which they were, after all, forbidden to perform. The nation has to pay for this series of costly and abortive missions. No wonder Gladstone has gone to the wall.

The Gladstone Cabinet Meet this Morning.

British Messenger Arrested by the Russians.

By cable to THE MERCURY: LONDON June 20—The Gladstone Cabinet met this morning and discussed the scope of the assurances of aid to carry on the government which it is proposed that the Liberals shall give to the Conservatives.

LONDON, June 20—A report is current this evening in some quarters that the Gladstone Cabinet has concluded to give all the aid that may be in their power to enable the Conservatives to take office.

There are other reports, however, that the Tories have refused to accept the responsibility of forming a ministry under the existing circumstances, and that Gladstone will resume the Premiership.

BRITISH MESSENGER ARRESTED.

LONDON, June 20—One of the party of British officers, who crossed the Russo-Persian frontier recently while travelling and was arrested by the Russians and carried to Askabad, was a clerk in the office of the British Consul at Reshad.

LOOKING AFTER MOROCCO

LONDON, June 20—Spain, it is claimed, has sounded England in regard to the steps proper to be taken in order to protect the interests of Spain and England against the intrigues of France in Morocco.

THE CHOLERA IN SPAIN

MADRID, June 20—In Valencia province the new cases were 249 and deaths 125; in Murcia city the new cases were 112 and deaths 37; in Murcia province the new cases were 240 and deaths 83; in Castellan province the new cases were 97 and deaths 67.

THE NEW CANADIAN LOAN.

LONDON, June 20—The prospectus of the new Canadian Government Loan was issued today. The amount of the loan is four million pounds sterling. The minimum price 99 per cent.

McCabe, of Willis, 49 miles north of Buckingham, has returned from Carlton Place where he disposed of \$2000 worth of pelts on the 8th instant. He says 200 miles north of Ottawa he was caught in a heavy snow storm.

L'Echo des Laurentides, published at Murray Bay, will issue an English edition to its ordinary French issue for the use of visitors and tourists to the seaside during the present watering season.

MOSQUITO NETS.

The ladies of St George's Church, Montreal, sent off to the Northwest a number of mosquito nets for the volunteers in the Northwest. These ladies have done excellent service to the volunteers, who cannot fail to appreciate their goodness.

SIGNAL SERVICE

Rimouski—Parisian arrived at 9 am; 65 cabin, 49 intermediate and 236 Steerage Passengers. Mails leave here 10 12 am.

FLEET SAILED.

A large number of the spring fleet of Quebec timber ships have left for sea within the past few days.

INJURY TO CABBAGES

A new cabbage maggot has appeared in the vicinity of London, Ont., cutting down plants by thousands. The larva is the product of a small bush fly, which much resembles a common house fly, but is more slender.

DEFECTIVE IRONCLADS

Her Majesty's monster ironclad Ajax is evidently as defective as its twin ship the Agamemnon in its steering power. In steaming round from Sheerness at about 13 knots it was found that two and a half turns of the helm were necessary to enable her to steer a straight course.

THE ANGLIO ITALIAN ALLIANCE

ROME, June 19—The opposition to Signor Mancini is due to his refusal to accept England's offer of alliance in 1882, and his recent action at Massowah, which was taken under pretence of co-operation with England.

Judge McCue, solicitor of the United States Treasury, has given an opinion that shadines or herrings caught in Canadian waters by American fishermen, in boats of less than five tons burden, can be admitted to the United States free of duty.

The milling interest in Cork, which has been so seriously affected by American competition that 12 mills are now lying idle, is making an effort to revive the industry in this district, and already with some success.

Lord William Nevill, fourth son of the Marquis of Abergavenny, and formerly A.D.C. to the Duke of Marlborough when Viceroy of Ireland, has been received into the Catholic Church.

A movement is on foot in Prince Edward Island to erect by public subscription a monument over the grave of the late Hon J.C. Pope, ex Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Baron Von Manteuffel remains will be taken from Vienna to Berlin, today, and thence to the family vault at Castle Topper.

The pumi, or American panther, at the Zoo, has given birth to a litter of four fine cubs.

CHINESE ENGLISH

A Siamese author has written a book in English about the United States. Moang Thukhada studied the language for two years at Philadelphia, where he married the daughter of a gentleman of the trade of keeper of saloons.

The Chinese loans have been subscribed five times in London.

The police authorities of New York have ordered the stoppage of all forms of pool selling in the city.


