PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT OF LOWER-CANADA. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, FEBRUARY—1817.

MONDAY, 3.—The special committee on Langlois's bridge bill reported, and the bill was referred to a Committee of the whole house for Friday.

The house resolved to form itself into a Committee on Wednesday to consider the expediency of granting a pension to Madm. Panet, widow, in consideration of the long and worthy services of the late Honorable J. A. Panet, her husband, as Speaker of the house, during twenty two years.

The special committee on P. Casgrain's bridge bill reported, and the bill was referred to a general committee for Friday.

A Bill was introduced to repeal part of the Army bill act. The second reading was ordered for Wednesday.

The engrossed bill for the relief of the poor by a loan of seed wheat, was read, passed and sent to the Council.

The general committees on the bills for maintaining good order on Sunday and Holidays; for the Friendly Society and for a house of Industry, having reported amendments and the house having concurred therein, the bills were ordered to be engrossed.

The bill for continuing the Act of 55th Geo. 3d, granting new duties to his Majesty to provide for the wants of the province was read a second time and referred to a general committee for Friday.

The bill for the relief of the insane, &c. was read a second time and referred to a general committee for Wednesday.

The house went into a committee to consider the means of establishing a watch in the cities of Quebec and Montreal and for lighting the said cities; the committee made some progress, and obtained leave to sit again on Wednesday.

The House went into committee on vaccine inoculation, and passed several resolves, of which the report was postponed to the next day.

A report from the Montreal Commissioners on internal communications, was laid before the House, and referred to the committee on internal communications.

TUESDAY, 4th.—The engrossed bills to continue the acts of the 55th Geo. III. granting new duties, and the bill for the maintenance of good order on Sundays and Holydays, were read, passed and ordered to the Legislative Council.

A bill was brought in to incorporate an Assurance Company in Quebec, and another to incorporate one in Montreal; their second reading on Monday.

A bill was also brought in to provide temporary Houses of Correction; second reading on Friday.

The committee of the whole on the Vaccine Institution reported that it was expedient to diffuse more than it now is, the practice of Vaccine inoculation, and to apply to that end a sum of 2250l.—The House having concurred, a committee was appointed to prepare a bill accordingly.

The other orders of the day were postponed, and the House adjourned.

The House of Assembly having appointed the 22d of this month for taking into consideration the Message of the late Administrator in Chief of the
