## Choice Of Eleven Interesting Courses At Cowansville Community School

COWANSVILLE — When the Missiquoi Community School began its sessions last night in Cowansville High School, its adult students had a choice of eleven interesting courses, details of which follow:

**Adventures in Hobbies:** Carl Gustafson has already arranged: Coins, Rev. T. F. Duncan; Clay Modelling, Mrs. Hilton Smith; Leatherwork, Claude Fulford; Eastern Townships Birds, Prof. Langford, Bishop's University, slides by Arthur Allen (National Geographic Magazine); Gem Polishing, J. E. Perry; Stamps, C. B. Gittens.

**Arm Chair Sports:** Russ Blinco, former Maroon hockey star and Bedford Arena manager, will lead "Hot Stove" sessions on football and hockey. There will be discussions of plays and stars, movies, and the probability of football and hockey guests.

**Badminton for Fun:** Milton Peters, Jackie Bousada and other Cowansville Badminton Club members will offer instruction for beginners and practice for those already familiar with the game. All equipment will be furnished, but participants should bring gym shoes.

**Barber-Shop Quartet:** John Peacock's course is for fun and for training to sing duets, trios and quartets in good harmony. No experience is necessary, but students must be able to hold a tune. They will learn all types of songs, in both English and French.

**Dancing:** Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Lavallee, professional dancers from Granby, will teach fox trot, waltz, rumba, samba and

jitterbug forms. The class is limited to 40 pupils, 15 years of age and older. There is a special fee for the nine lessons.

**Early Eastern Townships History:** How can you tell if you are descended from United Empire Loyalists? What happened that early morning, May 25, 1870, when the Fenians attacked at Eccles Hill? Why could Andrew Ten Eyck be called Father of Dunham Township? Miss Marion Phelps and Gerald Hawke have the answers.

**English for Beginners:** Mrs. A. Gibson, Mrs. K. Winsor and Mrs. W. Goettel will conduct this practical course to learn English.

**French for Beginners:** Mrs. Pauline Duval will lead this class in some practical lessons in French conversation.

**Geography:** Milton Kastello will bring this subject to life and show the influence geography has had on world history. This course is equally interesting to beginners and advanced students.

**Photography:** Kim Ayam will repeat his popular course, which will help students to improve picture taking technique and to learn darkroom processing, developing, printing and enlarging negatives. Facilities of the Albany Felt Laboratory will be used.

**Smocking:** A number of students have already registered in this excellent course. Enrollment is limited to 20. Those interested are requested to telephone Miss Lucienne Bessette before 5 p.m. at Cowansville 94 or 37. Miss Bessette is complet-

ely bilingual. She has obtained material for use in the class, and has many attractive new patterns available.

Courses continue for nine consecutive Wednesdays; classes are one and a half hours in duration; coffee is served at 9:30 p.m. Everyone is welcome.

Details of the proceeds will be given at the October meeting to be held at the home of Mrs. Roy Wells.

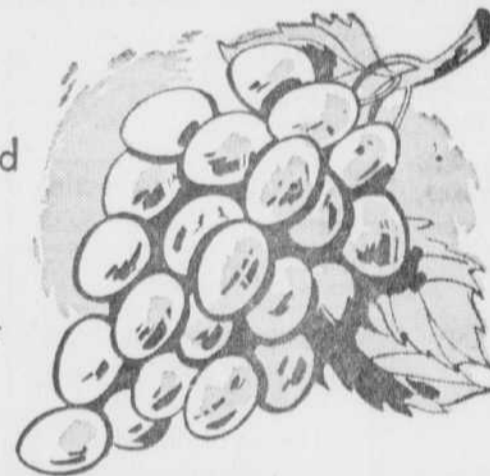

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US Bases Here A Threat-Reds

LONDON (Reuters)—The Soviet Army newspaper Red Star said today the installation of American rocket bases on Canadian territory would place Canada in a highly dangerous position. The Soviet news agency Tass reported.

By agreeing to the NORAD set-up, Red Star continued, the Canadian government "is about to take a step which will, as a result, increase her dependence on the Pentagon" — the U.S. military establishment.

Should they decide to merge, the question would be put to the unions' 1959 conventions.

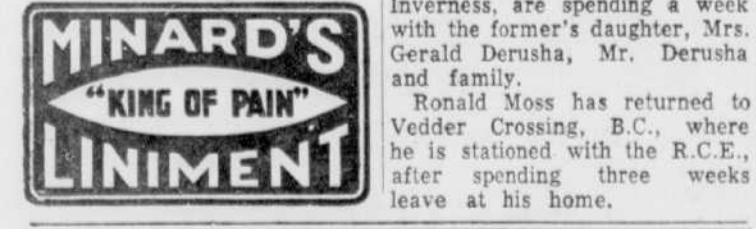

## Delicious Pumpkin Souffle Pie

An excellent new dessert good the year around is Pumpkin Souffle Pie. The creamy, light filling combines flavorful canned pumpkin and vanilla ice cream, made firm with gelatine. Toasted almond halves garnish the top and add a bit of crunchiness. Serve it at an afternoon or evening dessert party or as a special treat to the family.

### PUMPKIN SOUFFLE PIE

1 envelope unflavored gelatine, 2/3 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon ginger, 3/4 cup water, 1 pint vanilla ice cream, 1 cup canned pumpkin, Baked 9-inch pastry shell, Toasted halved almonds (optional). Combine gelatine, brown sugar, salt and spices in saucepan; add water. Heat to boiling, stirring. Remove from heat; stir ice cream into hot mixture by spoonfuls. Add pumpkin, mixing until smooth. Chill until filling mounds slightly. Pour into pastry shell; sprinkle with almonds, if desired. Chill until firm. One 9-inch pie.

## Classical Music Can Be Enjoyed By Children

WINNIPEG (CP) — A formula to persuade children to listen to classical music has been outlined by Victor Feldbrill, who came here from Toronto to take over this year as permanent conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra.

He said in an interview that children are naturally discriminating because their minds are not cluttered. "But the conductor must be enthusiastic and convincing and programs must be carefully selected to appeal to them emotionally," he said.

### SHORT STRETCHES

Programs must be divided into four or five minute intervals to hold their attention. "And you must be aware that there is an explosive interval after 20 or 25 minutes when they need a break. Take advantage of it to let them stand up, stretch to the music, talk to them; get them to look at a certain instrument — the trumpet perhaps — it catches their attention.

"Then they go home and listen to records and soon they can pick out the oboe or some other instrument."

Mr. Feldbrill said it is not fair to impose adult standards on children. "If you force them to sit absolutely still they get bored and it becomes a pill they have to swallow.

"It's important to expose children to music—even if they don't understand it all," he said.

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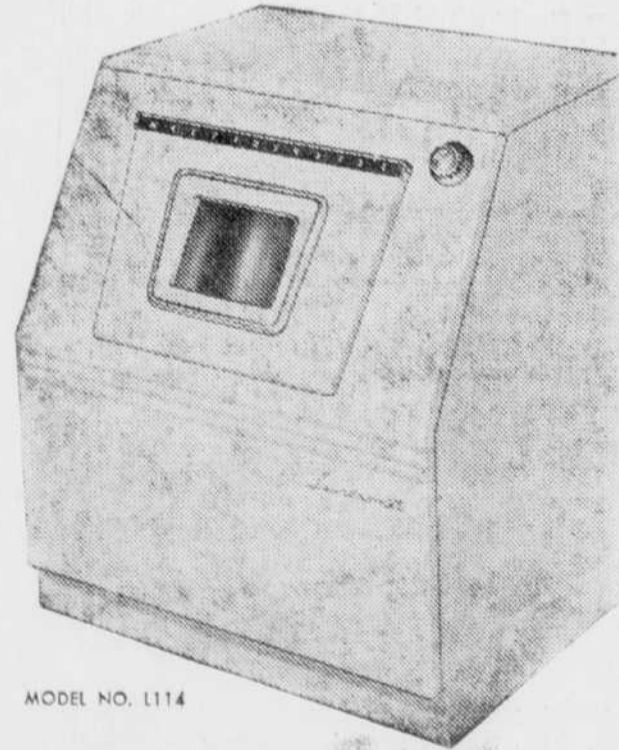

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## 4,000 Trout Are Purchased For Yamaska Region

**WATERLOO** — The Yamaska Conservation Association resumed activities at an interesting meeting, attended by nearly 500 people.

W. K. Spurling, treasurer, stated he was well satisfied with the results of the annual Fish Derby, which brought in \$1,250.

The Association is now in 5th place in the Molson contest, with 59 entries. If each of the 1,000 members of the Association made one more attempt, the group could again bring home the honors.

In all, 156 new members joined the Association during 1958 and much credit is due Lionel Duchesne, who looks after the recruiting division.

Fishing has been good at Gale Pond and it is estimated that about 200 speckled trout have been caught there. The Association has bought 4,000 trout for this pond, which will be put in early next month.

Louis-Roch Seguin, biologist at the Fish Hatchery at Baldwin's Mills, explained the necessity of artificial ponds for raising trout and gave several pointers which must be considered to insure the success of such a project.

Mr. Seguin added that the board of directors of the Association had done everything possible to find a suitable place for this kind of a pond. It is hoped that as early as next year the ponds will be completed and stocked with fish.

The accomplishment of such a project normally takes three years or more. Mr. Seguin was surprised at the enthusiasm with which the members had worked at this project and he promised that the hatchery at Baldwin's Mills would raise 10,000 brown trout at its expense and give them to the Association next fall. Later these trout will be placed in Brome Lake to make fishing there more interesting.

Thanks to the work accomplished by the Yamaska Conservation Association, hunting and fishing conditions have been considerably improved in this region. But it is only with the cooperation of the public that this success will remain permanent.
