Dept. of Tourism

Provincial Secretary Lionel Bertrand announced yesterday at Quebec that the government plans to create a new department to oversee the tourist industry in Quebec.

The minister stated that the tourist industry, which brings in an estimated two hundred million dollars annually from outside the province, is the third largest source of outside earnings in Quebec.

It is anticipated that the new department will be created before the next session of the House.

Making the announcement in the Legislature during the study of his Department's estimates, Mr. Bertrand also announced that agreement had been reached with the federal government under which Quebec will set up camp grounds and picnic sites along the trans-Canada highway. The aim will be to provide camp grounds at 100 mile intervals and picnic sites every 50 miles along the highway.

Support too, he said, is being sought for Boards of Trade and the St. Jean Baptist Societies.

Court Report

Ferdinand Vaillancourt alias Benoit, 51 years old, Quyon, P.Q. Pleaded guilty before District Judge Avila Labelle, on a charge of breaking and entering the tool shed of Mr. George Meunier of South Onslow, P.Q., where he stole clothing, and tools for an approximate amount of \$100.00.

Seeing the lengthy record of the accused the Judge told him that he had no other alternative but to send him to the penitentiary for a period of two (2) years.

Garry Miller, 125 Drummond St., Ottawa Ont., pleaded guilty on a charge of having stolen two (2) tires from Mr. Clarence Pasch of Ladysmith, P.Q. He was sentenced to 15 days in jail.

On a second charge of having driven a motor vehicle while not carrying with him the registration certificate for the said motor vehicle, was fined \$10.00 ordered to pay the court costs, and in default of payment, 8 additional days in jail.

Rene Belanger, Campbell's Bay, P.Q., pleaded guilty of assault on his mother-in-law Mrs. Xavier Lepine of Campbell's Bay, P.Q., and of having caused a disturbance at the same place, was sentenced to 15 days in jail.

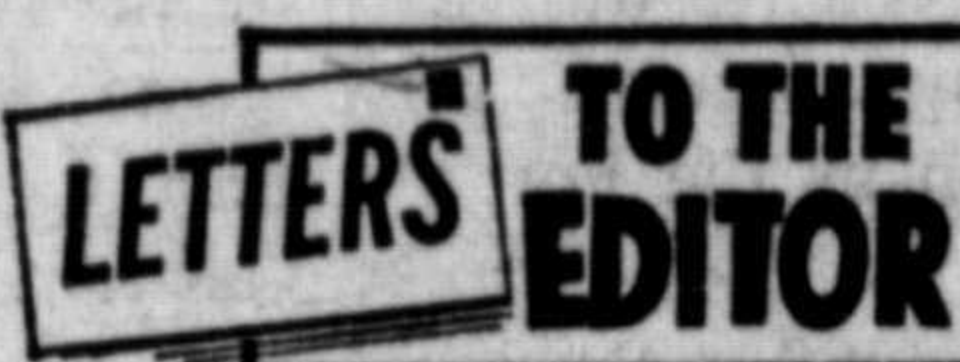

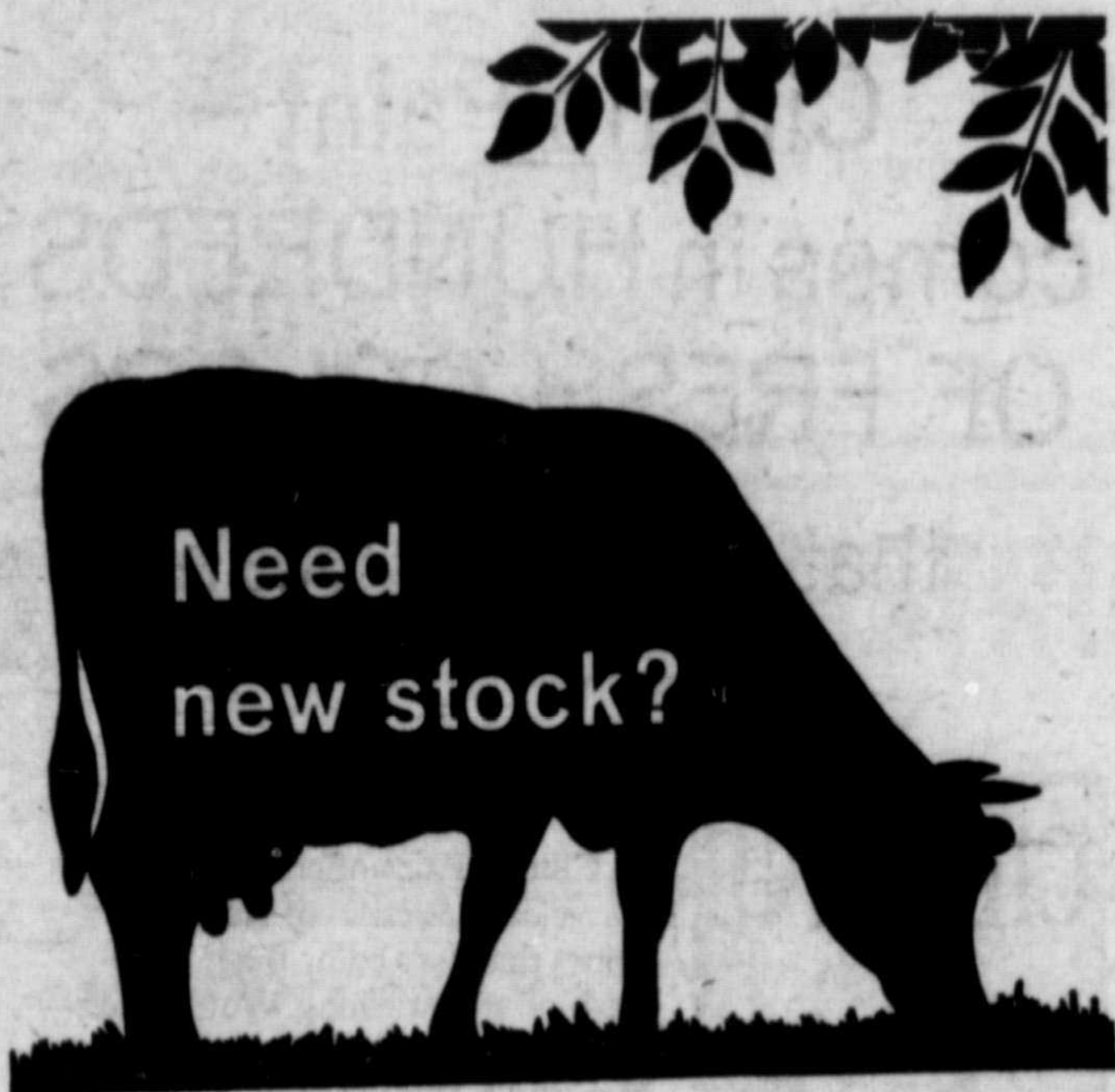

The Early History of Pontiac Families

from the files of Rev. Jos. E. Gravelle

PRENDERGASTS family of seven, four boys and three girls. Lt. Col. James, born in Ireland in the 1790's, was accompanied by his younger brother Thomas, born in 1806 and another brother Georges, of whom all trace has been lost. An-

other brother Robert, born in 1791, a widower, came out a few years later, in 1837, there being four in his family when the 1841 census was taken.

On January 17, 1833, the date that the Township of Clarendon was erected, a special grant of four lots, numbers 8 and 9 in Range 1 and 2 Clarendon was made to the Lt. Colonel, consisting of 548 acres. On the following day John Maitland was granted 500 acres in the same and adjoining Range. The Maitlands had come out to Canada in 1820, twelve years before the Prendergasts and consisted of three families at the time of the 1841 census, PETER born in 1804 in Scotland, John Sr., born also in Scotland, became Post-Master, and his son John Jr. born in Ireland. In 1841 they had families of six, three and eight, respectively. It is thought that John Sr., the Post-Master was the father of Peter and John Jr. as also of Jane Maitland, born in Scotland in 1798, who married

Lt. Col. Prendergast. This marriage likely took place before his arrival in Canada in 1832. Since their eldest daughter Mary was born in 1830. It was she who married Robert Alex Glenn on July 9, 1874. A second child James was born the year of their arrival in Canada and Mary Jane, their last child Mrs. John A. Armstrong, a few months after her father's death.

In July 1834, James went on a trip to Quebec City, where he took sick and died on July 6th. The sad news was brought back to the family. Their last child was born two months and a half later. The Maitlands and Prendergasts must have come to the help of the young widow and her three young children for later on we see her running the mill and acquiring 766 additional acres of timber land in her own name, a balance of grant still due to her late husband. This was in 1836. In October 1844 she purchased 916 more acres, the year the Gilmour Interested came to Clarendon.

The only son of the Colonel, James, who took charge of the Mill for his mother with James Hill, and with James Kelly, one year younger than himself. The three Jameses, died in 1853 at the age of 21. He was unmarried, and so there were no Prendergast descendants of this family, only Glens and Armstrongs.

The Colonel's older brother, ROBERT, who was mentioned as a widower, took up lot 16, Range 5 in Clarendon in 1857, but must have died or moved away before 1861, as no mention is made of him in that Census, nor is anything known of his three children.

However Thomas, born in 1801, the other brother, married a girl named Deborah and had fourteen children. His brother Robert lived with him.

Prendergast Grand-Children

LT. COL. JAMES b. 179 , d. July 6, 1834 and JANE MAITLAND b. 1798 in Scotland had three children: MARY 1830 Scot. (Robert Alex Glenn) d. 1908, JAMES 1832-1853, single and MARY JANE 1834 Canada (John A. Armstrong).

THOMAS PRENDERGAST 1806 Ireland and Debora 1811 Ireland had 13 or 14 children, all born in Canada: JOHN 1834 (Mathilda Caldwell), MARIA 1835 (Eades), MARY ANN 1837 (Ralph Laughran), WILLIAM 1839 (Mary Lett), JAMES M. 1840 (Susan Grant), ROBERT 1841, THOMAS 1843 (Sarah Eades), GEORGE 1845 married, MARGARET 1847 (William McKibbin), FRANCIS 1849 (Richardson), ELIZABETH 1850 (John Bradley) Eardley, DEBORAH 1855 (Justus Merrifield) Beechgrove, HARRY 1857 (Merrifield) and finally, perhaps a son SAM.

ROBERT PRENDERGAST, according to the census had three children, names unknown. He was born 1791 in Ireland.

Great Grand-Children:

JOHN A. ARMSTRONG and Mary Jane Prendergast had eight children: JAMES PRENDERGAST ARMSTRONG 1858 (Margaret Eliza), SOPHIA JANE 1860, MARIA THERESA 1863, MARY PRENDERGAST ARMSTRONG 1865 (Robert Alex Glenn in 1920) d. 1938, FRANCES CORY 1868, WILLIAM JOHN ALEX 1870, MARY ELIZA 1873-1882 and ANTHONY ALFRED 1876.

Anthony Armstrong of Clarendon was in possession of the old family Bible. It contains important family records. His grandfather Francis Armstrong, who married Jane Caldwell, came from County of Fermanagh, Ireland, West of Armagh in the Valley of Bellamallard, bordering on the County of Tyrone. We have already given the family of John Armstrong and Ann McDowell who came from Ballinamore, also of Fermanagh Co. but farther South. Anthony's father, John A. lived first on the west half of Lot 1, Range 2, Clarendon. In 1884 he bought a log house from Andrew Telfer on lot 4 and in 1883 he built a stone house, where he lived until his death in 1923.

JOHN PRENDERGAST 1834 and MATHILDA CALDWELL, married in 1863, had eleven children: GEORGE (Mary Ellen Olmstead), ROBERT 1867, married and living at Olds, Alberta, SAMUEL (Cecilia ...) Fort William, FOREST 1(, the daughter of Ralph Horner, 2. Margaret Hodgins, dau. of William) d. Ottawa 1957, MARY 1869 (1. Charles Lett, 2. John Moore of Allumette Island), DEBORAH 1872 (William Anderson) of Essex Junction, Vermont, JOHN (Emma ...) on the homestead, THOMAS of Olds, Alta., ELIZABETH and MATHILDA (Jas. Lang) of Litchfield.

RALPH LAUGHREN and MARY ANN PRENDERGAST had nine children: WILLIAM JAMES (- Lachapelle), Deborah, died young, GEORGE THOMAS married twice and living at Duluth, MARY JANE also married and living at Duluth, HUGH (Margaret Connelly SAMUEL, died young, MINA, married and BEATRICE (Fred Lachapelle).

JAMES M. 1840 and SUSAN GRANT of Eardley had three children: GEORGE, single, CHESTER of Los Angeles and LEA (Walter Findlay).

THOMAS PRENDERGAST and SARAH EADES had seven

children and lived at Radford: GEORGE (Elizabeth Anderson) Cobden, ANNIE LAURA (1. Herbert J. Armstrong, 2. W. J. Connelly) Cobden, MILDRED (Chestre Kloack) U.S.A., IDENA (William Durke) USA and three young children who died of diphtheria, Minnie at 11 months, May at 5 years and John at 5 months. Their father died in 1907 at the age of 62. Sarah was a sister of Mrs. Robert Kemp.

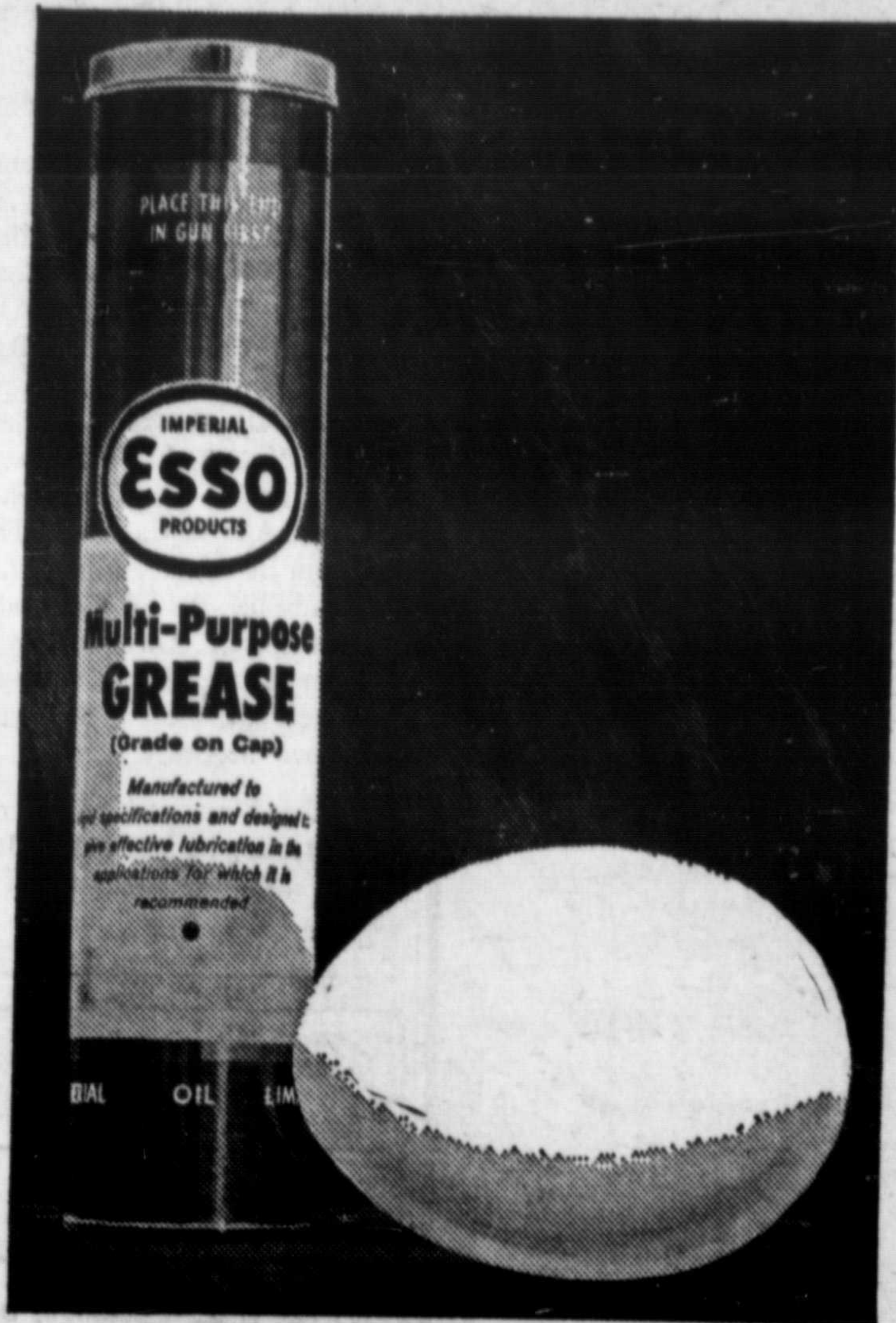

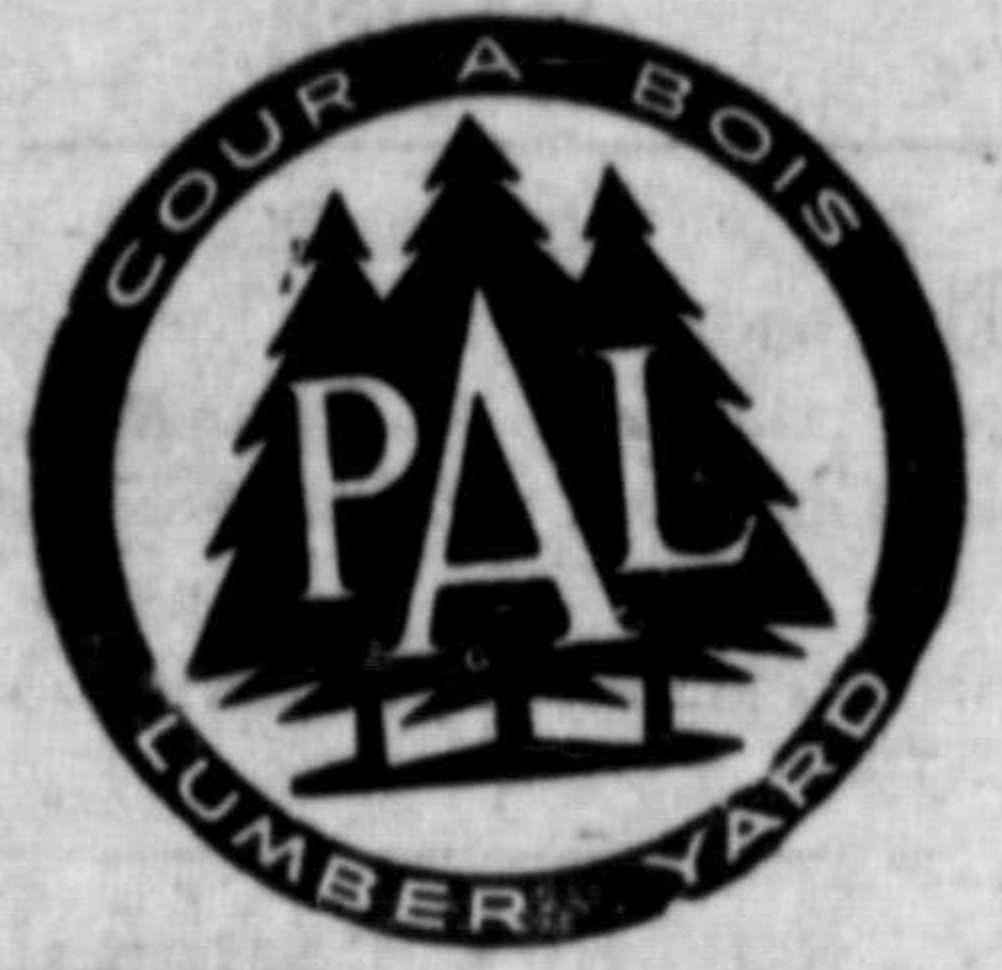
