Lower Canada Agricultural and Industrial EXHIBITION.
 To the Public of Lower Canada.
 THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE for LOWER CANADA having resolved that the next GRAND PROVINCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION shall be held at QUEBEC, on the 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th of SEPTEMBER, 1854; the Local Committee appointed to carry out the intentions of the Board are desirous of making such decision generally known to the Inhabitants, and more especially to the Agriculturists, Manufacturers and Mechanics of the Province.
 The importance of such Exhibitions, as tending to develop the Agricultural and other Industrial resources of the country, and to call forth and keep in active exercise the intellectual energies and practical skill and ingenuity of the Artisan and the Agriculturist, have now become so self-evident, and are so universally acknowledged, that the Committee cannot but rely with hopeful confidence upon the zealous and liberal co-operation of all classes of the Community, in assisting them to realize to their fullest extent, such beneficial results and advantages upon the present occasion.
 The Committee are extremely desirous that the forthcoming Exhibition should afford a fair representation of the industry, skill and enterprise of all classes; but in order to attain that object, it is manifestly necessary that their pecuniary resources should be such as to enable them to offer premiums, the number, variety and amount of which shall prove a sufficient inducement to extensive and general competition; in addition, therefore, to the liberal aid which will, it is hoped, be received from the Provincial Government, through the Board of Agriculture, the Committee would respectfully invoke the generous support of all classes; and in making this appeal the Committee confidently trust that all persons throughout the Province will so interest themselves in the matter, as to render this Exhibition worthy of the important objects for which it has been undertaken, and, at the same time, worthy of Canada.
 The Committee have much satisfaction in being able to state by attestation that the Quebec and Richmond section of the GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY will be in operation during the month of AUGUST, an accommodation which will no doubt very materially increase the number of Visitors to the Exhibition from all parts south of the River St. Lawrence, but more especially from the Eastern Townships; many of whose inhabitants have hitherto, from the want of proper means of communication, been prevented from visiting the ancient Capital of Canada.

We allude to the refusal on the part of the Roman Catholic bishop of this island, to allow his clergy to administer the sacrament of the Holy Communion to one of our most respectable merchants, a member of the Council of Government, the Hon. H. Lemiere, on account of his being a Freemason. As may naturally be supposed, this intolerant measure gave rise immediately to considerable discontent and uneasiness in the public mind, which has resulted in a lengthened discussion in the public papers, sustained principally by writers in this journal and by Mr. E. Piaton in the *Cermeen*. The Roman Catholic bishop replied in a letter which first appeared in the *Cermeen*, justifying his conduct in virtue of the authority of a long line of Sovereign Pontiffs who have placed Freemasonry in the list of secret societies, the members of which are pilloried excommunicated by the Church of Rome. This letter raised the inquiry whether the bulls of the Pope are execratory in this island, unless they shall have first been recognized by the Church of Paris, from which the Catholics of this island claim their descent. The inquiry has been very ably and fully gone into by two of our correspondents, Mr. E. Daruit, and "A Gallician," who have in the clearest manner possible established the fact, that the religious laws and customs of the inhabitants of this island, preserved to them by the articles of its capitulation to the British Crown, are those of the Gallician Church; that they have never been deprived of the rights they then possessed, and which they still possess; and that, consequently they are not bound by any bull of the Pope that has not been recognized and sanctioned by a Council of the Church. The bishop has not attempted to reply to the position thus assumed by the Freemasons, and maintains his unqualified determination to exclude the members of that body from any of the sacraments of the Church, and even from Christian burial. Under these circumstances, as was to be expected, the Freemasons of the island, who are very numerous and compose the *dite* of the population, have taken up the matter with becoming dignity and spirit. The *Loge of La Triple Esperance* has led the way, and after several preliminary deliberations, a memorial was framed to the acting governor, in which the masonic fraternity claim his Honor's protection and interference, the maintenance of the ancient religious rights and privileges, and their exemption from this or any other bull of the Pope that has not received the sanction of their Church. A deputation waited on his Honour at Government house on the 3rd inst., to present this memorial. His Honour received them with his accustomed courtesy, expressed his great regret at what had arisen, and assured the deputation that if his personal efforts with the bishop should fail in producing the withdrawal of the obnoxious and intolerant measure alluded to, he would without delay refer the question to the law officers of the Crown. There the matter rests for the present. It is of the highest importance that an early solution should be given to the difficulty that has thus arisen, for it would be difficult to foresee the consequences that might ensue upon an obstinate persistence in such monstrous and intolerant conduct as that so suddenly and unexpectedly adopted by the Right Rev. Dr. Collier. We trust that whatever solution may be given to the question, the British authorities will have detected sufficient cause in the conduct of his lordship to render his immediate recall a matter of indispensable necessity.

From United States Papers.

INCREASE OF TRAVEL.—The outward express train upon the Boston and Worcester Railroad this morning, consisted of seven *hundred* cars, well filled, probably upwards of four hundred persons. This heavy train was drawn by the new and powerful locomotive Worcester with perfect ease. Among the passengers were 15 dead mules and one Hartford, to be buried through the ceremony consequent upon the erection of the monument of their benefactor, Gallaudet. There was also on hand a company of thieves, pickpockets, and gamblers, bound to the Camp at Amherst.—[Traveler].

ILLINOIS.—Two hundred thousand dollars in gold has recently been transferred from the vaults of the State Treasury of Illinois, to New York, for the payment of the interest of the State debt.
 A LARGE GANG of BERBERANS have been lately detected and brought to justice, in Chester, State of Massachusetts, by the ingenuity of an Albany police officer. For some time previously, the gang had been spreading terror through the neighbourhood, by their daring and wanton outrages, and no clue could be found to their detection. At length an Albany detective policeman, disguised as a hunter, visited the place, and soon having worked himself into the confidence and favor of the gang, he became possessed of all their secrets. When he considered his business completed, he gave the necessary information, whereupon they were all arrested, and are now in jail awaiting trial.

From Provincial Papers.

A REALM HUMAN MAN.—Dr. Wolfred Nelson, the Mayor of Montreal, while coming up to Kingston recently to attend to his duties as Inspector of the Penitentiary, was witness to some acts of great kindness and personal interposition on the part of Mr. Magrath, the Lieut. Tender of the Royal Mail Steamer *Ontario*, Capt. Putnam. Dr. Wolfred Nelson tells us, that on board the vessel were a large party of emigrants, many of whom were down with incipient Cholera; that Mr. Magrath paid the most unremitting personal attention to them; that he was ever amid them with stimulants and other Choleric remedies, and was the means, the Doctor avers, of stopping the disease in no less a number than *seventeen* cases! Capt. Putnam further tells us, that this conduct is no special case, but that on many other occasions, it had been equally praiseworthy. In fact he is a most invaluable man. Such humanity is worthy of notice and commendation.—*Kingston Weekly*.

A TURKISH AMBASSADOR.—In the year 1838, I left Constantinople on my way to Vienna. I went to Varso, and from thence proceeded up the Danube in a miserable steamer, on board of which was a passenger of high distinction, belonging to a neighboring nation, whose manners and habits afforded me great amusement. He was courteous and gentleman-like in a remarkable degree, but his domestic ways differed from those of our own countrymen. He had numerous suit of servants, three or four of whom seemed to be of a sort of gentlemen; these attended him every night when he went to bed, in the standing bed-place of the crazy steamer. First they would up six or seven gold

CHARITY from Quebec arrived at Liverpool at midnight. Latest Lloyd's authentic news that Marshall S. Anand will leave Constantinople on September 24, to take command of an expedition which would by this time have reached its destination.

VIENNA, Friday.—Gortschakoff made confidential communication to Buelow and requested a similar explanation with the notice that he should command him to make to the Emperor in person.

BERLIN, Friday, p. m.—General Benckendorff returned yesterday from St. Petersburg and will proceed direct to Putbus.

Russia will not accept the Austrian invitation to commence negotiations upon the basis stipulated by the western powers.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 2.—Market to-day unchanged from yesterday's prices. Breadstuffs quite unchanged.

THE WAR. BALTIC.—France and England have decided to dismantle and abandon all the fortifications at Bomarsund and in the Aland Islands.

On the 26th Napier and Marshal d'Hilliers proceeded to Ilango. In their sight blew up fortifications and retreated to Abo. There were 15,000 men in garrison. 120 mounted and 80 dismounted guns taken at Bomarsund, which will be divided between England and France.

Black Sea.—Reported continuation of preparations for Crimea expedition, but up to August 21st nothing known of any embarkation.

ADMIRALTY SECRET.—Opinion gains currency that the first destination of the expedition will be Arpa; and that fleets will winter there.

General Cornario has gone to Bucharest to consult Omar Pacha on the recent fire at Varna; half a million lbs. bread, equal to two weeks consumption of the English Army, was burned; supposed to be willfully done, consequently a cordon for precaution is drawn around powder magazines.

FRANCE.—Another extremely large proportion of iron secured. Parliamentary recess. No political news.

T. Archibald appointed member of Council for Nova Scotia, and Neville Parker, Puisne Judge for New Brunswick.

FRANCE.—Nothing new. SENATE.—Government publishes accounts of defalcations of previous ministry of \$30,000,000, with extra resources pledged. A decree appears concerning property of Queen Christina.

COMMERCIAL.—Breadstuffs.—Harvest progressing and very abundant, causing great depression in market. Principal circulars agree in reporting a 3d. decline in wheat, and decline in flour, 3d. Indian corn, slightly lower but good demand.
