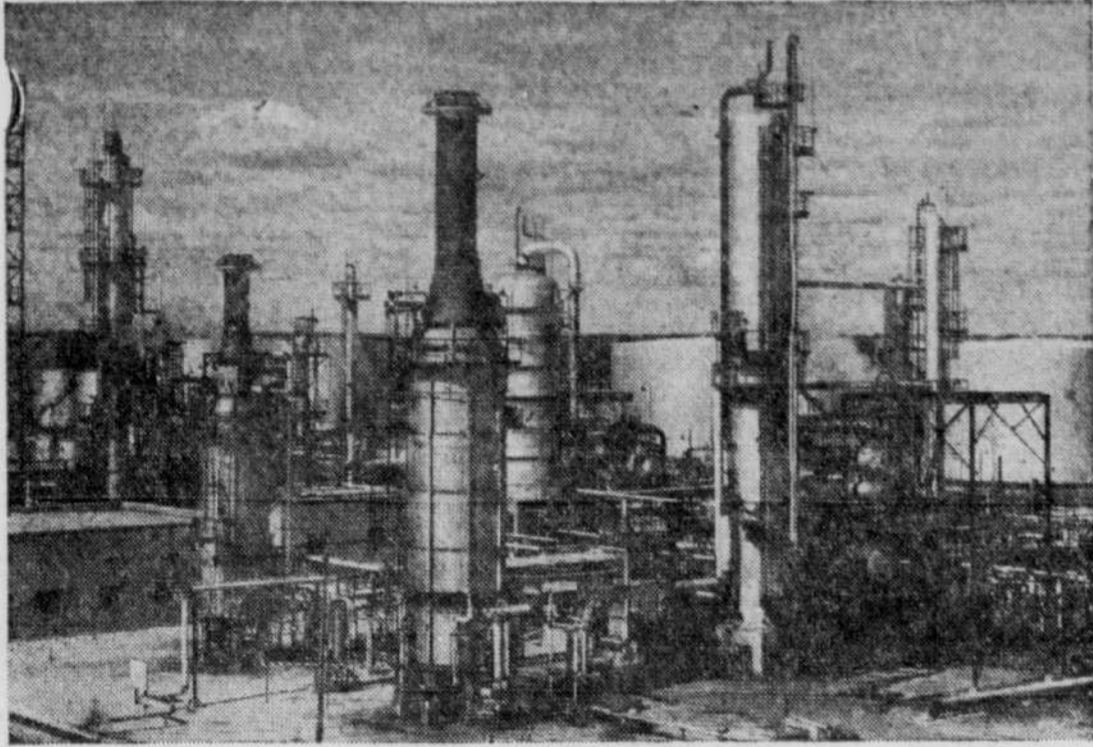


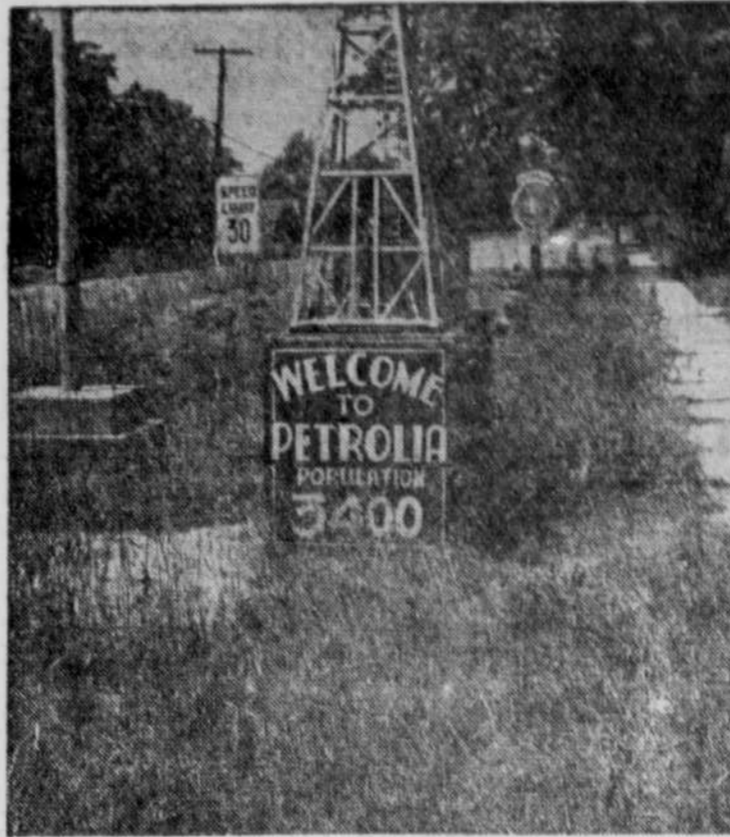

Canada's First Field

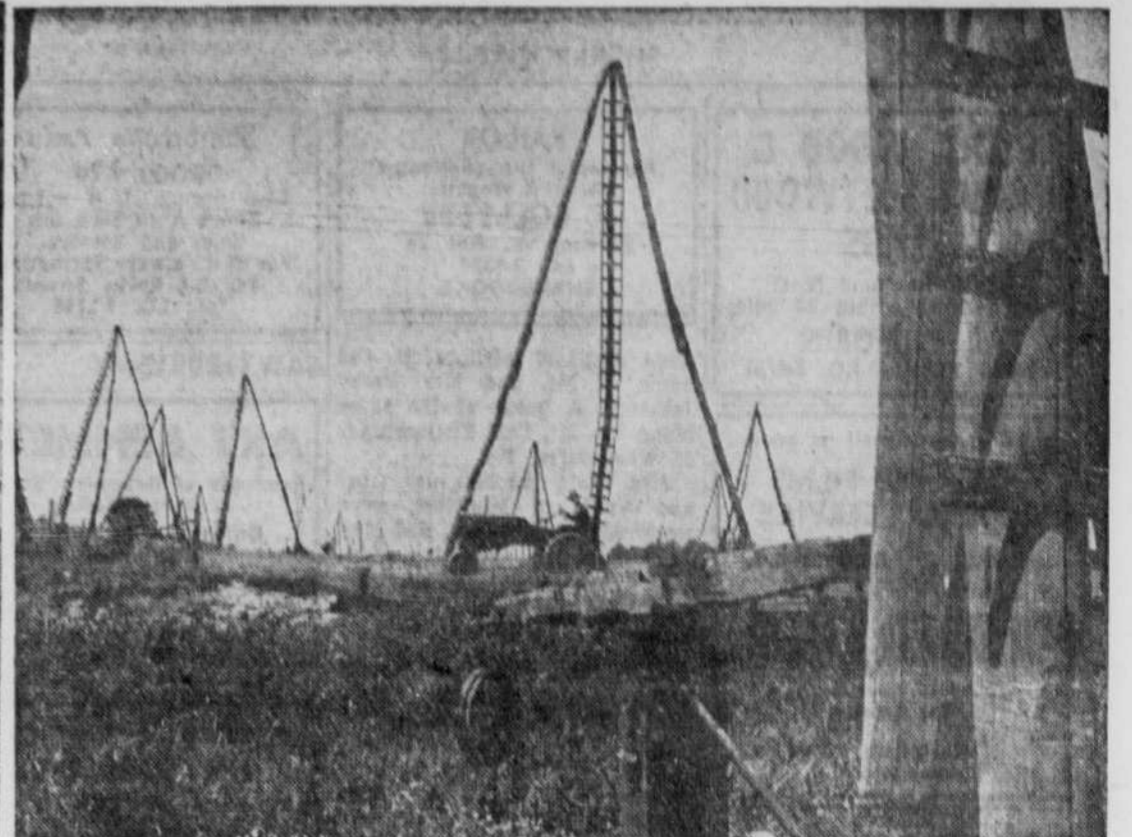
Still Producing Oil



Canada continued as one of the world's great oil producers in 1956 with an output of 171 million barrels. A small but noteworthy part of that total—some 36,000 barrels trickled from the area where 100 years ago the first oil well in North America was brought into production.



In the 1890's when nearby oil fields were in their heyday, Petrolia, Ont. was a boomtown, boasting 6 large refineries, 11 hotels. Today local residents are content to claim Petrolia was the cradle of Canada's oil industry.



Farmlands around Petrolia present a strange skyline to the casual visitor. Wooden derricks and jerker rod pumps weathered with age turn out about 1/4 barrel of oil daily from each of the 360 wells still producing at the site of Canada's first oilfield. Meanwhile men continue to farm the land for the earth holds riches in many forms.



A small but steady income is garnered by local farmers who still work the wells on their land. Farmer above uses old-fashioned hand-pump to fill primitive wooden oil vat. Later, horse-drawn wagon will haul oil to pipe-line (said to be the first in Canada) feeding refinery at Sarnia.



Today the busy refinery at Sarnia requires a mere 12 hours to process the annual output of the historic wells. Above, technician draws off sample from underground storage tank to test for specific gravity.

Submit Rival Disarmament Proposals To U.N.

Practical Agreements Out For Present Say American Officials

WASHINGTON — (AP) — U. S. officials see no present possibility of practical agreements between Russia and the West on major world issues such as international control of space satellites.

They feel that Soviet Communist boss Nikita Khrushchev is not seriously interested in reaching any such agreement at this time.

This estimate of Khrushchev manoeuvres in foreign affairs is based primarily on an assessment of State Secretary Dulles' talk here last Saturday with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

In the U.S. view Khrushchev is seeking simultaneously to impress the world with Russia's scientific progress and military power, and to promote the familiar propaganda line that the Soviet Union is actively seeking peaceful settlements with its power rival, the United States.

In his talks with Dulles, Gromyko gave no intimation of any Kremlin willingness to change its position on the middle East, disarmament or the European situation.

Since the Moscow announcement of the satellite launching last Friday, Khrushchev has made a number of public statements. He has alternately taken a tough line emphasizing the strength of Soviet arms and a peaceful line stressing his contention that Russia is trying to gain U.S. acceptance of peaceful co-existence.

He has called for direct understandings between Washington and Moscow, which, he said, could lead to international control of objects propelled into outer space. He leaves the implication that other problems of disarmament and world politics would similarly be amenable to solution.

President Eisenhower made clear at a press conference Wednesday that the United States has no intention of joining with Russia in an "attempt to dictate to the world."

Dulles, departing for a long weekend at Duck Island, his Lake Ontario retreat, told reporters at the airport that there would be no bilateral talks with Russia—talks from which America's allies would be excluded.

United States Will Stress Outer Space Control Of Missiles

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — (CP) — The United States and Russia were scheduled to open the annual United Nations arms debate today with appeals for endorsement of rival disarmament proposals expanded to stress control of outer space missiles.

U.S. ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge was to launch the debate in the UN assembly's chief political committee with introduction of a resolution embodying the West's proposals made at the recent London negotiations of the five-nation disarmament subcommittee.

International control of long-range missiles and space satellites was mentioned in the Western plan outlined in London. But introduction of the resolution—which is sponsored by some 21 Western countries—was held up after the launching of the Soviet earth satellite to put more emphasis on this point.

Soviet Communist party chief Nikita Khrushchev said in an interview in Moscow this week that Russia also would amend its disarmament proposals to provide for international inspection of rocket-launching sites as well as airports. Khrushchev said rockets and missiles now are the important weapons of war, that planes are on the way out.

The Russian proposal was certain to reiterate a demand for immediate suspension of nuclear arms tests, an idea also being pushed by India and Japan.

The United States and its Western allies say suspension should come only after agreement is reached to stop using atomic material for weapons reduce armed forces and evolve an embracing inspection system.

Also in the UN: India charged in the security council that Pakistan is directing a "subversive campaign in an effort to force a showdown on the disputed state of Kashmir."

The trusteeship committee failed to reach a compromise on a proposal for a UN good offices committee to seek agreement with South Africa on its southwest territory. South Africa held the territory as a League of Nations mandate between the world wars. It has refused to turn it into a UN trust territory despite repeated general assembly resolutions appealing for the shift.

Khrushchev declined to discuss two topics Reston proposed for the interview. One was on internal political developments in the Soviet Union since the death of Stalin and recent Kremlin shakeups. The other was one problem program for the new Soviet programs for agriculture and the decentralization of industrial management.

Khrushchev observed that Arabs in general are far from Communist ideas. He said they are not Communists but nationalists and President Nasser has even jailed Egyptian Communists.

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Khrushchev Ready To Use Force

NEW YORK (AP)—Nikita S. Khrushchev has made it clear the Soviet Union is prepared to use military force if necessary to defend its interests in the Middle East, the New York Times says today.

During an interview with James Reston of the Times, Khrushchev accused State Secretary Dulles of inciting Turkey to start a war in the Middle East by attacking Syria. The Communist party boss challenged the U.S. Senate to investigate his charges.

The interview took place Monday at Communist party headquarters in Moscow. The final portion was released by the Soviet government for publication today.

Reston reports that, in what seemed to be a clear threat of Soviet intervention in any Middle East war, Khrushchev said: "If war breaks out, we are near Turkey and you are not. When the guns begin to fire, the rockets (missiles) can begin flying and then it will be too late to think about it. . . . Turkey would not last one day in case of war."

The Turks have rejected the charge of aggressive intent and said their troop movements are a defensive measure made necessary by Soviet arms shipments to Syria.

Khrushchev told Reston there were documents to prove his charges which eventually will be published.

SEKS INVESTIGATION
"It would be useful if the American Senate would acquaint itself with those instructions which Henderson received from Dulles. . . ."

Reston reminded the Russian the United States had gone against its major allies in the Suez crisis to bring peace to the Middle East and now is confronted with new Communist arms and provocations in Syria. Khrushchev replied with condemnation of the Eisenhower doctrine. He said: "From the Soviet side there were no provocations in Syria. There is not a single Soviet soldier in Syria. There is but an economic delegation with a group of technical experts."

Khrushchev conceded that Soviet arms had been supplied to Syria but added that the U.S. also has supplied arms in the Middle East.

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Pleven Abandons Attempt

PARIS — (AP) — President Rene Coty today resumed his search for a new French premier after Rene Pleven abandoned his attempt to end the 10-day cabinet crisis by forming a government.

Sources close to the president said Coty had no likely candidate in mind to head France's 24th post-war government.

The political crisis provoked by the parliamentary defeat of Premier Maurice Bourges-Maunoury deepened with failure of Coty's second choice to win enough support in the National Assembly.

Pleven, a member of the small Democratic and Socialist Union of Resistance, gave up Tuesday night after 36 hours. He said he quit because the Radical Socialists of Bourges-Maunoury, who is serving as caretaker premier, refused to back his program.

WANTED UNION
Pleven had demanded that all parties except the Communists and the extreme-right Poujadists join his cabinet and unite in a one-year political truce.

Coty consulted until midnight with the speakers of both houses of parliament, then scheduled meetings today with leaders of all parties.

Two Teacher Bodies Ruled Out By Court

QUEBEC (CP) — A Superior Court ruling Wednesday upheld a writ of prohibition against the Quebec labor relations board and declared invalid its recognition of two associations as joint bargaining agent for Montreal's Roman Catholic teachers.

The ruling by Judge Oscar Boulanger orders the labor board to pay costs of the suit, brought by L'Alliance Professeurs Catholique de Montreal who obtained the writ three years ago. The board has 30 days to file an appeal.

The decision nullifies the board's recognition of L'Association des Educateurs Catholiques de Montreal and the Federation of English-Speaking Catholic Teachers as joint bargaining agent for Catholic teachers in the city.

Mr. Justice Boulanger said the board exceeded its power, denied L'Alliance a rightful hearing and was seemingly swayed by the group's opposition to a provincial law banning strikes by public service workers.

Futile Effort
HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Councilman Louie Welch moved Wednesday that the city prepare an ordinance making it illegal for Russia satellites to fly over Houston, but his effort died for lack of a second.

Continue Hunt For Killers

BLIND RIVER, Ont. (CP)—A posse of police and armed residents today continued a search for two men who Wednesday killed a bank manager in an attempted robbery.

Some 50 to 60 police led the search of bushland between this uranium mining town, 65 miles east of Sault Ste. Marie, and Elliot Lake, 22 miles north.

The hunt started shortly after the men held up the Royal Bank of Canada branch here at 9:10 a.m. and killed J. H. Walter Bridges, 50, manager here for 11 years. The pair did not get any money.

The search was pressed by an estimated 200 persons, urged on in part by rewards totalling \$27,500—\$25,000 by the Royal Bank of Canada and \$2,500 by the Ontario attorney-general's department.

World News In Brief

HONOLULU — (AP)—Admiral Arleigh Burke, chief of U.S. Naval Operation, said Wednesday there is "a very great possibility" Russia already has nuclear-powered submarines as effective as those of the United States.

EDMONTON, (CP)—Alberta civil servants now must take an oath of secrecy. An order-in-council carries the threat of dismissal or suspension for anyone disclosing information gained in his work.

ROME — (AP)—The Senate Wednesday night approved the European common market and Euratom treaties, completing Parliamentary acceptance by Italy of the pacts.

CAPTOWN, South Africa — (AP)—"We cannot tolerate the third degree in this country," a magistrate at Malmesbury, Cape Province, said Wednesday in jailing three policemen for beating seven prisoners.

SPRINGFIELD, Colo. — (AP)—An 11-year-old boy, husky Earl Wear, shot and killed his sleeping father because the father made him attend school after he had found a job on a nearby farm.

Judge Gives Golfer's Wife No Sympathy

LONDON (AP) — A judge ruled Wednesday that a woman who marries a keen golfer or fisherman had better just get used to the idea and stop thinking about divorce.

Justice Gordon Willmer rejected a divorce petition by Mrs. Irene Dickens who complained her husband Edward went fishing four evenings a week and spent the rest of his spare time preparing bait. In other words, she said, he neglected her.

"A woman might marry a keen fisherman or golf addict," said the judge, "but that is one of the things which come within the phrase 'for better or for worse.'"

Must Meet Challenge Or Cede

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Brig. Gen. Robert L. Scott of the U.S. Air Force says the United States must meet the challenge of the Russian satellite or "be at the mercy of the Soviet Union."

"If necessary, let's get rid of all three branches of the military service," the commander of nearby Luke Air Force base told the Phoenix Executives Club Wednesday night. "Let's pull out from each of the branches enough forward-looking men to form a missile corps."

Scott is the author of "God is My Co-Pilot," a best seller of the war era. He is due to retire from the USAF later this month.

Scott said he is infuriated by a navy admiral's comment the Russian satellite is just a hunk of iron.

"It's a helluva lot more than a hunk of iron," he said. "The world is no longer controlled by land masses and the seven seas—but by Sputnik, circling us in its own orbit."

Canadian Photographs Red Earth Satellite

OTTAWA (CP) — A Canadian scientist has photographed the Russian earth satellite. The feat may be another satellite first for Canada.

Arthur Griffin, an astrophysicist at the federal observatory at Newbrook, Alta., 70 miles northeast of Edmonton, photographed the object Wednesday at 7:52 a.m. EDT.

Dr. C. S. Beals, Dominion astronomer who announced Mr. Griffin's achievement, said it will enable scientists to locate precisely the satellite by its position in relation to the stars at the time it was photographed.

Another Dominion Observatory scientist here, Dr. Ian Halliday, told a reporter there was a good possibility Mr. Griffin was the first man in the world, including the U.S.S.R., to photograph the satellite. He had heard of no country doing so.

Canada's first satellite beat was scored by Defence Research Board scientists who Tuesday reported they had tracked down the satellite in space.

They disclosed for the first time it was losing altitude at a rate of three miles a day, its speed was increasing and it passed over the same spot once every 24 hours after 15 intervening revolutions.

Dr. Beals said the location of the Newbrook observatory is ideal for photographing the object because scientists there can capture the satellite at its turning point at the northernmost part of its orbit.

At Newbrook, Mr. Griffin said he hoped to get more photographs of the satellite today.

"It (the satellite) doesn't make a spectacular picture, he said. "It looks like one of the stars in the background of the picture but it had long streaks behind it because it is moving so far."

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—On the morning of Sept. 23, a Monday, 99 per cent of the people of Little Rock were nowhere near Central High School.

You don't often begin a report by noting something that didn't happen.

It's important in this case, however, because Sept. 23 was "black Monday" in Little Rock, the day of the riots at the high school.

That was the day when a relatively few people, about 400 in all, beat up Negroes and newspaper men, fought with police, raged in the streets, and screamed to the children inside the high school: "Come out! Don't stay in there with the niggers!"

BROUGHT SHAME
In the space of an hour, these few:

1. Brought shame and disgrace to a community of good people.

2. Fashioned a deadly propaganda weapon for the Communists to use against the United States in Asia and Africa, among the colored races the U.S. wants as friends.

3. Rescued Governor Orval Faubus, who had predicted violence, from what had appeared to be the role of a false prophet.

4. Figuratively tarred and feathered those people who are patiently searching for the answers to the immense problems that sprang from the Supreme Court ruling that segregated schools are unconstitutional.
