World News In Brief

Tokyo, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida told the diet today that a formal state of war would continue between Japan and those powers which did not sign the Japanese peace treaty. The treaty is due to be signed at San Francisco next month.

The Hague, Netherlands, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—About 600 Dutchmen will go to Canada this month in 10 emigrant flights by Royal Dutch Airlines (KLM). The demand for air passage by emigrants to Canada is so great that it is expected an even larger number of flights will be made in September, said a KLM official.

New York, Aug. 18.—(AP)—She looked "like a sweet old lady," police said, but the 60-year-old former nurse peddled dope along Broadway, sometimes netting \$2,000-a-day "pushing heroin." The white-haired widow, Mrs. Vera Wolf, was held in \$10,000 bail yesterday on narcotics charges after she was trapped by a woman detective who telephoned her and made an appointment to buy drugs.

Worcester, Mass., Aug. 18.—(AP)—Immediate release of Associated Press correspondent William N. Oatis from prison in Czechoslovakia was demanded last night in a resolution unanimously adopted at the 63rd national encampment of the army-navy union. The resolution termed Oatis' trial in Prague on espionage charges a "farce" and said the spy accusation was "trumped up."

Paris, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—Dr. Thomas E. Benner, professor of education at the University of Illinois, today was named to survey a means of restoring education in Korea for the United Nations. The U.N. educational, scientific and cultural organization announced the appointment.

Ankara, Turkey, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—The United States ship *Langitt* sailed for Korea last night with 1,800 Turkish troops who will replace 1,570 Turkish veterans recently returned home.

London, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—The French coast guard was asked today to keep a lookout for a British motor launch missing for a week in the English channel with five aboard.

Copenhagen, Denmark, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Denmark has appointed navy Capt. H. F. Kjoelsen as chief of its Arctic defences in Greenland, it was announced today. Capt. Kjoelsen, 58-year-old navy hero and former naval attaché to Danish embassies in Ottawa, Washington and Berlin, will set up headquarters at Groenland, a United States naval base.

Corfu, Greece, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—Horror-stricken bathers yesterday watched a shark kill Yanni Perri, 16, and wound her boy companion 150 yards off the shore here. A Greek navy patrol ship was unable to fire on the shark for fear of wounding other bathers.

Combines Report Is Expected To Urge Open Retail Mart

Ottawa, Aug. 18.—(CP)—The four-man MacQuarrie committee, nearing an end to year-long deliberations on Canada's combine laws, may recommend to the government that Canada should halt the practice whereby a product's retail price is sometimes maintained at the manufacturer's request.

The committee headed by Mr. Justice J. H. MacQuarrie of the Nova Scotia supreme court has been concentrating on the problem of retail price maintenance as one aspect of a long-range study to find means to tighten combines legislation.

Its recommendations, perhaps including one to convert the combines commission from a one-man show into a board of two or three members, likely will be prepared and sent to Justice Minister Garson next October. The committee's report then would likely be tabled in the House of Commons almost immediately.

Under the act, the combines commission is made up of the commissioner and two deputies, but in practice it is the commissioner who makes decision on investigations and who has authority to make anti-combines recommendations to the Justice Minister.

Some experts believe that if the retail price maintenance practice is eliminated by federal law, it might invite the possibility of a price war among retail stores, perhaps a miniature sample of the big price war that raged in the United States some months ago.

Committee Talks On Buffer Zone In Korea Are Marked By Friendly Informality

Gaspe Oil Puzzles Geologists

Quebec, Aug. 18.—(CP)—The presence of oil in Gaspe is something of a puzzle to Quebec geologists.

There are known deposits of iron ore, copper, lead and zinc. But the oil is an ancient mystery. You can spot traces of it almost everywhere in the eastern end of the peninsula, yet no one knows exactly where it comes from.

Bears roaming Galt Township use a yellowish-green oil lying around in puddles as a sort of insecticide. At least, that's how geologists explain patches of oil on trees. They think the bears roll themselves in the oil and then work it into their skin by rubbing against the trees.

Various wells have been drilled in several townships since 1960, but none of these ventures, many of them costly, have proved commercially successful.

The geologists now believe the earlier drillers did not know enough about the stone formations, and offer new theories based on detailed examinations.

On the north side of Gaspe bay farmers frequently plow up lumps of iron ore. This led geologists to Battery Point where traces of ore "of an unusually high iron content" were found.

In Blanchet Township, adjoining Galt, narrow veins of asbestos have been spotted in an area practically unknown to prospectors.

And vast deposits of copper ore have been outlined. But Gaspe oil remains an intriguing problem.

This is some of the information crammed into a 168-page geological report on Eastern Gaspe published this year by the Quebec government.

Although the information was collected a few years ago the contents of the survey are new to many people, including most mining companies.

The survey was done by Quebec's three top government geologists—L. W. Jones, H. W. McGerrigle and R. A. Brown—between 1937 and 1940.

It actually covers about one-sixth of the peninsula, the section most accessible to Gaspe's salt water harbor.

Holland County's great copper ore deposits, to be developed by Noranda Mines Ltd., lie just outside the boundaries of this survey. Other possible sources of copper are mentioned.

Gaspe is one of the last regions in Quebec to be studied for mineral possibilities. But oddly enough, one of the earliest dates in Canadian mining history is connected with it. In 1665, the French explored and tried to develop lead and zinc deposits, but without success.

Now the colorful area is on the eve of widespread commercial development of its ancient riches.

Cordiality Spurs Hopes That Some Solution To Deadlock May Be Reached.

Munsan, Korea, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Allies and Reds got down to brass tacks today as the four-man armistice sub-committee met on the buffer zone issue in an atmosphere of friendly informality for the second straight time.

The talks are strictly off-the-record and no official report was made.

But a pooled dispatch from Kaesong said the four generals—two American, one North Korean and one Chinese—were seen huddled over a map on a conference table. They seemed to be speaking informally, and not from prepared statements.

After a lengthy session they adjourned. They will meet again at 11 A.M. tomorrow (9 P.M. EDT Saturday). That indicated the four trouble-shooters did not reach a final solution today on where the cease-fire buffer zone should be placed.

Once more the sound of laughter coming from the conference room spurred hope of progress.

Peiping radio yesterday dropped a hint of progress in a broadcast just before the negotiators met. The Red radio, monitored in Tokyo, said the sub-committee Thursday "took the first step toward finding a solution to the issue deadlocking the truce talks."

What that was, Peiping didn't say.

Before the sub-committee began today's session, liaison officers of the two sides took over the conference room and continued their debate on the neutrality of Kaesong. The liaison groups will meet again tomorrow. Allied members refused to discuss what happened today.

The allied line-up was changed for today's session. Maj. Gen. L. C. Craigie of the United States Air Force replaced Rear-Admiral Arleigh Burke on the sub-committee. No significance was attached to the change. The other allied delegate is Maj. Gen. Harry Hodes, deputy chief of staff of the U.S. Eighth Army.

The sub-committee meetings were strictly off-the-record. No official reports will be issued until they are completed. The purpose is to give the sub-committee members complete freedom in efforts to hammer out an agreement acceptable to both sides.

The Reds have held out for a buffer zone astride the 38th parallel. Recently they indicated this was not an inflexible demand, that the line could be "adjusted."

The United Nations command has said it wants the buffer zone generally along the present lines, mostly north of 38. The U.N. has indicated a willingness to compromise.

The informal and friendly atmosphere of Friday's meeting spurred hopes that the informal sub-committee would succeed where the full five-man delegations failed.

U.S. Eighth Army Headquarters, Korea, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Twenty-nine U.S. F-86 Sabre jets clashed with 30 Red Mig jets over northwestern Korea today.

The U.S. Fifth Air Force said one Mig was damaged and that all F-86s returned safely to their bases.

The battle, 5,000 feet over Sonchon, lasted five minutes. The Migs broke off the fight and flew north. It was the first large-scale jet air battle since July 11.

United Nations and communist infantry fought hand-to-hand battles at both ends of the Korean battle line yesterday.

Chinese troops attacked in the west in the Yonchon sector, 35 miles north of Seoul. The Reds were repulsed. Thirty-one Chinese were killed and 33 taken prisoner.

On the eastern end of the line, U.N. forces fought to dislodge Reds from strongly-entrenched positions northwest of Yangju. The Allies pressed their attack in hand-to-hand combat but failed to dislodge the enemy.

Fifth Air Force fighter bombers hammered away today at enemy rail communications.

The communist Pyongyang radio said last night that Red ground fire shot down four allied planes. There was no allied confirmation of the enemy claims.

Joliette, Que., Aug. 18.—(CP)—Provincial police are holding Jean Pelletier, 52, as a material witness to the rifle-shooting last night of John Lewery, 27, at St. Felix de Valois, near the Laurentian town about 45 miles north of Montreal. Police said the two were neighbors and had not been friendly for several years.

Tehran, Aug. 18.—(Reuters) Iran's unofficial rejection of British proposals for settlement of the oil dispute today brought a reply of "take it or leave it" from Richard Stokes, chief British envoy.

The rejection was made outright but not officially in an English-language broadcast last night over Tehran radio. It was thought here to be Iran's answer to the British minister.

Polish Consul Quits Post, To Stay Here

Ottawa, Aug. 18.—(CP)—Zygmunt Ziemiński, latest to turn his back on the Iron Curtain, is a man who won't have to "play" any more.

In nearly six years in Canada as Polish consul, Mr. Ziemiński said in an interview, he's been "playing." By playing Mr. Ziemiński means acting.

The 59-year-old consul who sold Belgian emeralds in his homeland some 20 years ago, told The Canadian Press he made his decision to stay in Canada two years ago. He said he felt it prudent to keep his intentions in doubt until now.

The latest purges of the high Polish command clinched his decision to trade allegiance.

Thursday, he said, he sent this message, in effect, to the external affairs minister in Warsaw:

"After these last events I don't believe I could in the future assume my duty loyally under the instructions of the present Polish government. Therefore I resign."

Although he made his decision two years ago, it was not until last Wednesday that the experienced consul shut up his office in Winnipeg, flew to Ottawa, conferred with external affairs officials and announced his intention to make his home in Canada.

He got permission to stay, sent his resignation to Poland, Thursday and announced his decision yesterday in a 200-word typewritten, signed statement to The Canadian Press.

Mr. Ziemiński (he pronounces it Jaimiesky), fluent in French but less facile in English, described his message to Warsaw during an interview in his hotel room here.

He said he was not recalled to Poland but was subject to a new Polish government rule that all diplomatic representatives in foreign lands must spend their six weeks' holidays at home. He was due for his vacation shortly, and this hastened his decision.

Mr. Ziemiński said he has no immediate plans. He wants to rest in Canada on a six-month permit. Mr. Ziemiński says he plans to become a Canadian citizen. In this he follows the line of a number of Polish legation members who have left their posts in Ottawa over the last few years.

Mr. Ziemiński said he had been in the diplomatic service in Belgium from 1920 to 1924 and left it to encourage Belgian industry in Poland. He was "well off."

When Warsaw came under Nazi attack he became secretary-general of relief for Warsaw's 400,000 evacuees. He lived in Eastern Poland with the formers for nearly five years. After the war he came back to the diplomatic corps and was posted to Canada early in 1946.

He watched the developments at home with some misgivings. When he saw that his former peasant friends were not to be allowed to own their own land, he made his decision.

Jamaica Swept By Hurricane
Miami, Fla., Aug. 18.—(AP)—Navy planes took off at dawn today to pick up the trail of the hurricane that apparently struck overnight at the island of Jamaica in the West Indies.

Communication with Kingston, the Jamaican capital city of 120,000 population, was lost early last night when the airport and radio tower were evacuated.

All efforts early today to learn how the city and the outlying banana and sugar cane lands withstood the 120-mile-an-hour punch of the storm were fruitless.

The Miami weather bureau's latest report from the island at 7 p.m. EDT said rain squalls, the usual prelude to hurricane winds, were pelting the Jamaican coast. "This is a dangerous hurricane," the weather bureau said in an advisory.

Expansion At Windsor Mills

Quebec, Aug. 18.—(CP)—Premier Duplessis announced yesterday that Howard Smith Paper Mills Limited will spend \$21,000,000 on expansion of its wood products plants at Windsor Mills, Que., and Crabtree Mills, Que.

The Premier told his weekly press conference the expansion plan was outlined to him by Harold Crabtree, president of the company, and E. Keith Robinson, executive vice-president.

The company will spend \$7,000,000 on a five-year plan of enlarging its pulp mills at Windsor Mills, in the Eastern Townships.

The extension plans for the company's paper products plant at Crabtree Mills, in Joliette county, will involve expenditure of \$14,000,000 in two years.

Premier Duplessis said that at present the company's output at Windsor Mills is mostly for export to the United States. Under the expansion program, the pulp will be shipped to Crabtree Mills for processing there into a variety of finished paper products.

The Premier said a Howard Smith subsidiary at Ville La Salle, near Montreal, manufactures plastic covering formerly imported.

The Premier said that since 1945 the government has aimed to eliminate waste in the manufacture of forest products estimated at one time at 30 per cent of the quantity of wood going to the mills.

He said the government is achieving its goal with the establishment of plants such as that at Ville La Salle and the enlarged plant at Crabtree Mills.

Premier Duplessis added that when his government was elected in 1944, the Windsor Mills pulp plant was on the point of "closing its doors."

The government's "policy of stability and progress" coupled with the activity of Forests Minister Bourque and Albert Gaudreau, Legislature member for Richmond, led to the current prosperity of the plant at Windsor Mills.

Labor Minister Barrette, who is member for Joliette, and Mr. Bourque contributed to the projects for the plant at Crabtree Mills, the Premier said.

With the Canadian 25th Brigade in Korea, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—A battalion of the Canadian 25th Brigade has brought back valuable information about communist defences after a three-day raid behind the Chinese lines north of the Imjin river.

The raid cost the communists an estimated 20 to 30 killed, said Col. Robert A. Keane, of Fort William, Ont., acting commander of the brigade and commander of regiment from which the raiding battalion was chosen. "Canadian casualties were negligible," he added.

Today the raiders, who penetrated six miles deep in the enemy positions, were resting in their camp amid the green hills of Korea's western front. Their leader, Maj. Charles H. Lithgow, of Toronto—it was the first time he had commanded a battalion in action—described the operation as "a satisfactory workout."

The first day was spent establishing a firm base on the south bank of the Imjin river. At first light of the second day the battalion crossed the river, covered by a barrage from the division's artillery and tank guns.

They had no transport; all supplies and weapons were manhandled.

With little opposition, they thrust about 4½ miles into enemy territory. But at nightfall resistance suddenly stiffened, and they found themselves battling grimly over rugged terrain under harassing fire from Chinese mortar teams, machine guns and small arms.

During the night the communists launched determined counterattacks, but the raiders threw them back.

V.C. Won At Danville Goes Back To Unit

Ottawa, Aug. 18.—(CP)—The only Victoria Cross ever won on Canadian soil has found a resting place, after 85 years, with the British unit whose private soldier won it in 1866.

The prized decoration was won by Pte. Timothy O'Hea at Danville, Que., during the time of the Fenian raids when invasion from the United States threatened.

O'Hea, then 20 years old, was one of four soldiers of the British rifle brigade placed in charge of a trainload of ammunition, including 95 barrels of gunpowder, which was sent from Quebec City to the frontier at Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont.

As the train pulled into Danville, O'Hea, an Irishman from Bantry, County Cork, saw that one of the ammunition trucks was on fire. While officials retired to a safe distance, he found a bucket, ladder, and water, and doused the blaze in 19 trips up the ladder, working alone for an hour.

His citation, instead of reading "for conspicuous bravery in the presence of the enemy," as is usual with a V.C., read "for conspicuous courage under circumstances of great danger."

Shortly after the episode, O'Hea headed for New Zealand. Later, he went to Australia, and after leaving his V.C. medal with a friend, died during an expedition inland. The medal remained until last year in the Australian National Art Gallery.

Thomas Dunbabin, former press attaché to the Australian High Commissioner's office here, arranged last year to have the V.C. brought back to Canada, to rest in the archives of the war museum here. External Affairs Minister Pearson was a supporter of this back-to-Canada move.

However, word of the medal got to Lord Wilson, colonel commander of the Rifle Brigade, who wrote Mr. Pearson suggesting it would be a gracious action on Canada's part to have the V.C. return to its old regiment.

According to the medal and accompanying documents were turned over at the Rifle Brigade's regimental dinner in London. Tim O'Hea's V.C. now reposes in a glass case at the regimental museum at Winchester, England.

The Princess will also become eligible to serve on a council of state when the King is out of the country.

The world's gayest Princess, the King's second daughter, will still have to obey her father's orders to stay away from night clubs—which has been the case for several months.

Even her love of clothes and her flair for setting fashions must be held in check if the strict code of the royal court says so.

Unlike other girls who reach 21 she won't even have a vote, because royalty doesn't meddle in politics.

One of the royal family's biggest fears is scandal of any kind or any action which might cause criticism of Margaret through no fault of her own, is the weakest chink in the armor.

Because of her youth, her good looks and her high spirits, newspapers and gossips for the last three years have followed her every move.

When she tried to have a secluded swim in the sea during an Italian vacation at Capri, cameras with telescopic lenses did a "peeping tom" act. Newspapers made Buckingham Palace totter by publishing pictures of a British princess in a scanty bathing suit.

Every time she has visited a night club or theatre it has meant headlines—giving an exaggerated impression of royal good-timing and luxury-living in Britain's days of austerity. So Margaret has stayed away from night spots recently and probably won't be seen at many after she becomes 21.

PLAY FOR THE 'BIRD IN HAND'

Here's a little Canasta problem for you. The chances are you'll get it right, if only because it's supposed to be a problem. Most people would do the wrong thing in actual play.

You and your partner each have seven or eight cards. You have closed a couple of canastas and have melded six natural kings, four queens with a pair of deuces, and some lesser melds. The opponents have made a canasta of tens and one or two small melds of spot cards, but have not melded any picture cards. They're both trying for out.

While you're enjoying all this, you draw from the stockpile and find that you have picked up the last wild card. You're a fine Canasta player, so you know that it's the twelfth and last wild card. Naturally, you want to make a canasta with it, because the opponents may draw their out-card at any moment.

Where do you add the deuce? Do you put it on the six natural kings or do you put it together with the four queens and the two deuces?

Most players would add it to the queens. They wouldn't want to spoil their chances for the natural cards of kings. Would you play it that way too?

You shouldn't. If you add the deuce to the queens, there are only two cards in the deck that will complete your canasta of kings. But if you add the deuce to the kings, there will then be four cards in the deck that will complete your canasta of queens.

In other words, the right play gives you twice as good a chance to make both canastas. It's better

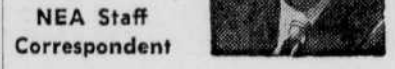

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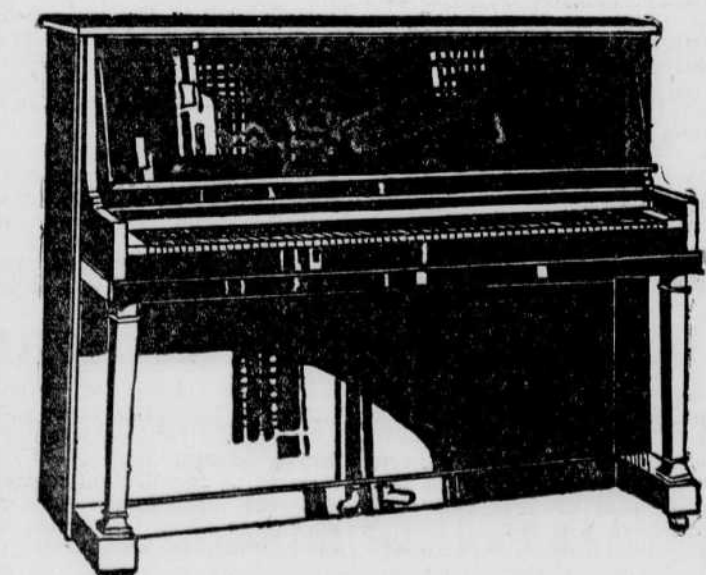

British Doctors Deny Charges Of Inhuman Methods

London.—A blunt suggestion in the British medical journal "Practitioner" that doctors are using human patients as "guinea pigs" in scientific experiments has provoked widespread indignation among the profession.

The article in the journal's current issue deals with forms of human vivisection and other horror practices in Nazi concentration camps in the last war. Then it declares:

"We should take a lesson from this and give careful thought to the extent to which we are tending to abuse the trust our patients put in us. Without such trust we and our patients are lost. And its loss will never be compensated by that increased knowledge that might arise from human vivisection."

The article mentions one method of investigation called cardiac catheterisation, an operation involving the passing of a fine tube through the bloodstream to the heart.

How far, it asks, are doctors justified in submitting patients to experimental procedure which may not be without risk to life?

"The suggestion appears to be that the search for knowledge takes priority over the welfare of the individual patient," the journal adds. "Knowledge can be bought too dearly. Once the sanctity of the patient's right is questioned there is no telling how rapidly the standards of practice will fall."

Doctors explained that the ethics of the profession frowned on public discussion of such matters. But they denied emphatically that experimental vivisection was practised by them on patients to advance their medical knowledge.

"There is absolutely no truth in the suggestion that human beings are being used as laboratory animals," said a council member of the British Medical Association.

Two Elk Are Placed In City's Zoo

With the arrival of two young elk from the Provincial Zoological Gardens at Charlbourg near Quebec City, the miniature zoo being maintained by the City of Sherbrooke in Victoria Park has taken another step towards realizing the ambitions of its sponsors to establish a full-fledged animal park in this city.

For several years, Ald. Sylvio Rousseau, chairman of the parks and recreation committee of the City Council, has been working on the task of creating a real zoo here.

The first acquisition of importance was a pair of deer, which have been supplemented through gifts and natural processes until they now number an even half-dozen.

In addition to the elk and deer, the park now boasts of two raccoons, two coyotes—a prairie animal resembling a small dog or wolf but with a cry like that of a lost child at night—two owls and a monster mud turtle.

J. A. Tardif, superintendent of the municipal parks, says the deer have become so friendly that when it was decided to move two of them from a cage near the ball park to a site further down the park, there was no need to place a halter on them. It was sufficient for a man to go in the cage with a handful of grain and offer it to them. Sensing food, they followed their guardian several hundred feet and walked into their new quarters without any hesitation.

The elk, however, despite the fact they were born in captivity are still adverse to any dealings with the human race and the custodians must leave the food and retreat.

Drummondville Population Rises Sharply

Drummondville's population has increased from 10,555 in 1941 to 14,251 in 1951, the first report of Canada's census revealed today.

The initial report of the June census, released by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in Ottawa, covered 526 cities, towns and incorporated villages, none of them larger but representing every province. A full report is expected next December.

Hull showed the biggest jump in the cities reported, going from 32,947 in 1941 to 43,204 in 1951. Other Quebec centres included St. Hyacinthe, where the jump was from 17,798 to 19,999.

Magog's Mayor Angered By Charge That Stand-In Will Jump For Him

Magog, Aug. 18.—Shades of the hurly-burly of the Bowery!

Even in the gay nineties, that tough section of New York City had nothing on Magog, Que., of today!

If Hollywood history serves us correctly, one Steve Brodie took a dive over the Brooklyn Bridge and survived. His enemies claimed Brodie didn't dive at all but had friends of his throw a dummy over the bridge into the water from which Brodie later emerged.

A similar situation developed in Magog the other day when a local French-language weekly suggested that Mayor Ernest Simard of Magog, would have a stand-in take his place in doing a parachute jump from a plane into Lake Memphremagog tomorrow.

The weekly, basing its charges on the saying of an unnamed informant, says that at the moment of the jump a photograph would be taken either from the jumper's posterior or from such a distance that identification of the jumper would be impossible.

"Doubtless comme au Hollywood," the weekly states to which Mayor Simard merely snorts.

That Mayor Simard may have seen too many movies in his career which included operating of theatres at Magog and East Angus as well as working as a pipefitter and proprietor of a public address advertising system, all of which he says he has now abandoned in order to devote his full energies to the mayoralty, may be true but he vehemently denies that anyone will "jump in the Lake" for him.

In a letter to the Record, Mayor Simard states: "I wish to declare to the public of Magog and to others that it will be I who shall make the parachute jump on Sunday, into the Lake at the Lantern Inn, Georgeville Road. The airplane will always be in full view of the public and I shall jump from a height of between 1,500 and 2,000 feet."

Arthur Cote, chairman of Magog's Aviation Day, of which the Mayor's stunt is part, is making arrangements for the Record's photographer to take aerial shots from a plane which will fly close to the one from which Mayor Simard is to jump. The show starts at two p.m.

"Aviation Day" is the opening of Magog's "Centenary" year and the Mayor has already printed souvenir cards for this event. The card shows a large picture of the Mayor with the following inscribed below: "Ernest Simard, first mayor of the City of Magog, (the town reached

The mayor cannot swim but he will be wearing a "Mae West" as well as his chute when he jumps into the Lake. Also, he has never parachuted before and doesn't intend to take any instruction in that art, as he was offered. He says he is entirely unworried about his jump.

His previous connection with parachutes was rather remote. In 1942, he worked for a firm at Portmouth, Ontario, engaged in the making of nylon for parachutes.

He has been a passenger in airplanes before. His first plane trip was made at St. Hubert in 1932 when he was given a flip so he could see the Zeppelin (R-100) from over it.

What does Mrs. Simard think of her husband's latest caper? "She doesn't know about it," the Mayor says. "I stopped having any newspapers delivered to my home about a year ago when the papers played up a nasty political issue. So she doesn't get any of this news. However, one of my daughters (the 43-year-old mayor has four daughters and two sons) saw a newspaper at my office today and I shall inform Mrs. Simard of my plan to jump tomorrow (Saturday)."

The "centenary" of which the "Aviation Day" is the "pre-opening," that is, after this event the celebrations will not be resumed until perhaps next year, the Mayor says is to mark not the 100th year of the arrival of the first white settlers here but to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the founding of Magog "township," and this he says is being observed only two years late.

The parachute jump, which will be from a "Piper" supercruiser and using an Irving seat-packed chute, is a stunt to give Magog publicity with a view to getting new industries to come here.

Mayor Simard has a number of letters on file from outsiders whom he is trying to interest in this city of approximately 15,000 persons. One of them is from an official of the Cunard White Star (steamship) Line thanking the Mayor for having entertained members of the crew of the R.M.S. Ascania.

Part of the letter reads: "Once again Mr. Mayor we thank you and we feel sure that under your wise and enterprising guardianship the City of Magog will retain the honor of being known as the 'Pearl' of the Eastern Townships."

Apparently Mayor Simard is sticking to the nickname of 'Pearl' of the E.T. for Magog, even though Coaticook insists it has used that nickname for 25 years.

Incidentally, a fast yacht will retrieve the mayor when he parachutes into the lake. "Dr. R. L. Boivin, of Sherbrooke, has a fast yacht," the mayor says.

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FRENCH SHOULD GIVE PREMIER PLEVEN A BREAK

The West can be gratified that Rene Pleven is the new French premier. He is probably the strongest middle-of-the-road leader in France today.

In his earlier premiership this year, Pleven exhibited more character and drive than any French prime minister has shown since World War II. He made a fine impression during his hasty visit to the United States.

Pleven faces some thorny issues. Rearmament and its impact on the French economy, the revival of a German army as part of the European defense force, the granting and development of air bases for the United States, these top the list.

In any realistic political framework, Pleven would be judged and his regime would stand or fall on how it meets these key issues. But, unluckily, French cabinets in recent years have been collapsing over domestic questions which often bear little or no relation to the critical world scene.

For the sake of Western solidarity in the building of effective defenses against Russia, it is to be hoped that henceforth the French people will gauge their leaders' performance more broadly.

THE LATE CLAUDE L. SPAFFORD

The death of Claude L. Spafford removes a man whose family has long played an important part in the industrial development of the Eastern Townships and other parts of Canada.

Born in North Hatley, he moved to Sherbrooke forty-five years ago and shortly after became associated with the company today known as Sherbrooke Machineries, Ltd., with which he served for many years as president and manager, continuing his connection with this concern until forced to retire for reasons of health a few years ago.

Aside from his business interests, he was keenly interested in sport and in various community activities. He was a member of the old Sherbrooke Senior Hockey Club which before the First World War was ranked among the best amateur squads in Canada and one year reached the Allan Cup finals.

He served for some time as a member of the Sherbrooke Protestant School Board and was active in the Sherbrooke Rotary Club. Other organizations in which he participated included St. George's Club, the Sherbrooke Curling Club, the Sherbrooke Snow Shoe Club and the Opeanga Fish and Game Club and was also prominent in Masonic circles.

Of a quiet and unobtrusive nature, he won for himself many friends who will sincerely mourn his passing.

A MELTING POT

Indications that Canada is becoming more and more of a melting pot for the nations of the world is shown by figures of the Immigration Department on newcomers to Canada during the first six months of 1951.

One thing seems certain, that in this period when newcomers have to be thoroughly screened and the condition will probably be permanent, Canada will never hit the peak in immigration as established in 1913, when no less than 400,870 newcomers were admitted, and many of whom helped to fill the west. But they also settled in the cities of Eastern Canada in great number, and their children and children's sons and daughters have improved their lot by their migration from Britain and Europe. A little more screening of immigrants back in the halcyon days might have been better for the country; the troubles caused by the Doukhobors might have been prevented. There are four or more non-British entering Canada than people of British origin. But the British are much stronger for the first six months this year than for the same period a year ago, 14,130 to 6,738. There were 8,604 English, 4,100 Scots, 1,153 Irish and a lack and alas only 273 Welsh.

But what a mixture all round? Immigrants from the Netherlands were the most numerous of those coming from any single country, total-

ling 11,297. The Italians were in second place with 9,522, and the Germans in third with 8,280. Other sizable national groups were Poles, 4,880; Estonians, 3,136; Ukrainians, 2,642; Danes, 2,305; French, 2,272; Hebrew, 2,984; Magyars, 1,819; Czechs, 1,642; Yugoslavs, 1,589; Chinese, 1,304; Letts, 1,259; Belgians, 1,190.

The United States made just about a normal contribution with 3,688. Probably Canada traded more than that number of Canadians who have gone to the States. Ontario has absorbed the bulk of the new citizens, more than 45,000, while Quebec took 15,204, Alberta 6,430, British Columbia 5,649, Manitoba, 3,700, and the other provinces hardly anywhere in the running, particularly the Maritimes.

At the present time, the absorption of immigrants in large number offers no strain on the Canadian economy. They do provide new industrial and productive strength, and also are consumers of food and goods. Immigration is at a very moderate pace; there are many advocates of having it stepped up. In that respect, Canada has certainly lagged behind Australia and New Zealand.

What Defense Minister Shinwell told the left wing group of the British Labor party, that to which Aneurin Bevan is making his big appeal, applies equally to Canada. There must be no slow down in the building up of armed strength by every nation in the Atlantic Pact. There are free opinions being expressed right today, among them by the French Canadian newspapers, that war will ensue before the end of 1952. On the other hand, Anthony Eden tells an audience in the western States that we are now no nearer war than a year ago. That may be true enough, but the timing and making of war is strictly a Russian prerogative.

Defense Minister Shinwell gave out Russian military figures, which are not only impressive but awesome in their import. The minister declared:

"We are still a long way from military parity with the Russians. This is no moment to talk of going slow or turning back."

Then he released these new figures on Soviet arms production and fighting strength.

They show Stalin has:

—19,000 aircraft, including many jet fighters and bombers; is producing 10,000 a year—350 airfields on the western perimeter of the Soviet bloc, that can accommodate 14,000-17,000 warplanes ... 25,000 tanks in service, another 25,000 in reserve ... 350 submarines.

—5.7 million men under arms; 4.6 in the Soviet forces; the rest in satellites and in East Germany. They are in 185 divisions, 22 of which are in East Germany. Eighteen are armored units.

That 1952 will be the crucial year has for some time been the consensus of the experts. In the meantime evidence accumulates of a housecleaning by the Soviet, purges, executions and trials in the higher military echelons, not only Russian but in the satellite countries. On paper and with statistics, Russia could defeat the western nations overnight, but with nervousness over the home front, what the situation would be within a year and after the release of atomic bombs, who is there who can hazard any opinion or prediction? On the field of battle itself, if western Europe can be held by the genius of Eisenhower and his supporting forces, the Russians will have no easy march in 1952, assuming that it will be the year of the resumption of global war which was really never finished in 1945.

QUODDY'S POSSIBILITIES

Moncton Transcript

Two natural features give Quoddy its vast potential for tidal power development that exist nowhere else in the world. The range of tides in the Passamaquoddy area is from 18 to 28 feet, covering two large basins, almost entirely landlocked and closely adjacent to each other.

The plan for harnessing these tremendous tides is basically simple. It calls for a series of dams and locks which would keep one of these basins, Passamaquoddy Bay, at or near high-tide level by means of sea gates opening inward as the tide neared full height and closing when it started to recede. The other basin, Cobscook Bay, would be kept at or near the low-tide mark by sea gates opening outward on the ebbing tide, and closing as the tide turned.

The difference in water level between the two basins would average 19 feet, and power would be generated by turbines in another dam between these two basins. The flow of water would be enormous and unrelenting. The scheme is made simpler by the fact that the upper basin is about three times larger than the lower basin. The engineers have estimated the Quoddy project is capable of generating approximately 1,000,000 horsepower per year, and this power would be available to some of the northeastern states of New England and New Brunswick. It is calculated to be of great value to both countries.

THE REAL SOURCE

Before Americans raise their hands in horror over the offences of some West Pointers, they would do well to search out the real source of the evil.

For many years an absurd and dangerous preoccupation with collegiate athletics has been sapping the intellectual and moral standards of American education. From the tolerance with which the football player's academic vagaries are too often regarded, from the recruiting of athletes by alumni and the adulation of gate receipts by trustees, have arisen many abuses. Cribbing comes to be regarded as a minor sin and the awarding of degrees to men who are notoriously incompetent in anything but games is condoned.

Only when the players succumb to bribes, or the loose practices which elsewhere are the subject of jokes and covert approval reach into the service academies, is there a public outcry.

It is time that Americans, who insist that West Point graduate men of highest character, apply the same ethical concept to education generally.

Bridges

Do Bridges interest you? Our Eastern Townships Bridges have a story to tell of days that once were—particularly the covered Bridges. Few of them now remain. Last January, with the collapse of the Duplessis Bridge near Quebec City, we became "bridge-conscious." In England we read that more than 7,000 bridges have been banned from modern traffic. With the Flight of Time our old Bridges are accordingly being affected.

To my "Source Book," the Bible, I turn and am surprised not to find a bridge mentioned therein. We are indebted to the Romans who constructed the first known bridge in the Seventh Century B.C. There seems to have been an ancient prejudice against the building of bridges. When the Sultan of Morocco was asked by an engineer for permission to construct a bridge, he answered: "I could not think of such a thing. God made the world without bridges." It was held to be an interference with the divine plan. The river gods were opposed to bridges. For a long time they had to be placated by sacrifice whenever a bridge was planned.

THEY CONNECT But who was the first man who thought of a bridge? And wasn't it a log thrown across the stream? The purpose nonetheless was the same to span gorges, chasms, gulfs and rivers in order that there may be easy communication from one side to the other. Montreal is a great city, situated on an island; a bridge, therefore, is a "must." And when we realize how dependent we are on them today, and their importance in world intercourse, the wonder is that humanity got along without them for so many centuries.

You are expected to be a bridge-builder. Don't be surprised if you find the same prejudices existing towards invisible structures as to those of stone and steel. United the Church of God must be to effectively battle against Materialism, which challenges our loyalty to God. Confronted with those forces which weaken the virtues of Faith, Hope and Love, the Church must buckle on Her armour. That She is doing. We must be one! Let our daily prayer be: "Show us, O Christ, how we can help answer Thy still unanswered prayer that Thy followers may be one" (John 17:21).

THEY SHARE Thinking further of the signifi-

cance of Bridges, I am impressed with the traffic that passes to and fro over Bridges. Often as I watched the traffic on the Montreal Harbor Bridge, I wondered where people were going and what they planned doing. Most of them were bent on business; others on pleasure; a few, perhaps, were seeking medical aid, or on missions of mercy. Back over the same Bridge they returned, enriched, demonstrating thereby that we are tied in the one bundle of life.

Then, the Jacques Cartier Bridge runs north and south, speaking of the wider communications and sharing between the nations. It is an altogether worthy ideal. English and French; Protestant and Catholic; Jew and Gentile holding fellowship together and mutually sharing in each other's gifts.

As a clerk in Holy Orders, I am grateful to Bridges for the sermon in unification they preach. To weld together separated things I, too, must devote my energies. God has given us much. In return He expects us to share with others. This is our privilege and our duty. For, in feeding those in need, we feed Him. And somehow I find that whenever I help others, I myself am doubly helped. For then we go out and share the life of others, or give ourselves up to be consumed in some grand passion or absorbed in some unselfish object, we escape accordingly from our shadow. Longfellow's immortal poem, "Bridge," has this as its central theme.

Life then, is writ to that pattern. That was Happiness lies. For Happiness is a by-product in life's laboratory. And when we expect sympathy and "lend our lives out" a sweetening love, an "unction"

Instead, George led out the ace, king, and queen of spades. This gave West a chance to ruff with his forgotten nine of hearts. While West was thinking, George discarded a club from dummy.

The trouble was that if West ruffed he would have to lose a trick no matter what he led back. Thus, if he returned a club, South would have two natural club tricks and could ruff his last club in dummy. And if West returned the ten of diamonds, South would ruff, cash his last good spade, and then win the last two tricks in dummy with a trump and a good diamond.

West couldn't save himself by refusing to ruff. George could just lead another top spade to discard another club from dummy. If

ment on both sides, but that in the main the MacQuarrie committee, appointed by the government last year, is concerned with the problem of bringing to Canada a more "efficient and democratic" economy.

In this view, any practice which would stand in the way of that goal should be eliminated, though there may be exceptions to be considered, such as the price of a refrigerator which includes a year's free service. If the price were not maintained, then such service probably could not be continued. It appears likely that the committee's recommendations will take that point into consideration.

Two impressions appear to have gained ground:

1. That the MacQuarrie committee has been set up to bring relief from the current price inflation.

2. That the federal combines commission is awaiting the committee's report and government action before it launches new anti-combines investigations.

Both are unsubstantiated. While it is expected that a recommendation on resale price maintenance, if implemented, may bring a slight but general lowering of the Canadian price structure, the committee is not so concerned with the immediate inflation problem as what may happen 10 or 15 years hence.

It has to draft laws to cover problems which may not be immediately apparent to the layman. Another study of the combines investigation act may not take place for a dozen years or more. Although the act has been in existence for some 60 years, only about a half-dozen committee studies have been made. The last was in 1937.

T. D. MacDonald, the combines commissioner, is as busy as ever investigating monopolies and actions considered in restraint of trade. His work might be vastly increased if new amendments are inserted in the legislation.

There also have been suggestions, it was learned, by those appearing before the committee that the job of investigating combines should not be a one-man affair but rather that of a committee or board.

This might lead to a prevention of the train of events which led to the resignation of Fred A. MacGregor, former combines commissioner, who resigned in 1949. One of his last actions was to recommend to the government that it take anti-combines action against the flour mill industry. The government did not accept the recommendation.

It was a few months after Mr. MacDonald's appointment that the committee was created. With Mr. Justice MacQuarrie on the committee are Dr. W. A. Mackintosh of Queen's University; Prof. Maurice Lamontagne, assistant director of the economics department, Laval University; and George F. Curtis, dean of the faculty of law, University of British Columbia.

Harriman gave his defence in a review of the Yalta meeting released by Senator Brien McMahon (Dem., Conn.).

The Ambassador said Stalin pledged "fundamental freedoms for the people in territories overrun by the Red army." Then he added:

"Had Stalin honored these commitments taken at Yalta, eastern Europe would be free today and the United States would be a truly effective organization for world security."

At Yalta, President Roosevelt and Britain's Prime Minister Churchill made concessions to the communists in Manchuria and elsewhere in return for their entry into the war against Japan.

Cattleman Halts Colorful Career To Retire At 81

Nicola, B.C.—Maj. C. Sydney Goldman, owner of the famed Nicola stock farms, has announced he is retiring at the age of 81 and plans to spend the winter in his native South Africa.

Starting as an office boy in Africa he has had a successful career as an industrialist, writer, soldier, legislator and British Columbia rancher.

Before leaving Africa he was chairman or director of a large number of mining and commercial corporations. He was a war correspondent in the Boer War and later wrote a book titled "With French's Cavalry." He also wrote technical books on mining and industry in South Africa before going to England, where for 18 years he was a Conservative M.P.

During the First World War Maj. Goldman served as an artillery officer and later an intelligence officer. He was attached for a time to the Verdun headquarters of the late Marshal Petain.

While in the trenches on the Somme in 1918, Maj. Goldman chatted with Col. Harold Matthews. The latter described his place in the Nicola valley, 250 miles northeast of Vancouver, in such glowing terms that the major decided to buy 3,000 acres.

Soon after arriving at his new home he increased the holdings to 60,000 acres, all fenced. Now he has 4,000. Hereofers, 1,500 sheep and 80 dairy cows, all pedigree Ayrshires and Holsteins.

Maj. Goldman's son John, who has been in the movie industry in the British Isles for 17 years, has come to Canada to take charge of the ranch operations. Next spring he will be joined by another brother.

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Fine Art School High In Rockies Popular Venture

Banff, Alta. — It's a revelation to talk of art in the Banff school of fine arts. He connects art with the popular needs of the people, not with "long-hair" theories.

Mr. Cameron sees the hunger of the people for knowledge as the reason for the remarkable growth of the school, which some supporters believe may eventually become a Canadian counterpart of the historic Salzburg centre in Austria.

They figure such an eminence may take five to 15 years to achieve, but they're working on it and in the meantime they would appreciate if the long-hair types set up shop somewhere else.

In other words, people attending the 19th summer session of the Banff school of fine arts are the same types that may sit around your room of an evening and discuss things simply because they enjoy food for thought and good fellowship.

And Mr. Cameron, who directs the extension department of the University of Alberta, apart from the Banff school, is a son of the farm, in the days when the farm home parlor was a community gathering place.

Today he engages the continent's leaders in various fields for the summer school staff, but his own education stems from a one-room country school at Innisfail, Alta.

While studying for his master's degree in agricultural economics at the University of Alberta he saw possibilities of adult education.

So in 1930 he entered the education field with appointment to the university's extension service. In 1933 he studied adult education in Europe on a Carnegie scholarship. In 1936 he was named director of the extension service and also of the Banff school, with which he has been associated in an administrative capacity for 18 years.

When the Banff school was started in 1933 on a Carnegie grant to the University of Alberta to encourage fine arts, they figured 40 would show up. But the attendance was 150 to study the elements of state production and acting.

Lacking dining room and dormitory facilities, the school farmed out the students all over town. The classes were held in the old Dr. Brett Theatre, where a little shoring of the beams was necessary on more than one occasion.

From that poor-cousin beginning, the school has grown to an average session enrollment of 600. It draws students from most of Canada, the United States, and even Norway, Hawaii, Mexico and Alaska.

At one time it had 82 different buildings under summer contract in the town of Banff. Today, having developed into a major continuation centre of the university, it owns three beautiful chalets, has 10 cabins and another building on long-term leases.

By these it accommodates 300 for sleeping. For classes, it has a co-operative arrangement for use of town schools and receives co-operation of the federal parks departments.

With its short courses and meetings—there were 28 of them this year—the school actually operates nine months of the year, drawing 3,000 persons to Banff. The school eventually will operate all year round.

The school is financed by private funds, and a \$2,500 grant from the extension department. Its ledger is a museum piece among fine art schools. The Banff school last year cost \$110,000 and its revenues totalled \$97,500.

Although the school has grown from drama to the other arts, the policy still is the same. Mr. Cameron says it is to invite as guest instructors leading artists of the world to develop a richer Canadian culture in the friendly atmosphere of the Canadian west.

The Doctor Says

AIR CONDITIONING, INJECTIONS, DRUGS AID HAY FEVER VICTIMS

By Edwin P. Jordan, M.D.

Aug. 15 is the traditional day for the start of fall hay fever. Actually, symptoms of this miserable affliction may begin several days earlier or later, depending on the particular region and the sensitivity of the victim. This kind of hay fever, which is the most widespread and probably the most unpleasant, comes principally from ragweed and at the time when this plant starts to pollinate. The wisest victims of ragweed hay fever have taken shots or injections and should get some relief if they have. Others have planned their vacations for this time of the year and may escape a lot of trouble by being in areas where there is little or no ragweed. Both of these measures have been discussed earlier this year.

But there remain many who for one reason or another have to stick it out in some place where ragweed pollen clouds the atmosphere. What can they do to get at least some relief from their sneezing, stuffy noses and irritated eyes?

Actually there is a good deal. Air conditioning is often quite helpful. In many air conditioned public buildings, the air going in is washed as well as cooled so that all or most of the pollen is removed. Even for the private home something can be done. Several small conditioning units are on the market which can be used to filter out the pollen for individual rooms. I know people who use them who never venture outside their rooms during the "season" unless they have to!

Drugs Help

Then there are drugs both new and old. The ones which have the most dramatic effects are the anti-histamines which have now been available for several years. These are taken by mouth and while they do not in any sense constitute a permanent cure they often bring striking relief of symptoms.

But the use of these drugs is a little complicated. It is hard to choose which one to use since there are so many. Actually some seem to work better for some people and others for others.

It isn't entirely safe to take these anti-histamines without direction. Unpleasant side effects have been found; some people are made sleepy by some of the preparations and this can be dangerous in driving a car or a locomotive. Nevertheless a great many people are tremendously helped by drugs and air conditioning and the hay fever season is not as feared as it used to be.

Handy Is as Handy Does

THAT shoe bag on your closet door is a very versatile article if you give it a chance. It has many uses besides the one for which it was made—to hold shoes!

A cloth shoe bag thumb-tacked to the back of your bedroom door makes a convenient "filing system" for any boy or girl. Each compartment becomes a receptacle for different items, and keeps each one in its place. One may hold letters to answer. Another, costume jewelry, others hair ribbons, snapshots waiting to be put in the album, study notes for school, or your library card. No confused jumble in a dresser drawer.

Everything is filed where you can find it.

A SHOE bag makes an excellent cleaning apron when you help Mom with the housework chores. It saves time and steps. Need a place to keep your sewing supplies? Are the scissors and tape measure always missing when you're ready to fix a hem and have just a moment to do it? Then assemble all your sewing wares in a shoe bag. There are enough sections that one can hold the scissors while others take care of buttons, patterns, thread, and needles.

AND what about a family mail box? Remember how fussy brother gets when someone mislays a letter from his pen pal? Select one of the prettier shoe bags made of plastic in a color to harmonize with the wall wallpaper.



This bag may be tacked behind the hall door or on the wall near the entrance door.

Label one section, "Dad," another "Mother," and so on until each member of the family has a separate compartment for holding his mail until he gets it. Set aside one section and call it, "Family." Here are placed the letters from grandmother, or others, intended for the whole family.

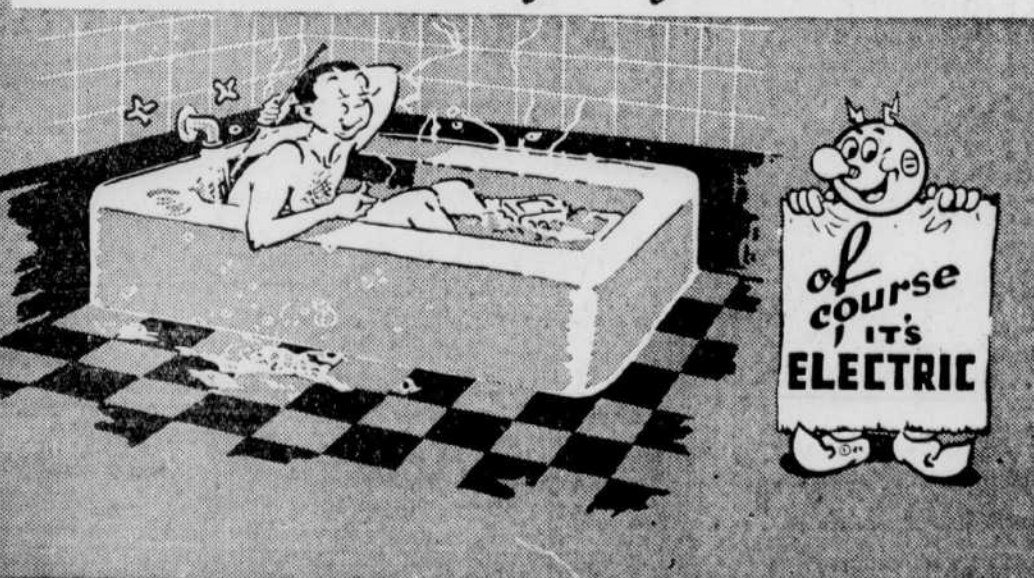

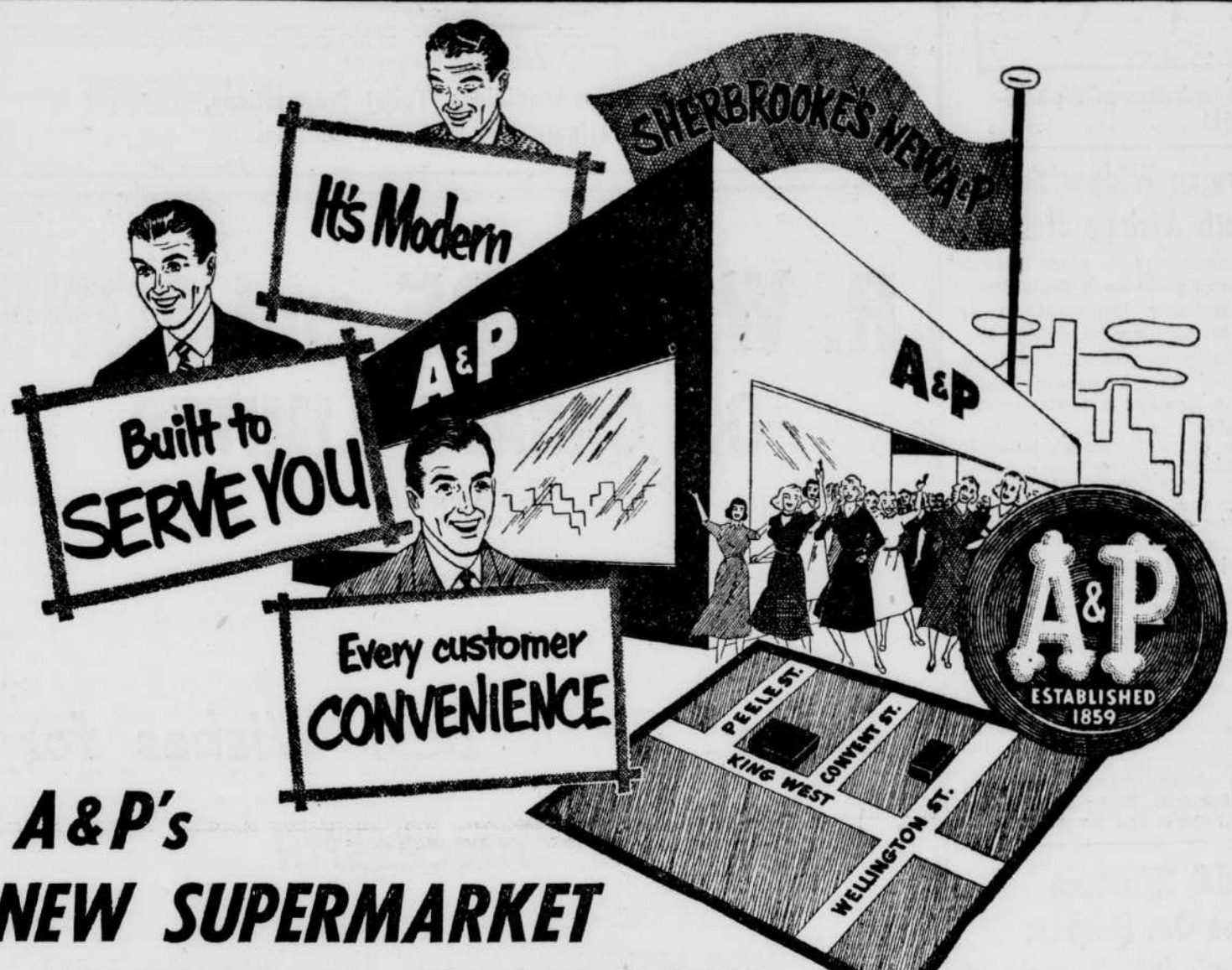

Coast Teacher Helps Conquer Reading Fault

Vancouver, — "Word blindness," or the inability to read intelligently, is being conquered by a Vancouver high school teacher. The strange affliction long has been a secret enemy of education, entirely distinct from the capacity to read and write. J. H. Sutherland's special course in English at the McGee high school has given hundreds of pupils, mostly about 15 years old, the ability to read effectively for the first time in their lives.

Intelligence quotients have been known to leap 30 points after the course. With their new ability to learn, formerly "stupid" students often become class leaders.

"Word blindness" is such an incredible disorder that Mr. Sutherland has difficulty convincing many parents that it actually exists. They ask why intelligent children who have gone to school 10 years cannot learn to read, and, if they can't read, how they ever get into high school.

Mr. Sutherland explains that the term "word-blindness" is a misnomer. About 30 per cent of all their memory of the printed word is associated in their minds with the sound instead of the picture.

They cannot recognize words of any complicated structure and cannot learn the difference between words of similar structure. Thus the entire meaning of most sentences is lost to them.

Instruction is comparatively simple compared to the startling results. Mr. Sutherland usually enlists aid of advanced pupils who sit with new class members and help them concentrate on breaking down difficult words into syllables.

Words are repeated with increasing speed until they form a sound picture in the pupils' minds. They take dictation with every difficult word carefully sounded. Later they gather in small groups and read to each other or write sentences on the blackboard, explaining the meaning of sentences. Once they can read properly Mr. Sutherland crams them with a tightly-knit grammar course to help them catch up with the other pupils. He said individual attention to the children's problem is essential.

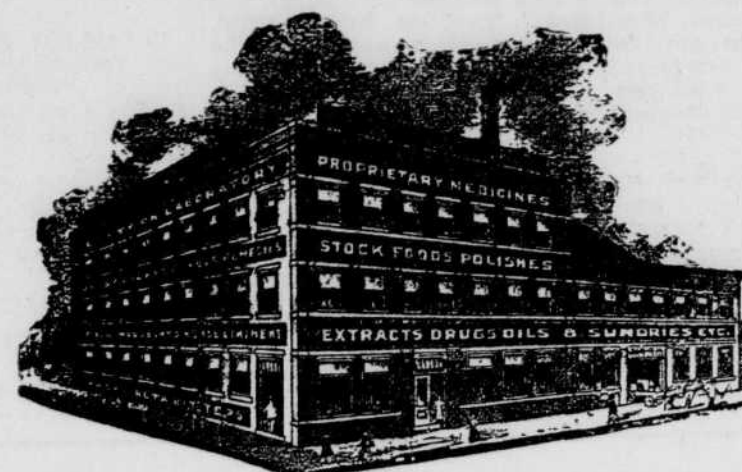

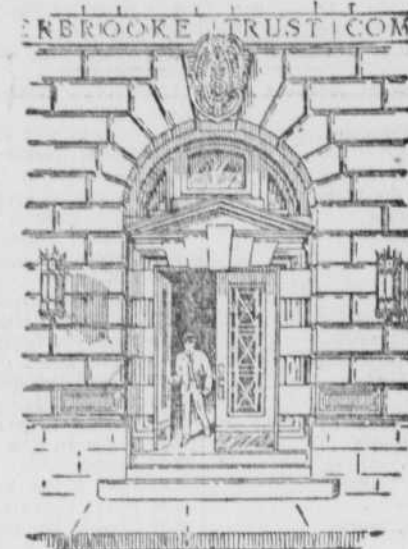

Skiing Federation Sets New Rules For Olympics

Bern, Switzerland, Aug. 18.—(Reuters)—The committee of the International Skiing Federation ruled that skiing instructors will not be permitted to take part in the forthcoming Winter Olympics unless they satisfy four conditions. They are:
1. That their instruction is only an accessory employment and only on a temporary basis.
2. That they only teach elementary skiing, not racing skiing, and that they do not act as trainers for races.
3. That their pay is the same as non-racing instructors and that they do not exploit their reputations.
4. That they have not taught skiing for a period of at least 90 days before the opening date of the Winter Olympics.

Linseed Oil Preserves Rustic Furniture

By MR. FIX

Now that you've finished sitting around in your garden chairs for a while, soaking up the sun and cold lemonade, you're likely to notice that the summer furniture isn't quite as spruce looking as you thought it was when you lugged it out of winter storage.

Or maybe you've finished building the lawn chairs we described in a recent column, and having admired the natural wood long enough by now, want to slick things up for the rest of the season.

A friend of Mr. Fix got us started on this mid-season research because he was worried about the effect of weather on his rustic garden furniture—the kind made of round, undressed saplings, which seems to be pretty popular these days. Alternate rain and sun is beginning to split the wood and make the furniture come apart at the seams.

This fellow will find he has a really easy job on his hands. Plain old linseed oil is just about the best friend rustic furniture ever had. It not only preserves the wood; it preserves the rustic look, too.

Brush or rub it in generously—two or three coats of it, depending on how it soaks up. Allow a couple of hours between coats, and when the final coat is dry, rub it down briskly. While you're at it, soak the raw ends of the sapling in the oil so they won't absorb oil and begin to warp. Where the joints are beginning to loosen, apply waterproof glue, reset the nails and lash things down until the glue dries.



Plain wooden chairs, such as the Adirondack variety, or finished wooden chairs, frames should get a finish of good outdoor enamel. Use metal paint, of course, on metal furniture, first scraping and priming any rust spots.

Canvas chairs, folding or otherwise, can be given new life in a hurry with any one of the many awning or canvas paints on the market. Don't try to imitate the stripes that may have been on the material when you first got it; settle for a plain solid color in the renovation job.

You can do any of these chores in the cool of the evening during

the week, and then be all fixed up for company next time you ask somebody over to sit in the garden and share a cool drink.

FIX-IT FORUM

Q—My kitchen floor creaks in certain spots. Can I stop the creaking without taking up the linoleum?—H. L.

A—If you can get at the joists underneath the kitchen floor, you should be able to stop the creaking by driving small wedges between the joists and the sub-flooring. Have somebody walk around in the kitchen while you're down below so you can locate the creaking boards.

Boundary Rotary Visits Crippled Children's Camp

Derby Line, Aug. 18. — Members of the Rotary Club of the Boundary, Rotary-Anns, visiting Rotarians and a number of special guests, journeyed to the Crippled Children's Camp at Lake Massawippi, Ayer's Cliff, for their regular Monday evening meeting.

The speaker for the event was Dr. "Pat" Patterson, director of the camp and a member of the Montreal Rotary Club. Explaining that the camp was sponsored by the Montreal School for Crippled Children, Dr. Patterson said there were about 72 boys and girls there at the lake this summer, and that he felt that it was a grand thing to get them out of the city and into the country for at least a few weeks each year.

"The Montreal School for Crippled Children," said the speaker, "is often confused with the Children's Memorial Hospital, probably because of the close cooperation between the two. Actually they are two different organizations. The School for Crippled Children was founded 38 years ago, has about 185 students, and teaches grades one to ten. In the higher grades the emphasis is on practical commercial work, so as to train the boys and girls in such a manner that they can look after themselves.

"There are only two questions that we ask when we have an applicant for the school. Are they crippled, and can they be educated? We have children who suffer from almost all the known crippling diseases, from polio to hereditary troubles. Attendance at the school is rather erratic, as these young people must have hospital treatments, but we have a teacher in the Children's Memorial Hospital who tries to keep the young people abreast of their school work so far as is possible.

"Our funds," continued Dr. Patterson, "come from our annual Christmas appeal, our tag days, a 10 per cent grant from the Montreal Protestant School Board, and various other donations, including some from the Province of Quebec. This last sum has decreased in the current year, due to quirks in the law, but we are seeking ways of increasing it. There are, of course, donations from parents of the children, though they are not especially solicited, and most of them would be financially unable to give a very large amount.

"There are no fees from the children, the school is non-sectarian, and virtually all religions are represented among the young people.

"This is the first year of our camp here, and it was not started until June. There are many things to be done, much work that will have to be completed, and we hope to have more boys and girls here next summer."

Vice-president Rene Monty presided at the meeting, and the speaker was introduced by Arch Graham, with the thanks of the large group present being expressed by Vincent Davis. Many of the visitors looked over the grounds and buildings, talked with the children and the counselors, and went home with the impression that here was a wonderful example of service in action.

Music for singing was played by Miss Aline Ricard, and led by C. R. McLean. The splendid dinner was supplied by the staff of the school. Among the visiting Rotarians present were, Don Feltus of Maynard, Mass., Percy Proctor of Babylon, N.Y., George Wallace of Madison, N.J., Alton Clark and Roy Robert Tait of Sherbrooke.

The meeting of the club will be held next Monday evening at the Del Monty Hotel.

OWEN ALVA McLAUGHLIN OF FOSTER, QUE.

Foster, Quebec, August 18. — A large circle of relatives and friends were saddened to learn of the passing of Owen A. McLaughlin, which occurred on Saturday, August 4, after seven weeks of illness at his home here, at the age of eighty-three years.

The deceased was born in West Bolton in 1877, the son of John McLaughlin and his wife, Anne George. In 1887 he was married to Miss Mary Dryburg of Knowlton, who predeceased him in 1930. Of this union there is one daughter, (Hazel), Mrs. Hugh Miller of Sutton.

In 1939 he sold his farm in West Bolton and came to Foster to reside. The deceased was a member of the Church of England and served as councillor on the Village Council for a term.

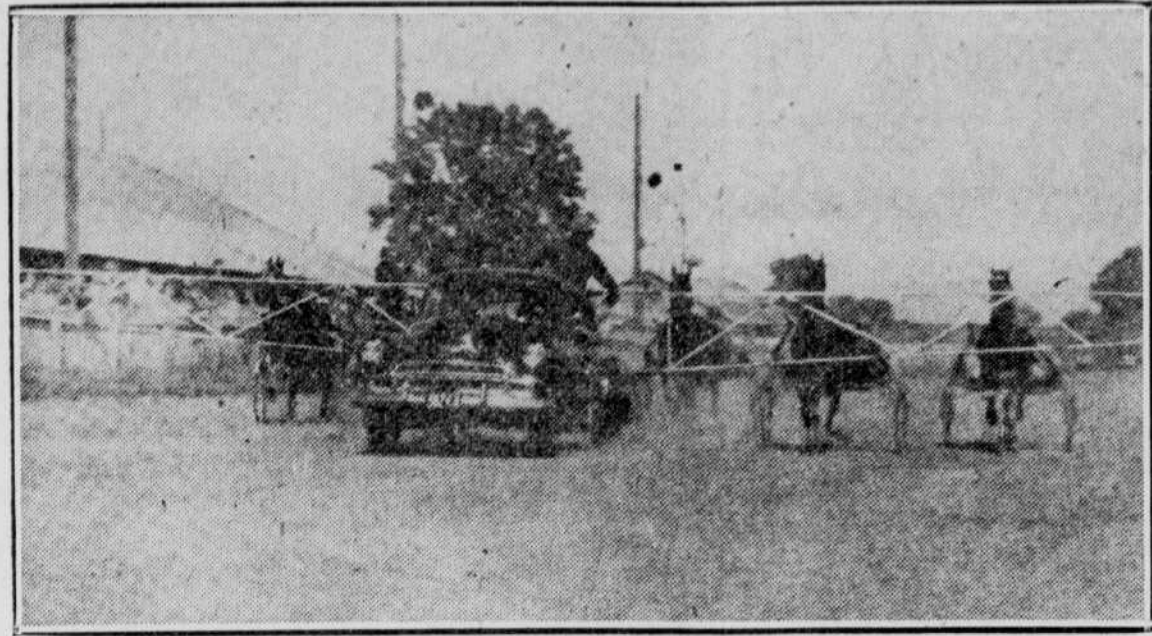

Grand Jury Indicts 11 On "Fixing" Charge

New York, Aug. 18. (AP) — The Bradley University basketball players and eight "fixers" — one of whom was described as a gunman and bank robber — were indicted yesterday in connection with the suspected fixing of key games.

The Bradley players named in the indictments were Eugene Melchiorre, an All-American star, William K. Mann, and George M. Chianakas.

District Attorney Frank Hogan, who has directed the investigation which has drawn six colleges and 31 players into the gambling scandal, said the group of "fixers" operated under the direction of Joseph Benintende, 41.

He termed him a gunman and said he was being sought under a nationwide alarm.

Hogan said that seven Bradley players in all were involved in the alleged fixing games but that only the three named in the indictments violated New York penal laws. Evidence concerning the other four will "presumably be submitted to the Grand Jury in Peoria, Ill."

Wagers as high as \$50,000 were placed by Benintende on a single Bradley game, Hogan said. Benintende travelled across the country to further his scheme to bribe the players to control the scores of games, he said.

Hall Of Fame Favored To Cop \$80,725 Derby

Chicago, Aug. 18. (AP) — Hall of Fame, seeking to clinch a bid for the year's three-year-old title, is favored to whip nine rivals in the 41st running of the historic \$80,725 American Derby today at Washington Park.

The Greentree Stable gelding won the Arlington Classic on his last trip to Chicago and is rated a 7-5 betting choice in today's 1 1/4-mile event.

U.S. Track Stars Set New Records In Japan

Sendai, Japan, Aug. 18. (AP) — Three new Japanese records-making six in two days — were set by touring United States track stars yesterday in winding up a two-day sweep of a good-will meet here.

The visitors set records yesterday in the 400-meter dash, discus throw and spring medley. Yesterday they hung up new Japanese marks in the 800-meter and 1,500-meter runs and 400-meter relay.

They won every event they entered both days.

Pretoria, South Africa, Aug. 18. (AP) — Lt.-Col. (Ian) DeJongh, South Africa's outstanding candidate for the 1952 Olympic team, was officially reported missing in action in Korea yesterday. He was serving with the South Africa Cheek Squadron of the United Nations Forces. He is believed to be a prisoner-of-war.

DeJongh is the British Empire and South African high jump champion and also the South African 120-yard high hurdle king.

Baseball Rated As Most Dangerous Sport In New York City For Past 32 Years; Tops List With 43 Deaths

Chicago, Aug. 18. (AP) — Baseball — not boxing or football — has been the most dangerous sport in New York City for the last 32 years.

Dr. Thomas A. Gonzales of the New York chief medical examiner's office said baseball injuries brought death to 43 players from 1918 through 1950 — as many as football and boxing deaths combined.

Writing in the journal of the American Medical Association, he presented this review of 104 fatal injuries resulting from sports activities during the period.

Baseball 43 deaths, football 22, boxing 21, basketball 7, handball 3, soccer 2, wrestling 2, cricket 1, golf 1, polo 1 and relay races 1.

Dr. Gonzales said that except for boxing death, fatal injuries in sports have received scant attention. He said:

"Most of the contributions in other sports refer to isolated instances of deaths in which the circumstances are purely accidental.
