Robinson, of 17 East 40th street, New York, and grandson of the late George I. Seney, the well known philanthropist, of Brooklyn, N.Y., was solemnized at the Congregational Church, Sherbrooke, to-day at high noon, the Rev. Mr. Day officiating.

The church was beautifully decorated and the ceremony was a brilliant one. The bride looked very charming, her beauty being adorned by a white liberty satin dress with incrustation lace over white chiffon; a coronet of orange blossoms and a tulle veil; in her hand she carried a shower bouquet of lilies of the valley and white sweet peas. The bride was given away by her brother, Mr. W. E. Paton of this city. P. Read of New York, and Mr. Herbert Larler of Montreal. On the entrance of the bridal party into the church, the strains of Wagner's Wedding March from Lohengrin arose from the organ at which Mr. E. Y.P.S.C.E. IS DECLINING.

Rev. F. J. Day Quotes Statistics To Congregational Union.

Toronto, June 10.—Rev. F. J. Day, of Sherbrooke, discussed the Christian Endeavor movement at the Congregational Union on Saturday. He said:—"Today the problem that we have to face was the weakening of the Christian Endeavor organization. Both in numbers and in interest there was a decline." At a meeting of the Endeavor Union of Quebec it was evident that there had been a weakening during the past two years. He had obtained figures from the statistical secretaries. Four years ago the Congregational Endeavor in Ontario numbered 1,908, now it was 943, a decrease of 49 per cent. In Quebec the figures were 563 and now 185, a decrease of 65 per cent. Four years ago the increase in membership in Ontario over the previous year was 22. This year the decrease over last year was 114. Four years ago in Quebec the increase over the previous year was 91, this year the decrease was 95. These figures spoke somewhat plainly about the position of the movement to-day.

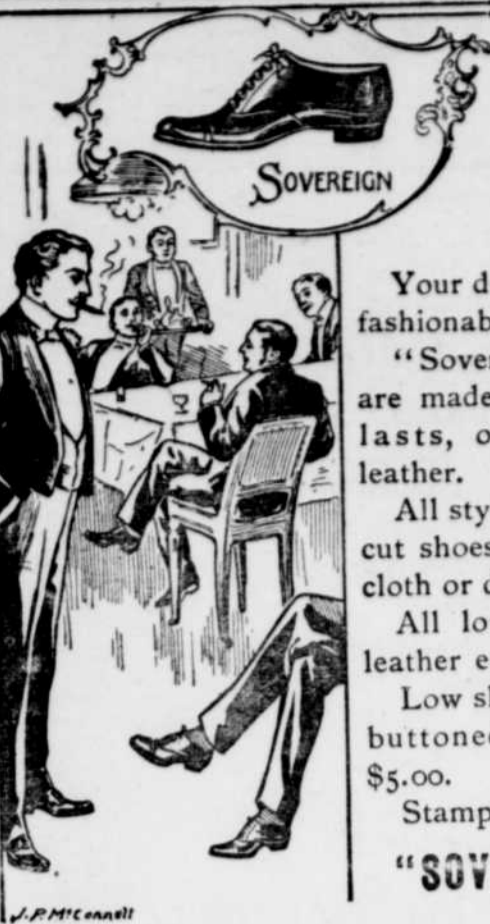

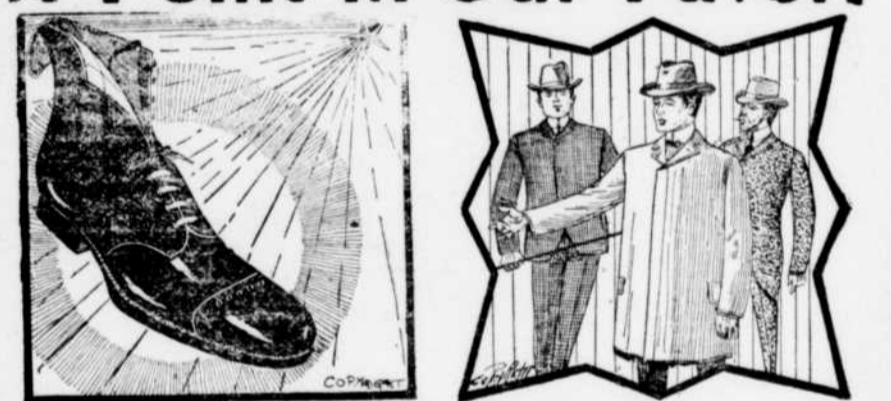

PRODUCE MARKET.

CHEESE. Montreal, June 11th 1901. Receipts of cheese yesterday were 20,057 boxes. The firm feeling noted last week developed into regular buoyancy to-day and the market has a strong upward tendency at the rise. The demand experienced also, is of a legitimate character, being due to the light stocks of cheese in Great Britain, and the light make of early fodder goods in Canada. At the wharf yesterday morning the offerings were 8,400 boxes, and all were cleaned up at 8 1/2c to 8 3/4c, the ruling price being 8 1/2c. This is an advance of 1/2c per pound on last week's basis. We quote prices for spot business as follows:—Ontario, 9 1/2c; Townships, 8 1/2c; and Quebec, 8 1/2c, with an upward tendency.

BUTTER. Receipts of butter were 1,388 packages. While this market is firm irregularity in the prices paid today. At the wharf the arrivals were about 900 packages, of which about 200 were sold to arrive on the basis of 18 1/2c. The unsold stock realized 19 1/2c on the wharf and it is claimed in some cases more, but the figure named was undoubtedly the ruling price, and there was business on the street in finest creamery below 19 1/2c.

EGGS. Receipts of eggs yesterday were 1,061 cases, against 1,067 on Saturday. There was no change in the condition of the market. The feeling was about steady, and the demand fair from the local buyers at 11c to 11 1/2c for No. 1, and at 9c to 9 1/2c for No. 2 per dozen.

MAPLE PRODUCTS. Business in maple product is quiet, owing to the fact, that buyers are pretty well supplied, and the consumption of the same is not large at this season. We quote: Syrup at 65c to 70c per tin of wine gallon, and at 90c to 95c per tin imperial gallon. In wood at 6 1/2c to 7c per lb. Sugar at 9c to 10c per pound.

HONEY. The demand for honey is also slow, and the market is very quiet, with no change in prices to note. We quote: White clover comb, 12 1/2c to 13c; white extract, 8 1/2c to 9c; buckwheat, in comb, 9c to 10c; and extracted, 8c to 8 1/2c.

Live Stock Market.

London, June 10—There was a firmer undertone to the market and prices show a slight improvement, as compared with a week ago. Choice States cattle sold at 12 1/2c, and Canadian stock ranged from 11 1/2c to 12c. There were no sheep on the market. Liverpool, June 10.—The trade in Canadian cattle was firmer, and choice stock sold 1/2 higher than a week ago at 12c, with medium at 11 1/2c.

Mayor McMorine was called to the chair and ably presided. Messrs. Summerhayes and E. King Dadds of Toronto, and a French Canadian gentleman from Coaticook represented the repeal side of the question. They were replied to by Messrs. Lambly, Nichols and Tanner, the latter gentleman speaking in French. Mr. Dadds made the speech of the evening from the repeal standpoint. As this meeting was called in the interests of the repealers, they would not give Mr. Nichols an opportunity to reply. He gave notice that he would hold a meeting here next Monday evening, when he would have ample opportunity to refute and point out the fallacies of Mr. Dadds' arguments. Both parties profess to be confident of victory on the 20th inst. Unfortunately for the cause of the prohibitionists, the Act has been openly violated in Windsor Mills, Asbestos and Richmond during the last two years, and for this reason many of the former supporters of the Act will either abstain from voting or cast their ballot in favor of repeal.

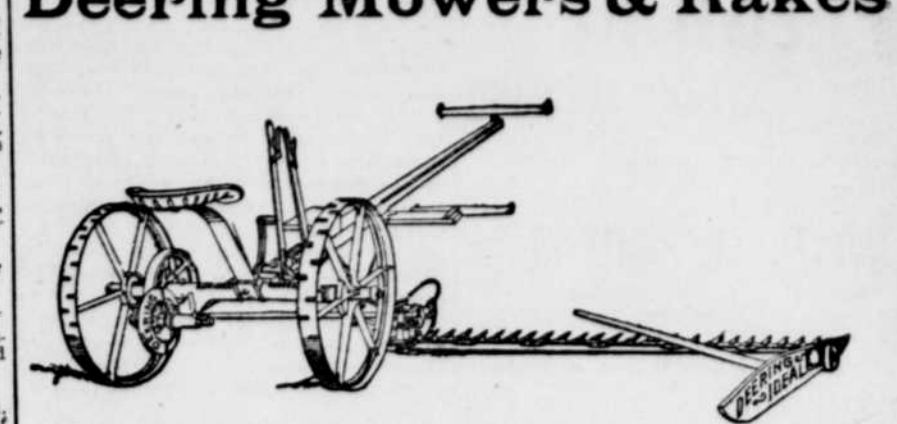
