## SHORTS "SQUEEZED" IN PACIFIC AND THE PRICE RAN UP FROM 122 TO 126 INSIDE OF TEN MINUTES

The local "Street" was full of "I told you so's" this morning. After the bear raid in Pacific in New York on Friday and Saturday, many became impressed with the belief that the shorts would have a run for their money on Monday—the first delivery day.

Some predicted as high as 125 for Pacific to-day, and they were not far astray.

Pacific opened in New York at 122 1/2 compared with 125, the lowest on Saturday. This indicated that the shorts were anxious to get a little later they were on the gallop.

In just seven minutes' time the price ran from 122 1/2 to 126, and the local bulls who would have seen a short promptly shook hands with themselves.

There was one big short account in New York, which it covered at around the top figures.

The main force of the buying being over, Pacific ran back rapidly and saw 125 1/2, but at that point the advance was 2 1/2 points over Saturday's close and 1/2 point over Saturday's lowest.

The sales of Pacific to noon in Wall Street amounted to 20,000 shares.

To some extent the Montreal market following Wall Street's lead in the Pacific firework. The price advanced here was 1 1/2 against 126 in Wall Street, but it was not difficult to see why the local market did not go the limit. If reports are true, and the Montreal interests are taking care of Pacific, they are certainly not worrying much about the Montreal market.

Canadian Pacific closed at 125 1/2 in London. Sales to noon were 40,000 shares.

Charles Head & Co.'s noon letter said: "Strong support was manifest in the stock market this morning and after a confused start, the market became regular opening, prices steadied and in some instances showed gains over Saturday's close. The squeeze of the shorts in C.P. was a feature, the stock selling as high as 125 and losing at 3-8 premium for the use. It sold off rapidly, however, after the more urgent demand was satisfied. Some new low records were established in the first 15 minutes but rallied quickly followed. London was a buyer to a moderate extent. The announcement that all clearing house sheets had gone through without trouble had a favorable effect. There is no disposition to buy stocks, however, and the only demand comes from the shorts who are still unsettled, and continued dullness and irregularity is expected."

### THE RAID ON CANADIAN PACIFIC AND THE QUESTION OF WHO DID THE BUYING.

Last week's raid on Canadian Pacific in Wall Street did not surprise Montrealers so much as did the question of where all the buying came from. Who bought the stock? What was the big question, and the support at times was so good that the belief was freely expressed here that Canadian interests were at the bottom of it, and that they were taking all the stock they could get on the "tip" that the dividend might be increased to 10 per cent. on this market. Whether or not this was an exceedingly interesting article on Pacific, in which it says: "One of the favorite short sales of the past two months has been Canadian Pacific. When 7 per cent. stocks like St. Paul were selling below 100 and 5 per cent. shares like Missouri Pacific below 90, it was argued with more or less reason that Canadian Pacific had no business to sell above 120. Moreover, as a stock which had not declined proportionately as much as the others, the drop was, or ought to have been, 'still to come.' The greater part of it is held in Great Britain and Canada. Investors abroad, and the Canadian friends, have been steadily accumulating it, and as for Canada, there isn't a Canadian with patriotism, sporting blood and a few dollars that has not been long of it all along these past two years. They are great holders in the past, and they are becoming more and more so. The Dominion's future development. They seem to be more tenacious than local speculators, and as the decline has not shaken out as many of them as might have been expected, the New York bears made the mistake of over-estimating the floating supply available for sale in this market. When a short interest was formed, the stock loan at a premium all New York street indignantly accused the 'pool.' But the earnings continue to show remarkable gains, and as for land sales, there is a young New York capitalist who went out on a shooting expedition to Canada, and all the time he was out he was buying up the stock. He acquired a big block, paid for it, and looks forward to a huge profit. He is not a man to be trifled with, and yesterday's tip was widely distributed. The stock was sure to break 120, but the 'turn' was to be for only two or three points, and the market slightly below that. None the less, the room expects lower prices, and points with pride to the break in Missouri Pacific, after holding so well throughout the 'slump.'"

The market expects a full dividend on second preference stocks, nothing on thirds, and the carrying forward of \$25,000.

### A Brief Word to Investors.

New York Evening Post. In the confusion, anxiety and apprehension which the investment markets, one fact stands forth unquestioned. It is this: It is an unfortunate tradition of the markets that the public habitually buys at top prices, and sells at low levels of depression. The greater the action is as senseless as the other, combined with the mean heavy and repeated losses to outside investors. It is time to warn the owners of investment securities, most of whom are not professional investors. With all its obscure elements, the situation is a whole in plain. People who make a business of dealing in securities have bought too many on borrowed money and have paid too much for what they bought. We are very certain that the securities are intrinsically at least as valuable as they were in the "boom days" of a year ago, that the owners of property, and other holders are being forced to liquidate, and that if the market, public, and the stock market, the stock market will prove only a temporary danger point.
