THE Commissioners for Internal Communications for the county of Dorchester, and for that part of the county of Buckinghamshire lying in the district of Québec, will receive Proposals for the following objects, viz. :

10. For the erection of a Bridge on the grand River Duchêne at the part called the Carrying Place, in the Parish of Lotbinière, in the County of Buckinghamshire, and for making and easing the hills leading there to. Those proposals must be accompanied by a plan.

20. To finish and complete the road leading from the Township of Leeds, that is to say, from Craig road to the Township of Broughton, passing across the said Township of Broughton and running from the said Township to the Parish of St. Joseph to the river Chaudière, partly in the County of Buckinghamshire, and partly in the County of Dorchester, viz. The said road to be made eighteen feet wide, with causeways of twelve feet, and ditches on each side of three feet wide, the earth of which to be thrown and spread on the middle of the road, also the timber to be cut down eighteen feet wide on each side, in order that there may be an opening of sixty feet.

30. To finish and complete eleven miles of Road leading from the interior of the Township of Frampton to St. Therese, in the County of Dorchester, viz. to cut down 48 feet of wood along the said road, to give it an opening of 60 feet; to enlarge, to the extent of 18 feet, the part of the said road meant for the passing of carriages, to take away all stumps and other obstructions; and to make a ditch of three feet wide on each side of the road, of which the earth must be thrown and spread on the middle of the road.

Sent proposals for the said works, will be received by the said Commissioners at their office at Québec, from this day to Monday the 18th of August next, at ten o'clock in the morning. The Proposals to mention the time when the Contractors propose to deliver their works. Intelligence never attended to.

Nothing perhaps is a better representative of human life than the pages of a newspaper.—In one department are to be discovered insurrections and revolutions abroad, in another, murders and confagurations at home—in one part, we notice all the volatile foreign rumors; and in the same column a grave official public document—then a little light-winged poetry, a pulling sonnet addressed by a lover to his mistress' eyebrow; then some specimen of party gladiatorialship—some poetical cut and thrust—then some short dissertation on morality—and then importunate advertisements, where all the comforts, necessities and superfluities of life, are carefully deposited in a page by themselves, as if neither war abroad, or outrages at home; as if neither politics, nor poetry, nor morality, should dare to interfere in a matter of so much more importance, as the acquisition of money. In the midst of all this rumor and bustle, and clamor, and rage of speculation, a little article comprehending four or five lines, is devoted to the intelligence that an immortal soul has taken its flight to its Creator, and is now awaiting his judgement. Room is hardly left for the communication of such intelligence, and it is passed over by the eye of the reader, as matter too insignificant to detain his attention for a moment.

How faithfully does this mirror reflect human life as it is now passing before us; if we but cast our eyes from the window, we behold the scenes—stores crowded with merchandise—the crier with his ostentatious bell announcing an auction—We hear the incessant roar of the drays over the pavement, as if a moment was not to be lost in acquiring money—the chariot of pleasure decorated with the smiles of female beauty, rolling in the streets; knots of quidnuncs at every turn and corner, anxious to hear or to communicate the floating rumors of the day—stately and magnificent mansions rising from the ground, and preparations making for future grandeur and magnificence—all these are confronted by the Hearse, which passes along neglected, and if the woe should happen to encounter the chariot of dissipation, it would excite no other emotion than that of impatience for the stopping of the carriage. That all this animating spectacle, is to be brought to this silent mass of dust and ashes, seems to bear the character of romance; it is mingled with our belief of giants and fairies, or some incredible tale, not worthy of a moment's regard.—the colu is suffered to pass, and with the spectacle, our memory of it likewise, passes away.

LONDON, May 22.

Accounts had reached London from Cadiz, stat-

ing that the British vice consul and several other British subjects and foreigners, had been murdered at Algiers.

Within the last fourteen days upwards of seventy one thousand five hundred barrels American flour were imported into this port.

May 29.—The marriage of her Imperial Highness the Archduchess Leopoldine of Austria, with the Prince Royal of the United Kingdom of Portugal, the Brazils, and the Algarves, was celebrated on the 13th inst. at Vienna. His Imperial Highness the Archduke Charles represented the Prince. After the ceremony, there was a splendid Court, like that of a New Year's Day, or the Emperor's Birth Day, followed by a splendid entertainment.

A destructive fire broke out at Birmingham, May 22, which destroyed property to the value of 200,000l.

May 30.—We learn from unquestionable authority, that the Speaker of the House of Commons will this day announce his resignation of that office, which he has filled for upwards of fifteen years, in a manner the most satisfactory to that House, and to the Public, and most honorably to himself. Mr. Manners Sutton, eldest son of the Archbishop of Canterbury, is, as we have heard, to be proposed to succeed him.

Business is very brisk in the city. Large orders have been given within these two days for goods to be exported, and the demand for vessels is greater than has been known for many months.

A treaty has been on foot for some time between Mr. Kean, of Drury Lane Theatre, and Mr. Holman, the manager of an American Theatre for Mr. Kean's performances for one year in the United States. The only point not settled is the security. Mr. Kean wishing to have the stipulated sum secured in a banking house in this city.

THE TUNISIAN CORSAIRS.

The extraordinary appearance of these daring depredators on our coast has excited great and general surprize. The visitation is, we believe without a precedent. Cape Finisterre has been the utmost limit of their cruize on this side of the world until the present moment. Why they have ventured into these northern latitudes with craft ill fitted for those boisterous seas, and sea-men ignorant of our coast, may perhaps be explained by the recent arrangements made with the Barbary Powers. The Mediterranean has been long their cruising ground, and the commerce of its islands and of the opposite coasts of Europe their prey. The little towns upon the coasts within this range, exposed to their attacks, lived in constant terror. The approach of a Barbary corsair was the visit of a hawk pouncing upon a flock of tame fowl, with unrelenting talons. By the recent arrangements however, all the little Italian and other States have been released from the fell grasp of these marauders. Their old cruising ground is converted into a preserve, and these poachers living by plunder, are driven by necessity, into new and hitherto unknown quarters in search of game. By their principles and practice they consider themselves in a state of war with every nation that does not conciliate them by some favour or cession. Denmark and Sweden at this moment submit to pay them tribute. Accordingly, the aggression and hostilities which they have hitherto exercised upon the little Italian states, they have now transferred to the little free towns in the northern seas, the Oldenburghers, the Papingers, &c. This system, however cannot be tolerated, and the arrangement made for the security of the commerce of the Mediterranean must be extended to that of the German Ocean. We trust that this will be effected without involving us in hostilities with the Barbary States.

BOSTON, July 17th.

From HALIFAX.—An arrival from this place brings papers to the 2d inst. On the 24th June, the Lieut. Gov. issued the following order:

(CIRCULAR.)

Secretary's Office, Halifax, June 24, 1817.

Rear Admiral Sir David Milne having communicated to His Excellency the Lt. Governor, that the American government had declined to accede to the propositions which had been made to them by His Majesty's Government for the purpose of endeavouring to frame some arrangements, by which the citizens of the United States of America might be permitted to a participation of the fisheries within the limits of a British jurisdiction. I have it in command from his Excellency the Lt. Governor to apprise you that American fishermen are not permitted to frequent the harbours, bays or creeks of this province, unless driven in by actual distress; and I have to desire that you, on no account, ask or receive any light money, anchorage, or any other fee whatsoever, for vessels belonging to American subjects.

A "true born Englishman" has no idea of the ardent enthusiasm of the Italians, in their veneration for the production of ancient art.—Many persons went from Rome to Civita Vecchia, a distance of 59 miles, to hail the arrival of the English ship, which brought their celebrated pictures and statues from Antwerp, whither they had been sent from Paris. The venerable Cardinal Gonsalvi, the Roman Secretary of State, was sent by his Holiness for the same purpose, and on his arrival on board, accompanied by the Governor of Civita Vecchia, and other distinguished persons, under a salute from the ship, which was returned by the Fort. Till that auspicious day the weather had been very boisterous, but on the first gale being hoisted from the ship, containing the magnificent colossal statue called the Nile, a salute of 15 guns was fired from the fort, and the sea became instantly calm! It was remarked that the moment the Nile appeared on the deck, the wind abated, and when it landed, a French schooner which had just entered the harbour got aground! Such were the observations which the superstition of the people made on the influence of the Gods of the Nile, and they were confirmed by the opinion of the Cardinal! His eminence, by command of the Pope, invited the Captain and principal officers to visit Rome, where they were received and treated with every mark of regard by his Holiness, who presented each of the officers with a casket of jewels; he ordered rings to be given to the petty officers, and a silver medal to each of the seamen with 400 sequins in money, to be distributed among them.

After landing his precious cargo, which occupied four days, the Capt. gave a ball to the ladies on board. Many of them had come from Rome, but the Gods were not so propitious to them as they had been to the Nile—the sea became rough, and but few ventured to quit the shore—but those who did and joined in the dance were not a little amused with Jack's active and strenuous efforts in waltzing. The Governor obligingly furnished the band of music which consisted of three violins, two flutes, one clarinet and four guitars. A Roman

lady, with great naïveté, asked the Captain if the English had any more such large ships, which question the Captain very characteristically answered by putting Steel's list of the British Navy into her hands.

On quitting the ship the sailors gave three cheers to the ladies, very much to their astonishment.—From Civita Vecchia they proceeded to Leghorn, where the cases containing the caskets, &c. for the Prince Regent, were embarked. The Ex-Empress Maria Louisa, being then at Leghorn, she went to the roads in a pinnace to view the English ship, but did not go on board. On her name being announced, all hands crowded to the side, and generously saluted her with three cheers in the English style—which her Royal Highness acknowledged by standing up, and treating Jack with three of her best curries!

During the time the ship remained at Civita Vecchia, they were abundantly supplied with fresh provisions, wines, fruit and vegetables, by the Governor, and the Captain and Officers were every where received with high favours by all ranks, from their arrival till their departure.

EXTRAORDINARY CASE OF MEMORY.

From a New-York Paper.

The *Medical Repository* furnishes the following singular article, communicated by Dr. Mitchell to the Rev. Dr. Nott, dated January, 1816:

Whilst I was employed, early in December 1815, with several other gentlemen, in doing the duty of a visitor to the United States Military Academy at West Point, a very extraordinary case of double consciousness, in a woman, was related to me by one of the Professors—Major Ellicott, who so worthily occupies the mathematical chair in the seminary, vouched for the correctness of the following narrative, the subject of which is related to him by blood, and an inhabitant of the Western counties of Pennsylvania:—

Miss R—possessed naturally a very good constitution, and was arrived at adult age without having it impaired by disease. She possessed an excellent capacity, and enjoyed fair opportunities to acquire knowledge. Besides the domestic arts and social attainments, she had improved her mind by reading and conversation. Her memory was capacious, and stored with a copious stock of ideas.—Unexpectedly, and without any forewarning, she fell into a profound sleep, which continued several hours beyond the ordinary term. On waking she was discovered to have lost every trait of acquired knowledge. Her memory was *tabula rasa*—all vestiges, both of words and things, were obliterated and gone. It was found necessary for her to learn every thing again.—She even acquired, by new efforts, the arts of spelling, reading, writing, and calculating, and gradually became acquainted with the persons and objects around, like a being for the first time brought into the world. In these exercises she made considerable proficiency. But, after a few months, another fit of somnolency invaded her. On rousing from it she found herself restored to the state she was before the first paroxysm; but was wholly ignorant of every event and occurrence that had befallen her afterwards. The former condition of her existence she now calls the old state, and the latter the new state; and she is as unconscious of her double character, as two distinct persons are of their respective natures. For example, in her old state she possesses all her original knowledge; in her new state only what she has acquired since. If a gentleman or lady be introduced to her in the old state, and vice versa, and so of all matters, to know them satisfactorily she must learn them in both states. In the old state she possesses fine powers of penmanship—while in the new, she writes a poor and awkward hand having not had time or means to become expert.

During four years and upwards, she has undergone periodical transitions from one of these states to the other. The alterations are always consequent upon a long and sound sleep. Both the Lady and her family are now capable of conducting the affair without embarrassment. By simply knowing whether she is in the old or new state, they regulate their intercourse, and govern themselves accordingly.—A history of her curious case is drawing up by the Rev. Timothy Aldid, of Meadville.

QUEBEC, JULY 29, 1817.

NO later dates have reached us from Europe since our last. The Catholic question has been laid at rest in the British House of Commons, for the present, by a very small majority. The question was, whether the House should go into a committee on the subject, which was lost. How much longer this subject is to divide the nation, we know not; but we cannot help deploring that Religion should, in any country, but particularly in a free one, be considered as an obstacle to any political or civil rights. If, however, any particular religion have a tendency to let into a State the influence of a foreign jurisdiction, it is but fair that proper precautions should be taken against such tendency. But the subject is a delicate one; and therefore we restrain the pen from entering any farther into it.

Sir GREGOR M'GREGOR, it appears, has taken possession of Amelia Island, and has set up his standard in East Florida. While the sovereigns of Europe are endeavouring to fasten their crowns to their heads, by every means they can devise, and are making the eastern world wholly monarchical, a counterpoise of Republicanism appears to be daily adding to its weight in the western hemisphere.—So is the world checked and balanced.—Every where power, whether monarchical or republican, must soon or late, have its reasonable bounds, and moderation for its base. There is such a light, and such a spirit pervading the earth, as must eventually have the effect of moulding Governments into a form best suited the great object of their institution—Protection.

It appears that the Americans have made a beginning in their great Western Canal. It was commenced on the Anniversary of their Revolution at Rome, in the county of Oneida. They certainly have begun it at an auspicious period, as the number of poor emigrants from Europe that have lately arrived in the States, in a state of distress, must enable them to procure labour at a low price; and cheap labour must be a great object in an undertaking of that magnitude. It must, however, be a work of time; and how many stoppages it may have in its progress, is not for us to calculate. The Americans, however, do not want for perseverance.

All accounts agree that, from Detroit downwards, a more luxuriant crop than the Canadas at present present, is not within the memory of the oldest in the country. This is a blessing for which all must be grateful.

The election for the county of Quebec is carrying on with great animation and spirit. The event as yet hangs doubtful, though Mr. Neilson has had a considerable start. The poll of this day, we suppose, will go near to enable us to form a tolerable idea who will be the successful candidate.

Our metropolitan church is receiving an additional and more elevated roof, so as more easily to reject the rain and snow, by which the congregation has been too often inundated. It will, we understand, be thoroughly repaired and properly inclosed, so as to exclude fish and indecency, for which the church ground has been so long distinguished.

By the arrival of the May mail yesterday, we have been enabled to take a further view of the Proceedings in Parliament, on the Catholic question; and, from the sentiments expressed by Lord Castlereagh on the subject, there is ground to believe that the question will ere long be successfully renewed, so as to admit Catholics to seats in Parliament, and to all other privileges of British subjects, equally with Protestants.
