

City tells Quebec: 'Take ramp'

Westmount has officially told Quebec in effect to take its Trans-Canada Highway access ramp and either cancel it or move it elsewhere.

Tuesday night's formal resolution moved by Planning and Redevelopment Commissioner, Architect and Alderman Charles Aspler and seconded by Lawyer-Alderman Douglas Robertson, who is a near-resident of the affected area, witnessed one of city council's rare public dissents by one of its number.

Public Service Commissioner Ald. John E. Birks, with some vehemence, declared in advance he would vote against the motion. He saw federal involvement in the highway which, said, must have ramps.

"We wouldn't get roads anywhere" if local authorities had the power of vote, he declared. "We must take the bigger view: the good of many and not of the few."

However, his five council colleagues obviously disagreed, voting for the proposition that the section east of Greene avenue, between Selby and St. Antoine streets, "constitutes a viable residential area of low-cost housing which ought to be conserved" but that the proposed ramp would "render the future of the area as a residential area untenable."

14-point agenda

The matter was opened as an item which came fifth in a 14-point agenda, covered in a 42-minute mid-month meeting.

Mayor Peter M. McEntyre was reporting on latest developments regarding the ramp. He related how, upon learning a week ago last Monday that the provincial roads department intended to wipe out the residences of 30 families on the east side of Greene, he contacted Hon. Kevin Drummond, MPQ for West-

The East-West Autoroute

I sometimes feel that in the best of worlds cars would be prohibited in cities and that a combination of an efficient public transportation system plus, hopefully, an increasing desire on the part of the population to take up walking again would adequately handle the problem.

Unfortunately, the automobile is very much a part of our lives and, to most, has become a necessity rather than a luxury. One only needs to look at the parking lot of any industrial concern to discern that not only the rich rely on cars.

This being the case, I think it will be accepted that any city's transportation system must take into account the needs of motorists as well as others. People want to drive their own cars no matter what, and no amount of moralizing will change this. In addition, further punitive

The Trans-Canada Highway

In following the rapid and confusing events surrounding the construction of the section of the Trans-Canada Highway which passes through the lower part of Westmount, I feel that the state of confusion which I am sure many Westmounters are in might be partially alleviated if I explain the responsibility of the federal government in this affair.

This government's role dates back to the signing of the "Trans-Canada Highway Agreement" with the provinces nearly 20 years ago.

Under the terms of this contract, the federal government agreed to help finance the construction of the highway to the tune of anywhere between 50 percent and 90 percent of the total cost, depending upon the province. The total federal contribution up until Dec. 31, 1970 when the agreement formally lapsed, amounted to some \$875 million.

However, in view of the fact that certain sections of the highway still have not reached completion, the federal govern-

ment is prepared to continue subsidizing its construction in those provinces who so desire. Quebec is one such province.

Too much freedom:

4424 Inc. youths opt for structured setup

After months of experimenting with absolute freedom and almost total lack of structure, Westmount's youth centre at 4424 St. Catherine street west is heading in a whole new direction.

At an end-of-year evaluation meeting, members of the advisory board (adults) and members of the centre (youths) decided that too much freedom—like too much water for budding plants—can destroy rather than bring to bloom.

"It was an incredibly mature decision to come from the kids," said Rina Fraticelli, co-director of the youth centre. "They've gone through a tremendous maturing process. The centre has given them a chance to find out what's involved with freedom and they've found that responsibility and discipline go hand and hand with it."

The centre now plans to have six adult craftsmen use the centre as a workshop, rent free, in exchange for teaching the youths crafts. One craftsman, a candle maker, Paddy Johnston, 21, 1193 Sussex street, Montreal, moved in this week.

May take a long time

It may take a long time for the centre to find the right kind of persons," said Miss Fraticelli, "but we're not in a hurry. We would rather wait and get the right type of person - someone who is involved in his craft, who really wants to teach it and who can work in a fairly unstructured environment."

The centre is looking for persons experienced in trades such as leather working, pottery making, weaving and copper enameling.

The training the craftsmen will give the youths is not intended to be in the form of highly organized or highly structured programs. "Our most successful programs so far have been highly spontaneous," said Miss Fraticelli.

There has been no change in the programs being run by the youths themselves. The coffee shop, music co-op, modern dance class and karate class continue.

The centre is now in need of craft equipment: leather tools, enameling equipment, wax, wool etc.

Local police raid in Montreal nips four cases

As a result of a raid by Westmount detectives on a MacKay street, Montreal, apartment, a theft of credit cards from a car in Westmount plus two similar cases in St. Laurent and one in Montreal were cleared up last week.

Dugal Daniel, 23, was arrested in the Jan. 11 raid and yesterday in Court of Sessions downtown he pleaded guilty on all four counts, receiving a month's imprisonment on each.

The raid resulted from "information" received by Westmount Police.

mount, and attempted to reach Municipal Affairs Minister Maurice Tessier and Roads Minister Bernard Pinard, urgently seeking yet another meeting with the Quebec authorities.

It turned out that Mr. Pinard was about to depart on a two-week vacation. The result was a meeting between senior officials of Mr. Pinard's department and the city team of the mayor, general manager, director of services and acting city engineer last Friday afternoon.

This session consisted, the mayor reported, of a series of questions from the city and technical answers from the departmental chiefs. No change in the roads people's attitude was effected, though His Worship acknowledged that explanations were given.

(The mayor was asked after Tuesday night's Council meeting if there had been any explanation

RESOLUTION RE. RAMP

WHEREAS in the opinion of the Council of the City of Westmount, based upon recommendations submitted by the Architectural and Planning Commission, the area of the City situated below the Canadian Pacific Railway right-of-way, between Hollowell and Atwater streets constitutes a viable residential area of low-cost housing which ought to be conserved and

WHEREAS the access ramp to the Trans Canada Highway as proposed by the Quebec Roads Department for the vicinity of Greene avenue will result in the expropriation and demolition of all of the residential dwellings on the east side of Greene Avenue between Selby and St. Antoine streets, displacing approximately 30 families and will have an adverse affect on the remaining dwellings which will render the future of the area as a residential area untenable

THEREFORE be it resolved THAT the Council of the City of Westmount opposes the construction of any access ramp in the City which will destroy existing residential dwellings, displace residents, or adversely affect any residential neighborhood, and urges the Quebec Roads Department to either cancel the proposed ramp, or remove it to a location which will not have any of the above effects.

given for the erroneous information which had led to Mr. McEntyre's television announcement that only three houses, on Greene avenue, would be expropriated when in fact the whole block on Greene was to go. It was suggested that it was meant to mean "three more houses." The Examiner and city hall both were told, simply, by two provincial officials, "three houses," which were described as two at the corner of Selby and one at St. Antoine.)

Discussion closes

The meeting ended on "a note of difference of opinion" and it was agreed nothing was to be gained from continuing the discussion.

Monday a further meeting was held with the province's consulting engineers and representatives of the Montreal planning department. Essentially the same answers were received.

The mayor had meanwhile been in further touch with Mr. Drummond and a meeting with Municipal Affairs Minister Tessier was set up for yesterday afternoon, the mayor concluded.

It was at this point that Mr. McEntyre invited Ald. Aspler to present his resolution and Mr. Birks voiced his opposition.

Ald. Jean Richer questioned

the wisdom of an access ramp so close to the heart of Montreal which, he thought, would lead to overloading of the highway within a few months of its opening. He questioned the official "overview." The City of Westmount does not oppose the highway itself—only the ramp, which was being proceeded with despite the city's representations. The stand taken was a good one for Westmount to take, he added, and the resolution deserved support.

Ald. Robertson said he would like to have an attorney's opinion on the relationship between the city's financial responsibility for the ramp and the fact that the city does not want it.

"A moral thing"

Ald. Aspler did not think financial and like considerations should be raised. "It is a moral thing," he asserted.

And Ald. Ian Craig said he did not think the highway needed "that many ramps."

There were only 10 persons in

the audience, though extra chairs had been set out in anticipation of a possible large influx of affected residents and others interested in the issue.

Later, following adjournment of the formal session, only two questions came when invited from the floor.

One man asked if the city's own engineers had been unable to find another place where the ramp could be placed. The mayor explained that the highway runs, in fact, only a relative short distance through Westmount, from Hollowell to Atwater avenue, and an exit ramp was also being built at Hollowell.

And F.A. Leclaire, spokesman for Lower Westmount residents, said he was cheered by council's resolution. He suggested to the mayor that in his meeting with Mr. Tessier the following day he should ask to have the area designated for rehabilitation and thus bring protection to the residents from the minister of municipal affairs.

That was it, the meeting which began promptly at 8 pm concluded at 8:46 pm.

How about 'Bourgs'?

Island mayors, aldermen invited here Tuesday to get Westmount staff ideas on MUC's future

If the ideas of Westmount city hall senior staff group were adopted by Montreal Urban Community members—and they are to be exposed to the local professional public administrators' thoughts in an audio-visual presentation at Victoria Hall on Tuesday—there would be a major regrouping of municipalities into "bourgs."

Invitations were going out this week from Mayor Peter M. McEntyre's office to every mayor and alderman or councillor on the Island of Montreal—some 250 persons—to come here Tuesday at 5 pm to see a sound film, commissioned by the city but produced largely on their own time by Westmount officials. It runs 30 minutes in English and similarly in French. Both will be shown.

The mayor told reporters this week that neither he nor his own aldermen had yet seen the film, though they had viewed a series of slides some time ago on which the final presentation is based. Thus the ideas do not necessarily have any official approval, though the staff work and undisclosed expenditure on the final film had council blessing.

Bilingual name

The term "bourg" was a deliberate choice after long study, having a historic and honorable use in European place names and regarded as particularly apt in the bilingual milieu here.

Said Mr. McEntyre: "The film doesn't give the answers—it asks the questions."

It is entitled: "Can Montreal Island Be Governed?"

General Manager Norman Dawe, who headed the team, said that the slides had been shown to a group of eight other city managers who had expressed great interest.

In a covering memorandum to the presentation, Mr. Dawe says:

“In May 1970 the executive committee of the Montreal Urban Community invited all members of the Community Council to forward suggestions or recommendations which would contribute to the implementation of the Montreal Urban Community Act.

As a result of this invitation, the general manager and senior staff began work on the revision

of a plan originally drafted in 1965-66 for the establishment of municipal boundaries and a form of government for the Island of Montreal.

On Dec. 4, 1970, the Mayor of the City of Westmount received another invitation from the Executive Committee to submit any suggestions which the Council of the City of Westmount wished to make concerning amendments to the existing Montreal Urban Community Act.

It is hoped that the staff presentation dealing with the Island's municipal boundaries and its form of government,

while not necessarily being advocated by the Council of the City of Westmount, will provide the City with the means of making a contribution in answer to both the May and December requests.

It is understood that the presentation will not be accepted in its present form by several of the communities. However, it has been prepared in order to provide what is believed to be a practicable basis for discussion. The executive team which developed the plan are very aware of the limitations which it contains.

In preliminary showings to date the original slide presentation has been very well received and in instances where criticism has been raised concerning specific elements of the plan, the critic has been invited to contribute an improvement.

In this manner it is possible that our submission may well provide the foundation document for the structure of a sound island government.”

We Say

Trans-Canada is needed, too

TRANS-CANADA highway opponents, in both Westmount and Montreal, have been getting much ink and air. They have plausible arguments against slicing the new route through the urban heart from Turcot interchange to Lafontaine tunnel. Rightly they are concerned with people: loss of homes, effect on adjoining environment, other pressing social needs. But there is another viewpoint, supported by at least as many factors which favor getting on with the artery. These, too, have to do with people. It is popular to condemn the automobile. But what about the motorist?

+ + +

THE MOTORIST, as citizen, has rights too. He pays heavily through license fees and extraordinarily loaded taxes on gasoline, and he supports a far-reaching segment of the job-making economy—the automobile industry with its countless manufacturing and servicing businesses and trades.

Doubtless, many of those persons living in or adjacent to the projected path of the Trans-Canada owe their very livelihoods to the automobile and the truck.

At least, a high proportion are themselves private drivers. So, before condemning the highway completely, all should weigh carefully the effect.

+ + +

FROM where we sit, on St. Catherine street, we observe a twice-daily demonstration of folly.

Hundreds of motorists inching east in the morning, west at night, crawling with idling, polluting engines to and from their work.

The scene is repeated on Sherbrooke street and The Boulevard and on westbound de Maisonneuve boulevard and St. Antoine street at night.

Beyond Westmount's borders, it is even worse, as users of Cote des Neiges, the Metropolitan and the Bonaventure, for example, can testify.

Why?

Because there is insufficient road space for the sheer volume of vehicles.

It is conventional wisdom to argue that new arteries simply encourage more traffic—partly true. The other, more compelling reason for traffic increase is urban growth. The car and the truck continue to be for the present, the most convenient way to move people and things between their multitudes of respective "As" and "Bs", which in turn proliferate with growing numbers of people, businesses, industries and homes.

+ + +

THERE is little argument against seeking alternatives to automobiles in urban centres. The Metro extensions have widespread support and both the Montreal Urban Community and the province are committed to them. Better use could be made of railway lines. Overhead monorails should be considered.

But even these are not substitutes for the car and the truck.

However convenient and attractive may be alternatives, the private and business vehicle always will be with us and no doubt in growing numbers. Witness London, Paris and other cities with extensive subway systems.

The trick is not to go overboard with one form of travel versus another.

And what we fear from the Trans-Canada opponents is that they say: don't build it, push Metro instead.

The fact is, we need both. And badly, too.

+ + +

IT IS a great mistake to make Trans-Canada planning the

whipping boy for our social ills. Indeed, the provincial roads department has been painted as the culprit, when in fact the problems of housing, other transport forms, the environment and so forth belong more squarely on the shoulders of other departments or government as a whole.

We still say the roads department, from Minister Pinard down, is guilty of atrocious public relations and communications within itself and with others, particularly with the City of Westmount.

But those of us born and brought up in this province must point with great pride to the giant strides made, in little more than a decade, in bringing Quebec highways out of the horse and buggy days.

The ubiquitous motorist is, at last, getting something like an even break.

The spurs of Expo, and now of St. Scholastique, to highway facilities are to be welcomed and not condemned.

A direct autoroute to and through downtown Montreal is to be welcomed and not condemned. Concern over dislocation to the least number of people, their homes and environment is to be welcomed, but the highway itself is not to be condemned. We urgently need Metro extensions, more decent housing, sewage treatment, more jobs—and the new, long-overdue Trans-Canada route.

Objects to term 'Anti-union group'

Sir: As a member of the so-called "Anti-Union Group" headlined in the Jan. 15 issue, I object strongly to the appellation.

The Council for the Faith is not against union: we do not think that this present scheme of union is good enough, and feel that at this point unity in grace, charity and action is more important than unity in worship or administration as long as so many differences exist within both the churches involved as well as between them.

We are engaged in examining the proposals made by the General Commission on Church Union, and in making constructive criticisms thereof.

that the pollution emanating from traffic circulating freely on an autoroute is, according to my informants, far less than that produced in a traffic jam.

Was near-future project

While the east-west autoroute might not have been considered an absolute priority, it is none the less a highway priority which was scheduled to go through, in the near future.

What advanced the decision to go ahead was obviously the fact that it was ready to proceed immediately and would instantly create jobs in an area where jobs are needed and at a time when unemployment is at a peak.

Obviously, such construction creates certain social problems—any new construction in the heart of a city invariably does—but to accuse the government of having no social conscience doesn't seem to hold water. One only has to look at the education, health and welfare budgets to measure the social conscience of succeeding provincial governments. The passage of medicare was another step toward social justice.

At any rate, every effort is being made to keep social dislocation at a minimum and the government is offering every assistance in the problem of relocation—where dislocation occurs. As well, changes in the actual plan are being considered so as to further reduce social malaise.

Doesn't like ramp

To get down to local factors, I don't like the idea of a ramp in Westmount any more than most of this paper's readers. While I might not have been trumpeting my opinions to everyone in sight, I have nevertheless discussed the situation with certain interested groups within the riding and arranged meetings with government authorities, and have spoken with Mr. Pinard on a number of occasions.

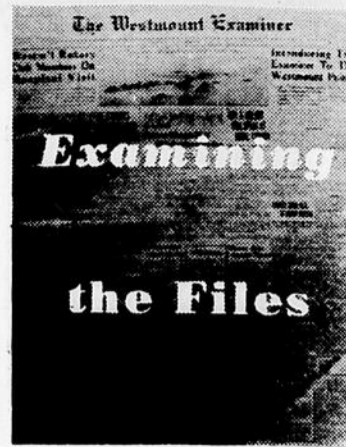

Dawson (at last) has student government

By GASTON CAMPEAU

Dawson college now has a student government, though the active interest on the part of the students was negligible. It took from October to December to find students interested enough in representing their student body, and for students to vote on the representatives.

The government has three main bodies, the Representative Council, the Executive Council and the Student Activities Council.

In the Representative Council a delegate is elected for every 75 students from each academic flow. In addition they control the activities of the college.

The Executive Council is made up of five secretaries who each have an equal vote, a term of office for one year, and they chair

the meetings of the Representative Council.

The Student Activities Council consists of 11 non-designated members who are responsible for extra-curricular activities in which they examine all clubs.

These three bodies have the power to distribute the \$22 fee which each student pays annually. This money is for student activities in the college, and is to be distributed to the groups and clubs that want support from the student government.

Terry Reagan, the secretary of academic concern for students, explained that last year Dawson had a government without a constitution whose primary concern was over clubs and activities, with no power over major issues of the college. He added that Dawson was too disorganized during its first year of operation, but now it has become more stable, and therefore, more responsible to its students.

and it is currently negotiating the financial arrangements with the federal government.

\$70 million share

It is Quebec's intention to spend its share of slightly over \$70 million, of the \$150 million capital projects loan fund, on this highway.

This fund was tabled by me in the supplementary estimates last December. And the size of the provincial allocations was later announced by the minister of finance in his budget speech.

Two major criteria are being applied to the capital projects for which this money is to be used: The project in question must involve construction that the provincial governments would not otherwise undertake between now and the end of March 1972, at which time the loan fund expires; and the proposed project should contribute directly and quickly to additional employment.

The point which I wish to emphasize is that, following the negotiations between the provinces and the federal government leading toward the release of this money, the provinces are free to implement their programs as they see fit.

Quebec responsible

For example, in the case of the Trans-Canada Highway, the Government of Quebec is responsible for everything from the design of the lamp-posts to the tendering of contracts to the choice of a suitable site. This is as it was when the Trans-Canada Highway agreement was in force, and no change which might result in increased involvement by the federal government in the project is at present being considered.

However, as your Member of Parliament, I cannot ignore the cold realities of the situation. I am indeed very concerned about the fate of the families whose homes are being considered for demolition, as are, I am sure, the members of the Government of Quebec.

I am hopeful that, given this concern on all sides, a compromise solution is near at hand.

Old marine hardware store transformed into 'Youtheatre'

"Youtheatre Inc." has moved into Westmount and is transforming an old marine hardware shop at 4175 St. Catherine street west into a theatre for Westmount's children.

The group plans an opening show, "The Three Little Pigs" by Ralph Kendall, for the beginning of February.

Besides giving regular theatre performances, the group plans to conduct workshops for children and school teachers. Registration for workshops begins Feb. 6.

The group has been in existence for two years and has given approximately 2,400 shows and played before approximately 480,000 children in the Montreal area during tours of schools. Before moving to Westmount, the group was primarily a touring group. The move to Westmount was promoted by the need for a permanent base. The theatre will be capable of seating 60 children.

sections, English and French. Each consists of four professional actors. The French section is in the process of forming but will be ready to perform in March or April with "L'Homme du Miroir."

"The basic purpose of Youtheatre, said Mr. Mainville, "is educational and cultural. We try to prompt children to open up, to express themselves, to communicate and become part of the play. We want them to discover theatre."

Youtheatre's fundamental

theory is that children should participate fully in the play. "Theatre isn't just entertainment," said Mr. Mainville; "it's a creative experience. 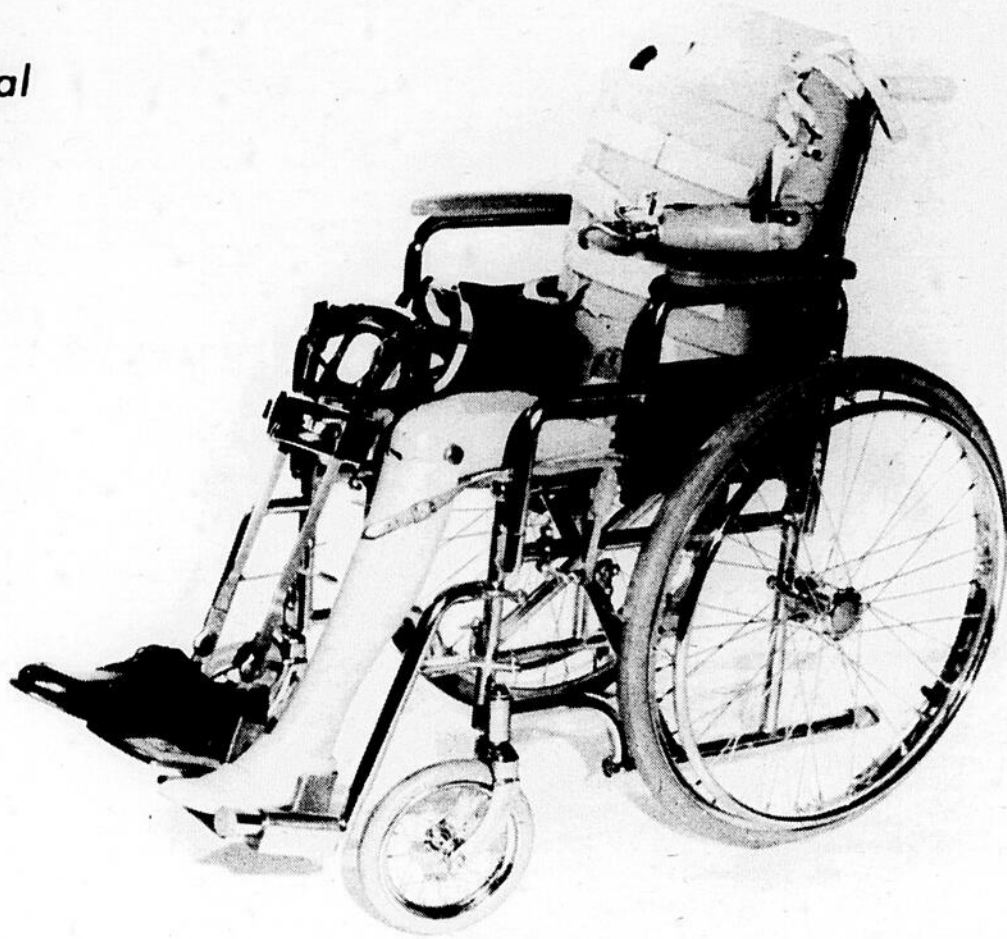

The spring session of the driver's education course begins on Feb. 2, under the auspices of a commercial driver's school.

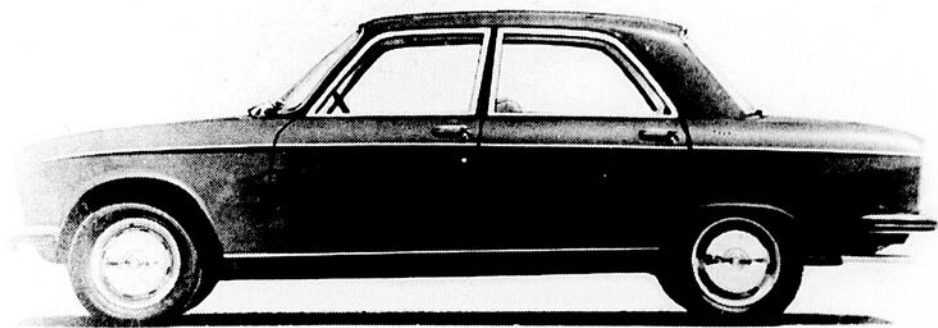
