Sherbrooke 10th City For Festival Finals

Sherbrooke is the 10th city to play host to the Dominion Drama Festival Finals. During the 17-year history of the festival, the finals have been held six times in Ottawa, three times in London, Ont., and once in Winnipeg, Toronto, Calgary, Saint John, N.B., Victoria and Hamilton.

The first festival was held in Ottawa in 1933 upon the express invitation of Governor-General Lord Bessborough. At first only one-act plays or short plays were entered in the finals but shortly after the war it became necessary to invite only full length plays to the finals. Short ones are still included in some of the regional competitions.

From 1940-46 no festival was held and since 1946 the finals have been held in a different region each year. This year's regional adjudicator Pamela Sterling saw 55 full-length plays and, based on her recommendation, eight of these plays were invited to compete in the finals here.

The fact that Sherbrooke was chosen as the site for the 1956 finals was due to the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and

the City of Sherbrooke which issued a joint invitation to the governors of the Festival. The announcement was made at the close of last year's finals in Regina.

The City of Sherbrooke followed up the invitation by providing a \$2,000 grant in the 1956 budget.

Besides the finals here May 14-19, other features which will be held in conjunction with Festival week will be the three-day Theatre Conference under the chairmanship of Mrs. Jean de Savoye; the Children's Theatre Section; and a two-day seminar following the festival. This will be held in the St. Jean Baptiste Church Hall and will be given by Mrs. Francoise Rosay, adjudicator of the finals.

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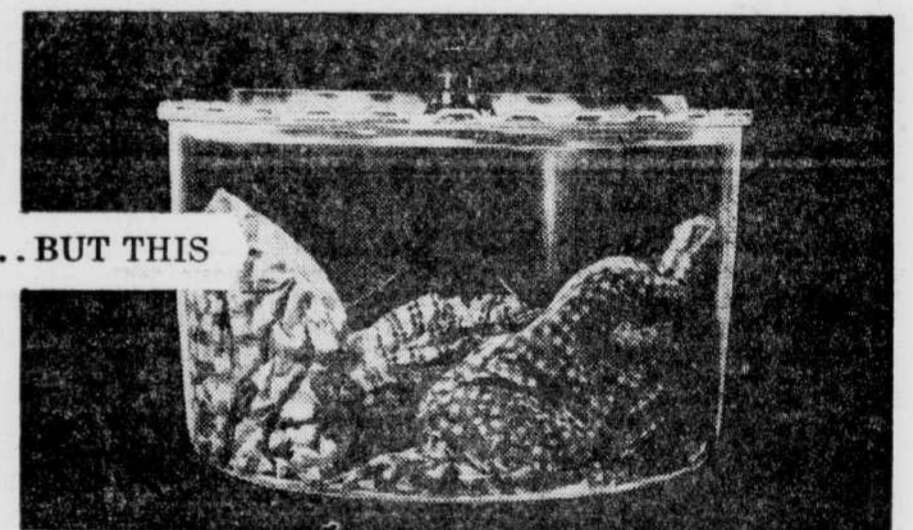

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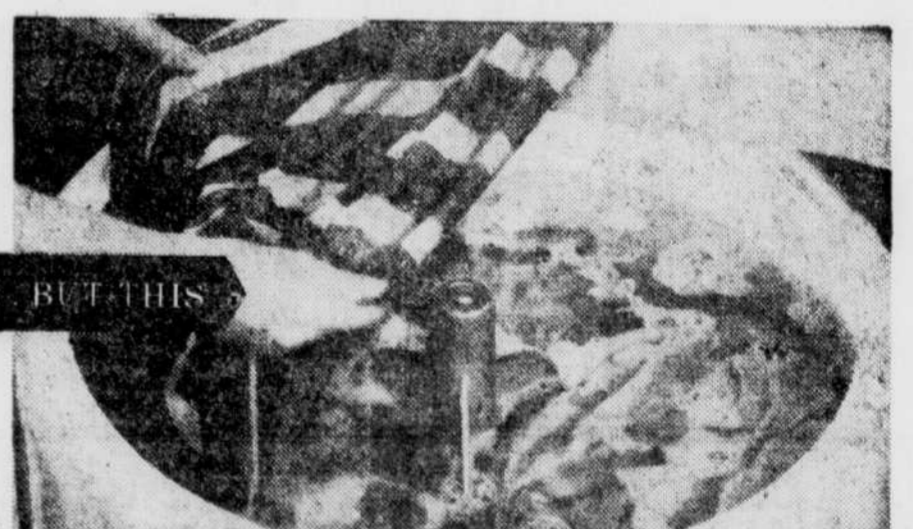

Homemade Bread Still Hard To Beat

Bread just wasn't bread in Grandma's day unless it was made with potato water. Fortunately for today's homemaker modern methods of bread baking have been developed to save time and effort. Stoves are easily regulated today—they have built-in clocks which ring bells when the baking time is complete—and even the yeast used in bread and bun-baking works much faster. However food technicians tell us that memories of

Grandma's home-baked bread aren't just nostalgia. Here's a recipe to help you discover again that Grandma's potato bread was really marvelous eating. Once you've tasted this Irish Potato Bread you'll be convinced that when it comes to plain good eating a slice of homemade bread is hard to beat.

IRISH POTATO BREAD

2 medium potatoes, boiled in their jackets, water in which potatoes were cooked, 1 teaspoon granulated sugar, 1/2 cup lukewarm water, 1 envelope active dry yeast, 2 eggs, milk enough to make 1 cup with the eggs, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 2 teaspoons salt, 6 cups sifted all-purpose flour.

Scrub potatoes and boil, unpeeled, until tender. Measure 3/4 cup of water in which potatoes were cooked. Place in a bowl and let cool to lukewarm.

Meanwhile, in 1/2 cup lukewarm water thoroughly dissolve 1 teaspoon sugar. Sprinkle yeast on top of water. Let stand 10 minutes. Then stir well.

Break eggs into an 8-ounce measuring cup. Beat lightly with a fork. Add enough milk to make 1 cup.

Peel potatoes and mash in the lukewarm water. Blend in shortening, 1/2 cup sugar and salt. Blend well. Add yeast, then milk mixture. Blend thoroughly.

Beat in flour with a wooden spoon. When dough is stiff enough to be easily handled, turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic about 10 minutes). Cover and let rise in a warm place, free from draft, for 2 hours or until doubled in bulk. Meanwhile grease three loaf pans 9x5x2 1/2-inches.

Punch down risen dough and knead again about 5 minutes. Divide dough in three equal portions. Shape into loaves. Place in well-greased loaf pans and let rise until doubled in bulk about 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

Meanwhile preheat oven to 400 deg. F. (hot). Bake in preheated oven for 20 minutes, then lower heat to 300 deg. F. (moderate) and bake an additional 30 minutes.

Note: This dough can be kept overnight. Place in refrigerator right after second kneading and first rising. When ready to bake shape into loaves and allow to rise once. Bake the same way.

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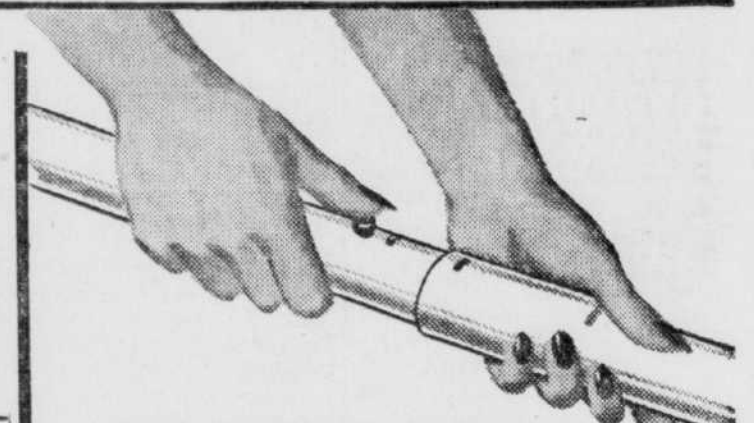
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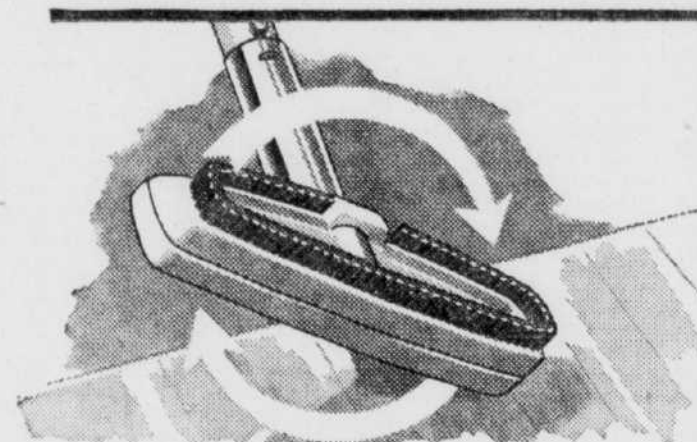
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
