Sacrifice Marriage Futile

Invalid's Wife Would Regret Loveless Union to Another

DEAR MISS DIX: I am a young wife of 23 with four children. My husband was in an accident in which he lost both legs. Here is my problem: A man 20 years my senior is very much in love with me and wants me to leave my husband and marry him. He is willing to provide for my invalid husband and my four children.

Now I do not love this man and don't want to marry him, but I seem to have no choice in the matter as I have no relatives who could help me. Shall I marry this man and break my husband's heart as he is unaware of what is going on; or shall I leave this man and work to provide for my husband and put my children in a children's home?

A DESPERATE WIFE. BITTER MISTAKE ANSWER: You will be making a fatal mistake if you sell yourself to your elderly Lethario, even though you do it for the sake of providing for your husband and children. Your sacrifice will be made in vain because it will bring happiness to no one concerned in the unholy transaction. Not even the old man will profit by it because he will know that he has a wife who does not love him and who does love another man, and he will resent your not making him a happy and cheerful home. He will naturally think that you have paid for him, and in losing his wife, your husband will sustain a loss far worse than losing his legs, and in his despair he will lack the courage that would enable him to rise above his affliction. Also, your children would be far worse off in a divided home than they would be in any asylum.

Your case need not be so desperate as you seem to think it is, if you will only look at it realistically. In these days of expert surgery and marvellous mechanical devices, for a man to lose his legs is not the tragedy it once was. He can make him a hopeless invalid, incapable of making a living. There is no reason why your husband should not be able to be fitted with artificial legs and become self-supporting as so many thousands of the men who were wounded in the war are.

So get your job. Put your children in some home, where they can be cared for the time being until you can get on your feet. And tell your boy friend to peddle his sentimental wares somewhere else, that you are not for sale.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: My husband is returning home in a week or so after serving two and a half years overseas. We were married about two weeks before he went over and only spent about five days together. He plans to come home and visit a day or two with his immediate family and then for us to be off on our long delayed honeymoon. But complications have set in. His mother-in-law having her house all redecorated and plans to have a huge party to celebrate his return, and she thinks he should stay at home and visit with all of his friends and relatives. But don't you think that they might hold off for a little while and give us a chance to see each other alone, instead of in crowds?

FRIEND. ANSWER: I certainly do, but you are not the only ones who have to pay the price of their family wanting to show off their hero. Innumerable scottions write to this column that they dread to come home on a furlough because they never get to see their wives and children alone. Their mothers drag them around to see all of their relatives, and date them up to tell the various clubs they belong to all about the war, and this is so tiresome that the poor lads wish that they could have the privacy and calm of the battlefield once more.

DEAR MISS DIX: Should a girl return an engagement ring when she breaks her engagement and accepts a ring from another man?

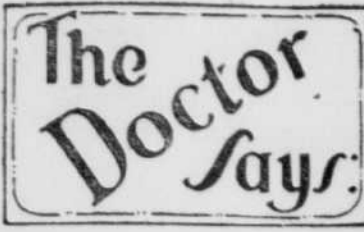
ARMISTICE DAY WAS OBSERVED AT DANVILLE

MILITARY GAINS IN CONTROL OF GANGRENE

By William A. O'Brien, M.D. Gas gangrene, a complication of wounds and compound fractures, is caused by germs which generate gas in the tissues. Military experience with gas gangrene has resulted in development of many lifesaving measures, according to Lt.-Col. Francis H. Langley and Capt. L. A. Lawrence B. Winkelman, M.C., U.S.A., who review their experience with 96 cases treated in an evacuation hospital in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Tension is a symptom. Gas infection is suspected when a wound develops a feeling of tension, heaviness or tightness under the dressing. Shortly afterward the patient shows signs of toxemia with definite mental changes. In more advanced cases the skin of the entire body develops a peculiar color change which varies from extreme pallor to a bronzed tint. As the infection progresses the pulse becomes rapid, the temperature rises, and the toxic absorption form the gas gangrene germs causes grave blood destruction and anemia.

Gas gangrene can develop from six hours to four days after injury. Wounds left uncovered in contact with clothing, dirt and soil are more likely to develop gas gangrene than those which are properly covered.

Prompt treatment of gas gangrene may be lifesaving. Wounds should be thoroughly cleansed and all dead tissue removed as soon as possible. Shock and anemia are treated, and sulfa drugs and penicillin are given. Although sulfa drugs are not of much value in gas gangrene, penicillin is of great help. Special antioxin is useful in combating the toxemia after the infection develops.

Many limbs have been saved by removal of dead tissue from the wound and giving penicillin, although it may be necessary to amputate if the infection is too extensive.

Practical lessons to be learned from our military experience with gas gangrene is to cover all wounds with first aid dressings, to cleanse them thoroughly, to remove foreign material and dead tissue as soon as possible, and to start penicillin at the first indication of trouble.

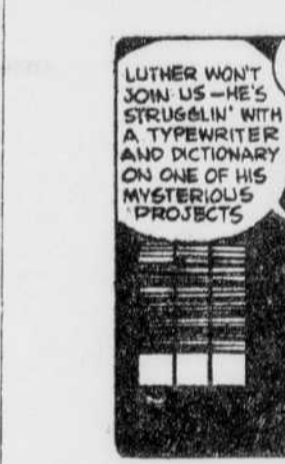

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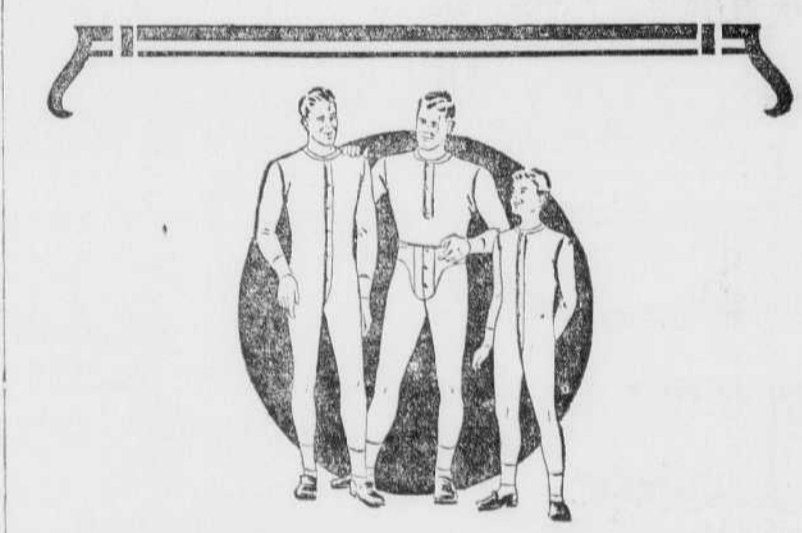
