MISCELLANEOUS CHARGES.

The charge on Parcels by Parcel Post to any place in Canada is 25 cents per lb., (with 5 cents additional if registered.)

One cent per oz., payable in advance by Postage Stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charge on Books, &c., by book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 12½ cents on ½ lb. packets, and 12½ cents additional for every additional ½ lb. These charges must be prepaid.

The Book Post regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates *if paid quarterly in advance* by either the publisher at the Post Office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering Post Office :

For a Paper published 6 times a week,	40 cents per quar.
" " 3	" 20 "
" " 2	" 13 "
" " 1	" 6½ "

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such Papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

## TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS.

*Transient Newspapers*—that is to say, Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British Papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded—except only *British Newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian Booksellers or News Agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mails.

## NEWSPAPERS BY MAIL FROM ENGLAND OR UNITED STATES.

Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspaper from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States Newspapers brought by Mail into Canada, are charged one cent each on delivery.

## PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

The rate on Periodical publications is, if not exceeding 3 ounces in weight, 1 cent: over 3 ounces, 4 cents.

If prepaid by postage stamps from the office of publication, Periodicals *published in Canada*, weighing over 3 oz., may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals *printed in this Province*, other than Newspapers, when specially devoted to Education, (both religious and general,) to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of Science, and addressed directly from the office of publication to be transmitted to any post office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

*Transient Periodicals*—including Canadian Periodicals not prepaid the commuted rate from the office of publication—nor exempted by the preceding clause, and all other Periodical publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by stamps, the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in the mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the first clause of this section.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage stamps of the respective values of 1 cent for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate: 12½ cents for Canadian packet: and 17 cents for Cunard Packet, are provided for sale to the public.

PENAL CLAUSES.

The act contains the following penal clauses:

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted, for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclosed a letter or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purposes of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers,) shall be a misdemeanor.

N. B.—No half cents to be introduced in the Orders.  
No single Order can be issued for more than \$100.

Money Orders, payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britain and Ireland, can be obtained at any Canadian Money Order Office. The Orders are drawn in Sterling, the commission chargeable being: for £2 and under, one shilling sterling; from £2 to £5, two shillings. No Order can be drawn for more than £5, but any number of orders of £5 each may be procured.

#### REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

Persons transmitting letters which they desire should pass through the post as "Registered Letters," must observe that no record is taken of any letter unless specially handed in for registration at the time of posting. Upon all such letters, with the exception of those addressed to the United States, 1 penny must be prepaid as a registration charge. If addressed to the United States the ordinary postage rate on the letter to that country *must be prepaid*, and in addition a registration charge of 5 cents per letter. The registry thus effected in Canada is certified on by the United States post office, until the letter arrives at its destination.

In like manner letters addressed to Canada may be registered at the place of posting in the United States, and the registry made there will accompany the letter to the place of delivery in Canada.

A certificate of Registration will be given by a Postmaster if required.

It must be distinctly understood by parties who avail themselves of the privilege of registration, that such registration, with the certificate and receipt, are merely intended to afford the means of tracing the course of such letters through the post, and of ascertaining their delivery at destination, and will not be held to imply any liability on the part of the Postal department to make good any loss, or alleged losses, arising from the miscarriage of any such letter or its contents.

*Goods paying fifteen per cent. ad valorem and 4 cents per lb. specific, from 9th June, 1862.*

*Goods paying ten per cent.*

Anchors, 6 cwt. and under. Books—School or other Books, printed in this province, (copies of which to be deposited with the Customs Branch of the Department of the Finance Minister,) are subject to a duty of 10 per cent. from 19th May, 1860. Brass in bars, rods, and sheets; Brass or Copper Wire and Wire Cloth; Cameos and Mosaics, real or imitation, when set in gold, silver, and other metal; Canada Plates, Tinned Plates, Galvanized Iron and Sheet Iron; Copper, in bars, rods, bolts, or sheets; Silk Twist for hats, boots and shoes; Iron—Bar, Rod, or Hoop, Nail and Spike Rod, Hoop or Tire for driving wheels of locomotives, bent and welded, Boiler Plate, Railroad Bars, Wrought Iron Chairs and Spikes, Rolled Plate, Wire; Jewellery and Watches; Lead in sheet; Maps, Charts and Atlases; Sails, ready made; Spirits of Turpentine; Steel, wrought or cast; Cotton Candle Wick, Cotton Yarn, and Cotton Warp; White Lead, dry; Plaster of Paris, ground and calcined; Hydraulic Cement, ground and calcined; Red Lead; Litharge; Phosphorus; Medicinal Roots; En-

gravings and Prints; Straw, Tuscan, and Grass Fancy Plaits; Tin, granulated or bar; Tubes and Piping, of copper, brass, or iron, when drawn; Zinc or Spelter, in sheet; Locomotive and Engine Frames, cranks, crank axles, railway car and locomotive axles, piston rods, guide and slide bars, crank pins, connecting rods, steamboat and mill shafts, and cranks forged in the rough.

*Goods paying twenty per cent.*

All articles not hereinbefore enumerated as charged with an *ad valorem* duty, or hereinafter charged with a Specific duty, or declared free of duty, shall be chargeable with a duty of twenty per cent. on the value thereof.

*Goods paying Specific Duties.*

Whiskey of any strength, not exceeding the strength of proof by Syke's hydrometer, shall be chargeable with a duty of twenty-five cents per gallon, and so in proportion for any greater strength, or less quantity than a gallon.

Oils,—Kerosene, Coal, and Petroleum, distilled, purified, and refined, per wine gallon, ten cents.

2nd.—Necessary and ordinary wearing apparel of debtor and his family.

3rd.—One stove and pipes, 1 crane and appendages, 1 pair of andirons, 1 set cooking utensils, 1 pair tongs and shovel, 1 table, 6 chairs, 6 knives, 6 forks, 6 plates, 6 teacups, 6 saucers, 1 sugar basin, 1 milk jug, 1 teapot, 6 spoons, all spinning wheels and weaving looms in domestic use, 10 volumes of books, [1 axe, 1 saw, 1 gun, 6 trays and fishing net seines in use.

4th.—All necessary fuel, meat, fish, flour, and vegetables, actually provided for family use, sufficient for 30 days, and not worth more than \$40.

5th.—1 cow, 4 sheep, 2 hogs, and food therefor for 39 days.

6th.—Tools and implements of, or chattels ordinarily used in the debtor's occupation, to the value of \$60.

1.—Nothing shall exempt from seizure in satisfaction of debt contracted for such identical chattel of any articles in Nos. 3, 4, 5 and 6.

The annual issue of Licenses will commence, as usual, on the 1st May,—the old licenses expiring on the 30th April.

Those who are in possession of certificates for Tavern Licenses in the country, or of permits from the City Clerk, in the city, will have the right, on making application to this office, and on paying the above taxes, to their licenses as heretofore.
