**G**EORGE THE FOURTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith: To our much beloved and faithful the Legislative Councillors of our Province of Lower-Canada, and to our faithful and well beloved the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of our said Province, to an Assembly at our City of Quebec, on the Eighth day of October next, to have been commenced and held, called and elected, and to every of you, GREETING:—Whereas, for divers urgent and arduous affairs, us, the state and defence of our said Province concerning, our Assembly at the day and place aforesaid, to be present, we did command to treat, consent and conclude upon those things which, in our Assembly, should then and there be proposed and deliberated upon; and for certain causes and considerations, us to this especially moving, we have thought fit to Prorogue our said Assembly, so that you, nor any of you, on the said Eighth day of October next at our said City to appear, are to be held or constrained, for we do will therefore, that you, and each of you, be as to us in this matter entirely exonerated; commanding, and by the tenor of these Presents firmly enjoining you, and every of you, and all others in this behalf interested, that on the Seventeenth day of November next, at our said City of Quebec, personally you be and appear, to treat, do, act and conclude, upon those things which, in our said Assembly, by the Common Council of our said Province, by the favour of God, may be ordained. IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, these our Letters we have caused to be made Patent, and the great Seal of our said Province to be thereunto affixed: Witness our trusty and well-beloved, the Honourable Sir FRANCIS NATHANIEL BURTON, Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Lieutenant-Governor in and over our Province of Lower-Canada, &c. &c. at our Castle of St. Lewis, in our city of Quebec, in our said Province, the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, and in the fifth year of our Reign. Late papers have been received at this port by the LIVERPOOL traders on their second voyage.—The last LONDON date is of the 10th September.

We have been favored with a file of papers, in which there is nothing of either novelty or importance. When we have alluded to the health of the KING OF FRANCE, the state of the GREEK revolution, and the attempt of the Constitutionals at TARIFA, we shall have touched on every thing of political interest.

It has been our duty before to allude to the indecent and unaccountable anxiety of certain journals in EUROPE and on this continent for the speedy dissolution of LOUIS 18th. No one doubts that in the course of nature this KING must soon be removed from the scene of political turmoil, but we are at a loss to understand what change is to be hoped for when this event takes place. Those who glory in what are termed liberal opinions, seem to view with increasing eagerness the long expected accomplishment of their wishes. But what do they expect to gain by his removal? Will the chair be empty because the King is dead? Will there be a greater likelihood of the restoration of the Napoleon dynasty? Does not, on the contrary, every step which the successive deaths of the elder members of the family afford to the promotion of the younger, add to the stability of the throne, by placing on it those who can hold the sceptre

in a youthful and vigorous grasp? For our parts, whenever it shall please the Disposer of events to remove from the Throne of France its present possessor, we shall not forget that there died a most accomplished and virtuous Prince, a most elegant scholar, and a pious and respectable man. That his death is near at hand, we have now, it is said, the authority of the French and English ministerial papers, and from an expression used by the KING himself to BARON VINCENT, who was about to return to VIENNA, in which he declared his pleasure that he was allowed to see him *once more*, it would seem that His MAJESTY himself was in a frame of mind which led him to entertain a belief of approaching dissolution.

Much greater importance seems to us to have been placed in the occupation of TARIFA, than is warranted by the circumstances. The official French account states the utter desperation of the enterprize, and the recapture of the fortress by the united troops of FRANCE and SPAIN. On the contrary, *private* letters mention, that on the 21st August, it remained in the hands of the insurgents. Experience has hitherto shown how little reliance is to be placed on the *private* letters intended for a public newspaper, which are too often written at the desk of the Editor. It always happens, somewhat strangely, that these *private* letters answer some public purpose, and are written for that purpose alone. But we are only incredulous, since we cannot deny the possibility of the truth of this information.

The GREEK revolutionists seem to have suffered no abatement of their spirit from the capture of IPSARA. It is said they have retaken the Island, and destroyed a Turkish fleet, when and where we have not yet discovered with sufficient certainty.

SUMMARY.

The Countess of Fitzwilliam died at Wentworth House on the 1st Sept.

The wheat harvest throughout England has been gathered and housed in excellent condition;—the ports are opened for Foreign Oats.

A late number of the Literary Gazette gives the following summary of the internal state of England. "Quiet times and a plentiful harvest, what better news could fill this important portion of our journal."

The basis of a commercial treaty is said to have been agreed upon between Great Britain and Buenos Ayres.

A Farce called *Jonathan in England* has been brought out at the English Opera.—The piece has little plot or incident, and is principally taken from the last "at home" of Mr. Mathews.—The design appears to be merely to display to an English audience a Caricature of the manners and notions of a thorough bred Virginian.

The following diplomatic changes have been determined on:—Sir Charles Bagot goes to Paris to succeed Sir Charles Stuart, who retires on a pension. Mr. Stratford Canning succeeds Sir Charles Bagot at Petersburg. Sir Wm. A'Court is to go as ambassador to Lisbon, with a salary of £8000 a year. Sir E. Thornton is to succeed Sir William A'Court as minister plenipotentiary at the Court of Madrid. Mr. Hamilton retires from Naples on a pension.—*Morning Chronicle.*

It is reported in the political circles, that the embassy to the Court of Naples is to devolve on Lord Hastings, as it was originally intended to be attached to his Lordship's government of Malta.—*Morning paper.*

It is supposed, that no fewer than 3000 houses will be built in Birmingham and its environs during the present year.

In consequence of the expected dissolution of Parliament, the candidates for seats in the new Parliament are beyond all precedent. Not only the sons of nobility, but the landed and commercial interest are equally anxious to become members at the approaching election, and which has occasioned

a most extraordinary sensation with persons who have any interest in boroughs.

At a privy council, held on Saturday last, in Dublin, two proclamations were agreed upon, whereby the Insurrection Act was removed from the following places:—West division of East Carbery; east and west of west Carbery; baronies of Ibane and Barryree, and parishes of Kilnegross and Kilgariff; and the part or portions of land, county Cork, known by the name of the Brebends of Templebrian and Curraganemore, in the barony of east Carbery, by the first, and the liberties of the county of the city of Cork, by the second.

His Majesty, on the recommendation of Mr. Secretary Canning, has appointed Lord Erskine ambassador to the Court of Stuttgart. The manner in which Mr. Canning communicated this to Lord Erskine, is spoken of in the higher circles as having been most gracious and kind.—*Morning Chronicle.*

FAIR AT WILLIAM HENRY.

On the 29th September, pursuant to public notice, a Fair was held at William Henry, on the Common adjacent to the Governor in Chief's Ground. It is a matter of much regret, that although some inducements were held out to Agriculturalists for the exhibition of Cattle, Produce, Cloths &c. by feruniary contributions made a few days before, or awarding premiums, there could scarcely be seen any competitors—some very fine Wheat was however exhibited by Mr. James Walker, which English Farmers observed could not be excelled in England. Very fine Oats, Sheep and Pigs, by Capt. Bramley, and Oxen, by Mr. Jacob Dörge; a premium was also awarded to Mr. Henry Belden for the best Cow—Mr. McNee also produced some beautiful vegetables, which evinced to what perfection a soil of sand can be brought to, when cultivated by skillful and well informed Agriculturalists.

The Races commenced about 3 o'clock P. M. and although the race ground was made circular and of a mile in distance, some good horsemanship was displayed by the Canadian Farmers. The successful competitors received as rewards—Saddles, Bridles, Beaver hats, Bonnets, Shawls, Sashes, Scythes, mounted, and money.

Several gentlemen of distinction honored the Fair with their attendance, among whom we noticed the Commissary General, his brother, Mr. Turquand, lately arrived from England, Maj. Huxley, Mr. De St. Ours, &c. &c. They seemed much amused and gratified with the sports of the day.

Mrs. Fleming, a comfortable-looking matron, proprietress of a miscellaneous lodging-house, opened the case against the prisoner. "The man is a coming-and-going lodger of mine, your Worship, what lies with me now and again!"

"Lies with you!" exclaimed the Magistrate.

Mrs. Fleming.—In my bed—in my house, your Worship, as a lodger; she came to me on Saturday night for a bed.

She! interrupted the Magistrate; what, then he had a woman with him?—No, your Honour, no woman but myself.

Mr. Markland—Whom then do you mean by she?—Mrs. Fleming—Why, the man, to be sure your Worship.

Mr. Markland—She, a man. What country do you come from?

Prisoner—She is a Scotchman, your Honour.

Mr. Markland—Well, Mrs. Fleming?

Mrs. Fleming—She axed me to shew her to her bed. I did that. In the room she laid hands on me, and hauled about my clothes, and—

Prisoner—Oh, Mrs. Fleming!

Mrs. Fleming—Yes, you did. I tauld her to gi'e o'er his gallymanfry. She wadna. Then cam a row, and then the watchman, and that's all.

Mr. Markland: Was he drunk?

Mrs. Fleming—Not precisely, your Worship; he was freshish; betwixt and between; just neither drunk nor sober. The watchman kens the rest.

The watchman deposed that he heard the prisoner cry "Watch;" went to his assistance; the prisoner insisted that Mrs. Fleming should repay him the price of the bed (four pence); was excessively riotous; abused every body, and struck the witness.

Mr. Markland (to the prisoner).—From what part do you come?

O'Gorman—From the watch-house, your Honour.

Mr. Markland—I know that; but I mean—

O'Gorman—Och, I know, from Ireland, your Honour.

Mr. Markland—I know that too; where were you before you came to Mrs. Fleming's?

O'Gorman—At Lewisham.

Mr. Markland—What have you to say against this charge?

O'Gorman—What's the use in my saying any thing?

Mr. Markland—Very little, I fear.

O'Gorman—Sure I can't swear against three of them.

Mr. Markland—I don't want you to swear.

O'Gorman—They'd sell God Almighty for sixpence. I am as innocent as the pig unborn.

Mr. Markland—You struck the watchman?

O'Gorman—I called him to help me; he came up and tuck me into custody. Was that the way to help me?

Mr. Markland—I must put you up, unless you find some-body to answer for your good behaviour.

O'Gorman—Mrs. Fleming will answer for me.

Mrs. Fleming—No, I won't now.

O'Gorman—Yes, you will, jewel, you'll tell his Honour I'll be on my good behaviour, and be a good boy and take care of me, and I'll do the like good turn for you when you get stuck among those Peelers. Yes you will "answer for me."

Mrs. Fleming hesitated—O'Gorman whispered—Mrs. Fleming still wavered, and shook her head.

O'Gorman took her hand, looked significantly into her eyes, "And winked and squeezed unutterable things."

"We are not made of stick or stone," as Sterne somewhere says—Mrs. Fleming felt the eloquent appeal to her generosity, and the prosecutrix became responsible for the conduct of the prisoner.

By an act of the Imperial Parliament passed only last year, it is made felony to write a threatening letter to any person with a view to extort money or other valuable thing by charging him with having committed any offence, which, if true, would subject him to death or transportation, or with any infamous crime. A man named Hickman was tried at the last Leicester assizes on the charge

of having written a letter to a person named Fabing threatening to accuse him of a heinous offence, with a view to extort money from him—The Jury returned a verdict in the following words. "We believe the prosecutor to be innocent of the crime charged upon him, and that the prisoner wrote the letter with a view to extort money."—Sentence of transportation for life was passed upon him.—On hearing it pronounced, he exclaimed "I did not want to extort money, I only wanted to have my account settled."

The Chief Justice—Then you should not have sought it in that way; better put a pistol to a man's head and take his life.—Take him away.

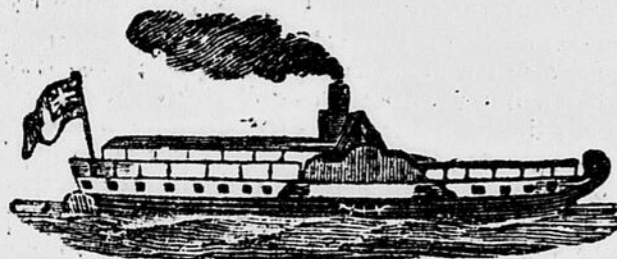
