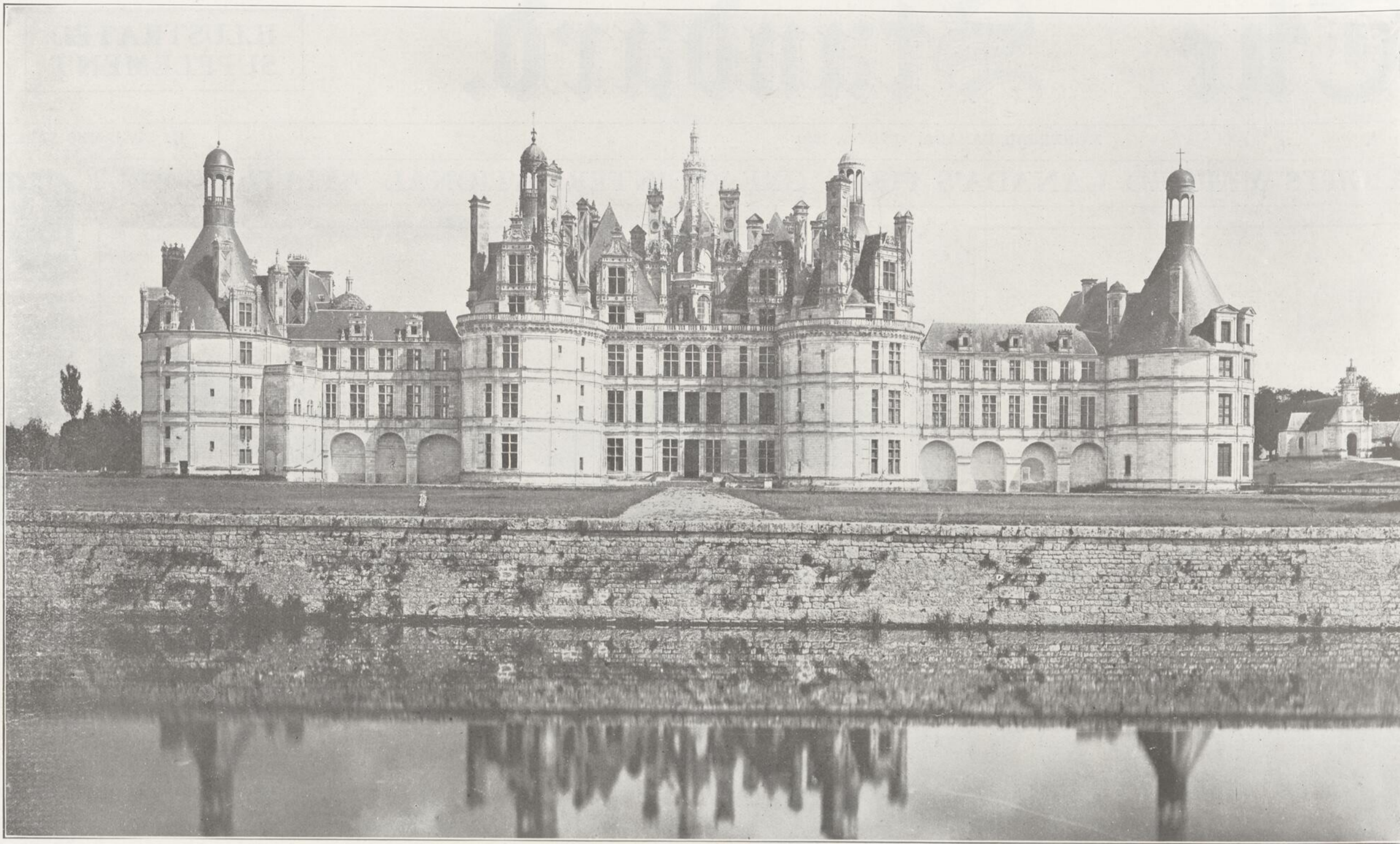


## MARVELLOUS AERIAL FLIGHTS MARKED CANADA'S FIRST GREAT INTERNATIONAL AVIATION MEET

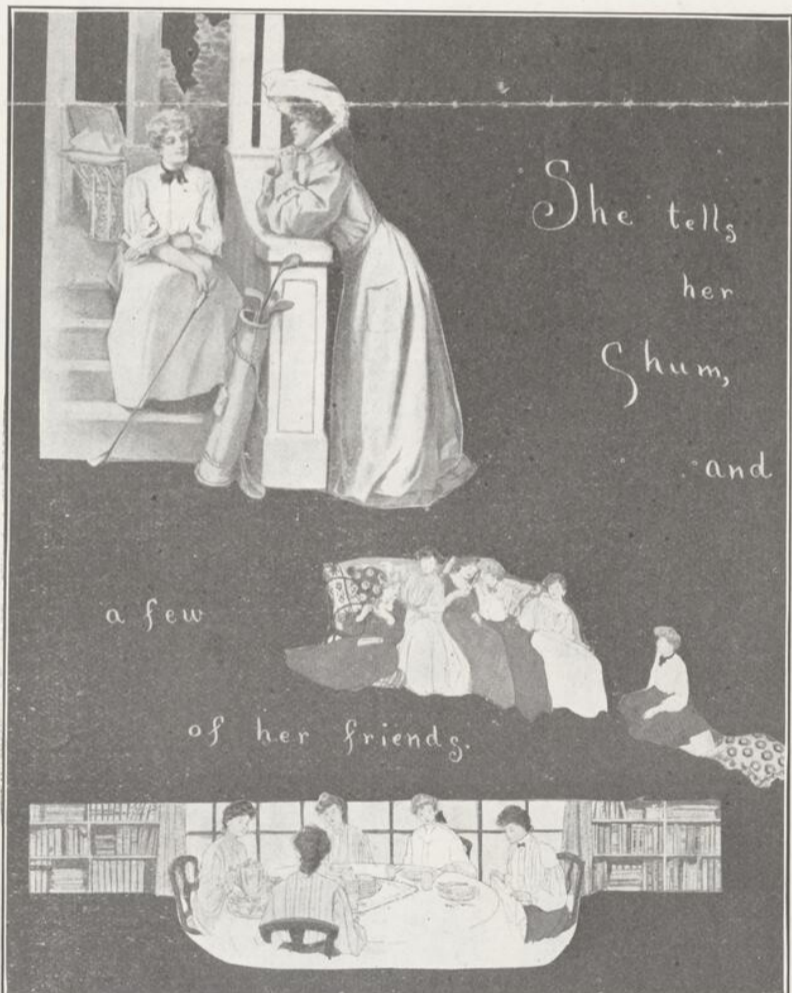


THE SECOND IN THE STANDARD'S GREAT SERIES OF TRAVEL PICTURES—Chambord, a magnificent Gothic chateau of France, in the Department of Loire-et-Cher, ten miles east of Blois, on the left bank of the River Cisse. It was commenced by Francis I. in 1532, carried on by Henry II., and at length finished by Louis XIV. It is built of black stone, with a profusion of towers, turrets and minarets, and the interior is fitted up with great magnificence. The Park is enclosed by walls seven leagues in circumference. The chateau is famous as the residence of Diana of Poitiers, and of Stanislaus, King of Poland, whose son-in-law, Louis XV., bestowed it upon Marshal Saxe. It was given by Napoleon to Marshal Berthier, from whose widow it was purchased by subscription in 1825, and presented to the Duke of Bordeaux, the representative of the older branch of the Bourbons, who has assumed from it the title of Count de Chambord.

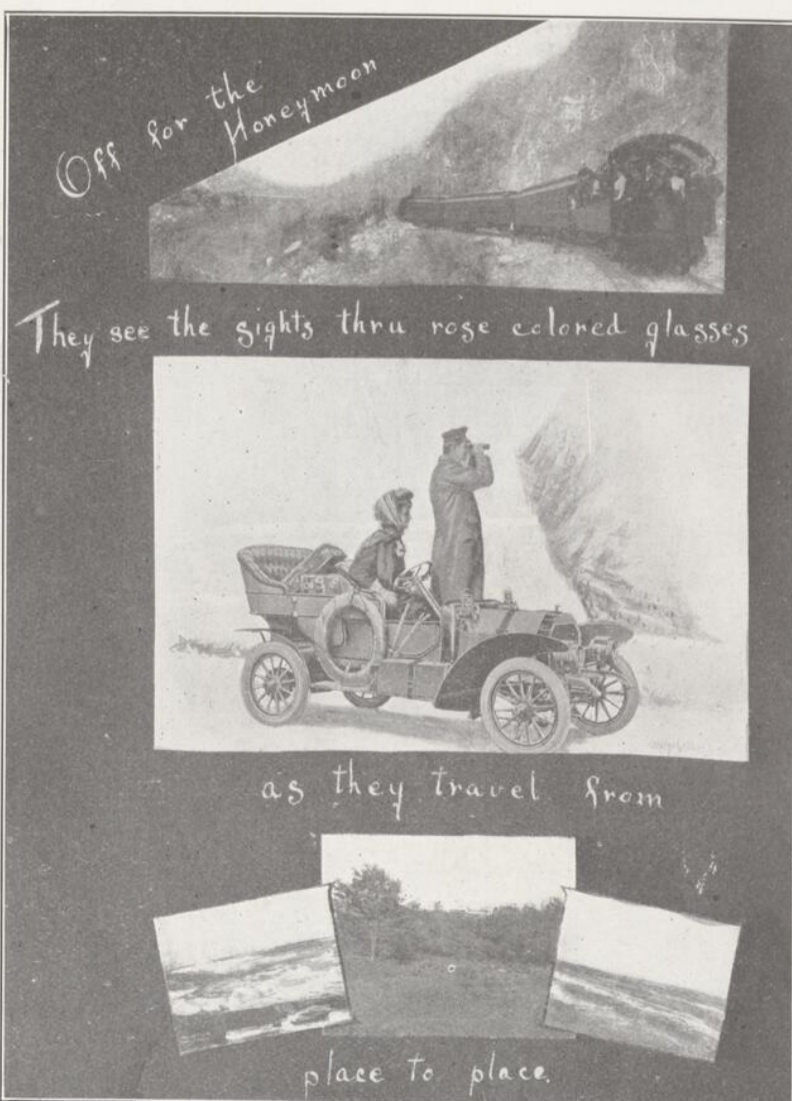

THE TENTH PLATE IN THE STANDARD'S SERIES OF GREAT CATHEDRAL PICTURES—A view of the choir in Ely Cathedral, England, looking from the choir screen. This Cathedral was originally a conventual church; on the dissolution of the monasteries, however, Henry VIII. raised it to its present dignity. The edifice displays a singular mixture of various styles of architecture. The nave, which is Late Norman, was probably completed about the middle of the 12th century, and the western towers and the transepts were built by Bishop Ridal (1174-1189). The choir (seen in the above illustration) was originally Early Norman, but its Norman apse was destroyed, and the church extended eastward by six more arches, by Bishop Northwold about the middle of the 13th century. The addition is Early English, and its carving is very elaborate and beautiful. The total length of the Cathedral from east to west is 525 feet, and the western tower is 220 feet high. The interior is exceedingly beautiful, and contains many interesting monuments.

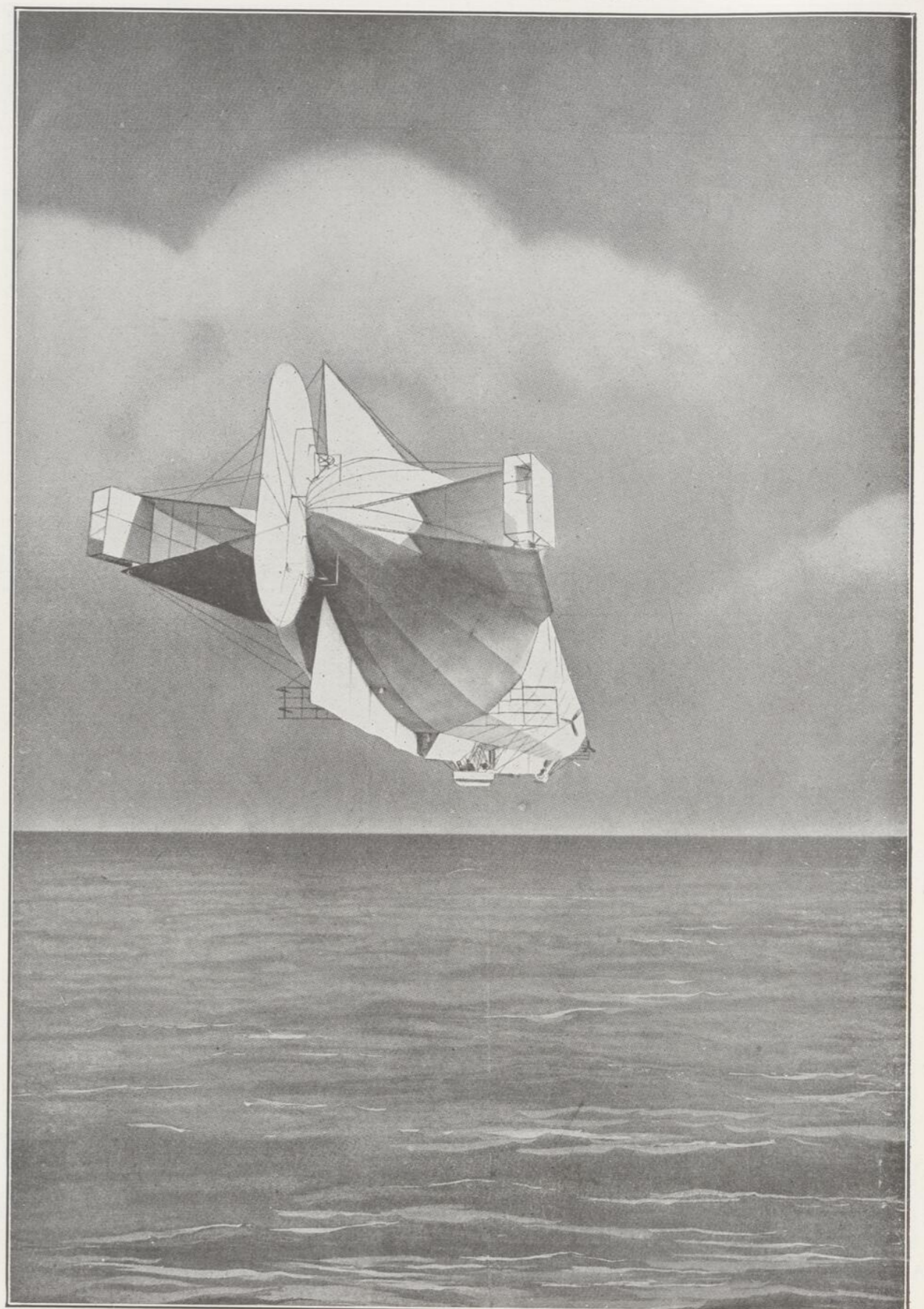

Latest Development of Montreal Suburbs.

THERE are two ways of developing a railway—two ways of expanding it. One way is to reach out, to extend, to take in new territory, to encourage settlement and industries to follow the line into unsettled districts. This, in fact, is the usual way. Another way is to improve, to develop the territory already occupied.

The quaint old village of Longueuil has been nesting on the south shore of the St. Lawrence, opposite Montreal, for two hundred and fifty years. In summer, its people ferry across, and

enjoy, in some measure, the metropolis of Canada. In winter, especially a mild winter such as that of 1909-10, its residents are cut off from Montreal, unless they have time to travel in by two different railways.

And so the quaint old village slept peaceful in its Arcadian quietness, hoping from decade to decade that, in the course of human events and national development, something would happen which would, in a measure, bridge the space between it and Montreal.

For years a charter for a railway to Longueuil had been in existence, but the men who had the charter had not the money to build the road, and the men who had the money could not get hold of the charter.

Finally this charter was acquired by strong financial interests, and then the real difficulty of building a road began to manifest itself all along the line. Months were wasted in an effort to effect a settlement with those who objected to a right of way for the new line.

Finally, when face to face with expropriation proceedings, those who had been balking the builders agreed to settle, there remained only three weeks in which to complete the line within the time fixed by Longueuil and other towns.

Such a task seemed impossible, and many considered it so, but all did not know that the builders had behind them a powerful organization. The line had reached St. Lambert last year, only two days ahead of the time limit.

When finally the right of way had been legally cleared, the builders went at the work of construction with a will, and completed the line with three days to the good. The driving of the last spike opened up for settlement that vast reach of fine suburban property—Brooklyn Park and Montreal South.

Already the quickening influence of the new line is felt. St. Lambert has taken on new life, and many fine residences are in course of construction at Brooklyn Park, and the population has increased over a thousand. The quaint and quiet town of Longueuil, the present terminus, is bustling up, building new buildings and putting down pavement walks—the long journey to Montreal has been reduced to thirty minutes, and there is a train every half-hour.

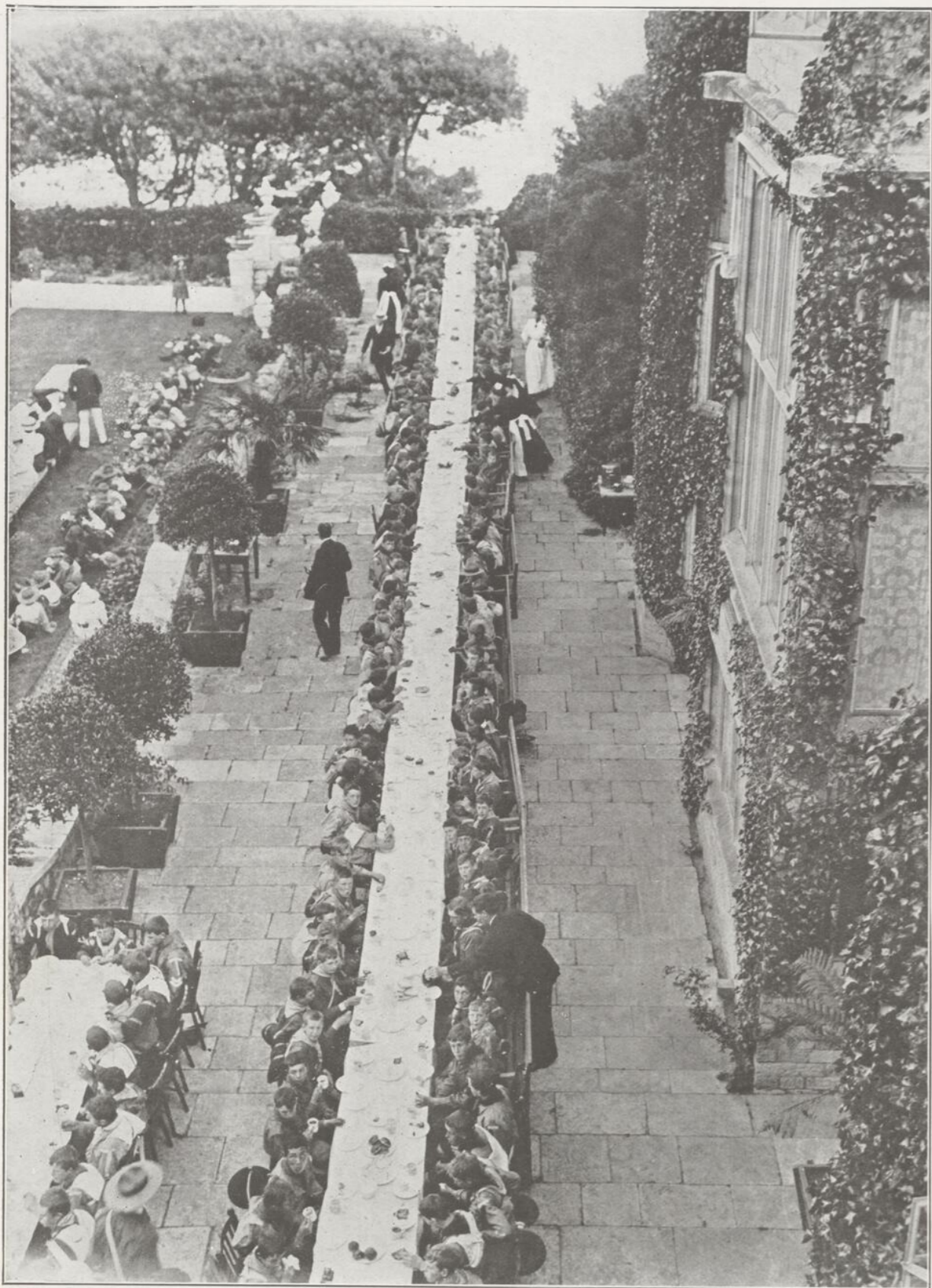

Recent Army Pageant at Fulham Palace.

THE Army Pageant, which closed recently in the grounds of Fulham Palace, London, was a splendid success. Each day for two weeks the fighting men of Britain, from the Brythons, who fought with antlers and clubs, to the hard-bitten soldiers of Wellington in the Peninsula, were engaged in mortal combat on the sward.

The feature of the pageant was the cavalry work by detachments from the Scots Greys, 4th Hussars, and 7th Hussars. Magnificently mounted, the troopers crawled across the field. At last there was an exciting battle, with no cover, and just as the English were winning Sir John Moore fell from his charger. His body was carried off by Highlandmen to his grave in the ramparts, while the choir sang an impressive version of the immortal burial poem—for Mr. Christopher Wilson's music was one of the richest parts of the pageant.

The storming of the castle at Badajoz, Joan of Arc's charge at Patay, the pike drill of the Buffs, correctly resuscitated from an old book in the British Museum, the curvetting of the haughty knights at Crecy and Agincourt, were full of bustling movement, and enriched with a showy splendor of costume. A shout of joy burst from the spectators when the Maid of Orleans flew by, at the head of her charging knights. Clad in white silk and wearing silver armor, her black hair and her white banner streaming in the wind, Mrs. Hohler was a dashing and martial figure as she bestrode her milk-white steed, which had been lent to her by the Scots Greys.

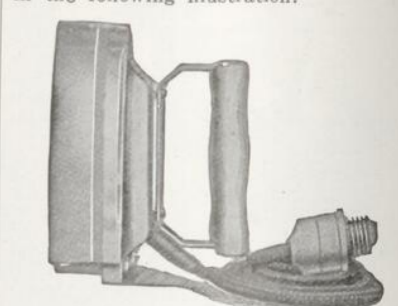
