GENTLEMEN,—The dissolution of Parliament having imposed upon you the necessity of electing a representative, I again ask from you a renewal of that confidence, which on four different occasions you have been kind enough to grant me. At this busy season of the year, when every hour is occupied, and nearly all are engaged in outdoor pursuits, it is impossible for me to have the advantage of a personal canvass, and I almost hesitate to trespass on your time by inviting you to public meetings.

My principles, however, have been long known to you, and are unchanged. Two questions now of more than usual importance, demand the attention of the electors of our public men.
