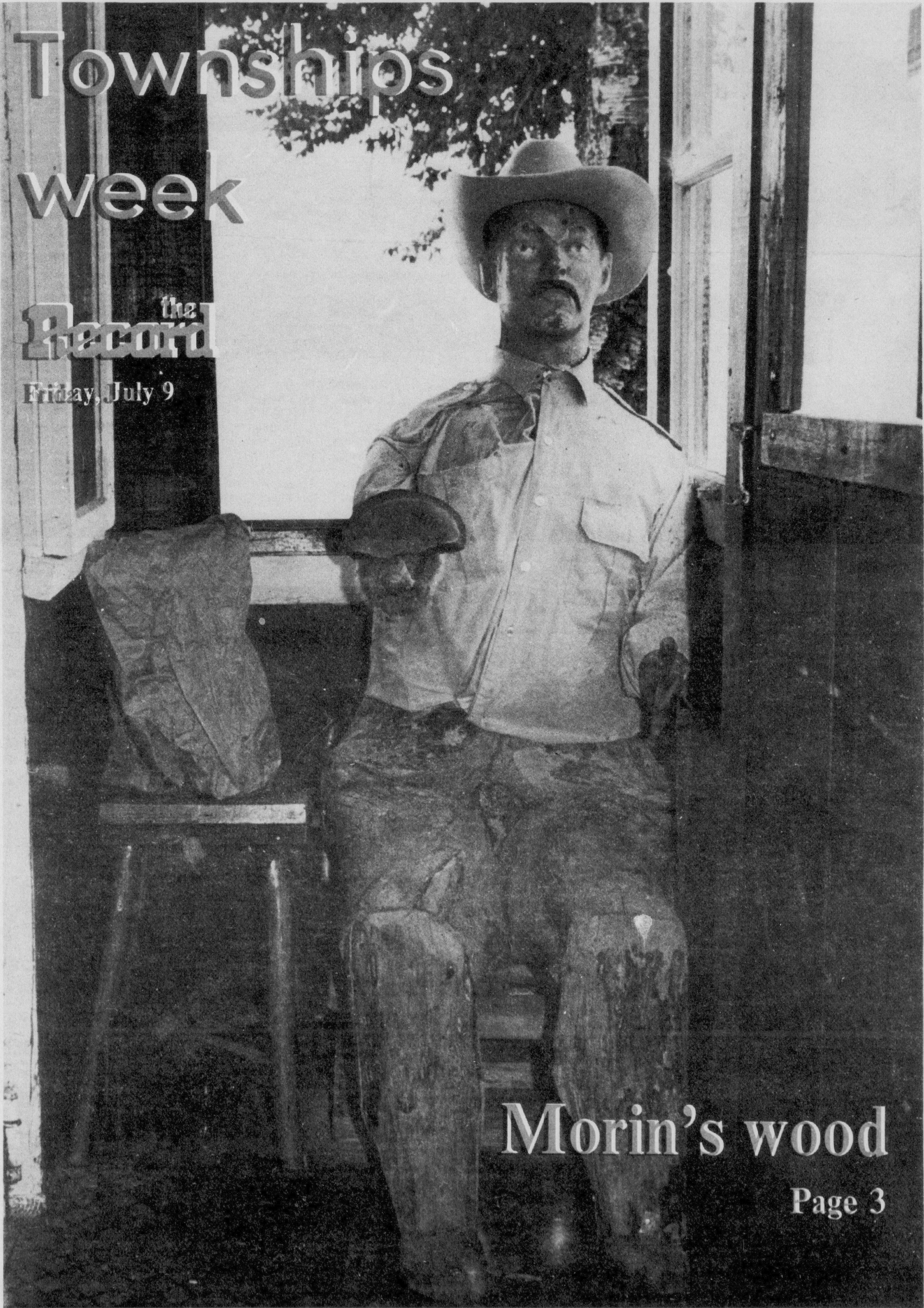

That, however, is about to change. The 21-year-old native of London, Ontario, has signed with RCA Records and has just returned from a recording session in Nashville.

"I felt the best about the session that I've ever felt in the studio," Marie says. "I was really impressed with the — professionalism, in both attitude and performance, of my producer and the musicians."

## Weepy fans greet Elvis memorabilia road show

EDMONTON (CP) — A song brought Danny Mayo and the memory of Elvis Presley to Edmonton last week.

The 31-year-old Alabama native wheeled into the city Thursday with The King's Cadillac and a collection of Presley memorabilia for a display at a local car dealership.

Shortly after the singer died in 1977, Mayo wrote a song in his memory entitled Elvis' Song.

Vernon Presley, Elvis' father, liked the song so much he called, Mayo says.

"We struck up a friendship and about a year later he made me an offer I couldn't refuse," he explained.

The elder Presley offered to sell his son's Cadillac to Mayo for \$15,000.

"I didn't have any money — my mom and dad mortgaged their house so I could buy it," said the Elvis fanatic. Mayo then used the Cadillac for collateral to buy Presley's Silverado camper for \$10,000 from the singer's father.

For the last three years, Mayo has made his living touring with the Presley vehicles, selling buttons, photographs, records and other trinkets.

The travelling

roadshow has drawn enthusiastic crowds — more than 500 Edmontonians visited Saturday.

### CROWD WEEPS

"It's been real crazy around here the past couple of days," said Westown Ford sales manager Steve Ball. "We had a group of 10 in the other day crying their eyes out, watching the videotapes."

"I'm not going to snow anybody," said Mayo, admitting the commercial side of the show is important.

He said his biggest sellers are photographs of Presley: "They go straight to the scrap book and people will have them for years."

But Mayo insisted his road show is not an attempt to capitalize on people's memories of Presley.

"I don't think this is really needed to let his memory live," he said.

"But I think Elvis was the greatest entertainer ever. I've done the show tastefully... it's just like a hall of fame."

Still-devout fans of Presley seemed to agree.

"I enjoy these displays when it's done in good taste and not just to make money," said Ron Miller, 35, of Edmonton.

"Elvis was one of the best entertainers... he

had a real feel for the people and his memory will always live on."

Mayo says the public's reverence for Presley is no surprise to him.

"He had great charisma and made a big impact on the public," he said. "The Washington Post even ran more papers on the day he died than when John Kennedy was assassinated."

# Ted Morin: Knotty trees, fungus becomes art

LAC BROMPTON SUD — Of his 81 years, the very energetic Ted Morin has spent over 42 in the log cabin he built on the Brompton "Bog" surrounded by his wood carvings and very original wood furniture of all shapes and sizes.

His house, unlike most log cabins, is built with its cedar logs running vertically rather than horizontally. "It's good for life with the logs this way. The water runs down them so the joints never rot. Cedar is also a very warm wood, so I don't need insulation. In the winter, just my small wood-stove is enough." He added, "It's over 100 years old."

Despite his years, Morin reports he is in excellent health and remains very active, starting each day off with a bicycle ride of four or five miles and an occasional ride to Magog. He rode the 10 miles there and back every summer day for 20 of the 36 years he worked at Dominion Textile. In the winter, he lived in Magog with his wife and five children. He cuts all his own

wood in the winter, does a lot of hunting for deer, rabbit and partridge, and traps mink, muskrat and raccoon.

When he's not on his bike, or rebuilding other bikes to sell, showing people around his cabin, visiting with his 17 grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren, he does his carving. Every square inch of his house is covered in woodwork of some kind. Items he has built and carved include a staircase made out of a single birch log; a replica of the apartment building one of his daughters lives in, including 3,400 bricks, balconies, windows and the pool on the roof; a variety of tables and chairs made from cross sections of trees, roots, driftwood and fungus; a driftwood couch; all sorts of animals and people engaged in different activities such as the tiny group of card cheating players; trunks; a miniature of his house and much more.

He uses imagination to transform or what he finds in the

woods. He made a she-bear out of a piece of driftwood he thought looked like one. Upon arrival at his cabin, one is greeted by a life-size wooden man made out of a bent tree-trunk he found that looks exactly like a man's torso. For the head, he used one from a mannequin he found in the woods that someone had used for target practise. He put band-aids over the bullet holes in the forehead.

Morin has also made a collection of different-sized bowls by hollowing out knots on beech trees. For his kitchen cabinets, he incorporated the paths carved in the wood by termites into their overall design. The hinges he uses are all wooden. He said he used to sell his work quite a bit, but had to slow down for tax reasons. One of his driftwood armchairs is at the Seminaire de Sherbrooke and another at the Queen Elizabeth Hotel in Montreal.

One of Morin's more utilitarian pieces is an old wooden barrel which he uses for a stereo speaker cabinet. "We found out it was good

sound when we were kids because we used to stick our heads in barrels like this with broken glass in the bottom and scream." Needless to say, he has added broken glass to his remodelled barrel.

Morin first started carving when he was seven, but said he had to give it up during his teens in order to work for his blacksmith father in Magog and for neighboring farmers during the summer. "Then I got married," he added. His wife and five kids, his work at Dominion Textile, and the bicycle shop he had at one point in Magog kept him busy for many years.

His present house is not the first one he has built. "When I was 13 or

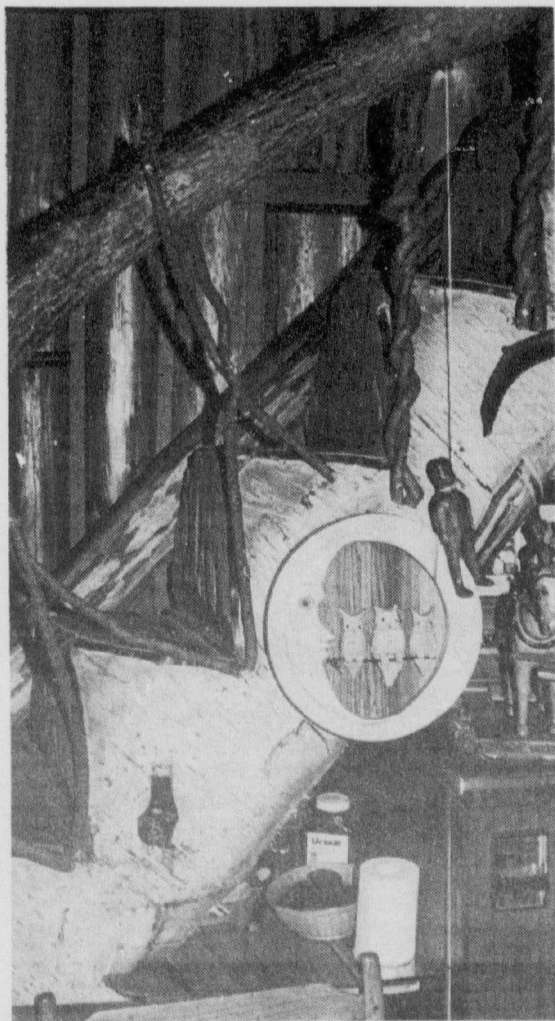
14, my father told me and my five brothers to build a log cabin near here where he used to come hunting." Then, 42 years ago, he built this one with his children. "I was the first one to build here except for Mr. Thibault at the end of the road." It is now quite a populated road and is named after Thibault.

Morin said he constantly has "busloads of people from all over the world coming to see my stuff." He has a big guest book to prove it, and welcomes visitors at any time. He explained that he loves people. When this reporter said goodbye, a small busload from the nearby Base de Plein Air Jouvence had just arrived.

# Oh! no... Pac Man fever hits western hospitals

If Terry Teitzen of Edmonton has his way, Pac-Man fever will soon sweep Canadian hospitals.

The 21-year-old entrepreneur has agreements with two city hospitals to let him start renting out battery-powered video games to patients this month, and he hopes to expand the service.

"I thought I'd alleviate the boredom of being a patient," he explained.

"I've experienced being in a hospital bed and staring at four walls."

Patients can rent one of his games, including the popular Pac-Man, for \$2 to \$3 a day.

Looking for a job? Try sitting in a treehouse for a year.

That's the strategy of unemployed actor Timothy Roy, who hopes the stunt will catch the notice of potential employers.

"The acting industry is really hurting and the only people who get work are those who have their name in print," he said Sunday as he climbed into his new Los Angeles home.

The treehouse, set in an artificial tree overlooking a miniature golf course, is the same one Glenn Woodrich lived in for 182 days in 1978, setting a mark recognized by the Guinness Book of World Records.

Roy, whose treehouse is equipped with a color TV, electric blanket and toilet, plans to remain perched there until July 4, 1983.

While most North Americans were taking it easy during the holiday weekend, Al Howie of Victoria was running the equivalent of six marathons.

Howie ran 240 kilometres to surpass the Canadian distance record for a 24-hour period.

Fuelled by water, beer and squares of chocolate, Howie added more than a kilometre to the record he set last year at the same competition, held in Ottawa.

Not one to take success lying down, Howie, 36, is entered in an

80-kilometre race next weekend in Edmonton.

Singer Kate Smith helped make God Bless America one of her country's favorite songs, and now America is returning the favor.

Smith, 75, will receive the nation's highest civilian award, the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

"I have always wanted to give my all, my voice, to America, and I have tried very hard to do everything I could to deserve being an American," she said when told of the award.

The family of Russian defector and chess grandmaster Viktor Korchnoi travelled to Switzerland on Sunday to join him after a six-year separation, but Korchnoi was off in France playing in a tournament.

When Korchnoi's wife, son and stepmother arrived, they found that the grandmaster, originally informed his family would leave the Soviet Union on June 27, was fulfilling a chess commitment.

Contacted at the tournament, Korchnoi said: "I have spent so much energy to reach this goal that I feel totally exhausted."

His wife, Bela, said it was probably western public opinion that persuaded Soviet officials to allow her to emigrate after five years of trying.

There was Elwy Yost, host of TVOntario's Saturday Night at the Movies, strolling through one of downtown Toronto's large department stores, when sales clerk Brigit Naylor called to him, "Yoo-hoo! Art. Over here!"

It turns out Yost is such a dead-ringer for ex-boxer Art Naylor, he even fooled Naylor's sister-in-law.

"People mistake me for Elwy all the time," says Naylor, a 52-year-

old exterminator who was a well-known amateur boxer around Toronto in the early 1950s. "On the subway people will stare, and some start talking to me about movies. We have the same moustache, glasses and er... hairline."

Recently, Naylor joined Yost at TVOntario for a taped interview introducing one of Elwy's Saturday Night at the Movies thrillers, I Was Monty's Double.

"Actually," says Naylor, "it's not so bad. If you're going to look like somebody, it might as well be a popular guy. Imagine what it would be like to be (Finance Minister) Allan MacEachen's double."

When Kammy Jean Sullivan appeared in court for trial on theft charges, her plea was innocent but her wardrobe said guilty.

"Hey, that's my jacket," the victim, Lenita Wilson, gasped in San Diego municipal court recently after the 18-year-old accused arrived wearing a sports warmup outfit.

Sullivan then changed her plea to guilty of receiving stolen property in connection with a car break-in April 26.

Sullivan took off the jacket and was allowed to leave court, pending her return for sentencing.

Author and humanitarian Pearl Buck will be honored on a United States postage stamp in 1983.

The stamp will be issued in Hillsboro, W. Va., Buck's birthplace.

The Austrian Skating Federation announced recently that European figureskating champion Claudia Kristofics-Binder had decided to retire.

A federation official said the bronze medalist at the 1981 world

championships had passed her final school examinations and planned post-graduate work at university.

A Reston, Man., area farmer was named King Farmer recently after a three-day farm skills competition which drew about 80 participants from southwestern Manitoba.

Glenn Caldwell, 31, faced Henri Van Mol of Pilot Mound in a playoff to break a first place tie in the finals. Third place winner was Allan Guild of Brandon.

The eight top finishers split a total of \$25,000 in farm equipment prizes after competing in nine events which included judging cattle weight, setting up harrows, welding, identifying weeds, guessing the amount of grain in a truck and other farm skills.

Canada has long been known for its hockey players, but now it has a world-class stone-skipper as well.

Dave Hollins of Ottawa put in a 16-skip performance Sunday to win the professional stone-skipping tournament in Mackinaw Island, Mich.

Hollins pocketed \$200 for the victory but had to turn down another prize — 45 kilograms of fudge — because of customs complications.

Actor Charlton Heston, often touted for political office, says being "president of the United States three times," is enough for

any man.

Heston referred to his presidential movie roles at a news conference in New Delhi, India, where he will appear in a film on refugees.

The former Oscar-winner said he has "great respect" for his friend Ronald Reagan, but does not want to follow in his footsteps and enter politics.

Comedian George Carlin, who suffered his second heart attack in May, is planning to resume concert and recording work as soon as possible.

Carlin, 45, will learn from doctors this week if he needs by-pass surgery, an operation that would keep him in hospital until September.

If not, Carlin will be back at work within a week.

Two commercial jet pilots were taken aback last week when they sighted a UFL — Unidentified Flying Lawn chair.

Piloting the strange aircraft was Larry Walters, a 33-year-old Los Angeles truck driver, who soared five kilometres above ground buoyed by 45 weather balloons.

During the 45-minute flight, in which he used jugs of water as ballast, Walters got so cold he became numb.

His journey ended unceremoniously when his contraction wrapped around a power line in Long Beach, Calif., about 32 kilometres from where he started.

## Few Swiss wines here — a shame

When in conversation one mentions Switzerland, the usual image is that of mountains, cheese, clocks and a funny blonde-headed young thing named Heidi. One hardly ever thinks of wine and this is a shame.

For all its expertise in the manufacturing of army knives, cow bells and cheese, this country, trapped by the Alps, is also the producer of some very good wine. Admittedly, nothing that Switzerland produces in the realm of Bacchus matches the best of France, Italy or the U.S.A., but the wine that comes from this mountain republic is often good and sometimes exceptional.

Vines have grown in Switzerland from the beginning of recorded history, particularly in the area of the south west around the cantons of Geneva, Neuchatel, Valais and Vaud. The area under cultivation encompasses about 70 square miles and although some original vine types still exist, the majority are those imported from other parts of Europe.

Since the climate is at best variable and the soil reminiscent of parts of Germany, it is easy to understand that the greatest part of production is devoted to white rather than red wines.

The major grapes grown in the four cantons are the Chasselas, Pinot Gris, Marsanne, Riesling, Sylvaner and Traminer — all white. For red wines it's the Gamay and the Pinot Noire.

Some of the best wines and worth noting are the Fendant, a very light dry wine from Valais, the Johannisberger, made from the Sylvaner grape also coming from Valais, and the only really important red, Dole.

Dole, although to my knowledge not available in Quebec, is well worth trying. Made from the Pinot Noire, the Gamay, or a combination of both grapes, it is usually a wine of full bouquet and yet soft and fruity like a beaujolais.

Switzerland also produces a sweet wine called Malvoisie. The name Malvoisie probably stems from the fact that the grape used to produce the wine is very similar to that used in the production of sweet wines in Greece, Cyprus and Italy — the Malvasia.

Strangely enough, although the Swiss produce predominately white wine, they can hardly be called wine snobs themselves since they import large quantities of wine from both France and Germany. As a matter of fact, some would suggest that the national drink is probably Burgundy.

The SAQ unfortunately makes no concerted effort to offer Quebecers any Swiss wines, so the ones available are hardly a representative sample of what this mountain-nation has to offer. Couple this with the fact that the Swiss drink most of their own wine, and you have a situation in which the dedicated oenophile will be forced to travel to Europe to really see for himself.

Come to think of it, that's probably not a bad idea. Cheers!

# Benoit's grandson follows steps with lamb canteen

SUTTON — Ian MacDonald is following in his grandmother, Jehane Benoit's footsteps. In one month, he will open a stand "along the canteen line" at which he'll serve his family's lamb prepared in various ways, incorporating his love for cooking and sheep-farming.

"I've always enjoyed cooking with lamb and have always wanted to promote it to take it out of the specialty market. Being a different kind of meat, you have to cook it differently. There are so many sheep now in Quebec, but lamb is still a specialty food and more expensive than pork or beef." Although most of the recipes he will use for the tourtières, sausages, and lamb-burgers are his grandmother's secret ones, he admitted, "I have a few of my own."

MacDonald claimed his whole family cooks, and that he has been serious about it since he was 12. "The first time I tried was when I was five. I saw my grandmother making some banana bread and I wanted to try it, so I put a banana in a pan with some yeast and put it in the oven. My mother couldn't believe it. It was green inside, though."

His cooking has improved since then especially since the two-year professional cooking course he took at Massey-Vanier High School in Cowansville and the three or so years he spent studying with his grandmother, with whom he learned the most.

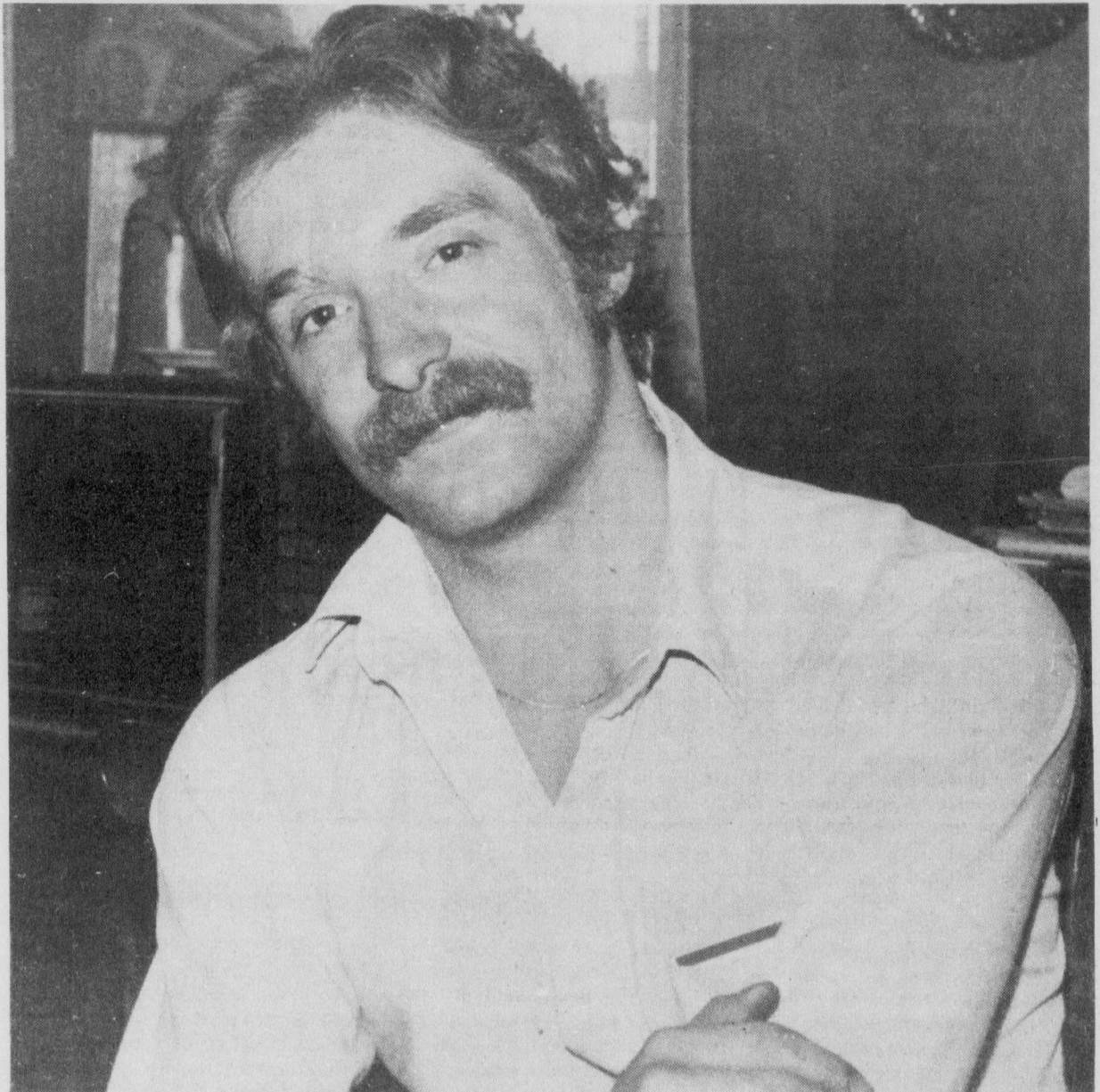
"I will keep the menu as small and natural as possible," he explained. Aside from the lamb

dishes, he will also serve fresh breads with or without traditional Scottish cheese spreads in various combination and desserts by season. He said they taste best when in season and it's a logical way to beat inflation.

In the meantime, MacDonald is building an 18 x 22 foot building with his father and a carpenter. Located right next to the family's Noirmouton farm shop, he said he feels the stand and the shop will complement each other, each one's clientele discovering the other shop. His kitchen will be in the back and there will be a small, simple dining area in the front and a patio outside. He said he believes most customers will buy to take out, especially during the winter. MacDonald will do all his cooking at his grandmother's up the road from his home and the future stand, then freeze it and reheat it in the stand's kitchen.

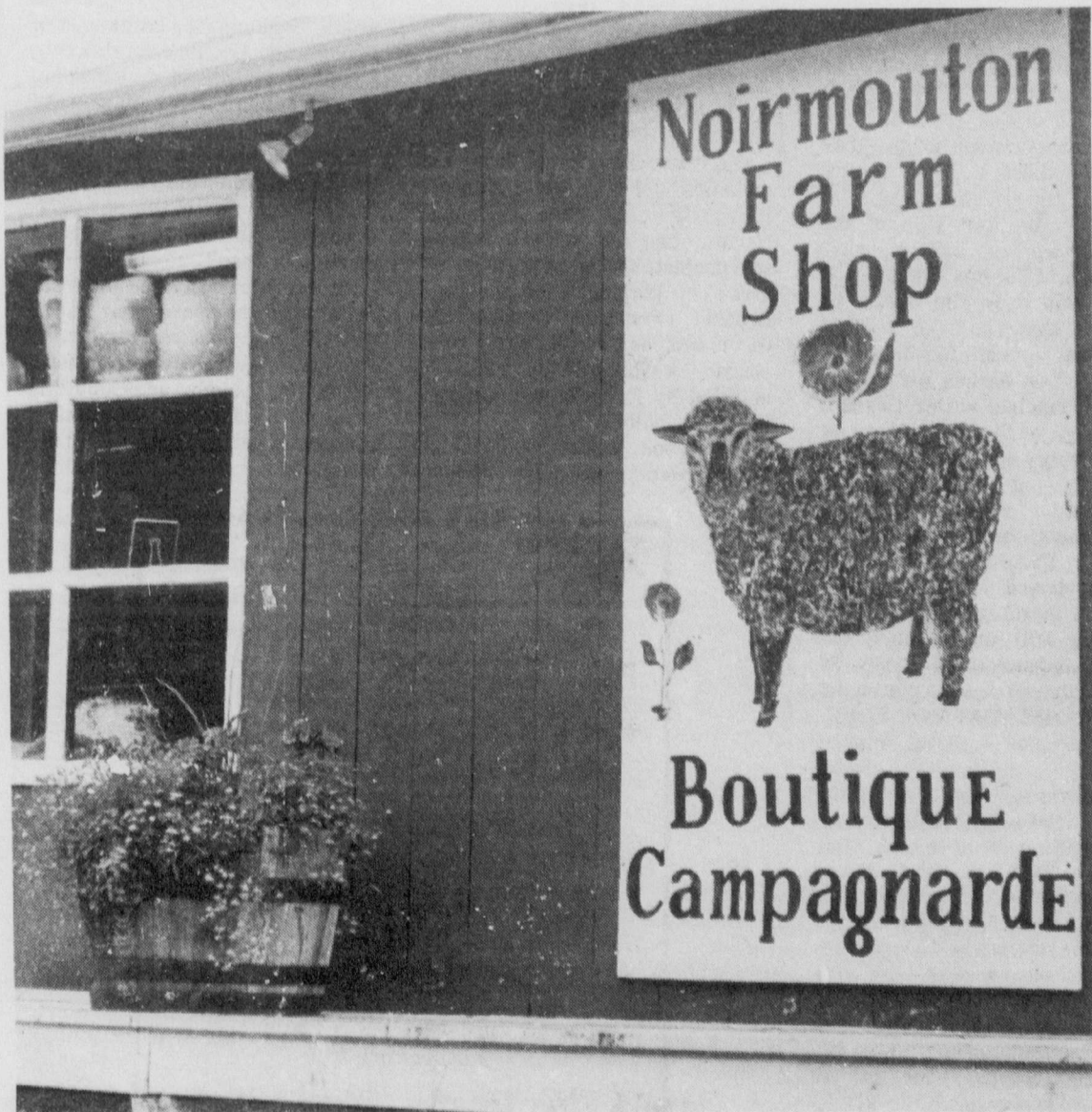
MacDonald has lived at the Noirmouton farm all his 23 years and says he does not plan to leave it. "I've always loved this hill." When he and his grandparents came up with the idea about one month ago, he said he realized it would be a perfect way to combine his two loves: cooking and sheep-farming. "One of my dreams is to have a restaurant here. When this opportunity came up, I just couldn't say no." He added, "I think it can go far."

He will combine his Scottish and French-Canadian roots, his family's reputation for sheep-farming and cooking and his own talent and initiative to offer something completely unique to hungry Townshippers.

# Controlling Interest: Stats without governmentalese

**Controlling Interest - The Canadian Gas and Oil Stakes**, by David Crane, McClelland and Stewart, 1982.

The interesting thing about statistics is their flexibility. Given enough time and enough numbers to work with, a good accountant or statistician could prove to the satisfaction of the general populous that North Americans are underfed. Likewise, but with far less effort, the major oil companies, mustering volumes of facts and figures, have convinced generations of Canadians and their elected representatives that the oil cartel does in fact work for the benefit of Canadian consumers.

Unfortunately for the multinationals, or perhaps fortunately for consumers, the

veracity of this statement has come under increasing scrutiny. As oil prices skyrocketed after the successful price-fixing attempts of the OPEC cartel and as rumors of oil shortages became common throughout North America, the Canadian government, under pressure from oil consumers, launches a series of investigations into the workings of the Canadian subsidiaries of the multinationals.

Highlighting the investigations was the government report entitled **The State of Competition in the Canadian Petroleum Industry**. What the report concluded, albeit in the best tradition of jargon-loaded "governmentalese", was that Canadian branch-plant companies such as Gulf Canada, Imperial Oil, Texaco Canada, BP Canada etc. were dominated by their parent companies and had

been involved in a concerted effort to manipulate the oil market in Canada to the ultimate benefit of the foreign-based head office.

David Crane, Economic Editor of the *Toronto Star*, has taken the process one step further and made the mysteries of the report available to the average Canadian. In **Controlling Interest**, Crane offers us a complete, entirely readable account of the manoeuvrings of the multinationals — manoeuvrings that resulted in artificially high prices for Canadian consumers and the ultimate destruction of the native-Canadian oil industry.

Supported by a wealth of facts and figures and considerable experience, Crane takes the reader on a back-alley journey to expose not only the strings attached to the Canadian oil puppets but the string pullers themselves. From John D.

Rockefeller's attempt to force up oil prices in the 1890s to C.D. Howe's refusal to warn Canadians of the danger of foreign ownership in the 1950s, the tale that unfolds is one of a level of collusion unknown in any other major industry.

Not incidentally, Crane's work also acts as a justification for the government's National Energy Policy. For all its failings, the creation of Petro-Canada and the federal government's attempts to regain control of Canada's energy industry, is seen as neither unjust nor unusual.

Crane points out that the response of the multinationals to the NEP is indicative of the historical rejection of Canadian interests. By choosing a wait-and-see attitude, i.e. by refusing to carry out further exploration and by cutting back investment in the Canadian sector, the major oil

companies hope to increase their bargaining power with future ministers. The immediate cost to the Canadian consumer will be perhaps higher prices and a slowdown within the industry, but the long-range benefits should more than make up for this.

"There are," says Crane, "in any country's history, important and decisive turning points that alter its direction and sense of being. In Canada's case, the decision to seek Canadian ownership and control of at least half of one of the country's most vital economic sectors will, years from now, come to be seen as one of those points."

If anyone doubts the validity of this statement or the duplicity of the international oil cartel, I suggest they read **Controlling Interest**.

## Paton brings soothing direction to quirky Camel

Camel **THE SINGLE FACTOR (A&M)**

Camel, a British group with considerable longevity, receives a fresh shot in the arm with an album that incorporates a familiar name into the band. David Paton, once a stalwart with the short-lived, one-substantial-hit group Pilot, ("It's Magic") joins Camel, and the result is a more soothing, tuneful, and ultimately commercial direction than the quirky Camel have ever chosen. Paton plays bass on the arrangements, plus sings lead vocal on one track, and background harmonies on several. Most of the lead vocal work is handled by Andy Latimer, who provides guitar, piano and even bass and mellotron contributions.

Vocal blends are silky smooth and make a couple of side two's tracks excellent fare for those who admire the British styles of bands such as Genesis -- "Today's Goodbye" or the hauntingly pretty "Camelogue", are excellent songs. Andy Latimer's lyrical work on guitar, joined with the poly-Moog and ARP 2600 effects created by Anthony Phillips, fade the album out in fine fashion with melodies reigning supreme. Camel's return with such a formidable line-up and eager guest artists could spell competition for Genesis in the future.

Pete Townshend **ALL THE BEST COWBOYS HAVE CHINESE EYES (ATCO-WEA)**

Pete Townshend takes his rock and roll quite seriously. His latest solo album, hitting the market hot after his cover story-interview in *Rolling Stone*, is a cryptic, intricate slice of rock at its most challenging. The title alone has created controversy, but the inside cover contains an anti-American, anti-Reagan, anti-Hollywood, page of rhetoric in prose and poetry that may perhaps aid or obscure the deciphering of the meaning behind the most intricate songs since the "Tommy" project.

There are not too many of contemporary society's ills and hypocrisies that escape Pete Townshend's pen. But perhaps it is Hollywood, as the epicenter of American society that comes in for most of Pete's musical invective: "Exquisitely Bored" is a clever

indictment of L.A. -- "Pray TV looks like pay TV to me... There's a whole lot of crazy people up there, - Living out a life in sweet ennui". **CHINESE EYES** is an album that defies a quick spin and a singalong with several catchy tunes -- the melodies are as intricate as the themes, and as usual Townshend's guitarmanhood is superb. Armed with the lyric sheet and a wariness for the Who's involved rock and roll, listeners to Pete Townshend's **CHINESE EYES** will find more genuine social comment here than can be gleaned from a dozen old Dylan albums.

Frankie Miller **STANDING ON THE EDGE (CAPITOL)**

Winner of the Bob Seger Clone Award, Frankie Miller is an artist who has a string of albums to his credit -- but until this one, the striking similarity to Seger's style has remained coincidental. **STANDING ON THE EDGE** is a 10-track tribute to Seger's sound -- raw-throated vocals, guitar-fired arrangements, even the harmonies in the background vocals seem to have had a course in the Bob Seger Silver Bullet Band dynamics. Frankie Miller puts his own band on hold for this album, calling in the entire stable of Muscle Shoals artists -- Barry Beckett on keyboards, who also produces; Roger Hawkins on drums; Pete Carr on guitar; and Chris Spedding on slide guitars; with expected results of tight, crisp takes on the songs Miller writes alone or with co-author Andy Fraser.

Glasgow-born Miller is still looking for an American hit, but his writing has already been noticed by Delbert McClinton, Ray Charles, Kim Carnes and of course, Seger, who used "Ain't Got No Money" on his **STRANGER IN TOWN** album. The Glasie lad traces his musical roots back to adulation of rockers such as Little Richard and bluesers like the Stax-Volt greats Otis Redding and Wilson Pickett, and those influences come filtering through the

Scotch blues-rock on Frankie Miller's **Muscle Shoals** collaboration. Whether American rock audiences treat this Celt with the same affection they reserved for Rod Stewart, the Rollers and Nazareth remains to be seen.

Air Supply **NOW AND FOREVER (POLYGRAM)**

Quickly established as the big production blasters of love songs, the down under group Air Supply fill up their latest album with more of the same operatic rock. The trouble with **NOW AND FOREVER** is that there is very little balance between songs -- they are all without a doubt pretty songs, but the sweetness begins to cloy after the first side of the record. "Two Less Lonely People In The World" seems like a son of "Every Woman In The World" or "The One That You Love", with a chorus that appears familiar, and a variation on earlier Air Supply themes. Principal writer Graham Russell, one of the two lead voices in Air Supply -- the other is Russell Hitchcock -- goes for the lush, symphonic sound in his arrangements on this third album, hung on Frank Esler-Smith's lilting keyboard style. Amazingly the seven members of the Aussie band are still intact since the awesome successes of **LOST IN LOVE** (above double platinum) and **THE ONE THAT YOU LOVE**. For those who dote on angelic choruses, celestial string arrangements, and aching poignant love songs, there are no finer practitioners of the art than the ever mellifluous balladeers. Air Supply.

Toto **IV (COLUMBIA)**

Although they trailed off slightly in the pair of albums that followed their knockout debut, Toto re-establishes itself as the second generation successor to the Blood, Sweat & Tears tradition. On **IV**, the L.A. sextet weave their twin keyboards signature sound

through some compelling songs--kicked off by "Rosanna", which is garnering AM airplay for a band that has had a tenuous existence by virtue of appealing to the FM adult oriented rock category. **IV** is graced with some astounding brass overdubs by the likes of Tom Scott, Jim Horn and Jimmy Pankow of Chicago-- plus soaring high harmonies from unemployed Eagle Timothy B. Schmit, whose vocals join the Toto regulars David Paich, Steve Lukather and front-man Bobby Kimball. It has taken Toto four albums, but they have finally got their considerable instrumental talents aligned with a strong vocal ensemble and the result is an album of accomplished richness and inventive contemporary rock.

Gary Brooker **LEAD ME TO THE WATER (VERTIGO-POLYGRAM)**

The man who charted the great melodies for one of Britain's favourite cult bands, Procol Harum, has released his second solo project, backed by a glittering array of playing friends. Gary Brooker (who sang Procol's anthems such as their definitive rock classic "A Whiter Shade of Pale") is aided by Eric Clapton, George Harrison, Albert Lee and Tim Renwick on guitars, plus Phil Collins, Henry Spinetta and Steve

Holly on drums, Dave Markee on bass, and Chris Stainton filling in any of the black and whites that the prolific pianist himself might miss.

**LEAD ME TO THE WATER** contains such esoteric highlights as "The Angler", inspired by the pages of Izaak Walton's Renaissance handbook for fishermen, and the teasingly erotic "Low Flying Birds", a play on the English nickname for females.

Harrison's hesitant, underplayed guitars are present, softly peeking through the brash, bold piano figures that Brooker uses to tell his strange marriages of melody and quirky lyrics. George's guitar on "Mineral Man" is reminiscent of the playing on tracks on **LET IT BE** which revealed a cautious Beatle beginning to break out of John and Paul's dominance. Brooker's release is a rhapsodic, soaring album, with flights of lyrical beauty that engage a listener the way that the songs of Procol Harum did until their disbanding in May of 1977. Brooker's return to rock salvages a quirky, original talent that has been sorely missed. At a time when aspects of the biz appear to be caught in an electronic, tuneless depression, Gary Brooker's pretty flights of melody and haunting songs are a solace amidst the clutter of synthesizers and synthetic drum beats.

# Locals at Festival Lennoxville: Jill Gyorgy, 'animator'

"I'll go around and knock on doors if I have to."

With that determined statement Jill Gyorgy, co-ordinator at Festival Lennoxville, expresses her resolve that the local drama festival will reach its goal of selling 20,000 tickets this year.

Gyorgy, a Lennoxville resident and mother of two, has been working for Festival for a year and a half, and is the group's longest continuous employee. "I was hired to babysit the festival in late 1980 when its future was in limbo," she recalls, "and for a while I was the only person in the office."

Gyorgy says the atmosphere at Festival was depressing for a while, as the group faced a dubious future because of high financial deficits, but adds that "things started looking up around the time we began to organize the concert last year with Andre Gagnon." The complete success of that show enabled Festival to meet financial requirements for grants, and guaranteed the continuation of what Gyorgy describes as "an important community event".

Gyorgy is confident that the impressive line-up of productions offered this summer will assure enough ticket sales to allow the festival to continue next season, but feels the local community

doesn't appreciate the importance of the event to the area. "Before I came to work here I took Festival for granted, and didn't realize what it does for the community. I don't think anyone who hasn't been involved does. And without the support of the average Townships we could lose it."

Gyorgy says her contacts with local businessmen has confirmed her belief that the summer festival brings a lot of money into the area, and says that the absence of the event last year hurt a lot of people financially. "It even hurt students who couldn't find anyone to sublet their apartments for the summer."

Gyorgy, a graduate of Bishop's with a degree in French, describes herself as an "animator" by nature, and has been involved with many social action activities. She worked for the Eastern Townships Social Action Group when that group started the Townships Sun, and was a partner with Bob Dawson when the paper became a private enterprise after federal funding stopped. After that she worked in the Audio Visual centre at Champlain College, as well as doing some supply teaching and free-lance writing for *The Record*.

Gyorgy says her experiences with Festival Lennoxville has been "quite an education" and she

marvels at the professionalism and dedication of the cast and crew. She feels that with the support of the community at large the Festival will continue to be one of the best in Canada.

Gyorgy first came to Lennoxville as a teenager to study at Bishop's from her native Washington, D.C., and describes the town as her home. "I'm a Canadian citizen now and I'd like to stay here as long as I can, but it's not always easy." She says she'd like to see Townshippers get together to save their institutions, and hopes to be able to get involved in this type of work on an active level.

As for Festival Lennoxville, she hopes more "average" Townshippers will get out to see some of the shows, and hopes that more will realize that there is something in theatre for everybody. "Some people seem to think there's something 'highbrow' about going to the theatre, but I feel that everybody can enjoy the plays. They're all pretty down to earth."

Gyorgy is confident the festival will do well this summer, but is not letting that confidence turn into complacency. "I'm driving all of my friends and acquaintances crazy making sure everybody gets out and buys a subscription, but Festival is important and we've got to do our part."

## Montrealer takes theatre to TO

TORONTO (CP) — Ten years ago, the sagest advice Marion Andre could get in the Toronto theatre world was: "It can't be done." But Andre has done it.

He arrived in Toronto from Montreal — where he had been artistic director of the Saidye Bronfman Centre for five years — to establish a high-quality summer-season theatre in an awkward concert hall. He proposed a program of challenging, contemporary plays, dealing with political, moral and social problems.

Everyone in the Toronto theatre community told him there was no audience for that sort of thing during the summer. Theatregoers in the city went to their rural cottages. If they did decide to spend a summer night at the theatre, they wanted light, straw-hat entertainment.

Andre proved them all wrong with Theatre Plus, his company at the St. Lawrence Centre. It has become Toronto's second-largest professional theatre enterprise, staging four to six plays a year for four-week runs for more than 7,000 subscribers.

He operates on a budget of \$850,000 and his audiences are surpassed only by Toronto Arts Productions, the winter season theatre in the St. Lawrence Centre.

Andre, the son of a Jewish pharmacist, was raised in Poland. Marion fought against the German occupation under an assumed identity in the Polish underground in the Second World War until he became a German prisoner of war.

TO CANADA IN 1957

After the war, he became a

writer, translator and director of theatre, radio and television in Warsaw. In 1957 Andre emigrated to Canada, continuing the same kind of work in English in Montreal. With the Saidye Bronfman Centre from 1967, he re-established English language professional theatre in Montreal.

Disagreement with the Bronfman Centre board over the choice of a play prompted Andre's move to Toronto in 1972, where he formed Theatre Plus.

The diminutive, greying director-manager, his eyes flashing with geniality and enthusiasm, described in an interview his conviction that theatre must reflect what is going on in the world and the current concerns of individuals.

"I think our streets are paved not with gold but with the subject matter for dramatic plays. What about Western alienation? What about the enormous tensions in the world? Our own state is in a turmoil.

"Unless we deal with those phenomena, we are missing the boat.

"Jean-Paul Sartre (the left-wing French philosopher and writer) said people are afraid to ask questions, even of themselves. But when they are sitting in a darkened theatre, they can ask those questions which they have inside them but are afraid to ask outside."

DEAL WITH QUESTIONS

Andre would like to deal with such questions in a theatrical way.

"For instance, I don't understand how few plays there are about the Quebec situation, seen

not from the Quebec viewpoint but from the viewpoint of English Canada."

He currently is working with a Montreal playwright, Roger Fournier, on a play to feature actress Louise Marleau. It is about a French-Canadian woman among a group of English-Canadian men.

Andre's playbill at Theatre Plus has been predominantly English, European and American contemporary drama, for which he has to buy performing rights in competition with other producers.

Rights for the English plays he wants often are sold to New York producers in deals that include Toronto performing rights. He thinks it wrong to consider Toronto merely an extension of the New York audience.

He has included some new Canadian plays in his programs. But Theatre Plus can rarely find either the money or the time to commission Canadian playwrights and work with them intensively to create the new plays.

IDEA FROM NDP LEADER

He got one playwright to examine a Northern Ontario mining family situation suggested by former provincial NDP leader Stephen Lewis — a dramatic story about two sons of an injured miner, one extreme right-wing and the other left-wing. After two months, the playwright found the subject boring.

"I think many of our playwrights are befuddled by situation comedies on TV," says Andre. "They are looking for the facile rather than the gripping."

The display will be open from 11 until 5 and from 11 until 4 on Sundays. As an added attraction the artists themselves will be present from noon until 3 on July 10.

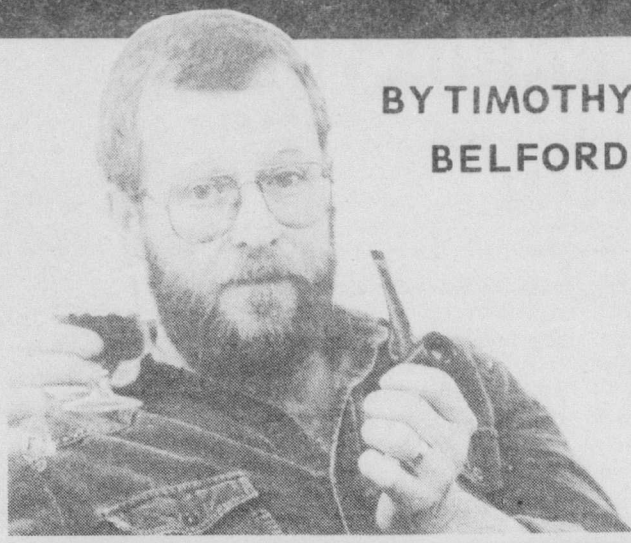
The Sherbrooke Library will be opening an exhibit of the works of recent works by GINETTE MARCOUX on Friday, July 9, which will run until July 30.

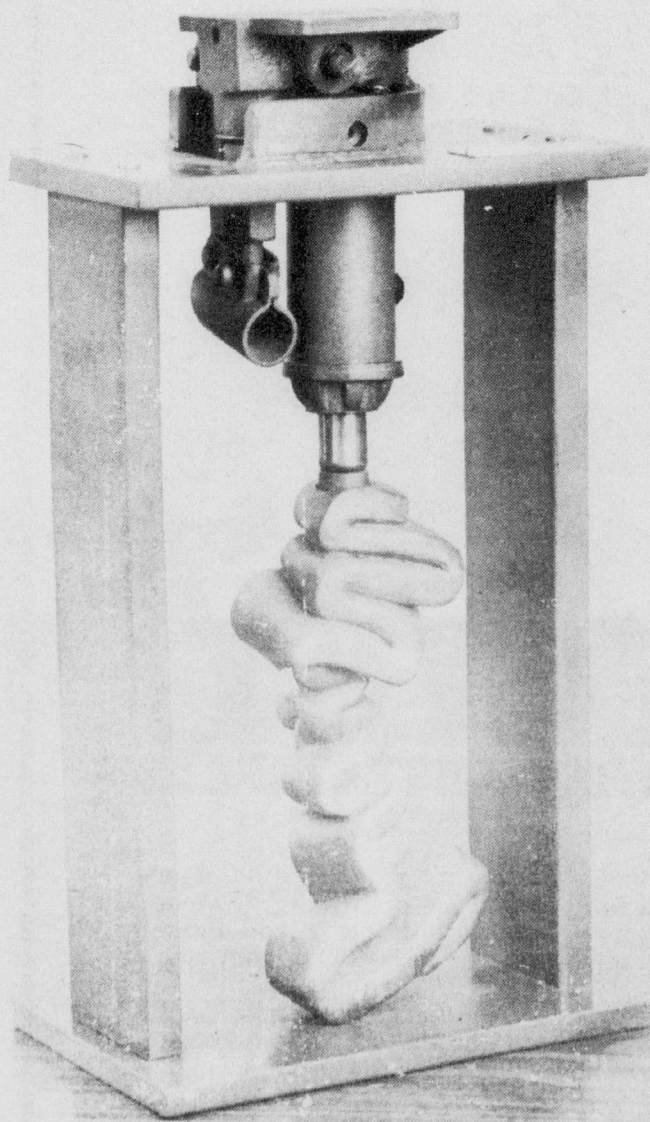
This award-winning documentary premiered in 1981 accompanied by a good deal of popular and critical acclaim. Essentially the story of five inmates of Kingston's women's prison, P4W, follows the day-to-day existence of the women showing in glaring detail the frustrations, pain and rage.

Although for some it will appear excessively depressing, P4W is an even-handed, microscopic look at a section of society usually forgotten with the slamming of the prison door.

EVERYBODY TALKS ABOUT IT BUT NO ONE EVER DOES ANYTHING is a lighthearted look at the possibilities of controlling the weather that airs Sunday, July 11 on EARTHBOUND.

The last selection on CBC that looks promising is a drama entitled DAVID'S STORY which stars the excellent Sir Ralph Richardson as an aging political figure living out his retirement in a quiet English country village.

The character Kitchen, played by Richardson, is an

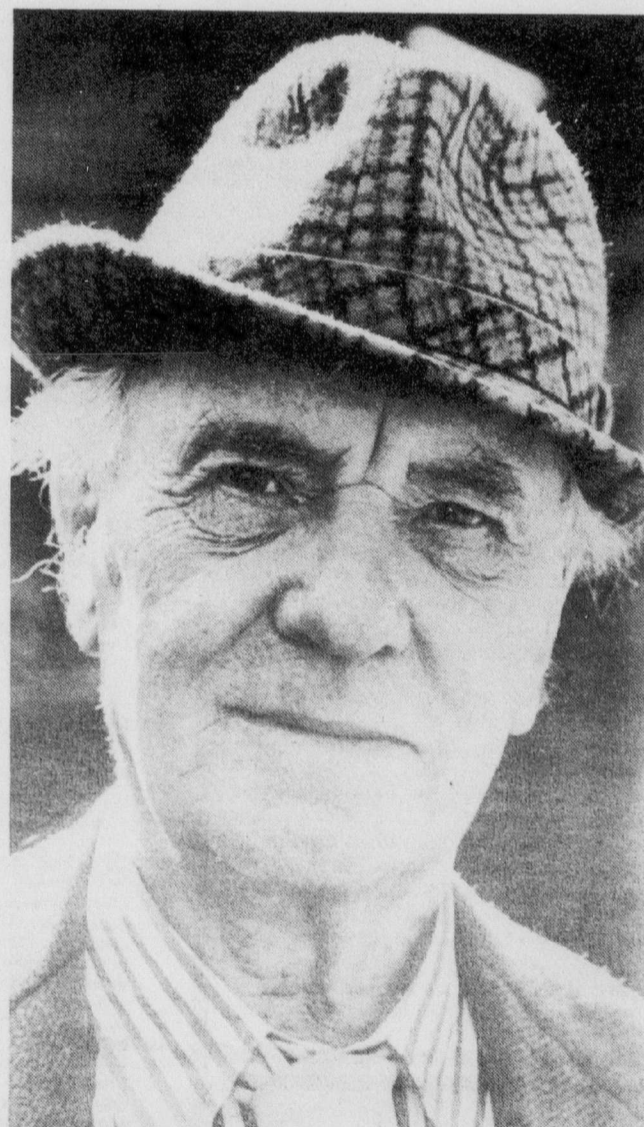

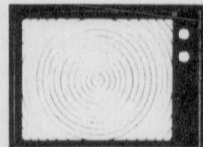

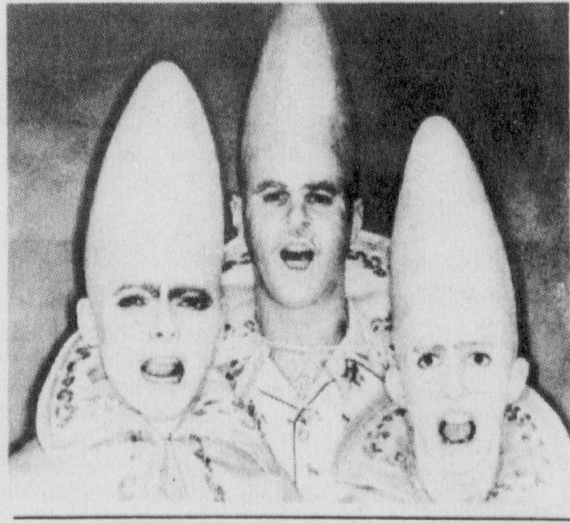

"Guiding Light," the Emmy Award-winning daytime drama, celebrated its 30th anniversary on the CBS Television Network on Wednesday, June 30.

The serial made its television debut in 1952, after 15 years as a radio favorite. At the time of its television premiere, it was 15 minutes in length.

"Guiding Light" was one of the first radio dramas to make the transition to television, and the only former radio drama still on the air. It surpasses all other dramatic programs in total broadcast years.

The serial received three 1981-82 Emmy Awards this month, including Outstanding Daytime Drama and Outstanding Writing for a Daytime Drama. The program was a recipient of the writing award the previous year as well, and was named Outstanding Daytime Drama in 1979-80.

Charita Bauer, the only remaining original cast member of the current series, joined the radio version of "Guiding Light" in 1950. In the years the radio and television versions overlapped (following the same storyline), she performed in both programs on the same day. When she began

her role as matriarch Bert (Bertha) Bauer, it was pure coincidence that actress Bauer's surname was the same as her character's.

In addition to Miss Bauer, prominent members of the serial's current cast include Don Stewart and Peter Simon, who play her sons, attorney Mike Bauer and Dr. Ed Bauer; Elvera Roussel and Christopher Bernau, as Mike's daughter, Hope, and her wealthy husband, Alan Spaulding; Lisa Brown and Michael Tylor as the unpredictable Nola Reardon and her mysterious employer, Quinton McCord; John Wesley Shipp and Jennifer Cooke as Kelly Nelson and his wife, model Morgan Nelson; Ellen Dolan as Nola's sister, Maureen Reardon; and Mark Pinter as the devious Mark Evans.

"Guiding Light," which is taped in New York City, has been a pioneer in remote taping techniques. Viewers of the serial have been treated to trips to Jamaica, St. Croix and the Canary Islands, and various remotes within the United States in recent months (the serial received a 1981-82 Emmy Award for one of its remotes).

Other recent distinctions have included guest appearances by popular artists of today's music world, including Judy Collins, the B-52's, Maurice Gibb, Ashford and Simpson and Tony Award winner Jennifer Holliday.

Among the many "graduates" of the long-running series are Barnard Hughes, Lilia Skala, Sandy Dennis, Caroline Williams, Jan Sterling, Ruth Warrick, Joseph Campanella, Cicely Tyson, Blythe Danner, Billy Dee Williams, Christopher Walken, James Earl Jones, Chris Sarandon and Ruby Dee.

## How fair are the Daytime Emmys?

During the calendar year of 1980, **Tony Geary** (Luke Spencer, "General Hospital") unquestionably did his best acting work, not only driving up "GH's" Nielsen rating numbers to a record high for a daytime drama, but attracting for the first time the attention of the national press to a soap opera star. Yet that year he was passed over for the Emmy for Outstanding Actor in a daytime drama series when he lost out to **Doug Watson** (Mac Cory, "Another World").

In 1981, "GH" rating numbers tumbled and Geary did not turn in as fine performances as in 1980. Yet, last month Geary picked up his Emmy award, while many other actors nominated in his category did much better work in '81.

Are the Daytime Emmy awards fair? Many members of the daytime com-

munity have raised their voices in protest since the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences first began presenting the Daytime Emmys in 1973.

Many feel the awards are presented undemocratically.

Since membership is voluntary, there is an unofficial concerted effort by the networks to get their own actors and backstage personnel to join. Whether by its active efforts or by merit, ABC garnered 63 nominations — more than CBS, NBC and PBS combined.

Of the 28 acting nominations, all except two went to those on ABC shows and all the resultant awards went to ABC actors. In the next few weeks, NBC and CBS may issue a joint official complaint to the Academy questioning the ethics of the Emmy nomination and voting procedures.

## Heather Thomas doesn't fall down

Last summer's writer's strike put a tremendous amount of pressure on the actors to perform quickly and efficiently in their respective TV series.

For Heather Thomas, the 23-year-old former UCLA film major who was cast as apprentice stuntwoman Jody Banks on ABC's "Fall Guy" series, last summer was an experience she'll never forget.

"The scripts were shot pretty much as we got them. We were way behind schedule because of the strike, so everybody was in a rush to get the show on-the-air," says Miss Thomas, who was picked for the part by co-star Lee Majors.

"We had something like five rewrites a day and I'll tell you, it taught me to become the fastest cold reader around. Thank goodness we had good writers. To be extremely frank, we all learned to be flexible, too. Under those circumstances, you better do your homework the night before. Let's face it, you are only as good as your crew.

"Lee was extremely considerate despite the fact that my role was basically an ancillary character. The first season of any series

should be used to establish the characters and I didn't mind that Jody Banks wasn't involved as much as Lee's character, Colt Seavers.

Reports have circulated that Miss Thomas has had run-ins with the producers of that film because of their wish to pose the actress in the nude. She refused and much to her dismay, discovered that the film used a naked double instead.

"In films, it seems that the scripts are written by guys who've never had sex before. 'Fall Guy' is a kids show and I want to represent myself properly," she asserts.
