## POSTAL INFORMATION.

Under the Special War Revenue Act of March, 1915, letters mailed in Canada for delivery in Canada or in any country or colony to which the postage rate on letters is two cents per ounce, are subject to a War tax of one cent each; and the same tax applies to post cards bearing written communications addressed to places in Canada, the United States and Mexico. Letters and post cards on which the war tax required is not prepaid, will not be forwarded to destination. Each postal note issued in Canada is subject to a War Tax of one cent; and each Post Office Money Order issued in Canada is subject to a War Tax of two cents.

**Postage.**—Letters addressed to places in Canada, Great Britain and British Colonies and possessions, Egypt, United States and Mexico, 2 cents per oz., or fraction thereof.

**Suburban Offices.**—For St. Lambert, Longueuil, Montreal South, 2 cts. per oz.

Drop letters for the city, Westmount, Outremont, Maisonneuve, Verdun and Montreal West, one cent per oz.

Letters addressed to places in Canada must be at least partially prepaid, and those addressed to the United States or Mexico must be prepaid at least a full rate, 2 cents, otherwise they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Letters addressed to places in Canada, and partly prepaid, will be forwarded, subject on delivery to double amount of deficient postage.

**Re-Directed Letters.**—Re-directed letters are not liable to any additional postage, if handed back to the Post Office with a changed address at the moment of delivery or as soon as possible thereafter, provided always the change in the address does not require the letter to be sent to any place to which the postage rate is higher than was at first payable.

Re-directed letters should not be dropped into a Post Office Box or receiver unless additional postage has been put on to carry them to their second destination.

**Request and Address Letters.**—Letters from places in Canada, the United Kingdom, the United States, Mexico and Newfoundland, covered by envelopes bearing a "Request" that the letters be returned to the sender if not delivered within a certain specified time, or the address of the sender either printed or written, will be returned as requested if not delivered in the time stated. Address letters having no time for return specified are held for a week in cities and for 15 days in other places.

**Special Delivery.**—The senders of letters posted at any Post-office in Canada and addressed to a city Post-office now having free delivery by letter carriers, on payment of special delivery stamps of the face value of 10 cents or of that amount in ordinary postage stamps affixed to each letter in addition to the ordinary postage to which the same are liable, will secure their special delivery daily, except Sunday, to the persons to whom they are addressed within the limits of letter carrier delivery at any of the following Post-offices in cities, viz.; Halifax, St. John, N.B., Moncton, Fredericton, Quebec, Montreal Ottawa, Kingston, Toronto, Brantford, Hamilton, London, Winnipeg, Victoria, Vancouver, Sherbrooke, St. Hyacinthe, Trois Rivières, Peterboro', Guelph, Kitchener, St. Catharines, Stratford, Chatham, Windsor, Port Arthur, Fort William, Sarnia, St. Thomas, Brandon, Calgary, Regina, Edmonton, Owen Sound, Hull, Shawinigan Falls, Niagara Falls, Lethbridge, Sydney, N.S., Saskatoon, Moose Jaw, New Westminster, Charlotte-town, Brockville, Sault Ste. Marie, Galt, Strathcona, Medicine Hat, Amherst, Belleville, Prince Albert.

**Post Cards.**—For Canada, Mexico and the United States, 1 cent each. For Great Britain, Newfoundland and all Postal Union countries, 2 cents each. Reply cards, for Canada, Mexico and U. S., 2 cents each. Nothing must be attached to a Post Card,

except a small adhesive tag or label bearing the name and address of the sender or addressee, or an engraving, photograph or newspaper clipping adhering completely to the card.

**Second Class Matter.**—Newspapers and Periodicals posted from the office of publication are authorized to pass at the bulk rate of one-quarter of 1 cent per lb. to regular subscribers or to newsdealers.

An exception is made in favor of newspapers and periodicals published not more frequently than once per week, and addressed to regular subscribers, or to newsdealers at post offices situated within a circular area of 80 miles in diameter, the centre of which must either be the place of publication or some point not more than 40 miles distant therefrom. Such papers enjoy exemption from postage.

The postage on newspapers and periodicals issued less frequently than once a month and addressed to regular subscribers or newsdealers and on all specimen newspapers, is one cent per lb., or fraction of a lb.

British and foreign newspapers and periodicals, as well as Canadian publications recognized as second class, may, if authorized by the Post Office Department, be posted by newsdealers to subscribers in Canada and Mexico at the bulk rate of 1c per lb.

**Transient Newspapers and Periodicals.**—Transient newspapers 1 cent per 4 oz.

The above postage rates apply to all duly recognized newspapers and periodicals addressed to any place in Canada, the United States, Mexico, and to Canadian newspapers and periodicals addressed to the United Kingdom and the following British Possessions; Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, Ceylon, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Fiji, Gambia, Gibraltar, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, Malta, Mauritius, Newfoundland, New Zealand, North Borneo, State of Northern Nigeria, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Southern Nigeria, Trinidad and Tobago, Turks Islands, Union of South Africa (comprising the Provinces of Cape of Good Hope, Natal, Orange Free State and Transvaal), and Zanzibar, provided that such newspapers and periodicals are forwarded from Canada either by direct mail steamers or by way of Great Britain.

All newspapers and periodicals published less frequently than daily, addressed to the United States, will be subject to the rate of 1 cent per 4 ounces, whether posted by publishers, newsdealers or private individuals.

Legitimate daily newspapers can be mailed by publishers to bona fide subscribers and newsdealers in the United States at the rate of 1 cent per pound. When mailed by private individuals the rate is 1 cent per 4 ozs.

Newspapers and periodicals addressed to other countries are subject to the rate of 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

**Printed and miscellaneous Matter.**—The postage on Books, Pamphlets, Circulars, occasional publications, etc. Exhibitors' Entry Tickets, Manuscripts of books or newspapers, Printers' Proof Sheets, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Lithographs, Photographs, Sheet Music (whether printed or written, including music books, whether stitched or bound), papers impressed with points or with characters in relief for the use of the blind, etc., addressed to Canada, the United States and Mexico is 1 cent per 2 oz. Most of these articles can be sent to Great Britain and all other countries at the rate of 1c per 2 oz.; but, in the case of manuscript of books or newspapers and manuscript music, a minimum prepayment of 5 cents (covering a weight of ten ounces) is required. The general limit of size for Canada, United States and Mexico is 30 inches in length by 1 foot in width or depth. For other countries no packet must measure more than 18 inches in any direction, unless in the form of a roll when a length of 30 inches is allowed provided diameter does

not exceed 4 inches. The limit of weight for Canada is 5 lbs., for the United States and other Postal union countries 4 lbs. 6 oz. Limit of weight for a single book addressed to places in Canada is 10 lbs.

Commercial Papers and Legal Documents may be sent to Great Britain, Newfoundland, United States, and all Foreign countries, at 5 cents for the first 10 ounces, and 1 cent for every additional 2 ounces. These papers, when posted for delivery in Canada, must be prepaid at Letter rate.

**Samples.**—*Bona fide* Samples of Merchandise, not of saleable value and not exceeding 12 oz. in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada, United States or Mexico, at 1 cent per 2 oz. Must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however, small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually Trade Samples, are not admissible.

The limit of weight to United Kingdom is 5 lbs.; limit of size 2 ft. in length by 1 foot in width or depth.

The limit of weight to other postal union countries is 12 oz.; limits of size: 1 ft. in length by 8 in. in width and 4 in. in depth.

The postage on sample packets to postal union countries 2c. for the first 4 ozs., and 1c. for each additional 2 ozs.

**Parcel Post in Canada**—Comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. Postage rates can be ascertained at any Post Office. Limit of weight, 11 lbs.; of size, two feet six in. in length by one foot in width or depth, but parcels will be accepted up to 3 ft. 6 in. provided that the combined length and girth do not exceed six feet. Matter for transmission by Parcel Post must be open to inspection, and there must be no correspondence enclosed. Packages of merchandise may be sent to the United States at the rate of 1 cent per oz., but the contents will be liable to Customs Inspection and collection of duty in the United States, and the limit of weight is 4 lbs. 6 oz. Sealed tins containing fish, lobster, vegetables, meats, etc., if put up in a solid manner and labelled in such a way as to fully indicate the nature of their contents, may be sent by parcel post, within the Dominion, but no sealed matter of this kind can be forwarded to the United States. Liquids, oils and fatty substances may be sent to places in Canada and the United States if securely put up.

**PARCEL POST WITH OTHER COUNTRIES.**

Parcels are sent to other countries via England. The rates can be ascertained at any Post office.

**Registration.**—Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the wicket, and a receipt obtained therefor. The fees on all classes of articles addressed to countries to which matter may be registered is 5 cents.

The sender of a registered article addressed to any place in Canada or to any Postal Union country may entitle himself to a certificate as to the disposal of the said article by the Postmaster at the office addressed, on prepayment of an additional fee of 5 cents. All classes of matter may be registered to all destinations in Canada or the United States and all classes of matter except Parcel Post packages to places throughout the Postal Union; and letters may be registered to most of the countries not included in the Union.

The public are reminded that registered letters are only carried on trains that are accompanied by railway mail clerk. Hence a registered letter and an ordinary letter posted simultaneously will often be received at different times.

**Prohibited Articles and Publications.**—Explosive, dangerous or destructive substance, or liquid, or any matter likely to injure usual contents of the mails, or the person of any officer or servant of the Post Office. Liquid Celluloid is prohibited, but celluloid in other forms may be sent by post in bulk provided it is packed with reasonable care and labelled "Celluloid—Inflammable." There is no restriction upon the circulation of cards, calendars, etc., made of celluloid when they are sent singly.

Glass, in any form, liquids, fish, fruit and oils are prohibited unless put up in the manner prescribed by postal regulations. Any obscene or immoral book, or other publication of an indecent, immoral, seditious, disloyal, scurrilous or libellous character, or any post card or post band or wrapper upon which there are words of the character aforesaid, or any letter or circular concerning an illegal lottery, so-called, gift-concert or other similar enterprise offering prizes or concerning schemes devised and intended to deceive and defraud the public, and newspapers, etc., containing advertisements of any obscene and immoral prints, publications, etc.

**BAGGAGE.**  
For each trunk carried in any such vehicle, 25 cents. No charge shall be made for travelling bags, valises, boxes or parcels which passengers can carry by the hand.

a. Fractions of hours for any drive exceeding one hour shall be charged at *pro rata* hour rates as above established. The above tariff shall apply to every drive within the limits of the City of Montreal, even in the event of it being necessary to go through an adjoining municipality to reach the destination of the passenger.

b. For drives between midnight and four o'clock in the morning, fifty p. c. shall be added to the tariff rates above established.

c. The tariff by time shall apply to all drives extending beyond the city limits, provided the engagement be made within the limits.

d. Children under 5 years of age and sitting on their parents' or guardians' laps will be admitted free of charge and shall not be held as being included in the word "persons" in the said tariff.

e. The word "drive" wherever it occurs in the said tariff shall be held to admit stoppages within the time fixed for said drives.

**BY-LAWS FOR CHAUFFEURS OR DRIVERS OF AUTOMOBILES FOR HIRE.**

Sec. 1.—The words "automobile for hire," for the purposes of this by-law, shall mean any taxi-cab, automobile or other similar motor vehicle intended for the conveyance of passengers for a fare.

Sec. 2.—No person shall drive any automobile for hire, in the City of Montreal, without having previously obtained a license from the City and without having secured a badge, as provided by the by-law concerning assessments, taxes and licenses.

Sec. 2a.—Drivers of automobiles for hire shall be divided into two classes: the owners of vehicles or employers and their employees. The city shall deliver to each of them a personal badge-number, indicating the class to which he belongs, and every driver of an automobile for hire shall, while engaged in the carrying on of his trade, constantly wear his badge-number in such a manner that the said number shall be conspicuous and shall, at all times, be visible to the public.

Only one badge-number shall be delivered to an owner of automobile, even if he has two or more vehicles in use.

"Sec. 2b.—Whenever an employee of an owner of automobile shall quit the service of his employer to enter the service of another, he shall give notice thereof to the Superintendent of Police and have the name and address of his new employer registered at the office of the latter."

Sec. 3.—No person other than the licensed chauffeur or driver of an automobile for hire shall have the right to wear the badge of such driver, and no chauffeur or driver shall wear any other badge than

his own or shall allow any other person to wear the same.

Sec. 4.—No chauffeur or driver of an automobile for hire, when unemployed, shall be stationed with his vehicle at any other place, in the City, than at one of the stands mentioned in Sect. 5 of this by-law and which shall have been assigned to him by the Superintendent of Police, nor shall he loiter about his stand nor drive about in the streets of the City to pick up passengers, nor solicit the custom of passers-by.

Sec. 5.—The under-mentioned places shall be the only stands on which it shall be lawful to station automobiles for hire, in the City. The privilege of occupying such places or stands shall be exclusively granted to owners of automobiles; the employees of such owners shall have the right to occupy the same only as representatives or substitutes of the latter:

No. 1.—West side of Place d'Armes, along the London, Liverpool & Globe Building, the first vehicle at 15 feet south of St. James street; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the north (4 vehicles).

No. 2.—West side of St. Hubert street, north of Craig street, the first vehicle at 15 feet from the latter street; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the south (15 vehicles).

No. 3.—East side of St. Dominique street, north of St. Catherine street, the first vehicle at 75 feet from the latter street; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the south (3 vehicles).

No. 4.—In the centre of Chaboulez Square, at 90 feet east of the Grand Trunk sheds and 50 feet west of the drinking trough; the vehicles to be placed abreast with an interval of two feet between one another; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the north (12 vehicles).

No. 5.—West side of Delorimier avenue, south of St. Catherine street, the first vehicle at 14 feet from the latter street; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the north (5 vehicles).

No. 6.—East side of Philips Square, south of St. Catherine street, the vehicles to stand in the middle of the roadway; the front thereof being turned towards the north (16 vehicles).

No. 7.—North side of Osborne street, east of Windsor street, the first vehicle at 15 feet from the latter street; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the west (20 vehicles).

No. 8.—South side of Sherbrooke street west, between St. Mark and Fort streets; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the east (10 vehicles).

No. 9.—West side of Atwater avenue, north of St. Catherine street, the first vehicle at 20 feet from the latter street; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the south (5 vehicles).

No. 10.—South side of Mount Royal Avenue, along the Park immediately West of Esplanade Avenue; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the east (15 vehicles).

No. 11.—At the north end of Dominion Square, along said square from east to west; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the east (20 vehicles).

No. 12.—East side of St. Urbain street, north of St. Catherine street; the front of the vehicles being turned towards the south (5 vehicles).

No. 13.—East side of City Hall avenue, south of Sherbrooke street, the front of the vehicles being turned towards the north (13 vehicles).

No. 14.—West side of McGill street, along Victoria square, between Craig and St. James streets; the front of the vehicles, being turned towards the south (10 vehicles).

No. 15.—St. Justin street, east side; the front of the vehicles being turned towards St. Catherine street (4 vehicles)."

Sec. 6.—In every case where the stands for automobiles for hire are intersected by cross-streets, passages or sidewalks, a free

space of at least fifteen feet shall be left, on each side of such streets, passages or sidewalks, between the same and the vehicles stationed on said stands.

All vehicles stationed on such stands shall be placed in a line as closely as possible to one another in the order of their arrival, and shall be available for hire in the same order.

Sec. 7.—Whenever the City may require to occupy any of the above described stands for municipal purposes, the automobiles may be stationed at such other place as shall be assigned to them by the Superintendent of Police or his officers.

Sec. 8.—Chauffeurs or drivers of automobiles for hire shall not have the right to charge or receive, for the conveyance of passengers and their baggage, higher fares than those hereunder enumerated, regardless of the number of passengers conveyed:

For a drive not exceeding one quarter of an hour . . . . .	\$0.75
For a drive not exceeding half an hour . . . . .	1.50
For a drive not exceeding three quarters of an hour . . . . .	2.25

*By time:*

For the first hour . . . . .	3.00
For each subsequent hour . . . . .	2.00
For each fraction of such subsequent hour, the fare shall be on the basis of . . . . .	2.00

Stops shall be paid for at the rate of \$1.50 per hour.

(a) The rates per hour shall apply to any drive outside of the City limits, provided the engagement be made within such limits.

(b) no fare shall be paid for children under 10 years of age.

(c) For any baggage carried by the hand no charge shall be made, but if such baggage is committed to the charge of the chauffeur, there shall be paid an extra sum of . . . . . \$0.20

(d) No chauffeur or driver of an automobile shall be held to convey large trunks or valises. He may do so for the price agreed upon with the passenger.

Sec. 9.—The chauffeur or driver of an automobile for hire shall not be entitled to recover or receive any pay from any person to whom he has charged a higher fare than that which he is authorized to charge and receive under this by-law.

Sec. 10.—Every chauffeur or driver of an automobile for hire, when unemployed, shall be held to drive at the rate fixed in the above tariff, the first person who shall offer him employment.

Sec. 11.—Every chauffeur or driver of an automobile for hire shall, during all the time he is in charge of his vehicle, carry about him a card supplied by the Superintendent of Police, on which shall be printed the above tariff and such other information as the Superintendent of Police may direct. He shall exhibit such card to passengers when requested to do so.

Sec. 12.—The above tariff shall not have the effect of preventing any specific agreement which parties hiring vehicles, as aforesaid, may make with the chauffeurs or drivers thereof.

Sec. 13.—Every person who employs a licensed chauffeur or driver for himself or for the conveyance of his effects in an automobile for hire, shall pay said chauffeur or driver the fare legally fixed for such conveyance or the fare agreed to be paid therefor.

Sec. 14.—Every person offending against any of the provisions of this by-law shall be liable to a fine, with or without costs, and in default of immediate payment of said fine with or without costs, as the case may be, to an imprisonment to be fixed by the Recorder's Court of the City of Montreal at its discretion, but such fine shall not exceed forty dollars, and the imprisonment shall not be for a longer period than two calendar months; the said imprisonment, however, to cease at any time before the expiration of the term fixed by the said Recorder's Court upon

payment of the said fine, or fine and costs, as the case may be.

Sec. 15.—This by-law shall come into force on the first day of January 1916.

TARIFF OF CARTAGE.

*From any place to any other in the First Division, or from any place exclusive of the Harbour wharves to any place in the City, and vice versa, provided the distance does not exceed ¼ of a mile.*

Articles not herein enumerated of a convenient bulk, not over 1,500 lbs. weight, 15 cts.; ashes, pot or pearl, two barrels, 15 cts.; beef, pork or fish, five barrels of 3 tierces, 15 cts.; coal or coke, half a chaldron or half a ton, 15 cts.; crockery, one crate or one hoghead, 15 cts.; flour or fruit, seven barrels, 15 cts.; grain, not over 1,500 lbs. weight, 15 cts.; lumber, sawn, from yard or boat, 500 feet broad measure, 15 cts.; salt or rice, six bags or six barrels, 15 cts.; firewood, dry, from yard or boat, half a cord three feet long, 15 cts.; firewood, green or from rafts, half a cord, three feet long, 20 cts.; furniture or luggage, per load, 20 cts.; lumber, green or hard, from rafts, 500 feet board measure, 20 cts.; molasses, sugar or oil, one puncheon, hoghead or load, 20 cts.; pig iron, lead, copper, or tin, one ton, 25 cts.; bar iron or steel, one ton, 30 cts. For every additional half mile for all above description of goods, 10 cents, and from any of the Harbour wharves to any place in the 2nd or 3rd division within ½ a mile distance from the boundary line of the first division, and vice versa, or from any place (exclusive of the wharves) to any other in the City, and vice versa, or from any place (exclusive of the 1¼ mile,—instead of 15, 20, 25 and 30 cts., the rate shall be 25, 30, 35 and 40 cents.

*From any place in the western section of the first division.*

To the stores and wharves below Wellington bridge, south side of Lachine canal, 20 cts.; the stores and wharves below Wellington bridge, north side of Lachine canal, 25 cts.; the Basins above Wellington bridge, north side of Lachine canal, 25 cts.; the Basins above Wellington bridge, south side of Lachine canal, and the stores, stations, factories, etc., at Point St. Charles, 35 cts.; the stores, factories, etc., at and above St. Gabriel Locks, north of Lachine canal, 30 cts.; the St. James Street Railway Station, 20 cts.; St. James Street Railway Station from the lower wharves of the Harbour, 25 cts.; and vice versa for one load.

And from any place in the Eastern section of the first division—instead of 20, 25, 25, 35, 30, 20, 25 cents, the rates shall be 25, 30, 30, 40, 35, 25, 30 cents.

For any excess over the quantity or weight fixed for a load, additional *pro rata* rates shall be paid.

If delay is caused to the carter by the employer, beyond the time usually required for loading, the carter shall be paid *extra* for such delay at the rate of five cents for every quarter of an hour.

If a carter be called, and there be no load ready for him, or if he be unable to load the goods or articles for want of assistance, he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance thus unnecessarily travelled.

DIVISIONS REFERRED TO ABOVE.

*First division.*—The first division shall comprise the east, centre and west wards (including the south-west side of McGill street and the north-west side of Craig street), and shall be sub-divided into two sections, eastern and western, the line of demarkation between them being the centre of St. Lambert and St. Jean Baptiste.

*Second division.*—The second division shall comprise the St. Ann, St. Antoine, and St. Lawrence wards (exclusive of McGill and Craig streets).

*Third division.*—The third division shall comprise (exclusive of Craig street) the St. Louis, St. James and St. Mary wards.

**TARIFF OF WATER RATES.**

Dwelling-houses, stores, shops, offices, &c., on the assessed rental, 6 per cent.; churches at shop rates on rental based at 6 per cent. on their assessed value; hotels, taverns and restaurants, at uniform rate of 12 per cent. on assessed yearly rental, provided that when the rent is \$1000 and over and at least twenty furnished rooms exist, water shall be charged by meter and paid for at the same rate as distilleries, breweries, &c.; horses, \$2 each; cows, \$1 each; horse stalls, livery stablekeepers, horse dealers, tavern keepers, &c., shall pay \$1.50 for each stall whether occupied or unoccupied; public baths or baths for the use of which a charge is made, \$6 each tub; steam engines, 50 horse-power or \$1.15 per 1000 cubic feet by meter; building materials, 6 cts. per 1000 bricks; 3 cts. per cubic yard of masonry and \$3 per 1,000 yards plastering; fountains, \$2 for every 1000 cubic feet, supplied by meter, hand hose, for sprinkling purposes, \$2.00; \$2.00 for each 50 feet of frontage or fraction thereof; for washing vehicles, \$5.00 per annum; meter rates for distilleries, breweries, railways, laundries, hotels, colleges, seminaries, academies, houses of industry, reformatories, boarding schools, nunneries, asylums, dye houses, photographic studios and all manufacturing establishments generally, \$1.15 per 1000 cubic feet; but the quarterly bill by meter must not be less than 1 p.c. of the assessed rental value of premises supplied; if, for any reason whatsoever in the opinion of the Board of Commissioners, water cannot be supplied by meter, 4 per cent. on yearly rental; meter rent by annum: 1/2 inch, \$2.00; 3/4 inch, \$2.00; 1 inch, \$3.00; 1 1/4 inch, \$4.00; 1 1/2 inch, \$5.00; 2 inch, \$6.00; 3 inch, \$8.00; 4 inch, \$10.00; 6 inch, \$15.00.

Public hospitals having a minimum of 100 permanent beds, kept gratuitously for patients, shall pay each annually, for their water supply a uniform rate of twenty-five dollars (\$25).

**Dates of payment.**—The water rates are due and payable on the 1st day of September, in each year, up to which date there will be allowed a discount of 3 p.c. All charges for specific supplies, or for fractional part of the year shall be payable in advance, before the water is turned on. Meter rates.—Water supplied by meter is payable quarterly.

**Stopping supply.**—The water supply will be cut off if not paid when due.

Penalty interest at the rate of 7 p.c. per annum is payable on all overdue taxes and water rates.

**COURTS OF JUSTICE.**

**SUPREME COURT OF CANADA.**

The Supreme Court, as a Court of Appeal, constituted by Dominion Statute (Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, chap. 139),

is composed of a chief justice and five puisne judges, and has appellate civil and criminal jurisdiction within and throughout the Dominion of Canada. The judges reside at Ottawa, where the Supreme Court holds annually three sessions, the first beginning on the first Tuesday in February, the second on the first Tuesday in May, and the third on the second Tuesday in October.

**EXCHEQUER COURT OF CANADA.**

The Exchequer Court, constituted under a Dominion Statute, 50-52 Vict., chap. 16, is presided over by one judge, and has original exclusive jurisdiction in all claims, suits or actions against the Crown. It has concurrent jurisdiction in relation to revenue cases and the enforcement of penalties; in cases respecting patents of invention, trade-marks, copyright and industrial designs and in respect to land patents; cases against Crown officers for anything done or omitted to be done as such officer, and all actions or suits in which the Crown is plaintiff or petitioner and in respect of Railway debts under 3 Ed. VII., ch. 21. Admiralty jurisdiction is vested in the Exchequer Court of Canada, under 53-54 Vic. (Imperial), ch. 27, and 54-85 Vic. (Canadian), ch. 29. The Exchequer Court is also an Imperial Prize Court in time of war.

The Court sits at Ottawa every Monday at 11 a.m., except during vacation or the absence of the judge, for hearing motions, demurrers, etc., and for the trial of causes at such places and times as are fixed by the judge, by general or special orders.

themtical instruments, mattings, medicines in cases, meters, millinery, mineral waters, mouldings, musical instruments, notions, optical instruments, organs, pianos, picture plants, saucers, settlers' effects, sewing machines, sleighs, small ware, stationery, statues, surgical instruments, tea, textiles, tobacco, tools, toys of all kinds, trees, trunks, umbrellas, valises, wall paper, wines.

Articles upon which the wharfage rates are payable on measurement and the bills of lading for which are made out for the weight thereof, the measurement in such cases shall be computed at four times the weight. The weight of the articles hereinafter described shall be estimated as follows:—

Apples, flour, meal, potatoes, ten barrels to one ton; fish, meat, pitch, tar, seven barrels to one ton; horses, two to one ton; neat cattle, three to one ton; raisins, 72 half boxes to one ton; sheep, fifteen to one ton; swine, ten to one ton; molasses, imp. gal., 13 lbs. packages; puncheons, 124 lbs.; hds. and tierces, 80 lbs.; barrels, 46 lbs., half barrels, 23 lbs.

No entry shall be less than ten (10) cents. All goods landed on the wharves shall be removed therefrom forthwith.

Barges landing bricks, cordwood, sand and hay allowed ten running days in which to discharge their cargo, on which the above wharfage rates will be paid. After that delay they will pay one half of one cent per day on their registered tonnage for every day that they remain at the wharf.

Goods remaining on the wharves or in the sheds for more than four clear working days after the complete discharge of the vessel from which they have been landed, except as hereinafter provided, shall be subject to additional charges as follows:

For each of the first four days, an amount equal to the wharfage paid on said goods, and

For each and every day thereafter, double the amount of wharfage paid on said goods.

The Commissioners may remove and store at the expense of whomsoever it may concern, all goods not removed within eight clear working days after the complete discharge of the vessel from which the goods were landed.

Consignees who may claim that their goods could not be removed within the above delay on account of the action of H. M. Customs shall furnish to the Commissioners a certificate signed by the Collector of Customs, setting forth the cause of the delay and the date that their goods were released by Customs.

Goods requiring to be gauged by H. M. Customs, corks, pig iron and scoriae blocks shall be allowed a further delay of four days for removal, in addition to the four days above mentioned, before the additional charge will be made.

The Agent of every vessel discharging in the harbour the cargo of which is subject to the payment of wharfage dues, shall deliver at the Office of the Commissioners within twenty-four hours after the final discharge of the vessel, a certificate to that effect and immediately after the expiry of four days after the final discharge of the vessel, a list of the goods not removed and their weight or measurement, marks and the names of the consignees as appear on the manifest of the vessel from which the goods were discharged.

After the expiry of the delay given for the removal of goods from the wharves, the Agent of any vessel shall not deliver to the consignee such goods as may not have been removed unless said consignee produces a certificate from the Secretary of the Commissioners that the additional charges have been paid, and when the delay granted by said certificate for the removal of goods has expired, the Agent of any vessel shall discontinue the delivery of said goods until the consignee produces another certificate from the Secretary that the further additional charges accrued have been paid.

Green fruit landed on the wharves and sold by public auction shall be liable to additional charges as herein provided, unless removed within four clear working days after the date of the auction sale of

the cargo of the vessel from which it was landed.

Wharfage rates on goods exported are payable at the Custom House within twenty days from the date the vessel by which the goods were shipped left the harbour, and all wharfages not paid within the said delay shall be subject to an additional charge of twenty-five per cent. of the rates herein provided, for each and every 30 days or part thereof until payment.

No claim for refund of wharfage will be entertained unless made, in writing, within thirty days of the payment of said wharfage.

Lumber landed on the wharves ex-barge or steamer shall be allowed a further delay of three days for removal in addition to the four days above mentioned, making seven days in all before the additional charge will be made.
