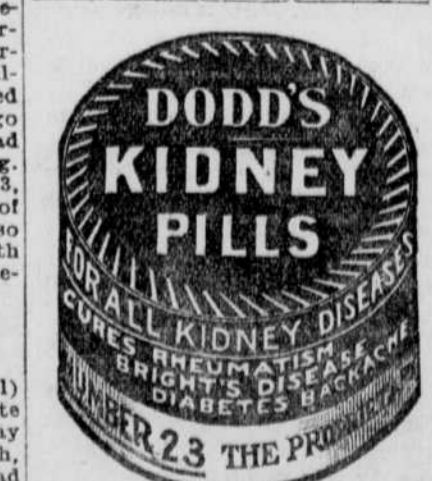

SAVED CHILDREN FROM BURNING BUILDING - DRAMATIC CLUB DOES GOOD WORK

## Bad Eyes Make Bad Men.

OFTEN RESPONSIBLE FOR CRIMINAL TENDENCIES, JURIST DECLARES.

New York, Feb. 15.—Defective eyesight frequently is the cause of criminal tendencies or moral delinquencies, in the opinion of Judge William H. Wadhams, who bases his belief upon a long period of observation as judge of the court of general sessions. "Bad eyes make bad men," said Judge Wadhams in an address to the Society of Medical Jurisprudence last night. "The man who cannot see straight cannot think straight and cannot act correctly. When the nervous functions become disarranged the morals also are affected. One of the first steps the state should take in the correction of criminals is careful examination and treatment of their eyes. A very large percentage of the men who appear before me for sentence are suffering from defective eyesight and I attribute their moral delinquencies largely to this cause." Consult A. C. The decrease in price may have the effect of again bringing bread back to its normal price. The course the market takes within the next few days will determine this.

Flour rose from \$6 a barrel to \$7.20 within six weeks after the commandeering of the wheat by the government. The congestion is now relieved and it is expected there will be a gradual recession. Bakers today said they had not yet been notified of the lower flour prices.

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PROTEST AGAIN AGAINST BRITAIN STEAMSHIP COMPANY SAYS SEIZED VESSELS ARE USED WITHOUT FORMALITY OF PRIZE COURT

Washington, Feb. 23.—Counsel for the American Transatlantic Steamship Company, owners of the steamers Kankakee, Hocking and Genesee, seized by the British Government on the ground of German ownership, has complained to the State Department that the British authorities continue to use the vessels without the formality of prize court proceedings.

AMBASSADOR GERARD BREAKS HIS COLLARBONE. London, Feb. 23.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says that James W. Gerard, American ambassador to Germany, broke his collarbone while skating yesterday near Munich, and also injured his left side.

SHELLS TO COST LESS IN BRITAIN. London, February 23.—A reduction in the cost of producing shells will result in saving £400,000 weekly after June 1. This statement was made in the House of Commons yesterday by Dr. Christopher Addison, parliamentary secretary of munitions in response to a question addressed to the ministry of munitions.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED AT SHANGHAI. Shanghai, Feb. 23.—(Special)—Martial law has been proclaimed at Shanghai, capital of the Province of Honan, where an unsuccessful attack was made by rebels on Monday on the Governor's mansion.
