

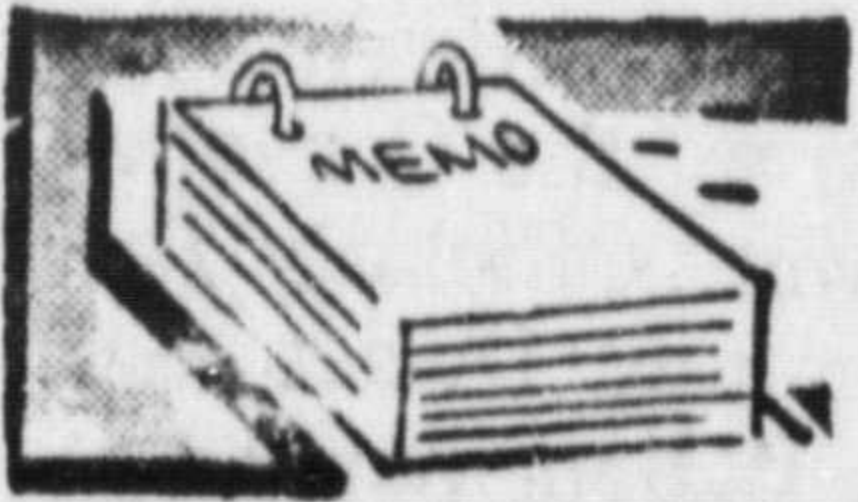

Drummond Addresses Rotary On Agriculture

The Rotary Club of Shawville this week heard an informative talk by Agronomist Neil Drummond on Agricultural activities of Shawville Rotary, and a brief sketch of farmers organizations in the Pontiac.

Rotary has looked after the landscaping of Pontiac Community Hospital. The speaker pointed out that there was still much work to be done there, and that it would probably take some years for the project to be completed.

Rotary some six years ago started an experimental apple orchard on the farm of John Hitz in the Township of Thorne. A group of 100 plants of hardy apple trees were brought over from Siberia and planted out. These trees have prospered, and grafting of domestic varieties has already started. This project was started in order to demonstrate that apples can successfully be grown in Thorne, which in many places does not lend itself to mechanized farming. There has been no loss by frost amongst these trees, nor is there expected to be any. This experience differs from the usual experience with fruit trees in this area, which often sustain heavy losses through frost. The secret of success is to use special hardy stock, such as the trees being used by Rotary.

Turning next to farmer organizations in the County, Mr. Drummond mentioned the Shawville Mutual Fire Insurance Co. He stated that there are 1801 policy holders who carry a total of 3½ million dollars of fire insurance on their properties.

Another important organization is the Artificial Insemination Association, of which Dr. Roland Armitage is the district representative. About 1,000 cows in the Pontiac are now being serviced artificially. The local association draws its semen from Kemptville, where the Association has some of the best sires of all breeds to be found in Canada.

The speaker next gave a rough breakdown of sources of farm income in Pontiac County:

1. From sale of livestock, beef cattle veal calves, hogs, dairy cows and lambs 40%
2. From sale of dairy products 25%
3. From sale of poultry products 10%
4. Forest products 10%
5. Grain 6%
6. Maple syrup, honey, small fruits etc. 9%

Butter constitutes the major dairy products of the district. Annual production amounts to 2½ million pounds, which is manufactured in the following places:

Shawville	1,500,000 lbs.
Quyon	550,000 lbs.
Campbell's Bay	225,000 lbs.
Pembroke	150,000 lbs.
	2,425,000

In addition, Shawville produces 600,000 lbs. of powdered milk—skim, whole and butter milk powder.

Dr. Trueman paid a tribute to the staff of the National Film Board which he felt was dedicated to the service of Canada.

Through the efforts of the film councils and film libraries across Canada an audience of more than

In closing, Mr. Drummond expressed the hope that some of the Rotarians would be able to participate in a panel discussion of rural-urban problems at the short course to be held this winter in Shawville.

The work done by these committees to date has been largely exploratory in nature.

Plans were made at the meeting for an evening program to be held during March in Shawville. It is proposed that the program should include a film and a panel discussion.

A resolution was also adopted that the Pontiac Film Council should be requested to include in its monthly program a short, high quality, educational film dealing with the alcohol problem.

Farmer's Organization Holds Meeting

Enthusiasm was keen over the new organization for Quebec farmers at a two day meeting in the Mount Royal Hotel, Montreal this week. Cooperation of every farmer is needed if objective is to be reached. Intense study is planned for Farm Forum groups during the next few months to complete the details.

"Canadian farmers have more at stake than farmers in any other Country in the world as regards marketing", said Dr. H. H. Hannam of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture in his address as guest speaker. One third of our Agricultural products go into world markets so the chief problem now is surpluses. We must endeavour to dispose of them without disrupting word markets.

Mr. Beauregard brought greetings from Co-op Federee, representing 47,000 French speaking farmers. He described their Abattoir in Quebec City bought at a price of \$1,500,000 and the only one

of its kind in Canada. All beef is sold boneless, a lot of it is processed and canned. At present free transportation as far away as Thurso can be arranged for all livestock and they hope eventually to extend this service to most of the Province.

Other highlights of the meeting were the report of Farm Forum fleet car insurance and also the liability coverage available. A pleasant surprise was the substantial decrease in rates for car insurance.

Reports from three medical co-ops showed Pontiac still leading. Much interest was expressed in the new combination contract now being offered.

At a separate meeting of the Union of Quebec Co-operatives with Mr. Breen Melvin, Secretary of the Co-op Union of Canada present, details as to purchase of feed were suggested. A general meeting is being planned for Mar. 5 at Macdonald College.

Seek C.P.R. Track On Bridge

The February meeting of the Shawville Council was attended by Dr. S. E. McDowell and David Dickson. Dr. McDowell provided Council with information as to the law concerning indigents, and to report progress to date in the work carried out on behalf of two of Shawville's indigents, David Dickson approached Council with the request that consideration be given to the granting of a sum of money to the Junior Hockey Club to assist in the financing of its current expenses. Council agreed to consider the matter after the close of the hockey season.

David Dickson next pointed out that in the long drawn out discussions and plans for the Pembroke Bridge, nothing had recently been said about planning for the laying of rails for the CPR on the bridge. Council accordingly has prepared a resolution to be sent to Ray Johnston, MLA, suggesting that plans of the bridge incorporate space for the laying of a railway track by the CPR.

Invoices covering construction of the new water tank at Shawville were read out by the Secretary-Treasurer. The total cost of the tank will run to about \$20,000. No submission has yet been made to Quebec for a grant to assist in this work. However, Council has been given to understand that a grant of about 50% of the total cost will be available. Construction of the tank has been completed and it is now in use as an auxiliary to the old tank. This means that Shawville now has an adequate water supply to draw on in the event of fire.

Council has expressed itself as concerned about the large amounts of ice now accumulated on the streets of the village. Ways and means of removing it were discussed. The final decision reached was that a toothed blade for the village tractor should be secured so that the ice can be broken up and removed. In the meantime the tractor is to be used with the present blade to remove the ruts on the road, running past the new school.

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Lamb From New Zealand

The members of the Agricultural Society, at the recent annual meeting held in Shawville, adopted a resolution protesting the import of lamb from New Zealand. The amount and effect of these imports were discussed last week in Parliament, when the following information was furnished by Hon. Earl Rowe, acting leader of the Opposition and Rt. Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture.

Imports of New Zealand and Australian lamb and mutton for recent years are as follows:

1951	3.3 million pounds
1952	2.4 million pounds
1953	2.4 million pounds
1954 (10 mo.)	6.5 million pounds

There is no restriction on the importing of lamb into Canada. The only government regulation is the imposition of a duty—1/2c per lb for New Zealand and Australia—and anyone may ship lamb into Canada who is able to do so over the duty.

Canadian lamb prices have in the past been substantially higher than lamb prices in the United States. During the week ending January 27, 1955 the average price for good and choice lambs at Chicago was \$19.90 as compared with \$23.21 in Toronto. This difference has led to the importing in 1955 of 450 head of live lamb from the US up to the end of January.

While the foregoing reflects a strong Canadian picture, as reported by Right Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Hon. Earl Rowe pointed out that the Toronto price had dropped, after January 27, to 19 cents. Mr. Gardiner replied that the drop must have arisen because of the import of lamb from the U.S.A.

Following up my letter, February 3rd Equity, it is interesting to note that in 1685 French Canada met a serious shortage of money, due to a fresh supply of bullion from France being captured by British Ships, which did not reach Quebec.

In this emergency the Intendant Meules performed an achievement for which his tenure in New France was not worthy. What he did one historian says, was quite remarkable. Faced with the shortage of currency, he confiscated what playing cards were in the Colony and used them for money. Spades, Hearts, Diamonds and Clubs, some were cut into halves and quarters and the word 'good' stamped on them and signed his name. They were accepted as currency in the amounts designated.

At that time too, like The Editor of The Equity of today, the kings officials said, it was a dangerous thing to do and might lead to inflation. Never-the-less it continued and playing card money became recognized. This system continued right through the French regime period and in the year 1749 Paper Money was issued to the value of 1,000,000 livres.

It is recorded that, this issue of money contributed to the gracious, luxurious and romantic life of Canada at that time.

In 1757-1775, during Benjamin Franklin's terms in London as agent for the Colonies. The Colonies had their own paper currency and development was making fast headway with no want in the country. As soon, however as the Bank of England took away from the colonies the right to issue their own currency, Chaos and Want settled over the once thriving centers and gloom descended on the people. Many historians state that this action along with the tax on tea brought about the American War of Independence. Its a noteworthy fact that since then, Americans have not allowed the Branch Bank System, such as we have here in Canada, in their country.

OTTAWA Report: by Anthony J. Wright

With German rearmament and Formosa out of the way for the moment one of the main topics of the Speech from the Throne debate has been how to get more Canadian butter and cheese out of storage and into stomachs. It's not just a matter of importance to farmers and housewives harried by rising costs, and growing appetites—a happy solution to the problem of Canada's surpluses would even effect unemployment by improving the farmer's state of affairs, giving him more buying power and putting tax revenue to better use than subsidising products of the good earth. Everyone, the farmer, finance minister and taxpayer would rather see butter selling easily and the \$42,000,000 used to buy it for surplus storage, put to other work for the country.

Several M.P.s. had suggestions for easing the surplus stocks on to the tables of Canadians, Britons, and other peoples. Mr. J. O. Gour, (Lib. Russell, Ont.) urged that a glass of milk and a piece of cheese be given, free, twice daily to all students, Ottawa and the province picking up the tab. He wanted Mr. Gardiner to buy 5,000,000 pounds of cheese at going prices and to sell it (as the Dept. of Agriculture has with butter) to 1,500 Canadian institutions at 18 to 20 cents less per pound. But his punch line came with a suggestion that all butter substitutes be taxed ten cents a pound the revenue given to the creameries who would in turn pass it on to farmers by continuing to pay 58 cents a pound for butter which they would themselves sell to wholesalers for 48 to 50 cents, depending on storage and transport costs.

Thus butter would be cheaper for all and margarine would be dearer. The government has made no comment yet and none is expected because Ottawa knows that although it would be fine for Canada if more butter were being eaten, many families are using more and more margarine and it fears to hike the price ten cents. Mr. Gardiner said in the House that it was not possible for his officials to discover how much of the margarine was being used as a spread instead of butter and how much replaced lard in Canada's kitchen. Mr. Ross Thatcher (C.C.F. Moose Jaw) pointing to the greater use of margarine and decline of butter, although the population grows by

400,000 annually, said a few cents off the butter price would actually help the farmer. He would sell more, said Thatcher, as had been discovered after President Eisenhower last year knocked a few cents off the butter support price—sales went up seven percent.

Money is the reason for the 0.50 trend. I know that a Navy commander's wife here regularly spreads margarine on her sandwiches (she has four children) because it is cheaper than butter, and, they say, that farmers buy it too. Neither commander nor farmers do it by choice.

Mr. Hayden Stanton (P.C. Leeds, Ont.) brandished a segment of cheddar in the Commons declaring it to be the finest cheese in the world, bar none. No one demurred but he weakened his plea for the farmers of the St. Lawrence Valley by saying in the next breath that they needed protection against New Zealand cheese which, according to Mr. Stanton, was "inferior". It seemed a harsh thing to say about another Commonwealth nation's dairy goods. On the face of it one might wonder why if the N.Z. cheese was that poor Canadians would favour it over the finest in the world in abundant supply. However, it's not that simple. The N.Z. cheese will be processed and no one will know the difference. According to P. C. member L. E. Cardiff (Huron, Ont.) the importing firm makes \$110.00 profit on the N.Z. deal.

TEXTILE TARIFF: There is a strong feeling here that the Tariff Board's report on wool incoming from Britain may induce the government to raise the nominal duty (50c per lb.) on British woolsens. Report expected anytime now. This might put new life into stricken Canadian textiles — some smart boys are even buying Canadian textile stocks now.

AUTO DUTY: Renewed pressure has been brought to bear on Mr. Harris to cut the 15 percent excise tax on new cars at the plant. M.P.s argue that a car is no luxury, that a tax relief is overdue, and would put new life into the economy.

STRIKE LOSS: Ford strikers lost an average of \$1,250 each while off work according to an estimate quoted by Miss Sybil Bennett (P.C. Halton, Ont.)

Just at the present the world seems to be tottering on the edge of another war. The general consensus of opinion in England is that we are closer to war than at any time since the end of World War II. For almost the first time in many months the Labour Party has a real difference of opinion from that seemingly held by the Conservatives who are the party in power. Officially the government supports Eisenhower and Dulles and their policy in Formosa. This the Labour party apparently does not do. They cannot justify the support of such a man as Chiang-kai-Chek who even his friends acknowledge as a "currupt dictator". Nor does the average Englishman see any justification for American forces to be in Formosa in the first place. "How would the Americans react to Chinese forces on Vancouver Island establishing airfields there and declaring that such fortifications were necessary for the defence of China?" In my opinion nothing that the Communists could do or have done, has made such a strain on the British-American alliance than the American policy in the Far East. What seems over here to give people some assurance that we are not only a few weeks away from war is the feeling that America will wait until German Re-armament has become a sure thing. This accounts for the popular support in Britain of the "No arms for Gernany" campaign now receiving great support from nearly all sections of the British people.

More Schools Needed

In the past ten years Canadians have pent close to \$900,000,000 on construction of new school and other educational buildings. Yet the rate of spending on new schools in the next ten years will be approximately four times that of the record peak of \$153,000,000 in 1954, if building accommodation is to keep up with pupil enrolment.

In 1946 Canada had about 2,100,000 children from 5-14 years of age and about 1,000,000 teenagers from 15-19 years of age. It is estimated that by 1961 these figures will rise to 3,800,000 from 5-14 years of age and 1,440,000 from 15-19 years of age. In a decade beyond that the figures could reach the startling totals of 4,500,000 from 5-14 years of age and over 2,000,000 from 15-19 years of age.

It is not just a matter of increasing rates of births and immigration but also the fact that more children stay more years at school.

All of this may pose some problems in finance but it is a sign of the healthy growth and development of our nation and a boon to the building trades, construction firms and manufacturers of building supplies.

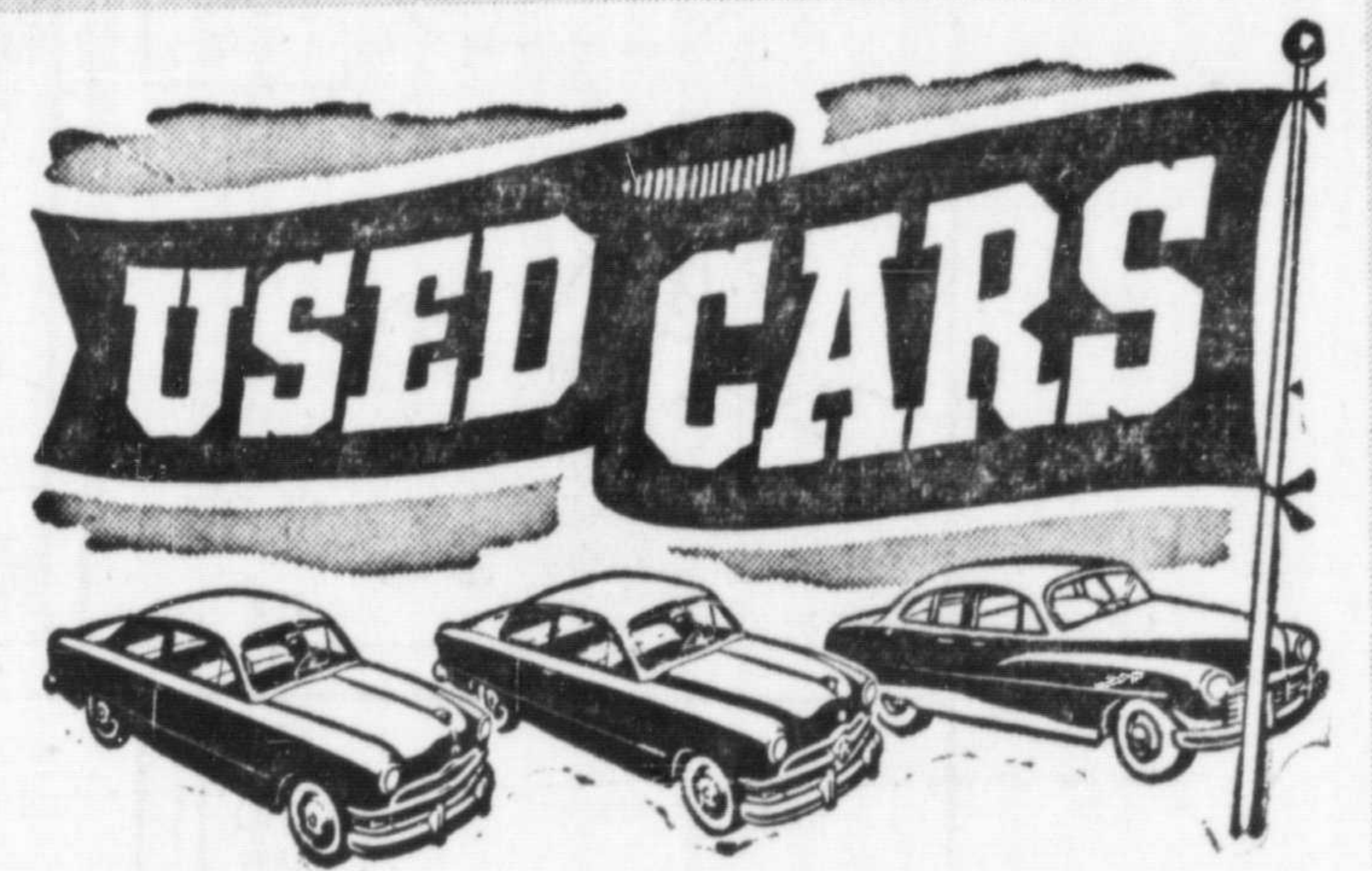

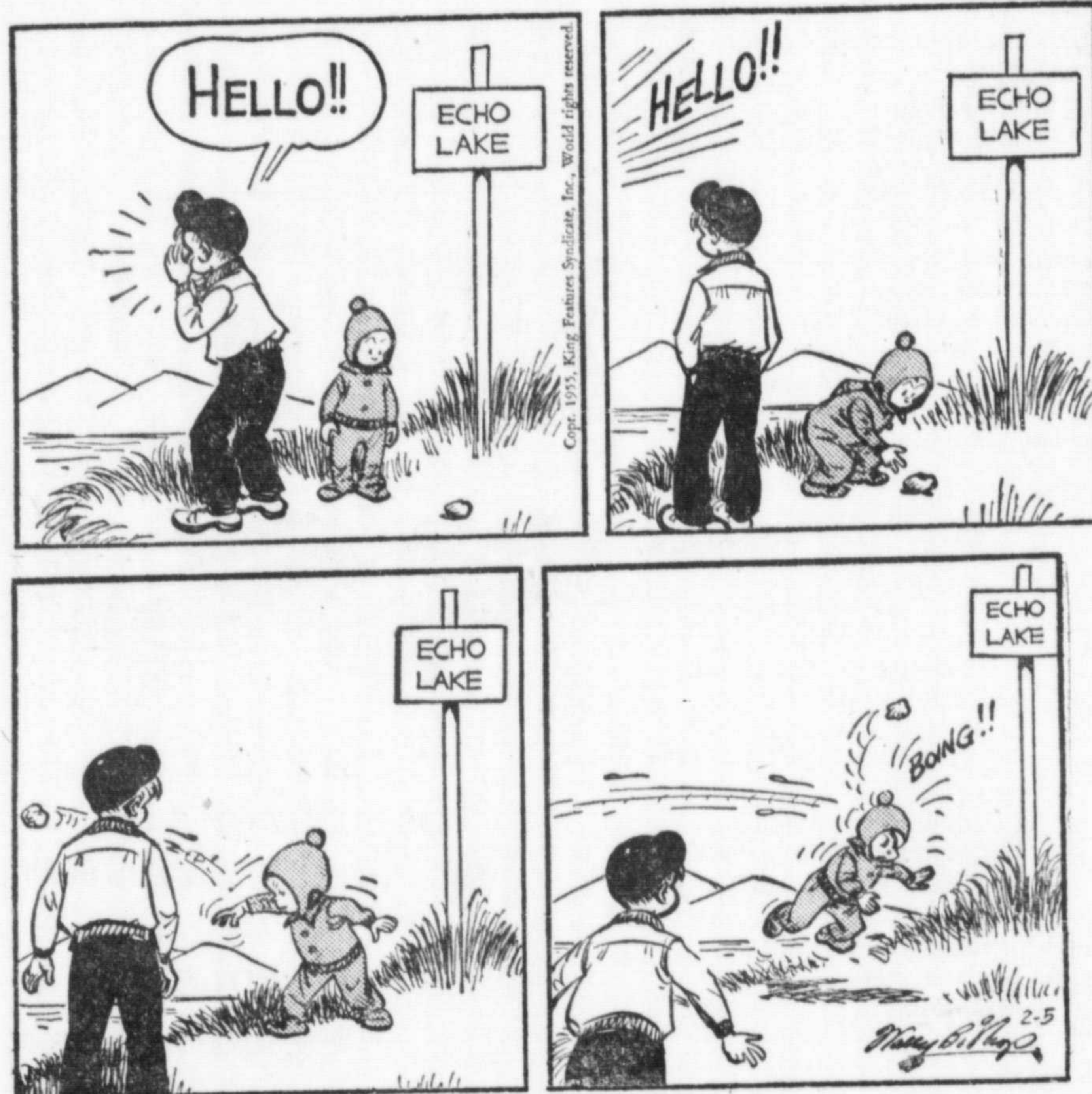


CONCESSIONS BY COMPANY, UNION, END 110-DAY STRIKE

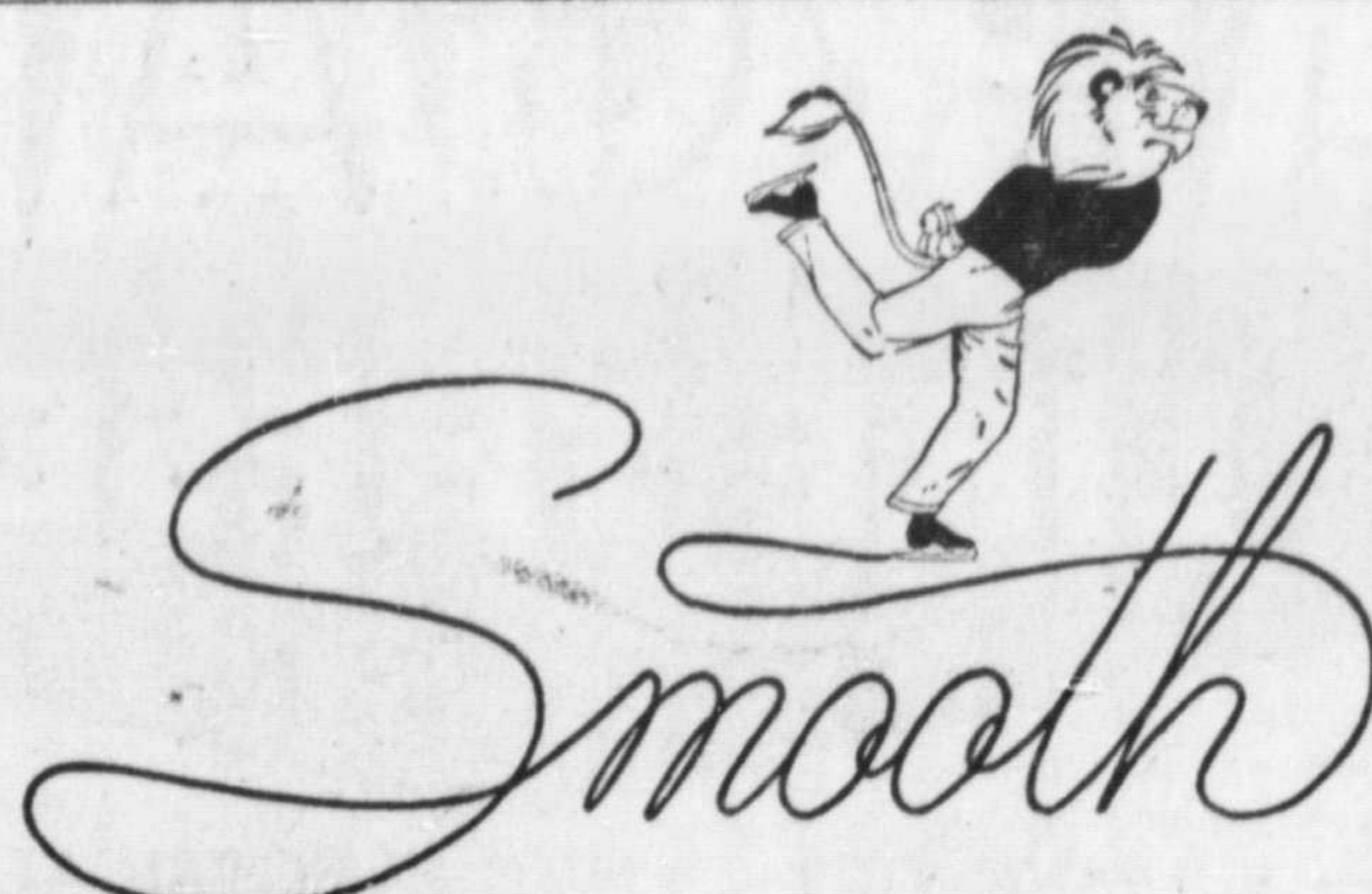

Teachers Still In
Great Demand

The problems of recruitment, training and retention of teachers remain acute. With school enrolment increasing much more rapidly than the general population, we must get more than "our ordinary share" of high school and university graduates to train for teachers. Moreover, it is not a simple problem of numbers because quality is equally important, if not more important, than quantity.

While the proportion of teachers holding university degrees has increased about 17% in the past five years, we still have approximately 20% of Canadian classrooms in which the teacher has not a complete high school education and at least one year of professional training. This is a frightening situation. How can the promise of a great future for Canada be fulfilled if 20 per cent of her young people are receiving their education in their most formative years from "teachers" who, themselves, have not the basic education demanded by business and industry for most positions of any importance in the development of our "material" resources?

The qualifications for entrance to teaching must be raised. Much

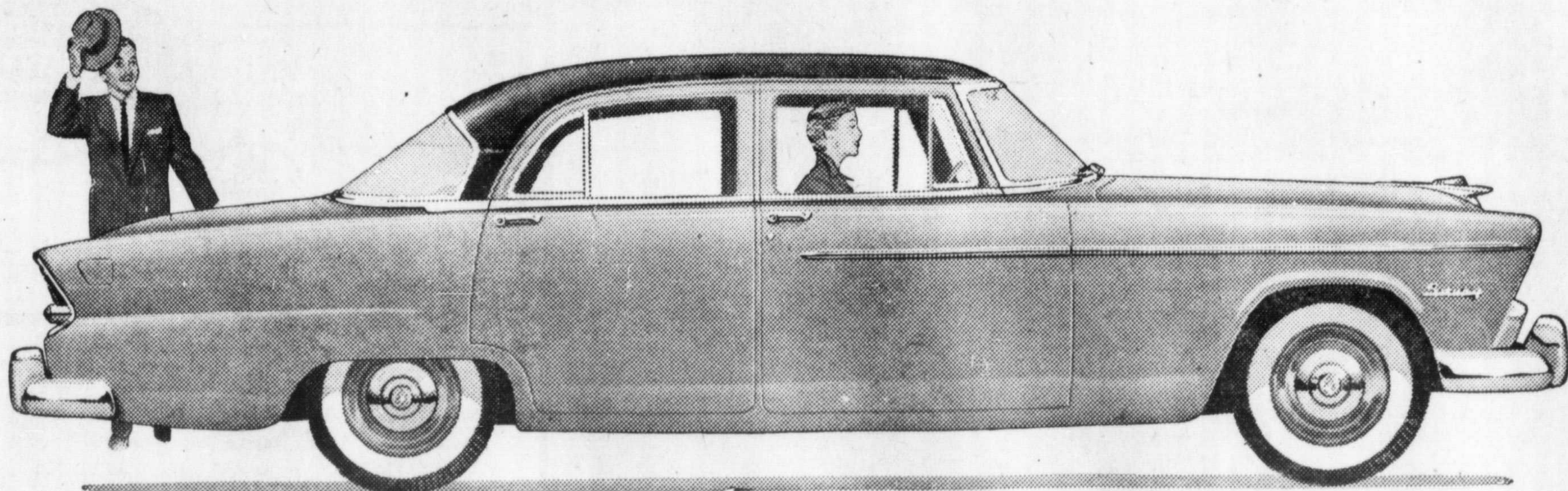

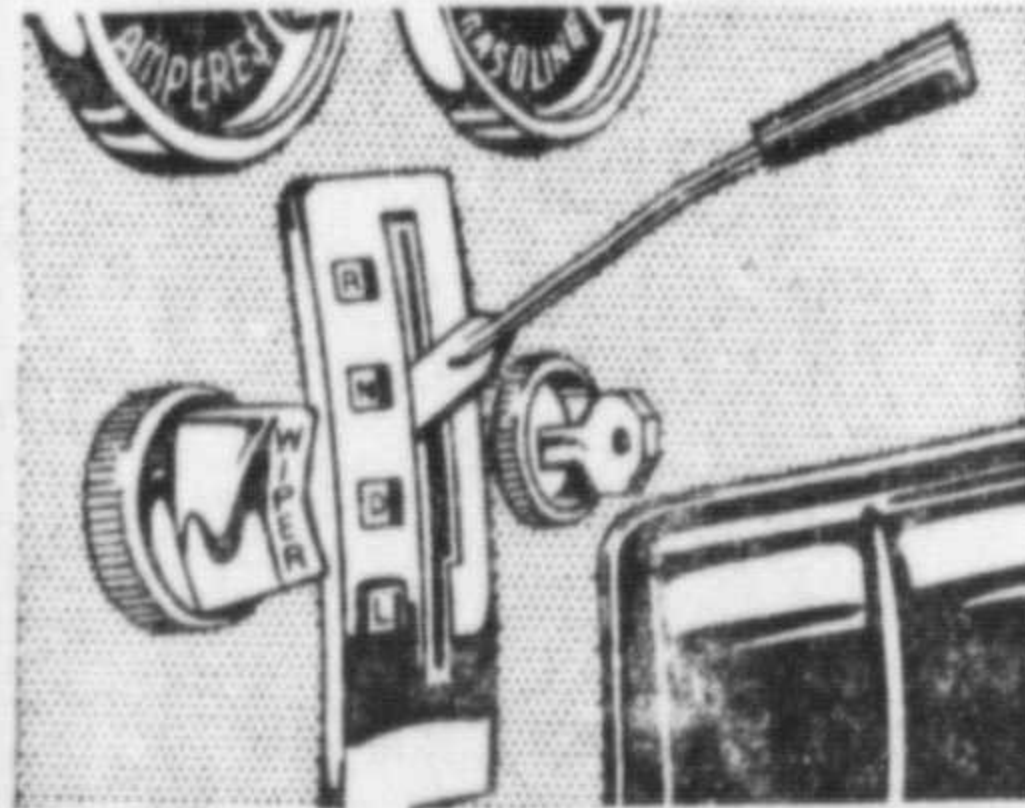

The Canadian National Railways confirmed that it will fully dieselize its transcontinental passenger train services concurrent with the next timetable change on April 24.

At that time a new fast transcontinental passenger train will considerably reduce the running time of the Montreal and Toronto section of the C.N.R. run to Vancouver.

This decision was reached following careful study which included a number of experimental runs with road diesels on transcontinental trains. The tests conducted over the last twelve months show that a substantial reduction in the Montreal and Toronto schedules to the Pacific Coast can be made by switching over entirely to diesels from steam locomotives.

Meanwhile the railway is studying how it can best use this time saving, having regard to the convenience of travellers and communities along its 2930-mile transcontinental route.

C.N.R. officials emphasized that the amount of time to be cut off the schedules would be determined largely by the question of arranging convenient arrival and departure times at principal cities, and connections with the other main routes served by transcontinental trains.

Hauled by powerful new road diesels, the fast train will be made up entirely of new equipment. The consist will embrace a wide variety of passenger accommodation, both first-class and tourist, including dinettes, grill service and standard diners.

The fast train will not replace the long established and well-known Continental Limited which will continue to operate between Montreal and Toronto and Vancouver. However, the new train will make it possible for the two sections of the Continental Limited to be consolidated at Capreol and run as one train between Capreol and the Pacific Coast.

"We are fortunate," said J. T. Whiteford, general passenger traffic manager, "in having sufficient new equipment to put the modern cars in both the fast train and the Continental Limited without robbing other main line trains on the system. The vastly improved transcontinental service will be

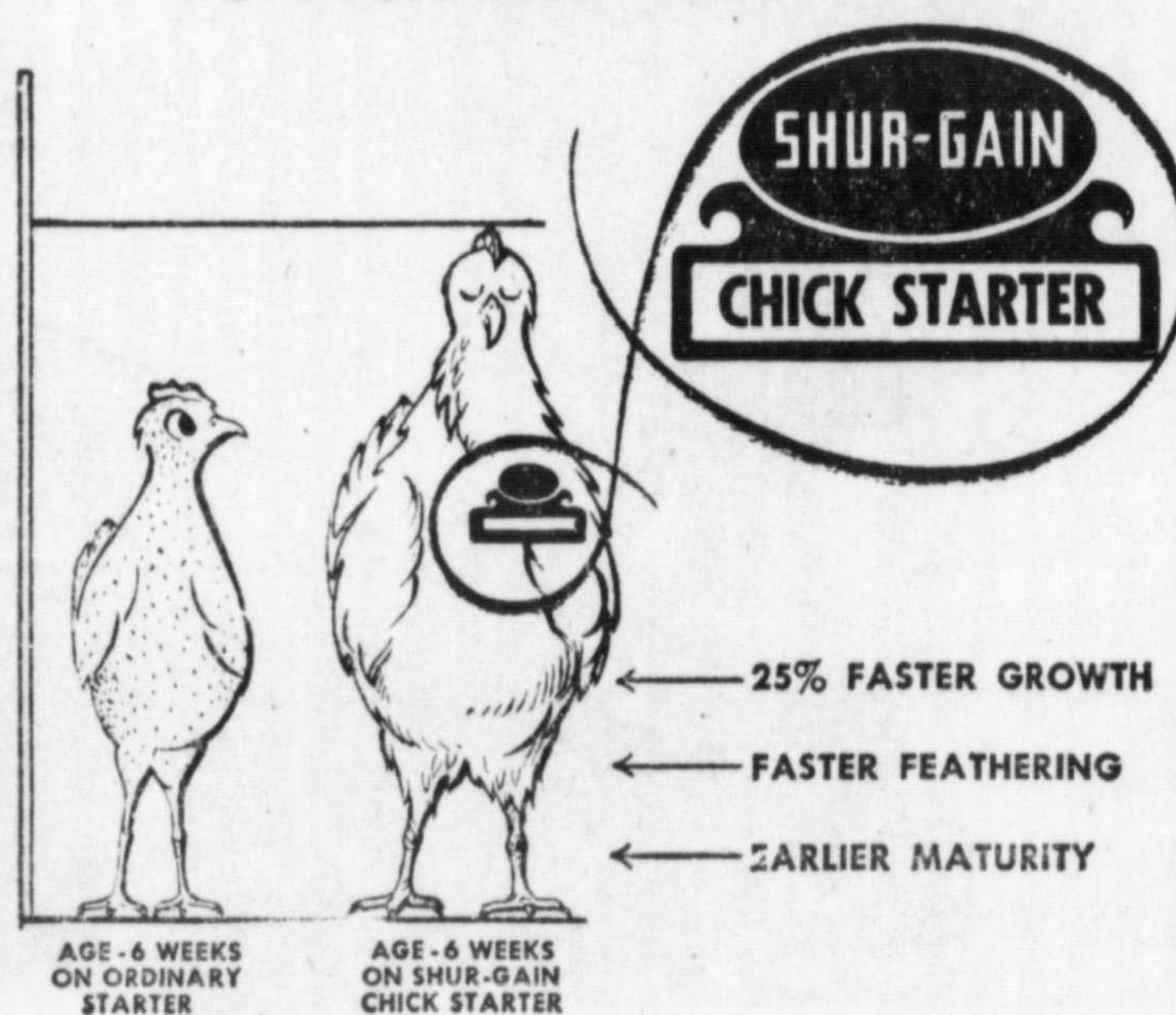

Control Of Wild Oats

An experiment was conducted in 1953 by the Beaverlodge Experimental Station to test the feasibility of using the chemical, maleic hydrazide, or MH as it is commonly termed to control wild oats in cereal crops selectively, much in the same manner as stinkweed and mustard are controlled by 2,4-D. Because of the hundreds of treatments and the vast number of germination trials involved by the experiment the results have only recently been assembled and interpreted.

The results may be summarized as follows:

1. At a certain growth stage, i.e. in the milk, germinability of the wild oats kernel can be reduced to under 1 per cent by the application of as little as ½ lb. active ingredient of MH per acre.
2. The germinability of the cer-

eals under test, i.e., Olli barley, Redwing flax, Saunders wheat and Larain oats, was also seriously impaired if MH was applied when they were in the milk.

3. The phasic development of Olli barley was sufficiently different from that of wild oats to permit a higher degree of selection, i.e., treatment could be made when the germinability of the wild oats could be destroyed while that of Olli barley would not be affected.

4. The phasic development of Saunders wheat and Larain oats did not permit selectivity insofar as germinability was concerned. Moreover, these two cereals did not seem to have as high a tolerance towards MH as did the barley and flax and this fact may contribute to the lower degree of selection between them and the wild oats.

5. The yield of barley was not reduced by the chemical in any treatment; the yields of the other cereals were, but only when treatment was made at certain of their growth stages. Because of this it was possible to destroy the germinability of wild oats and (a) not lower the yield or germinability of Olli barley, (b) not lower the yield but slightly impair the germinability of Redwing flax and (c) not lower the yield but destroy the germinability of Saunders wheat and Larain oats.

7. The yield of wild oats was not affected by any treatment even though under some their germinability was virtually destroyed.

The method has several shortcomings. One is that the time when successful treatment can be made is short, possibly not more than a week. Perhaps its greatest fault, however, is that the chemical must be applied at a time when the cultivated cereals have passed full vegetative development and are, therefore, subject to serious loss from treading, particularly in heavy stands. Moreover, the results with MH are not striking like those which attend the use of 2,4-D because the wild oat plant is not removed from the growing cereal; only the germinability of its seed is destroyed.

This experiment at Beaverlodge, conducted by A. C. Carder, confirms similar work undertaken at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in 1952 and 1953. Further trials were made at both locations in 1954 but the results will not be

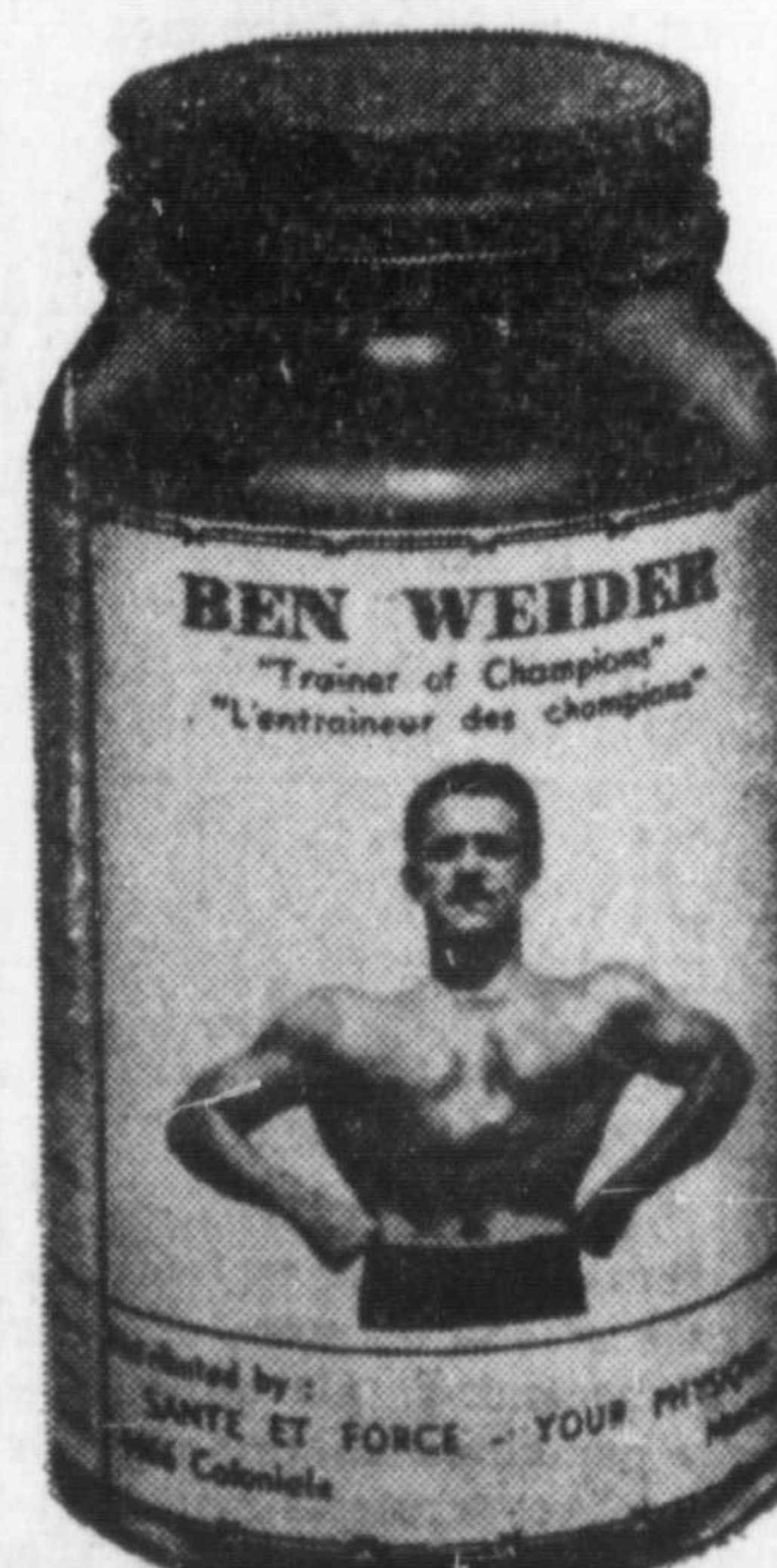

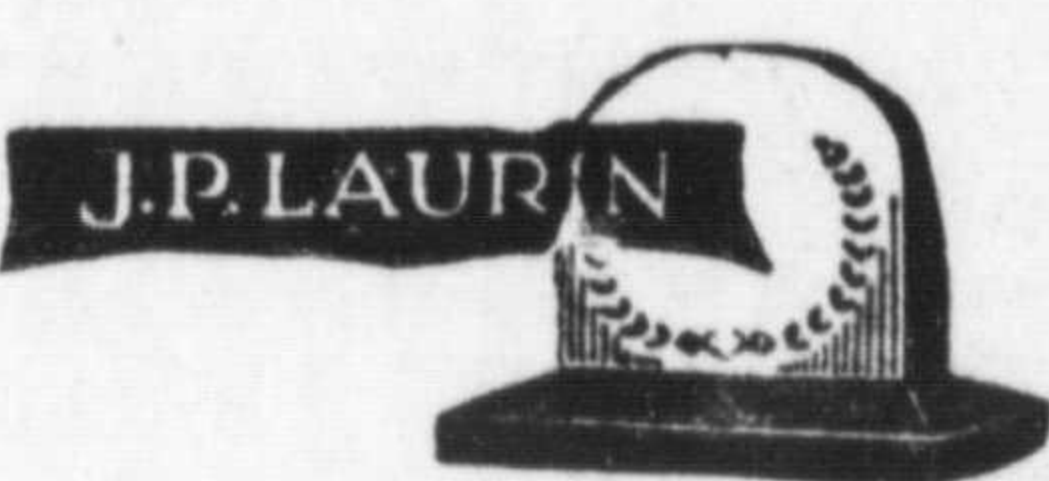
