GEORGE THE FOURTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great-Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith: To our much beloved and faithful the Legislative Councillors of our Province of Lower-Canada, and to our faithful and well beloved the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of our said Province, to an Assembly at our City of Quebec, on the second day of June next, to have been commenced and held, called and elected, and to every of you, GREETING: Whereas for divers urgent and arduous affairs, us, the state and defence of our said Province, concerning, our Assembly at the day and place aforesaid, to be present, we did command, to treat, consent and conclude, upon those things which, in our Assembly, should then and there be proposed and deliberated upon; and for certain causes and considerations, us to this especially moving, we have thought fit to Prorogue our said Assembly, so that you, nor any of you, on the said second day of June next, at our said City to appear, are to be held or constrained, for we do will there fore, that you, and each of you, be as to us in this matter entirely exonerated; Commanding, and by the tenor of these Presents firmly enjoining you, and every of you, and all others in this behalf interested, that on the fourteenth day of July next, at our said city of Quebec, personally you be and appear, to treat, do, act and conclude, upon those things which, in our said Assembly, by the Common Council of our said Province, by the favor of God may be ordained.—IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, these our Letters we have caused to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of our said Province to be thereunto affixed: Witness our Trusty and Well beloved Sir JAMES KEMPT, Knight, Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant General and Commander-in-Chief of all our Forces in the Provinces of Lower Canada and Upper-Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and their several Dependencies, and in the Island of Newfoundland and Administrator of the Government of our Province of Lower-Canada, &c. &c. &c., at our Castle of St. Lewis, in our City of Quebec, in our said Province, the Twentieth day of May, in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty nine, and in the tenth Year of our Reign. WITH a view to carry into effect the intentions of the Legislature in the Act passed in the late Session of the Provincial Parliament, "For the encouragement of Elementary Education," as regards Schools in the Country Parishes, not under the direction of the Royal Institution, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government deems it necessary to establish the following Regulations, which are to be strictly attended to in all applications for the Allowances granted by the said Act:—

The payment of the allowances granted by the 2d Section of the Act for the encouragement of Elementary Education will be issued from the Treasury, half yearly, in the months of January and July.

All applications for the same are to be transmitted to the Civil Secretary, as early as possible in those months.

The applications are to be accompanied by a return of the School for the six months, in the form prescribed by the Act, signed by the Trustees or Proprietor;—on the back of the return a list of the Scholars is to be inserted, placing first the names of those who pay for their Education, and then those who are educated gratis, with the date of the admission of each Scholar opposite to the name.

The first payment will be made in the month of July next.

To enable a School to receive at each period of payment the half of the yearly allowance of £20, granted by the Legislature, it will be necessary that such School shall have been attended by 20 pupils, during the preceding half year, but a proportion of the allowance according to that scale will be granted to a School that has been attended by the required number of Scholars during any part of the period, not being less than one month.

It is not necessary that the 20 pauper children, who must have attended the School to entitle it to receive the allowance granted for their Education, should be exclusive of the twenty of which the School must have consisted, to entitle it to any allowance whatever.

No child is to be admitted as a pauper Scholar at any School, whose parents or protectors are not in such circumstances as to be unable to pay for the instruction of such child.

No School established subsequently to the passing of the Act, will be entitled to any allowance, until the Trustees shall have been appointed as directed by the 4th Section, the Law only authorizing the allowance to be granted to Schools whose affairs are administered by the Proprietors, where the same were actually established at the time the Act was passed.

An authentic copy of the entry of record of the Election of the Trustees is to be transmitted by them to the Civil Secretary, immediately after the Election.

The benefits of the Act having been extended by the 8th Section to the several religious communities in the country parishes, where the children of the poor are educated gratis, a nominal return of the children who have

received instruction at any such Institution, with the dates of their admission, will be required at the same periods as prescribed with regard to other Schools, signed by the Proprietor or persons having the direction of the establishment.

The following form of a Certificate is to be transmitted to the Civil Secretary by the Trustees, to enable them to receive the allowance for a School House granted by the 3d Section of the Act:

We the Trustees for the purchase or erection of a School House in the Parish of elected, as directed by the 4th Section of the Act for the Encouragement of Elementary Education, do hereby certify that we have actually purchased (or erected as the case may be,) a suitable building for the purpose, in the said Parish, and that the full price thereof amounts to*

The same allowance will be granted to the different Fabriques on a certificate signed by the Curé and Marguilliers that they have purchased a lot of ground and built a school house thereon, and stating the full price of the same.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Glasgow, April 13.—On Saturday last, the Brigantine, George Canning, sailed from Greenock, with an association of families, who have agreed to form an establishment on Lake Huron, in Upper Canada, under the direction, and upon the lands of Henry Jones Esqr. of Exeter. From the excellence of the soil, and the convenience of communication by water ; the mildness of the climate, and the short duration of winter, no situation in Canada, hitherto selected, promises better for health and immediate comfort, while the liberal aid and benevolent system of regulations on the part of Mr. Jones, cannot fail to ensure to every industrious family an earlier arrival at a state of independant competency, than could be hoped for by the unaided and uncombined exertions of insulated settlers. It is understood that this eligible position and plan of settlement is likely to attract many followers, so soon as those who have just gone shall have had an opportunity of reporting to their friends their practical experience of its advantage.—Glasgow Courier. [They have arrived and proceeded to Upper-Canada Ed.] About two hundred emigrants for the Canadas, sailed from Leith last week in four vessels, viz. the Harmony, Young ; Margaret Bogle, Smith ; Fidelity, English ; and Jessies, Christie ; the first three for Quebec, and the last for Montreal. On board the Harmony there are about sixty from the neighbourhood of Jedburgh, going out together to settle on one spot, and of course composed wholly of agricultural labourers. The Margaret, Bogle, after being as far north as Dundee, had put back to Bruntisland Roads ; and the Fidelity had also to seek shelter in Leith Roads, after being so far on her voyage, in consequence of the violent gale of Thursday.—Ed.

COLONIAL.

From the latest Nova-Scotian.

CANADIAN PAPERS. We cannot refrain from congratulating our sister Province of Lower Canada, on the favorable change that has taken place in her newspaper press, which instead of being filled, as formerly, with angry bickerings, and personal squabbles, is now devoted to the diffusion of intelligence relative to the important concerns of the country, and to the more temperate discussion of such questions as arise in the progress of affairs. Perhaps our brethren of the Quill may reply, that they are sorry they cannot return the compliment !

A WISEACRE.—The London Morning Herald says, "According to the last accounts from Nova Scotia, a ship had arrived at Halifax, bringing out 15,000 stand of arms, and nine tons ball cartridges. These arms are for the purpose of effectually equipping the Militia of the two provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. It has been asked what is the object of this measure ? We are enabled to answer this question. It is preparatory to the withdrawing the regular troops from these provinces, which will be henceforth left to defend themselves, and thus the expense of keeping up military establishments will be saved." It may perhaps be some consolation to us to reflect that the Morning Herald is about as well acquainted with the intentions of the British Cabinet as we are with what passes in the minds of the Pacha of Egypt, or the Autocrat of all the Russias.

SEMPRONIUS' first letter has been partly copied into the New England Palladium, his second into the Colonial Advocate, and the National Journal, after embodying some of his statements in an abstract, denies that the policy of America either had or has any such tendency as he describes. We hope events may prove that the fears of our correspondent were groundless. We hope also that the policy of Jackson may be the reverse, as regards Great Britain, to that pursued by his predecessor ; but had Mr. Adams remained in office four years longer, we think Sempromius would have escaped the reputation of a false prophet. Their is no portion of the wide domain of either country that could receive any real benefit by a war, while both would be materially injured by any interruption of the present peace. We pass over the blood and treasure that would be expended in their hostilities, the amount of human suffering to which they would give rise, and the crimes which they could not fail to engender, and would turn the attention of the two nations to the consequences that must result from either or both being arrested in the high and useful career which they are now pursuing. Both are engaged in the development of their internal resources—in the education of their population, and in the gradual pruning away of such excrescences as may have grown up under the governments of each, and by which the efficiency and stability of their institutions might be obstructed or impaired ; and besides all this, both are bending the energies of their best minds to the cultivation of science and literature, and the enlargement of that circle of light, which, like the fabled zone of the heathen mythology, sheds a lustre on every thing that comes within its grasp.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—We have great pleasure in calling the attention of our readers to that interesting Colony, so long the scene of discord and faction, but now exhibiting the gratifying spectacle of an united population, and an improving country. In the Nova Scotian of the 22d ult. there is a succinct view of the state of its affairs, which confirms the above remark, and from which we have made the following satisfactory extracts :—Observer. "The revenue has increased, affording a considerable surplus beyond the receipts of last year, order and regularity every where prevail, whilst a just and impartial administration of the Laws secures to every man the fruits of his own exertions. The Fisheries, so long neglected, appear to be reviving ; a branch of industry of the first importance, as well to our agricultural as commercial interests, opening a market for the produce of the farmer, and furnishing the means of a most valuable export. Public Schools are increasing in number, under the operation of the present School Act, and their beneficial effects are most sensibly felt."

On the 11th March, the Governor laid before the Assembly the communication received from Sir Howard Douglas, respecting the erection of Light Houses in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and the cutting of the Canal at the Bay Verte. On the 13th, the Attorney General reported a series of Resolutions expressive of the willingness of the house to contribute, on the part of this Island, as far as its means will admit, towards that most important object, when the progress thereof shall be in such a state of forwardness as to require its aid ; that it feels the full force of all the views which are detailed in the documents received from his Excellency Sir Howard Douglas, Lieut. Governor of New-Brunswick, on the subject, and is fully aware that the completion of that great national undertaking would be highly advantageous to this Island. The same disposition to contribute a fair proportion towards the support of Light Houses, is also expressed, and it is recommended that Commissioners be appointed to correspond with the Commissioners appointed on behalf of the other Colonies, and to ascertain what their Governments consider a fair proportion to be paid by the Colony."

The following is a statement of Vessels employed in the Trade of Prince Edward Island, during the year 1828 :— Fishing 11, 98 men, 254 tons—Coasting 67, 182 men, 2947 tons—West India 7, 35 men, 624 tons—Timber Trade 14, 157 men, 3567 tons. Total, 99 vessels, 412 men, 7391 tons.

It is understood that the Island of Berbice will soon be united to Demerara and Essequibo.

PROVINCIAL.

YORK, U. C. May 16, 1829. NAVIGATION OF LAKE ERIE.—The Navigation of Lake Erie is not yet open. By private letters we are informed, that the ice still remains in the Lake for a distance of several miles above Fort Erie, and it was not expected that the Steam Boats would commence running before 1st June.

Welland Canal—Harbour of the Mouth of the Grand River.—Of the importance of this Harbor, says the Canal Intelligence, and of the Welland Canal, no stronger one

need be adduced, to carry conviction home to the mind of the most superficial observer, than the fact, that the whole body of the Lake above this point, was entirely clear of ice on the 11th day of April last ; and that on the 10th of the same month the first Steam-boat arrived at Niagara from Prescott, on Lake Ontario—while the Harbor at Buffalo remains blocked up with ice for many miles out, and will probably continue so for a week or ten days to come, at least. Had the Canal been completed, it is plain, from the above, that produce from any part of Lake Erie, above Port Maitland might long before this have been conveyed either to the Montreal or New-York Markets.

BURLINGTON.—The Gore Gazette gives the Shipping Intelligence from this canal—it presents a gratifying account of the increasing prosperity of the surrounding country. During the last week, it appears from the statement given, that 5,546 barrels of pork, flour, and ashes, passed through the canal, laden on board several vessels cleared for Prescott. During the same time several vessels entered in ballast, and one with a cargo of merchandise from the lower ports.—York Loyalist.

We lately made a few remarks respecting the removal of the seat of Government from York to Kingston, and we are now happy to announce to our readers that there is a greater prospect than ever of this measure being carried into effect, as we learn this morning that Sir Geo. Murray, has expressed himself decidedly in favour of the projected change.—Herald.

MONTREAL, May 25. On Friday evening four batteaux arrived here from Upper Canada, with a detachment under the command of Captain D. McDonald of the 68th Regiment, who are about to garrison this city.

A company of Royal Artillery, under command of Capt. Anderson, arrived here in the steam-boat Hercules from Quebec, on Thursday afternoon. They proceeded in batteaux to Kingston on Friday, to relieve the company stationed there, formerly under command of Lieut. Col. Wallace, which, we understand, is to proceed home along with the company at Quebec, on the arrival of the two companies, which are daily expected from England by the transports.—Mont. Offi. Gaz.

We observe in a Rochester paper, of the 12th instant, a statement of a robbery, which had been discovered there ; it would appear to be somewhat connected with some individuals in this or the neighbouring Province.

A trunk was yesterday found broken open behind a fence in Carrol-street, containing many letters, &c. to various persons in Canada, mostly with the seals broken. Some of them are for Sir James Kempt—others for Jas. Young, Esq., of York, U. C., from his uncle, Hugh Cross, of Banff, Scotland, dated 19th January, 1829. The name of H. C. Young is on the trunk, and his name is mentioned as the bearer in one of the letters from Mr. Cross to Mr. Y. of York.—No trace of such a person can be found on the stage registers, or from other inquiries.—Mont. Gaz.

Since our last publication we have received no later news, than that furnished, *via* Boston, to the 20th April from LONDON. A vessel which sailed from PORTSMOUTH on the 23d has arrived here, but brought no papers.

A conversation occurred in the HOUSE OF COMMONS on the 6th April, relative to the CANADAS. It is, however, so very incorrectly reported, that we are almost afraid to express any opinion on it. It would seem that Mr. HUME still indulges in his ill-natured strictures on the liberal grants of the MOTHER COUNTRY to this PROVINCE, while Sir GEORGE MURRAY continues to convince the House, that they are necessary and expedient. Mr. HUME moreover tells us that the CANADIAN population are generally hostile to the GOVERNMENT. Whether he means the Local or the General GOVERNMENT, there is no man of common sense but can and will refute him. There seems, indeed, a lamentable deficiency of knowledge as to the true state of this PROVINCE: the consequence of which is, that the oracles of the HOUSE are either travelling gentlemen who spent a day or two amongst us, or persons in the habit of receiving discontented letters on every subject of imaginary grievance. A Colonial paper in LONDON, under able direction, would be invaluable both to us here, and to our interests in ENGLAND. The people of ENGLAND are grossly misled by the *Morning Herald*, whenever it writes on CANADIAN matters.

This morning, at half past 4 o'clock, the Troops in Garrison proceeded from their respective Barracks to the Citadel, in pursuance of the General Order, commanding the execution of the prisoner MOORE, 66th Regt. under sentence of death for desertion, and for a violent attack on the life of Serjt. SURBY, of the same Regiment, while in the execution of his duty. The public are in possession of the facts of this case.

The Troops were formed under the orders of Lieutenant Colonel COCKBURN, R. A. Commandant of the Garrison, in the ravelin near the eastern Barrier, making two sides of a square. When the arrangements were completed, the Prisoner was brought out from the Cape Guard, with an escort preceded by the band of the 66th Regt. playing in slow and solemn time the dead march. Next came the coffin, borne by six men; the prisoner followed, attended and supported by the Revd. Mr. McMAHON, the Roman Catholic Clergyman, whose attentions to the unfortunate man were most humane and unremitting, and surrounded by the escort. The Prisoner advanced with an apparently firm step to the place of execution, passing in front of the whole line, and through the firing party to his coffin, on which he knelt while the proceedings of the Court Martial, the sentence, the approval, and the order for his execution were read aloud by Town Major FROST. When these were concluded, the Reverend Clergyman and the prisoner were engaged a short time in earnest prayer; and on the former slowly retiring, the fatal signal was given to the firing party, drawn up at about six paces. His death was instantaneous, not a motion being perceived. The whole Garrison then filed past the corps in ordinary time, and immediately returned without music playing to their barracks.

The men appointed to the firing party were drawn by lot, from his own regiment, three men from each company, in all 18. Two were reserved, and of the other 16, one musket only was unloaded. The pieces were charged by the non-commissioned officers, who informed the men that one piece was unloaded, with the humane intention of leading each man to believe he had a chance of avoiding the necessary but very painful duty imposed upon him. It is supposed, owing to this arrangement, that almost every shot took effect.

It is most satisfactory to learn that the prisoner, having no hopes of a remission of the sentence, on account of the enormity of his offence, became speedily resigned to his fate. He fully acknowledged the justice of the sentence, and it marks a good trait in his character, that he earnestly desired to see Sergeant SURBY, and in an affecting interview exchanged christian forgiveness with him, remarking that he might have given much stronger evidence against him, than he actually did on the Court Martial.

By permission of the COMMANDER of the FORCES, the

body of MOORE, who had always expressed great anxiety on the subject, was given up to the disposal of his friends.

The prisoner M'CORMICK, servant to Mr. GIBSON, 66th Regt. who in addition to his desertion most ungratefully robbed his master, was present during the awful scene. His sentence, transportation for life as a Felon, was also read to him.

At nine o'clock A. M. the Troops in Garrison attended Divine service in the Cathedral, when at the conclusion of the sermon the attention of all was riveted by the eloquent and impressive notice taken by the Revd. Chaplain, Dr. MILLS, of the awful occurrence of the morning. We are told by an eye witness that the impression was sensibly to be traced in the countenances of the men returning from Church. A sombre and religious air had banished the slightest appearance of levity.

The solemn effect of this necessary example must have been considerably heightened by the aptness of the spot chosen for the execution, the stillness and beauty of the morning, the early hour, and the complete abstraction of the mind from any thing which could divert its attention, or diminish the powerful lesson impressed on the military spectators. The scene has been described to us as beyond any thing awful and subduing. The effect of the Dead March, played as the Band advanced from the Cape Guard, and for a considerable period heard, but unseen, by the Troops, until the procession doubled the angle of the Bastion, may be well imagined. The solemn expectation of the assembled troops—the measured pace of the prisoner approaching at a distance—his last death march along the whole line—the cessation of the mournful dirge—the kneeling on the coffin—the reading of the sentence—the last prayer—the volley—and the disfigured corpse—as they successively riveted the attention, must have produced the most soul-stirring effect on all who witnessed this Military execution.

On Wednesday morning very early, a fire broke out in a dwelling house under repair, about twenty yards east of HOPK GATE, which at one time caused great alarm. The prompt attendance, however, of the Engines and the excellent manner in which the Artillery Engine was worked, together with the activity of the Military and civilians soon arrested its progress. Only one house was destroyed, but much damage was done to that occupied by Miss ASPINALL, a most deserving instructress of youth, who, unless she was insured, must have suffered very heavily. We were glad to see that water was well supplied and upon the whole the management at this fire was better than usual. Any one able to give positive information as to the cause of the fire, which is supposed to have been the negligence of the workmen employed, had better call at the Police Office.

We notice in the AMERICAN papers the death of JOHN JAY, an eminent Citizen of that Republic.

The cargo of Flour from the UNITED STATES to WILLIAM BUCHANAN, of YAMASKA, Esquire, has we understand been all forwarded to its destination.

The *Kingfisher*, RAYSIDE, which has been anxiously expected, we are happy to say arrived this day.

QUEBEC CHARITABLE INSTITUTION.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

The "Quebec Charitable Institution for the suppression of street begging, and for the supply of work to the poor," took its rise from a very general apprehension, on the part of the Inhabitants, that the winter of 1828-9, would be particularly distressful to the poor of Quebec. A rational conviction was also entertained, that were the sums expended in indiscriminate charities, and chiefly bestowed on applicants at the doors of the Inhabitant householders, made to flow into a permanent channel, under the management of a charitable institution, great advantage would be the result, as well to the poor themselves, as to the public in general.

A Meeting of the Inhabitants of the city was consequently held at the Court House on November 20th 1828, and this Institution was established.

From that time the operations of the Quebec Charitable Institution were continued to the 13th April, with the strictest attention to the objects sought to be attained; and they were divided into three distinct branches, for the purpose of ensuring regularity, economy and success.

The supply of food to the poor was at first confined to soup and potatoes; but upon the recommendations of the Ward Inspectors, this relief was afterwards changed to rations, graduated on a scale agreed to by the Committee. In this manner it is calculated that 530 poor persons, including children, have received weekly relief from the Institution during the winter.

That branch of the Institution which superintended the supply of work to the male poor, considered stone-breaking for the purposes of Macadamization the most eligible mode; and their exertions appear to have been attended with complete success. Their operations were continued for 18 weeks, and have afforded means of employing more than 500 individuals, men and boys, Canadian as well as British poor. One hundred and twenty-eight of these have received constant employment and pay. From the labour of these persons, it is expected that about seventeen thousand loads of broken stone, of

ten bushels each, have been obtained, fit for the purposes of Macadamization, three hundred pounds worth of which has been contracted for by the Magistrates of Quebec. The Commissioners appointed to take charge of the expenditure of the money voted by the Provincial Legislature for making good the roads in the vicinity of the city, have also agreed to take such part of the remainder as may be suitable for their purpose.

The Committee have reason to hope, that when the delivery of the broken stone is concluded, and the amount paid for, there will remain a surplus in the hands of the Treasurer of nearly £200 0 0. As, however, the stone has not yet been delivered, it is impossible to speak on this point with certainty. The public will hereafter be fully informed of the amount, and the sum so remaining will be at their disposal for any future operations. It is earnestly hoped, however, on the part of the Committee, that on the delivery of each thousand boxes, to the Road Inspector, and the Commissioners for Macadamization, a payment equal to that amount may be made to the Treasurer as soon as possible afterwards.

The General Committee of Management have to acknowledge the most valuable assistance of the Ladies' Sub-Committee, who employed themselves in the most humane and judicious manner, in giving work to deserving women, and in selling cheap clothing for their benefit. By their exertions during the season, there is every reason to believe that many families have been entirely clothed, who before were ill provided against the severity of last winter. The average weekly number of women receiving relief was 72, and the number of articles made up as clothing amounted to 1143.

The amount of sums subscribed and received by the Treasurer, during the continuance of the Institution, was £762 3 2½. The accounts of that officer have been vouched, and the balance now remaining in hand is £16, exclusive of the surplus expected to remain after the final receipts from the stone-breaking operations.

In conclusion, it is the opinion of the General Committee, that the operations of the winter have been generally successful. Much good has been undoubtedly done; and with the experience now gained, the difficulties always to be anticipated in Institutions of this kind are considerably smoothed, and a fair prospect of increased success for the future is afforded to a charitable and confiding public. The suppression of mendicancy may not have been accomplished; but it has been considerably checked, and will gradually diminish, should these Institutions be persevered in. But the Committee are decidedly of opinion, that the most efficacious, and in fact the only certain method for suppressing street begging, is the establishment and support of a competent House of Industry, in Quebec. Until that desirable object is attained, however, the public should be particularly cautious in giving alms indiscriminately, especially to children, some of whom have been known to this Institution to be in the constant habit of begging, while their parents were receiving the wages of their own industry on the public works, and from other sources.

The Committee of Management are on the whole fully convinced that real benefit has been the result of the operations of the Institution; and in the event of the renewal of these operations for the employment and relief of the poor, during the ensuing winter, they trust that they will again meet with the support and cordial co-operation of the Magistrates and a generous public.

POSTSCRIPT.

As we were going to press, the arrival of several vessels, among them the Earl of Dalhousie from Liverpool, was reported. She brings the following Extracts from the Liverpool Courier, 22d April.

On the 15th April in the House of Commons the LORD ADVOCATE brought in a Bill for the more effectual prevention of murder by suffocation in SCOTLAND—this arises out of Burke's murders.

ADJOURNMENT OF PARLIAMENT.—On Wednesday evening the 15th April, the House of Lords adjourned to Thursday the 28th of that month, and on Thursday the House of Commons also adjourned to the same day. The Budget will be brought forward immediately after the Holidays, and the prorogation may be expected to take place the latter end of May or early in June. Nearly all the Estimates have been already voted. The Duke of Wellington if not a man of "many words" is a man of business.

Wheat was on the decline at Liverpool the 21st April. Government have granted wood for the rebuilding of YORK MINSTER to the amount of £5,000.

Consols 87 1/2 to 88.

It is said now on authority of letters from Lisbon, that Don Miguel openly lays claim to an acknowledgement of his title to the Crown, on the part of this country, having acquired it with the consent of the people whom he governs, and adds further that seeing he had no other alternative, under all circumstances, than to exercise the sovereignty thus put into his hands, he considers himself entitled as completely as if he had governed under the title of Regent and adhered to the Constitution to claim the fulfilment of the contract of Marriage with the young Queen. This claim is said to have been acceded to by Austria, and it is even added will not be opposed by this Country, which feels the importance to all Europe of settling this quarrel between the two brothers, though there is little hope that Don Pedro will be brought to accede to such a proposition. Under the idea that the question would be settled, Portuguese stock rose in the market.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

The Trinity Yacht arrived on the 25th from Green Island Light House. The Elizabeth from Greenock, lost her Capt. (Charlton) overboard on the passage the early part of May. The John Porter, hence for Dublin, was spoken by the Gratitude from Dundee, in lat. 45, 10, north long. 50, 15 west, all well. The Sophia, Neil, to London, which was ready for sea, at Montreal, on Saturday Evening, has been detained by the house which chartered

her, in consequence of the ashes not having been inspected or shipped according to the provisions of the new ashes inspection law. No inspector under the act has yet been appointed for this Province. Application will probably be made to the Governor, and the vessel be immediately despatched.

A Schr. has come up from the wreck of the Julia and another from the wreck of the Exmouth,—both with materials. Brig Joseph, Carr, 17th April from Liverpool, with a general cargo, to Montreal, to Mr. Amner, was totally lost, by striking a sunken rock at the Bird Islands, on the 13th inst. Capt and hands arrived yesterday in the Bird Islands. The vessel went down in 15 minutes after striking. Cargo, all lost.

The Erie wrecked last fall below, and sold for the benefit of the Underwriters, was fallen in with adrift on the 14th May, about 30 miles to the westward of the Bird Rocks, by the Enterprise, from London
