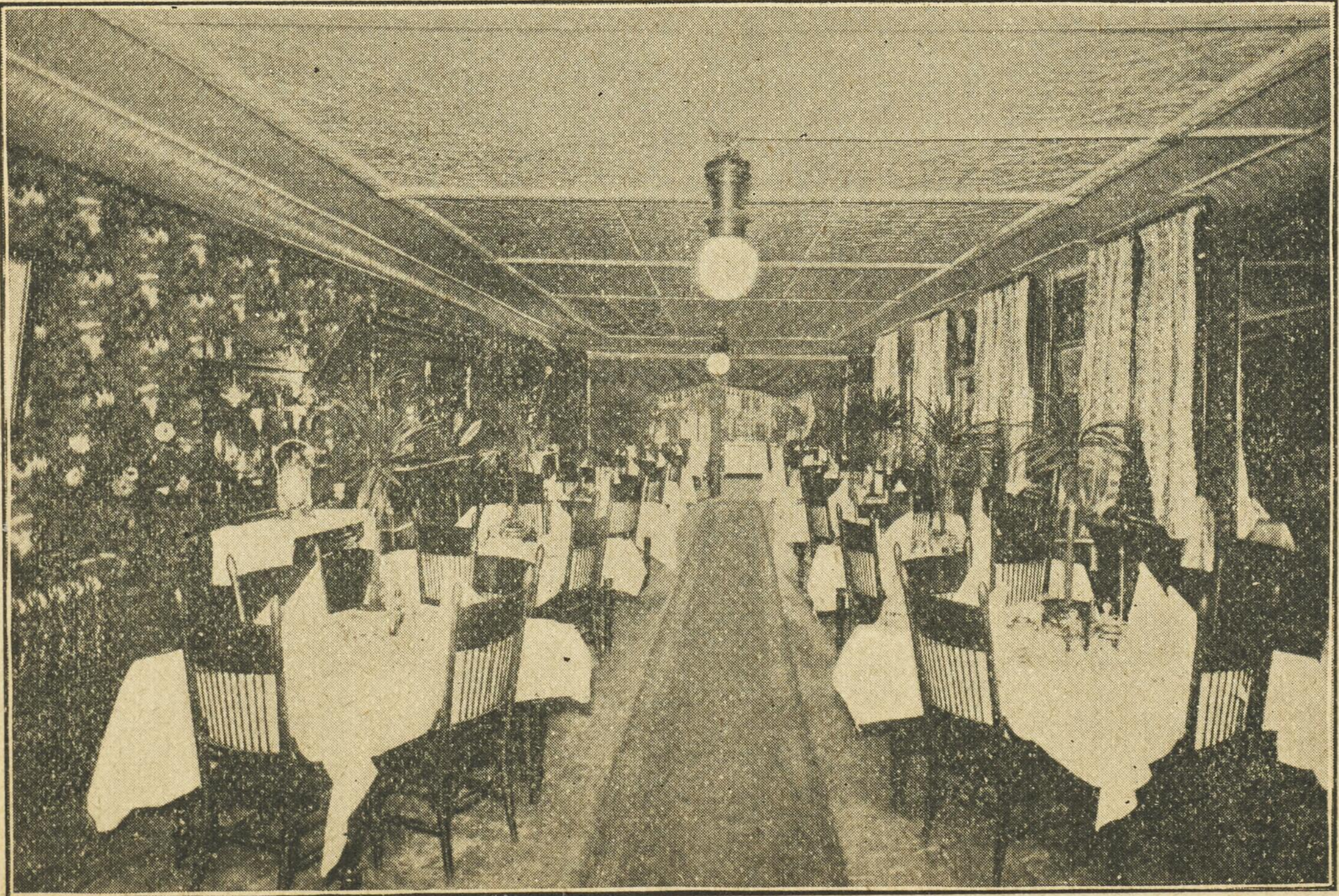

HOW TO SEE MONTREAL.

THE GENERAL POST OFFICE.—Once comfortably established at the Grand Union, visitors from a distance naturally like to first see if there be any mail awaiting them. Six short blocks Eastward from the hotel and one short block Northward from Notre Dame Street, along St. Francois Xavier Street to St. James Street, and the General Post Office is in front of you, and at this point you are in the midst of some of the most magnificent and historical edifices in the city.

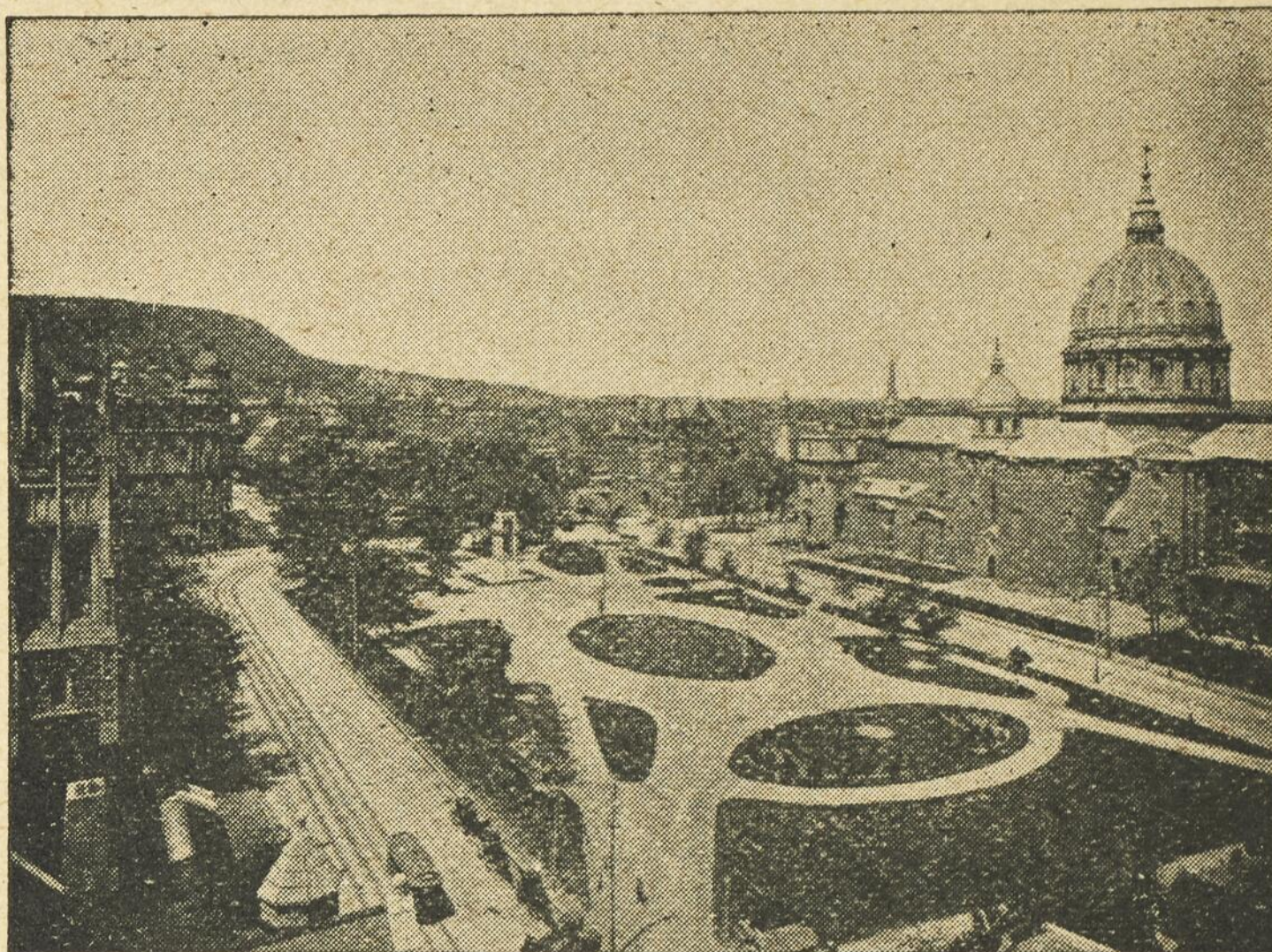

A FREE DESCRIPTIVE BOOKLET ON MONTREAL can be obtained gratis at the office of the 'Tourists' Information Bureau at the corner of Notre Dame Street and St. Lambert Hill. The Bureau is associated with the Montreal Business Men's League which has for its objects, the advertising of Montreal; the bringing of people to the city; the encouragement of an attitude of courtesy toward strangers and the exploitation of national characteristics and historical associations. Guests can obtain these booklets at the Grand Union office, or at the offices of the League, they are well compiled and descriptive of all the principal points of interest, and we recommend all visitors to get one, and used in conjunction with this guide and map, anyone can find his or her way about Montreal without asking a question.

THEATRES.—The principal theatres are closed during the Summer, but provide the best of dramatic attractions during the open season. His Majesty's, The Academy of Music, the Theatre Royal, the Theatre Francais, and the Theatre des Nouveautes are the leading theatres. Concerts are held in the Windsor hall and the Monument National.

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RIVERSIDE RESORTS.—Sohmer Park, and Riverside Park are attractive resorts during the Summer, with open air variety entertainments and fine orchestras. There one can sit beneath the trees and enjoy the nearest approach to the Parisian Cafe Chantant on the American Continent. Montreal is largely populated by French Canadians, the French language is heard on every side at every step, and Montrealers take their pleasures gaily in true continental fashion.

SPORTS.—Nor must we forget that the champion Lacrosse Players of the world are the Montreal team of the Shamrocks, who possess a splendid ground. Baseball flourishes : games are to be daily seen during the season. Boating and Yachting on the noble St. Lawrence, and fishing in that magnificent stream are splendid variations.

HORSE RACING.—There is but one running meeting in Montreal each year, the taste of Montrealers being centered in the trotting horse. The Delorimer Park track is the scene of several fine trotting meets during the season. Here also lovers of the American Turf can play their fancies daily on the races run at New York and the principal American tracks.

MONTREAL HUNT CLUB.—The Montreal Hunt Club and its Kennels are well worth a visit. This club rivals any other on the American continent and shows some of the finest Fox Hunting in the world.

CRICKET AND OTHER SPORTS.—Cricket, and in fact all Summer sports are freely indulged in by Canadians, and visitors can always find out where their favorite sport is going on by telephoning to or calling upon the Montreal Star, which gladly gives information.

WINTER SPORTS.—In Winter, as all the world knows, Canada is the greatest sporting country. Sleighing, Snowshoeing, Tobogganing, Skating, Hockey, Curling, etc., all

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combine to make the severe though healthy Canadian Winter incomparable. No city in the world enjoys life better in the Winter than Montreal.

Finally Montreal is distinctly one of the cities of the world which should be seen by all who can gain the opportunity. Its Architecture, Historical Associations, Ancient Buildings and Landmarks, splendid Business Structures, fine Parks, River and Mountain Scenery, Churches, Statuary and Works of Art, make Montreal the rival of old world cities, and the envy of the new.
