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THE LABOR DIFFICULTY IS NOW SETTLED

On the Basis of the Suggestion Made Yesterday by Mayor Parent.

ALD. GRIFFIN APPOINTED STEVEDORE--A FALSE RUMOR DENIED.

The difficulty between the Quebec Ship Laborers' Society and the Leyland Line of steamers ended in an amicable settlement yesterday afternoon, when the proposition made by His Worship Mayor Parent the night previous and published in yesterday's Chronicle was accepted by all parties concerned.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Harling, Canadian manager of the Leyland Line of steamers, accompanied by Mr. J. G. Scott, Manager of the Great Northern Railroad, and Mr. Ramsay, of this city, representing the Manchester Line of steamers, waited on Mayor Parent at his private office, corner of St. Peter and St. Paul streets, to discuss the difficulty and come to an understanding. Mr. Harling presented a new document dealing with the situation, which, however, did not find favor with the Mayor. He reiterated his suggestions of the night previous, and gave the gentlemen who called on him to understand in an emphatic manner that he saw no other way out of the difficulty than to resort to the expeditious he had already proposed, viz., his right to appoint a Quebec stevedore, who would in turn appoint his time-keepers and other assistants, and proceed to do the work at the Montreal contracting stevedores' rates while paying the Quebec laborers the same rate that they received last season. His Worship was inexorable on this point, and informed the deputations that after mature consideration he had come to this conclusion on a basis of fair play to the interests of both capital and labor, and desired that the Leyland Line should submit to a trial of his proposition as an experiment, by the loading of two steamers, and if it should result satisfactorily well and good; if it should turn out otherwise he would be pleased to initiate means of arbitration to regulate a scale of wages that would render more satisfactory results.

After some discussion the Canadian manager of the Leyland Line, Mr. Harling, and Mr. J. G. Scott, representing the Great Northern Railroad, agreed to accept the Mayor's proposition, when His Worship requested them to notify him to that effect by letter, when he would appoint a stevedore and notify the President of the Ship Laborers' Society of the arrangement. In the meantime Mayor Parent appointed Alderman D. Griffin as his stevedore, with power to employ his own time-keepers and other assistants. This appointment has given general satisfaction among the laboring class as well as the merchants.

Alderman Griffin is recognized as one of the most astute stevedores in the trade. He is possessed of good, accurate judgment, and knows exactly how to handle men and load a ship.

At 5.30 o'clock yesterday Mayor Parent received a letter from the Manager of the Great Northern Railroad, on behalf of the Leyland Line of steamers, accepting his proposition. His Worship immediately sent for Mr. Kenny, President of the Quebec Ship Laborers' Society, and Alderman D. Griffin, to whom he communicated the facts of the meeting and the decision arrived at. Mr. Kenny expressed himself perfectly satisfied with the conditions arranged by the Mayor and felt sure that the management of the Leyland Line and the Great Northern Railroad would have no cause to regret the amicable settlement, as he believed that under the direction of Alderman Griffin the steamers could be loaded as economically in the port of Quebec as at the port of Montreal without any reduction of wages. He also thanked the Mayor for the interest he had taken in the dispute and the impartial manner in which he had rendered his decision.

Thus the difficulty ends for the present, with a conviction on the part of the laborers and a fair share of the mercantile community that there will be no occasion for any further dispute.

QUESTION OF LOADING.
It having been stated that Quebec firms and stevedores were willing to undertake the loading of the Leyland Line steamers at Montreal rates and pay the Quebec scale of wages, a Chronicle reporter was instructed to ascertain the facts. The first gentleman seen was Mr. Lorne Webster, of the firm of G. M. Webster & Co., in reply to the query—"Would you undertake to load the Leyland steamers at Montreal rates and pay the Quebec Society's scale of wages?"—Mr. Webster said it would require some calculation to answer the question. He had not studied it thoroughly, but at any rate he did not care to tender for the work, as he could not afford the time to attend to it. He thought, however, a stevedore taking it at the Montreal rates would make his daily

The South African Returns Brought Down

'H.M. GOVERNMENT WILL REPAY'

SOME INTERESTING READING CONCERNING THE SENDING OF FORCES TO SOUTH AFRICA. THE SUPPLYING OF ARMS AND EQUIPMENT AND THE PURCHASE OF HORSES—PORT OF QUEBEC HAS A CHAMPION IN MR. M'LAREN, OF PERTH.

Ottawa, May 7.—Papers and correspondence in relation to the South African war and Canada's connection therewith were brought down to-day. They cover a period of three years. In connection with the organization of the Second Canadian Mounted Rifles some interesting cables appear. Lord Minto sent one cable which is suggestive: "Troops should be armed here, as public opinion is against sending unarmed force, His Majesty's Government to replace arms sent from here. Other messages regarding the furnishing of supplies by Canada contain the significant sentence: "His Majesty's Government to repay." At the time last December when Mr. Beith, M.P., was inspecting horses and purchases were being made by favored friends of the Government the request was sent to England asking for leave to send as many horses as the ship could carry. Mr. Chamberlain enquired what price the horses would be, and was told on December 10th that they would range from \$145 to \$155 per horse. Colonel Dent was instructed to purchase additional mounts to fill the vessels that were taking the Second Mounted Rifles to South Africa. This led to a protest from the Militia Department and the statement that the Minister felt sure his agents could purchase the additional number required. On the subject of supplying arms Lord Minto also cabled in December that the Officer Commanding at Halifax had received a communication on the subject: "But my Government has no official connection with Halifax." The despatch continued: "My Ministers hope it may be clearly understood that their channel of communication with His Majesty's Government is through the Governor-General alone. Inform War Office that all communications should be sent through me, otherwise there will be confusion."

THE MORGAN SHIPPING TRUST

AMERICAN RAILROADS AT THE BACK OF THE MERGER IN ORDER TO CONTROL INTERIOR RATES—EFFORTS TO KEEP THE MATTER SECRET TO AVOID OPPOSITION HERE AND ABROAD.

New York, May 7.—The Evening Post says to-day that a despatch to that paper from London to the effect that some of the large American railroads are to be the principal owners of the steamship combination was confirmed to-day in trustworthy quarters. The Post says:—

Efforts are being made, however, to keep the matter as secret as possible, because of the opposition which has been stirred up abroad and which might arise here in case the facts are known in regard to the ownership of the steamship companies.

It is admitted in well-informed quarters that it is planned to make the ocean liners feeders to the largest railroad transportation companies of the United States, so that it will be possible to control rates from the principal interior points of this country to leading European centers.

Several large railroad companies—supposed to be the Eastern Trunk lines—are represented in the underwriting syndicate for \$50,000,000, which has just been formed to guarantee the success of the steamship deal and these are supposed to be the Pennsylvania, New York Central, Erie and Baltimore & Ohio, although there is some doubt whether all of these lines will come in.

In regard to the railroads, it should be said that their interest in the undertaking does not necessarily imply that they have officially subscribed as yet to the syndicate, but subscriptions have been entered which are intended for them, and those who have taken them are agents for the railroads.

THE DANISH ISLANDS

Copenhagen, Denmark, May 6.—At a secret session to-day, the Landsting decided to adhere to the resolution previously passed, namely, to defer ratification of the treaty, providing for the sale of the Danish West Indies until after a limited vote of the population of the islands. This will undoubtedly be confirmed in open session to-morrow. The minority will then move the appointment of a conference committee which will probably be accepted by the majority.

AGAIN IN TROUBLE

London, May 7.—A despatch to the Daily Express from Rome says that a telegram from Trieste states that last night a number of sailors belonging to the American cruiser Chicago assaulted citizens in the street. Four of the men were arrested, despite efforts to rescue them. They were delivered to Captain Dayton, commanding the Chicago, who paid all claims for broken windows.

SAFELY LANDED

Athens, May 7.—The Royal family of Greece have been safely landed at Elis, Peloponnesus, thirty-five miles from here. The Royal yacht Amphitrite has not yet been floated. The Amphitrite, with the Royal family on board, ran aground in the Fapros channel while proceeding to Chalkis last night, whether the Royal party were proceeding to celebrate the King's name day.

COLLAPSE OF VESUVIUS

Naples, May 7.—The central cone of Mount Vesuvius suddenly collapsed on Friday evening, and a large gap is now seen toward Pompeii. Long and very deep cracks have also made their appearance along the sides of the volcano. Professor Mattei, of the Vesuvius observatory, says the collapse will be followed by startling volcanic manifestations resulting in the formation of a new cone in the direction of Naples. Considerable alarm is felt by the inhabitants.

CAPTURE OF BOERS

London, May 7.—Lord Kitchener reporting the capture of Boers, near Lindley, said that the British troops forming a continuous line, left Frankfurt Hillborn and Vredestrom line at dawn, without wheels of any sort, and proceeded rapidly south reaching the Kroonstad and Lindley neighborhood with the result announced. Another British column holding the drifts north of this country has reported its results. The captured Boers represent the most irremovable Boers in the Orange River Colony.

JACQUES CARTIER HALL

Government Grants Paltry Sum of \$100,000

THE SHIP LABORERS' QUESTION.

The recrudescence of the misunderstanding of last year between the Ship Laborers' Society and the Leyland Line, with the Great Northern Railway mis en cause, is much to be deplored, especially as it is more than likely to be exaggerated and used abroad to the depreciation of the port. Under this latter aspect the questions which have arisen become a matter of general interest in which the city may well take part, but outside of this they are of such a nature as to affect the disputants alone. In discussing them there is no need for angry words or hard feelings, as we take it, though each side is convinced of the justice of its cause, it is also equally convinced of the desirability of an amicable settlement, of the importance of such a settlement to its own interests, and of the reasonableness of going as far as it can in the way of compromise. The moderation with which the discussion has been so far conducted on both sides, and the candour and temperate tone with which they have laid their respective cases before the public are very creditable to them, and if they should ultimately lead to a satisfactory arrangement of all differences will be something gained in the present conjuncture.

The cause of the whole matter is not whether a certain rate of wages is too high, or too low, either in itself, or in comparison with the rate in other places, but whether a contractor can take the loading of a ship at Quebec, paying his men the rate demanded by the Ship Laborers' Society here, as satisfactory, in a pecuniary sense, as if he were in Montreal paying Montreal rates. This is denied by Mr. Harling, and asserted by the Ship Laborers, who adduce the example of the first three ships loaded here to prove their position. The proof, though strong, is not quite so much so as it would appear at first, because there was unquestionably a comparative loss on the second vessel loaded, which seems to show that the individual question is affected by circumstances which are overlooked; at the same time the average, if three may be taken as a fair average, sustains the contention of the Society. The conclusion, however, is disputed by the Company, because, as we understand, the expense of shed work at Montreal is not included in the statement. It may fairly be urged in reply, that this expense is counterbalanced by peculiar advantages enjoyed by the Company here, such as free wharfage and electrical lighting, and the absence of annual pulling down and rebuilding sheds. All these things, however, on either side come more properly under the head of theories, and whether a ship can or cannot be loaded here as the Ship Laborers' claim is a question which can only be set at rest by a practical test.

Both sides seem to recognize this fact, and as will have been noted by our report of yesterday, both sides are willing to govern themselves accordingly; the difference between the two being as to who should make the experiment, the Society or the Company; each is willing to "learn to shave on other people's faces," but not on their own, and each seems not quite so satisfied as to the strength of its position when faced with the making of the test. The Mayor, who is the general *deus ex machina* being appealed to suggested he should appoint an experienced Stevedore to employ his own time-keepers, and keep an account of the actual cost of the loading of two vessels, offering at the same time to arbitrate in case this did not lead to a satisfactory solution. The proposition naturally commended itself to the Society, and equally naturally was not so grateful to the Company, at whose expense the experiment was proposed to be made, so Mr. Harling took time to consider, with the result that yesterday he was enabled to announce the acceptance of the offer by the Leyland Company. We compliment Mr. Harling on the conciliatory spirits thus manifested and see in it a good augury for a future mutual good understanding to which the moderate attitude of the Ship Laborers has materially contributed, and we congratulate the Great Northern Railway, which though not

in any degree responsible for the dispute, and desirous of the prosperity of both parties has been placed in a very unpleasant position, on this termination of the matter.

WALDECK-ROUSSEAU'S SUCCESS.

What the French Ministerialists have lost in Paris they have more than made good in the provinces, and the net outcome of the appeal of the electors is an unmistakable note of confidence.

The result of this election, coupled with the unprecedented duration of the Waldeck-Rousseau Cabinet, indicates that the French people, considered as a whole, and distinguished from the light-minded Parisians, have begun to acquire a firmness and a sobriety of purpose which they have hitherto lacked. If they continue to exhibit the calm and judicial temper which they have displayed during the last two or three years, they will not much longer deserve the reputation of political instability.—New York Sun.

"A LITTLE JOKER."

The New York Tribune points out that, while the terms of Russia's recent treaty with China, respecting Russia's withdrawal from Manchuria, appear to be unexceptionable, there is a clause appended to it that may turn the whole thing into a joke, as it leaves Russia quite free to disregard the treaty at any time she makes up her mind to do so. This clause declares that "if the Chinese Government violates any provision of the convention the Russian Government will not hold itself bound either by the terms of the Manchurian agreement or by declarations previously made in connection with this matter, and will be compelled to repudiate responsibility for any consequences that might result therefrom." That is, as the Tribune points out, if China should send into Manchuria a few more soldiers than Russia sanctions or is informed of, Russia will be privileged to sweep aside the whole treaty and all other arguments concerning Manchuria and act as she pleases. And remembering how easy it is to impute to any country a violation of treaty stipulation, it is clear that the integrity of China in Manchuria is not at all guaranteed by this "treaty." In treaty making and everything else, it is the same Adam Zad.—Halifax Herald.

SMALL-POX IN QUEBEC.

We noticed a paragraph in the Montreal Star of Monday last to the effect that Dr. Laberge had received a letter from Washington that the prevalence of small-pox in this city, owing to the laxity of precautionary measures, was exciting alarm in Washington, and that American tourists were being warned against visiting Quebec. That is precisely what we stated would happen when we called attention to the prevalence of the disease and the inefficient enforcement of quarantine but we are happy to be able to state on the authority of several leading physicians that the disease has practically disappeared and that there is not the slightest reason for alarm, as the sanitary state of the city is perfect. In fact, in spite of the medical diagnosis, when we consider the all-but total absence of fatal cases, and the ease with which those affected could, and did, pursue their ordinary avocations after a brief confinement to the house of two or three days, it is open to question whether the disease was not varioloid rather than variola, and not small-pox at all, or, if it were, an extremely new and excessively mild description of it.

VICTORIA DAY.

It should not be forgotten that the
24th of May falls this year on Satur-
day, and it must be obvious that this
will cause great inconvenience to busi-
ness men. But it must be remembered
that it is a statutory holiday, the Act
passed last year making the day a
legal holiday to be kept and observed
under the name of Victoria Day. A
correspondent writes to the effect that
the celebration should be on Monday,
May 26, and the City Council should
fix the day at once, so that the public
may make its arrangements, and that
the matter should not be left to the
last moment. It must, however, be
clear enough that the City Council has
to power to make the proposed change.
The Act also changes the Bills of Ex-
change Act by adding the day to the
list of bank holidays. The only thing
which seems possible is that a clause
amending the Act be passed before the
end of the session, but then again it
may be doubted whether the Govern-
ment would so change the law. But
it is certainly unfortunate that the
holiday falls on the day of the week
it does.—Ottawa Free Press.

THE WEBB-MEYER SLUMP.

There is considerable doubt as to the
exact cause of the slump in the Webb-
Meyer stocks, but there appears to
have been something resembling con-
certed action on the part of several
banks to refuse to renew loans upon
shares. This refusal brought the bro-
kers who are believed to have had the
market manipulation of the shares in
large into financial trouble. Lack of
funds prevented the firm from complet-
ing the purchase of stock bought by
them and, therefore, from supporting
the securities on the curb. It is al-
leged that a number of country banks
and financial institutions have loaned
from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000 on the
syndicate stocks. One especially inter-
esting rumor which was current on
Saturday was that Vanderbilt brokers
had come to the support of Rutland
shares, which seems probable through
Dr. Webb's connection with the family.

The lesson to be drawn from the
movement in stocks in the last few
days is a very plain one for the pub-
lic. It points the necessity for mak-
ing sure of the solidity of companies
before investing money in them. This
does not mean that the companies
which are now figuring conspicuously
in the market are not intrinsically
sound or do not have excellent pros-
pects, but it does mean that the earn-
ing power of corporations should be
closely scrutinized and compared with
the prices at which their securities are
held. It is a matter for considerable
contraturation that the public was not
hit very hard by the slump recorded
last week, for the simple reason that
it seems to have looked upon the
market with well-founded suspicion
and lambs are keeping out of it. The
only people who seem to have suffered
are those who were manipulating
stocks with a view to drawing in out-
side money. No one regrets the turn
which the punishment took.—Buffalo
Express.

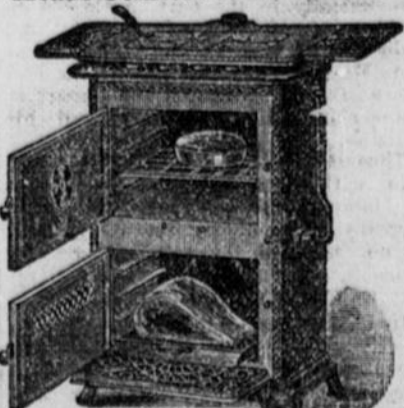

NOTES FROM SOUTH AFRICA

London, May 7. - A letter, from Pretoria, dated April 13, is printed, describing the Boer delegates. The writer says that they all like and respect General Kitchener and fear him to a good extent. It was expected that State Secretary Reitz would prove troublesome, but General Kitchener bagged him as an interpreter, keeping him so busy that he did not have leisure to make speeches.

London, May 6. - The Official Gazette to-night announces that the distinguished conduct medal granted by the War Office to Corporal H. C. Picton, of Loch's Horse, who became a lieutenant in the Bushveldt Carbineers, the organization accused of cruelty towards prisoners and women, has been cancelled. The medal was awarded on September 27, 1901. Corporal Picton has been cashiered owing to his having been implicated in the murder of Boer prisoners.

Lord Kitchener's weekly report, dated from Pretoria yesterday, shows that the peace movement is not allowed to interfere with military operations except so far as to permit of unrestrained meetings between the leaders and their various commands. The week's Boer casualties were 10 men killed and 122 made prisoners. General Bruce Hamilton's columns captured 87 men on the Heilbron (Orange River Colony) line. Colonel Colenbrander has resumed operations in the northern part of the Transvaal against Commandant Beyers, whose forces have been considerably reduced, and General Ian Hamilton has cleared a large area west of Klerksdorp, southern Transvaal.

THE VALET. From the New York Times. The valet, in a way, seems to have taken the place of the maid for continental travelling. Many women employ valets instead of maids, and sometimes they hire both. The valet acts as a courier, attends to the luggage and the custom house inspection, and is popularly supposed never to be sick at sea. For unprotested women, he is of great assistance. For instance, on Thursday, on the passenger list of the Deutschland, Miss Delia Gurnee, a very fashionable woman, who is going abroad with her niece, Miss Scott, to get a trousseau for the latter, who is to be married in November, registered "Miss Delia Gurnee and valet." Miss Norma Munro, who is well known at Long Branch and in this city, registered "Miss Norma Munro, valet and maid."

THE KING'S CORONATION MANTLE

In the Easter number of the Pall Mall Magazine Mary Howarth supplied particulars of the making of the Coronation robe of King Edward. It was at Brantree, in the mills of Messrs. Warner and Sons, that the King's mantle was woven. The gold was bought by a firm of gold wire pullers, who prepared it for the loom, it was set up on the loom and then it was woven. Anglers who tie their own flies know exactly what the gold looked like when the weavers received it, for they themselves buy it on flat reels, some of it a very narrow flat strip, some round, in which case the gold has been wound about a very fine silken thread, to make the tag, ribs, and sometimes the whole body of their lures. For the King's Coronation mantle, instead of the fine silken inner thread one of delicate silver was used, covered with gold exactly in the manner just described. The very purest gold only was naturally deemed suitable for the cloak, gold with less alloy in it that that used for the coinage of the sovereigns and half-sovereigns; gold with the brightest possible radiance of glory, a luminous color like corn first touched with a radiant burnish of the harvest sun. Mr. Frank Warner who knows the ins and out of hand-loom weaving from beginning to end, tried first one weaving and then another, until the result was precisely what was wanted—a perfectly pliable cloth, stiff enough to stand alone, yet so amenable to the movement of its wearer as to fall from one glistening line of fold to another; perfect also for the needle of the embroiderer and the gold and silver stitchery it was to receive.

Albert Parchment and William Shoulder wove the King's mantle of gold, every inch of it by the hand. Both men and seven others in Messrs. Warner's firm received honorable mention at the Paris Exhibition of 1900, where the firm obtained the gold medals for silks. Opposite Albert Parchment and William Shoulder was a fellow-workman, weaving the length of glorious purple velvet that is to form the Coronation Day robe of H. R. H. the Princess of Wales. Other looms were slowly creating—surely the sentiment expression is appropriate here—more velvets for Royalty and the great ladies of the kingdom to wear on that all glorious day of glorious June.

There were twenty-seven yards of gold tissue woven for the King's mantle, and as each few inches was completed, it was covered with a jeweller's cloth to preserve it in immaculate splendor. Once a slight flaw was detected in the cloth of gold, the merest, tiniest excrescence, after several inches had been woven past it; and the weaver was directed laboriously to unpick his work until the flaw was reached—a task that occupied quite as long a time as the process of weaving itself. It was about the end of the month of February that the lovely length of stuff, glowing like molten metal, was completed in triumph and borne from the mill to undergo the next stage in its process towards completion, when hand embroidery it was decided should be given to it, instead of the woven patterns of crowns, eagles, roses, thistles, and shamrocks in reputation, that garnished Queen Victoria's mantle.

ODD CLASSIFICATION.

The Way a Carload of Tramps Was Designated in Mexico. In Mexico the billing of railroad freight requires a knowledge and precision which can only be attained by years of practice. This is due to the peculiar classification of various articles and the different rates of customs duties. A case recently occurred which severely taxed the ingenuity of the station agent, although he finally succeeded in meeting all requirements.

The town was over run with tramps, and the council determined that steps must be taken to rid the city of them. It was finally decided to round them up and ship them out of the country. It would be too expensive to purchase tickets, so they concluded to hire stock cars and ship their tramps as freight. The cars were procured, and by the aid of the police the tramps were gathered, but then the question arose as to how the shipment should be designated on the bill of lading.

The term "persons" could not be used, as it would conflict with the state law relative to proper accommodations for the traveling public, and it would also be in violation of the company's rules governing the rates of passenger traffic. "Marketable commodities" would not do, as that would subject the carload to a heavy duty upon crossing the tariff zone. Again they would have to be classified as "perishable" or the dispatcher might order the car sidetracked along the line. But fortunately there is a customs law which exempts certain kinds of curiosities from duty, and so, after much consideration, the tramps were billed and forwarded, as so many hundredweight of "perishable curiosities—unsuitable to eat."

Curing a Duelist.

It is said that a Harvard man who was visiting Paris in some innocent way offended a club member, who promptly slapped his face, the Frenchman expecting, of course, to receive a challenge for a duel. Instead of this proceeding the Harvard man turned and looked for an instant at his adversary, then quick as a flash pulled back his strong right hand and sent the fellow rolling across the floor, breaking the bones of his nose in two places.

After a few weeks, when the Frenchman had sufficiently recovered from the incident to discover what had happened, he issued a formal challenge to his American offender to fight a duel, and, being the recipient of the challenge, the American was permitted to select the weapons. He promptly chose a baseball and, being an old pitcher, threw with an accuracy which resulted in the Frenchman's getting another wound on the nose, curing him entirely of the love for dueling.

How New York Sleeps.

New York is a city of infinite variety. There are those who have beds without sleep and those who sleep without beds. Three thousand of her winter residents slumber in the cradles of the canal barges that come each year from the canals of New York state, from the great lakes and Lake Champlain to spend the winter months moored in New York harbor. In the tenement districts a man, his wife and his four or six or eight or more children sleep in a single room, and one who goes about the city finds many a device for slumber and repose. On Washington street, on the west side, where the Turks, the Greeks, the Assyrians and the Egyptians live near neighbors to a colony of Irish, is a queer little oriental hotel on the top floor of a tenement. —Leslie's Weekly.

Rome's Churches.

The guidebooks are responsible for the popular impression that there are 865 churches in Rome, one for every day in the year, but that is a mistake. The exact number is 352, including the four great basilicas outside the walls. Besides these there are about 918 chapels connected with monasteries, nunneries, schools and private palaces and a large number of shrines erected by individuals in different parts of the city to fulfill vows or show gratitude for deliverance from peril or sickness. There are 68 monastic establishments, 42 for monks and 26 for nuns.

The Umbrella Conscience.

A correspondent contributes another to the series of umbrella myths. During a smart shower a gentleman who was unprovided hurriedly overlooked an acquaintance whom he chanced to see some distance ahead of him carrying an umbrella, intending to ask if he might be permitted to share its shelter. He was almost up to him, when suddenly the other turned around and with a guilty look thrust it into his hands and vanished.—London Globe.
