RIOT AT JERUSALEM.

LONDON, June 4.—A despatch from Constantinople reports a serious riot at Jerusalem between Catholics and Greeks. The Turkish troops intervened, killing several and wounding a large number. The French ambassador at Constantinople sent a strong protest to the Porte against the action of the Turkish troops.

SEALING BILL PASSED.

LONDON, June 4.—The bill for the prohibition of sealing in Behring Sea by British subjects passed its third reading in the House of Commons to-night.

QUEEN CITY TOPICS.

(Special to the Witness.)

Toronto, June 5.—The Brahmin missionary Shehadri gave a public address in Knox church last night, under the auspices of the Presbyterian body, on missionary work in India. The Salvation Army gave a grand farewell last night to Commissioner Adams, who left at midnight for England. He will be succeeded by Commissioner Rees.

The harbor authorities manifest a laudable determination to suppress all steamboat racing on the bay. A second captain has been fined \$25 and costs for exceeding the maximum legal rate of speed and others are being constantly watched. It is easy to detect the offence by timing vessels between Yonge street and the Queen's wharf.

BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE.

(Special to the Witness.)

NAPANEE, June 4.—The following young men have been received on probation for the ministry: Messrs. W. A. Sanderson, J. Barnes, J. A. Connell, J. R. Peake, M. B. Williams, H. B. Rowe, C. B. Darling, A. Dossie, J. Garbutt, J. W. Shaw, A. L. Brown, G. L. Ross, J. Gable, R. K. Spence and D. C. Day.
A very pleasant part of the reception was the knowledge that three of the young men were sons of ministers, and several were volunteers for the mission field of the church.

One of the most largely attended prayer meetings ever held in connection with Conference Sessions was held this afternoon, over three hundred persons being in attendance upon the conference, and the galleries were filled with visitors. The election of officers is always an interesting and exciting part of the meeting.

The new President is the Rev. O. R. Lambly, M.A., of Wellington, and the secretary, the Rev. O. W. Watch, Chairman of the Cannington District. Mr. Lambly entered the ministry in 1864, is a graduate of Victoria University and has been appointed to many important charges by the Conference.

Mr. Watch is a younger man, being about 40 years of age, 16 being spent in the ministry. He has been the Journal secretary of the Conference for the past four years, and having completed his three years at Cannington he is appointed to Oshawa as his future field of labor. The assistant secretaries are the Rev. E. N. Baker, B.D., and Mr. R. W. Clarke, and the Journal Secretary the Rev. R. Duke.

The educational meeting of the Conference held this evening was marked in its interest and enthusiasm. The Rev. J. Anderson paid a glowing and eloquent tribute to the life and memory of the late Dr. Nelles.
The Rev. Dr. Badgely delivered an able address on the necessity of a continually improving Professoriate, and therefore he was thankful for federation. He was followed by Dr. Potts in an eloquent appeal for the Educational Society. During the past quadrennium the income had increased \$20,000. He pleaded for an income of \$50,000 a year. The corner stone of the new College in Toronto is to be laid on Monday next.

Among the lay delegates, the following prominent gentlemen are to be met, and they make their presence felt in all the discussions: His Honor Judge Dean, of Lindsay; J. R. Crowle, Ph.D., of Markham; W. E. Tilley, Ph.D., of Bowmanville; Dr. Ford, of Norwood; J. A. Sprague, M.P.P., of Ameliasburg, and Police Magistrate Dumble, of Peterboro'.

THE WEATHER REPORT.

METEOROLOGICAL OFFICE, Toronto, Ont., June 4, 11 p.m.—The pressure is generally high to-night over the greater portion of the continent. The greatest pressure still covering the northern portion. A DEADLOCK has apparently come about

between the legislative powers of the Do-
minion and the ratification powers of the
United Kingdom over the question of copy-
right for the Dominion. The interests of
Canadian authors, publishers and sellers, are
in diametrical opposition to those of English
ones, and all the authorities that lie on the
other side have, so far, steadily resisted Cana-
da's demands that the legislation which has
been passed in her own interests by her
Parliament shall be allowed to go into force.

Sir John Thompson's declaration, which is
very firm in tone, that Canada, in this as in
other matters well within her own sphere,
must have her will, and that the Imperial
Government would probably proclaim the act,
or pass the necessary enabling measures, will
be regarded as satisfactory.

THE CONGRESSIONAL PARTY OF CHILI,

of the "insurgents," as they are called, have,
from a political point of view, very wisely
surrendered the "Itata" and its cargo to the
United States for violation of the neutral-
ity laws and for carrying off a law mar-
shal of the United States placed on
board in charge. The friendship of
the United States is worth a good deal
more than five thousand rifles to the Con-
gressional party, and it will probably win
the goodwill of the Americans by its act. The
United States, Brazil and France are trying
to compose the quarrel between the two par-
ties in Chili, but have not yet been success-
ful, and in the meantime the civil war is pro-
ceeding with no very decisive results, though
the insurgents, in spite of their recent moral
defeat and disaster, seem to be slowly gaining
ground.

SOWING THE WIND.

At one time a strong Republican movement
existed in England, which had among
other leaders and sympathizers such men as
Sir Charles Dilke and Mr. Bradlaugh. Re-
cently Radicals and Reformers have proba-
bly become satisfied that it would prove as
easy, practically, bringing about moral, so-
cial and political reforms under a monarchical
form of government, such as that of England,
as under a Republican form like that of the
United States. At any rate, reformers of all
kinds and conditions have been too busy dur-
ing the last twenty years with the work of
actual reform in all directions and in all
departments to give much attention to the
question of the mere form of govern-
ment. It is probable, too, that the almost
miraculous recovery of the Prince of
Wales from death by typhoid fever and his
supposed change of character as a result of
that illness aroused sympathy and good feel-
ing for him, and certainly the joy of the
Queen and Princess of Wales, as well as the
sincere rejoicing of the whole royal family
over his recovery and over the demonstra-
tions of sympathy, which were world-wide,
drew the hearts of the subjects of the
Queen more closely to her and to her family
and put an end for the time to all republican
agitation. Since then the Prince of Wales
has shown a remarkable aptitude for the
graceful performance of such duties, most-
ly social, which came within his sphere
as heir to the throne. He has presided over
many national undertakings and social func-
tions, and has done much to promote and en-
courage charitable work. Those who can be
trusting by the people, and who have also the
means and opportunity of forming a judg-
ment, men like Mr. Gladstone and Mr.
Morley, say that he has worked hard and
earnestly in his own line of public duty,
and without sparing himself. He has proba-
bly done something very real for reform
by refusing to countenance attempts to
ostracize the Liberals socially since they took
up the subject of Home Rule, and he did
not confine himself to passive attitude. The
names of Mr. Gladstone and Mr. Morley were
made prominent on all occasions when the
Prince of Wales presided over state enter-
tainments, though they and others like them
were not prominent figures, as they care little
for such affairs and nothing for the mere
show. The Prince, who is the acknowledged

leader of English society, has been, therefore,
personally rather popular with the Liberals,
though there are Radicals even among those
who see a good deal of him in society and else-
where, who have always seized every oppor-
tunity to keep down, if not cut down,
state grants to him and other members
of the royal family. He is now in danger of
forfeiting the goodwill of the Liberals, and of
arousing the serious hostility of the Radicals.
It has been generally known for years that
he was deeply in debt, but it was believed
that his embarrassments arose out of the fact
that he was compelled to perform the social
duties and maintain more or less of the style
of the sovereign while still only heir to the
throne, and possessed of the comparatively
narrow resources of that position. Just when
it was determined that a grant should be asked
from Parliament to clear off his indebtedness
the fact became public that he had been
cheated at gambling. The circumstances
were not known, but the mere fact rendered
it impossible for the Government to apply to
Parliament for the grant. Now details are
being made public, and they are of such a
character as to antagonize the moral sentiment
of the people against the Prince. He virtu-
ally compelled the re-admission of gambling
into the family and house of a friend after it
had been stopped, and the gross cheating
which was practised by one of his most inti-
mate companions upon himself has ended in
a trial in which evidence shows that
gambling has become habitual to him, and
that it has become so necessary a part of his
life that he carries around his own gambling
outfit. When once the gambling habit takes
possession of a man, his case is almost hope-
less. To attempt to keep a man seized of the
passion supplied with money would be as
great a task as to fill a sieve with water.
And this passion has a tendency to render
all other pleasures irksome, and all duties
distasteful. A breeze may be expected against
royalty in certain strata of English society,
and the Prince of Wales will only have
himself to blame for it.

JOLY'S DISMISSAL CONFIRMED.

ACCOUNT OF HOW A PRISONER WAS SERVED
WHEN ARRESTED.

The Police Committee met last evening and
investigated the charges brought by Mr.
Bras, accountant of the Road Department,
against Constable Joly, for alleged ill-treat-
ment of a prisoner. Joly having been dis-
missed, had asked to be heard. Mr. Bras told
how he saw Joly drag in the prisoner, strike
him in the face, and knock him against the
door, swearing at him in French. The
other policemen present jeered and laughed,
and when the prisoner tried to wipe his face,
which was streaming with blood, the men
laughed. Witness had told Joly he was a
coward. He asked for paper, and made a re-
port to the Chief. Detectives Campeau and
McMahon had told witness at the time that
the Chief was not in, although witness knew
that he was in.

Fred. Bartlett, freeman at the City Hall, de-
posed to having seen Joly drag in the prisoner
and strike him. Could not say if prisoner had
hold of Joly's leg with his teeth or not. Joly
hit the prisoner twice with his hand.

Sergeant Watson said the prisoner was
bleeding when brought in and drunk, help-
lessly drunk. He saw the prisoner clinging to
Joly's leg and saw Joly strike prisoner with
his hand. Mr. Bras was very much excited.

Constable Senecal, one of the policemen
who laughed, said he saw the prisoner bite
Joly's leg. Joly struck him to make him let go.

Ex-Constable Joly said the man was one of
the worst loafers in Montreal. When he took
him he was drunk and covered with blood.
He had to carry the fellow part of the way to
the station, and when he got there, upon his
order, he struck him in the head. He hit
the prisoner to make him stop biting.

It was decided to sustain the Chief's action
in dismissing Joly.

MEETINGS AND SOCIETIES.

ODD FELLOWS' PRESENTATIONS.

Last evening a number of the members of the Man-
chester Lodge, representing the Grand Lodge of
Montreal, Excelsior, Star of the West, and Lansdowne
Lodges, met in the Oddfellows Hall, 601 St. Craig street,
for the purpose of presenting to their band a drum
major's staff. Noble Grand Vaux, of Loyal Montreal
Lodge, No. 3115, on behalf of the Order, made the pre-
sentation, and stating that it was only a small token of
the members' appreciation for the band's "valuable ser-
vice." Bandmaster Andrew McAllister and Drum-
Major Peter S. Morrison, on receiving the magnificent
gift made appropriate replies. The staff is well got up
and reflects great credit on the originator, Bro. J. Har-
rison, of the Loyal Montreal Lodge. It is made of Ger-
man silver, on the top is a gold plated crown, and on
the front is the inscription: "Presented to the
Oddfellows' Band, Manchester Lodge, by the members
of the Montreal District." Three gold-plated links,
crossed at the top, and the initials "J. H. G." are
engraved on the staff. At the top is a beautiful chain with
tassels attached, which encircles the staff to the bottom.
After the presentation of the staff a very pleasant
evening was spent in the reception of the band. Bro.
Peter S. Morrison of a silver medal. The presentation
was made by Noble Grand Vaux and Bro. J. Harrison,
who stated that the occasion gave them great pleasure.
Bro. Morrison was very happy to see that Past Grand
Morrison, an old Oddfellow, was held in such high esteem by
the brethren, and hoped that he would be long spared to
work in the lodge. Bro. Morrison was completely taken
by surprise, replied in a nasal speech. The medal is solid
silver, with two clasps and three heavy links. On the
front side it has the Globe and heart in hand, which is
encircled by a wreath, and outside of this on the four
corners "Faith, Hope and Charity." On the reverse
side is the inscription: "Presented to P. S. Morrison,
P.M., by the members of Loyal Montreal Lodge, No.
3115, I.O.O.F. M.U., for meritorious services. Mont-
real, June 4, 1891." The pleasant evening came to a
close at 10 o'clock.

THE EXHIBITION.

The various committees of the Montreal Exposition
Company met on Wednesday. A circular will be issued
to manufacturers and exhibitors urging that machines
in operation and the processes of manufacture should
be exhibited. The Central Trades and Labor Council
asked permission to use the grounds for the Labor Day
celebration on Monday, September 7. It was agreed
that if the Central Trades and Labor Council would
have the Labor Day celebration on Tuesday, September
8, the opening day of the exhibition, the company
would make concessions. A staff of carpenters is
putting the grounds in order.

BROCK'S ASSOCIATION.

The Montreal Brock's Association held a meeting in
the Mechanics Institute last evening. The attendance
was large and Mr. E. D. Elliott, the president, occupied
the chair. The principal question brought up was
that of the Labor Day celebration. It was held on
Monday, September 7, and the Brock's Association
and St. Rose seems to be the place most favored.
A committee was formed to report to the meeting a
suitable place.

THE HOCHELAGA COUNTY COUNCIL HAS

appointed Messrs. Pierre David and Joseph N.
Lefebvre auditors to examine the books of the
defaulting ex-secretary-treasurer, Prevost.
Mr. S. Villeneuve, advocate, son of Alderman
Villeneuve, has been appointed secretary-
treasurer of the Council.

MORE BY-LAWS.

THE CITY COUNCIL GETTING READY
FOR ITS SUMMER HOLIDAY.

ALD. CONROY CARRIES HIS MOTION AGAINST
NON-RESIDENT CIVIC EMPLOYEES.

The City Council yesterday, despite the fact
that Ald. Stephens—whom some consider an
obstructionist—was present, made quite a hole
in the order sheet. The Mayor presided. Ald.
Pronfantine moved for a by-law giving the
city power to clean sidewalks of snow and ice
in winter and charge citizens. Ald. Clendinning
declared himself against it. The City
Attorney was, however, ordered to prepare a
by-law. Ald. Pronfantine then moved that
application be made to the Legislature for
powers to levy a special tax for the work.
Carried, Ald. Clendinning dissenting.

WOULD CUT HIS OWN COMMITTEE'S HEAD OFF.

Ald. Stephens moved "to merge the Parks
and Ferries Committee into the Mount Royal
Park Committee." He would also increase
the latter, now composed of three, to seven
members. Ald. Pronfantine said they could
not change a standing committee without the
consent of the Legislature. There must, con-
sequently, be an amendment to the Charter.
In the meantime the City Attorney
might be instructed to frame a by-law.
Ald. Clendinning asked why he did not
propose to put all the parks and squares
under a single committee and be done with it?
The Mayor said he believed the Council was
in error in doing so. Ald. Stephens explained
that the expenditure on the island was so
small that it was not necessary to have a com-
mittee especially for it. Ald. Pronfantine re-
marked that if all the parks and squares were
put under one committee, the city would need
a special department, with a gang of survey-
ors, levelers, etc., while at present this was
done by the Road Department. Ald. Stephens
said they had lots of officials already. There
was no engineering required on the island.
By-law ordered.

The Water Committee reported asking that
the Road Committee be instructed to give
timely notice to it when about to lay side-
walks. Carried.

WESTERN SQUARE EXTENSION.

Ald. Shorey moved, seconded by Ald. Con-
roy, to extend Western square to St.
Luke street, in rear of the Western Hospital.
—Referred to the Road Committee. Ald. Rol-
land objected, as too much permanent work
had already been given out. "Refer it," said
Ald. Stephens, "with instructions to put it in
the basket." (Laughter.)

Ald. Conroy moved "That all civic em-
ployees be obliged to reside within the city
limits."

The Mayor—Not in summer. (Laughter.)

Ald. Rolland—Yes, all the year round.

Ald. Pronfantine objected to the rule being
applied to existing employees. It was like
obliging every old member of the police force
to buy a new uniform. Such a rule
would be declared illegal if brought
before a court of justice. Ald. P. Ken-
nedy took the opposite side. All civic
employees should be citizens and out-
siders ought not to get the preference. The
idea was not intended to deprive anyone of
going to work in summer. Ald. Con-
roy remarked that his motion applied to high
officials as well as low ones. Some did not
even spend a dollar in the city of the
citizens money. He did not believe in
letting them come in and fill positions
that of right belonged to citizens.
Ald. Stephens moved that it take effect
on May 1, 1892. The motion was not fair to
interfere with people who had made their arrange-
ments for a year. As for the motion's legality,
he had no doubt of that, and a motion in Council
was quite sufficient. They did not need any
by-law. Heads of departments, especially,
should live within call. It was not right for
employees to hurry out of the offices in order
to "catch their trains" at 3 or 3.30 in the after-
noon. The work of the city.

MUST NOT BE INTERFERED WITH.

Then, again, a man who came in by
train might not arrive before 10 o'clock.
That this city has no time to commence work.
Ald. Stevenson said he hoped this would not
prevent a man's staying a month or so at a
suburban residence with his family. He cer-
tainly believed in the motion, calling to mind
one case, where an official, by whom the city
had lost between \$4,000 and \$5,000, had lived
in the country and nothing had been known
of his whereabouts for several days.

The Mayor—That was the fault of the City
Treasurer.

Ald. Wilson—Would you oblige the officials
to live in town all summer?

Ald. Stephens—Certainly. A good many
people have to live here all the year round.
They are healthy individuals at the end of the
year. The Mayor said the motion ought to
have been carried long ago. He did not see
why country men were appointed anyway. It
was the citizens who paid the taxes and they
should be employed. He applied these re-
marks to carters as well as others, and hoped
the corporation in future would not employ
outside carters, but our own people. Ald.
Conroy's motion, with Ald. Stephens' amend-
ment attached, was carried.

"ST. LOUIS PARK" NOW.

Ald. Savignac moved to alter "Ernest" and
"Albina" streets to "St. Louis Park."

Ald. Stevenson wanted those sections of
Laval avenue and St. Denis street fronting
the Park included, but did not get what he
wanted. Ald. Savignac's motion, without an
amendment, being carried, after Ald. Clen-
dinning had asked for plans of the square and
been rebuffed by the Mayor to sit down.

Ald. Pronfantine moved that the report on
the harbor plans be printed in both languages.
Carried.

ANNUAL EXPROPRIATIONS.

The following by-law covering expropriations,
which formerly took place under the
quinquennial law, was carried:

In the month of September next and in the month
of September of every succeeding year, an expropriation
shall take place of the immovables, or parts of immovables
belonging to proprietors who, after the homologation
of the general plan of the city, or of the plan of
one of the wards thereof, shall offer to cede to the city
such immovables comprised between the former lines
of streets and squares and the new lines as indicated on
the said plan.

CARTAGE OF MANURE.

The following was adopted:—

Section 1.—Every cart, wagon or other vehicle used
to transport manure, garbage, house refuse or other
offensive material, in or through any of the
streets of this city, shall be fitted with a good and
substantial box thereon, the sides of which shall not be
less than twenty-four inches high, so that no portion of
the contents thereof shall be scattered or thrown into
the street; and every such box shall be provided with
a proper covering, so as to conceal its contents and pre-
vent the escape of offensive exhalations therefrom.

At Ald. McBride's suggestion the following
was added:—

"That gas liquids and other offensive matters be re-
moved in air tight vehicles between nine at night and
nine in the morning.

The usual penalties to attach to infringements
of the law.

THE DEADLY CROSSINGS.

Ald. McBride asked when the Mayor intended
calling a meeting on level crossings. Some-

one was being killed every day. The Mayor
said he would call a meeting at any time.

Ald. Stephens—There is a by-law, why is it
not here?

Ald. McBride—Yes, send for it and take it
up now. Ald. Stephens said he learned that
the City Attorney was still studying it.

Ald. Thompson—Next meeting.

Ald. Jeannotte wanted to take up another
by-law, but it was discovered that there was
no quorum.

Ald. Lamarche then moved to adjourn,
which was lost. Ald. Jeannotte then asked
leave to introduce a by-law for the better ob-
servance of Sunday, but was told that he must
await his turn.

Ald. Stephens moved to amend the law so
as to reduce the quorum necessary to pass by-
laws. There was so much delay.

The Mayor denied that there had been any
delay since he had been elected, to which
Ald. Stephens replied that Mr. McShane
might die and they might have a wicked
mayor in his stead. Ald. Stephens' motion
was defeated.

Ald. Pronfantine then moved to adjourn and
his motion was carried.

MILITARY MATTERS.

PROGRESS OF THE CITIZEN SOLDIERY.

There is a good deal of activity just now in
the ranks of the Royal Scots and of the Sixth
Fusiliers. The regiments are preparing for
their respective inspections. Both mustered
strongly, and looked, as a whole, smart and
soldierlike. Some rather difficult movements
were tried by the commanding officers of each,
and the men showed praiseworthy effort to be
up to the mark. The Royal Scots drilled in
the army, and their commanding officer gave
them a capital bit of practice in battalion
movements.

The Prince of Wales' army just now is as-
suming a shape that must make membership
of that fine old corps really more pleasant
than it otherwise could be, as a good meeting
place for chaff and conversation is indispen-
sable for citizen soldiers. It is something for
each regiment to possess, and what regiments
of the '95 period did not have. The arrange-
ment to Colonel Butler's great credit. It is the
Colonel's intention to have arrangements
made so that each volunteer's uniform can be
kept in the army, and the volunteers
dressed for parade there upon all occasions.
This is the United States fashion, and has
been found to work admirably, especially in
the case of troops called out in cases of local
unrest, where the volunteer is a mark for
the displeasure of dissatisfied individuals, as
was the case during the Orange troubles some
years ago. Another good use for these ar-
mouries would be the preparation of a cup of
coffee or tea and a sandwich after a hard held
day or an inspection. The old fashion was to
march the men to a tavern.

THE JUNIOR CONSERVATIVES.

SYMPATHY VOTED FOR LADY MACDONALD.

The Junior Conservative Club met last evening
and elected officers for the ensuing year.

falls to the lot of political clubs, and having

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

LORD'S DAY OBSERVANCE AND FRANCHISE DEBATES.

PRINCIPLE OF ONE-MAN ONE-VOTE REJECTED ON A DIVISION.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

Ottawa, Ont., June 5.—The House heard Mr. Charlton's Lord's Day Observance Bill debated yesterday. The speech of the promoter, occupying almost two hours, was an able exposition of the necessity for such legislation, and a splendid defence of the provisions of his bill. Sir John Thompson following endorsed the principle and expressed the hope that the bill would go to a select committee for the arrangements of the details. The bill was referred to a select committee.

ELECTORAL FRANCHISE ACT.

Mr. Barron introduced a bill to further amend the Electoral Franchise Act. He explained that the bill was to make plain the intention of Mr. Chabreau's amendment to the Act in 1889 that names must be in the declaration to returning officers and not on schedules. Also that the returning officers shall receive names up to and not later than 1st August. Further, he said, he provided that candidates should receive ten instead of four copies of voters' lists.

QUESTIONS.

Mr. Davies enquired why the vote of \$80,000 paid for by the Government for additional property accommodation at the St. John Railway station was wanted. Mr. Bowell gave the reply of the Department of Railways that the district superintendent of the International Railway had reported in favor of increasing the accommodation. Mr. McMullen questioned the Minister of Customs a number of questions with regard to the quantity of raw sugar held in bond by manufacturers. Most of them the minister was unable to answer. As to the quantity held in bond by manufacturers, he gave these figures: At Halifax, 15,546,000 lbs.; at Moncton, 4,578,175 lbs.; and at Montreal, 38,758,080 lbs.

When the orders of the day were called Mr. McMullen called the attention of the House to a question of importance to the farmers of Western Ontario. A few days ago, he said, the member for East Grey had asked in the House if the Department of Agriculture knew anything of an embargo put upon lambs passing out of Canada into the United States. The reply was that the Department had no official information on the subject. Mr. McMullen explained to the House that in August, 1890, the United States had amended their quarantine regulations, but had excepted from its operations, sheep and swine imported from Canada. Since that time, however, the United States authorities either that there were diseases among the sheep of Canada, or that Canada admitted the entry into this country under too lax regulations, for an order had been made by the United States putting an embargo on Canadian lambs, and it would be put in force, unless the Canadian Government took some measure to induce its withdrawal by the United States authorities. The matter was of the greatest importance to the farmers and shippers of Western Ontario; letters had been received by members with regard to the matter and he had himself received three from shippers who said that if the order went into effect they could not go on with their business. This was the season when the shipping of lambs commenced and if the United States order went into force its effect upon the farmers of Ontario would be severe. Thereupon, he moved, seconded by Dr. Macdonald, "That such changes should be made in our quarantine regulations as would prevent the importation of sheep and swine having contagious diseases and thereby secure the removal of the embargo imposed by the United States on sheep, lambs and swine, imported from Canada into that country." Mr. Speaker decided that the vigilant member for North Wellington was not in order with his motion, as that stage of the House's proceedings. The motion was therefore withdrawn, but, as Sir Richard Cartwright remarked, its object had been served when the matter had been by it pressed upon the notice of the Government.

Sir Richard Cartwright asked Mr. Foster if the Budget speech would be brought down to-day, and the Minister replied that it would not.

LORD'S DAY OBSERVANCE.

Mr. Charlton's bill to secure the better observance of the Lord's Day came up for its second reading. The member for North Norfolk speaks for the immense body of Christian people of all characters and churches, when he brings forward this measure. His speech was a comprehensive marshalling of the testimony in favor of such observance that contained in his bill, and was a well sustained argument in favor of its various provisions. A majority of the House are with him so far as the principle of the bill is concerned, whether or not the wide scope and details of the bill are agreed upon. In introducing his bill, Mr. Charlton said it did not attempt to provide for any religious observance of the Sabbath, but merely that it be observed as a day of rest.

The right arm of the observance of the Lord's Day, he said, was religious conviction, but it was the civil relation of the Sabbath to man with which the bill dealt. He first went into the question of the physical and mental requirement of man of a day of rest. He contended that man should not allow any encroachments upon a necessary rest from work. The state, he argued, had a right to establish holidays and it had a right to establish days of rest, and provide for the observance of them. It was proper that the state should make regular ones, which might interfere with personal liberty to some extent, if the interest of the public demanded it, and this bill would be in the interest of the Christian people, of the laborer, of the employer, of the state and humanity and it was not its least recommendation that it was in conformity with the laws of God. It was supported by the Labor organizations. There were in the House Roman Catholics who, he believed, did not look upon the bill with much favor, and he asked them to listen to a deliverance made by Pope Leo XIII, in which His Holiness deplored what he said was a fatal tendency to treat the Lord's Day with contempt and that the observance of the Sabbath as imperative. He also quoted from letters written by Cardinal Taschereau and Archbishop Fabre, to the same effect and utterances by a number of American prelates who denounced picnics, excursions and receptions on the Lord's Day. All these declarations bore out his contention that legislation of the character of the bill before the House was necessary.

LABOR ORGANIZATIONS QUOTED.

"This legislation Mr. Charlton said had been petitioned for by labor organizations and he referred to resolutions passed by union labor bodies praying for the cessation of work on railway and other large systems of a public nature. It had been urged against the bill that if its provisions were for municipal control, but municipalities he said could not control railways, post-offices, carriers, canals, and such systems, some of the matters referred to

in the bill might be dealt with by the provinces, but except the first six provisions dealing with games, racing, buying and selling, fishing and hunting, the matters dealt with could not be controlled by the provinces or by municipalities. The seventh clause he explained made it a misdemeanor to publish a newspaper on Sunday. The eighth declared that no canal belonging to Canada should be open on Sunday except that the provision may be set aside by Order-in-Council after the first day of November in each year. The experience in London, the greatest city in the world, was evidence of the practicality of section nine which says that no post-office in Canada shall be open for delivery of letters or the transaction of business other than the reception of mails on the Lord's Day.

THE MOST IMPORTANT CLAUSE.

was the 10th, which prohibits traffic on railways in Canada, (save in the case of perishable goods) on the Lord's Day. Except one mail train each way, and one milk train on each road. Some sympathizers with the promoter of the bill might think that with respect to the railways the provision did not go far enough, but he thought the serious interests of the through traffic and perishable merchandise ought to be considered. The bill went as far toward the minimizing railway operations on the railway as he believed it was judicious that it should. In support of his argument that as far as the clause went it was practicable for Sabbath observance to be carried, he quoted the opinion of a number of railway magistrates and authorities on commercial traffic. In conclusion, Mr. Charlton declared that a weekly day of rest was a natural need and a natural right of man. The celebrated Humboldt had said it was a natural law, but it was both a natural law and a natural need. Further it should be protected by law. This was necessary to secure its uniform observance. His fourth and last proposition was that two exceptions should be made in regard to the operation of the law, one relating to works of necessity and the other to works of mercy. The provisions of the bill were in accordance with Divine law and would be to the advantage of the State. It commended itself to the good sense of the people, inasmuch as it struck the bonds and shackles of the limbs of the laborer, who had no other means of asserting his right to the day of rest. It would promote the advantage of the employer of labor because after his day of rest the laborer was in a far better condition to resume his work on the Monday morning. It was likewise a blessing to all, even to those that cursed the bill. There was no person in the country that would not be benefited by a Sunday Observance Bill. (Applause.)

SIR JOHN THOMPSON.

commended the objects of the Bill. There would be no difference of opinion as to the proposition that the law of the state should enforce the observance of a day of rest. While expressing himself wholly in sympathy with the provisions of the measure Sir John went on to say that it was a subject of which he had not the least desire to discuss fully and personally. It was within the province of Provincial Legislatures to say how far the enactments in this subject were sufficiently severe, how much their severity should be increased from time to time. He thought the honorable gentleman were fully cognizant of this fact when he intimated that the first half dozen clauses might perhaps be unnecessary. The first point to be considered was whether it was not desired, having regard to the fact that this had been the subject of diverse enactments on the different Provinces they should consider these enactments, should consider whether it was not better as regards the general question of Sunday observance to leave it as it was now in the hands of Provincial Legislatures. Provincial Legislatures were better able to say how far the general observance should be strengthened or relaxed. He proposed that the opinion of the House on this subject should not be tested by a division, but that the House should agree to refer the bill after the second reading to a select committee to consider, first, the provisions of the bill in regard to Sunday observance, and next to inquire how far they had been already met by the Provincial Legislatures. Outside this question of the jurisdiction of Provincial Legislatures there were one or two other matters upon which Sir John had a few words to say, one was the subject of publishing newspapers on Sunday, which he claimed could be regulated by provincial enactment. Then there was the clause relating to fishing and hunting, and here the Minister assumed a playful vein, but his humor was evidently not obvious to all, for only a few members smiled as he observed that the bill not only intended to punish those who caught fish on Sunday, but also those who go fishing, a distinction that many a disappointed angler will be ready to admit the force of. He thought there were cases where hardship would be inflicted if people were prevented from catching fish from Saturday till Monday. Then he objected to the discrimination proposed between the American and Canadian freight trains. American trains could bring freight into Canada, but trains could not carry freight to the American border. He hoped the House would agree to the second reading of the bill in order that it might be referred to a select committee. (Applause.)

AFTER BUSINESS.

Sir John Thompson moved the reference of the bill to a special committee consisting of the Hon. Messrs. Chabreau, G. A. Kirkpatrick, Charlton, Weldon, Mills (Bothwell), Coatsworth, Davies, Gillies, Beauséjour, Mara and Christie.

ONE MAN, ONE VOTE.

Mr. Edgar moved the second reading of his bill to amend the Electoral Franchise Act. The object of his bill, he said, was to adopt into the Dominion Franchise Act the principle of one man, one vote, and that the voter must be a resident within the electoral district in which he claimed to be registered. Mr. Edgar and the Opposition made a strong fight for the adoption of the bill. The member for West Ontario argued against the objection to the adoption of the principle of the bill that property would not be sufficiently represented. He contended that Parliament had ceased to recognize the right of property to representation. Property qualification, he said, was not required of members of the House of Commons. Property would always have a full weight in the representation of the country. Mr. Edgar argued, and it was the brains, the blood and the flesh, and opinions, and not the clods of earth, the piles of brick and mortar which should be represented. In Ontario one man, one vote was the law.

REPRESENTATION OF PROPERTY.

Sir John Thompson made his first facetious remark of the session, after the Speaker had put Mr. Edgar's motion for the second reading of the bill. Mr. Speaker asked, "Shall the motion be adopted?" and Sir John, with a smile as he arose to his feet, replied, "I do not think it will, but, in case it should, I want to say a word on the proper side." Sir John went on to say that for the prevention of the bringing in of voters from a foreign country he would rather vote for the bill introduced by the hon. member for Brockville (Mr. Wood), which was not complicated by the question of the qualification for voting. He did not agree with Mr. Edgar's contention that the Franchise Act did not recognize a property qualification. In his opinion property was the

basis of representation under the present franchise. He did not agree that only brains, and not property, should be represented. He moved the six months' hoist.

Mr. Mills, of Bothwell, replied to the objection made by Sir John Thompson that the bill was unnecessary, and ought not to have been proposed because the abolition of the Franchise Act as proposed by Mr. M. C. Cameron, had been disposed of by the House. The measure by Mr. Cameron, Mr. Mills said, was radically different from the present bill. Mr. Cameron's bill proposed to change the sphere of legislation while the present measure proposed that as the House had decided on the continuance of the administration of the Franchise by the Dominion, therefore the principle of one man one vote should be adopted in it. Mr. Mills claimed that the bill of Mr. Woods of Brockville did not cover the principle in Mr. Edgar's. If, as the Minister of Justice said, property was recognized in voting then the man with \$10,000 should have more votes than the man with only \$5,000. Mr. Mills argued, too, that additional votes were not necessary to give a man of property and intelligence due weight in society. If a man had a right to a vote in more than one constituency Mr. Mills proceeded, then simultaneous voting was wrong because it interfered with the exercise of the right. Another strong reason for the adoption of the principle of the bill was that it would conduce to the purity of elections, because he held that the right to vote in more than one district was an evil and led to corruption. After further debate the House divided on the amendment giving the bill the six months' hoist with the following result: 109 yeas and 71 nays. The supplementary estimates were laid on the table.

CONGREGATIONAL WOMAN'S BOARD.

THE ANNUAL MEETING IN TORONTO. (Special Correspondence of the Witness.)

Toronto, June 4.—The fifth annual meeting of the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions opened on Wednesday morning at the Northern Congregational Church with a prayer meeting, led by Mrs. Wickson of Toronto. Three forms of Christian consecration were specially emphasized; a consecrated Christian life at home, a consecrated life exemplified in church and social duties, of labor because after his day of rest the laborer was in a far better condition to resume his work on the Monday morning. It was likewise a blessing to all, even to those that cursed the bill. There was no person in the country that would not be benefited by a Sunday Observance Bill. (Applause.)

In the afternoon, Mrs. (Rev.) George Robertson, of Toronto, extended a graceful and cordial welcome to the visiting delegates. Mrs. Powter, of Montreal, appropriately replied. The President's address by Mrs. Macaulay, strongly urged the importance of educating the children to love missionary work, gave a brief review of the blessings of the year and missionary progress in general, suggesting that the recent action of the London Missionary Society in admitting ladies to its management is largely due to the well known capacity of women for raising money. Formal greetings were presented as follows: Presbyterian Board, Mrs. G. H. Robinson; Baptist Board, Mrs. John Firstbrook; Methodist Board, Mrs. Dr. Willmott; Undenominational Board of Montreal, Mrs. C. T. Williams; Montreal; Toronto District W.C.T.U., Mrs. D. Cowan; also from the Board of the Interior, Chicago. The report of Miss Wood, corresponding secretary, reported 71 Societies and Mission Homes, with 1,000 members. This, however, includes only one-fourth of the reported female membership of Congregational Churches in Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba, and the other three-fourths were earnestly invited to join in our work. The Treasurer's report showed the payment of \$2,326.96, and the following balance:—General fund, \$370.89; Currie fund, \$406.76. Mrs. R. W. Cowan gave the Foreign Secretary's report, Miss Ashdown that of the Literature Department, and Miss Rawlings that of "Organization" for Ontario. Mrs. Moodie, of Montreal, read an excellently written paper on "Woman's Boards," after which the first day's work was brought to a close by the benediction by the Rev. G. Robertson, of Toronto.

NEW TEMPERANCE HALL.

(Special to the Witness.)

QUEBEC, Que., June 3.—The new temperance hall was formally opened here to-night by a public council. The building of this hall by the Royal Templars and their friends marks an important event in the history of temperance in Quebec and county. This enterprising village was four years ago but part of a forest. It is now the centre of a large lumber trade. Messrs. Church, Mitchell & Fee have three saw-mills running, giving employment to a large number. This firm generously donated the lumber for the new hall, also the ground on which it is built. To-night's entertainment consisted of two temperance dramas, "Ralph Coleman's reformation" and "The poisoned negro." The principal parts were taken by Mr. Patrick, Mrs. Patrick, Master Lester Patrick, Mr. Keenan, Mr. W. J. Noble, Mr. Geo. Church, Miss Bothwell and Mr. David Mitchell.

Instrumental music was rendered by the Misses Moison and Miss Pilon, a solo by Miss Lyster, a vocal trio by Messrs. Malcolm Miller, Wm. Tees and Peter Bellevue.

Mr. J. H. Carson, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, was present, and which he congratulated the Royal Templars on their success. He expressed the hope that they would be earnest and persistent in their work, and especially did he urge upon them the necessity of a rigid enforcement of the Scott Act in their country. The act was the best law we had yet, but it must be enforced to be effective. He urged all present to join "Woodland" Council.

Mr. J. H. Carson also gave a good practical address. The Rev. Mr. Scott of Drummondville was present.

THE ANCIENT CAPITAL.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

QUEBEC, June 4.—There was a sharp frost throughout the surrounding country here last night.

Mr. W. Wainwright, of the Grand Trunk, came to Quebec this morning, accompanying his wife, who has sailed for England.

A number of the leading lawyers of this city, including the Hon. Geo. Irvine and Messrs. A. Cook and Gus Stuart, Q.C., are reported down with the grippe.

Measles are reported to be very rife among the children of this city at present, and a report received this afternoon from the Magdalen Islands states that an alarming epidemic of grippe is prevailing there, that hundreds are suffering from the disease, and that all the lobster factories have had to be closed for want of hands to work them.

Several members of the English nobility are expected to visit Canada this summer, among others Lord and Lady Brassey, who will be the guests of Mr. R. R. Dobell, at Beauvoir, here next month.

The population of St. John's Saburbs are said to be somewhat excited over a prediction that some terrible calamity in the shape of another great conflagration will occur, because there was no public procession of the host in that quarter of the city this year. The prediction seems to be based on the fact that there was no procession the year of the last great conflagration, which swept St. John's suburbs.

The contract for a new chime of bells weighing respectively 2,500, 2,000 and 1,500 lbs. for the Basilica, has been awarded to a manufacturer in France.

A street car conductor here took an action of damages lately against a party for charging him with defrauding the Company, and before the defendant could get a settlement, he had to publicly apologize, admit the falseness of his charge and pay all the costs.

A freight train on the Intercolonial ran off the track yesterday near St. Anaclet station, and came very nearly wrecking the whole building.

In the case of Dame M. H. Courcelles, for separation from her husband, Captain Kane, motion was made on behalf of the latter in the Superior Court here to-day, that his wife be adjudged to pay him a rent or pension of \$200 monthly during the pendency of the case, plus \$500 to help him to pay the costs of his defence.

This morning, considerable interest was manifested in the Circuit Court in connection with a suit against Mr. Gerard Macquet, the Provincial Government's iron bridge engineer, to recover \$75, the amount of a doctor's bill for attendance on Mrs. Dennis Hudson, who was knocked down and injured last winter by Mr. Macquet's runaway horses while driving with the Tandem Club. Mr. Macquet resisted payment on the ground that the bill was excessive, and offered \$30 in payment. A large number of local physicians were in Court to prove the reasonableness of the charges.

QUEBEC, June 5.—The Provincial Police returned to town yesterday with a prisoner, arrested at Deschambault for church robberies. He is accused of having committed a large number, nine of which he admits, in as many different churches. He gives his name as Eugene Lambert, shoemaker, and is a native of Quebec, but for fourteen years is a resident of Montreal. He also admits having taken \$314 out of the pockets of a man named Barte and a watch from on board the steamer "Jacques Cartier." The man, who has been lodged in gaol, is apparently deranged.

Five young men who concealed themselves on the SS. "Oregon," at Montreal, to get a passage as stowaways to Europe, were discovered on the way down by officers of the ship, and were landed here yesterday. The boatman who brought them ashore says that he recognized one of them as a strong believer in cheap travel, as he had previously landed him from five different steamers under similar circumstances.

The barque "G. M. Cairns," bound for this port, which was abandoned at sea, water-logged, a few days ago, was set on fire by the crew before they left her. They were picked up by a German steamer, and were landed at Philadelphia.

THE MAISONNEUVE MONUMENT.

The Maisonneuve celebration committee held an adjourned meeting in the Mayor's parlour yesterday afternoon, Judge Baby in the chair. Mr. R. Bellemare, elected corresponding secretary at the previous meeting, regretted that business engagements would render it impossible to fill the position, and Messrs. Lucien Huot and W. D. Lighthall were elected in his stead.

It was resolved to add the names of the following gentlemen to the committee: Messrs. John Crawford, J. H. Joseph, J. H. R. Molson, Hugh Paton, Charles Alexander, Adam Skille, A. Bonin, Alphonse David, G. Coffin, Claude Leprohon, L. N. Dumouchel, George R. Desbarres, Charles Phillips, Edgar Judge, D. A. P. Watt, Joseph E. Fortier, J. B. Allan, Alphonse Leclaire, W. Thomas, W. Drysdale, W. George Beers and J. R. Dougall, with power to add others.

The meeting adjourned until this afternoon.

FINANCIAL.

There is no change in the rates of money or sterling exchange. Calls loans are made at 4½ to 5 percent and good commercial paper is discounted at 6 to 7 percent as to name and date. Round amounts of 90 day bills between banks are quoted at 109½ to 109½ and of demand bills at 109½ to 109 13/16. Drafts on New York are drawn at 1-16 premium.

The market for sterling exchange is dull, and rates are about the same as yesterday.

The stock market remains dull, especially for bank stocks, which are hardly dealt in, and prices of which remain almost stationary. The feature of the market

was the strength of Canadian Pacific Railway stock which advanced $\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 percent in spite of considerable offerings at the morning board, and over 700 shares were sold during the first session. Other stocks remain dull.
