—The Lancers and the Guards have received orders to embark for Ireland, as a precautionary measure only, for the authorities assert that the disturbance is at an end.

—The despotism of Russia has once more asserted itself. An Imperial decree has been issued closing and dissolving the provincial estates on the ground that they have adopted an attitude opposed to the laws and hostile to the Government.

—It is reported that Narvaez intends to suppress the present Senate in Spain by Royal decree, and to replace it by an hereditary one, composed exclusively of the high aristocracy, with perhaps some additions from large landholders and great capitalists.

—Experiments made in Dublin on the Greek fire recently found by the police in that city, establish the fact that it is a similar substance, and equally destructive, as the composition seized by the Liverpool authorities in the recent raid against some suspected Fenians.

—The prisoner brought to Washington on the "Swatara" positively denies that he is John H. Surratt.

—The editor of the *Discussion*, of Madrid, has just been sentenced to death for articles which he had published.

—By the death of Cardinal Villeneuve there are now 14 Cardinals' hats disposable.

—The town of Portsmouth gave a dinner to Lord Monck on the 30th of January, at which Lord Monck was represented by the Hon. Messrs. Cartier, Langevin, Chauveau, Ryan, McDougall, McDonald, Rose, and Howland; also Mrs. Rose, Mrs. Galt, and Mrs. McDougall. There were about 300 guests, among whom was Vice-Admiral Sir Rodney Munday, the new commandant of the North American Station.

—Mr. Lemoine has translated Mr. Chiquin's letter to the children of the Duke of Sabatier, Montreal, which appeared in the *Witness*, and is getting it inserted in the leading French Canadian papers, in order to strengthen his appeal on behalf of his pious lottery. We do not know how the Bishop who indorsed his gift concert will like this episode of the business.

—There is reason to believe that the names given by the "effeminate" young men engaged in the infamous affair which was broken up by the police on Monday night were false names, and that the parties really occupy a much higher position than that assumed. It is to be desired that the real names should transpire, and also those of the male part of the company, or the part dressed in men's clothes, in order that they might all be shunned as they ought.

—We have another letter from "Exeter Hall" with reference to some criticisms which, it seems, were published somewhere on his former letter, and which criticisms, we infer from his reply, amounted to an exhibition of spleen against the temperance cause. We are not aware that "Exeter Hall" has anything to do with that cause; but abuse of it is a most natural resort for the defenders of such theatricals as he very judiciously condemned.

—A letter from Three Rivers to the *Journal de Quebec* says: "The nomination of Bishop Lafite as Coadjutor of Three Rivers, and his acceptance, have been cause of rejoicing to all the inhabitants of the diocese, and the day of his consecration will be a great fête. A special train will leave the Arthabaska station on Sunday, at 3 p.m., to bring the curés of the Eastern Townships and all who arrive at Arthabaska on Saturday night and Sunday. This is a great favor obtained from Messieurs the Directors of the Grand Trunk; but if there is a storm, this train may be too late for the consecration."

—The *Minerve's* letter from Paris, dated 30th Jan., says: "It is high time Mr. Taché were in Paris. Several commissioners are already at their post, and the classification of articles will begin soon. An immense number of visitors is expected, not less, probably, than three millions during the exposition. (Should each on the average spend \$50 in France, which would be a small estimate, that country will receive during the season \$150,000,000, of which probably a third will be profit.)"

—CONFEDERATION AS GOOD AS CARRIED.—A despatch from London, received at two o'clock this morning, informs us that the Confederation bill has been read twice in the British Parliament. The third reading will probably take place very soon.

—The plan of Confederation is, perhaps, even at this present writing, adopted in England; for the latest papers show that it will be pushed through rapidly, all parties being united in its favor.—*Minerve*, this morning.

—THE CONFERENCE BETWEEN LEADING CLERGYMEN OF LONDON AND WORKINGMEN.—The papers received on Monday bring full accounts of this Conference, from which it appears that the chief cause of the alienation of the workingmen from the ministry of the gospel and the churches of all denominations is simply class feeling. There is a deep and bitter sense of injustice on the part of the workingmen, on account of a long continuance of class legislation and their entire exclusion from the franchise, and on account of the real, or supposed, selfishness and oppression of their employers. This feeling makes them hate not only the middle-classes, but the churches they frequent. They think those churches are intended for persons in comfortable circumstances; and if workingmen who cannot pay pew-rents attend them, they are thrust into the seats for the poor, in the worst parts of the church. Their pride is thus hurt, and they prefer to keep away. They also think that the ministers of religion side with the upper and middle classes, against the workingmen,

and they, therefore, want none of their ministrations. It is well these points have been formally brought out, and it now remains for British Christianity to apply the remedy by first, giving the workingmen their political rights fairly and freely; and, second, by making their places of worship free to rich and poor alike.

—GRAND TRUNK MODEL.—An object, interesting at once for that which, in miniature, it represents, for beauty of execution, and also its own honorable distinction, will be exhibited to-day in the Mechanics' Hall. We allude to the model of a sleeping-car of the Grand Trunk Railway, intended for the Paris Exhibition, and designed by Mr. Eaton, of the locomotive department. It is 1-16th of the full size, and composed mostly of maple. The roof is hinged, and when open allows to be seen the interior, showing a perfect model of the fitting and arrangement of the new sleeping-cars. Along one side are to be seen the car as it appears by day, while the other side shows the beds down for the night.

There are the warming and ventilating contrivances, the dressing and washing rooms, in fine, a diminished total, external and internal, of what may be looked upon as the ideal of a perfect sleeping-car. It is placed upon two trucks, each of six wheels, the extra number of wheels (now being adopted on the line) equalizing the pressure and increasing the steadiness. The whole is mounted upon what is meant to represent an embankment. This portion is in walnut, and contrasts pleasantly in color with the carriage. One of the faces of this embankment is ornamented with very delicate carving in maple, representing, in the middle, the Victoria Bridge, the river, with rafts upon it, and even the distant hills. On one side of this is the American shield, with the Stars and Stripes, crossed; and on the other the crossed Union Jack, with the emblems of Canada. The whole has been executed at the works at Point St. Charles, and by workmen in the permanent employ of the Company. It certainly shows that they possess amongst them the same ability for delicate manipulation and taste, which they have long been acknowledged to possess for producing work combining strength, elegance, and convenience. We trust this model will be numerous visited during the very brief exhibition.

A PARK?—We hear nothing now of a project for a park on the side of the mountain. The following from the late report of the New York Central Park Commissioners may, by showing the collateral advantages of such an undertaking, do something towards stirring up the idea in the minds of those with whom may chiefly lie the first taking in hand of such an enterprise. The total cost of the land and improvement of the Central Park of New York up to the present, has been ten million dollars. But the surrounding neighborhood has increased in value more than five-fold, and the consequent increased revenue raised in assessments is almost twice as much as the annual interest on the park with all its improvements. There seems to be no reason why a proportionate success should not follow the laying out of a suitable site for a similar purpose in the neighborhood of Montreal, as has followed the forming of the now famous Central Park of New York.

—LOWER CANADA LAW JOURNAL.—We have received the February number of this journal. It contains its usual amount of important treatises, both English and Canadian, also recent English decisions. We subjoin the following from amongst the "Equity Cases"; since they may be as applicable in Montreal as in London: *Immoral Purpose*.—A lease of a house which, to his knowledge, had for many years been used as a brothel, assigned the lease absolutely, knowing that the assignee intended to use the house for the same purpose. The lessee having been compelled to pay for dilapidations at the end of the lease, sought to recover the amount from the estate of the assignee, which was being administered—*Held*, that the assignment, and everything arising out of it, was so tainted with the immoral purpose, that the plaintiff could not recover.

—*Contract void for Immorality*.—One who makes a contract for sale or hire, with the knowledge that the other contracting party intends to apply the subject-matter of the contract to an immoral purpose, cannot recover upon the contract; it is not necessary that he should expect to be paid out of the proceeds of the immoral act. The defendant, a prostitute, was sued by the plaintiffs, coach-builders, for the hire of a brougham. There was no evidence that the plaintiffs looked expressly to the proceeds of the defendant's prostitution for payment. The jury found that the plaintiffs knew her to be a prostitute, and that they supplied the brougham with a knowledge that it would be, as in fact it was, used by her as part of her display to attract men.—*Held*, that the contract could not recover.

—*PEAT FUEL*, mode of manufacture and machinery used in Hodge's patent process; pp. 23, with three engravings. This little pamphlet explains the results of experiments extending over three years, with an account of the machinery used in the most perfect process of cutting and drying peat, &c.

—CANADIAN POSTAL GUIDE FOR 1867 AND 1868.—Mr. Dewe, the post-office inspector, has just brought out this useful work. It contains an abstract of the last census, an exchange table, a description of the practical working of the Canadian postal system, the laws and regulations in relation to the rates of postage, every information in regard to bill-remittance and money orders, a complete list of all the post-offices in Canada, together with a table of the railways, with the distances between each station, and an appropriate map. The work is very creditable to Mr. Dewe's enterprise, and cannot fail to be very useful.

—QUICK NEWS.—Ed. By last California mails, I have papers from Gold Hill, Nevada Territory dated 12th January. These papers contain news from Rome, by Atlantic telegraph, dated the same month. As Gold Hill, N. T., is three hundred miles from San Francisco, I think you will join with me in saying that this is worthy of notice.—CONSTANT READER.

—SABREVOIS MISSION. (To the Editor of the *Witness*.) DEAR SIR,—Will you kindly give an early insertion to a short appeal on behalf of the Sabrevois mission to the French Canadians? The schools are growing in number and usefulness, and their good influence is evident and encouraging. But we are much hampered just now from want of a sufficient supply of many common articles of household furniture. The funds of the Society are at present at too low an ebb to furnish them.

Being, bed-covering, cast-off or new clothing, dry-goods of a plain, substantial kind, pieces of all kinds for quilts, or groceries, would be thankfully received. Although the pupils are required to clothe themselves, there are always some of them very destitute, who need help to do so, and anything

that friends send us with this view will be acceptable.

Mrs. Aylwin, 34 Notre Dame street; Mrs. McLeod, 17 Berrill street; and Mrs. Tate, 6 Wellington street, all of whom are members of the Montreal Ladies' Association, have kindly undertaken to receive and forward contributions.

### POINT ST. CHARLES CHRISTIAN TOTAL SOCIETY.

On Wednesday evening last, according to announcement, our second public temperance meeting was held in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, the room again being well filled; the Rev. Geo. Douglas in the chair.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises; after which a draft of the constitution prepared by the Committee appointed at the first meeting was submitted to the members and adopted.

The officers of the Society for the present year were then elected, consisting of the following gentlemen: viz.—Daniel Hadley, Esq., President; Mr. M. Darwent, Esq., Vice-President; Mr. T. Akin, Secretary, and George Alderson, Esq., Treasurer. The Committee appointed are Messrs. James Black, sen.; John Newmarch, Richard Hayden, Hugh Montgomery, and Henry Hadley.

A hymn was then sung by Mr. Beard, followed by Mr. Holloway, of the Rifle Brigade, with an interesting address, in which he related some of his experience in Malta and Gibraltar before he became a teetotaler, and gave some of the curious names by which the liquors they drank were called; such as steel-filing, fixed bayonets, &c. Since he signed the pledge, he was a happy man, and he trusted in God for strength, by which alone he could stand, to keep that pledge inviolate to his end. Then followed another military brother in something of the same strain.

Mr. James Black, of the Grand Trunk, gave a lively and telling speech. He had been accustomed, with many of his shipmates, to spend his evenings in the drinking-places at the Point; while his almost heart-broken Ellen passed the weary hours at home, waiting for his return. He was paying a liquor-bill one night out of his wife's wages, and he could inform them that his family was one penny. He began to think what a fool he had been, and resolved that he would never spend another farthing for liquor. He still kept the penny as a reminder of his folly and reformation. Since he became a teetotaler, he had also become a Christian; and while he was sometimes told that his face had become very long, he could inform them that his purse had also increased considerably in length, and he could now show papers which represented over \$100 in the Mechanics' Bank, saved out of the past year's earnings, which before went into the tavern-keeper's till. Before closing, he made an earnest and urgent appeal to all present, and especially to church members, to become teetotalers; reminding them that those who did not give their influence in favor of this cause were against it. A temperance hymn was then sung by Mr. Beard, and Wm. Clendenning, Esq., made a few remarks, showing the effects of drink on many with whom he was acquainted, both in a mental, physical, and financial point of view. Rev. G. Douglas, in a short address, referred to the fact that an enormous amount of money spent in England on intoxicating drink, and the awful suffering and degradation resulting therefrom. The pledge then being read by the Secretary, Mr. Francis was called upon to address the meeting, which he did in his usual lively way, and while so doing, twenty-five persons came forward and signed the pledge. The singing of the hymn, and the benediction pronounced, and the friends of temperance separated, feeling that there was something bright in the future for Point St. Charles. THOMAS AKIN, Secretary.

### MEETING OF THE MONTREAL TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

The first of an intended series of monthly temperance meetings was held last night in the Mechanics' Hall.

In the absence of Dr. Taylor, President of the Society, the first Vice-President occupied the chair, and, in explaining the object of the meeting, noticed with sorrow the smallness of the attendance. The committee could only work so far as seconded by the public, and especially the religious public. They wished to reach the youth of the city with the same arguments for this cause as the young men of a former generation, but the youth were not here. Some doubted the depravity of the human heart; but upon what other principle could it be explained that this hall would be crowded to its utmost capacity if a woman indecently dressed were dancing on that stage, but a meeting called like this to promote whatever things were pure and lovely, and of good report, was so thinly attended? The greatness of the evil that we oppose was acknowledged by all, and the desirableness of some effectual remedy was generally felt; but when a remedy perfectly safe, pleasant, and effectual, was proposed by those who could speak from experience, how few seemed to take the interest. The speaker then took up the first topic of the evening, "Deeds, not words," and showed that whilst the middle course, and half-and-between character, were most admired by men, they were not approved of God. In all the teachings of Scripture, decision was inculcated; and a man was required to be wholly and uncompromisingly on one side, and that the right side.

The Rev. Mr. GUNDY, secretary of the Society, portrayed forcibly the social and moral effects of drinking, giving a series of vivid descriptions of the intemperate man's career and its effects upon himself, his family, and society. These he contrasted with the safe and happy course of those who abstained from this great cause of temptation and ruin, and who added to temperance piety.

The Rev. Mr. McKILLICAN gave a number of thrilling instances from his own extended personal observation of the effects of strong drink. He had heard a minister recommend from the pulpit the use of liquor in what he called moderation, to which, however, he set liberal bounds; and he knew individuals who went home intoxicated after that sermon. He went to his native land, was deposed from the ministry, and obtained a wide and painful notoriety. But the very pulpits in Upper Canada which, thirty years ago, were filled with opposition to the temperance cause, were now filled with earnest, consistent advocates of it. He knew a settlement where at that time every second farm was said to be mortgaged to the rum-seller, and where all was going to decay through drink; but where now there was not a drop of liquor to be obtained, and everything was peaceful and prosperous. The great difficulty at present is the drinking usages among what are called the respectable classes. He had known several instances of clever men who had worked their way up to those classes, and who there learned to look down upon the temperance principles of their youth and to drink genteelly; the consequence of which was that they fell into intemperate habits, and were reduced to ruin. It was the poorer classes, as they were called, who were setting an example of drinking to their sons and to society, doing the most to hinder the temperance reformation, and he (Mr. McKILLICAN) wished we could reach them, but too often they would not come to temperance meetings, or read temperance documents.

The Chairman asked if it would not be well for the Temperance Society to have the temperance cause, in order to know their objections to it, and try to remove them, and also to ascertain

the arguments and reasons which lead them to set the example of using those intoxicating drinks which prove so baneful to society.

This idea Mr. Gundy highly approved in a brief and pointed address. Mr. HUGHES, of Cote St. Paul, said it was difficult to get those who were opposed to the temperance cause to define their objections.—An influential individual at a meeting in Farnham had stated at a temperance meeting that he wished the cause well, but he had private reasons for not joining it himself. And, whether private reasons were in the cupboard with a cork in them. He believed in the religion which was worn, not only on Sunday, but through the week; and which guided all a man's conduct and actions, but he had not much faith in that kind which was leading men by precept and example to ruin both body and soul with strong drink.

During the meeting the audience gradually increased till it became respectable in point of numbers, and the deepest interest was manifested throughout. First of the beautiful new hymns, which are so highly appreciated, were sung in an admirable manner in the course of the evening by the Rev. Mr. McKILLICAN and Mr. Craig, the audience joining in chorus; and at the close sixteen names were added to the pledge, among whom were two instances of husband and wife signing together. The collection taken up proved to be chiefly in silver, with one four-dollar bill in it, and amounted to \$11.

From the interest exhibited on this occasion, it is hoped the next monthly meeting will fill the hall.

### CITY ITEMS.

—The annual meeting of Knox Church Missionary Society will take place this (Wednesday) evening at half-past seven o'clock. Reports will be submitted, and addresses delivered by several clergymen and laymen. A collection will be taken up on behalf of the funds of the Society.

—The roads around the city are stated to be in a dangerous state, large patches of glare ice, and many accidents therefrom are said to have occurred.

—There was a numerous turnout of the Montreal Driving Club yesterday afternoon.

—A detachment of the Victoria Rifles intended to carry out, on Saturday, their hitherto delayed idea of a march to Chambly on snow-shoes.

MARCH OUT.—Yesterday afternoon the Grand Trunk Railway Regiment of volunteers marched out from Point St. Charles, having with them their brass band, which then made its first appearance. Having marched to Bonaventure street station, the main body was joined by three companies of artillery. The brigade then marched along Bonaventure, Great St. James, and Notre Dame streets to St. Denis street. The main guard of the regulars then turned out and saluted them, after which the column marched along Sherbrooke street, and down Mountain to Point St. Charles, arriving at the armory there at about five o'clock.

FIRE.—At about half-past eleven o'clock last night a fire broke out in a storey wooden house, occupied as a grocery store, on the corner of St. Charles Baronne and St. Catherine streets. The tenant was absent, and the place would seem to have been set on fire in three different places in the attic. A good deal of damage was done.

RAN AWAY.—Yesterday afternoon a runaway horse and sleigh went, at a rapid pace, up St. Urbain street, and, turning along Dorchester street, came into collision with a lamp-post, and knocked it down.

LECTURE ON WINTER VENTILATION.—A very interesting and instructive lecture was delivered last Tuesday evening in the Mission Chapel, Chabotter Square, by Dr. P. P. Carpenter, on "Winter Ventilation." This subject is one of great importance to all classes, but especially to the poor and the working-classes, residing in the suburban districts of the city, who, preferring warmth to pure air, pay very little attention to the ventilation of their houses, consequently all suffer more or less, but especially the mother and younger children who are necessarily confined most to the house. It is hoped that the more attention will be given to this important subject, affecting as it does the health and well-being of the people.

WESLEYAN PARSONAGE FUND CONCERT.—The concert given last night in the large school-room of the Wesleyan Church, by the choir, for the benefit of the Parsonage Fund, was largely attended, the room being filled. The programme was selected from Mozart, Costa, Handel, Haydn, Gounod, Spohr, and Beethoven; and under the able leadership of Mr. Thornton, its various pieces were rendered with great effect. The Air, "I dreamt I was in Heaven," was very sweetly given by Master Bailey. The Air, soprano—"Let the Bright Seraphim," is a most difficult piece, and sung by Miss Arnold, received an encore. The duett and chorus—"I waited for the Lord," sung by Miss Arnold and Miss Parlow, was well rendered; and the solo and chorus—"As Pants the Hart," was sung by Mrs. Walsh, late Miss Heavyside, with an artistic taste, fine feeling, and modulated expression that called forth a rapturous encore. The chorus of the evening was undoubtedly the "Gloria in Excelsis" of Gounod; and was sung in a high degree. The concert was concluded at a little before ten o'clock, and was undoubtedly one of the most pleasant and successful of the season. The object for which it was given cannot fail to have been attained; and the choir of this church may well be congratulated on the fact of its being able to give a concert with a programme so excellent, and in its execution sustained with a credit amounting to honor.

A FORTUNATE ACCIDENT.—An unfortunate accident happened on Monday night on the hill near Mr. Edsall's house, by which a young gentleman had his right leg broken above the knee. This bill is used for tobogganing, and the tobogganist having to "bring up" against a fence, it is a wonder more accidents have not occurred. On Monday night the hill was one mass of clear crystal ice, making it impossible for the helmsman to steer their sleighs, and upsets and strikes against the fence were the rule. A party of four started, and the weight of so many on the clear ice accelerated the speed of the sleigh, which went at a lightning rate under no control. The young man in front incautiously extended his right leg at full length in front of the toboggan to ease the jolt against the fence, and the speed was too great, and a severe fracture of the femur bone of the thigh of the right leg occurred.—*News*.
