A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS on the twenty-first day of March, which was in the year of our Lord Christ, one thousand eight hundred and eleven, a Bill passed by the Legislative Council, and by the House of Assembly of the said Province of Lower Canada, was presented for His Majesty's assent, unto His Excellency Sir James Henry Craig, then Governor in Chief of the said Province, which said Bill is intitled, "An Act for erecting a Common Gaol with its dependencies in the District of Three-Rivers, and to provide the means for defraying the expenses thereof."—And Whereas the said Bill being so presented as aforesaid, there was by His Excellency Sir James Henry Craig, reserved for the signification of His Majesty's pleasure thereon.—And Whereas on the eighteenth day of December now last past, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to declare His Royal Highness's approbation of the said Bill; and pursuant to His Royal Highness's pleasure, thereupon expressed, the said Bill then was confirmed, finally enacted and ratified accordingly. Therefore according to the Statute in such case made and provided, by this Proclamation, I do signify and make known to all His Majesty's subjects, and to all other persons whom it may concern, that the said Bill hath been laid before His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; and that His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, has been pleased in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to assent to the same. Wherefore all Judges, Justices, and other Officers and persons whom it may concern, are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Arms, at the Castle of St. Lewis, in the City of Quebec, this Sixth Day of May, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Twelve, and in the Fifty-second year of His Majesty's Reign.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, February 10.

In the Debate on the vote of thanks to Lord Wellington General Tarleton said, that he could not avoid submitting a few observations, which would readily flow from his heart and his tongue. He believed that he was the oldest general officer then present; and that he was addressing himself to many military men. He could not, therefore, avoid expressing the satisfaction he felt at an exploit so brilliant and so honourable to the British arms. He believed, that he might defy any nation to produce a more steady and more successful, or a more gallant and more successful, than that which was the result of the efforts of the columns was not thereby relaxed in any manner. Three hundred and forty men were waiting for a fourth hope, and no less than 700 hundred volunteered from two regiments in a quarter of an hour. (Hear! Hear!) He did not think the page of history could show a more brilliant military exploit; and he thought that no eloquence would be sufficient to add a chaplet to the monument of glory raised by our gallant country men on the rampart of Ciudad Rodrigo.

Feb. 12.—The Army Estimates for the present year laid before the House of Commons are for 37,434 men, and deducting the 28,161 for the regiments in the territories of the East India Company, there remain 9,273 to be provided for by Parliament. The expenses for this force, and other disbursements of the Military Department, amount to 15,893,021. 3s. 9d. The number of embodied Militia is 93,212. The expense for the Local Militia is 720,078l.

MARCH.—The Subalterns of the Army are, at length, rescued from what they detested Sir D—'s Badge, and are to wear the same epaulettes as before, under the following order:—The epaulettes and wings of all Regimental Officers, in future, to be the same, without any other distinction than what was prescribed by the General Order of the 19th of February, 1810, in the case of Colonels and Field Officers.

The Brevet that will come out in the month of April next will extend to a great portion of the Colonels of 1810, and include the whole of the Lieutenant-Colonels of 1808-9, the Majors of 1806-7, and the Captains of 1801-2.

The new regulations for officers wearing caps and jackets instead of cocked-hats and long coats, are to be generally adopted on the 4th of June next, in all regiments at home.

LONDON, January 4.

two ships of force in any part of the Mediterranean, from the impossibility of their receiving naval stores in that port; and has compelled them to strip five or six sail in order to equip these thro.

JAN. 13.—The celebrated copyist of La Trappe was, on the 6th of November, suppressed by a decree of the Swiss Council. Jan. 18.—Mr. Seppings, master of Chatham dock-yard, has discovered a new mode of constructing ships of war, by which a considerable saving in the timber is effected, (from 100 to 150 large trees in 7 days) and the strength and durability are obtained. The experiment has been made on the Tremendous, and has been found to answer most completely. She not only out-sailed the whole of the North Sea Squadron, but stood several violent gales of wind without complaining, and continued a firm, dry, and handsome ship during the whole season.

JAN. 23.—It has long been a desideratum with chemists to discover a substance which might supply the place of potash in the manufacture of glass. M. Oestreicher, a physician and naturalist of Hungary, appears to have discovered such a substance in a native salt, to which he has given the name of sal arabile nativum Hungaricum. This substance abounds in Hungary, and was first used by M. Oestreicher in medicine with great success. He has now discovered a chemical process, by which he separates from it the sulphuric acid in such a manner that only natron remains, and it may be employed in the fabrication of all kinds of glass.

JAN. 28.—The following article is extracted from The Freeman's Journal Printed at Dublin:—Upon the authenticity of the following most important intelligence, though not mentioned in the London Papers, the Public may confidently rely:—His Holiness the Pope, having complied with the wishes of Buonaparte, by nominating to the vacant Bishoprics in France and its dependencies, has been freed from all restraint, and granted a Palace at Parma, in Italy.

M. Humboldt has announced his intention of shortly quitting Paris on his travels through Asia. He purposes making some stay in Thibet.

A paragraph appeared in most of the Morning Papers stating, that letters from Gibraltar mention that the Conqueror, of 74 guns, had been unfortunately becalmed under a French battery near Toulon until 170 of her men were killed. The Conqueror is now, and has been for nearly a month, in the Medway, between Chatham and Sheerness.

Feb. 13.—7th. Trigonometrical Survey of Great Britain.—This survey has been extended to the Frith of Forth, the whole of England, with a small exception, having been completed; and it is expected the whole of Scotland will be also completed within four years.

Feb. 14.—It is reported, that Buonaparte has offered to the Porte to interpose, by an armed mediation, between that power and Russia; and that the Divan have accepted his offer.

The following is an extract of a circular letter, recently issued by a respectable mercantile house at Riga:—"Our import trade increases in magnitude progressively; and Russia now being the only country to which the greatest part of the Continent must look for a supply of all colonial produce, and a number of other articles of the first necessity, this branch of trade promises peculiar advantages.—Great quantities of sugar, coffee, spices, cotton-twist, &c. have already been sent from Russia to Austria and Prussia, purchased at high prices, and without any allowance of drawback on the import duties. Our Government are sensible of the benefit the country in general derives from this traffic, and have hence evinced a determined resolution to countenance the import trade, in spite of foreign representations."

Feb. 24.—We have now the satisfaction to state, that the quantity of oak at present in store in the different Royal Dockyards is so abundant, that, notwithstanding the enormous consumption of that article in building and repairing, there is a sufficiency of it on hand to meet all the demands for the three ensuing years.

All the British oak fit for ship-building, which has recently come into the market, has been wisely bought up and stored for the use of the navy; and every occasion has been seized to add to the native supply as much foreign timber of the best quality as the circumstances of the times would allow. Every country capable of producing the article, from which British vessels are not excluded, has been made subservient to this great and national purpose. Even the Brazils, from which quarter we have seldom before derived any supply of this description, have contributed their full proportion. No transport has been of late suffered to return from that country without a cargo of timber, by which arrangement an accession to the pre-existing stock is not only secured, but the expence of freight is also saved. We must add, too, in justice to our ally the Prince Regent of Portugal, that he has granted all the timber that can be deared from his immense forests for the service of the British Navy.

Feb. 28.—Lord Castlereagh has entered on his functions, and has appointed Mr. Edward Cooke his under Secretary.

ROYAL LETTER.

Ferdinand, by the Grace of God, King of the Two Sicilies, Jerusalem, &c. Infante of Spain, Duke of Parma, Placencia, Castro, &c. Grand Hereditary Prince of Tuscany, &c.

My most esteemed Son Francis, Hereditary Prince of the Two Sicilies:

Being obliged, through bodily indisposition, and from the advice of the Physicians, to breathe the air of the country, to withdraw myself from all serious application, I should esteem myself culpable before God, if I did not make such provision for the government of the kingdom, in these most difficult times, that affairs of the greatest importance should be promptly dispatched, and the public weal suffer no detriment through my infirmities. Wishing, therefore, to disburthen myself of the weight of government, as long as it shall not please God to restore me to a state of health suitable for conducting it, I cannot more properly entrust it to any other than to you, my beloved son, as well because you are my legitimate successor, as on account of the experience which I have had of your high rectitude and capacity; and by these presents, with my free will and consent, I constitute and appoint you my Vicar-General in this my kingdom of Sicily, in the same way as you have been already twice Vicar-General in my other kingdom of Naples; and I yield and transfer to you, with the ample title of Alter Ego, the exercise of all the rights, prerogatives, pre-eminences, and powers, which could be exercised by myself; and that this my determination may be known to all, and obeyed by all, I order that this my letter, signed by myself, and sealed with my royal seal, be preserved in the archives of the kingdom, and that you direct a copy of it to be sent to all Counsellors and Secretaries of State for their information, and that they may communicate the same to all persons interested. Given in Palermo, this 10th day of January, 1812.

STATE OF THE KING'S HEALTH.

By the above account it may be seen, that in the year before last we had a balance to pay to foreigners of near twelve millions sterling, which must have been drained from us in money. The amount, in 1811, we suspect, was still more unfavourable.

MARCH 6.—General Jan. the late Governor of Java, was in the gallery of the House of Commons yesterday evening, and appeared to be very attentive to the discussion.

A decree has been published in the Grand Duchy of Berg, in which Napoleon, to the exclusion of his nephew, the Grand Duke, assumes to himself the Sovereignty, by ordering the execution of this same in his own name, and under his own sole authority. By this instrument he takes into his hand all the manufactured or unmanufactured tobacco which shall be found in the territory, and all the machines, implements, &c. employed upon it, for which, he says, compensation shall be made to the proprietors.

This interesting advice reached us from Anhalt on the 26th inst. The following is an extract from a letter dated Feb. 27:—Accounts from Petersburg state, that the levy of 150,000 men, ordered some time since, has been called out for organization.

LONDON, March 20.

The French goods to be received, comprised in the catalogue now published, are the following: Seeds, Cheese, Fruit, Bricks, Porcelain, Rashes, Clinkery, Thread, Tapes, Perfumery, Flax; Linens, Lawns, Cambrics, Silks, new and thrown Laces, Quack-silvers, Flax and Linen Yarn, Jewellery, Bronzes, Books, Drugs, medicinal (not drying).

Licences were on Tuesday granted for St. Petersburg, notwithstanding the hostile appearances in the North of Europe.

LONDON, April 3.—Dispatches have been received from the Earl of Wellington, by which we learn, that the siege of Badajoz commenced on the 17th ult. The substance of his lordship's dispatches has been communicated in the following official Bulletin:—

War Department, April 1.

"Dispatches have been received from the Earl of Wellington, dated 20th March.—

"His lordship invested Badajoz on the 16th, and broke ground on the following day, forming his first parallel within 200 yards of the out-work called Picorina. Lord Wellington conducted the siege in person, with the 3d, 4th, and Light Divisions, upon the left of the river.

"Sir Thomas Graham crossed the Guadiana on the 16th, with three divisions of infantry and two brigades of cavalry, and marched upon Santa Martha and Valverde, while Sir R. Hill, with two divisions and brigade of cavalry, moved upon Merida, where he made some prisoners.

"These movements induced general Drouot to retreat from Villafranca to Homoschos, to preserve his communication with general Darcion's division, stationed at Llerena.

"Upon the 19th, a sortie was attempted by the garrison of Badajoz; 2000 men pushed out against the right flank of our work, but were immediately driven in, with considerable loss, by major-general Boves.

"In this affair, general Picton's aid-de-camp, capt. Cuthbert, was killed, and lieut.-colonel Fletcher slightly wounded.

"Since the commencement of the operations, the loss of the allies has been about 150 men killed or wounded.

"There was no general movement of the enemy upon the side of Ciudad Rodrigo so late as the 17th March, but two of the three divisions of Marmont's army which had been upon the Tagus, had moved through the mountains in the direction of Valladolid.

"The rains had been very heavy for the last three days."

Lisbon papers to the 25th ult. have been received in town. They do not add any thing of consequence to the information contained above.

Lisbon, March 23d.—We do not learn that any large French corps is marching to succor Badajoz; their marches and countermarches in the North of Spain are so confused and various that it is not possible to form a conjecture of their object. The French usually make these manoeuvres when they wish to conceal from us the true designs of their marches; but if they eventually march for Badajoz, all this obscurity with which they cover themselves is useful to us, as they lose time while we are proceeding in the taking of Badajoz.

BY THE BURLINGTON MAIL.

Washington City, Tuesday, April 21.

It is with feelings of unmixed veneration for the character of the revolutionary hero, the patriot and statesman, combined in one, that we announce that the venerable GEORGE CLINTON is no more. He expired about nine o'clock yesterday morning, at his lodgings in this city, after an illness of about four weeks continuance.

BALTIMORE, April 21.

The Vice President of the U. States, the venerable GEORGE CLINTON, died yesterday morning about 8 o'clock. In consequence of this event, both houses of congress adjourned without transacting any business.

BALTIMORE, April 20.

We have received accounts from Charleston to the 9th inst. They state that the Spaniards had not yet been dispossessed of St. Augustine; that in consequence of an expectation that the Indians would take part with the garrison at St. Augustine, the American troops at Savannah had been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to march for that place at a moment's warning.

BOSTON, April 25.

We have seen several letters from gentlemen in Washington on whose judgment and veracity we rely, which state, that a mad proposition of War against England solely, would immediately be laid before Congress, and would probably be adopted. In the Senate, however, it will meet with a powerful opposition.

Extract of a letter from Baltimore, dated 18th April.

Governor HULL, from Detroit, came with me from Washington yesterday. He starts to-morrow on his return home, and assures me that in a month from this time he expects to have, on the frontiers of Canada, 3000 men under his command."

The same letter mentions, that it is the determination of Government to go to war with England, immediately. The writer had conversed with Federal and Democratic members of Congress at Washington, who, one and all, assured him that "WAR was coming."

Late letters from Washington say, though the death of the Vice President had suspended the proposition to Congress to declare WAR, the determination of the Executive to try that resort had not been abandoned.

Congressional adjournment.—Letters from Washington inform, that the motion to adjourn was carried in the senate by a large majority; but was lost in the house 53 to 62. They are determined to sit; and if Mr. Foster, they say, does not give immediate satisfaction, they will neither rise nor adjourn without declaring war in form.—Ev. Post.

FROM WASHINGTON.

IN SENATE, Thursday, April 23.

Mr. DANA, from the committee appointed on the subject, further reported a bill respecting associations for maritime security; and the bill was read and passed to a second reading. The bill authorizing the departure of ships and vessels from the ports and harbours of the United States in certain cases, and the bill concerning merchant vessels armed for defence, were read a second time.

The U. S. Sloop of war Hornet, has arrived in Hampton Roads.—N. Y. Paper.

CONSCRIPTION.

Gov. Gerry has issued General Orders for the draft of 10,000 of the militia of this State; of which 9000 are to be infantry, 500 artillery and 500 cavalry. They are to form three divisions and six brigades: Major-Generals Varnum, Ulmer, and Willis are to command the divisions, Brig Genl. Lathrop, Welles, Hildrich, Bliss, Irish, and Brewer, the brigades. The first division furnishes 521 men. The law authorising the draft is on the first page.

BOSTON, April 29.

Accounts to the 16th February have been received from Rio Janeiro.—It appears, that the Portuguese troops which had been sent to assist the Montevideanos (not Buenos Ayrians) had made some improper demands on the Spaniards, after Peace was concluded by the above; and had been sent home with a few in their rear.

By captain Bots, from Laguna, we learn that on the 26th of March, at a place, B. de there was a very severe shock of an EARTHQUAKE which destroyed nearly the whole of the city of Caracas, and all the town of Sagua, with all the neighbouring villages.—22,000 people were killed, and the ruins—two thousand five hundred in Laguna, and 1000 in Sagua.

only perished, viz. Crowell, of New York. Four shocks were heard and felt on the night following, not heavy enough to do any damage. On the 27th, the survivors were employed in digging the dead from under the ruins, putting them in large lighters carrying them to the side of the shipping, and burying them in the sea. On the 28th, the sea was so rough as to prevent them taking the dead off—then they built a large pier near the wharf, and commenced burning these, and buried about fifty at a time, in the sea. On the 29th, the stench had become so bad that they quit digging the dead from under the ruins. All the survivors pitched tents on the plains of Magdalen. On the 4th of April, there was a very hard shock, which made the vessels tremble as if they had been on a reef of rocks in a heavy sea; and from on board the Independence, we could see the mountains move like a ship on a heavy sea, and large pieces scaling off them. At half past 5, the Independence sailed, so that he could not fall what damage had been done.

FROM LISBON.—Yesterday arrived here the ship Mentor, capt. Hopkins, in 34 days from Lisbon.—She brings no news of consequence from the seat of war. A Lisbon paper of the 25th of March contains the following article:—

"Elvas, March 21st.—The French have made a sortie from Badajoz, with 2000 men, but were repulsed, leaving on the field 500 killed and 300 wounded. The works go on with great activity, notwithstanding the unfavourable weather. On the 23d or 24th the batteries will open their fire upon the ramparts of Badajoz. Lord Wellington's head quarters are at Elvas. His army is composed of 51,000 infantry and 5900 cavalry.

"Advices from Cadiz to the 16th inst. mention no event of importance."

A Letter from J. B. Varnum, dated at Sandusky, April 9, states, that two of our fellow citizens had been murdered by the Indians on the South side of Sandusky Bay, on the 3d of April. The act is ascribed to the Chippewa Tribe.—Part of a militia company were in pursuit of the murderers.

BATAVIA (N. Y.) April 18.

We stop the press to announce the intelligence of an armed British and Indian force on the Canada side of the Niagara river apparently with an intention to make a descent on the American side.

It is stated that the Indians are receiving supplies of arms and provisions from the British military stores at Newark; and that boats are in readiness to transport their men across the river. We learn that intelligence has been transmitted to Messrs. Porter and Barton, from some of their friends in Upper Canada, stating that it is advisable for them to remove their families from the river.

A messenger has been sent express from Lewiston on Niagara river to General Hall of Ontario county to call out the militia immediately. The companies in this place are emboldened to march at a moment's warning.

MONTREAL, May 9.

Yesterday having been appointed by His Excellency the Governor in Chief, as a general Fast throughout this Province, we feel much satisfaction in announcing that it was observed by all classes with that religious awe and veneration which the occasion required. All the churches were attended by crowded congregations, and appropriate sermons were delivered to each, replete with those sentiments of loyalty and attachment to the government, which the happy state of this part of the British Empire has impressed so strongly on the minds of the Canadian people.

THE CANADIAN VOLTEIGURS.

The same degree of loyalty abounds in the bosoms of the young Canadians in this city, as at Quebec. On Tuesday and Wednesday last, the office of Peter Lukin, Esq. Notary Public, was fairly beset with volunteers for this corps. Great numbers were enrolled, and several retired greatly mortified, being unfortunately a little under the size required.

We learn that the number actually engaged in that short space considerably exceeds one hundred and fifty in the town, exclusive of vast numbers in various parts of the country.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT OF LOWER CANADA.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

WEDNESDAY, May 6.—A message from the Governor in Chief was delivered to Mr. Speaker by the Honble. Mr. Irvine, announcing the Sanction of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in His Majesty's name, to the bill for erecting a common Goal in the District of Three Rivers.

The question of concurrence was put on the amendments reported by the committee of the whole house, to the bill to authorise E. N. L. Dumont, Esq. to erect a bridge over the River Jesus, which being agreed to, the bill as amended was ordered to be engrossed.

The House then went into a committee on the bill to grant to Alexis Gosselin, a toll over the bridge over the River Boyer, made several amendments, which being reported and agreed, the bill, as amended, was ordered to be engrossed.

A message was received from the Legislative Council announcing their having agreed to the bill to continue the Alien Act, without any amendment.

The amendments from the Legislative Council to the bill for incorporating the Friendly and Benevolent Society of the Mechanics of Quebec, were taken into consideration, negatived, and a committee appointed to draw up reasons for concurring in the said amendments.

SATURDAY, 9.—The committee appointed to draw up reasons to be offered to the Legislative Council, for the House not concurring in the amendments made by them to the Bill incorporating certain persons therein named, under the title of the friendly and benevolent Society of Mechanics of Quebec, reported the said reasons accordingly, and there being no Question the House adjourned.

MONDAY 11th.—Messages were received from the Legislative Council informing the House, that the Council had passed the bill to erect a bridge above the Falls of Montmorency, and requesting a conference on the amendments to the bill for the better preservation of His Majesty's Government, which conference was agreed to.

Messages were also received from the Legislative Council with the following bills passed by the Council without any amendment. A bill for applying certain sums of money therein mentioned. A bill to grant a sum of money to the Hotel Dieu. A bill to grant a sum of money to the General Hospital; and Jacques Morin's bridge bill.

Dumonts and Gosselin's bridge bills were read for the third time and passed.—Adjourned for want of Quorum.

TUESDAY 12th.—A message was received from the Legislative Council with a bill to amend the Act 45 Geo. III. for the better regulation of Pilots and shipping, &c. which bill was read for the first time.

WEDNESDAY 13.—A message was received from the Legislative Council, desiring a conference upon a matter of importance to the future interests of the Province, tomorrow, at 11 o'clock; and the said conference was agreed to and Managers appointed.

The report of the commissioners under the Act 45 Geo. III. for the improvement of the inland navigation, was presented to the House.

The House then went into committee on the reasons set down by the Legislative Council for disagreeing to the amendments made by the Assembly to the bill for the better preservation of His Majesty's Government; and afterwards adjourned for want of a quorum.
