Pontiac cattle ranked high at Winter Fair

Pontiac cattle exhibitors ranked high at last week's Ottawa Winter Fair, winning among many other prizes, four out of a possible six Grand Championship awards. Grand Champion Ayrshire male was won by Donholm Lightning owned and exhibited by Crawford Bros and Dale Ebert of Campbell's Bay. Grand Champion Ayrshire female was the first prize four year old Bonnieshade Primrose 2nd from the exhibit of W Ronald MacKechnie & Sons, Wyman. This cow also won the Inter-Breed Best Udder Class out of 18 entries from all dairy breeds. To qualify in this class an entry must have at least three records which average 125 per cent or more of Breed Class average in milk. Primrose's three records average 154% milk.

Garden Lea Duchess Mandie owned by J Arthur and Kenneth Kilgour of Shawville was the winner of the three year old class and went on to be named Grand Champion Holstein female. The Grand Champion Jersey female was Willow Hollow Royal Rep, owned by Robert Young of Shawville. She had previously won the three year old class. 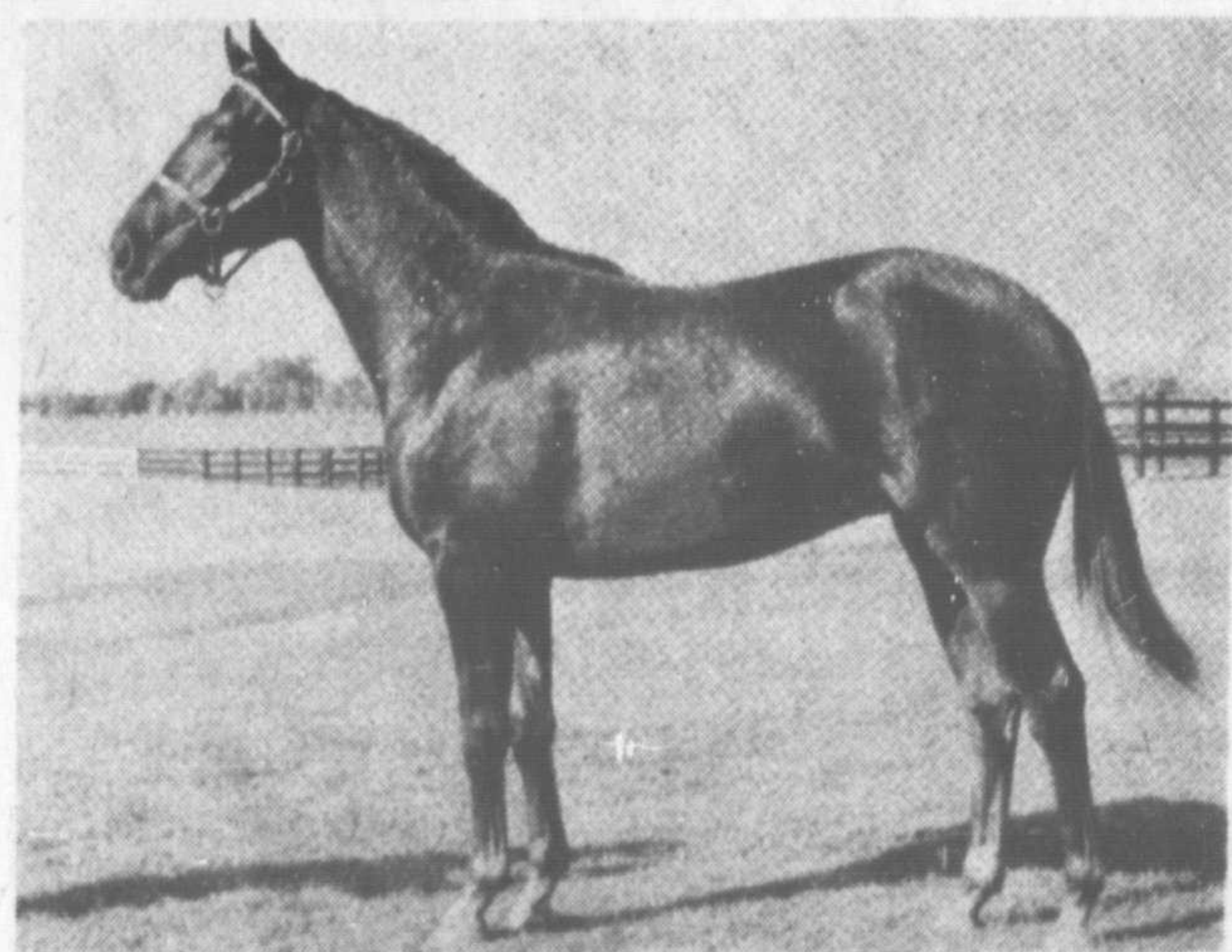

C-B expects Pontiac to break even by '70

Still operating at a loss here

Consolidated-Bathurst Limited reported Friday that net sales for the first three quarters of this year totalled \$248,881,000. This was an increase from \$212,802,000 in the same period in 1968.

The company, in an interim unaudited report to shareholders, attributed the \$36,079,000 increase mainly to higher sales of newsprint and pulp.

Net earnings for the period were \$6,152,000 or 97 cents per common share, down from \$6,455,000, or \$1.04 per common share, in the first nine months of 1968.

The report noted that while there was a substantial improvement in sales and an increase of \$5,200,000 in operating profits in the first three quarters of this year,

the company experienced operating losses at the Pontiac pulp mill in Quebec and reduced operating profits in tissue operations in the United States.

These factors, coupled with the higher depreciation and interest expense in 1969 and reduced tax holiday benefits, resulted in net earnings which were \$303,000 lower than those in the same period last year.

However, a turn-around had occurred in the third quarter and earnings for that period were 25 cents per share, compared with 21 cents a year ago.

Operations of the Pontiac mill continue to show an improving trend which will bring this mill to a break-even position before the end of the year, the company believes.

They expect that the final quarter of 1969 will reflect a further upward trend in earnings which will extend into 1970.

Upper Ottawa Improvement Company reports progress

The Upper Ottawa Improvement Company reports substantial progress this season in sweeping up deadheads in the river and in clearing the beaches of commercial wood.

The company has found that sweeping operations on some sections of the Ottawa River have resulted in all visible deadheads being recovered. Special attention was given to Pembroke lake, since wood movement operations by water were no longer being carried out at this location due to the closing of the sawmill at Pembroke last year.

The company has instituted a survey to test the reaction of cottage owners and power boat owners. To a large extent they say cottagers have been pleased with the condition of their beaches and hope improvement will continue.

Complaints were investigated and errors or neglect rectified. In some cases where it was impossible to comply with requests of the complainants, reasons were offered and explained.

The company, requesting people to make their complaints known directly, has promised to rectify each situation or to give a good reason why it cannot do so.

Although the Upper Ottawa Improvement Company will be stepping up its salvage operations of deadheads, there will always be some of these at large as long as water transportation of commercial wood is carried on.

Apart from deadheads, there is another problem which does not result from the operations of the company - the problems of driftwood caused by erosion of the river banks, or wood cut along the banks by residents, or land-clearing operations for construction purposes. The company would like it to be known that it is not responsible for removing this driftwood either from the shore or from the river.

The Upper Ottawa Improvement Company is trying to be of service beyond its legal requirements to summer residents and visitors along the Ottawa River and it would appreciate any suggestions. A WORKING KNOWLEDGE OF FRENCH

The brightest note about that famous Bill 63 is its promise to teach English speaking students a working knowledge of the French language. This would clear out of the schools all French teachers who were not actually French speaking and would finally give the teaching of French a meaning to the children.

Past generations of students have viewed French as a stumbling block to progress with no actual use whatsoever because even though they absolutely had to pass certain examinations in French to progress from one grade to the next they never were able to use their school-taught French outside the classroom. This has resulted in tremendous waste of money in adulthood with French lessons at the expense of the person, his employer, or in so many cases, the tax-

payers who also footed the bill to employ the teachers who didn't teach a workable language in the schools.

If the Government fulfills the promise set out in Bill 63, it will undertake the immediate institution in all the schools of the Province of French departments which teach the use of the language. If they can provide teachers to get adult public servants speaking French in a few weeks, they can certainly use the same methods on the children in the elementary and high schools.

It may be just another of those wonderful ideas which never gets put into practice. In the Department of Education, theories seem to precede practice by so many years that benefits from good thinking are slow to be realized. But anyway, the bill does hold out hope for our great-grandchildren maybe.

Egg transfers have far reaching possibilities

Within a few years, beef cattle in Bristol may be giving birth to calves that got their start in life on the other side of the Atlantic Ocean.

Or an Italian Count may order half a dozen fertilized eggs from a Shawville area Holstein farmer, transfer them to his own cows near Rome and be well on his way to establishing a high-producing herd of prize Holsteins nine months later.

Or an Allumette Island hog farmer might have a litter of pigs that includes piglets originating in half a dozen different countries of the world - all born at the same time, but each one of distinctly different breeding.

Sound far-fetched? Then consider the fact that transfers of fertilized eggs from one female to another have already happened many times in the animal world.

In 1961, scientists transferred fertilized eggs from ewes in England into ewes in South Africa. The operation was a success.

This January Dr P J Dziuk of the University of Illinois transferred fertilized eggs from one sow bred at his university into a sow kept at Macdonald College here in Quebec. The operation was a success as reported earlier in THE EQUITY. Four piglets were born to the nurse sow in May.

Experiments of this kind are being attempted almost weekly around the world.

The operation is commonplace now among laboratory animals such as rabbits, mice and guinea pigs. At Cambridge

University in England scientists are working with fertilized human eggs kept in test tubes.

It appears likely that the operation will become a practical reality in the veterinary profession within the next decade.

Certainly there are problems still to be solved, but all of them appear to be manageable today. A decade ago, some of the problems appeared to be insurmountable.

At the Animal Diseases Research Institute at Hull, veterinarians are launching a study to determine if disease can be transferred along with the eggs.

The Canada Department of Agriculture is interested in this particular aspect of the pending breakthrough because farmers will likely be the first to use the technique on a relatively large scale.

Farmers want a cheap and safe method to introduce exotic foreign stock. Now they are spending thousands of dollars to purchase and import full grown animals that must undergo lengthy sea transportation and quarantine. The quarantine, which involves extensive testing by the Health of Animals Branch, is necessary to guard against the import of diseases such as foot and mouth virus into Canada.

If the Research Institute in Hull finds that disease is not transferred along with the eggs the operation will likely gain an important economic edge over the import of fully grown animals.

Farmers are interested for another important reason. Using

egg transfers, a prize female will possibly be able to produce hundreds of offspring in her lifetime.

Dr Douglas Mitchell and Dr K J Betteridge are the two veterinarians at the Institute who are most intimately involved in egg transfer research for the Canada Department of Agriculture.

"We in Canada must be ready to use this egg transfer technique," says Dr Mitchell. "And unless we've worked with it at the research level, we won't be fully aware of the problems involved."

"For example, should we have quarantine stations for these fertilized eggs when they start coming into Canada? Will a fertilized egg be capable of carrying this virus?"

"Perhaps we will have to establish a quarantine station with a group of our own nurse animals. When a batch of eggs comes in, we might transfer a few into our quarantine animals to test against disease; we may check the eggs directly for the presence of exotic infections using laboratory culture techniques; perhaps we would hold the rest of the eggs until we're sure that there is no possibility of disease transfer; perhaps we would allow the rest of the eggs to go on to the farm and put it under partial quarantine until our tests are complete."

"These are some of the important areas that require study and evaluation," says Dr Mitchell.

Dr Betteridge says that the technique could follow one of two general patterns. Either the eggs could be fertilized within the animal, then transferred, or the unfertilized eggs could be taken, fertilized in test tube conditions, then the transfer operation would be completed.

Either way, the prize animal would end up producing more offspring. After fertilized eggs are taken from her, she will recycle and produce more eggs for fertilizing within a few weeks. If the eggs are taken from her before fertilization, several could be removed at one time from the ovaries. There are hormone injections available that control both the timing of cycles in animals and ones that cause super ovulation, meaning that more than the normal number of eggs are shed and become available for fertilization at each heat period.

In her lifetime, a cow's ovaries have the potential to produce 50,000 to 100,000 eggs. Sows may produce up to 1,250,000 eggs.

"We don't know if they are all capable of developing to maturity," says Dr Betteridge, "but we do know that we could produce more offspring by transfer operations than now occurs under natural conditions."

Nurse animals would be scrub stock. Farmers currently attempt to improve their herds by breeding females to high-quality males, often by artificial insemination. If, however, they could buy fertilized eggs from excellent male AND female parents, they could make tremendous strides in improving the next generation of animals, says Dr Mitchell.

"The basic technique is worked out," says Dr Betteridge. "Really all that remains to be done now is some further refining, a cutting down on the cost of collection of the eggs

Operations have commenced at the Reid woolen factory, Portage du Fort. Most of the machinery has been placed in position.

On Tuesday of last week, Mr James Findlay, of Clarendon, was united in matrimony to Mrs Dunlap, late of Pembroke. On the Friday evening following, a number of friends and acquaintances in the vicinity assembled at Mr Findlay's to welcome the bride.

At a meeting of the school commissioners of Thorne held on Saturday last, the proceedings previously had with reference to the establishment of an additional school section, were confirmed, and the preliminary steps towards getting the new section which takes in most of the German settlement into operation were taken. The school house will be erected at or in the vicinity of Upper Thorne Centre.

If sufficient bonuses to supplement the Government subsidy can be secured from the people between Engenville and Renfrew, the Kingston and Pembroke Railway Company will build the road.

Mr Crawford, station agent here, took a run down to the Bristol iron mine the other day for the purpose of seeing how things are progressing in that locality. He reports that operations have been renewed, and that from four to six carloads of ore are being shipped off daily. The ore is being despatched in its crude state, the roasting process having been abandoned. As yet the company has only one drill in operation, but expects to have four at work in a short time.

A couple of weeks ago the Messrs Wm and S Richardson executed a feat in the threshing line which deserves mention. At the barn of Mr N Brownlee in North Clarendon, they threshed out 809 bushels of oats in the short space of 3 1/2 hours time. Mr R McJanet weighed the grain as it came from the mill which was driven by horse power.

Mr George Findlay has the skating rink well underway; it will probably be ready this week, so far as the mechanical part is concerned. When the structure may be ready for use will depend, of course, very much on the whims of Jack Frost.

Scientists have been able to use female rabbits as a nurse animal for eggs of some species during the transportation stage. This involves a double transplant - from the donor into the rabbit and out of the rabbit into the nurse animal.

The Animal Diseases Research Institute is also quite interested in egg transfer as a research tool. For example, they might use the technique to discover answers to causes of fetal death in cattle and in finding out if infection is transmitted by the egg.

Heavy thunderstorms passed over this section on Thursday last - the first during the late afternoon, and the second commencing about nine in the evening, continued at intervals till after midnight. It was during this last storm that the barn and outbuildings of John R Corrigan who lives in the McKee neighbourhood were struck by lightning, and destroyed with the contents, which included this year's grain crop. Mr Charles Taber, of Wyman neighbourhood, also had his barn burnt during this midnight storm. A house in Charteris is reported to have been burned during one of these storms. The school house in Caldwell section was struck but fortunately was not set on fire.

1. Keep both hands firmly on the wheel — at 10 and two o'clock — and both eyes on the road.
2. Never tailgate — allow at least one vehicle length for every ten miles per hour of speed.
3. On wet, snowy or icy roads, reduce speed well below posted speed limits, depending on the severity of conditions.

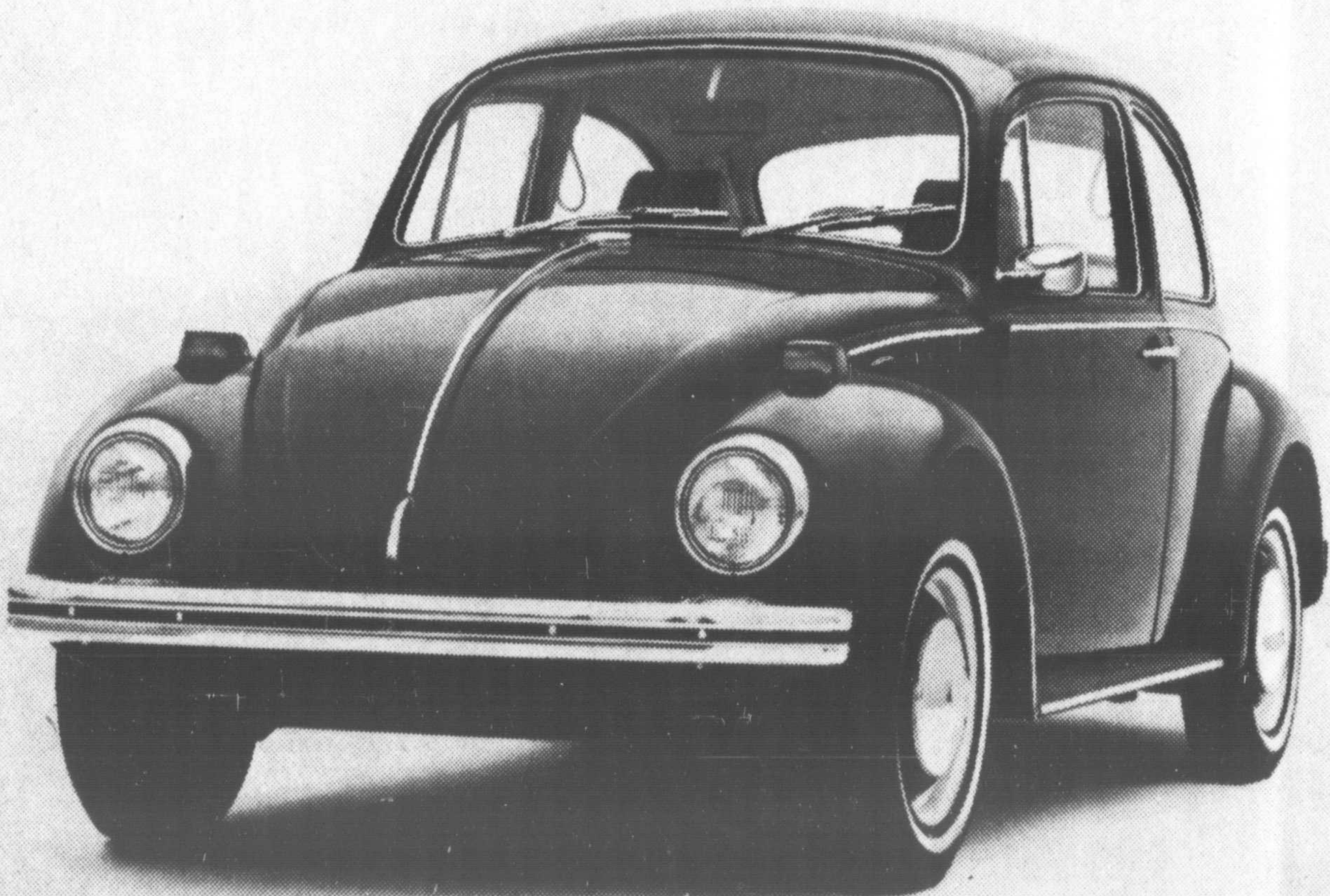

COURT REPORT
