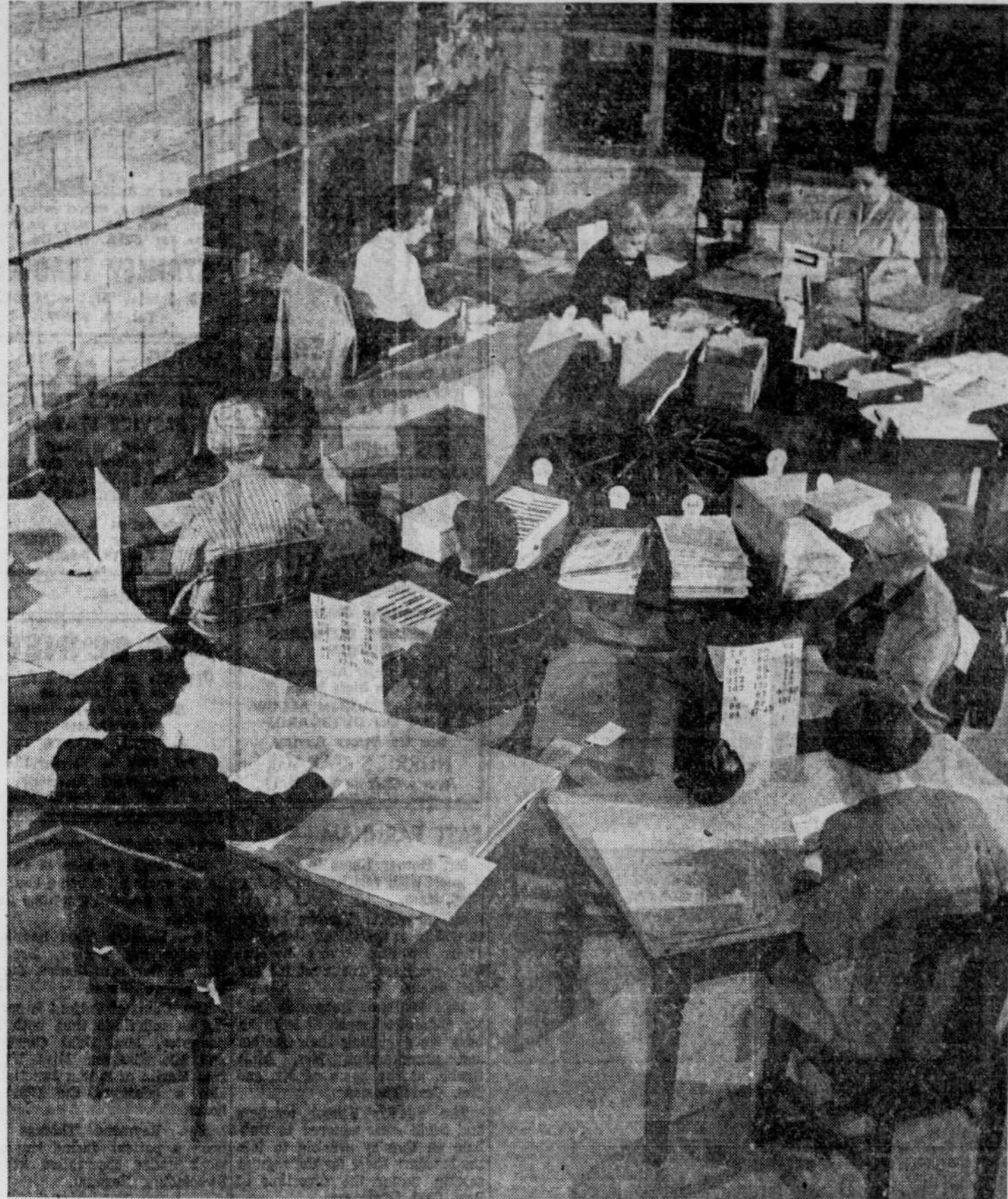

A Nation Will Speak

Canada At The Polls



One name that won't be on the list is Canada's Chief Electoral Officer, Nelson Castonguay. Neither he, his assistant, nor the country's 263 returning officers may vote. Nor may federally appointed judges, inmates of penal and mental institutions, and tax-exempt Indians.



Forms and ballots are rushed to Canada's 263 electoral districts. To reach the country's remote northern areas within the prescribed time, ice-breakers, helicopters, parachute drop and dog sled have been called upon. Parliament is unable to sit until the results are in.

The forthcoming general election has not caught Canada's chief electoral officer napping. For months his staff has been on the alert maintaining a state of preparedness worthy of the most zealous boy scout. Now that the signal has been given, everyone goes to action stations

with the calm efficiency born of careful training. Forms at the ready, a hastily recruited army of canvassers will ring doorbells from coast to coast to see that everyone who has the right gets his name on the voter's list—which this year will top the 9 million mark.



In past elections, from 66 to 76 percent of the electorate have turned out to vote. Generally, the hotter the election issues, the keener election interest; nevertheless, Canada's national average compares favourably with other countries using a similar electoral system.



All told, some 500 tons of paper will be put to work by Canada's electoral officers when they set out to discover what candidates the electorate have chosen to represent them during the next 5-year-life of Canada's Parliament.

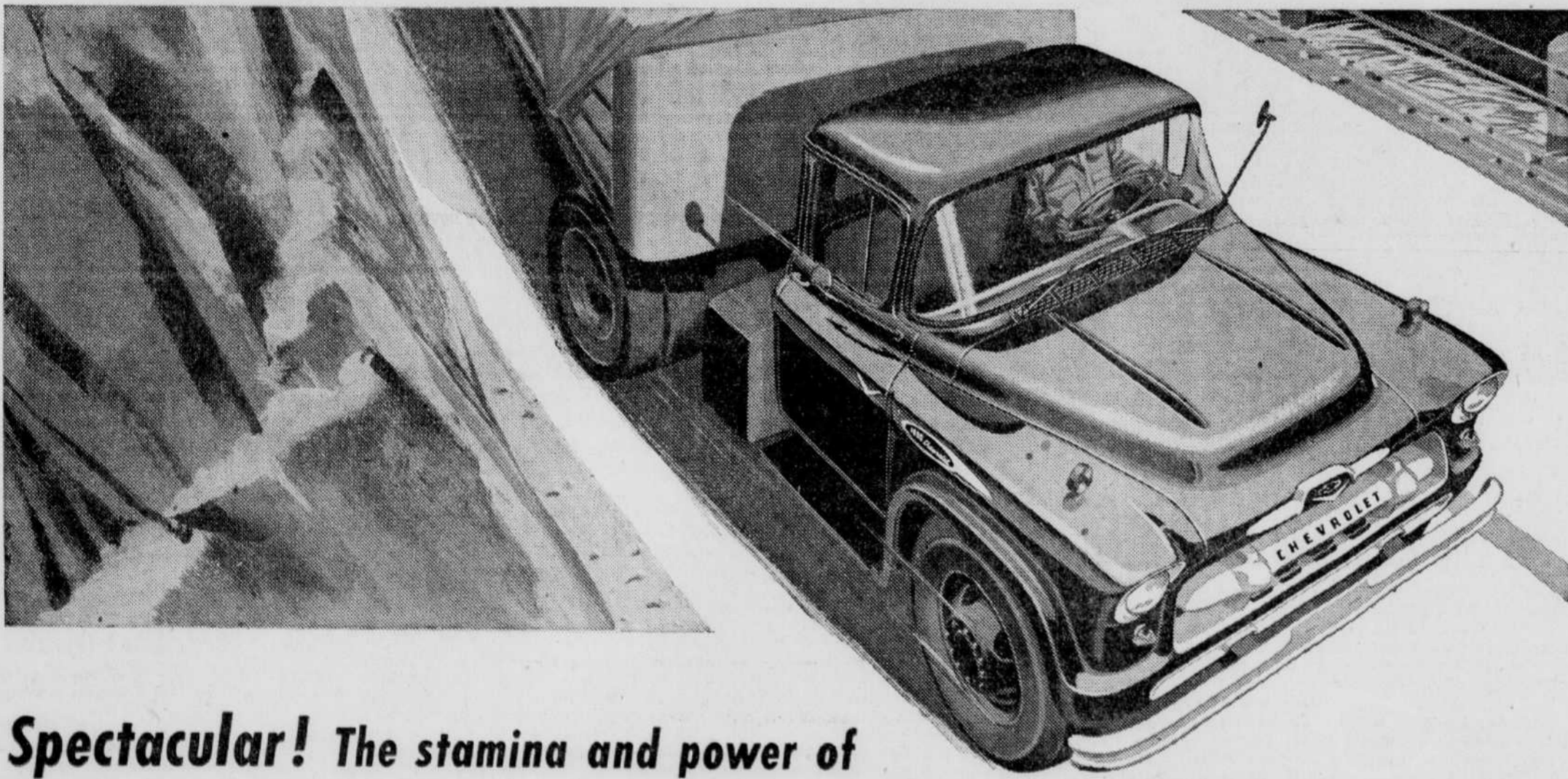

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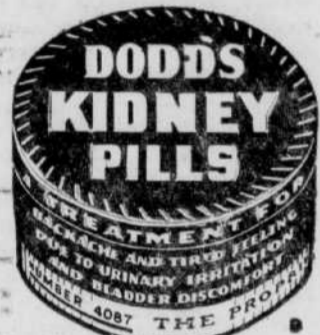
Waterloo Pee Wee Hockey League Concludes Season

Mr. Rudd expressed the thanks of himself and Mrs. Rudd for this unexpected pleasure and the lovely gifts.

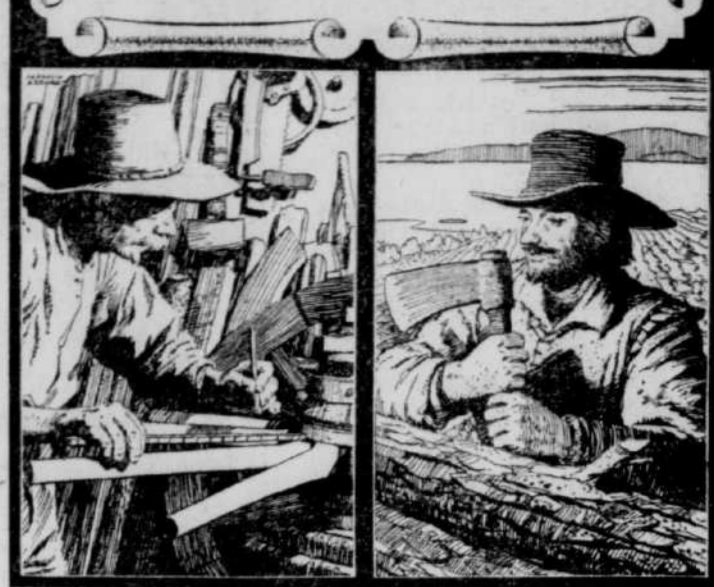
Refreshments were served, including a decorated three-tier wedding cake, made by Mrs. A. Lowe.

Old Families in Quebec



Morin

Three hundred years ago communication between France and colonial New France was extremely difficult. The brave men and women who settled in the colony were compelled to be almost entirely self-sufficient, for their combined efforts were all that stood between them and the tangled savage wilderness.

Typically, the man who made the treacherous sea journey to New France brought with him some special skill that would bolster civilized man's foothold in this virgin wilderness.

Such a man was Noël Morin, a wheelwright, from Saint-Etienne le Compto-Robert-en-Brie in France. He arrived in New France in 1639 and on January 8, 1640, in Quebec City, he married Hélène Des Portes, the widow of Guillaume Hébert. Noël followed his trade diligently and as time passed six sons and six daughters were born of his union with Hélène. Germain Morin, one of their sons, became the first Canadian born Catholic priest. Another of their children was the first Canadian nun to serve at the Institut des Hospitalières in Montreal.

Throughout Quebec the name Morin is continually associated with the proud and timeless traditions exemplified by Noël. Today his many descendants enrich the culture of Quebec by outstanding devotion to their chosen trades and professions.

Labat

In the year 1634, at the junction of the St. Maurice and St. Lawrence rivers, one of the oldest cities in the province of Quebec was founded. Originally it was known as "Fort Three Rivers" but with the end of frontier hostilities the name evolved to the "Three Rivers" we know today.

The setting for the original fort was one of rugged natural beauty, and for miles around the land was wild and completely untamed. To bring the land under the plow the first pioneers worked tirelessly clearing each precious acre foot by foot.

One of these hardworking, God-fearing pioneers was Mathieu Labat. Labat was an adventurous Frenchman who immigrated to New France in 1653. His first two summers in the new land were marked with a progress that comes only from tireless effort and he succeeded in clearing acres of his precious land. All went well for Labat until December ninth of his second year as a pioneer—on that day disaster struck in the form of the savage Iroquois Indians. Mathieu Labat, pioneer habitant, was killed defending his loved ones.

Labat died, but his pioneer spirit still lived in others who bore his name. Many Labats followed him to this country to carry on the struggle where he had finished. One of them, spelling his name Labat, would be the head of a family to become famous as brewers of fine beer and ale.

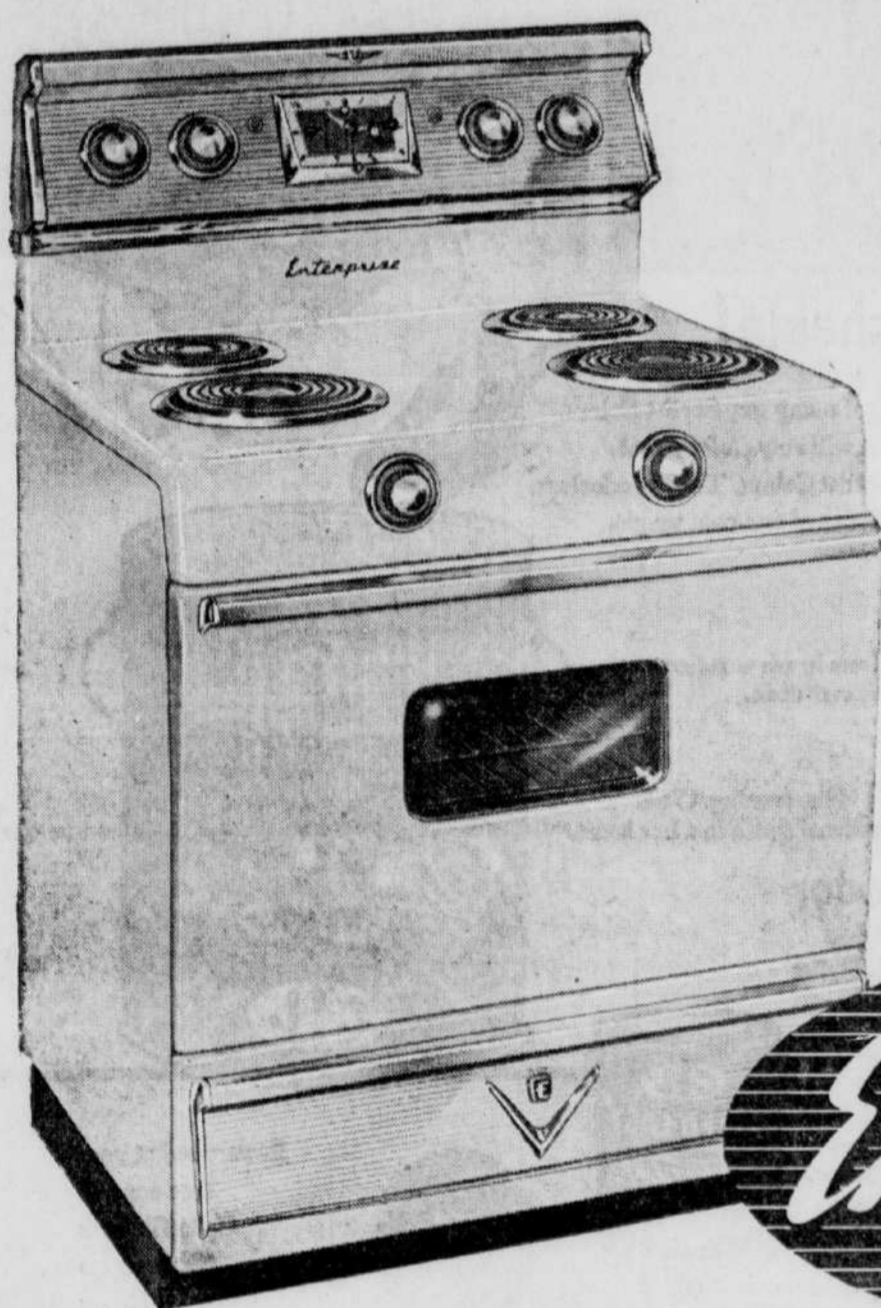
"I resign. I can't work where there are alligators. I would have mentioned this before, but I didn't think the question would ever come up."

For two days every summer, the town of Morton, Washington looks like an old-fashioned logging camp! It's jumping with American and Canadian loggers, all competing for prizes with their axes, chain saws and other modern machine tools. Last year, a feller using a crosscut saw cut a 30-inch log in 77 seconds! Others engaged in birling — which is the art of spinning a floating log! These loggers' celebrations are lots of fun, and visitors are always welcome.

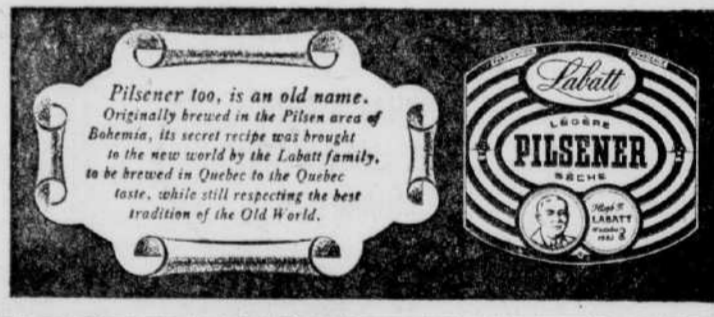

Happy Days Here Again!

Fishing Rules IT IS UNLAWFUL

1. To use minnows as bait in waters frequented by Speckled Trout, Grey Trout and Quebec Red Trout, save when such minnows were taken in these same waters.
2. To transport anywhere in the Province lampreys to be used as bait for fishing;
3. To fish with, carry or have in his possession fish, including minnows or lampreys, to be used as bait for fishing in the Counties of Rimouski, Matane, Matapeia, Bonaventure, Gaspé, North, Gaspé-South and Saguenay; provided however, that the above does not apply to the use of any bait for deep-sea fishing;
4. For any person to fish, without the permission of the lessee, in any territory under lease.
5. For any person to fish by any means other than line or rod and line held in the hand; not more than three hooks must be attached to said line; use of nets, seines, night lines and other gear prohibited, without special permit.
6. To use worms or any other kind of bait than artificial flies in fishing for, catching or killing salmon by angling.
7. To use a fixed spool reel or a spinning gear in Salmon rivers.
8. To use DYNAMITE or any other EXPLOSIVE whatsoever, to take or kill fish.
9. To take in any one day, according to species, more fish than is legally permitted.
10. To retain fish under the lawful size.
11. To have in one's possession at anytime more fish than one day's legal catch, according to species.
12. To POLLUTE the waters of lakes or rivers by throwing, depositing or introducing in these waters chemical substances, lime, poisonous matters, mill rubbish or any other deleterious substance.
13. To buy or SELL speckled trout, rainbow trout, brown trout, ouananiche, bass, muskellunge, and Quebec red trout.
14. Fishing for speckled trout, brown trout, Quebec red trout and grey or lake trout THROUGH THE ICE is prohibited.
15. To export Black Bass, Muskellunge, Ouananiche, Landlocked or Sebago Salmon, Speckled Trout, Sea Trout, Brown Trout, Rainbow Trout, Quebec Red Trout, no matter where procured, provided that any non-resident fishing, in the waters of the Province under a proper permit may, on leaving the Province, take away the lawful catch of one day's fishing; however, for all species of trout, save lake trout, the total weight limit is fifteen (15) pounds.

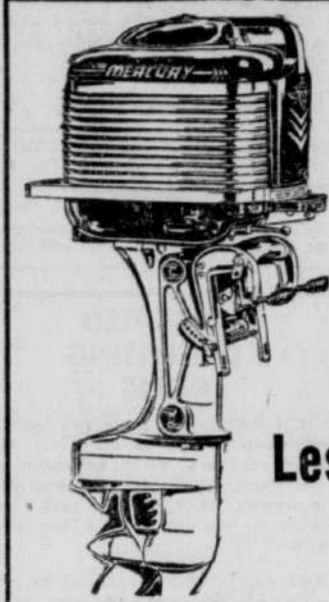

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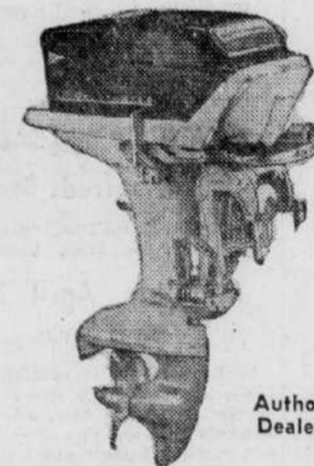

Lake Memphremagog Internationally Known

Lake Memphremagog was described as one of the best fishing spots in Southern Quebec by Richmond Pelletier, director of the fishing competitions sponsored by Molson's Brewery, when he presented \$275 in prizes to anglers in Magog last summer.

This 32-mile stretch of water contains many species of game fish, ranging from perch to the deep-dwelling brown and steel-head trout. Bass, rainbow trout and land-locked salmon are also to be found in the lake.

For those who wonder at the seemingly endless source of game in the lake, the explanation lies in the fact that it has an extremely deep bed and is fed by many streams and rivers. Very often the weather and temperature will affect the movement of the game and one day's catch may be another day's catastrophe.

Against the day when the source of fish in the lake will diminish, measures are being taken to insure the continuance of the excellent fishing which has already made the district an internationally famous fishing ground.

A sportsmanship and restocking

campaign is in full swing by the Memphremagog Conservation Association.

The Stanstead Fish and Game Association has followed the same measures and have taken extra steps against sewage and garbage disposal besides conducting an all out fight against poaching. Similarly, the Newport group are taking an active part in maintaining the fishing and beauty qualities of this anglers' paradise.

First hand information and first class equipment is to be had, outfitters of every type of equipment dot the lake from one end to the other. In fact, many of these firms base their entire year preparing and outfitting for the summer season.

REMINDERS

There are within the Province of Quebec a great number of hunting and fishing outfitters.

For the purpose of giving information to anglers and hunters, the Department of Game has published a booklet describing each one of these organizations. One may obtain this publication free of charge from the Department of Game, Outfitters Service, 29 Ste Ursule Street, Quebec City.

In Lakes Massawippi and Little Magog, angling is allowed from May first to October thirtieth in each year; provided that the taking of Perch by angling is allowed at any time of the year in Little Lake Magog and in Round and North Hatley Bays in Lake Massawippi; provided, further, that in that part of the Magog River, extending from Memphremagog Lake to the first dam, an approximate distance of four thousand eight hundred feet, angling is allowed as set for Lake Memphremagog.

No person shall fish for, catch or kill in one day in Lake Massawippi, Stanstead County, more fish of any kind than will in the aggregate weigh more than fifteen pounds round weight.

Fishing Hints.....

When buying streamers, try to visualize how they will look when they are wet... as they would be when activated in fishing. A streamer with fish-appearance, quivers and pulsates with a minnow-like action. Novice anglers might buy only one streamer of each pattern to see how it pulses from being twitched in the water, then buy the best performers in sizes from small 12's up to the large 4's which represent local minnows.

All game fish take minnows, so try various streamers to suit them on each occasion.

Use a monofilament leader on the line's end when possible; it is less visible to the fish than a line or wire leader. Use a short length of HEAVY monofilament instead of wire when possible.

Trout take dry flies best in water temperatures between 50 degrees up to 70 degrees—brown trout may take flies in temperatures up to 75 degrees.

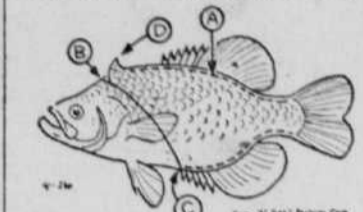
Nymphs, wet flies, streamers, underwater lures and baits are most productive in 40 to 55 degree waters.

Below 40 degrees, bait works the best of all when trout are less active. The best spots to fish are shallow riffles that grow warm first from the sunshine.

To get results with a streamer you must give it a life-like action. One of the best methods for streams, is to cast across and upstream so the lure sinks deep for a downstream drift and retrieve it as it swings around in the current.

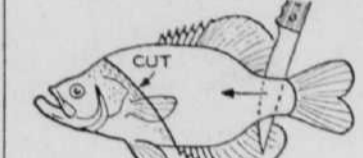
To make a streamer more effective, it is wise to make it "pulse" by means of stop-and-go twitches on the line. Another method of accomplishing the same thing is to allow the lure to fall back about eight or 10 inches occasionally on retrieves.
