The Tenders are to specify the number of Locks and the places at which it is proposed to build them; Also the number of Flood Gates in each Lock, and the period for completing the work by the Irish Creek.

**T**HE Commissioners for internal communications for the county of Dorchester, and for that part of the county of Buckinghamshire lying in the district of Quebec, will receive proposals for the following objects, viz.:

1er. To repair Craig road from the line of the district of Three Rivers to the settlements of St. Giles; that is to say, to make the carriage road 18 feet wide, with a ditch three feet wide on each side; the road to be sufficiently bridged where it shall be necessary, with paving pieces not less than 15 feet in length; and to make besides, a clearance of 18 feet on each side outside of the ditches.

2d. To complete in the manner above described, the road existing at present between Craig road and the settlements of the parish of *Sainte Marie*.

3d. To complete in the manner above described, that part of the road from Craig road about the place called *Lord's settlement* in Ireland, to that part of the line of the district of Three Rivers in Wolfestown, where it meets the road traced by Mr. Pennoyer.

4th. For the construction of a solid bridge, to be built of wood, on the river Etchemins, near the river Saint Lawrence, in the parish of *Point Levi*. These proposals to be accompanied by a plan.

5th. To clear the landing place for canoes at *Point Levi*, before *Captain Labadie's*, and for easing the steepness of the hill from this landing place to the brow of the Cape — The proposals for which, also to be accompanied by a plan.

6th. To examine the river Chaudiere, from its mouth to its source, and report on the possibility of rendering it navigable, by means of dams, canals, or other works, with a plan, details and estimates of the probable expence of such works.

7th. To examine the road commonly called the *Kenebeck road*, with a plan, containing the deviations which may be necessary to make, and an estimate of the probable expence of changing and completing the said road.

Sealed proposals for the said works, plans, and details, will be received by the said Commissioners at their office at Quebec, from this day to Monday the 7th of July next, at ten o'clock in the morning. The proposals to mention the time at which the Contractors propose to deliver the works, plans and details above mentioned.

Two good and sufficient securities will be required for the execution of the five first works. — Their names must be mentioned in the proposals.

One half only of the works mentioned in the first and second clauses will be required in the course of the present year.

**CONTRACT FOR WHARFING AND COMPLETING a part of St. PAUL STREET, commencing at the end of Saint Peter Street, and to be continued to St. Thomas street.**

THE Commissioners for Internal Communications for the County of Quebec, being authorised by His Excellency the Governor in Chief to contract for the above mentioned work; Hereby give Notice, that they will Contract at the lowest rate for the completion thereof as laid down in the Plan deposited in their Office.

The following specification of Materials to be used in constructing the Wharf, Bridge and Street, will be particularly attended to

The pine Timber for the fronts to be Merchantable, and not less than 12 inches square. The Sleepers to be Cedar or Red Spruce, each to be placed at 5 feet distance, the Buis in front to be dove tailed, in each dove tail one Iron Bolt 18 inches long by 1/2 inch square and jugged at the point. The Cross Sleepers to be placed at 6 feet as under and secured with Cedar Treennails, 1 1/2 inch square, to go through both pieces at every cross. Where the back of the Wharf does not join the Buildings it must be sufficiently close to retain the filling up. The whole of the wharf to be filled up to high water mark with Stone only, the remainder with Rubbish and Gravel. The Centre of the Street to rise two feet above the height of the side, a Foot path of 5 feet on each side, logged in front 8 inches thick, framed and filled up with Gravel, a Gutter to be left 8 inches wide. The said Street 30 feet broad, the Bridge 20 feet wide, faced the same as the front; at the height of 7 feet wide, a projecting log on each side, to be left of 6 inches, for placing supporters. The top Beams, 11 pieces Cedar, 10 by 14 inches square; secured with 2 Iron Bolts in each end, 14 pieces Cedar 8 inch square for supporters, secured at each end with two Iron bolts. The top to be covered with sound oak plank of 6 inches thick, 6 Iron Bolts in each plank, the remainder Oak Treennails. The punt at present not included, to be raised agreeable to the plan; the whole finished and painted in a workman-like manner.

Sealed proposals for the said work, addressed to the Commissioners for Internal Communications for the County of Quebec, will be received by the said Commissioners at their Office, where the Plan of the Street, Bridge and Railing is deposited for inspection, and may be seen every morning between the hours of 8 and 10 o'clock, (Sunday excepted) until Friday the 27th June Instant. The proposals must state the time at which they propose delivering the said Work complete.

Two good and sufficient Securities for the execution of the said Contract will be required, and one half of the amount of said Contract will be paid down when the same is passed.

LES Commissaires pour les Communications intérieures pour le Comté de Québec, étant autorisés par Son Excellence le Gouverneur en Chef à contracter pour l'ouvrage ci-dessus mentionné, donnent avis par le présent qu'ils contracteront au Rabais pour les dits ouvrages tels que traces dans le Plan déposé dans leur Bureau.

On fera particulièrement attention à la spécification suivante des matériaux à employer dans la construction du Quai et de la Rue

Les pièces employées pour le front seront de Pin marchand, et pas moins de douze pouces quarrés. Les pièces de liaison seront de Cèdre ou d'Épinette rouge et seront placées à cinq pieds de distance les unes des autres, les bouts en front seront en queues d'aronde, et dans chaque d'aronde un boulon de fer de 18 pouces de long sur un pouce et demi quarré, et dentelé à la pointe. Les pièces de liaison de travers doivent être à six pieds l'une de l'autre et assurées par des gournables de cèdre d'un pouce et demi quarré, qui traverseront les deux pièces où elles se croiseront. Dans les endroits où le derrière du Quai ne joindra pas les Bâtimens, il doit être assez près pour recevoir ce dont on le remplira.

Le Quai doit être rempli de pierre seulement jusqu'à la marque de la haute mer, le reste de décombres et de graviers. Le centre de la Rue doit être élevé de deux pieds plus que les côtés; un parapet de cinq pieds de chaque côté, avec une pièce en front de huit pouces d'épaisseur, et rempli de graviers, et une gouttière de huit pouces de large. La dite Rue sera de trente pieds de large, le pont de vingt pieds de large; à la hauteur de sept pieds une pièce projettera de chaque côté, laquelle sera laissée de six pouces pour y mettre des supports. Les solives supérieures 11 pièces de cèdre de 10 sur 14 pouces quarrés, assurées avec 2 Boulons de fer à chaque bout, 14 pièces de cèdre de huit pouces quarrés pour supports, assurées à chaque bout par deux Boulons de fer. (From a London paper, April 1.)

COBBETT.

This person is really gone, and has left the following farewell—  
TO THE PUBLIC.

Liverpool, M. MCH 26, 1817.

"My departure for America will surprise nobody but those who do not reflect. A full and explicit statement of my reason will appear in a few days, probably on the 5th of April. In the meanwhile, I think it necessary for me to make known, that I have fully empowered a person of respectability to manage and settle all my affairs in England. I owe my countrymen most sincere regard, which I shall always entertain for them in a higher degree than towards any other people on earth. I carry nothing from my country, but my wife and my children, and surely they are my own at any rate. I shall always love England better than any other country; I will never become a subject or citizen of any other State; but I and mine will not live under a Government having the absolute power to imprison us at its pleasure; and, if we can avoid it, we will neither live nor die under such an order of things.

"If I have not taken leave of numerous friends in London and in the country, it was because I should have been made unhappy by their importunities and the expressions of their sorrow. I make an enormous sacrifice of property and of feelings; but, when my heart feels the ties of friendship, and of all the interesting objects in Hampshire, it is reconciled to the loss by the thought that I can enjoy them only during the pleasure of a Secretary of State. When this order of things shall cease to exist, then shall I again see England.

(Signed) "William Cobbett."

What kind of reception does Cobbett expect in America? His person may be safe from the dangers of a prison—no small comfort to one who has had two years' experience of its inconveniences; but can he receive a cordial welcome among those on whom he has heaped every kind of abuse? In what terms did he speak of the Americans, as individuals and as a people, when he made his appearance in London as a Journalist? Let the following extract from the 1st Number of his *Pantheon* serve as a specimen—

"Notwithstanding the example of America, and the more dreadful example of France, I and the emissaries of the Republican faction (for such it really is) still preaching fanaticism and infidelity; still hawking for that change which they have the audacity to denounce as reform; still exerting all their nefarious ingenuity in sapping the foundation of the Church and the Throne. Those who want experience of the consequences, may, for aught I know, be excused for coniving at those attempts; but, you see, who have seen acts passed by a Republican Legislature, more fraudulent than forgery or perjury; you see, who have seen Republican Officers of State offering their country for sale for a few thousand dollars; you see, who have seen Republican Judges become felons, and felons become Republican Judges; you see to hold my lands, and family listen to the insolent exigist of Republican Governments and rulers; would be a shameful abandonment of principle, a dastardly desertion of duty."

Various rumours are abroad, not only with respect to the motives which led to Cobbett's self-departation; but to the condition in which he has left his affairs. A professional friend is entrusted with the sale of the Botley estate, which, however, is not expected to produce much. It is deeply mortgaged. Several claims have been preferred by unexpected creditors. It will be recollected that Cobbett says, in his Farewell Address,—"I carry nothing from my country, but my wife and my children;" and such is stated to be the fact. Communications have been received from him, in which he expresses his determination to revisit this country, when the period for the continuance of the suspension of the Habeas Corpus shall have expired. Mrs. Cobbett and her daughters are expected in London this day. Preparations are now making for their departure. The *Liverpool Anvertiser* received yesterday states, that the Importer, Ogden, for New York, with Mr. Cobbett and his two sons on board, actually left Liverpool on Thursday last having been towed out of the river by a steam-boat.

LONDON, April 15.

By recent accounts from India we are informed, that a considerable movement pervades the native powers throughout the north-east and centre of the Peninsula. The tributaries and officers of the Rajah of Jypour, terrified by the advances of Ameer Khan, and still more by the imbecility of their own Rajah, resolved at one time to call in the assistance of the Company's troops; at another to choose a more capable and sufficient sovereign. The British resident at Delhi had received intelligence that the number of Pindarees in the field amounted to no less than 80,000, mostly well equipped, and all well mounted. Their mode of making war is most destructive, as plunder is their only object; they separate for the purpose into bodies of from 100 to 4 or 5000 horse, and ravage a territory of 50 miles or more in circumference; whence after rendering it a perfect desert they march elsewhere to similar devastations.—It was a detachment of several thousands of these fierce marauders which traversed last year the whole of India; and penetrating to the Bay of Bengal, laid waste the British Province of Gattack, in the very neighbourhood of Calcutta. It is presumed that some decisive measures will be taken by the Company's Government and their several allies, to check the progress of this terrible banditti, and to chastise their insolence; since otherwise, there will be neither secu-

curity nor tranquility for the peaceful inhabitants from north to south of India. For this purpose his highness the Nizam had resolved to embody 5000 cavalry, and place them under the command of British officers. To this end it also was contemplated, as much as with any view towards anticipating the designs of the Maharras, a subsidiary force of six battalions of the Company's infantry, five regiments of horse, and a proportionate number of artillery, were forthwith to assemble at Nagpour, in the dominions of the Rajah of Behar, under the command of Colonel J. Adams; and Col. Frith had been appointed to the second division of the army in the field.

NEW-YORK, June 7.

FROM THE SPANISH MAIN.

A letter from the Island of Trinidad, dated May 11th, to a respectable house in this city, describes the success of the Patriots as follows.

The troops which had recently arrived with Morilla from Grenada (Old Spain) passed the Oronoko and formed a junction with the royal troops in that quarter, amounting in all to 2000, whence they marched to attack the patriotic General Piar. On coming up with him Piar feigned a retreat, and induced his adversary to pursue him to a position he had fixed upon, when he halted, and a desperate battle ensued. Eight hundred of the royal troops were left dead on the field, and many taken prisoners. Morilla escaped, and at the last accounts was at Caracas. Only 150 of his troops had reached Guayana. Bolivar the supreme chief of the republican army, had recently been at Guayana where he had an interview with Piar, after which he repassed the Oronoko, taking with him 2000 horses. All the country from Apure to Barcelona and Cumana (the two last mentioned cities, excepted) is in favour of the patriot cause. Piar is at Vargas. It is expected he will soon attack and take possession of Calabozo, there being no force at that place to oppose him. A detachment of Marino's army is besieging Cumana; the residue are before Barcelona. Every thing goes on well, and it will not be long before the independence of the country is completely established.—*Mer. Adv.*

So far, the Proprietors feel the strongest confidence in her powers, and that she will fully equal their most sanguine expectations. She proceeded at the rate of 6 1/2 miles an hour against a strong head wind. It was reported in Kingston, that Gen. Wellington would proceed in her to this place on Tuesday or Wednesday last, and she may now be hourly expected. Apprehensions were entertained that her size was much greater than would be necessary for the navigation, but it is now proved that a smaller vessel of that description would not be able to encounter any severe weather on the Lake, as is shown by the American steam-boat, which has been compelled repeatedly to put back for shelter; her last trip, it was confidently asserted, would be performed in seven days, but was not effected in less than thirteen, it being found that she could not make way through a heavy swell.

**QUEBEC, JUNE 24 1817.**

EUROPEAN dates have not varied since our last. There is much consolation, however, in the latest advices, as that best of tranquilizers, employment, was progressing in a manner to silence the calls of hunger, and, consequently, to restore order in society, where confusion had lately too much prevailed. The alarming effects of a change from long and continued war to a state of peace, had begun to subside, and the world was in a fair way of sinking into that sedate calm whose gratifications must be the greater in proportion to the degree of turbulence which had preceded it. The fangs of the designing have been completely drawn, somewhat violently it is true, but certainly successfully. A diminution of a redundant population by emigration, so as to leave no greater burthen than society can bear, cannot fail of restoring the equilibrium into which the world must and will settle in due time. Where there is a void, there population, like the elements, must rush. The earth offers abundant soil to all. If men perish, it is by being crowded into too circumscribed a space. The remedy is, to expand themselves.

We have much satisfaction in learning, from the *Herald*, that His Majesty's Consul from New-York, has been making arrangements in Montreal, for the accommodation of settlers, who may make choice of the Canadas for their future resting-place. Messrs. Jones Molson & Son, proprietors of the first steam-boats that navigate the Saint Lawrence, have liberally agreed to afford Settlers transport on the most easy terms to Montreal, on their way to Upper Canada. Each Settler is to be allowed to take nearly 200 lbs. luggage, instead of only 60, the usual allowance to travellers. The whole expense for each grown Settler, will be 20s. from Quebec to Kingston, and 1s. 3d. more to York. Children, half-price. It further appears, that Messrs. BOURGEOIS & NOUVEAU, have made equally generous offers on behalf of settlers, who may be accommodated by them with excellent provisions, in small quantities, at the wholesale prices. These are laudable examples, and will, we doubt not, have beneficial results, as well to Great-Britain and the Canadas, as to the individuals who receive the assistance.

As to what follows, we will allow the *Herald* to speak for itself. "While we rejoice in these beneficial regulations, we are not without hope, that their effect will be of permanent utility to the settlers, and consequently to these fine Provinces. Whilst we are thus indulging in ardent expectations, we cannot but reprobate a fatal delusion that is too often successfully practiced by ship owners and masters in the British and Irish ports, to force the unsuspecting emigrant of his money. In Irish and Scotch papers, we see vessels advertised for the Islands in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Nova Scotia and Halifax; these advertisements, state to people wishing to emigrate to Canada, that the ports, such vessels are bound for are on the high road to the place they wish to arrive at; while every informed man knows, that to come from Halifax, St. Johns, Pictou, Prince Edward Island, &c. to Quebec, will cost as much as to come from Britain or Ireland direct. It is earnestly to be hoped that these facts may be generally known by all ranks in the mother country, that the people may not be led astray by the cunning of American agents, and the cupidity of the British ship masters and owners. Canada begins to be known at home, but we are sorry to say least of all by ministers, who ought to be the best informed of the relative value of every part of the Empire."

We observe, by the Upper Canada papers, that His Excellency Lieutenant-Governor GORE is about embarking for England—it is said on his private affairs. He has been addressed by the Judges, Magistrates, and other inhabitants of York. They compliment him on the wisdom of the measures by which he has preserved the province to be a truly British colony. This is a point on which His Excellency abruptly put an end to the last session of their Legislature, the House of Assembly having formed resolutions in favor of American settlers, on their taking the oath of allegiance. The Lieutenant-Governor, in his answer to the Address says, "I regret that there should have existed two opinions on the policy of maintaining a purely British population in this Province; and it is certainly gratifying to me to find that my sentiments and conduct in this respect, meet your approbation."

The only question that arises in our mind on this subject is, whether the peculiar strength and dexterity of the American arm, in wielding the hatchet in a wilderness, would not be of more benefit to a new country, than the politics of his mind could possibly injure it, when governed by any thing like a British constitution and British Laws, and these well administered?

On Wednesday last, the Honorable Lieut. Col. SMITH, and the Officers of the Third Battalion Quebec Militia, gave a Dinner at the Union Hotel, to Col. BURNS, their late Commanding Officer, in testimony of their approbation of his conduct during the interesting period of his command.

All the Officers appeared in uniform in honour of the day, and the Colours of the Battalion were displayed at the head of the great Hall Room, fitted up for the occasion.

At six o'clock, the company sat down to an elegant repast, prepared by Mr. O'Hara, consisting of the best of every thing that the country and season could afford.

When the cloth was removed, the following toasts were drunk, with suitable demonstrations of the sentiments of the company, the Band of the 10th Regt. with which the corps had been politely favored by Col. SMITH, striking up the tunes annexed.

1. The King—God bless him. God save the King.
2. The Prince Regent. Prince Regent's March.
3. The Queen and Royal Family. Queen's Birth Day.
4. The Princess Charlotte of Wales, and her august consort Prince Leopold; may this auspicious marriage prove a blessing to the nation. Prince Cobourg's March.
5. Duke of York and the Army. Duke of York's March.
6. Duke of Clarence and the Navy. Rule Britannia.
7. The Duke of Kent, the war and decided friend to the interests of the British American Colonies. Duke of Kent's March 8th Regt.
8. The Duke of Wellington and the Day—being the anniversary of the ever to be remembered battle of Waterloo—a lesson to usurpers, an assurance to legitimate governments, and a leaf eternal in the wreath of British glory. See the conquering hero comes.
9. His Excellency Sir John Coape Sherbrooke, our highly respected Governor in Chief, and the example he has given through life—an example in every respect worthy of the imitation of all Commanders, both civil and military. March 33d Regt.

Col. SMITH then rose, and addressed Col. BURNS, as follows:

"SIR—Being called to this Chair, I should but imperfectly discharge the duties attached to it, did I not express to you the high sense we entertain of your merits, and of your conduct as a Gentleman. In drinking your health, you may readily suppose, the pleasure is considerably diminished by our regret at your retiring from a station you have filled with so much honor to yourself, and satisfaction to the corps. Permit me, Sir, to offer you this tribute of our esteem, and assure yourself always of the best wishes and most grateful remembrance of every Officer of the Third Regiment of Quebec Militia."

10. Lieut. Col. BURN, our late commanding officer.—March 3d Batt. Q. M.

This toast being drunk with a perfect enthusiasm, Col. BURNS rose, under the strongest emotions of feeling, and returned thanks in the following words:

"This testimony of your approbation of my conduct, while I had the honor of being your chief, I receive with heartfelt gratitude, and the remembrance thereof will remain impressed on my mind till the last moment of my existence. Such a distinguished mark of esteem I did not expect, because I was not aware that I had merited it; but manifested as it now is, on your part, I consider it as one of the proudest occurrences of my life; and I beg leave to assure you, Gentlemen, that I shall always feel a lively interest in any thing that concerns the Third Battalion Quebec Militia. The cause of my retirement, is being advanced in years, and in a bad state of health, and not from any lukewarmness towards the Battalion, for which I always did and ever will entertain the warmest attachment."

To you, Sir, my thanks are particularly due, for the very handsome manner in which you have conveyed the sentiments of your brother Officers and your own."
