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JOHNSON EXTREMELY CRITICAL OF LIBERALS

OVER 650 ATTEND LIVELY NATIONAL UNION MEETING

There was standing room only as more than 650 people crowded into the Tougas Nicholson Hall in Valleyfield last Sunday afternoon to attend the first meeting of the National Union Party Organisation in the county of Beauharnois since the Provincial election in June of last year.

Electing a county Committee executive was the main purpose of the meeting, but Federal and provincial politicians were in attendance in large numbers with the former Minister for Hydraulic Resources, Daniel Johnson as main guest speaker. In his speech Mr. Johnson

now in power and of the patronage which is practiced in spite of what Premier Lesage has been preaching. Mr. Johnson also referred in short to relations between the National Union Party and the Federal Government. He said, "The Union National Party was composed of Conservatives, Liberals and Independents thus making it a truly Provincial Party which looked to Ottawa as their friends not as their masters".

"Difficult To Stand On One Leg"

Mr. Alex Hainey from Beauharnois was the main speaker for the English speaking members in the audience. Mr. Hainey, who recently broke a leg in a skiing accident, remarked that it was difficult standing on one leg but noted that it was rather

sharply criticized the policy of the present Liberal Government. He said that he and a large section of the Quebec population were greatly alarmed about the leftist attitude of many top members of the Liberal Party. He also denounced the great influence of Rene Levesque Minister of Public Works on the French language news broadcasts of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. Mr. Johnson said that he felt that the French network under the influence of Mr. Levesque was giving the Liberal Party preference at the expense of others. Mr. Levesque was newscaster and commentator for the CBC for many years, before going into politics.

Mr. Johnson also remarked that obviously Premier Lesage objected to the opposition opposing government measures. He said that the National Union however would "oppose, oppose and oppose."

The former Minister of Hydraulic Resources said that he, like people in Quebec was greatly concerned about the plans the Liberal government proposed to remove religious instruction from the schools.

(Last Sunday parish priests in many communities preached in their sermons against such steps.)

Mr. Johnson in general spoke of the ineptitude of the Liberals

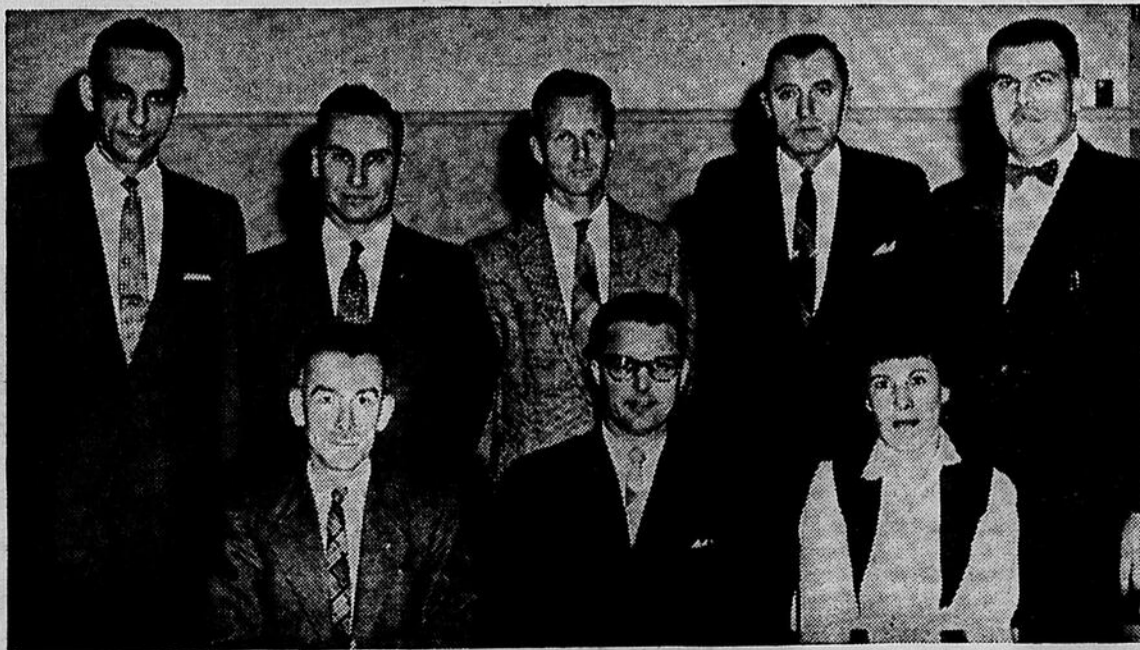
Police Looking For Important Suspect In Recent Murder Case

The Provincial Police are still looking for the murderer of 88 year old Patrick Durnin which took place in St. Stanislas de Kostka on Wednesday April 5th. Two suspects which had been temporarily detained have since last week been released and while hundreds of people have been questioned the police are now looking for a suspect seen coming from the home of Mr. Durnin on the day his body was found. They are looking for a young man between 19 and 23 years of age, 5'7" tall, weighing 160 lbs., black hair combed back, round face and soft skin, wearing a black windbreaker, light blue trousers and small

rubbers. Prints found in the mud near the home show that the suspect was wearing regular rubbers. He was seen by neighbouring farmers over a three quarter mile area.

In the mean time the police are combing the area and leaving no stone unturned in their efforts to find the guilty person.

There is a possibility that the suspect was picked up by a car, a 1952 dark Pontiac on range No. 5 in the morning of April 5th. The police requests that anyone knowing the driver of this car would they contact the provincial police at FR. 3-2222. Also any other information which could lead to the arrest of the murderer should be phoned in to the police to help them in their search.

Many local merchants are becoming alarmed at the shopping habits of local residents. It seems that breadwinners and their spend-thrift spouses are not particularly interested in supporting the homespun counter activities which makes for cosy buying.

Let's face it. The family grocer, cobbler and tailor belong to the old days.

Anonymity is the slogan of the modern shopper. Better to be a digital debtor than a neighborly nuisance.

Speed has displaced the smile and the handshake is now a poor substitute for "prompt delivery."

Shoppers like variety, color and streamlined service. The quality of food, cloth and gadget can't compete with Junior's pleasure when he rides the supermarket's "horsie."

Take away the technicolored labels and the cinematic shelves and suddenly shoppers would realize what they actually wanted to buy.

Provincial Home and School Conference May 5 and 6

A progress report and workshop sessions on "Operation Bootstraps" at the half-way point will highlight the 17th annual provincial conference of the Quebec Federation of Protestant Home and School Association to be held in Montreal May 5 and 6.

The two-year project, set in motion at last year's conference, is designed to give parents a better understanding of what is happening in our schools. It will examine all vital aspects of modern education - its function, scope and purpose.

Over 400 delegates and observers from throughout Quebec are expected to attend the two-day conference. Sessions will be held this year at the new McConnell Engineering Building of McGill University, E. Michael Berger,

conference chairman, pointed out.

The provincial federation consists of 18 Home and School Associations throughout the province, an increase of five from a year ago. These associations have a membership of some 28,000 families - representing over 70 per cent of the families with children attending schools attached to the province's Protestant school system. President of the provincial group is Jack W. Chivers, of Montreal.

Annual conference dinner and installation of the new officers will take place on the Friday night (May 5) this year instead of Saturday as in the past, Mr. Berger explained.

Guest speaker at the dinner will be Kurt R. Swinton, of Toronto, President of the Encyclopaedia Britannica of Canada Limited and chairman of the National Committee of the Canadian Conference on Education.

In urging participation in the

conference activities, Mr. Chivers reminded parents that they have a serious responsibility to understand the methods and purpose of the school system.

"These annual sessions provide a chance for parents and teachers to share their experiences and to make plans for action in the field," the federation president observed.

Further Bell Improvement

At the end of the year, St. Chrysostome and Howick will have a new modern type of telephone service. The exchange designations will consist of 825, for customers living in Howick and or 826 for those in St. Chrysostome. All new numbers will consist of seven figures.

Howick will have a one-story, 53 by 28 foot exchange building; in St. Chrysostome, it will also be a one-storey exchange building, measuring 27 by 43 feet.

The introduction of dial telephone service in these two loca-

lities this winter will give Howick and St. Chrysostome a most modern and up-to-date telephone system. As for the exchange designations 825 and 826, they conform to the new All Number Calling system

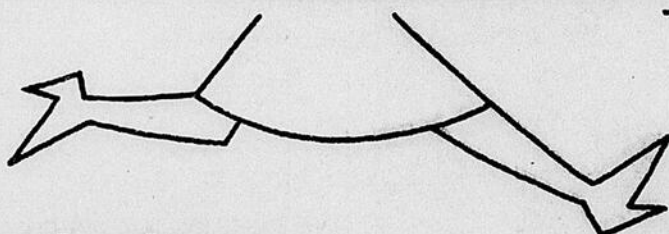

A CHILD'S SAFETY

We all abhor the thought of cruelty inflicted on a child. In our environment, a child's world should be a place of comfort and happy security, and we flatter ourselves that now, more than ever, we have succeeded in providing such a place for our children.

We are saving them from polio, tuberculosis, smallpox, and other dread diseases that have threatened them in the past, and we provide them with more creature comforts and shining baubles than our forbears could have imagined. Yet with all our attentions, all of us who at any time have charge of a child are burdened with the knowledge that nearly 2,000 of our young people are killed in Canada every year by accidents.

Home accidents are taking well over half of this toll of young life, and yet ironically this environment could be made the safest place in the entire child's world. A child's safety in the home depends largely on two things, both of them adult charges. First, he must be protected, as a helpless infant, from such accidents as suffocation, drowning, fire, falls and poisoning. It is the job of the parent to make sure hazards which could cause these accidents are well under control - that the child is not surrounded by pillows and soft bedding, or given toys with small removable parts he could swallow, or exposed to ultra-thin plastic, which can suffocate him. We must be alert in bathing the child, we must lock away poisons and administer medicine with care, we must provide barriers for windows and stairways, and take every precaution against fires. These boil down to the physical ways in which we can make sure a child and an accident hazard don't meet.

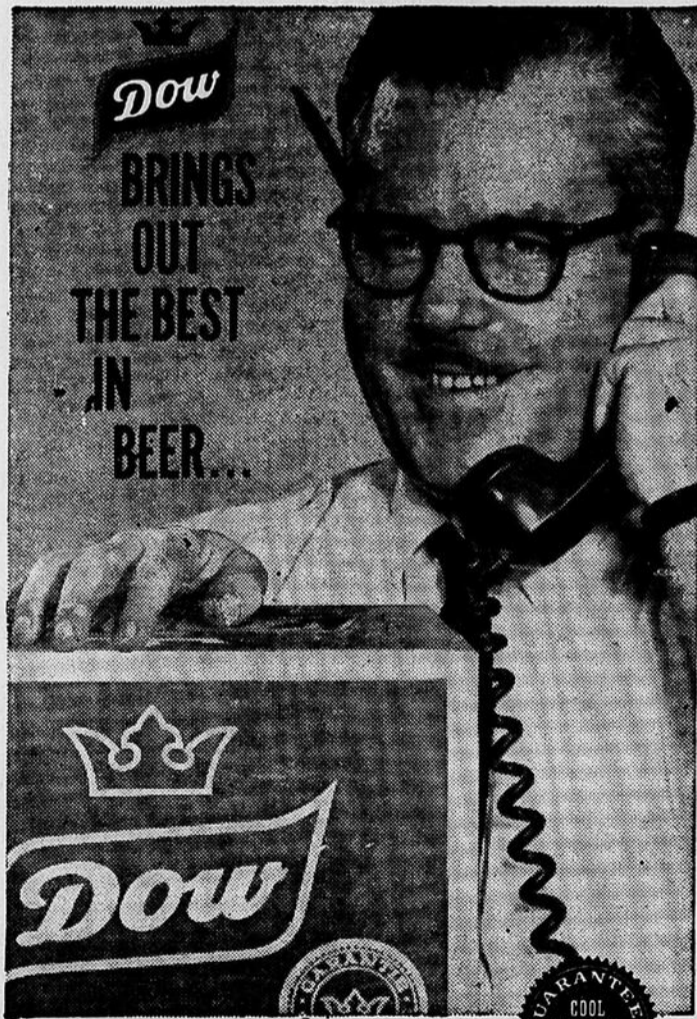
The hall tournaments will be held during the week of May 1-6, exact date to be decided by the individual bowling hall manager. Dow Trophies will be presented each hall champion.

Raymond Leboeuf also did well, he bowled 876 and placed in the "C" category. Claude Gervais was another member on the team.

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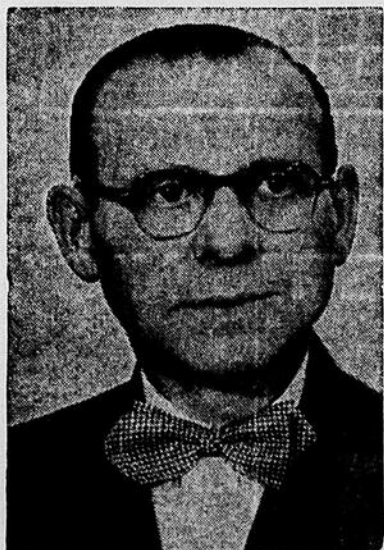

"Safety Limerick"

Boys and girls of the Province of Quebec between the ages of 10 and 18 are invited to participate in the Red Cross Water Safety limerick contest open until May 2. This was announced today by Mr. Donald T. Rose, president of the Water Safety Service and Mr. W.A. Edge, chairman of the Water Safety Committee for the Montreal Branch.

The purpose of the contest is to bring the rules of water safety to the attention of as many boys and girls as possible and also arouse their interest of their parents.

A limerick is a five line verse rhyming A A B B A, for instance:

A "There was a young man called Lou

A Who chased a boat fast and new

B He was not very bright

B And he played with a light

A Now both he and his boat are all through"

Contestants may send as many entries as they wish. But each limerick must refer to one or more of the water safety rules, divided into three categories: Swimming, Boating and at Home.

SWIMMING:

1.—Swim with a friend - don't swim alone.

2.—Know your swimming area - don't dive into unknown water.

3.—Don't "duck" or push bathers into water.

4.—Swim parallel to shore - don't swim far from the beach.

BOATING:

5.—Don't overload any boat, large or small.

6.—Wear a life jacket when boating or water skiing.

7.—Don't stand up or change

places in a small boat or canoe.

8.—If you capsize, "HANG ON" don't attempt to swim to shore.

HOME:

9.—Never play near excavations, open pits, swamps, etc.

10.—Plastic pools may be slippery, be careful.

Eight waterproof wrist watches will be awarded as prizes to the winners and formal presentations will be made by local Red Cross branch representatives.

Entries must be clearly printed in either ink or pencil on white paper.

Limericks must be forwarded to "Water Safety Limerick Contest", The Canadian Red Cross Society, 2170 Dorchester Street, West, Montreal, not later than May 2nd, 1961.

Contestants must print on each entry their name, age and address.

Entries will become the property of the Red Cross and the decisions of the judges will be considered as final. Winners will be announced during National Water Safety Week, May 14 to 20.

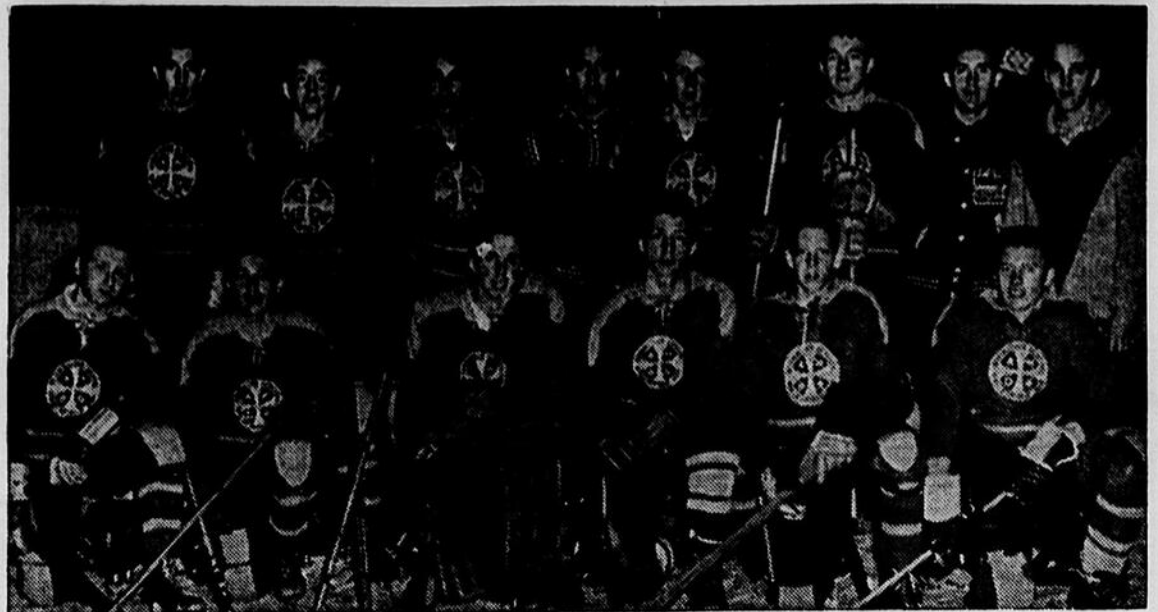

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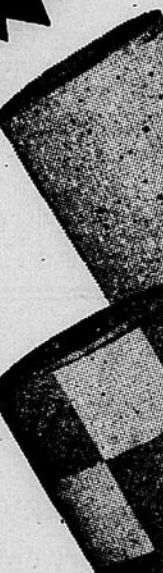
