# Lee Greenwood makes jump from Vegas to Nashville

On Aug. 10, 1981, MCA Records released a single by Lee Greenwood entitled *It Turns Me Inside Out*. The song shot to the top of North American country charts, remaining on Billboard's chart for 22 weeks.

The label followed it with similar success for *Ring On Her Finger*, *Time On Her Hands*, *She's Lyin'* and the recent *Ain't No Trick*.

After 19 years of glitter and gloss on the Las Vegas showstrip, Greenwood was an overnight success in country music — an amazing accomplishment for more reasons than one.

It usually takes a while for the Nashville establishment to accept newcomers, but the Sacramento, Calif., native seemed to fit into the country-music community almost the day he arrived. Why?

"Probably because people in Nashville realize I'm just a country boy at heart," Greenwood

says. "There's nothing different about Nashville and where I was raised, except that the South may be a little more friendly. Also, I'm a hard worker and I think people in Nashville respect that."

A hard worker indeed. Greenwood is one of those rare talents who can do it all, and last year he did it all for 280 days on the road. **STARTED AS TEEN**

But the road is something this 40-year-old performer has been hitting for the better part of his life.

Greenwood's parents split up when he was one year old, and he was raised by his grandparents on a chicken farm on the outskirts of Sacramento. After teaching himself saxophone, he moved to Los Angeles in his early teens and played dixieland, rock, jazz and soul with various bands.

But the influence of Central California country music was part of his makeup, and when he was 14 he landed a job playing saxophone in *Del Reeve's* band, his first stint with a country unit.

Las Vegas, however, was closer than Nashville, and in 1962 Greenwood took his own band to the sparkle capital of North America. For the next 19 years he worked as a musical arranger, band leader, jingle writer, backup singer and piano-bar performer.

And that brings us to the second reason for surprise at his rapid success in country music. Not only

has he been accepted by Nashville, but his live shows have won over country audiences.

"There's been a lot of consideration given to my choice of material, the tempo of the show, even the way I dress and talk," Greenwood says. "I have to be very careful not to be too quick with a country audience."

### WROTE HIT FOR ROGERS

So the West Coast farm boy has established himself by tailoring his talents to the country market. But perhaps even more important, Greenwood has an ace-in-the-hole: He's a songwriter. His songs have been recorded by *Mel Tillis*, *Brenda Lee* and *Kenny Rogers*, who topped the charts recently with Greenwood's *A Love Song*.

Strangely, although he's written more than 100 songs, Greenwood's first four hits were by other writers, but that's hardly a source of frustration to him.

"Not at all," he says. "I submit my material, but let my producer choose the songs for my albums. I don't want to conflict the writer with the singer. I know some artists who push their own songs and burn out quickly."

With four successful singles from his first album, *Inside Out*, Greenwood is hoping to repeat that pattern with his recently released second album, *Somebody's Gonna Love You*, whose first single is *I.O.U.*

In the coming months this ambitious entertainer will do several television shows and there'll be "another year of hard work on the road."

"I'm 40 years old and I certainly don't want to wait another 10 years to reach the peak of my success. I'd like to have it as soon as possible, and I think it depends upon how hard I work. I think I just have to believe in what I'm doing."

# Inuit singer wows them from Baker Lake to Greenland

**YELLOWKNIFE, N.W.T. (CP)** — When William Tagoona sang in Greenland a few years ago, fans grabbed at him as he tried to leave the stage.

And when he played his first record to a disc jockey in Alaska recently, "the guy went crazy."

Tagoona is a pop star throughout the Arctic, a 31-year-old singer, guitarist and song-writer from the windswept Inuit settlement of Baker Lake, in the Central Arctic west of Hudson Bay.

Most of his songs are in Inuktitut, the Inuit language, and "it is the language that gets to them," Tagoona says, accounting for his popularity.

But his songs appeal to a non-Inuit ear, too.

A snare drum and steel guitar meshing with Tagoona's melodious, elongated vowels and velar inflections are a sometimes-charming, sometimes-potent mix. **POP-ROCK INFLUENCED**

There are no caribou drums or

chants to alienate a southern Canadian: Tagoona's musical influence comes from Beatle pop-rock and American country-and-western.

His singing style in many songs is somewhere between Donovan and Neil Young.

But how, he asks himself, are music listeners in southern Canada going to hear his records and those of other Inuit musicians who have recently gained an enthusiastic following in the Arctic?

"Distribution is not going well," he says of his first record.

"You can buy it in Germany and at Sam's in Montreal but the stores in Yellowknife (in the western sub-Arctic) haven't even heard of it."

There is more at stake than personal vanity, says Tagoona, a modest man and anything but a self-promoter.

### CUT OFF FROM WHITES

"When I was growing up in Baker Lake 30 years ago, we were a small, isolated community, cut

off from white society.

"(During the 1970s) our native organizations gave us more recognition; people started talking about aboriginal rights.

"But we're going to be recognized, not by having something entrenched in the constitution but by what we can give the South."

Tagoona looks more European than Inuit, with his light skin, steel-rimmed glasses and brown goatee.

# Quebec's own Belgazou 'is going to be a star'

**MONTREAL (CP)** — Talk About It has been the top pop tune on local French-language radio stations for weeks and is breaking through the language barrier on English stations in Montreal, Toronto and Ottawa.

Belgazou, the voice behind the hit, is "going to be a star," said Rob Braide, program director of local CKGM. Her music is "very beat oriented, very street" and Belgazou herself is "a neat person who seems to have it all."

Ivar Hamilton of Toronto's CFNY said French songs don't usually catch on in the city, "but we are getting lots of calls about Belgazou every time we play her" from people wanting to know where they can buy the record.

Belgazou, however, is concerned about the public image the hit is giving her.

"It's young people who like this song and I have many songs with beautiful words and beautiful feelings, songs for older people, for a larger public."

The woman who otherwise freely chats about herself won't say how old she is because, she said, some people don't want to face a woman entertainer's age.

"I don't hide anything else," she added.

She does have a 15-year-old son from an early marriage.

### BORN POOR

She was born Diane Guerin in suburban Lachine to a poor family that moved to the country when she was seven. She said Belgazou was the name French author Colette gave her own daughter. She translated it as beautiful language, although the dictionary derives it from gazouiller — to chirp,

warble, gurgle.

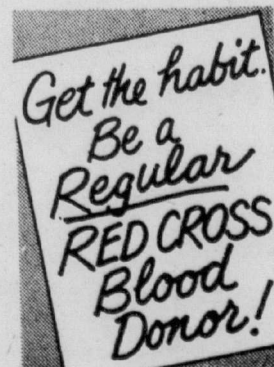
At age 17, she married a man who provided her with a big house and a swimming pool. But five years later, finding herself bored and not ready to settle down, she left her son with his father and set out on her own.

She supported herself working as a bit actress, a dancer, a model and then singing with a friend for four years. She sang with the hit Quebec musical *Starmania* for a year, then developed her own show two years ago.

An impresario saw her perform and took her to France, where she made her one and only album, *Belgazou*, under the label WEA-Filipacchi. It has been released in France, Belgium, Switzerland and Canada.

"I am not afraid to reveal my life and what I feel because I accept myself," Belgazou said. "If people accept me, I like it, but if they don't, it doesn't matter."

"When I do something I don't like, I will try to improve. I am here to grow and to experiment."



# If you can't go to Spain or Portugal ...

Perhaps it is because of the climate or perhaps because of the proximity of the ocean, whatever the reason both Spain and Portugal produce numerous white and rose wines that are excellent for summer quaffing as well as being generally good companions to light summer meals of cold cuts or sea food.

The SAQ presently carries a relatively dry, clear white wine from Portugal called **Dao Grao Vasco**. The Dao, which also comes in red, is ideal for sipping or for a picnic lunch under the August sun. At under \$6 per bottle it isn't too hard on the pocket book either.

Perhaps the most famous of Portuguese wines are its roses. **Faisca, Mateus, Isobel and Casal Mendes** are all usually available in local SAQ stores. All are reasonably light, sparkling and low in alcoholic content thus making a refreshing after work drink, a good base for a summer punch and in some cases a reasonable

accompaniment to light meals. Although all lack any real substance they can be a good buy at prices ranging from \$3.10 for a small bottle to \$5.75 a litre.

Of all the wines of Portugal my favourite is still the **Vinho Verde**. Although Vinho Verde comes in both red and white, it is the white that is available here in Canada. A greenish, semi-dry wine with just a hint of effervescence, Vinho Verde is the product of early bottling thus leaving the wine to ferment slightly while in the bottle. At its best it is a delightful, zesty drink with a low alcoholic level that is perfect for those sweltering days.

Spain too produces some very good wines for summer drinking although by far its finest wines

are the fortified **Sherries** and the aged **Riojas**. One of these is the **Vina Sol Miguel Torres** from the excellent house of Torres. A dry, crisp white with a distinct taste of fruit, the Vina Sol is excellent with summer food and just right for the back yard chef. Another well worth trying is the **Vino Bianco Yago** in its peculiar tall bottle. Both are under \$5 and both good value.

A look at Spain's summer wines wouldn't be complete without a mention of the **Codorniu**. Codorniu is a sparkling white wine made by the methode champenoise and for my money is perhaps the best buy in a sparkling white wine on the market today. Presently it is available in both the Brut (dry) version and the Sec (semi-dry). It is a little more expensive but well worth the extra pennies.

There are others I could mention but these are the best for the money. Next week; Inexpensive French whites. Cheers!

# Beautiful B.C. will get \$60 million from filmmakers in 1983

VANCOUVER (CP) — Dianne Neufeld sells British Columbia to Hollywood by touting its scenery, technicians, talent, and the 80-cent Canadian dollar.

And Hollywood buys as does the rest of the filmmaking world.

In 1983, filmmakers will spend up to \$60 million in B.C. on movies for both theatrical release and television. A lot of that is the result of hustling by the film promotion

office of the provincial Tourism Ministry of which Neufeld, 35, is acting director.

This month there are two films shooting in the province. On location in Vancouver and Stewart is producer Norman Jewison's **Iceman**, a \$10-million production starring Timothy Hutton and directed by Australian Fred Schepisi.

Also on location in Vancouver is a \$2-million made-for-tel-

elevision horror movie, **The Haunting Passion**.

In pre-production is a \$1.2-million pay television production, **Hitchiker**, being made in Vancouver for Home Box Office and First Choice.

"We have 20 projects lined up for the year," says Neufeld. "Even if half of them disappear there's always 15 others that will show up that we don't know about now."

Since the film

promotion office was set up in 1978 under former director Justis Greene, \$174.5 million has been spent on feature film production.

The best year was 1980, when \$52.3 million came in to the province for 15 films including **The Grey Fox**, **Harry Tracey, By Design** and **Never Cry Wolf**.

Last year \$39.8 million was spent and Neufeld predicts 1983 production will at least equal the 1980 figure.

"Justis (Greene) once figured out that for every \$900 spent we've brought in \$1 million," says Neufeld.

The annual budget of the film promotion office is \$260,000. While awaiting the appointment of a per-

manent director to replace Greene, who left last fall, Neufeld works with just one office assistant.

## Magazine touts self-confidence

EDMONTON (CP) — A new national magazine — preaching self-confidence and free enterprise for Canada — and aimed at the right-wing market began rolling off the presses in a small, south-side Edmonton print shop Wednesday.

The **Promise of Tomorrow**, a quarterly of news and opinion, has an initial press run of 10,000, although publisher Bill Campbell, a former real estate developer, refuses to give out actual circulation.

"We hope to have 100,000 subscribers by the end of '84," he said as he put the finishing touches on Volume 1, No. 1. By that time he also hopes to be publishing monthly.

The magazine is the house organ of a group called the **Canada 2000 Project**, a Campbell-organized movement calling for political activism and economic renewal for Canada.

"It's for the average person," the 31-year-old publisher said of the magazine.

# Festival Lac Massawippi is coming and it sounds good

Festival Lennoxville, the ill-fated Townships theatre, may be dead but culture is very much alive and kicking east of the Orford toll-gate. Festival Lac Massawippi is coming your way this summer with a dazzling array of poetry readings, art shows, craft exhibits and concerts.

The brain-child of Eric Scott and Jan Draper, Festival Lac Massawippi will attempt to give local artists and writers the type of public exposure that the enthusiastic duo feel they deserve and presently don't get. In most cases Scott and Draper — who operate under the name Association des Activités Artistique du Lac Massawippi Inc. — insist that participants in the various events need not have previous exhibition experience since the purpose of the series is to not only support local artists and artisans but to encourage participation and to help members of the

artistic community communicate among themselves and with the outside world.

Originally scheduled to start in June, the Festival is getting a head start during National Book Week with three events. On Wednesday, April 27 at 7:30 p.m. there will be a **Workshop on Creativity:**

**How to get started** held in the library of the Lennoxville Elementary School. Sponsored by the Lennoxville and District Women's Centre, the workshop requires no previous experience and all are welcome.

The following evening Robert Allen and Stephen Luxton will

give a reading of prose and poetry in the Staff Lounge of McGreer Hall at Bishop's University. The 8:00 p.m. reading is being sponsored by Champlain College.

Finally, on Saturday and Sunday there will be a book fair at the Saint James Anglican Church Hall in Hatley. The fair will be open from 10 to 5 each day and will feature the works of a variety of Quebec writers both French and English speaking. Two writers will be present at all times to discuss their work and to autograph books. Saturday evening the book fair will conclude with a bilingual reading by four area writers including Ralph Gustafson.

According to Scott, the real events get under when the Festival starts its poetry readings at the Ripplecove Inn. The readings will take place on the first and third Wednesdays of June, July and August. An opening art exhibit will also be held on June 7 at the Saint James Hall Hatley and

all regional artists are encouraged to submit their work for the exhibit. "We're not using any criteria for judging the open exhibit", says Scott so everyone will be considered.

To finance the summer events, the Festival went to the usual sources and "through

the generosity of the federal government" received \$14,000 to offset costs and to hire three summer assistants. The association still needs help however and as Scott points out, "We are presently looking for a baby grand piano. We'll move it, tune it and insure it if

anyone out there is interested in a loan."

## Velazquez — a much needed study

**Velazquez**, by Enriqueta Harris, Cornell University Press.

Diego Velazquez, born in 1599, is considered by many to be Spain's foremost painter. This assessment is primarily based upon the artist's incredibly realistic portrayal of Spanish life in the 17th century particularly through the medium of the portrait.

What is known of Velazquez, the author notes, is taken primarily from two biographies. The first by his father-in-law and painter, Francisco Pacheco and the second by court painter Palomino de Castro y Velasco. Unfortunately what remains in the way of records and documents often

deals with Velazquez as a court official and not a painter.

Enriqueta Harris' book therefore, is a necessary and substantive addition to the study of one of the world's most fascinating artists and perhaps the finest portrait painter of the era.

Although Harris examines in detail as much as is known of Velazquez's early life and subsequent career she manages to keep his role as a painter always in the forefront of the book. By a skilful combination of the artist's own work and the work of contemporaries, she manages to illustrate far beyond mere words the developing technique that was to influence his peers and to

make him the favourite painter of Philip IV.

Most of Velazquez's major autographed works are presented in the book and paintings such as the the equestrian series of the royal family are literally a visual history of the times. Also interesting are many of the works completed during the last years of his life when his paintings took on an almost impressionistic technique such as **Mercury and Argus**.

Harris, a former curator of the Photographic Collection at the Warburg Institute, has given the world a much needed study of Diego Velazquez — both the artist and the man.

## Martha and the Muffins are back but changed

TORONTO (CP) — Getting the album Dansepare by Martha and The Muffins a couple of months ago was like welcoming an old friend after a two-year absence.

But how that friend has changed.

The Toronto-based M and M, emerging from a two-year hiatus after severing ties with Britain's Virgin-Dindisc concern, entered the new year refreshed, solidly supported by RCA and the Current label, a stabilized lineup, a colorful new album and a revamped outlook toward the style it plans to pursue.

Of the band that came together six years ago — making its mark in Europe a good five months before being exposed to its homeland — only Martha Johnson and writing partner Mark Gane remain.

They recruited Jocelyne Lanois, a capable bassist, for their last release (the acclaimed *This Is the Ice Age*) and drummer Nick Kent for this newest endeavor.

To support growing interest in Dansepare, their first album to be released in the United States, Martha and The Muffins will embark next week on their first major U.S. tour in three years, to be followed by appearances in Britain and, in July, Canada.

### HAS TAKEN TIME

"In effect, it's really taken two years to get our act together, break it down by parts and build it up again," says guitarist Gane. "I think that process started after *Trance and Dance* (their second LP and one which they'd rather forget), and *Ice Age* happened in the middle of it. This album is like the first one where everything's been settled.

"It's a band that enjoys playing and everyone's really excited about what we're doing, whereas there were always some people bitching about this or that before. Now we've got a record company that believes in us and we've come through that period. But it meant changes and different

attitude."

Part of the new attitude concerns what Gane and Johnson consider a general stagnation of the rock form. That prompted them to take a closer look at the experimentation of '80s new music, particularly Third World rhythms.

"The newer bands, and smarter old ones, realize that even though rock music is still very popular and heavy metal still sells in the millions, it's bankrupt as a creative medium," says Gane. "People are getting tired of the same old riffs and things, and I think (the new Muffins direction) is just a desire to get out of the conventions of pop music."

In fact, the guitarist adds, most of the concerts he's gone to see in the last decade have been "new music, weird stuff," because "that's where you get ideas for sounds and textures."

# Betty Oliphant - 25 years building National ballet school

TORONTO (CP) — If Betty Oliphant hadn't devoted almost 25 years to building one of the world's most renowned classical ballet schools she probably could have been a whiz as a property developer.

As it is, she has parlayed an initial holding of an old Quaker meeting hall into a sven-building complex, gradually taking over adjoining houses in downtown Toronto for a library, classroom-studio and a charming cafeteria with old fireplace and bright stained-glass windows.

There also are renovated residences, the whole thing linked by underground walkways and brightened outside by little patios and gardens. Now she has her eye on a new theatre in time for the 25th anniversary in 1984.

Quite an accomplishment for a school where talent is the only criteria; poor kids are as welcome as rich.

As founder, principal and artistic director of the National Ballet School Oliphant is busy with the annual school concert and the springtime ritual of coast-to-coast auditions, which bring far more groans and sobs than joy.

But she took a break recently, sitting in her sunny, elegant but tiny office, to chat frankly about such things as retirement (she's against it, for herself), homosexuality in ballet, the incredible pressure she's sometimes under from influential parents and her reputation as something of a dragon.

Young hopefuls rejected by her, and others who have lived under her domain, may have reason to perpetuate the dragon lady epithet.

And she is not without her more serious critics — people who say she uses her amazing strength of character, charm and forceful personality to get her own way, manipulate her board of directors and dominate associates.

"I don't think you can be in my position and not be criticized," she says. "It's part of the job."

But she has great affection and understanding for those who can't get in the school or, even worse, get in and must leave "because of lack of drive or determination or because they grow too tall or too heavy." She shared that agony with her daughter and "I know what she went through."

The school — not connected with the National Ballet of Canada — probably gets more international accolades than any other Canadian institution. And Oliphant has been showered with awards and was one of the few westerners ever invited to teach a graduating class of the Bolshoi school in Moscow.

Her graduates are a Who's Who of Canadian ballet — Karen Kain, Nadia Potts, Frank Augustyn, Vanessa Harwood, Veronica Tennant — and many others signed to companies abroad. With this kind of reputation, thousands of young hopefuls clamor each year to get in. Only about 100 even get selected for summer school tryout and of these only about 40 are accepted.

Oliphant and vice-principal Carole Chadwick judge the youngsters like livestock at a fair, looking first at the physique and bone structure, then the flexibility and finally the child's response to a teacher in taking correction and instruction.

If it all seems a bit heartless, Oliphant says she can sleep at night because by nipping in the bud a career that isn't going anywhere she is doing the child the best favor

anyone ever will.

"We talk to the parents. Most agree they don't want their child to go into a career that is going to be full of disappointments."

Tall and white-haired, wearing a vivid red blouse and black slacks, Oliphant is British-born and got her early training in London. During the Second World War she married a Canadian and had two daughters, Gail, who now teaches at a business college, and Carol who does research for a drug addiction foundation.

## OPENED SCHOOL

The family moved to Canada for treatment of Carol's tubercular spine. When her husband left, Oliphant became the breadwinner by opening her dance school. Later she was ballet mistress in the young National Ballet and then became principal of the new National Ballet School, beginning with 27 students. The school now has about 200, including 93 in residence.

She introduced Carol to dancing to strengthen her spine but it was too much for her. "I didn't know she would be so talented or so in love with ballet," she recalls. "It was tragic and I know what she

went through so I'm very understanding of children who have to give up."

She takes great pride that the school in recent years has increasingly attracted many good, strong male students after a long time when public opinion was afflicted by "the whole homosexual connotation."

"It's absolutely ridiculous to think all ballet dancers are homosexual," she says. "Anyway, I don't think it matters if they are or not."

"The students we get are at a very susceptible age, often uncertain. That's why we are careful to have a healthy atmosphere with lots of counselling and psychiatric consultants and a lot of channels for kids to communicate their feelings."

She says the school, covering grades 5 to 12, has a French-English system which equips graduates for any walk of life if they don't make it as dancers. Several graduates went on to become doctors.

Fees for resident students range up to \$3,300 a year. Some parents

can pay only one-half, one-third or even nothing, she says.

"Sometimes we've been asked to take the children of really, really influential politicians but we never accept them unless they are talented. I think people respect me for that. No one wants their child going in for something they are not going to do well at."



Who knows whether the next student will be another Frank Augustyn or a Karen Kain?

## Enrolment for writers abounds despite hard times

YELLOWKNIFE, N.W.T. (CP) — The Muse is not tied to six-and-five restraint.

On the contrary, in the midst of recession, poets abound.

"Enrolments in writing courses have mushroomed across the country," says Gary Geddes, coordinator and professor of creative writing at Concordia University in Montreal.

"People are saying: Since I'm going to be broke anyway, I might as well do what I've always wanted to do — write."

Economic pressures and international tensions make writing almost necessary, he says. "There comes a time, if you don't analyse, you go crazy."

Geddes was in Yellowknife in his self-described capacity as cultural missionary — giving public

readings, speaking to high school students, offering advice to a fledgling publisher and generally whipping up enthusiasm among the group of aspiring writers who invited him North with Regina poet Lorna Crozier.

### WHY ENCOURAGE?

But why encourage new writers when they can't get published; when as Geddes says, "pressure on the arts in general is very severe"

He considers the question between sips of coffee following a dog-sled ride across Yellowknife Bay, the temperature outside 35 C.

Geddes acknowledges that the big publishers have become reluctant to take risks. They concentrate on the block-buster novel, publishing literary works of fiction and poetry "only as a token gesture, to get government

grants."

Few of the books are properly distributed, he says. Fewer are sold.

So he is teaching a new course in editing and publishing, and encouraging students to think of starting their own presses and magazines.

"Most people (who take creative writing) find out they're not writers," he says.

"They should be encouraged to promote the arts, to become editors or publishers, rather than slinking off and feeling that they've failed."

Geddes has written six books of poetry, five literary anthologies, a critical work on Joseph Conrad and a novel. His book of poems, *The Acid Test*, won the Canadian

Author's Association Award in 1981.

### BECAME PUBLISHER

He also became an editor and publisher three years ago by launching, from his university office, a subscription press called *Quadrant Editions*.

Subscribers will soon be offered Series 4, a list of nine soft-cover books from which they can pick six for \$30.

The list is not yet final but the accent, as in the past, is on literary works — the early prose of Leonard Cohen, a play by Mavis Gallant, a collection of short stories by new writers.

"For the first time, at least one book in the series will come from the socio-political realm — *Two Worlds: The Immigrant Experience*, by Milly Charon of

Montreal, a book of "incredibly moving pieces and remarkable experiences," Geddes says.

In three years, Geddes plans to pass *Quadrant* on to a friend and get on with his own writing.

"The intellectual community in Canada is so small. I always feel tremendously compelled to do something."

Decrying the lack of social and political analysis in the country, he has in mind a book on the little-known story of Canadian soldiers sent to Hong Kong in the Second World War, when politicians and generals knew full well most of the men would be slaughtered or taken prisoner.

"It was a political ploy," Geddes says, "designed to draw blood and help conscription."

# Montreal dancer has dream come true playing Astaire

MONTREAL (CP) — Top hat and tails swirling, John Stanzel makes a personal dream come true in a new production by Les Grands Ballets Canadiens paying tribute to legendary hooper Fred Astaire.

Although the com-

pany will back him up with numbers from Astaire's greatest hits, Stanzel, the bearded, 60-year-old grand gent of the tap dancing scene, is the focal point of the work, one of four new pieces the troupe will perform for three nights starting tonight.

It was Stanzel who inspired choreographer Brydon Paige, and it is he who has worked out his own tap routines and drilled an ensemble of male dancers to recreate some of the magic and flavor of the old Astaire-Ginger Rogers movies.

Stanzel, who began tap dancing at the age of eight, says Astaire's smooth film performances inspired him. In 1945, he abandoned his stenographic job to try to make a living out of dancing, shocking his friends and relatives.

"They said I was out of my cotton pickin' mind," he recalls. "But the dance had really taken fire in me. Besides, I was really only responsible for myself and it was sink or swim."

**FOUNDED BALLETS**  
Dancing wherever he

could, Stanzel joined Ludmilla Chiriaeff in the early 1950s in founding the dance company which later became Les Grands. He had no ballet training. "I couldn't jump but they were desperate for boys."

He still can't jump. He

never became a ballet dancer although he has held major character roles during the past quarter century.

Last fall, Stanzel suspended his bread-and-butter jobs teaching dance to devote every moment to the Astaire work.

# Children's festivals abound from Toronto to Vancouver

TORONTO (CP) — Entertainment for kids is a booming business in Canada, as evidenced by the big children's festivals that have spread east from Vancouver in recent years and are attracting performers even from overseas.

The Toronto Harborfront leisure area along Lake Ontario, which surprised itself by attracting more than 40,000 children, parents and teachers to its premiere festival last year, has lined up 15 companies for this year's presentation May 17-23, taking in the Victoria Day holiday weekend.

The 1983 version, produced with the help of the renowned Van-

couver Children's Festival which started six years ago, again will offer some of the world's best in children's theatre, music, mime, puppets and dance.

The idea has flourished to the point where a core of international companies find it worthwhile to visit Canada to perform first at the Vancouver festival May 2-8 and then move on to Edmonton May 9-14.

After the Toronto show they go to Winnipeg May 26-29 and now Montreal is hoping to get into the act with a festival in late May or early June.

**SUPPLEMENTS FESTIVALS**

Each city sup-

plements the international performances with national and local shows and the combined production cost for all the festivals is estimated to run well over \$1 million.

Typical of the Canadian content is Al Simmons who, all got up in clown outfit, has been working festivals for years but thinks of himself as more than just a clown.

"I call myself an entertainer," he says engagingly, and it all started back in the dark and dismal days when he worked grubby bars.

"It seemed audiences were always into drinking and talking and not watching and I had to devise strange ways to get their at-

tention — crazy hats, roaming around the audience and bringing people up on stage."

From that he graduated to kids — "I like kids better than drinkers" — and now has a weekly TV show in Winnipeg and has been performing at the Vancouver festival since it started.

He and Debbie Westphal of Harborfront's communications department agree there is a tremendous demand for entertainment for children, saying neither radio, TV or the movies provide the right quantity or quality.

**WANTS ENTERTAINMENT**

Simmons says what people really want is

family entertainment, things for everyone from grandma to toddlers, and that's right down his alley.

"I prefer audiences of kids, adults and teenagers and then I work to somehow melt them all down into one age group, one person almost, all laughing at the same jokes."

"Children's entertainment is a big, largely untapped market," says Westphal. "The festivals have been successful, I think, because parents are more willing to go to them knowing the shows are geared to all the family. Parents these days really are looking for things to do with their kids."

She says the \$4 or \$5

kids pay to see the professional travelling groups hardly scratches the surface of the overall costs, noting that sponsorship comes from the Canada Council touring office and corporate donations.

Some of the acts include Bobby Berky and Friends from New York, England's Moving Picture Mime Company doing The Seven Samarai, the Teatro O Bando of Portugal, a West German group in a show called Don't Be Afraid of Big Animals and the National Tap Dance Company of Canada in The Tin Soldier, to name a few.

Show are from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., except

for a special evening run of Snoopy!!!, a musical sequel to You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown, with tickets at \$8 for kids and seniors, \$10 for adults. In addition, there are a score of free activities, including a big show featuring Goodwin's Balloowins, a storyteller who builds balloon props; ventriloquist John Patterson and his puppets, Cranky Consort, a storyteller with a classical guitar, and other acts.

Other free activities organized by the experienced Harborfront staff include cooperative games, a dressup corner, arts and crafts corner and 10 face-painters on site.

People unfamiliar with Mowat and his work can look forward to something new and original to be irritated by.

Also at 8, but on Channel 12, **George Burns**, **Art Carney** and the late **Lee Strasberg** star as three retired old crooks who take up bank robbing again in their twilight years in **Going in Style**. This is a sentimental but delightful comedy executed masterfully by three great talents. A good bet.

Monday, on Channel 12, it's the return of Philo Beddoe and his orangutan Clyde in **Any Which Way You Can**. This is the sequel to **Anywhich Way But Loose**, which introduced the tough but lovable Philo (Clint Eastwood) and the just-lovable Clyde to an unsuspecting world. The ape steals the show but Eastwood makes the money.

On Tuesday at 9, PBS' great **American Playhouse** series presents the Tony Award winning play **Wings**, by **Arthur Kopit**. The play is the story of a former aviation stuntwoman, **Constance Cummings**, who must now face the tortuous task of trying to recover from a debilitating stroke. Shown through her eyes, we see her confusion, frustration, fear and desperation turn to hope with the help of a caring therapist. This is the stuff that good television is made of.

On Wednesday, PBS hands the spotlight over to the

slightly absurd as, at 8 p.m., it presents **Barbara Woodhouse visits Beverly Hills**. Woodhouse, who became a smash success in England, and then in America with her no-nonsense shrill-voiced approach to dog training, visits such 'celebrities' as **Zsa Zsa Gabor**, **William Shatner** and **Britt Ekland** and meets their pets. She also gets to meet a vet who caps teeth and a dog astrologer (Is it a dogastrologer or a dog astrologer?).

At 9, the yuks continue with political comedian **Mark Russel**. Russel has a knack for turning horrifying news into grist for the humor mill in a wonderfully entertaining way. He must be a busy man these days.

PBS does it again on Thursday at 7:30 with a broadcast of **The Klan: A Legacy of Hate in America**. The show traces the history of the Ku Klux Klan from its earliest beginnings to its recent upsurge in North America. It incorporates vintage film to depict the influence of the Klan in politics and social life in some segments of society. Again the early timing allows parents to help their children understand the consequences of racial and religious hatred.

## Radio

Tonight on **Nightfall** on **CBC Radio** we visit the Polish city of Vilna in 1658. Following pogroms by the locals and an infestation of the plague, the Jewish community feels that things must surely have settled down. But have they? **The Wedding**, written by **Phil Savath** clues us in.

At 8:05 on **CBC Stereo**, **Ideas** continues its **Europe Between the Superpowers** series with a look at the deterioration of the Eastern bloc. Following the Russian takeover of a totally devastated Eastern Europe, socialistic idealism begins the gigantic task of trying to rebuild. This same idealism seems to breed a deep resentment of foreign domination that has erupted from time to time in Hungary, Poland, Czechoslovakia and most successfully Yugoslavia. The show demonstrates how the reimposition of Russian control has nurtured this resentment.

Tomorrow evening at 7:05 on **CBC Radio**, a concert by **Kate and Anna McGarrigle** from **Halifax**. These two **Québécois** have a distinct sound that has built them a large and loyal following over the years. Their songs have been recorded by the likes of **Linda Ronstadt** and **Emmylou Harris** and they have had hits themselves in both English and French. Very good music.

For those who prefer drama, **Saturday Stereo Theatre** presents **The Chopin Obsession**, by **Joy Carroll**. This is the story of a Saskatchewan girl who goes to Paris to study music. She is aided by a student of the great Chopin who comes out of the past for this task. The play stars **Janet Laine-Green** and **Robert Haley**.

On Sunday, at 4:05 p.m. **CBC Radio** presents **A Memory of Murder** by **David Helwig**. A woman heading an international art theft ring feels a mysterious sympathy to a German woman murdered at the end of the Second World War. The feeling of kinship she has turns out to be a not-isolated connection between them.

**Sunday Stereo Theatre** continues its adaptation of Margaret Laurence's **The Diviners** Sunday at 7:05.

On Monday, **Ideas** enters the field of ethics in a four-part series about philosophy and moral problems. In tonight's show, **Genetics**, University of Guelph professor **Michael Ruse** examines the problems posed by modern scientific developments. Other shows, aired also at 8:05 this week, will examine the role of philosophy in business, sexuality and medicine.

### Don January earns his legendary way

**GOLF GREATS** — Don January planned to start taking it easy.

Certainly the lanky Texan deserved some rest after a million-dollar pro golf career that included a dozen PGA Tour victories over 20 years.

Yet his retirement has been postponed. At age 53, he is playing in more golf tournaments than ever — thanks to the new Senior PGA Tour.

January and Sam Snead this week are defending their title at the Liberty Mutual Legends of Golf tournament. TV viewers can watch the old-time heroes compete live on NBC, Saturday, April 30 and Sunday, May 1 (4 to 6 p.m. ET).

"I thought I'd cut back to a dozen tournaments after I hit 50," says January. "But with the senior-circuit tournaments blossoming everywhere, I expect to play in about 25 senior and regular contests this year."

"That's more golf than I've played since I was in my twenties."

The official Senior PGA Tour, open to pro golfers at least 50 years old, has grown from four tournaments in 1980, to seven in 1981, to 11 in 1982.

This season 16 events

are scheduled with total purses of more than \$3 million — nearly a 100 percent increase from 1982.

"The senior circuit is one of the best things that's happened to golf," says January. "It looks as if it's here to stay."

January, who ranks in the top 30 on golf's lifetime money list, first won at the Dallas Open in 1956, the year of his debut on the PGA Tour. His titles include the 1967 PGA, and the 1968 and 1976 Tournaments of Champions.

Going into 1983, his career PGA earnings totaled \$1.1 million.

In 1982, January (who earned \$18,841 during the year on the regular PGA Tour) won \$99,508 on the senior golf circuit — including \$50,000 for sharing first prize in the Legends of Golf tournament.

"It's great getting together with my friends at the Legends of Golf," says January. "It's like a class reunion."

"Palmer, Casper, Brewer and Littler will all be there as well as some real legends like Jimmy Demaret and Gene Sarazen."

For January, the get together is "unusually rewarding."

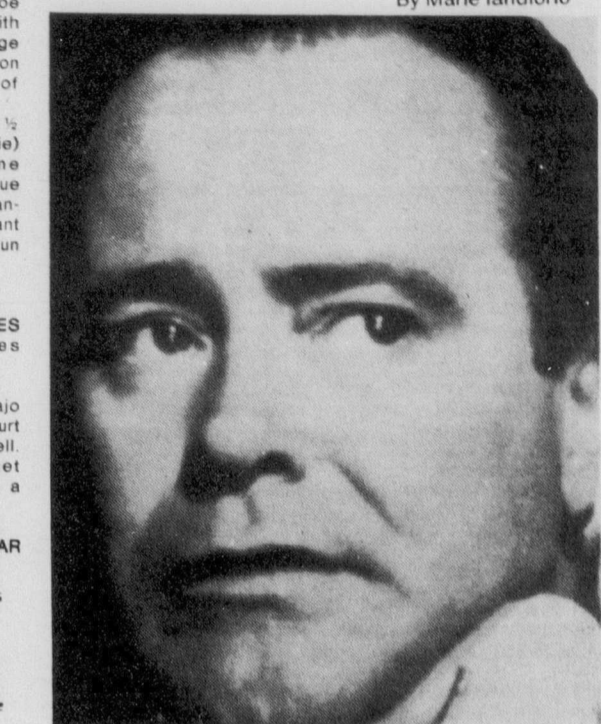

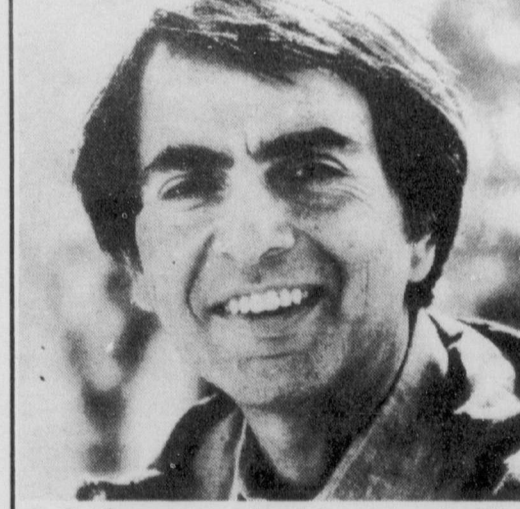

## Sagan's cosmic fugue

How did life on Earth begin? Do other planets have life? In "One Voice in the Cosmic Fugue," the second episode of "Cosmos," airing Sunday, April 24 on PBS, Dr. Carl Sagan, the distinguished Pulitzer Prize-winning author, explores the origin, evolution and diversity of life on Earth, showing the underlying similarity hidden within the variety of living creatures. (Please check local listings for time.)

The "Cosmic Calendar" pinpoints the beginnings of life on Earth and shows the evolution of plants, dinosaurs and mammals. With stunning computer animation, the heart of the living cell is entered to examine DNA, the master molecule of life.

To understand how evolution occurs, Dr. Sagan follows the story of the Japanese Heike crab, which humans have changed in form by selecting which crabs should live and which should die.

Spectacular animation sequences trace the evolution of human beings from one-celled organisms in the primitive ocean. The creatures of other planets, if any, also will have evolved to fit their particular alien environments.

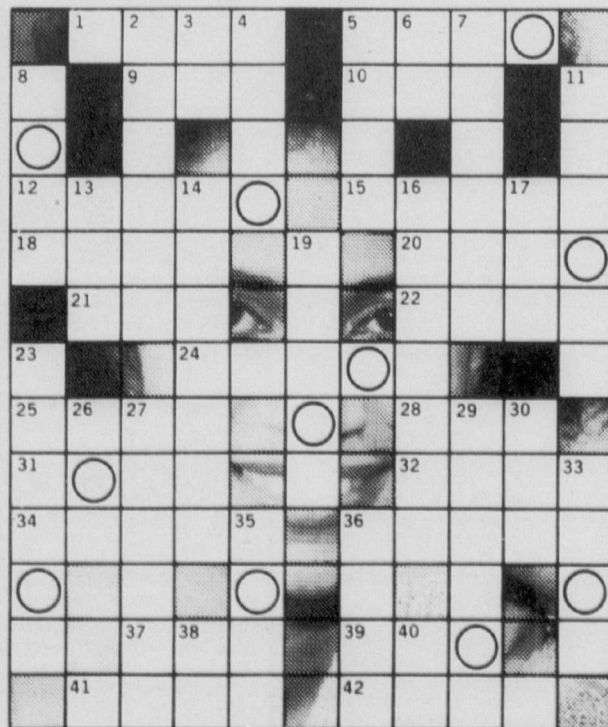

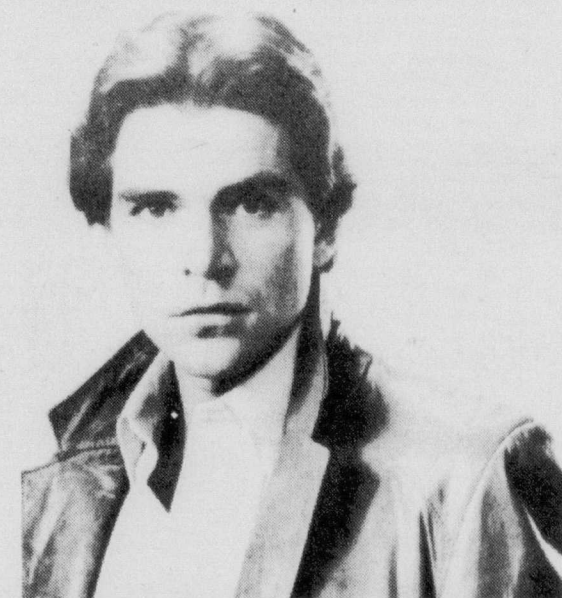

### Fashionable Linda Dano has flair for design

Joan Collins as Alexis Carrington Colby on "Dynasty" may well be the best-dressed actress on television, but she's got serious competition from "Another World's" Linda Dano, who plays flamboyant romance novelist Felicia Gallant.

Felicia's passion for outrageous outfits and high-fashion clothing reflects Miss Dano's longtime real-life interest. A year ago, she turned her fashion flair into a successful sideline business.

"I've always loved coordinating outfits and wardrobes for friends," she says. "A few years back while I was playing Gretel Cummings on 'One Life to Live,' I helped Robin (Strasser, who plays Doran Callison) and Jacque (Courtney, who plays Pat Ashley Lord) create their own personal wardrobes. I've always loved fashion and dabbled in it. So I decided to turn it into a business and it has just skyrocketed."

Miss Dano has created wardrobes for such personalities as tennis star Billie Jean King and daytime actresses Kathleen Noone (Ellen Dalton, "All My Children") and Mary Murray (Becky Abbott,

"OLTL"). She also sells clothing to costume designers of five daytime dramas.

"I'm another store for them," she explains. "Since I'm in the soap business, I know all the characters they have to buy for and it helps. My calling card is that I'm very good at finding things no one else can — from designers no one has heard of yet, to samples, or custom-made items."

Miss Dano does not sell to "AW" costume designer Lewis Brown, but she does assist him in dressing Felicia. "She's the kind of woman who would never be seen in anything twice. Lewis designs a specific outfit and together we jazz it up with all kinds of jewelry and other accessories.

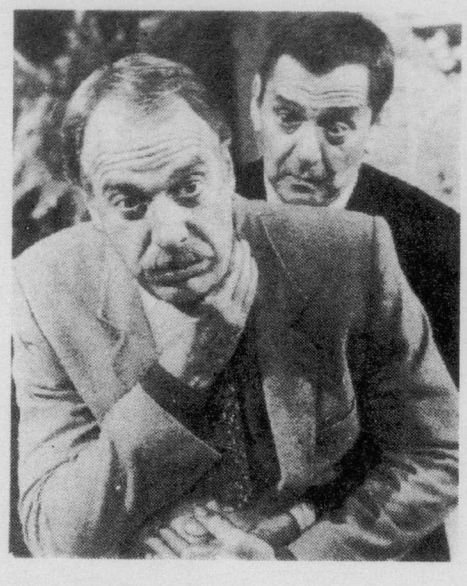
