**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

**JESUS TEACHES TRUE GREATNESS**

February 20  
Mark 9: 30-10: 45.

PRINTED TEXT—Mark 9: 33-39; 10: 13-16, 42-45.

**GOLDEN TEXT.**—The son of man also came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and give his life ransom for many. Mark 10: 45  
Memory Verse: I love thee, O Jehovah. Psalm 18: 1.

**THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING**  
Time—Our Lord's teachings to His own disciples, as recorded in chapter nine, were uttered in Autumn, A.D. 29. All the teachings and events of the remaining part of the lesson took place in February and March, A.D. 30.

Place—Our Lord's announcement about His forthcoming death took place in Galilee. His discourse concerning greatness was uttered in Capernaum. All the rest of the material assigned to our lesson falls in that period of His life which was spent in Peraea.

**Greatness In Men**

"And they came to Capernaum; and when he was in the house he asked them, what were ye reasoning on the way? But they held their peace: for they had disputed one with another on the way, who was the greatest and he sat down and called the twelve; and he saith unto them, If any man would be first, he shall be last of all, and servant of all."

They were ashamed to tell the Lord the subject of their dispute—who should be chief minister. In the presence of Jesus we are all put to silence when we have been proud, ambitious, full of controversial spirit. The thought of the love and humility of our Saviour shames us into silence. What is meant by being great? Jesus answered that greatness lies in character, in service—to love and serve all for Christ's sake.

**In The Name Of Christ**

"And he took a little child, and set him in the midst of them, and taking him in his arms, he saith unto them, whosoever shall receive one of such little children in my name, receiveth me; and whosoever receiveth me, receiveth not me, but him that sent me."

Christ favors and honors those

who receive people who are of small account in the eyes of men. We learn that the will of him who receives Christ is in harmony with the will of God. To see Christ is to see the Father. (John 14:9), to receive Christ is to receive the Father (Mat. 10:40). Not to receive Christ is to reject God himself. (John 12:45-48).

**For Or Against Christ**

"John said unto him, Teacher, we saw one casting out demons in thy name; and we forbade him, because he followed not us. But Jesus said, forbid him not: for there is no man who shall do a mighty work in my name, and be able quickly to speak evil of me."

Christ's words condemn all who are actuated by party-spirit, envy, enmity, uncharitableness. In verse 40 we see that all men must range themselves on one side or the other—with Christ or against him. There is no neutral ground. Christ regarded this man as being with Him, and we must regard as fellow laborers all men who are doing Christ's work in a spirit of love and not of enmity, although they have different modes of working.

**Disciples Rebuke Christ**

"And they were bringing unto him little children, that he should touch them; and the disciples rebuked them." The apostles regarded their master as a teacher and a

No explanation was given but Aftonbladets Berlin correspondent suggested it was the opening shot in an anti-spy campaign. Morrison is now wondering whether the Gestapo is after the

Shadow, or the Shadow after the Gestapo.

Both groups write with an audience in mind because they know that the people are the final judges of their music."

The results of the decisions arrived at in the Quebec meetings will have a large effect on Radio in 1944. You can rest assured however, that whatever decisions are arrived at, radio's people fighting on the home front will continue their outstanding contribution to your entertainment and information as well as to our war effort.

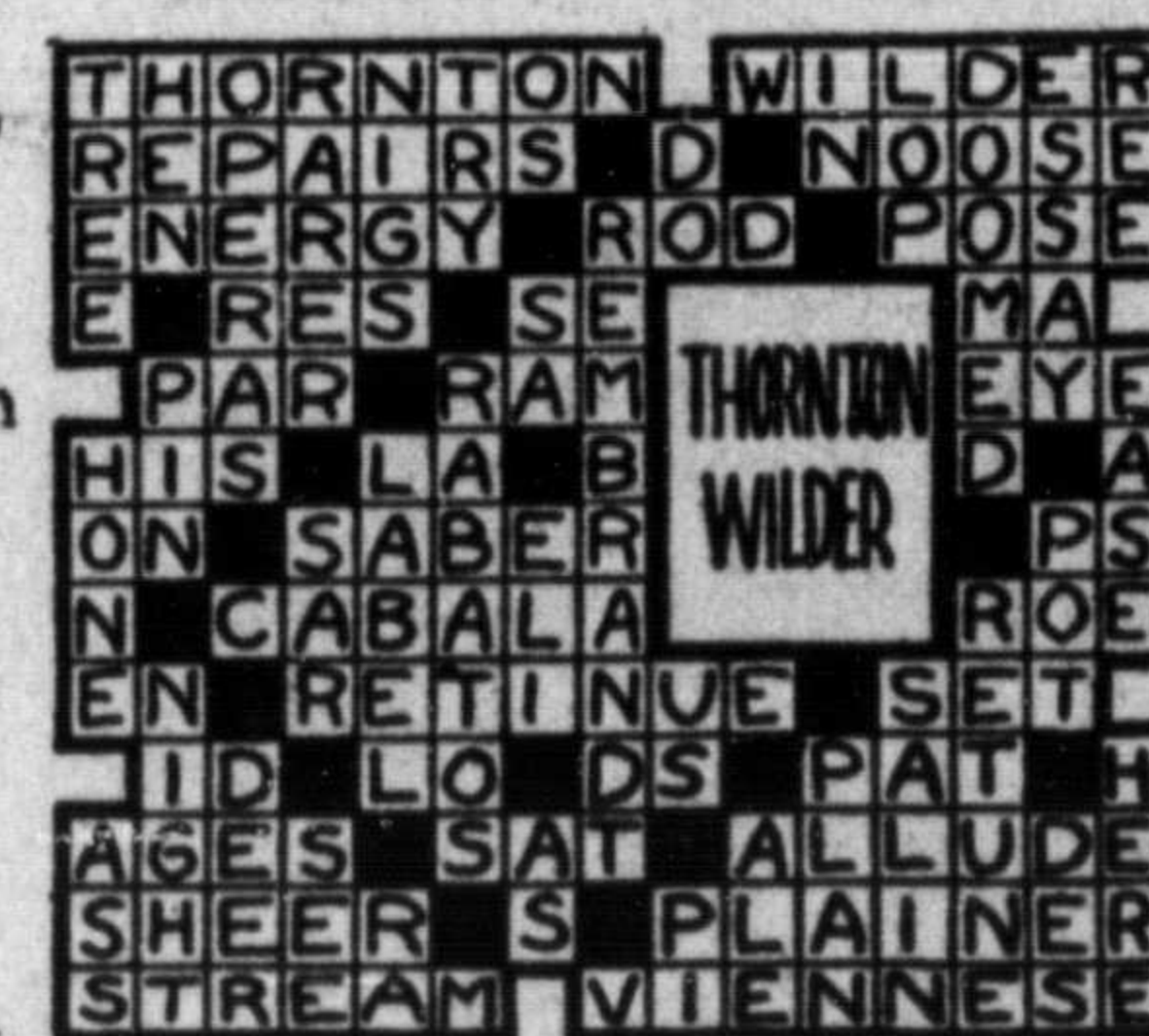

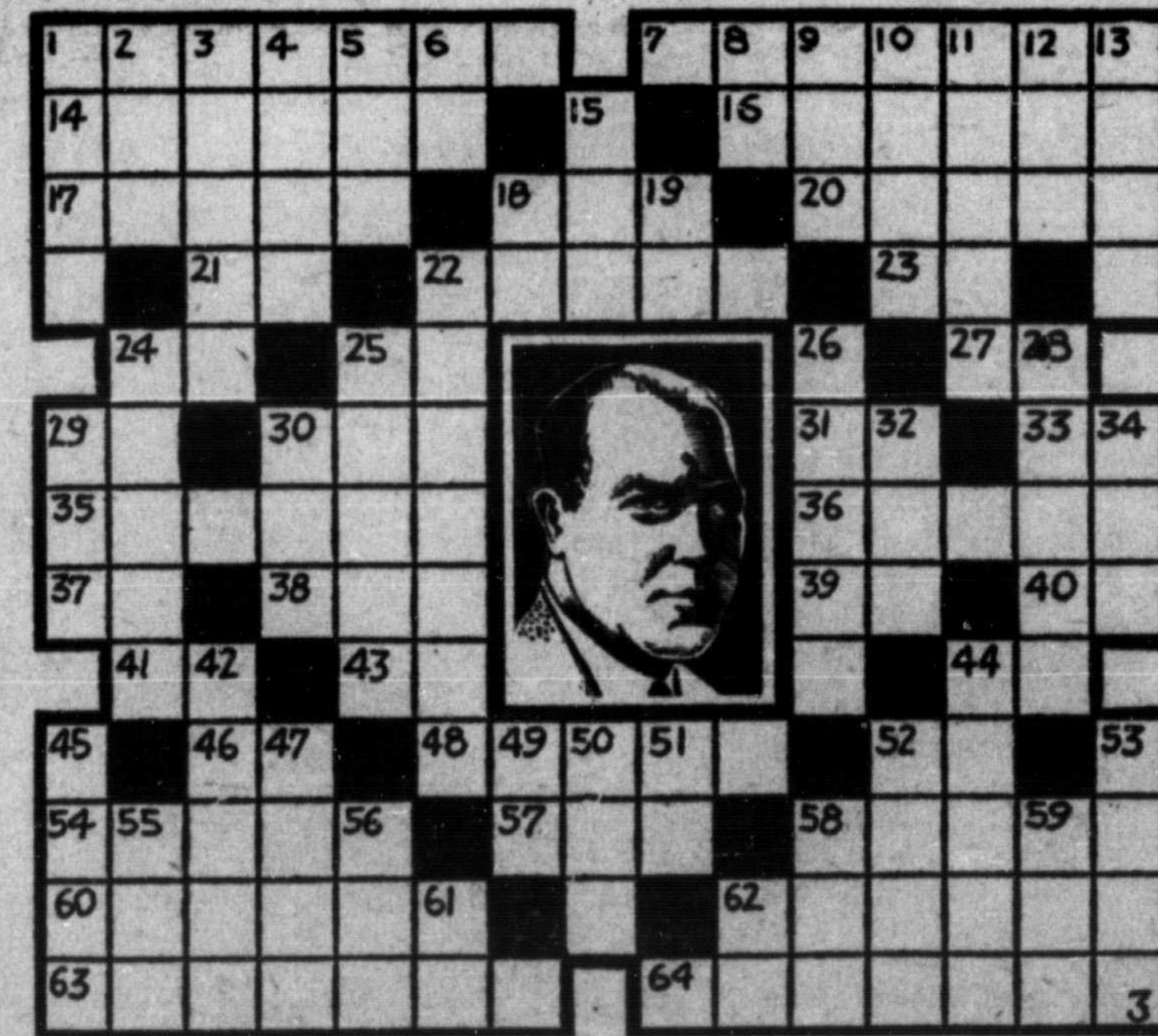

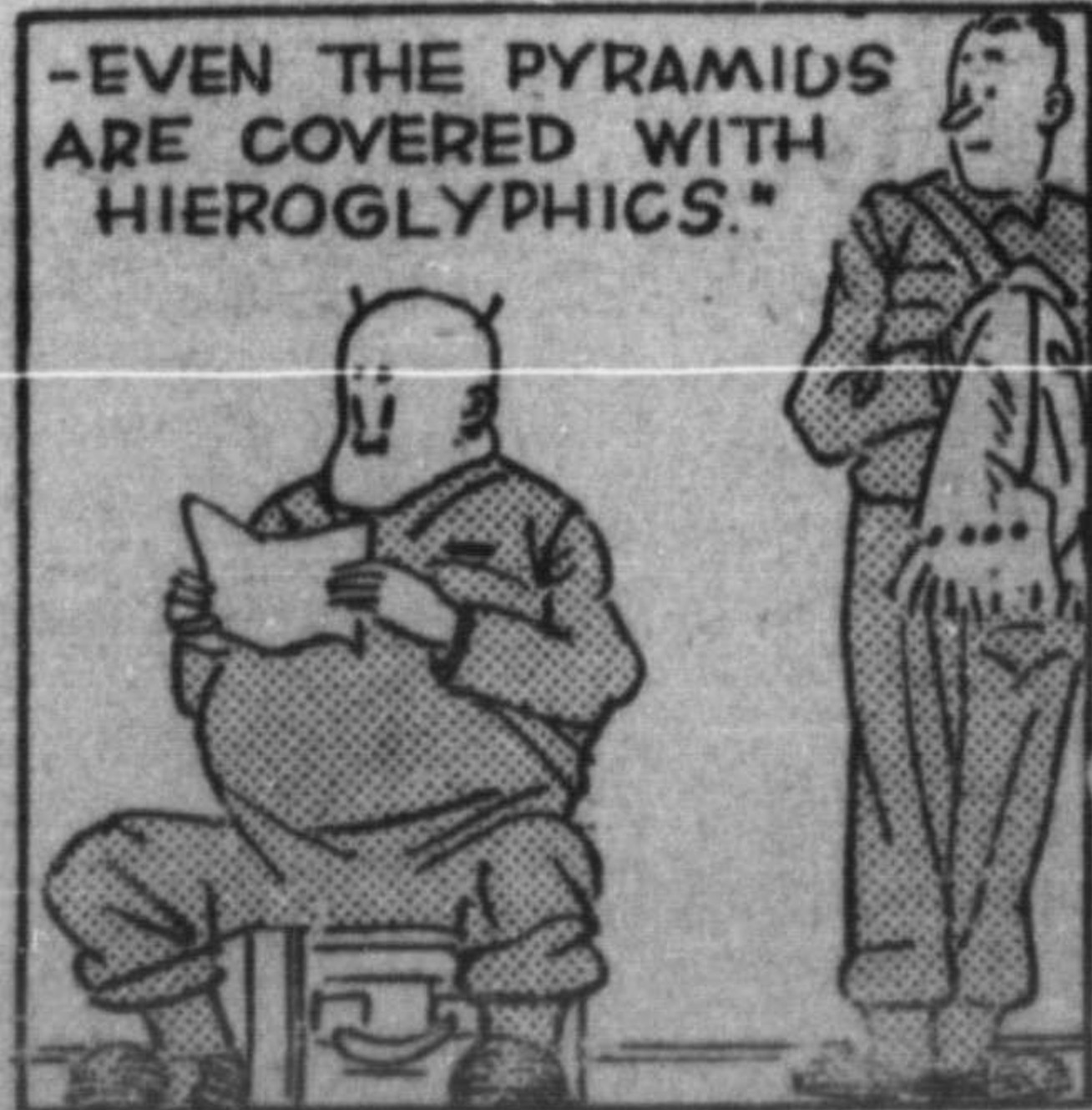

## Nazis Plundering Occupied Lands

The German people have been able to live better during this war than during the last one because they have occupied the greater part of Europe and plundered the countries of their livestock, foods and economic resources, but as this is a process that cannot be continued indefinitely to anything like the same extent, and as they have already lost the great wheatfields of the Ukraine and will soon be out of Russia altogether, the future outlook for food is black, comments the St. Thomas Times-Journal.

Norway, Holland and Denmark have been plundered until the natives live in a chronic state of hunger. The French government in London is in a position to give almost exact figures of direct levies of food by the Germans in France since June, 1940, which reveal the extent of German reliance on looting in one country alone to feed their own armies and people. The Nazis have also "bought" great quantities by means of paper marks.

In spite of the dislocation, removal and appropriation of French industries, Germany imposed a cost-of-occupation bill of \$10,000,000 a day based on a figure of 4,000,000 occupation troops. Notwithstanding the fact that there are probably not more than 1,000,000 German soldiers in France today, the Nazis still demand their \$10,000,000 a day for their maintenance, the balance being clear financial profit.

## Japan Has Great Naval Base At Truk

Truk, the great Japanese naval base, is an objective of the Americans in the South Pacific, relates the Windsor Star. The island group is 900 miles from Rabaul, 2,000 miles from Yokohama, and 3,500 miles from Honolulu.

Truk is a group of 250 islands enclosing a lagoon that measures 130 miles around. There are four small gaps as entrances to this great harbor area, which is large enough to accommodate the entire Japanese fleet. The islands vary in size from a few square yards to a few square miles. But, even the small islands provide emplacements for anti-aircraft guns or heavier artillery.

Germany bought Truk from Spain for £1,000,000 in 1889. The Americans had taken the islands from Spain in the Spanish-American war, but gave them back because they had no use for them. The United States little thought then that Truk would be a formidable naval base to be used against the Americans in 1944. Japan got the islands following the last war.

It is going to take skill and daring to capture Truk. But, it is one of the obstacles to overcome on the way to Tokio.

## Trapped Mink Keeps On Fighting For Life

Mink-life, to a mink, is a good and glad thing. Alan Devoe writes in The American Mercury. Its wild freedom, its stealth and strength, its lusting and exulting, are not lightly to be surrendered. And so, when the hidden trap-jaws clang together on the leg of a mink, what happens is in the nature of a fearful thing. The mink, if it can, will gnaw off its leg in order to go free. If it cannot free itself, there wells up in it such a fury, such a surging compound of rage and hate and terror and malignance and despair, that many a trapper could wish that he had never watched it.

A trapped mink snarls, screams, screeches, froths and spits. It looses from its musky glands a stench that is subtler but more sickening than the odor of a skunk, and it fouls the trap and all the surrounding earth with as thorough a pollution as it can. Until the minute of death, a trapped mink battles to withhold, from an unknown woman in a far metropolis, the pelt which she will scarcely realize came from an animal; and the life which she will scarcely know was ever lived.

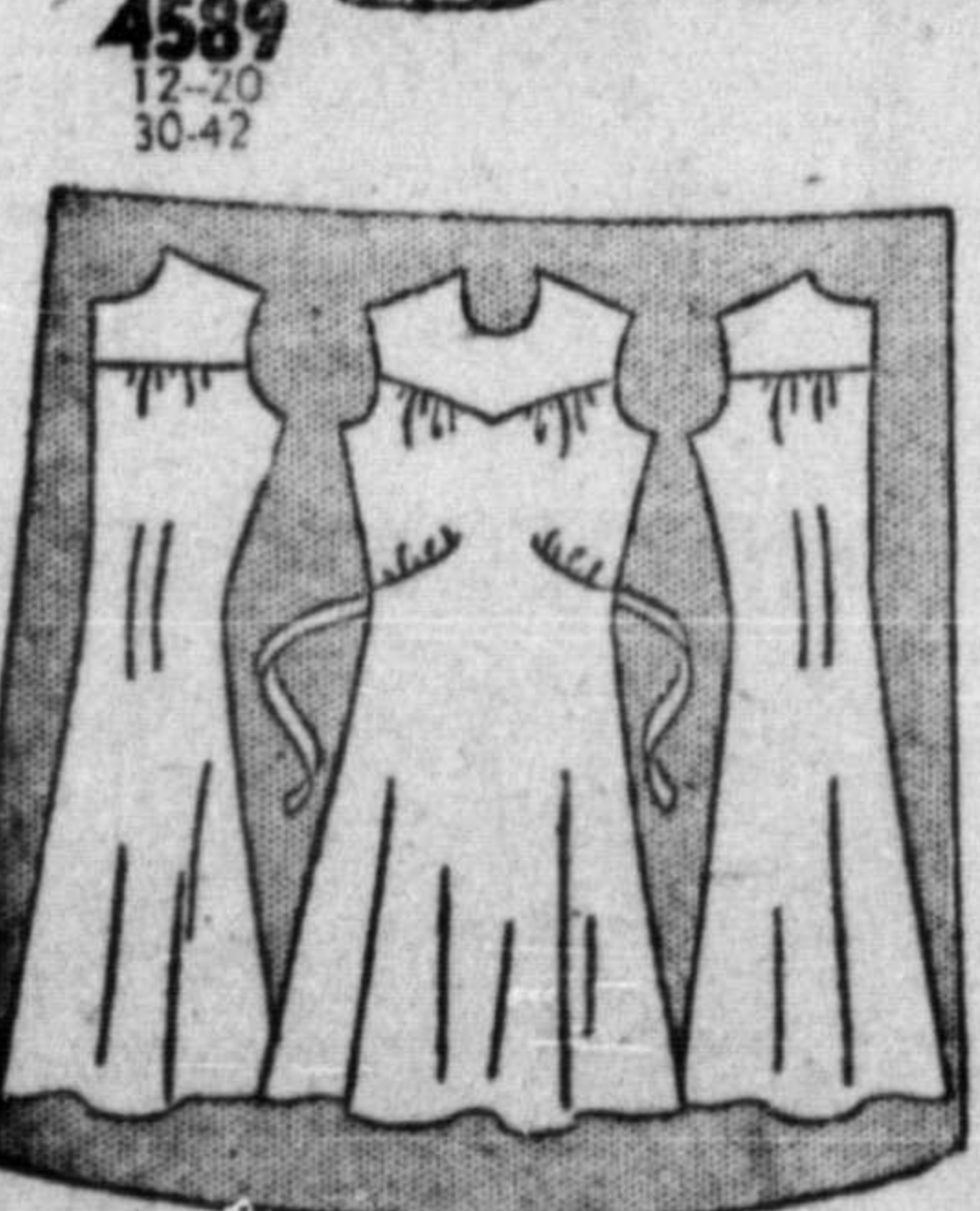
"You devil!" shouted Ferris, springing to his feet. "So that's what you've had in mind, getting me out of the district? I guessed it!"

## TABLE TALKS

### Your War Saving Stamp Recipe

#### FROSTED MEAT LOAF

- 2 tablespoons fat
  - 1 onion, chopped
  - 1 1/2 lbs. chuck beef, ground
  - 3/4 lb. pork shoulder, ground
  - 2 1/2 cups corn flakes, rolled
  - 1 egg, unbeat.
  - 1 tablespoon cornstarch
  - 3/4 teaspoon salt
  - dash of pepper and paprika
  - 1/2 teaspoon poultry spice
  - 3/4 cup milk
  - 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
  - 1 teaspoon lemon juice
  - 4 steamed weiners
  - 2 cups fluffy mashed potatoes
  - 2 medium carrots, cooked whole
- Heat the fat and add the chopped onion. Cook and stir till the onion is tender and golden brown; add all remaining ingredients except the weiners, potatoes and carrots; spoon half the mixture into an oiled loaf pan 9" x 5" x 3". Press the weiners into the meat mixture, laying them end to end and touching. Cover with all remaining mixture, pressing firmly. Bake in a moderate oven; after the first half hour drain off the liquid. When the meat loaf is cooked, invert on a hot platter. Frost all over with mashed potatoes. Score the cooked carrots with a fork and cut in thin slices. Decorate the sides and top of the meat loaf with the carrot slices. Heat again in the oven till the potatoes are slightly browned.
- Temperature: 350° F.  
Time: 1 1/4 hours.

## Gas Pesky Ant Colonies With Carbon Bisulphide

Judging from inquiries and from general observation, ants are numerous this season, particularly in lawns, say entomologists at the New York state experiment station at Geneva. The cheapest and most effective remedy is gassing the colonies with carbon bisulphide, say the specialists.

One treatment generally suffices, the material is cheap and easy to apply, and it does not injure the lawn. Carbon bisulphide is highly inflammable and care must be exercised that it does not come in close contact with a lighted match, cigar, cigarette or pipe.

Ants show themselves in various ways in lawns and gardens, explain the station specialists. Some species build conspicuous nests or "hills," while others cover the wide areas in the lawn with the openings to their underground quarters. In either case, the treatment is the same—gassing with carbon bisulphide—according to a statement from the station.

"The best way to get the fumes of carbon bisulphide into an ant colony," continues the statement, "is to make small holes about 8 to 12 inches deep and six to eight inches apart around and through the infested area. In each of these openings place one tablespoonful of the carbon bisulphide and cover it immediately with soil."

## Expert Says Daisies Carry Potato Disease

Daisies carry the virus that causes the potato yellow-dwarf disease, according to studies conducted by S. G. Younkin of the Cornell university agricultural experiment station at Ithaca.

Formerly clovers were considered the source of this virus, one of the most serious in the state affecting potatoes. Daisies and a few other weeds actually carry the disease, and the virus is spread to potato plants by the clover leafhopper when the insects move to green potato fields from adjoining abandoned fields or meadows. Movement is usually in dry weather or after hay has been cut.

About 45 per cent of the daisy plants in the test fields carried the virus, while only 3 per cent or less of any other weed was found infected with yellow dwarf. Only one clover plant in the test plots was found infected. The disease causes severe crop losses if tubers from infected potato plants are used for seed the following year.

Diseased daisy plants are dwarfed and in spring or fall show rosettes of curled, twisted leaves. During most of the summer they appear normal, except for their smaller size.

## Sea Water Undrinkable Mixture of Elements

How to "unscramble" sea water chemically so that a drinkable, life-sustaining liquid results, is one of the latest discoveries stimulated by war conditions—in this case by the tragic plight of hundreds of mariners and fliers set adrift at sea, many to die of thirst. A kit for treating the sea water, developed by scientists of the navy and other agencies, will be placed in ships' lifeboats and in the rubber rafts carried by overseas airplanes.

From the point of view of drinkableness by man, sea water is just water with an assortment of ill tasting and poisonous chemicals. It is a sort of "world soup" leached and stewed from the bony framework of the earth through untold geologic ages.

Almost every conceivable substance has been washed by rains and rivers into the sea, but some are there now in solution in tremendously greater strength than others. Of the 92 elements that make up the earth and everything in it, 49 have been found in sea water. It is likely that traces of many of the other 43 are there too.

The ease with which materials dissolve is one important factor in what is found in the sea today. Silicon (chief ingredient in sand), aluminum, and iron are the three most abundant solid elements in the earth's crust; but because they are so hard to dissolve, sea water is practically free of them.

## Fresh Fruits Will Yield Good Juices for Canning

Those softer fruits which the homemaker must discard for whole fruit canning will give excellent juice provided they are free from bruises and decay and in no way overripe.

You may use rhubarb, berries, cherries, currants, plums, cranberries, or grapes, preferably locally grown. Fruits from your garden or nearby farms are best for juices, since freshness plays an important role in all successful canning. Red raspberries make an especially fine fruit juice that retains the fresh fruit flavor over many months, even though it may lose some color in time. Wild berries, if sufficiently juicy, may be used and also the wild Muscadine grape if it grows in your region.

To preserve the fruity taste, juice for beverages should be extracted from the raw or slightly heated fruit. Since apples and peaches do not give up their juices readily when raw or slightly heated, home economists do not recommend them for home-canned beverage juice.

Citrus juices are hard to put up at home and take a good deal of sugar. Chemists of the department of agriculture have found in their experiments that citrus juice packed in glass and stored at room temperatures darkened and developed "off flavors."

## Old Man of Sea

The "Story of the Seven Voyages of Sindbad of the Sea," one of the fabulous tales of the Arabian Nights, recounts the strange adventures of Sindbad. On his fifth voyage he met on an island an old man who indicated he wanted to be carried across a stream. Sindbad lifted him to his shoulders but while they crossed the stream the gnarled old fellow wound his legs around Sindbad's neck, nearly choking him, and would not get down. After carrying him for many exhausting days, Sindbad made some grape wine and the old man drank it until he became intoxicated, whereupon Sindbad managed to throw him to the ground, then struck him on the head with a stone until he died.

Later, passengers on a vessel told Sindbad. "This old man who rode upon thy shoulders is called the Old Man of the Sea, and no one was ever beneath his limbs and escaped from him excepting thee."

## Silk Worms Spin Cocoons

American-born silk worms reach their maturity in a month, at which time they get down to the serious business of spinning their cocoons. The worms will spin enough silk within a few hours to conceal themselves from outside view, and will then continue to spin for several days until the cocoon is completed.

Ten days or so later the silk worm emerges as a moth and breaks through the silken shell. Since the moth possesses no chewing mechanism it softens the cocoon by secreting a solvent material and then claws its way to the outside. Ordinarily these moths do not fly, because they have lost the use of their wings through generations of domestication.

## Water Cucumbers

Hills of cucumber, squash and melons can be watered best by first opening a small well to one side where roots and running tops are not disturbed. Refill this at intervals with water. Picking and pruning is important. Pick all fruits of usable size from cucumber vines or they will concentrate on seed production. New and tender growth is encouraged in parsley, swiss chard, and New Zealand spinach by cutting older leaves.

## Naval Academy

Although midshipmen existed in our navy since its beginning there was little formal training for them at first. Placed on ships, they learned by experience or from the chaplain. In 1800 the secretary of war, James McHenry, espoused a plan for a group of schools to instruct the various armed forces. This resulted in the establishment of the Military academy in 1802, but strong feeling that the naval officers should be trained at sea held up the founding of a naval school. In 1813 some concession was made in that a civilian schoolmaster was placed on each ship. For some 15 years after 1821 temporary schools were operated in the navy yards to give "crash courses" for midshipman examinations. In 1827 by one vote the bill to establish a naval school lost in the senate. The project gradually won favor until in 1845 the school became an actuality.

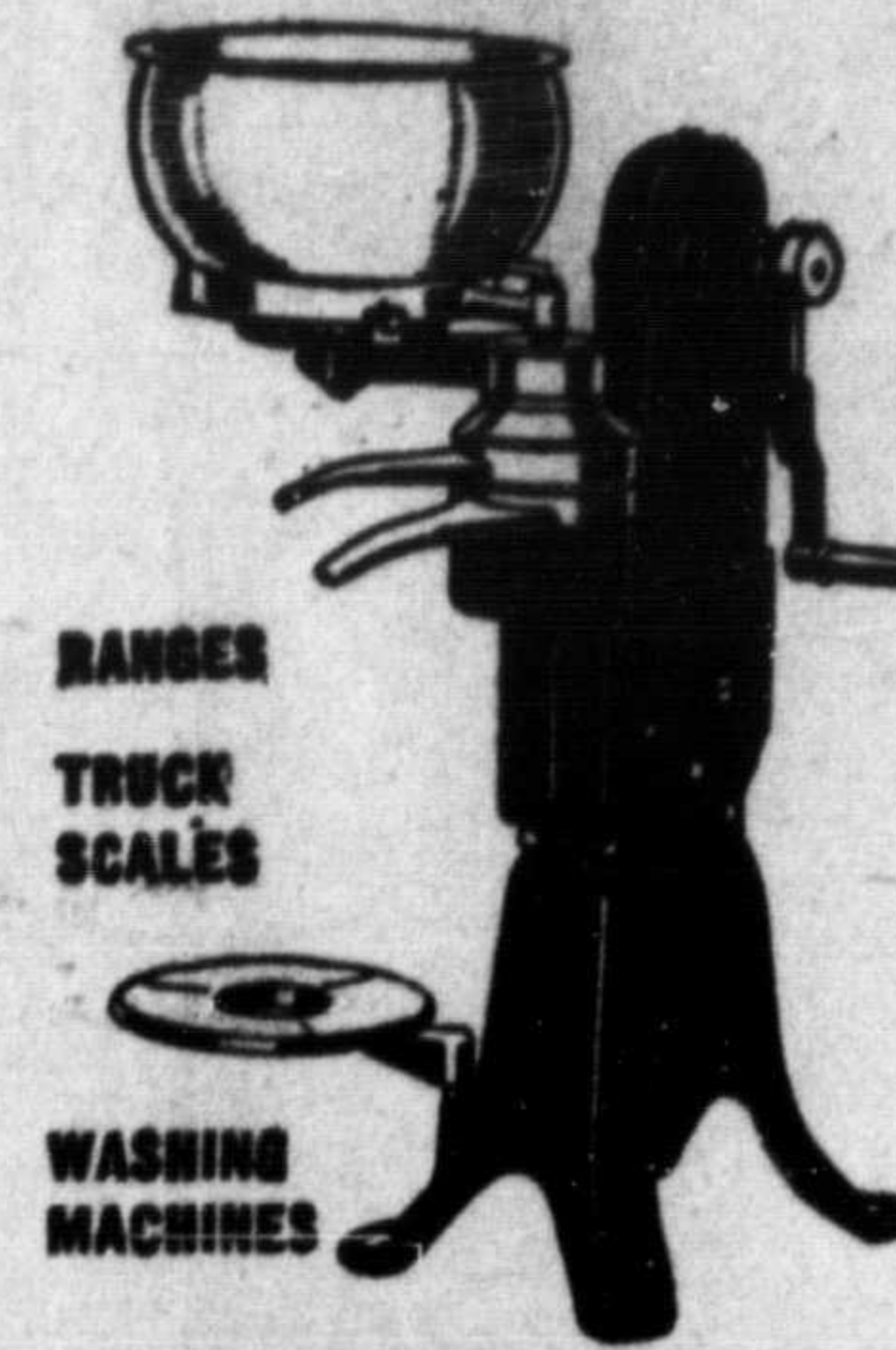

## How Can I??

By Anne Ashley

Q. How can I tighten the cane seat of a chair?

A. The cane seat of a chair that is slightly sagged can be tightened by washing it with hot water, then drying it in a hot sun.

Q. How can I restore the sweetness of winter vegetables, that have arrived a long time after they have been picked?

A. The sweetness can be restored by adding a little sugar to the water while boiling them.

Q. How can I clean windows rapidly?

A. By washing them with a chamomile wrung out of warm water. Rinse the chamomile and wring out as dry as possible and then rub over the windows again.

Q. How can I remove kalsomine from walls and ceilings without making too much dust?

A. To remove kalsomine, wash walls and ceilings with warm water and a large sponge (if you are lucky enough to have one) or an old soft bath towel until the washing water is clear.

Q. How can I clean a velvet covered Chesterfield without a vacuum cleaner?

A. To clean a velvet covered Chesterfield, brush the dust out of the covering with a stiff brush or whisk, and sponge with a non-inflammable cleaning fluid such as carbon-tetrachloride.

## How To Protect Eggs For Hatching

It is especially important that eggs for hatching should be collected several times a day in Winter weather, says the Ottawa Farm Journal. The baskets or pails in which they are collected should be lined with some material as a protection against frost. It must be remembered that in a fertilized egg the cell division begins to take place before the egg leaves the hen's body. If the egg is left exposed to intense frost this process may be so effectually checked at the outset that the germ will not develop when the egg is raised to incubating temperature. ### OTTAWA REPORTS

That In Parliament Last Week A Price Floor Was Proposed For Staple Farm Products

Cheering news for Canada's farming community came last week in the Speech from the Throne at the opening of the fifth session of Canada's 19th Parliament. Proposal to introduce provision for a price floor for staple farm products to ensure stability for agriculture follows an announcement made some time ago by the Prime Minister that this measure was under consideration. No group in the Dominion has contributed more in hard work and human endurance to the winning of the war than the farmer and his family. The coming season will call for no less effort than in the previous war years. A floor on farm products in the future would be an incentive to meet this call.

If you are tempted to use feed grain from the West for seed this year, the advice of Experimental Farm experts is "Don't."

While there are several varieties of wheat, oats and barley that do equally well in both Eastern and Western Canada, as proven in tests made by the Cereal Division, Experimental Farm Service, Ottawa, the only safe seed to buy is Registered seed. Owing to the possibility of a shortage of seed grain this spring, farmers are urged to order now. In addition to the possibility of Western feed grain being unsuitable to various localities in the East, attention is called to the danger of wild oats and other noxious weeds which re-cleaning is not guaranteed to remove.

The farmer who has his own seed and who is doubtful about its germinating qualities due to injury by bad harvest conditions, heating or other factors, is advised to test it. Make the test by counting out 100 kernels and placing them in a saucer of moist sand with another saucer turned over it to help hold the moisture. (It may be necessary to add a very small amount of water each day to keep the sand moist). In a few days sprouts will begin to show and it is then easy to determine what percentage of the seeds will grow.

Farmers should place orders for fertilizer not later than March 15 to avoid disappointment, according to the fertilizer administrator, War-time Prices and Trade Board. Regarding mixtures containing potash which is in shorter supply than last year, retail distributors have been directed to see that all regular farmer customers are supplied before accepting new accounts. New customers who are bona fide farmers may be taken on if additional supplies are available. Need for potash supplies has led to reduction of potash content in several mixtures and a consequent reduction in the ceiling price. A more liberal supply of nitrogen and phosphate has led to the approval of mixtures containing only these two elements. A substantial reduction in price has been obtained to encourage the production of ammonium nitrate, a new wartime chemical with 32 percent nitrogen content. A minimum of 60 lbs. of this is now being used in every ton of mixed fertilizer produced.

The total gross farm value of all the field crops produced on 60,345,600 acres in 1943 was \$1,104,065,000 compared with \$1,179,073,000, the estimated value of crops produced on 60,809,200 acres in 1942 according to the latest Canadian Bureau of Statistics figures.

The search for new outlets for farm products is of primary importance, says the report of the sub-committee of the Advisory Committee on Reconstruction appointed to study agricultural policy, tabled last week in the House of Commons. A research programme including such experiments as use of plastics from farm waste, paper manufacture from straw, processing of oil seeds, grain alcohol production in local plants and food dehydrators for each farm is suggested.

### THE WAR WEEK — Commentary on Current Events

#### Why The R.A.F. Bomber Command Is Destroying Capital of Germany

The attack upon Berlin marks the highest point yet reached in the bomber offensive, says Squadron Leader John Strachey in London Calling.

This attack is a deliberate attempt to deprive the enemy of the use of his capital city. E.A.F. Bomber Command has set out to make it impossible for the Nazis to use Berlin. For remember, Berlin is today the capital, not simply of Germany, but of Hitler's whole slave empire. Berlin is a city in a totally different class to Essen, Dusseldorf, or even Hamburg—or any other of the cities which Bomber Command has so far attacked. Berlin is the fourth largest city in the world. It is one of the half dozen or so world capitals round which the life not only of one nation but of a whole area of the world revolves. Berlin contains factories of the highest importance; but its unique significance is that the economic life of Central Europe as a whole has been carried on by means of the financial, marketing, administrative, and transportation facilities of Berlin.

#### Berlin Not Yet Destroyed

We don't know what the effect of the paralysis of such a centre will be. For such a thing has never yet happened. If, however, Bomber Command can effect its purpose, we shall know . . . and within the next few weeks. It may be that the Nazi empire can be carried on without Berlin. I daresay it can be. But the ruin of Berlin—if it can be effected—will take us a long step towards the weakening of Germany to a point where she will not be able to resist the final attack. "If it can be effected" — for don't let us deceive ourselves for a moment into supposing that Berlin has already been destroyed.

#### Enemy Kept Guessing

You can get some idea of the size of the task which Bomber Command has set itself by comparing Berlin with Hamburg. Hamburg was itself a vast city — getting on for twice the size of any city in Britain outside London. Hamburg had 1,800,000 inhabitants and a fully built-up area of 8,382 acres. It is taking a whole series of attacks to render such a city as this useless to the Nazis. Moreover, it will, of course, be impossible for Bomber Command to peg away at Berlin without interruption. The enemy must be kept guessing as to where we are going next.

#### Counter-Counter Measures

It isn't too much to say that the bomber offensive is today the joint product of the brains, the courage, and the grinding hard work of this entire nation. The very success which has been achieved may tend to make some people think that the bomber offensive has just been a matter of building a sufficient number of bombers, flying them over Germany, dropping the bombs, and coming home again. The fact is that the bomber offensive has only been carried forward by keeping one step ahead of the enemy's continually improving defences. It would have been

fatal even to pause. The counter-measure — the new method of fighter attack against the new form of bomber defence — has never been long in coming. We have had to be ready with the counter — counter measures; and we have been.

#### Pathfinders Mark Targets

If, for example we were to attack Berlin today with the same aircraft and using the same methods which we employed only two years ago our bomber force would be massacred in one or two operations. But, equally, if today our Lancasters, Halifaxes, Stirlings had to meet no more than the defences which existed in 1942 they could destroy every industrial centre in Germany with negligible losses to themselves.

Recently, we have been given an account of the work of our Pathfinder Force. The need for someone to find the path to the target is obvious — for naturally that same darkness which hides the bomber from the defending fighter also tends to hide the target from the bomber.

The Pathfinders are marking the target so that intensely concentrated bombing is being achieved. For Germany that's perhaps the most ominous development of all. For it is the concentration in both time and space that counts — the tons per minute per acre!

### Army Beauty Shops Help Men's Morale

Applied psychology is being used in the "beauty shops" which are maintained by the American Fifth Army in Italy, says the Windsor Star. The establishment of these depots shows the genius which is going into effort to maintain in the morale and efficiency of fighting men.

Much of the soldier's work makes it necessary for him, at times, to be dirty and bedraggled. But the majority of these men do not enjoy being in that condition. They are willing to wade and crawl through mud to win a battle, but once it is over, they want to get cleaned up as quickly as possible.

The "revival tents" give them that opportunity. There they are showered, shaved and outfitted with clean new uniforms. In a very real sense, they emerge as new men. The "beauty shops" are to be counted among the most valuable agencies for keeping the men in fighting trim.

### Hevea Tree Main Source Of Rubber

From Hevea seeds taken from the Western Hemisphere in 1876 grew the fields on which the world has depended for ninety percent of its rubber since 1920, says Middle America Bureau. Replanted in Calcutta, Singapore and other posts in the Far East, these wild seedlings became nine million acres of rubber-producing trees.

Today the Hevea tree, the main source of natural rubber, has returned to the American tropics. Millions of seeds are being planted in three Middle American countries, Costa Rica, Honduras and Panama, to become our rubber plantations of tomorrow.

### Now X-Ray Machine Okays Airplane Castings

A new mass production X-ray machine capable of inspecting as many as 17,000 airplane castings in a 24-hour day has been developed. This revolutionary machine, which for the first time brings the advantages of assembly line speed to X-ray work, makes it possible to X-ray metal castings for defects at a rate of one every five seconds. As a result, America's growing air forces will get better airplanes faster.

Key to this new unit's speed is a moving conveyor 40 feet long and three feet wide that transports the castings through the X-ray inspection and provides the fastest method yet devised to spot flaws in large quantities of metal parts. This unit produces an exposed film of six castings every 30 seconds—or the equivalent of one casting every five seconds—to provide an almost continuous flow of exposed film ready for developing. When developed, each film shows an inside view of the six castings. The faulty castings with "blow" holes, cracks and other defects then can be "weeded" out, so that no man-hours or machine-hours will be wasted on imperfect castings.

### FBI Reports Increase in Internal Security Action

The department of justice announced that the wartime work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in safeguarding the nation's internal security during the fiscal year 1943, ending June 30, had resulted in the arrest and conviction of 147 persons for war crimes in the most serious category—espionage, failure to register as foreign agents, sabotage and sedition. Punishment in these cases totaled 688 years of imprisonment, one life sentence and six death penalties.

Director J. Edgar Hoover, pointing out that internal safety in time of war was the FBI's first concern, stated that investigations by the FBI of violations of all kinds during the 12-month period exceeded those of any previous year. The total of convictions was 10,294, as against 7,448 in the year preceding.

Total sentences imposed aggregated 24,624 years, 3 months and 6 days; 3 life and 7 death. Last year the sentences totaled 17,163 years, 6 months and 4 days; 8 life, and 1 death.

Convictions resulted during the year in 95.8 per cent of the cases investigated by the FBI which were brought to trial.

### Control Grain Insects

Clean bins and prompt control of weevils and other grain insects will help farmers prevent loss of thousands of bushels of feed grains stored in farm granaries.

New wheat from the field contains no insects, and if stored in a clean tight bin will stay free of weevils for a year. To prevent weevils and other insects from spreading to clean grain, all old grain should be cleaned out of storages and the area sprayed with a good fly spray. Accumulations of grain in corners, in old feed bags, and in threshers or grain cleaners should be removed, as they are fine breeding places for the insects.

Grain more than a year old is apt to get infested with insects, and should be inspected every month and, if necessary, fumigated. An ethylene-dichloride-carbon-tetrachloride mixture is the best fumigant and five gallons will treat 1,000 bushels of grain.

### Bananas in Tinfoil

Back in the latter part of the last century, when the banana was a rare tidbit in this country, the fruit was wrapped in tinfoil. The theory was that an exotic delicacy like that ought to be made attractive, and besides, the foil wrapper protected the banana.

Dealers no longer do that. They soon discovered that the golden yellow color of the fruit was more handsome than any foil wrapping could be. Moreover, its own natural covering is thick, strong and sterile, and does a better job of protecting the fruit.

It would take a tremendous amount of foil to wrap the quantity of bananas that Americans are used to eating. In normal times, Middle America sends us an average of 18 to 25 pounds a year per person.

### Romans Used Convoys to Clear Pirates From Sea

Convoying ships goes back to early Roman times, says the National Geographic society. Pirates were the enemies that first made convoy necessary.

Rome's early pirate destroyers copied the light swift galleys of the Liburnians, a maritime people who lived on Adriatic shores. The Romans increased the speed of sail with rows of bars. After Pompey cleared the Mediterranean of pirates, communications still had to be guarded to frontiers beyond.

Piracy later became more menacing, often encouraged by nations to block trade rivals. Protection from pirates was one of the reasons for the Hanseatic league of German port cities. As soon as merchant vessels became virtually warships, they could protect themselves when sailing together in a fleet. At first voluntary, such co-operation was later regulated by law.

England built 34 men-of-war to oppose Spain's "Invincible Armada," but most of the British fleet in the engagement of 1588 was made up of merchant vessels manned by their regular crews. Merchant seamen constituted a naval reserve, and when captured were treated as prisoners of war.
