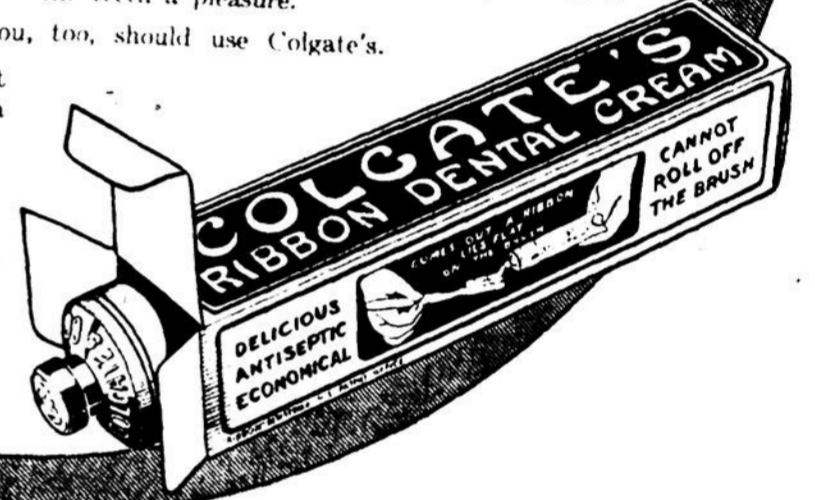

NUMBERS A GREAT FACTOR UPON THE AUSTRIAN FRONTS

Hilaire Belloc Analyzes Situation About Gorizia and Podgora—Points Out That Capture or Masking of Former is Essential to Taking of Trieste

Special Star Cable by Hilaire Belloc. ROME, Oct. 13.—The mere movements upon the Italian front do not constitute the chief point for our consideration.

The position which the Austrians have chosen to fortify and make a centre of is the town of Gorizia, which lies on a little peninsula on the left bank of the Isonzo at the foot of the mountain range by which the river has come to its deep gorge.

Undoubtedly it is taken the Italian cannot allow upon Trieste. That makes Gorizia as far as the main Italian operation.

The Austrians have a double advantage in their defence, the other being the possession of the mountain range which protects the bridgehead and prevents an Italian attack from the north.

Therefore, this explains the articles in the French and English newspapers which treated that a new Greek Government would be formed by the resignation of Premier Venizelos, the only man in the wishes of the Entente was not pliantly accepted.

# CANADIAN INDIAN IS FINE SHOT

### Finds Sniper with Naked Eye When Officers' Glasses Failed

### HAS KILLED THIRTY-EIGHT OF ENEMY

### Canadian Batteries Do Big Execution in Use of High Explosives

THE MONTREAL STAR OFFICE, 17 Cockspur St., London, Oct. 13.—

A gunner in a Canadian Battery who is now on leave, having been the only man on his gun's crew left fit for service after the second battle at Ypres, gives you a representative account of the Canadian Artillery's part in the great advance. He says: "Our artillery started firing the day before the general bombardment of the German position at Loos, having spent part of the previous day in finding the ranges. Every Canadian battery, including heavy batteries, bombarded the first line of the German trenches for half an hour in the early morning firing. The Germans, who were mostly behind, hurried up into the fire trenches, anticipating a Canadian attack. Then our batteries opened fire on them with high explosives doing, we believe, fearful execution. "Meanwhile a brigade of our Canadian Field Artillery on our left kept up fire for five hours. We had wonderful gun pits with only the muzzles showing, so were quite safe except for a direct hit. Several British officers came to see our emplacements and complimented us on them. Our Artillery had no casualties."

### MARVEL WITH RIFLE

The best recent Canadian incident from the front relates to a full-blooded Indian in the Canadian Infantry Battalion who is a marvel with his rifle. He has a telescopic sight attached to his rifle, and goes about as he likes. He is a most silent man, talking hardly to anyone. He wanders about the trenches and waits for a chance to pick off a German. One German sniper was recently giving a lot of trouble. Officers with glasses tried in vain to locate him. The Indian came along and without saying a word to anyone was seen to fire at the big tree. Down fell the sniper. The Indian saw with his naked eye what the officers with their glasses failed to discover. He told me he put a little nick in the stock of his rifle every time he was sure he had killed a German. I saw thirty-eight nicks on the stock. With gleeful countenance he said he was just about to add two more nicks. For some unaccountable reason this Indian never fires twice at the same man. If he misses his mark he will not fire again, and lets the man alone.

### AN EXCITING INCIDENT

A story reaches me of a recent exciting Canadian incident at the front. The Canadians, who were in a position by an orchard which had once been a fire trench but is now a reserve, decided that the Second Canadian Battery should fire at the German position as much as possible. Before the Germans replied the position we shelled covered about an acre. "Within two hours," Canadian gunners describing the incident, say: "Our guns escaped and were hardly damaged, and we were afterwards highly complimented."

# LEAVE ON FIRST PASSENGER TRAIN ON NEW RAILWAY

OTTAWA, Oct. 13.—The first passenger train to cover the cross continental line of the Canadian Northern Railway from Quebec to Vancouver left Ottawa at 11 o'clock last night with fourteen cars, and more than one hundred guests of the railway company on board. The guests are Senators, members of Parliament and newspaper men, and are known collectively as the Canadian Northern Parliamentary party or more popularly as the Canadian Northern expeditionary force.

At Capreol, Ontario, Sir William Mackenzie met the train with a large delegation from Toronto and assumed charge of the tour. He will be assisted by W. H. Moore, secretary of the Canadian Northern, and other railway officials. Stops will be made at Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Regina and other western points to allow the passengers to view the railroad works.

### NO GOVERNMENT

Special Star Cable by United Press. LONDON, Oct. 13.—The British Government has declined to declare cotton piece-goods and other cotton products contraband was announced by the Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, in the House of Commons today.

In reply to a question as to whether the Government was still allowing cotton to go into Germany in certain cases under certain circumstances, Sir Edward stated that new cotton, cotton waste and cotton yarn all have been declared contraband, and that every possible step has been taken to prevent any supply of these reaching Germany.

It was intended, the Foreign Secretary added, forthwith to declare as contraband cotton piece goods and other cotton products and prohibit the export to neutral countries contiguous to Germany and Austria of such goods, capable of being used in the manufacture of explosives.

### HORROR AT MASSACRE

Speaking further, Sir Edward said that all the information in possession of the British Government on the subject of massacres and deportations of Armenians in Turkey was made public in the Marquis of Crewe's report in the House of Lords.

"This can be but one feeling of horror and indignation about it," the Foreign Secretary added.

More than one million pounds sterling (\$1,000,000) weekly is being paid by the British Government to the wives and children of soldiers serving with the colors. The ministerial statement was made in the House in reply to a question.

### AUSTRIA ASKS FOR GOLD AND SILVER

ZURICH, Switzerland, Oct. 12.—The Austrian Government has issued an appeal to the public to take all gold and silver jewelry, plate and other articles made of these metals to the mints for conversion into coin of metal.

The necessity of strengthening the gold reserve and meeting payments abroad for goods for military purposes is given as the reason for the appeal.

Persons who surrender gold or silver will receive full payment in bank notes and certificates of honor for their patriotic acts.

### SUBMARINE SINKS GERMAN COLLIER

# ALLIES RESOLVED TO SAVE SERBIANS FROM THE TEUTONS

Premier Viviani Makes Full Statement to French Chamber of Deputies. RUSSIA TO ENTER THE BALKAN ARENA. Bulgaria Has Been Flyn in Ointment All the Time. PARIS, Oct. 13.—In response to resolutions adopted by the Finance committee and the Socialist group, urging the necessity of a complete and immediate explanation on the part of the Government, Premier Viviani, in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday outlined the situation with respect to the Balkan States. 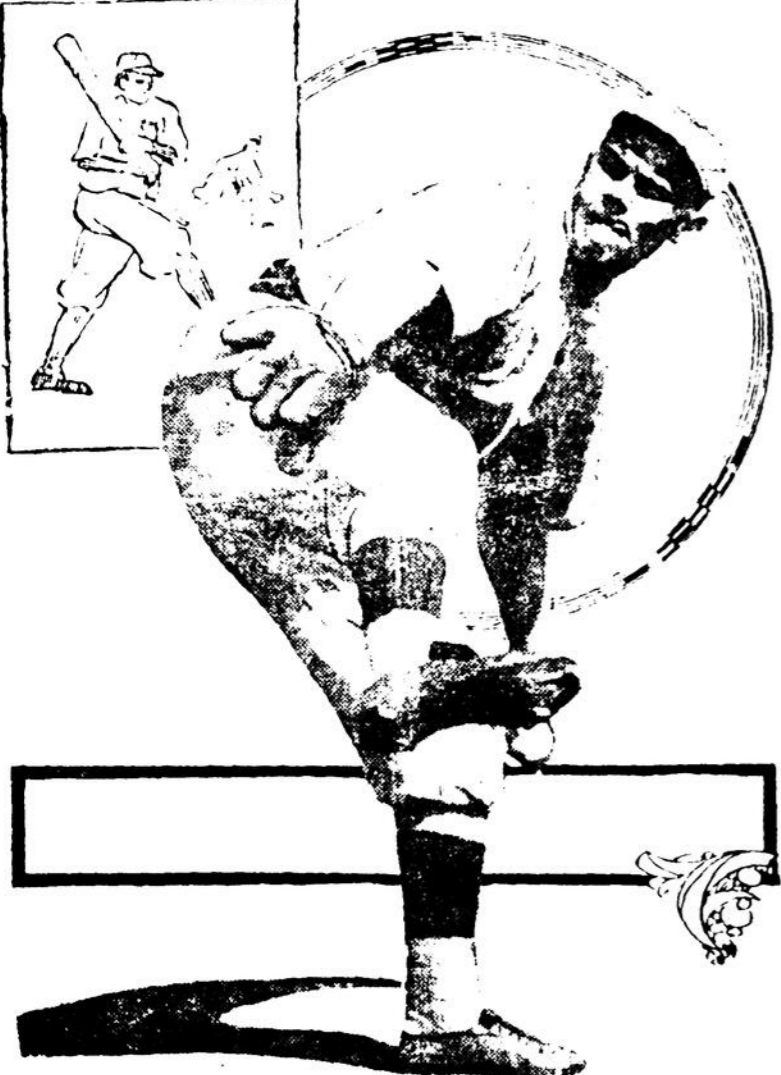
