GREAT BRITAIN.

BY THE KING.—A PROCLAMATION.

For the Suppression of the Mutinous and Treasonable proceedings of the Crews of certain of our Ships at the Nore.

GEORGE R.

Whereas, upon the representation of our Lords Commissioners of our Admiralty, respecting the proceedings of the Seamen and Marines on board certain of our Ships at the Nore, we were pleased to command our said Lords Commissioners of our Admiralty, to signify to the said Seamen and Marines, our gracious intentions, expressed in our Royal Declaration, under Our Sign Manual, bearing date at St. James's, the twenty seventh day of May instant.

And whereas our right trusty and right well beloved Cousin and Counsellor George John Earl Spencer, our trusty and well beloved Charles George Lord Arden of our Kingdom of Ireland, and William Young, Esq, Rear Admiral of the White, being three of the Lords Commissioners of our Admiralty, did cause our gracious intentions expressed in such Our Declaration, to be signified to the Crews of our Ships at the Nore, and did require such Crews to return to their due obedience accordingly; and whereas it has been represented to Us, that some of the Crews of our said Ships have been desirous of returning to their obedience accordingly, but have been prevented from so doing by violence; and others of our Ships, in the actual discharge of their duty, have been fired upon, and attempts have been made to prevent some of our Ships from proceeding according to the Orders of their Commanders: And whereas such continued perseverance in rebellious and treasonable attempts against our Crown and Dignity, after repeated admonitions and offers of our gracious pardon, render it necessary for Us, to call on all our loving Subjects to be aiding and assisting in repressing the same: We have thought fit, by the advice of our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby strictly enjoin and command all our Admirals, Generals, Commanders, and Officers of our Forces by Sea and land, and all Magistrates whatsoever, and all others our loving Subjects, that they in their several stations do use their utmost endeavours, according to Law, to suppress all such mutinous and treasonable proceedings, and to use all lawful means to bring the persons concerned therein, their aiders and abettors, to Justice: And We do hereby strictly enjoin and command all our loving Subjects whatsoever, not to give any aid, comfort, assistance, or encouragement whatsoever to any person or persons concerned in any such mutinous and treasonable proceedings, as they will answer the same at their peril; and also, to the utmost of their power, and according to Law, to prevent all other persons from giving any such aid, assistance, comfort, or encouragement.

GIVEN at Our Court at St. James's, the thirty first day of May, one thousand seven hundred and ninety seven, and in the thirty seventh year of Our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

LONDON, MAY 29.

The King has been pleased to grant the dignities of Baron and Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain to Sir John Jervis, K. B. Admiral of the Blue, and the heirs male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, title, and title of Baron Jervis, of Medford in the county of Stafford, and Earl of St. Vincent.

The King has also been pleased to grant the dignity of a Baronet of the Kingdom of Great Britain to the following gentlemen, and the respective heirs male of their bodies lawfully begotten, viz. Charles Thompson, Esq. Vice Admiral of the Blue, and William Parker, Esq. Rear Admiral of the Red.

The King has also been pleased to nominate and appoint Horatio Nelson, Esq. Rear Admiral of the Blue, to be one of the Knights Companions of the most honourable order of the Bath.

The following notice in large bills, is posted up in the streets of Dublin.

"Adjutant General's office, May 20, 1797. "General orders.—In obedience to an order of the Lord Lieutenant and Council, it is the command in chief's command, that the military do act, without waiting for directions from the Civil Magistrate, in dispersing any tumultuous assemblies, or persons threatening the peace of the realm, and the safety of the lives and properties of his Majesty's loyal subjects whatsoever."

PORTSMOUTH, JUNE 23.

SENTENCE ON MUTINEERS OF THE POMPEE.

The Court Martial ended this evening at half-past six o'clock, and we understand that the sentence of the Court is as follows:

Calloway, Guthrie, Johnston, and Aspley, condemned to suffer death; but the two former recommended for mercy. A fifth of the Mutineers to be imprisoned twelve months; and the sixth acquitted.

PAR LE ROI.—PROCLAMATION.

Pour supprimer les procédés traitres et séditeux des équipages de certains de nos vaisseaux au Nore.

GEORGE R.

Attendu que sur la représentation de nos Lords Commissaires de notre Amirauté, au sujet des Procédés des matelots et troupes de Marine à bord de certains de nos vaisseaux au Nore, il nous a plu donner ordre à nos dits Lords Commissaires de signifier aux dits Matelots et troupes de Marine nos gracieuses intentions, exprimées dans notre Déclaration Royale, signée de notre main, et datée à St. James, le vingt septième jour du présent mois de Mai; Et attendu que notre très fidèle et bien aimé Cousin et Conseiller George John Comte de Spencer, notre fidèle et bien aimé Charles George Lord Arden de notre Royaume d'Irlande, et William Young, Ecuyer, contre-Amiral du Blanc, les trois Lords Commissaires de notre Amirauté, ont fait signifier aux équipages de nos vaisseaux au Nore nos gracieuses intentions exprimées dans notre dite Déclaration, et en conséquence ont sommé les dits équipages de rentrer dans l'obéissance qu'ils nous doivent: Et attendu qu'il nous a été représenté que quelques-uns des équipages des dits vaisseaux ont en conséquence souhaité de rentrer dans leur devoir, mais ont été empêchés de le faire par violence; et que l'on a fait feu sur d'autres de nos vaisseaux, dans l'exécution actuelle de leur devoir, et fait des tentatives pour empêcher quelques-uns de nos vaisseaux de procéder conformément aux ordres de leurs commandants; et attendu qu'une persévérance continue dans ces attentats traitres et rebelles contre notre couronne et notre dignité, rend nécessaire, après des avertissements réitérés et les offres de notre gracieux pardon, d'inviter tous nos aimés sujets à nous aider et assister à les réprimer: nous avons jugé à propos, de l'avis de notre Conseil Privé, d'émaner notre présente Proclamation Royale, et nous enjoignons strictement par ces présentes, et commandons tous nos Amiraux, Généraux, Commandants et Officiers de nos Forces, tant sur mer que sur terre, et tous Magistrats quelconques, et tous autres de nos aimés sujets, que dans leurs différentes situations, ils aient à faire tous leurs efforts, suivant la Loi, pour supprimer tous semblables Actes de trahison et mutinerie, et se servir de tous les moyens légaux pour amener à Justice les personnes qui y sont concernées, de même que leurs aides et complices: et nous enjoignons strictement par ces présentes, et commandons tous nos aimés sujets quelconques, de ne donner aucun aide, secours, assistance ou encouragement quelconque à aucune des personnes concernées dans tels procédés traitres et séditeux, parcequ'ils en rendront compte à leur péril; et aussi d'empêcher de tout leur pouvoir, et suivant la Loi, toute autre personne quelconque de leur donner tel aide, assistance, secours ou encouragement.

Donné à notre Cour à St. James, le Trente-unième jour de Mai, Mil sept cent quatrevingt dix-sept, et dans la Trente septième année de notre règne.

SENTENCE CONTRE LES MUTINS A BORD DU POMPEE.

La Cour Martiale a fini ce soir à six heures et demie, et on nous dit que la sentence de la Cour est comme suit:

Calloway, Guthrie, Johnston et Aspley, condamnés à souffrir la mort; mais les deux premiers recommandés à la merci.

Un cinquième des mutins condamné à être emprisonné pendant douze mois, et le sixième acquitté.

By accounts from London to the 14th June, it appears that a body of 7000 French troops had entered Venice and taken possession of that City, together with all the vessels in the harbor.

An arrival from the West Indies at New York, reports that General Simcoe failed for England on the 8th July in his Majesty's Ship Swallow, and that he had been succeeded in the Command of St. Domingo by Major General Whyte.

Extract of a letter from a Gentleman in Jersey, to his Correspondent in Quebec, dated Jersey 11th July 1797.

"We are yet in a state of uncertainty whether we shall have peace, or that war will be continued, appearances however give us hopes that peace is not far distant, and we have to tell you that the general politics look as favorable as can be wished under the pressure of the times—Lord Malmesbury and his suite are arrived at Lisle, where the Congress is to meet, but although we may reasonably hope a favorable issue to the negotiation, the state of parties in France, and the doubts whether the Moderates and people who call for peace may not once more be overthrown, renders it prudent to wait the opening of the Congress before peace be considered as at hand.

In the mean while however it is a great satisfaction to see the discipline of the Navy restored, the Jacobins completely beaten in the City, and the Country more unanimous in the support of Government, than it has been for a length of time past, so that if unhappily the negotiation should fail, you will see the Country display an energy our enemies did not expect."

WEDNESDAY EVENING, AUGUST 23.

We have just now been favored with the Sun a London paper, of the 24th and 26th June, they contain the agreeable intelligence of the termination of the mutiny at the Nore. It appears that the sailors intimidated by the vigor of Government and seeing the public mind universally against them surrendered themselves and the Ships in their possession one after the other at His Majesty's discretion. Parker, President of the Delegates had been taken into custody and was under trial. It appears also that some of the Delegates had made their escape in an open boat to Calais, where they arrived on the 15th June. The mutiny was entirely quelled on the 14th.

Lord Malmesbury, Earl Pembroke, Lord Morpeth and Lord Grenville Levison Gower, were to set out on the 26th June for Lisle, where it appears a Congress was about to be held.

Il parait par des avis de Londres du 14 Juin, qu'un corps de troupes Francoises de 7000 hommes, étoit entré dans Venise, et avoit pris possession de cette ville, avec tous les vaisseaux dans le port.

Un vaisseau arrivé des Isles à la Nouvelle York, rapporte, que le Général Simcoe étoit parti pour l'Angleterre le 8 Juillet, dans le vaisseau de sa Majesté le Swallow, et que le Major Général Whyte avoit pris à sa place le commandement de St. Domingue.

Extrait d'une lettre d'un Monsieur à Jersey à son Correspondant à Quebec, datée de Jersey, 11e Juillet, 1797.

"Nous sommes encore dans l'incertitude si nous aurons la Paix, ou si la guerre continuera—cependant les apparences nous donnent à espérer que la Paix n'est pas éloignée, et nous pouvons vous dire que les affaires politiques en général, paroissent aussi favorables qu'on peut le désirer dans les circonstances présentes.—Le Lord Malmesbury et sa suite sont arrivés à Lille, où le Congrès doit s'assembler; mais quoiqu'avec raison, nous puissions espérer que la Négociation aura une issue favorable, l'état des partis en France, et les doutes où nous sommes si les modérés et le Peuple qui demandent la paix, n'auront pas encore une fois le dessous, rendent prudent d'attendre l'ouverture du Congrès avant de regarder la paix comme prochaine.

En attendant il est bien satisfaisant de voir la discipline de la marine rétablie, les Jacobins dans la cité entièrement défaits, et le peuple plus unanime pour soutenir le Gouvernement, qu'on ne l'a vu depuis bien du tems; desorte que si malheureusement la Négociation échouoit, vous verriez ce pays déployer une énergie à laquelle nos ennemis ne s'attendent point."

MERCREDI, AU SOIR, 23 Août.

On vient de nous obliger du Sun, papier de Londres, du 24 et 26 Juin. Il nous donne l'agréable nouvelle que la mutinerie au Nore étoit terminée. Il parait que les matelots, fatigués de l'illusion dans laquelle ils avoient été jetés par leurs chefs, se rendirent avec les vaisseaux l'un après l'autre. Parker, le président des délégués avoit été arrêté, et on lui faisoit son procès. Il parait aussi que quelques-uns des Délégués s'étoient enfuis à Calais dans une chaloupe ouverte, où ils arriverent le 15 de Juin. La mutinerie étoit entièrement apaisée le 14.

Le Lord Malmesbury, le Comte Pembroke, le Lord Morpeth et le Lord Grenville Levison Gower, devoient partir le 26 Juin pour Lille, où il parait qu'un Congrès étoit sur le point de se tenir.
