Lac Megantic Astrolab anticipating steady star showers

This week, the night sky will be lit with the Perseids meteor shower, and the Lac Megantic Astrolab has organized five nights of stargazing at the summit for the unique spectacle, which will be most visible from August 10 to August 14.

Spokesperson Sébastien Giguère said that there has been a lot of interest in the stargazing events. "We're almost full for the five nights," he said, explaining that to go to the summit, a reservation was needed. However, he added that viewing at the base of the mountain did not require one.

The reason that there are five nights of viewing events is because the meteor shower is already ramping up. "Already we are at 20 shooting stars per hour," Giguère explained. At the peak, this could reach 100 shooting stars per hour.

"Every meteor shower has its own rhythm," he said, adding that people should not wait for the peak of Perseids before they take a look at the night sky. Giguère explained that it was better to observe when you can, especially when the weather could interfere with visibility.

Giguère advised that those planning to spend the night looking at the stars should not expect results right away. "Patience pays," he said with a chuckle. Light pollution and the time of night will all factor into how much of Perseids people see. Giguère said that while the early part of the night was still a good time to watch, past midnight would yield the best viewing environment.

Cell tower stand-off at Bolton Pass

Citizens opposed to the construction of a Bell telecommunications tower on Route 243 have been protesting since Monday, attempting to prevent construction crews from accessing the site to erect the tower.

It has been over two years since the

dispute between Bell and citizens of East Bolton began.

The original location proposed for the tower was near a provincial bat reserve that serves as a habitat for several species, including the endangered Pipistrelle, which gave the reserve its name.

According to protesters, that location was nixed by Bell when the munic-

ipality of Pottion requested an environmental impact study.

The current site, already prepped for construction, is located less than 300 meters from four homes.

Opponents to the tower pointed to guidelines on the Health Canada website, which recommend residences be a

the power to legislate on the matter, which falls under the jurisdiction of the federal government.

"We want the federal government to tell us what their policy is in the case of telecommunications towers," East Bolton Mayor Joan Westland Eby told Radio Canada news. We certainly have suggestions to give municipalities more power," pointing out that Brome-Missisquoi MP Denis Paradis has already called for a moratorium on the erection of telecom towers,

"It is the right of citizens to express their position. The municipality has done all it could do," Eby said prior to a demonstration of citizens Monday and

Tuesday during which they prevented a Bell subcontractor from accessing a proposed site alongside Bolton Pass where a tower is planned.

The municipalities of East Bolton, Austin and St-Étienne-de-Bolton have united to demand a meeting with the Minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development Navdeep Bains to try to obtain a clear policy on the rules concerning the construction of cell phone towers on municipal territory.

A decision by the Supreme Court confirmed that municipalities do not have

minimum distance of 500 meters from a cellular tower.

When Bell decided to move the tower location from the south side of Route 243 to the north side, it was believed the intent was to set the foundation further into the forest, but protesters find the new location unacceptable.

George and Andy Jasper and Sandra Wallis, three of the locals that would be directly impacted by the tower construction, asked why they weren't being given the same consideration as the bats.

To date, the demonstration has remained peaceful, with protestors standing their ground against employees of Rocktel Inc. and Synergie delivery services, the companies sub-contracted by Bell to deliver and assemble the tower components.

The Memphremagog Police were present on Monday and Tuesday.

Robert Poupart, one of the protestors, told The Record he delivered a formal no-

tice to East Bolton on Tuesday, pointing out that no building permit had been issued by the municipality and for that reason, construction should be halted.

The Superior Court of Canada recently sided with the federal government's decision to allow Bell to go ahead with the project; there have since been signs over the past week that work was resuming.

Tower opponents referenced the federal government's stipulation that projects of this type must be done in accordance with the will of the people. When the project went to a referendum, only one of the 18 citizens living adjacent to the proposed location voted in favour of the project, area residents said.

At press time on Tuesday, the stand-off was coming to an end for the day, with Police and the Bell flatbed trucks containing the tower components leaving the scene.

As the crowd dispersed, protestors expressed their determination to prevent the tower from being built.

# Spirit of 'Mona' still strong after over 30 years

After over 30 years since its original publication in 1979, local Sherbrooke author Ginette Bureau's story 'Mona' is finally available in the United States and by e-book through Balboa Press. 'Mona' is an autobiographical story documenting the circumstances of her daughter's battle with leukemia, which she lost when she was 15.

Bureau wrote the story as a gift to her daughter on her twelfth birthday. Since its original publication, the book has been published several times, even in Poland. With this new, more affordable and accessible version, Bureau hopes that 'Mona' will make its way into schools to be used as a resource.

The story explores Mona's diagnosis at age four, and the decision that Bureau and her family made to treat their daughter as if she was going to grow up. "She was supposed to die within the year," Bureau said. While this timeline was crushing, Bureau chose to change her perspective on her daughter. "Looking at a problem in a different way changes how we react to it," she said.

"I would just raise her," Bureau said, adding that until then, Mona had understood something was wrong. The

family then made the decision to treat her like any other child, and she was treated just like her brother. If she had to be sent to her room, she was. "She was happier." Bureau said the change in her daughter was wonderful to see, and gave her the assurance that she was doing what was right for her and her family.

Mona's road to a longer life was a hard one, and Bureau discussed the many difficulties that came with her daughter's treatment. For a while, Bureau struggled with the fact that the doctors were telling her to accept and prepare her family for the fact that Mona would not live much longer.

"I didn't want to hear that, I didn't want to feel that, I just wanted to be in the present moment," Bureau explained, which is when she decided to treat her daughter like a daughter who was going to live a long life, disregarding some of the doctors' suggestions.

When she wrote the book, Bureau admitted she was scared about the doctors reading it, that she didn't want them to feel blame, but perhaps learn a little. "I needed them so much," she said.

Luckily, Mona's pediatrician greatly supported the book. "He asked me to write this story. He was my biggest promoter," she remembered, adding he even sold the book to his medical stu-

dents. "It did change the approach of doctors," Bureau said.

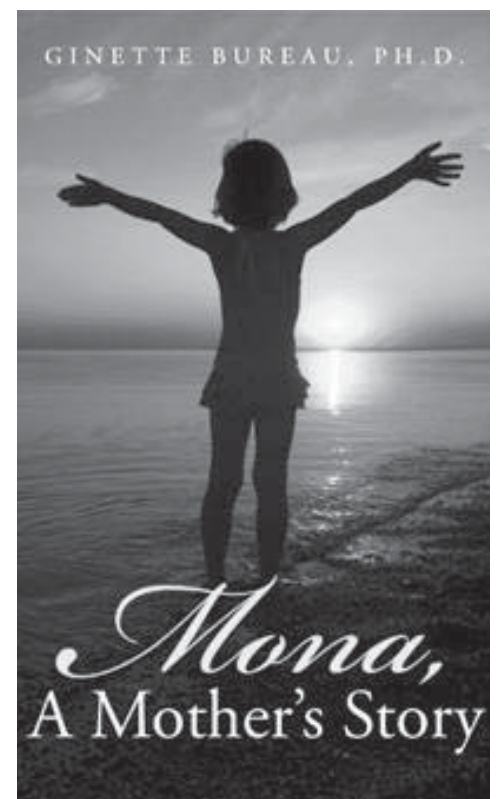
The attitudes of the doctors were not the only obstacle they faced. Mona received very strong chemotherapy. "It made her so, so sick," Bureau remembered. When she had to have the bone marrow transplant when she became a teenager, a whole new set of difficulties was faced.

"We would have to pay everything," Bureau said, explaining that there were no aid programs, no support homes for families to stay in near the hospital, like the Ronald McDonald Houses of today. Her daughter, then a student at Richmond Regional High School, was unable to attend class, and had to have private lessons.

"All of that was brand new in those days," Bureau said. If it weren't for the book sales, Mona may not have been able to have the surgery, and they may not have been able to stay with her in Montreal. As it was, Mona was able to receive the bone marrow transplant from her older brother, and Bureau, who had stopped working, was able to be there.

While in today's world things are much different, the story is one that is timeless. "Your inner voice gives joy," Bureau said, attempting to simply explain the overwhelming emotions concerning

her decision to believe in her daughter's life. She said she followed her intuition when it came to how she would treat and care for her daughter, and she hoped that somewhere, 'Mona' has helped someone in a similar situation.



## Coaticook gets the status of tourist area

For the past several months, the City of Coaticook has taken steps to obtain the status of an official tourist area.

The arrival of the Foresta Lumina attraction has created a large influx into

The city's request has been analyzed by the Ministry of the Economy, Science and Innovation and the Ministry of Tourism and subsequently, the municipa-

"No charges will be brought against them. We are confident that they understood the seriousness of what they did," Carrier concluded.

A Sherbrooke man learned the hard way that the Sherbrooke Police don't mess around with public safety after he was arrested for carrying a fishing rod case, that was mistakenly believe to contain a long gun, Sherbrooke's La Tribune reports.

Stéphane Arsenault was walking on King Street West, Monday morning, when he was stopped by police near Wilson St.

Arsenault was coming back from fishing with his rod in its case and stopped off at the Revenu Québec at the Delta complex to drop off documents when police came up to him and grabbed the case from his shoulder.

"We received a complaint about a man who asked what time the Revenu

Québec office opened carrying a camouflage color case resembling that for a long gun," said police spokesperson Martin Carrier. "Officers spotted the suspect near the scene and proceeded to immobilize the individual to the ground. In cases where the presence of a firearm is suspected, you have to proceed as quickly as possible given the degree of danger."

Carrier said police can't make any assumptions about the intentions of anyone described as carrying a weapon until the situation has been checked out

Arsenault received a ticket for insulting a police officer in the performance of his duties after calling the officer who had intercepted him a 'twit,' but says he may contest the ticket. "I didn't look like a terrorist, I looked like a fisherman," he said.

Police are asking anyone who might have information regarding their whereabouts to contact Sûreté du Québec Criminal Investigation Central at 1-800-659-4264.

The Sûreté du Québec and the Police are calling on the public for help in locating Christopher Ouellet, 16, of Cleveland, who disappeared on August 4 and Brittany Laroche-Gadoury 14, from Trois-Rivières Rivers, missing since August 7.

The police have reason to believe they could be traveling together on foot and could be in greater Montreal, the Eastern Townships, or the Mauricie, particularly near Shawinigan.

Their families have reason to fear for their health and safety.

Christopher Ouellet is described as being 1.68 m (5' 6" tall, weighing: 54 kg (119 lb), with black hair in a semi-Mohawk. He is of Asian descent with black eyes and has a piercing on his lower lip and a tattoo of a devil with wings on his inner right forearm. He also wears tinted glasses, He was last seen wearing beige pants and a short sleeve "Rush" shirt.

Brittany Laroche-Gadoury is 1.65 m (5' 4") tall, weighs 50 kg (110 lb, and has long brown-red hair and blue eyes. She has a piercing under her nose and scars on the inside of her right wrist. When last seen, she was wearing black leggings, beige suede high-heeled boots, a light gray sweatshirt over a black camisole, a black and a red paddle cap, and a khaki canvas bag.

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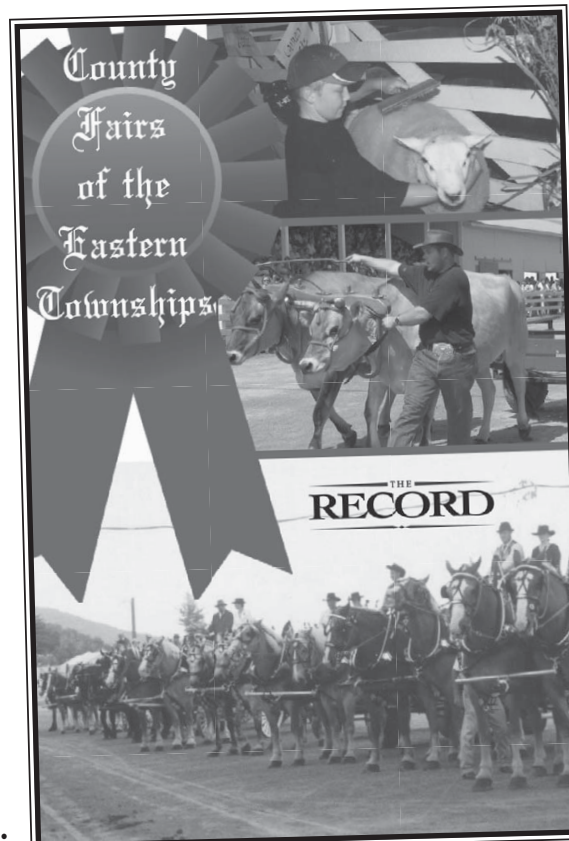

### All living past Prime Ministers unite to mark Sir Wilfrid Laurier anniversary

DEAR EDITOR

Canadians are pausing this year to mark the 175th anniversary of the birth of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1841. As part of these celebrations all seven living past prime ministers wrote essays to honour the life and legacy of their illustrious predecessor. These essays were assembled by public historian and political speechwriter Arthur Milnes for his book *Canada Always: The Defining Speeches of Sir Wilfrid Laurier*, to be published this fall by McClelland and Stewart. Edited excerpts from the past prime ministers' tributes to Laurier are found below.

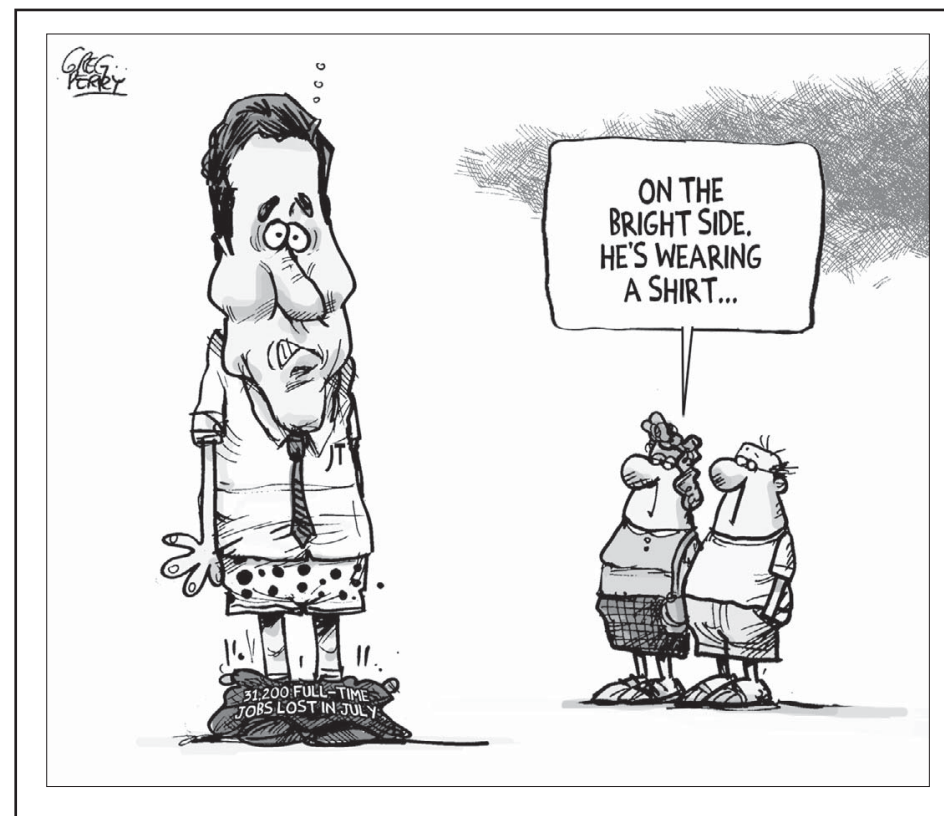
Joe Clark, Prime Minister 1979-1980: Laurier evoked the future: "We do not want nor wish that any individual should forget the land of his origin . . . but let them still more look to the future

. . . to the land of their children," he once said. And he spoke of the challenge of connecting across the great physical distance of Canada: ". . . we all admit that the prosperity of this [country], past, present or future is undoubtedly connected with the question of transportation . . ." Both Sir John A. Macdonald and Wilfrid Laurier shared a mastery of their own time, a century and more ago, but are revered statesmen now because they sensed - and they prepared for - what this young country could become.

John N. Turner, Prime Minister 1984: Laurier was one of Canada's greatest parliamentarians, perhaps the greatest in our history. Studying Laurier today reminds us that Parliament truly mattered in days gone by. Party discipline was not as strong, and the role of the MP - in caucus, committee, and in the House itself - was much more important than it is today. In allowing MPs to be diminished as we have, we diminish Parliament and, by doing so, Canada itself.

Brian Mulroney, Prime Minister 1984-1993: I've always been interested in the lengthy personal and professional relationship between Laurier and Macdonald. Laurier carefully watched the Old Chieftain for almost twenty years, learning the lessons of party leadership the entire time. Political differences aside, he saw how Macdonald crafted cabinets and held a disparate caucus together, navigating the ever-difficult issues of race, religion, and region in nineteenth-century Canada. The dream of every prime minister that has followed both Laurier and Macdonald is in fact the dream and challenge both these prime ministers first bequeathed Canadians: that Canada would one day live up to her full potential as a country.

Kim Campbell, Prime Minister 1993: I am particularly attracted by Laurier's admiration for Lincoln, who is also a hero of mine. Laurier was well schooled in Lincoln's speeches and read as many bi-



ographies of him as he could. There are many lessons both Canadians and Americans can learn from studying Lincoln and Laurier in our own time. Both were politicians who appealed to the "better angels" of their respective electorates, rejecting the politics of division. While proud and fierce partisans for sure, they would both reject much of the negativity that is a feature in North American politics today.

Jean Chrétien, Prime Minister 1993-2003: Laurier imagined Canada as a strong, independent country whose voice would be heard on the international stage, and the first modern nation to celebrate diversity, tolerance, and generosity. He built a country in this image through his four terms as prime minister. It's often said that we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us. I know that as a Canadian, and as someone who has had the honour of serving our country in so many capacities, including its highest elected office, I thank fortune that Wilfrid Laurier's shoulders were so broad and solid.

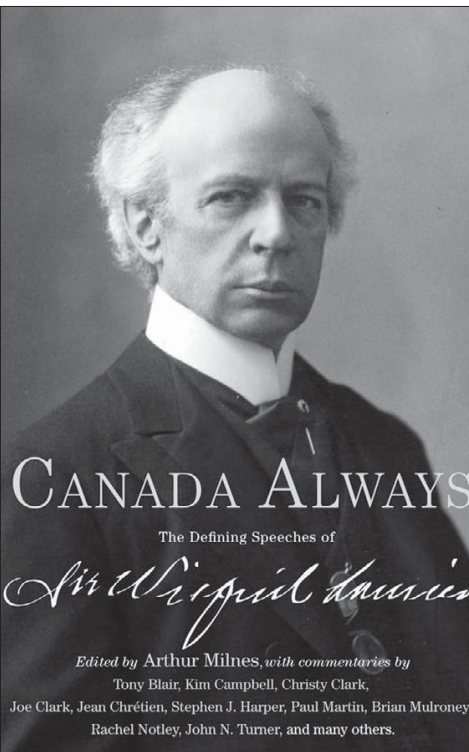
Paul Martin, Prime Minister 2003-2006: How many times did I hear my father tell the story that, as a scholarship

student he somehow got a ride into Ottawa to be one of the thousands lining the streets for Sir Wilfrid Laurier's funeral. Let there be no doubt that for all of his life my father remained a Laurier Liberal. And I, like my father, am proud to be a Laurier Liberal.

Stephen J. Harper, Prime Minister 2006-2015: One of the greatest privileges I had as prime minister was retracing Sir Wilfrid Laurier's footsteps in travelling to London to honour a Queen on her Diamond Jubilee. While times had changed in world and Canadian politics, I still felt and heard the echoes of Sir Wilfrid's Diamond Jubilee visit of so long before while I was in London in 2012. It was there, at Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897, that our Canada took her first steps, under Laurier's gifted leadership, onto the world stage. Canada has remained on Laurier's confident path ever since. Sir Wilfrid Laurier stands as one of our greatest prime ministers. He always will.

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## Drug combination may help if statin doesn't work alone

### ASK DOCTOR K

**DEAR DOCTOR K:** Despite taking statins, my cholesterol hasn't dropped as low as my doctor would like. I figured he'd put me on the new PCSK9 inhibitors. Instead, he suggested that I stay on my statin, but also take another drug called ezetimibe. What can you tell me about this combination?

**DEAR READER:** From what you say, I assume your doctor has used the highest dose of the most potent statins before giving up on those drugs. There are very few people whose cholesterol does not drop substantially on statins alone.

However, if your cholesterol still is not low enough despite maximizing statin treatment, then you do need something else. The cholesterol-lowering drugs known as PCSK9 inhibitors roared onto the market last year. Thanks to their impressive performance in clinical trials — in one year, they lowered LDL ("bad") cholesterol levels by 40 to 60 percent — doctors and patients alike greeted them with excitement. But these drugs aren't for everyone.

Why? One big reason is cost. PCSK9 inhibitors cost an estimated \$14,600 per year. Did I just hear you gulp? I thought so. By contrast, most statins are available as generics. They can cost as little as \$4 per month through discount programs at large chain stores.

Moreover, the statins have been proven to decrease actual heart attacks and strokes. Doctors do not yet know if the PCSK9 inhibitors will ultimately do the same. Finally, PCSK9 inhibitors are given by injection every two to four weeks, whereas statins are pills.

But when statins alone do not adequately lower LDL cholesterol, there are other options than the PCSK9 inhibitors, as well.

One alternative is ezetimibe (Zetia). This drug blocks cholesterol in food from crossing the intestinal wall and getting into the bloodstream. It can lower LDL levels by roughly 15 to 20 percent when used alone. And when added to statins, it can lower cholesterol further. Ezetimibe has an excellent safety record and is generally well tolerated.

One large study compared adding ezetimibe to the statin simvastatin (the combination found in the drug Vytorin) to using one of the statin drugs (simvastatin)

alone. The combination was more effective in preventing heart attacks and strokes.

The study included more than 18,000 people who were recovering from heart attacks. After six years, LDL levels in the ezetimibe-plus-simvastatin group dropped considerably lower than in the group taking just simvastatin. More important, comparing a theoretical group of 100,000 people taking the combined drugs to a group of the same size taking just the simvastatin, 2,000 more people taking just simvastatin would have had another heart attack or a stroke.

Ezetimibe works when added to any statin. If the combination of a statin plus ezetimibe doesn't work for you, then your doctor may consider a PCSK9 inhibitor.

Not all insurance companies pay for PCSK9 inhibitors. Those that do need proof from your doctor that every other way to lower your cholesterol has not produced adequate results. Hopefully, adding ezetimibe will do the trick. I'll bet it will.
