Cowes, Isle of Wight,
January 22, 6.30 p. m.—
The Queen is dead.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, January 22.—With the members of the Royal Family gathered at the Queen's bedside, the Bishop of Winchester and the rector of Whippingham read the prayers for those in extremis. Happily, the Queen was able to recognize those around her. They came to her bedside, but the physicians had warned them against attempts to speak to her. Naturally, the family, while recognizing the claim for public information, insist that the details of the events around the death-bed shall be sacred for the present, and they imposed the strictest secrecy on the whole household.

The Queen is said to have bade farewell at mid-day in a feeble monosyllable to her family assembled at her bedside. She first recognized the Prince of Wales, to whom she spoke a few words of great moment; then the Emperor William and others filed past and heard a whispered good-bye. All those in the bedroom were in tears.

THE NEWS CORROBORATED.

London, Jan. 22, 7.03 p. m.—A telegram from the Prince of Wales to the Lord Mayor is as follows:

Osborne, 6.45 p. m.—My beloved mother has just passed away, surrounded by her children and grandchildren.

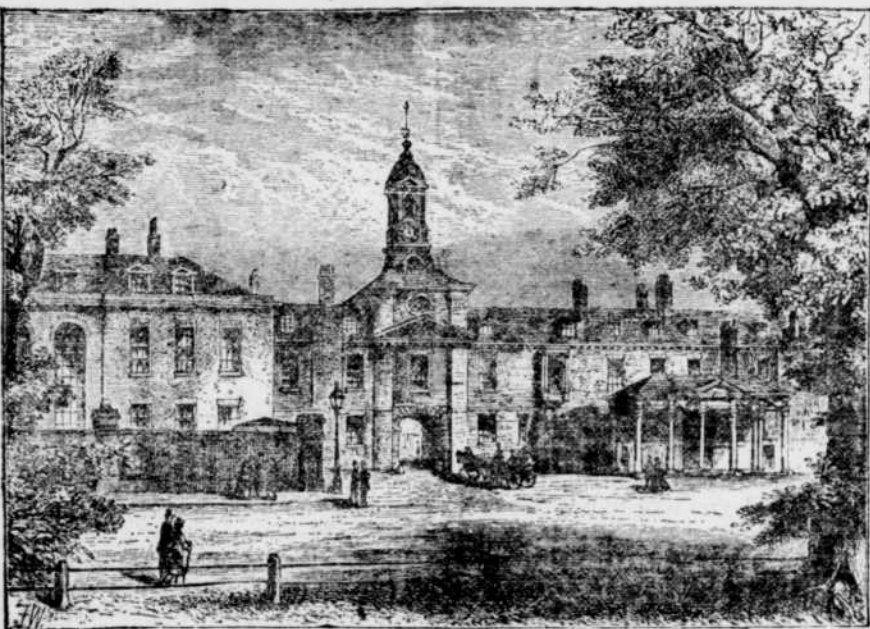
PARLIAMENT WILL MEET.
Parliament will assemble within 24 hours of the death of the Queen, in accordance with the precedent in the case of George III. Emperor William's yacht Hohenzollern has been ordered to leave Kiel immediately. She is expected to arrive at Cowes Friday. No arrangements have yet been made for Emperor William's return to Germany, which is dependent upon eventualities.

CROWDS SANG THE ANTHEM.
There was a remarkable scene outside the Mansion House early this morning. On the receipt of the alarming reports something resembling a groan was uttered by the hundreds of people assembled, and then some one started singing the National Anthem. All heads were bowed, and in a moment the crowds were singing "God Save the Queen" with a fervor proving how earnestly they wished for her recovery. The passengers in passing carriages, cabs and omnibuses joined in the singing, the drivers reverently doffing their hats.

The papers devote columns of space to historical and personal reminiscences, and the scenes and incidents of the Queen's life. Emphasis is laid on the fact that Her Majesty is now paying the penalty for her devotion to affairs of state. It is generally recognized that until a few days ago there was no harder worker in the kingdom. Roughly estimated, she signed 50,000 documents yearly.

No dispatch of any gravity was ever issued from the Foreign Office until seen by the Queen, and some idea of the work thus entailed is gathered from the fact that the Foreign Office handles considerably over a thousand dispatches weekly.

KEPT IN TOUCH WITH PARLIAMENT.
After every sitting of the House of Commons, the Government leader in the House was in the habit of forwarding to the Queen an abstract of the business done. She personally attended to these and frequently returned them with marginal notes asking for explanations.

receive better news of the condition of the Queen. Men of all ages and conditions, women and even children were content to spend a long time in waiting their turn to come within reading distance of the board. As the throng moves slowly past the notice board, those who are unable to get there personally are sending messenger boys with note-books and pencils to bring the text of everything posted. The grief of all is evident, and the relapse announced at 8 o'clock was only too generally anticipated.

ALREADY IN MOURNING.
Never were there so many black ties in the city before the actual arrival of a time of general mourning, and nobody mingling with the crowds can doubt for a moment that everybody in them can have a keen personal interest in the Queen's condition.

GRANDCHILDREN GO TO OSBORNE.
The Duchess of Connaught's children and Mr. A. J. Balfour, the First Lord of the Treasury, started for Osborne this afternoon. Mr. Balfour, it is said, goes as the representative of the Premier, Lord Salisbury. The summoning of Mr. Balfour and the Connaught children is regarded as indicating that the end of Queen Victoria is fast approaching.

RECOGNIZED THE EMPEROR.
Berlin, Jan. 22.—3.39 p. m.—The correspondent of the Associated Press here learns from an official source that Queen Victoria recognized Emperor William when the latter went to her bedside yesterday by giving a sigh of joy. She was unable to converse with him. It is not known how long the Emperor will stay in England.

ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED FOR THE CHANGE.

London, Jan. 22.—The arrangements are already practically complete for meetings of the Privy Council and Parliament, the statutes providing that they shall assemble immediately on the death of a sovereign. The Privy Council could gather together within a few hours.

The ministers will attend, give up their seals of office, be re-sworn, receive the proclamation of the new king, pass votes of condolence and congratulations, and adjourn. After giving up their seals the Ministers will receive them back from the new ruler. The Privy Councilors will also be sworn afresh.

adjournment or prorogation it must assemble immediately. As there is an adjourned session of the new parliament, the two houses must meet at least the day after the Queen's death. The object of this statute is clearly to bring in parliamentary privilege in regulating and sanctioning the succession to the throne. In this emergency it would be a short, formal session, for administering the oath of allegiance to the new King, and there would be probably an immediate adjournment or prorogation until a later period in the spring. Treasury officials are quoted as wondering how, if no legislative business will be done until May, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach can get on without financial supplies and increased borrowing powers when the war is still in progress. It is by no means probable, however, that the usual arrangements for the session and budget work will be upset. The new reign may involve formalities, such as resignations of the ministry but these will not be accepted, and the usual order of legislation is likely to follow.

Other points connected with the succession of the King are in doubt. If the Prince of Wales be at Osborne, however, he will not require formal information respecting the Queen's death.

LORD TENNYSON'S TRIBUTE.

Lord Tennyson wrote the following well known dedication of one of his books to the Queen, in March, 1851, a few months after he had

been appointed poet laureate:—
May children of our children say:
"She wrought her people lasting good;
Her court was pure; her life serene;
God gave her peace; her land reposed
A thousand claims to reverence closed
In her as mother, wife and Queen.

And statesmen at her council met
Who knew the seasons when to take
Occasion by the hand, and make
The bonnet of freedom wider yet.
By shaping some august decree
Which kept her throne unshaken still,
Broad based upon her people's will
And compass'd by the inviolate sea."

KING EDWARD VII.

WILL HOLD HIS FIRST COUNCIL TO-DAY.

London, January 22.—Shortly before midnight an official announcement was issued, calling this (Wednesday) afternoon, to enable members of the House of Lords and House of Commons to take the oath of allegiance to King Edward VII.

The Privy Council will meet in London to-day, and the proclamation of the King will occur thereafter at all places required by custom. The King will come to London to reside over the council.

At the usual dinner of the Hilary Term of Gray's Inn, the Master Teacher said:

"Amid great sorrow we must follow the practice of the constitution and recite 'God Save the King.'"

The chancel bell tolled 82 times, and the benches drank the health of the King.

At the offices of the Lord Chamberlain, St. James' Palace, and of the City Remembrancer, at the Guild Hall, and at the College of Heralds, the officials are preparing for the formalities which, for the first time in a generation, are to occur—the proclaiming of a new ruler of the United Kingdom and of India. The ancient gazettes, court circulars, and other papers which describe the ceremonial of 1837 have been taken from the libraries that the officials may familiarize themselves with the ancient pageantry whereby a sovereign is proclaimed. The City Remembrancer said to-day: "It will depend on the pleasure of the new monarch to decide how far the ancient customs shall be modified to suit modern methods, but in a country where precedents are so firmly adhered to as England, it may be anticipated that we shall follow closely on the acts which prevailed when the Queen ascended the throne. The Privy Council, which is a very large body, will meet at once in St. James Palace, where the form of proclamation, declaring that 'We' etc., 'with one voice and consent of tongue and heart declare and proclaim the High Mighty Prince Albert Edward,' etc., 'who by the

death of the monarch, has become our only lawful and rightful liege,' etc. This proclamation will give the new title the King may assume; but this is not yet announced. The proclamation will then be sent to the Herald's College and the following day to the Earl Marshal, the Garter King-at-Arms, the Heralds, pursuivants, and other officials, the college members, with the Household troops, will proceed from the palace clad in their gorgeous surcoats and proceed to Trafalgar square. There the King-at-Arms will halt, command silence, and read the proclamation. Proceeding down the Strand to Temple Bar another halt will be made to demand an entrance into the city to proclaim the King. There the Lord Mayor and sheriffs, in their state carriages, will form a great procession, and when the Earl Marshal's party comes just within the city boundary, the proclamation will be read again, and the procession will pass down Ludgate Hill and Cheapside to the Royal Exchange, where similar ceremonies will close the spectacle.

Mourning At Ottawa.

OFFICIAL PROCLAMATION WILL BE ISSUED TO-DAY.

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—A meeting of the Privy Council had been called for 2.30, and the ministers met, but it is understood that no business was transacted, pending official notification of Her Majesty's death beyond informant preparations for the issuance of the necessary proclamation. The observance of a period of mourning and the draping of the public buildings, which will be commenced to-morrow

St. John's, Newfoundland, Jan. 22.—Announcement of Queen Victoria's death has called forth expressions of the keenest regret in Newfoundland, the oldest colony of the British Empire. The colonial cabinet met this evening and adopted resolutions of condolence, which were cabled to London.

FRANCE.

Paris, January 22.—As soon as definite information reached Parliament of the Queen's death, the president of the Chambers announced that the next session would be adjourned as a sign of mourning. The French government will be represented at the funeral by an extraordinary embassy.

AT THE HAGUE.

The Hague, January 22.—The Dutch press printed the news of the death of Queen Victoria with mourning borders.

The Court will go into mourning; but it is probable that there will be no change in the arrangements for the marriage of Queen Wilhelmina.

IN VIENNA.

Vienna, January 22.—Emperor Francis Joseph, who was greatly affected to learn that Queen Victoria had passed away, immediately despatched a message of condolence to Osborne.

THE LONDON PRESS.

London, January 23.—All the morning papers appear in heavy mourning borders, with editorials eulogist of the dead Queen and recalling the leading events and

morning, Hon. Mr. Tarte having given instructions this evening.

Some delay in the issue of the official proclamation has been caused by the doubt as to the title of the new king, but this will probably be settled before morning, and the proclamation issued at an early hour to-morrow.

It was 7.30 to-night when His Excellency received the official message announcing the Queen's death. Lord Minto immediately indited the following telegram to the Colonial Secretary:—"The announcement of Her Majesty's death which has just reached Canada, has created universal sorrow. My ministers desire that you will convey to His Majesty the King and to the members of the Royal family an assurance that the people of Canada share in the great grief that has visited them. No greater sovereign has ever ruled the British people or been more beloved and honored by her subjects than Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and by none has this love and respect been more deeply felt than by the people of His Majesty's Dominion of Canada."

Scores of messages of condolence have been received by Lord Minto for transmission to England. His Excellency has cabled for full information regarding the title of the King, the duration of the period of mourning, military salutes, etc. The Secretary of State will, to-morrow, formally notify the lieutenant governors, of all the provinces, of the change of sovereigns.

THE WORLD OVER.

NEWS OF THE QUEEN'S DEATH PROVOKES DEEPEST SYMPATHY AND GRIEF.

Calcutta, January 22.—Queen Victoria's death caused the utmost distress here. All public functions have been abandoned.

Bridgetown, Barbadoes, January 22.—The death of Queen Victoria has plunged the ancient and loyal

characteristics of her reign. Very few political references as to the future are made.

THE EMPRESS EDERERICK.

London, January 23.—The news of her mother's death was tenderly broken to Dowager Empress Frederick, late last evening, says a despatch to the Daily Mail from Frankfurt. 1848—Louis Philippe overthrown.
Second French republic established
with Napoleon III. at its head.
1852—Napoleon III., by treachery
overthrew second French republic
and established the second em-
pire.
1859—Unification of Italy begun.
War of France and Sardinia against
Austria.
1861-5—Civil war in America.
1866—War of Prussia against Aus-
tria.
1867—Union of Austria and Hun-
gary.
1868—Isabella, Bourbon Queen
driven from the Spanish throne
driven from the Spanish throne.
Provisional government established.
1870—Spanish regency under Mar-
shal Serrano established.
1870—Franco-Prussian war begun.
Downfall of second empire of France
and re-establishment of third re-
public. Temporal power of the Pope
abolished and unification of Italy
completed. Amadeo, son of the
King of Italy, made King of Spain.

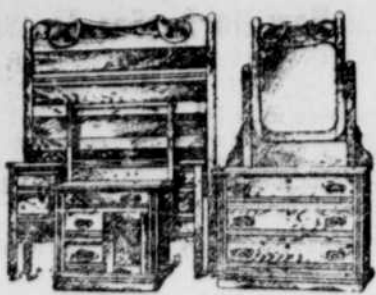

The News in Sherbrooke

The news of the death of the Queen was received with many tokens of regret. Immediately it was officially announced, the flags and residences were hoisted at half-mast out of respect for our beloved Queen Victoria. From several of the churches the bells tolled for a short time.

It is expected that the City Council will meet and pass resolutions of condolence.

JUDGES AND OTHER OFFICIALS MUST TAKE NEW OATH.

By the death of Queen Victoria all judges of the various courts and other officials who took the oath of allegiance to Queen Victoria at the time of their entering upon office, cannot perform any functions between the death of the Sovereign and the issue of the proclamation. They have to take a new oath of allegiance to the heir succeeding the deceased monarch before they can resume their duties again.

The clause in the revised statutes of the Province of Quebec, which are the same as the Dominion statutes, bearing on the subject, is as follows:

(601) Upon the demise of the Sovereign, it is not necessary to renew any commission or appointment by virtue whereof any public officer or employee of the Province held his office or exercised his profession during the preceding reign, but a proclamation is issued by the Lieutenant-Governor authorizing every such officer or employee to continue in the exercise of his functions or profession. Every such officer or employee shall, as soon thereafter as may be, take the oath of allegiance before the officers thereunto appointed. Every public officer or employee continues in the exercise of the duties of his office or profession, as fully as if again appointed by commission or order-in-council under the new sovereign; all acts and things done and performed in good faith by every such officer or employee in the exercise of his duties, between the time of such demise and the issue of the proclamation, are good and valid, provided always that the oath of allegiance be duly taken.

COURTS ADJOURNED.

In consequence of the death of Her Majesty, the Court adjourned this morning and business is suspended at the offices. It is expected that a proclamation will be issued at Ottawa and Quebec during the day.

LATEST FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

TOWN OF HELVETIA ATTACKED.

London, Jan. 22.—Lord Kitchener reports to the War Office that the Boers attacked Helvetia, eastern Transvaal, at midnight. The British suffered no casualties.

Capetown, Jan. 21.—Fifty Boers looted the town of Aberdeen with out opposition. They took eighty horses.

The residents of the Hanover district have been warned that they must surrender to the government modern rifles hereafter, all the guns heretofore turned in being antiquated weapons. Steps are being taken to enforce the orders for the delivery of all arms and ammunition.

Fighting is reported to have occurred outside of Maraisburg, in which a corporal was wounded. It is believed that the invaders are marching towards Molteno. The town of Maraisburg was not entered.

A despatch to a New York paper says that Mr. Merriman has sailed for England and that he goes instructed by a majority of the bond members to advise Kruger and Fisher to accept terms other than independence.

The game was a hard fought one throughout and much closer than the score would indicate. Sherbrooke now looks like champions of the Eastern series of the league.

CRESCENTS BEAT SHERBROOKE.

Quebec, Jan. 21.—In the intermediate match, played here last evening between Sherbrooke and Crescents, the latter won by 6 to 2. The match was witnessed by a large crowd, and was the best seen here this season. Mr. D. Watson made an impartial referee, and was only called upon to put a Crescent man off the ice.

Sherbrooke stands a good chance of winning out in the championship. They have won three and lost one out of six.

A FREAK OF NATURE.

A Dam in Arizona Which is Made of Soda.

Probably few people ever heard of a soda dam, but such a freak of nature really exists in an unfrequented part of the great west. A. O. Wright of the Indian service, who travels extensively through that section of the country west of the Missouri river, in speaking of strange things he has encountered in his tours alluded to the soda dam. Asked what he meant by a soda dam, he said:

"In Box canyon, just above the hot springs of the Jemez river, Arizona, is a dam extending from one wall of the gorge to the other. This dam is nothing more or less than a massive wall of pure soda, rising to a height of 100 feet, and probably 600 feet from end to end. Nature's forces, of course, started their work of construction away back in the dim and distant past, when deposits of soda contained in the water thrown off by the springs were made at the base of what has since developed into one of the natural wonders of the west. Those deposits must have been made with remarkable rapidity.

"Just ten years ago the Jemez river rose to an unprecedented height, and under the abnormal pressure of the torrent a lower section of the dam gave way, leaving a breach in the all of soda about 20 feet high. When the water subsided, the lake formed by the dam was, of course, destroyed, leaving the upper 80 feet of the dam high and dry.

"I passed through that section of Arizona this last summer, and purposely visited the soda dam. I was most astonished to see that the 20 foot breach had been nearly filled in. The soda from the springs had made fresh deposits, and gradually patched up the hole made in 1890. At the present rate the breach will be entirely closed in another year and the lake will assume its former proportions.

"Previous to the break in the dam the lake above was fully 600 feet wide and extended up the canyon for at least three-quarters of a mile. Scientists who have examined the dam are of the opinion that it will never attain a height much above 100 feet, for the deposits in the water seem to sink in that great depth before the brink is reached. As they fall, however, they will tend to strengthen the base of the dam and will gradually decrease the depth of the lake at its lower end."—Washington Star.
