

REPORTED FOREIGNERS ARE FLEEING FROM MOSCOW

Lenroot Measure Reviewed--De Valera Pleased With Results

Rumors Of A New Russian Terror Heard In London

Stated that Strict Censorship imposed on All News from Russia Accounts for Inability to Confirm Sensational Stories, Which Tell, Among Other Things, of "Mass Executions" in Many Parts of Union of Soviet Socialist Republic.

STATED THAT POPULACE OF MOSCOW TERROR-STRICKEN Moscow and Leningrad Do Not Possess Enough Prison Accommodation for Additional Thousand Persons Arrested Past Few Days and Guarded Freight Trains Are Leaving Both Cities Nightly, Taking Victims to Siberia.

(Associated Press Despatch) LONDON, June 15.—Rumors of a new terror in Russia, with numerous summary executions, wholesale arrests, impending declaration of martial law and crowds of foreigners fleeing from Moscow are current in London. They emanate from Warsaw, Riga and other centres which are notoriously given to circulating anti-Soviet reports, and whether they are based on facts could not be substantiated today from any independent reliable source.

It is said that a strict censorship imposed on all telegrams from Russia accounts for the inability to confirm the sensational stories, which tell, among other things, of "mass executions" in many parts of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, including Valdivostok, the Caspian region, the Republics of South Russia and Moscow and Leningrad.

Police Given Free Hand The G. P. U. (Political police) is reported as having been given a free hand, with the power of life or death over citizens and as making liberal use of those powers, which, it is declared, is in accordance with Soviet law.

The population of Moscow is panic-stricken, with reservists being called to the colors. According to a Warsaw despatch to the Daily Mail, the Ukraine army alone will be increased by many thousands. This report says that boys and girls are being taught rifle shooting and that the workers are being compelled to devote their evenings to military training. The despatch suggests these preparations are due to "expected war with Poland."

More Than Hundred Executed Among other reports of alleged terror, is one from Helsinki, Finland, which asserts that the Finnish General Elvenberg, one of the twenty whose execution was announced officially at Moscow several days ago, after the assassination at Warsaw of the Russian envoy Vonoff, was actually put to death some time ago, after undergoing a series of tortures from which he became insane. It is impossible to obtain verification of this and similar stories. A despatch from Riga to the Daily Mail tells of the shooting at Moscow of twenty-eight former officers of the Czar's army and says that more than one hundred persons have been shot in reprisal for the assassination of M. Voloff.

Suicides Numerous. "This new terror," the correspondent adds, "has more than doubled the number of suicides in Moscow, where there now are from ten to fifteen daily. Moscow and Leningrad do not possess enough prison accommodations for the additional thousand persons arrested the past few days, and guarded freight trains are leaving both cities nightly, taking victims to Siberia. The correspondent quotes what he says is an announcement of the Moscow newspaper Izvestia, organ of the federal executive committee of the Soviets, that twenty-five prominent persons held as hostages in Moscow will be put to death in the event of further attacks on commissars."

LINDBERGH WAS BANQUET GUEST OF NEW YORK

3,500 Attended Banquet—Young Flier Spoke of Need for Development of Aviation in United States.

NEW YORK, June 15.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, hero of New York to Paris flight, was the guest of the City of New York last night at a banquet to which 3,500 people sat down. The crush to see the young aviator was so great that many officials found difficulty in getting into the hall.

Mayor Walker was Lindbergh's host and he and Governor Al Smith loaded the Colonel with encomiums.

Lindbergh in reply spoke of the need for development of aviation in the United States.

He expected, he said, a great advance in the use of multi-motored planes, and he urged the establishment of air ports throughout the country and the general support of the people toward flying.

Lindbergh signed his first contract for \$2,000,000 worth of contracts offered him. It calls for publication of a 50,000 word book of his life, his flight to Paris, his reception in Paris, England and Belgium, and his views on the future of aviation. Most of his manuscript is ready. Payment will be on the regular royalty basis.

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States Quebec Will Stick To British Connection As Long As Empire Continues

Ontario and Quebec Premiers Sang "Alouette" Together at Dinner Offered by Toronto to Delegates to Ninth Annual Convention of Union of Municipalities of Province of Quebec.

COMPTON, Que., June 15.—The closing exercises at King's Hall, Compton, were held yesterday afternoon, and were attended by a large number of parents and friends, as well as many former students of the school. The reports of the lady principal and the examiner showed the fine work done by the pupils and teachers during the year. The musical programme testified to the successful work in this department and showed that there was much musical talent among the pupils, while the programme of rhythmic dancing was excellent. The Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Quebec presented the prizes, and at the opening of the programme he extended a welcome to Miss Joll, the lady principal of the school, on her return after a serious illness which was heartily seconded by the enthusiastic applause of those present.

The musical programme contained part songs by the senior and junior classes, and vocal solos were given by Misses I. Mitchell and M. Pirie, and those playing piano solos were Misses D. Cowan, M. Pirie, M. Trimble and H. Bell.

Principal's Report Miss Joll, the lady principal of King's Hall, gave a very favorable report of the school year. The music department had done excellent work, she said, and a number of pupils had passed the examinations of the Royal College of Music. The art section had some fine work to its credit, and rhythmic dancing had been taken up extensively at the school the past year. Miss Joll spoke of the subject of elementary chemistry, which had been added to the school curriculum recently, and expressed the hope that in time there would be more positions open to girls which would enable them to use this subject. She said that the girls had been able to pay off the debt of the altar of the church. The health of the school had been excellent during the year. Miss Joll thanked both teachers and pupils for the way in which they had carried on the work during her absence. She welcomed the old girls who were present, and in conclusion she addressed herself to those who were leaving the school, either to take up a career or to go abroad. She wished them every success in whatever they undertook.

Examiner's Report The McGill examiner said that the school had never been better in its scholarship and that the examination papers he had corrected were noticeable for their clearness, neatness and discretion. They were all of a high standard and merited more high marks than any he had corrected for some time. He had observed the school at work and at play, and it was in excellent condition, he said. The pupils took a live interest in all they did and the quality of the teaching staff had impressed him. The mutual effort of pupils and instructors was an asset to the school, and the papers he had examined showed good instruction and study. He paid a tribute to Miss Joll for her work and the excellent results of the school under her direction.

Before the distribution of the prizes Miss Joll spoke of the competition in all the grades due to the fact that there were a number of pupils who were new to the school.

"May I say to you in conclusion," he said, "without any suggestion of political color, that the great object I have aimed at in my public life is not political advantage, but to make worth while contributions to the progress of this great country of ours."

Rev. Dr. F. E. Powell, of this city, told the delegates that he was brought up an Orangeman and was still a member of the Orange order. "But after tonight," he said, amid laughter, "I am not sure that I want to remain an Orangeman. When we rub shoulders together, all our differences fade into thin air. If Rev. Father Broussau, of St. Jerome, who is here as a delegate tonight wishes to be my guest and share my bed with me, he will be most welcome."

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MANY ATTEND CLOSING DAY AT KING'S HALL

Report of Principal and Examiner—Lord Bishop of Quebec Distributed Prizes—Programme of Music and Rhythmic Dancing.

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RESULTS OF JUNE EXAMINATIONS IN BOTH FACULTIES OF BISHOP'S UNIVERSITY ANNOUNCED TODAY

Three Qualify for M.A., Twenty-Five for B.A., and Five for Divinity—First Class Standing in Honors Courses by J. D. Jefferies, D. B. Ames and R. T. Carson—M. Echenberg and Miss Hunting Lead in Options—J. W. R. Meakin and J. B. Creegan Lead Final Year in Divinity—Standing in First and Second Years Announced.

THE results of the final examinations at the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, posted late Monday night, indicate that three candidates have been successful in qualifying for the degree of Master of Arts, twenty-five for Bachelor of Arts, and five for the Licentiate in Sacred Theology, which degrees will be conferred at Convocation on Thursday. The outstanding students in the final year of Arts were J. D. Jefferies, Lennoxville, who received 1st class classical honors; D. B. Ames, Lennoxville, with 1st class mathematical honors; and R. T. Carson, Windsor, N.S., with 1st class history honors. In the ordinary options, two students received first class standing, M. Echenberg, Sherbrooke, 1st class standing in science, and Miss C. Hunting, Lennoxville, 1st class in French and English. The most successful students in the final year in the Divinity Faculty were J. W. R. Meakin, of Oundle School, England, whose general standing averaged a distinction, that is, even higher than an ordinary first class standing, and J. B. Creegan, B.A., Deseronto, Ont., with first class standing. The standing in the various courses follows:

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TO SEND PLANE TO INVESTIGATE HELP SIGNALS

Possibility that Flares Were Sent Up by Lost French Aviators.

(Associated Press Despatch) QUEBEC, June 15.—Preliminary arrangements are being made here to send a hydroplane to the scene of the distress signals reported to have been seen in the St. Germain township district, northeast of Chateaufort. While there was a possibility that the flares were sent up by the lost French aviators, Nungesser and Goh, who have been in the vicinity since their attempt at a transatlantic flight, information reaching here last night favored the idea that a party of surveyors exploring the Cap Eternite and St. Germain districts were responsible for the flares.

The hydroplane which will make the search is the one which carried on an unsuccessful search for the missing aviators on the north shore of the St. Lawrence and on down to Labrador.

FRANCE WILL FLOAT A NEW FIFTY-YEAR LOAN

All New Money Will Be Applied to Reduction of Advances Made to State by Bank of France.

PARIS, June 15.—Reduction of at least 10,000,000 francs in France's floating debt is expected by bankers to result from the new fifty-year six per cent. loan which has been officially announced.

It is thought half of this will result from conversion of short term national defence bonds and half will be fresh money from the heavy sight deposits held by the government. All the new money will be applied to reduction of the advances made to the state by the Bank of France.

The last loan contained 18,000,000 francs.

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MOON'S ECLIPSE VISIBLE HERE THIS MORNING

Actual Eclipse Lasted Twenty-Two Minutes—At 2.43 Moon Entered Earth's Shadow, Completely Leaving it at 6.06.

Exactly how many local residents took advantage of the occasion to witness the eclipse of the moon, which occurred at 2.43 o'clock this morning, is not known, although it is quite likely that at least some arose in the wee small hours to see the strange workings of nature.

The actual eclipse lasted for twenty-two minutes. At 2.43 o'clock, daylight saving time, the moon entered the earth's shadow and at 4.13 a.m. the eclipse entered its total phase, ending at 4.35 o'clock, the moon leaving the shadow completely at 6.06 o'clock.

Those who did get up early enough to see the eclipse noticed the moon beginning to be cut out by a circular shadow which crept over the moon's surface cutting out a crescent and then blotting it out completely for twenty-two minutes. The crescent then started to reappear on the other side and after about an hour and a half the moon was clear again.

The actual eclipse being only of twenty-two minutes' duration made this one of the shorter eclipses that has occurred in this area. The longest eclipse of the moon within recent times which occurred in this vicinity came on July 22nd, 1888, when it lasted for one hour and forty-two minutes. The shortest came on the 28th of December, 191, and lasted for fifteen minutes. On the occasion of this eclipse of the moon's centre it was cut off a half minute from the shadow centre, whereas in this morning's eclipse there were twenty-six minutes between the moon's centre and the shadow centre. It is this distance which made it of shorter duration.

ECLIPSE SEEN AT CHICAGO. (Associated Press Despatch) CHICAGO, ILL., June 15.—A total eclipse of the moon lasting for twelve minutes was visible in North and South America early today. The phenomenon was observed through clear skies in the parts of the middle west. Chicago observers saw the moon slip into partial obscurity at 1.40 a.m. when the earth first crept between it and the sun. At 3.18 a.m. began the total eclipse, which ended at 3.25 a.m. The shadow passed entirely from the moon's face at 5.06 a.m.

It was the only eclipse either of the moon or sun this year visible in the United States. There will be a total eclipse of the sun on June 29, but only Alaska, Europe, Asia and North Africa will see it.

MONOPLANE "AMERICA" IS READY. ROOSEVELT FIELD, N.Y., June 15.—Commander Richard E. Byrd's tri-motored monoplane "America," was ready today to take off on its non-stop flight to Paris at short notice, but indications were that it would be the end of this week before the start could be made.

Inspection of dairies and stables, it was suggested, could be done by well qualified dairymen, or by the inspectors of large plants, accustomed to such work; but in all cases these inspections would be responsible to Federal Department of Agriculture. The cost of this inspection, it was considered, should be paid by the dairyman.

The regulations contained in the United States bill will be issued shortly, which will enable an inspection before the late fall months. The regulations are not expected to be more severe than those now imposed by Canadian cities.

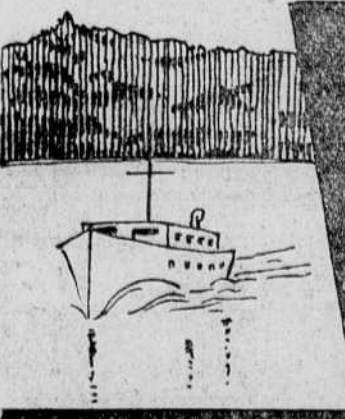

'RAILWAYS' WAS SUBJECT HEARD AT ROTARY CLUB

History of Founding of Railroads Given by Mr. Glenn Sampson—Rotary Club to Unite With Board of Trade on Occasion of Dinner to City Fathers on June 28.

"Railways, and their contribution to the economic development of the civilized world," was the subject of a very interesting address by Mr. Glenn Sampson at the Rotary Club dinner at the New Sherbrooke House last night. Following the introduction by the vice-president, Rotarian Charles St. Jean, who acted in the capacity of chairman in the absence of the president, Rotarian A. C. Skinner, Mr. Sampson gave a brief sketch of the history of the railroad from the opening of the Stockton and Darlington road with its thirty-eight miles of track, in September, 1825, by George Stevenson, to the present day, when some 700,000 miles of track are to be found in the world.

"In 1836, Canada had sixteen miles of railway," continued Mr. Sampson, "today there are 54,000 miles, with a total capitalization of \$3,471,080,909. 109,850,925 tons of freight and 41,458,084 passengers were carried in 1925, there being the latest government statistics available. Of this number only five passengers were killed in train accidents and 374 injured, which means that only one passenger out of every eight and one half million killed," added the speaker.

Mr. Sampson then touched on the subject of taxes paid the government, which he stated amounted to some \$8,997,071.07 in 1925 and pointed out that it seemed hardly fair that the railroads should be forced to pay such a huge amount, much of which went towards the upkeep of roads parallel to their tracks and used by trucks and buses in direct competition with them.

Railroad stocks, Mr. Sampson pointed out, are not owned by a few individuals as a large portion of the public thought, but were in most cases widely scattered in small lots and are often held by people whose livelihood is dependent on the income and he claimed that any legislation enforced to make this an impossibility would not be just. The new three year agreement between the Federal Department of Immigration and Colonization at Ottawa and the Canadian railways.

was brought to the notice of the assembled Rotarians by the speaker. By this agreement, the Federal Department agrees to accept certificates of personal representatives of the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National railways stationed at continental ports, but however, reserves the right to deny admission to immigrants on ground of health or morals. The railways agree to insure employment to immigrants brought in.

A sketch of the history of the Quebec Central Railway was given by the speaker, from the founding of the road in 1869 by Sherbrooke citizens, among whom were the late Sir Alexander Gait and Hon. J. G. Robertson, to the present day when the company operates 359 miles of track through one of the most valuable mineral and agricultural sections in the Province of Quebec. "During the year," stated the speaker, "the total shipments in tonnage over the Quebec Central rails amounted to 1,485,989 tons. The district served by the new line south of Sherbrooke is one of the outstanding agricultural sections of the Province, which is shown by the fact that during the months of June, July and August 1,821,000 quarts of cream were shipped from three stations on this line to Boston and other New England points. The shipments of \$783,874 to the farmers of the district. The territory served by the line north of Sherbrooke also has its agricultural importance, the shipments of cream to Montreal and Quebec totalling 350,748 quarts, the approximate value of which was \$150,821. The shipments of butter and cheese shipped brought the total value in three months to \$2,105,424."

In closing his address, Mr. Sampson brought to the notice of the Rotarians the value of having the Quebec Central Railway headquarters in the city, for he stated, wages paid to employees amounted to \$800,000; money expended by stores department \$400,000 and \$52,528.00 for local, municipal and provincial taxes.

Rotarian A. O. Beck moved a vote of thanks which was seconded by Rotarian Charles St. Jean. One new member, Mr. Leo Lallier, was introduced during the meeting.

After some discussion it was unanimously decided to unite with the local Board of Trade in tendering a dinner to the City Fathers on June 28th.

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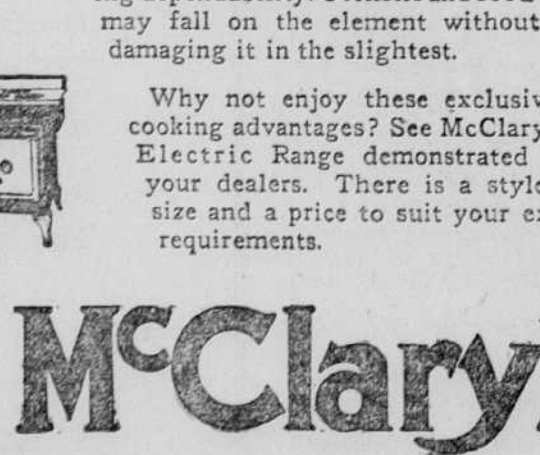

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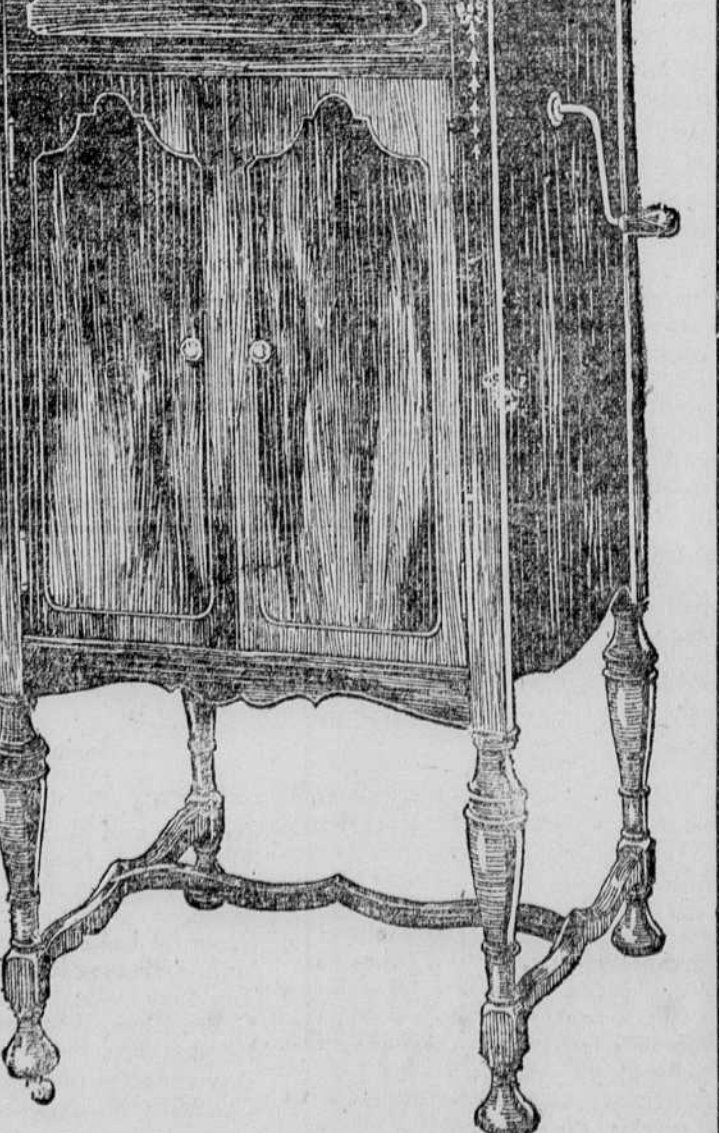

CANADA'S NORTHLAND.

Canada is a very wide country. But, measured, North and South, the inhabited belt is very narrow.

This prompted, Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, in a speech the other day to say:

Often I stand before the map of Canada and look at that narrow belt of civilization which stretches from coast to coast. It is not the length, but the narrowness that is our problem. It is like an elastic belt—in stretching it we narrowed down the width—but having reached the geographical limits it is high time for us to broaden it out, and thus balance off our sectional divisions.

By consolidation I do not mean the shifting of groups from one province to another, but rather the pushing of our frontiers into the north, bringing to the use of man more diversification in production, so that its section will have, as the saying goes, "all its eggs in one basket." Success in this respect will develop interests in common, and encourage willingness to come to reasonable and fair solutions to problems which from time to time arise.

In the next decade, and the next century, this widening process is likely to be very marked. The agricultural belt is much wider than that at present under cultivation, and the mining resources, the fisheries, the fur operations and lumber tracts and the potential water powers extend much farther north.

The Ottawa Journal, commenting upon Mr. Robb's observations, says:

Forty years ago Greeley's advice was "Go West young men." Today the dreams of ambitious youths are turning to the last great unsettled frontier, the Northland which promises mighty recompense to the hardy, adventurous pioneer. There is no doubt that our younger generation and the pick of the new settlers will discover ways and means of making the north an integral part of Canada, and it is no exaggeration to say that a new empire as rich in mines, crops, water power and timber as any portion of the globe will be developed by these 20th century pioneers.

But the doubters and pessimists are with us today as they were with those who dreamed great dreams 60 years ago. Then our vast unfurrowed prairies which now supply a third of the universe with bread were known only to Indians, fur traders, missionaries and a few explorers. When a transcontinental railway was proposed to link them up with the narrow belt of Ontario and Quebec even so potent a voice as that of Edward Blake was uplifted against the criminal folly of wasting money in laying tracks across such "permanently uninhabitable areas" and an eminent British visitor declared that it was utterly impossible for Europeans to exist all the year in a location where the city of Prince Albert now stands.

Those of faint heart today advocate concentration on those regions which have already been opened up and are just as pessimistic about the possibilities of northern expansion as were their early predecessors on the drive to the west. But the push to the north goes on with increasing momentum. Northern Ontario has been transformed in the past 25 years from a comparative wilderness to one of the richest mineral and agricultural sections of the Dominion; thousands are pouring into northern Quebec whose vast stores of copper and gold and tremendous water power make its successful development a glorious certainty; away to the northwest the fertile Peace River Valley is rewarding its pioneers and even further afield the discovery of oil between Fort Norman and the Arctic Circle forecasts an expansion which will banish even the mythological terrors of the sub-polar areas. The Viking call is continent wide and who will dare to predict what by the end of the century will be the population and prosperity of the last great north.

There is no reason to believe that the Ottawa writer is over optimistic. As Canada's population grows, expansion northward will continue. Nine million people are already occupying a vast area in Canada. When this becomes twenty and thirty millions the northland will have come into its own.

PRESS COMMENT

THE WAR WITH RUSSIA.

(Col. J. F. C. Fuller, D.S.O., in the London Nineteenth Century and After)

In the war which Russia has been waging with us during the last nine years we have received many psychological blows, and suffered more than one reverse, yet we have delivered no single blow in return, since we do not possess weapons that can reach her. Her aim is to undermine Western civilization, and her main tools are gold and propaganda. There is nothing new in this form of attack—it is patently Oriental—yet we have no certain means of protecting ourselves against it, since for centuries we have been thinking in terms of physical warfare.

THE VALUE OF CLEAN LIVING.

(Montreal Star)

The value of clean living to the individual and to society has been established beyond cavil, but every now and then its results are so strikingly demonstrated as to command special attention.

Such a demonstration occurred at Boston when De Mar, veteran runner of 38 years, won the most grueling physical contest of the Continent—the Boston Marathon. At a time of life when he must be excused for turning to golf, he matched his stamina and his judgment against the pick of the Continent, and won.

A short distance behind him raced the gray-haired Kennedy, who won the contest ten years ago. The sixth to finish was the veteran Fabre of Montreal. He was the victor twelve years ago and has finished in the vanguard many times since.

The event was productive of a score of similar incidents, but the lesson is identical. Clean living pays dividends in health, in happiness and in success in life.

KING ARTHUR TO THE FORE AGAIN.

(Christian Science Monitor)

Perhaps the nearest relationship that has heretofore been established between America and Good King Arthur of mythical renown was when a certain Connecticut Yankee is reputed to have found himself the center of interest in his court. Now, however, a definite bond has been forged with the donation of \$1,000 recently sent by the Knights of the Round Table of America to the Carle Foundation Committee, to help defray the cost of a further exploration of the Roman amphitheater there, which is the legendary home of the central hero of the Arthurian legend.

It really matters not a great deal whether there was a historic Arthur, a subject which, one reads, has been much debated. Nor is one prepared to take up the cudgels to prove that, within the confines of this monarch's realm, a Connecticut Yankee ever accomplished wonders over which many young persons and many older ones too have laughed long and loudly. Of more importance is the sentiment expressed by Vivian Mearns, of Seattle, the prime mover in America's effort to raise these funds, in a letter to Dr. Mortimer Wheeler, secretary of the London Museum:

When one remembers what a great influence the chivalry and ideals of King Arthur's court had in the early days, what an aid they have been even in this busy commercial age to those who strive for better things, one cannot but feel it is both a privilege and an honor to aid in any way in preserving that priceless spot whence those beautiful and enduring ideals emanated.

Whatever may have been the influence, however, that King Arthur exercised upon the ideals of the world, this move of the Knights of the Round Table of America is welding it into a practical bond of friendship that should grow stronger with the years.

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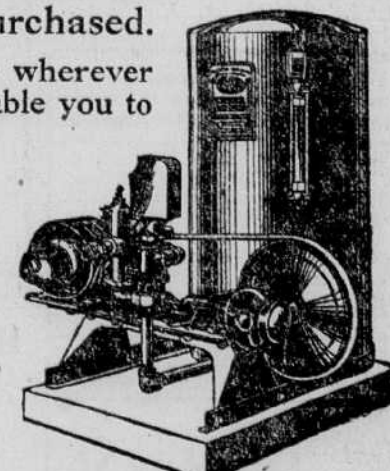
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THETFORD AND GRANBY LADIES IN TOURNEY

STUDY PROBLEM OF RHINELAND OCCUPATION

ALLIED SUPERVISION OF DISMANTLING OF GERMAN FORTRESSES IS ALSO BEING CONSIDERED.

GENEVA, June 15.—The foreign ministers of Great Britain, France, Germany and Belgium, and also representatives of Italy and Japan, met privately last night and for two hours discussed the general European political situation, but especially the problem of the Rhineland occupation. Later they issued a common communiqué, limited to revealing that they will meet again at 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

M. Briand, however, added that he hoped tomorrow to reach agreement on the questions at issue. Allied supervision of the dismantling of the German fortresses, it is understood, is one of the questions to be considered, and the German spokesman indicated that Germany would accept some modified arrangement.

The day's lay-off for the Yanks incidentally deprived "Babe" Ruth of the chance to hit any home runs and put him behind his record of 1921.

On June 14, 1921, he hit numbers twenty-two and twenty-three. He now has twenty-one. In the number of games played, however, "Babe" is still ahead of his record.

A GOOD SWING IS ONLY ACQUIRED THROUGH CAREFUL PRACTICE—

If a player already has a poor or jerky swing, how should he go about correcting it—if he should?

A poor or jerky swing is one of the big handicaps in golf. If the player cannot diagnose the fault in his swing, the club professional should be immediately consulted before the fault gets so bad it cannot be quickly corrected. A smooth swing in the proper arc is the only way a golf ball should be struck. The timing of a swing lacking in smoothness and containing a jerky motion is vastly more difficult than the timing of a smooth, effortless swing. After all, timing is the big thing in getting distance without great effort, and smoothness must be a corollary to good timing.

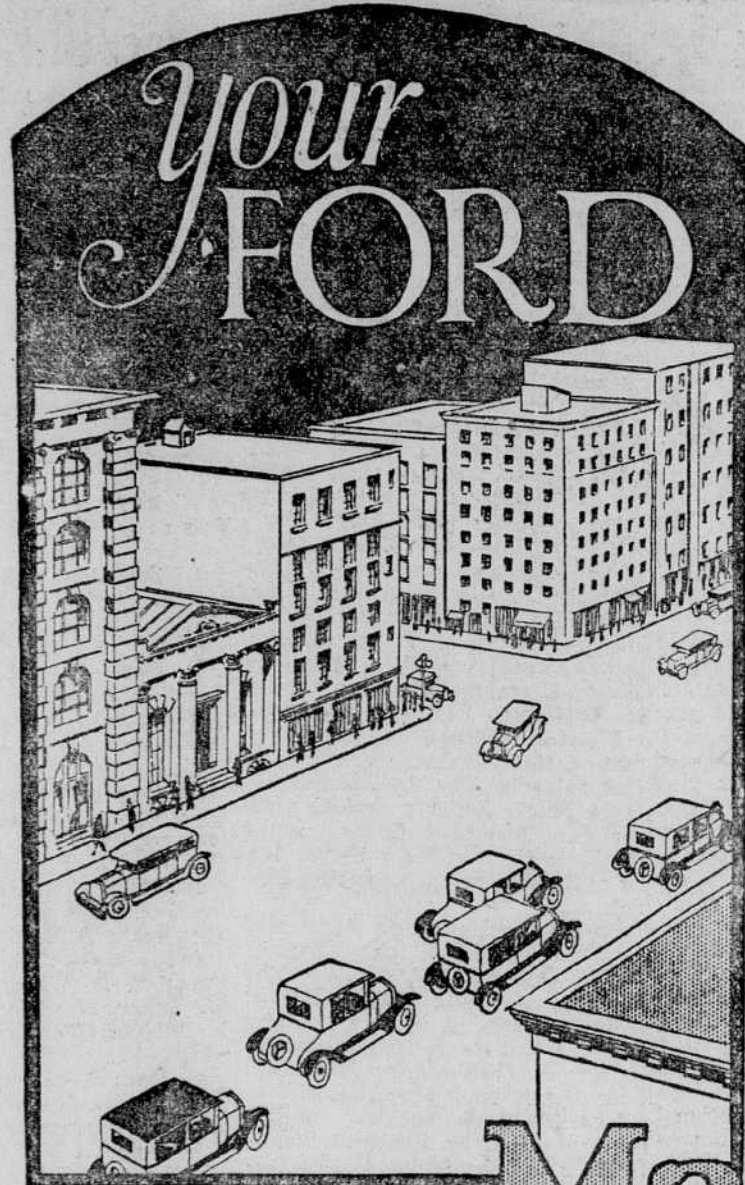
