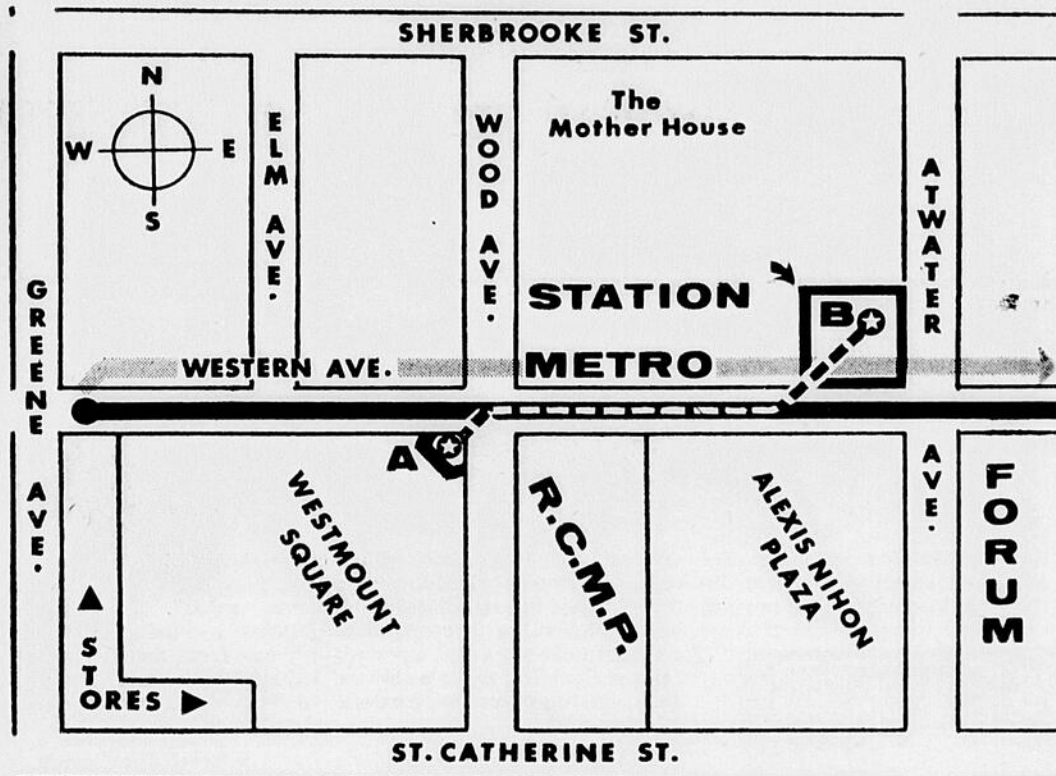
Blue sky, harvest moon weather into mid-week. Afternoons sultry. Possibility of very local thunder showers with hail and gale winds. Valley mists morning and evening.

Mainly sunny and very warm everywhere through the middle of this week. Night and day temperatures, 40 to 75°F.

Heavy rains, with hail will follow, due to tropical storms in south and near our Atlantic coasts. 1" to 1½" for the Maritimes, and ½ to ¾" elsewhere. Gale force winds can cause considerable damage at this time.

Clearing generally for a pleasant weekend.

Tunnelling to close Western for 100 days

The Westmount Centre Inc., builders of Westmount Square, have been granted the right to construct a pedestrian tunnel to link up with the Metro station at Atwater and Western.

The tunnel will extend right down the centre of Western avenue from the southwest corner of Wood and will enter the west wall of the subway station. Construction is due to begin any day now, and the operation on Western avenue will be done with the 'open cut' method, meaning digging from the street down.

100 days

What does this mean to you? Just this, Western avenue from Wood to Atwater will be closed to all traffic for at least 100 days.

However inconvenient this 100 day detour may be to residents, one can't help but marvel at the engineering feat that is involved.

The actual tunnel will come north from the Square at the northeast corner of Wood for only a few feet. Once it reaches the centre of Western avenue, it will bear right and continue down the centre of Western avenue to the west wall of the Metro station.

This may not sound very difficult, but when one remembers that the Metro western storage yards are directly beneath Western avenue from Atwater to Greene, one can appreciate the problem at hand, especially when the ceiling of the subway

lies only 30 feet under Western avenue.

Therefore this Westmount Square tunnel must be built between the subway below and the road above — allowing enough clearance to assure the safety of both.

So, when you stop and think about it, 100 days for 1 block of tunnel as described above is not bad at all.

Westmount and Montreal city engineers have both seen the plan of the tunnel and have both agreed. The only thing being waited upon now is a permit to start construction.

The Future

But, residents, this tunnel will save much more time in the future than it will cost you while it's under construction. Granted 100 days is a long wait, but think what it will mean when the tunnel is complete.

It will give Westmounters a direct access to Metro from Greene avenue, in fact, one could walk underground from Greene avenue to Cabot Square due to this tunnel.

When you add onto this the fact that the City of Westmount was going to close the street in that section anyway to repave it, the extra time will be worth it.

Library takes a look back to the 1940's

Non-fictional best-sellers did not include a single "war book" and featured such titles as: "I Married An Adventurer", by Osa Johnson; "A Smattering Of Ignorance", Oscar Levant; "Land Below The Wind", by Agnes Newton Keith; "New England Indian Summer", by Van Wyck Brooks; and "Days Of Your Years", by Pierre Van Paassen.

War

The year 1942 brought about the appearance of many "war books" on the best-seller list as the United States struck their first offensive blow in the bombing of Tokyo. On the top of the best-seller list was "The Song of Bernadette", by Franz Werfel; followed by John Steinbeck's "The Moon is Down". Other fiction successes were: "Dragon Seed", by Pearl Buck, "Drivin' Woman", by Elizabeth Pickett; "Windswept" by Mary Ellen Chase; "The Robe", by Lloyd C. Douglas; and "The Keys of The Kingdom", A. J. Cronin.

The rookie of World War II, Private Hargrove, was the star of hit book of 1942 fiction; sales

in all editions topped 2,000,000. Next in succession were: "Mission to Moscow", by Joseph E. Davies; "The last Time I saw Paris", by Elliott Paul; "They Were Expendable", by W. W. White; "Flight to Arras", by Antoine de St. Exupery and finally, "Inside Latin America", by John Gunther.

All are available for circulation at the library.

Tenants demand report

City officials have stated that the Urban Renewal Report, which they are currently studying, will be made available to the public in a shorter form in five weeks, if possible.

The report came under fire at a recent meeting of the Westmount Tenants Association where chairman Al Fisher stated that, "We know there is a lot in it, but we want to know what's in it."

The Selby area residents are hopeful that the report will hold some answer to their problem of housing. The Trans-Canada Highway will make its way through their homes by June of next year. As of yet, many of the 200 odd families who must leave have not found a place to live.

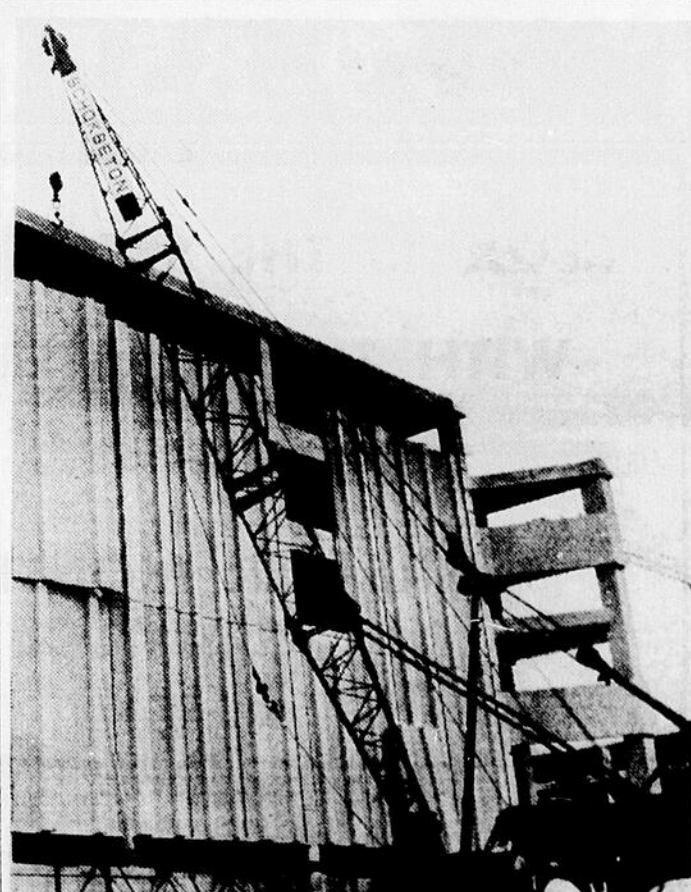
The city has set up a relocation office for these people, but, as was told to the WTA meeting by several people, "They just send us to Point St. Charles."

Westmount Square — on schedule; due to open in May 1967

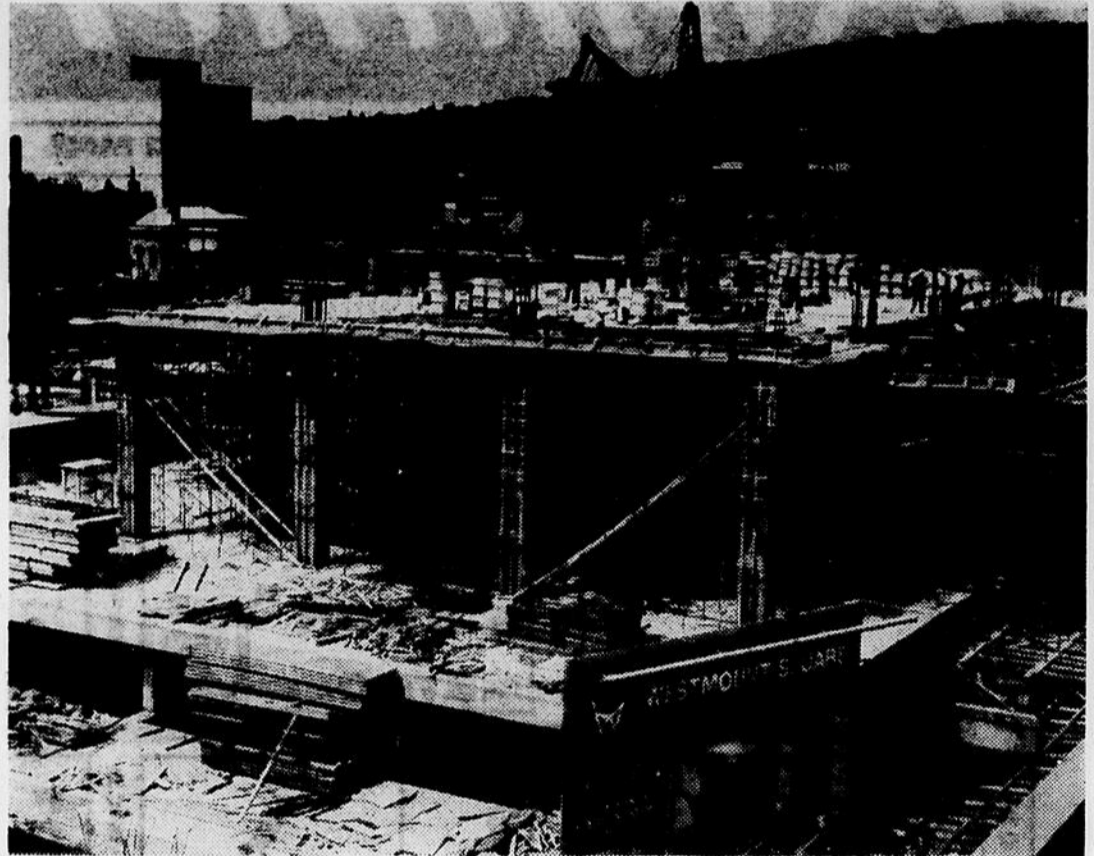
The \$25 million Westmount Square complex, now rising well above ground in the Western-Greene and St. Catherine-Wood avenue area of Westmount will become one of Canada's most unique residential-commercial building projects when it stands substantially completed in May 1967.

The three 21-storey towers, each sheathed in a black, Durachron aluminum curtain-wall, will rise dramatically against Montreal's changing skyline — the design of architect Meis van der Rohe, creator of the famous Seagram Building in New York City and the Toronto-Dominion Centre in downtown Toronto.

Westmount Square is actually Canada's first example of the present trend toward the combined working-living and shopping-recreation environment which is now re-vitalizing many major cities on this continent.

Briefly then, Westmount Square can best be described as Montreal's — and Canada's — first city-within-a-city.

Immensity of the Complex
Situating on a tract of 155,000 square feet of land, Westmount



Square contains an impressive array of structures. These include a 21-storey ultra-modern

office tower; two 21-storey luxury apartment buildings; a three-storey intermediate building designed to accommodate a department store and a restaurant; a shopping mall; a theatre and extensive underground parking.

The main structures will stand completely detached and will occupy only a small part of the total land area. The surrounding space will then be transformed into a park-like setting to form a beautifully landscaped plaza complete with flowers, trees, pools and pedestrian walkways.

The Office Tower

The 21-storey office tower, which will be known officially as One Westmount Square, has been designed as a superior quality office building, centrally air-conditioned and with the best combination of functional and aesthetic elements of contemporary architecture.

"One Westmount Square will offer tenants the very best in efficiency, comfort, service and utility," the architects declare.

Highlights of the office tower will include: 10,500 square feet of rentable space on 19 typical upper floors and 5,000 square feet on the ground floor; dual duct system of heating, cooling and humidity control, designed to maintain maximum comfort all year around; six Otis high-speed Autotronic elevators; each upper floor will have approximately 420 linear feet of natural light from eight-foot high windows of solar grey, polished plate glass; suspended acoustic tile ceilings, recessed fluorescent lighting fixtures and vinyl-asbestos tiled floors. Washrooms and drinking fountains are provided on each floor. Indoor parking for approximately 750 cars will be available in the lower levels of the office tower for tenants and business visitors.

Luxury Apartment Buildings

The twin 21-storey luxury apartment buildings will contain approximately 250 distinctive and luxurious suites ranging in size from one-bedroom to five-bedroom plans. All apartments will have individually controlled air-conditioning and heating.

The architects make special mention of the solar grey thermal, polished plate glass used in all windows throughout the two residential towers. They also

point out with great pride that the parquet floors are "cushioned soled". This is accomplished by using a hardwood product from Sweden which has a half-inch of felt firmly glued to the underside of the parquet flooring.

Special Apartments

An outstanding feature of the overall designing is the provision for duplex penthouse apartments on the top six floors of each building . . . a two-level effect with living room and social areas on the lower floor

The University of Peace

This is the last in a series of stories by Michel Shore, a Notre Dame College Arts student who lives in Westmount and has just returned from spending a term at the famous University of Peace in Belgium.

After a two week session in Belgium, many thoughts passed my mind. Thoughts of a "University of Peace," thoughts concerning a great man, a Nobel peace prize winner, the Founder of the University of Peace, thoughts of Congressionists students of peace gathered from five different continents, 22 countries, members of five religions and different ideologies, thoughts of great friendships bound together from the four corners of the world, thoughts of concrete application of these ideals into definite actions, thoughts aimed at using the raw material already available, a certain instinctive good will of men which does exist although at times many do not want to admit it.

Understanding

The prime example is that such a "University of Peace" exists dedicated to revealing different cultures, socials and ideologies within the teachings of the "Fraternal Dialogue," showing "The harmonization of all men in all their differences." In understanding and accepting people for what they are and for what they believe in, a mutual respect for one another is created. Finally, a realization dawns upon us that all of humanity is closely bound together in every breath and motion it

takes. The University of Peace reflects these goals where men and women from varied professions take the time to come to learn about Peace and how it can be brought about. Professors specialists in underdeveloped countries, the United Nations, other facets of World Affairs, and observers in economic (social and political problems (outlined in detail in previous articles) come to enlighten the session of difficulties facing man, and solutions are put forth. However, no one at the University of Peace is naive enough to say that the road to Peace is short, simple and without obstacles, a long and difficult path lies ahead. The destination of Peace can only be reached if men will be ready to lay aside their "preconceived mistrust." At the moment when societies will admit that no one holds the monopoly on truth then a "stable peace" will become reality.

During my discussions with Father Pire, sitting in the calm scenic surroundings of the Meuse Valley, I felt that I was speaking to a very extraordinary person because for him Peace not only represents an ideal but a way of life put into practical application. His University of Peace which he built with funds from the Nobel Peace Prize (1958) and the support of other Nobel Prize winners such as his very good friend, Albert Schweitzer. This University of Peace has created, since its foundation in 1960, about 500 workers for Peace throughout the world. Organizations and active groups of common understanding have been formed in several countries by students of the University. Father Pire's "Island of Peace" which has brought hope to so many habitants of Pakistan, his Refugee Villages in Europe which have given homes to those who were so long homeless, and his Orphan and Refugee Program in Africa and Tibet demonstrate living symbols of the dynamism of a truly great man. (These realizations were mentioned in detail in last week's articles.)

Barriers

In his very famous book "Battir la Paix." (To Build Peace) which has been published in many countries including Canada, the "Fraternal Dialogue" explains how to break the barriers of misunderstanding in establishing peace. This quotation by a jurist friend of the Nobel Peace Prize winner exhibits the spirit of the Dialogue "To listen well before to speak well and then to relate well; this is to understand that the other one also has a message to give and we also have a message to be given." The book is written in a series of interviews between Father Pire and Dr. Charles Dricot, who represents the modern reader who criticizes idealism and the possibility of Peace in this life. These interviews are bound together throughout by a common thread of a mutual interest for man and his problems. The most evident aspect of his work insists on the necessity that man must get down from his pedestal and abandon personal pride in order to treat each human being with equal dignity. The book echoes the fact that Peace is something

tangible; if you want Peace, prepare for Peace.

When Father Pire's book appeared in Canada early this year, he was invited for a series of interviews and engagements in Montreal to speak about his book and his principles for Peace. A Montreal journalist asked him if he would be interested in contributing to Expo '67. The Dominican Father replied that he would be delighted to create a Peace Pavillion for the World's Fair in Montreal. The Nobel Peace Prize winner said, "How can a World Exhibition with the theme 'Terres des Hommes' (Earth of Men) take place without such a Pavillion, unifying men

in principles of Peace. A few days later, blueprints were drawn up. Father Pire formed and brought forth many wonderful ideas in a written planification, composed of films of different countries' problems, pamphlets and an entire program to be shown in the Pavillion; an ideal place was reserved at Expo for such a Pavillion and a group of architects made the idea into reality on technical drawings. However, the entire plan, energy and great ideas had to be abandoned because the people who had taken charge of the pavillion did not find the financial backing. It is extremely unfortunate for such a

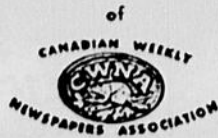

Call off politics

Or can a responsible Leader of the Opposition make more gains for himself and his party, at the same time contributing to the country's welfare, by statesmanlike behavior in support of the Government in power when emergencies confront the nation? Biography of Streets

Grosvenor avenue

CONTRIBUTED BY THE WESTMOUNT HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The following historical information on Grosvenor avenue taken from the City of Westmount Council Minutes is of sufficient interest to merit publication.

While no historical tie-up with this name is available, it is interesting to note that Grosvenor was the family name of a former Duke of Westminster.

July 8, 1897 — That the Road Committee be and are hereby authorized to construct drains on Grosvenor and Roslyn avenues between Cote St. Antoine and Sherbrooke streets.

Nov. 8, 1897 — A letter was read from **G. E. Blackwell** requesting that the Council order the construction of a drain in Grosvenor avenue between Western avenue and Sherbrooke street to serve buildings in course of erection by him, which having been considered, it was resolved that Blackwell's request be granted and the necessary orders be given the Road Department.

July 4, 1898 — That water mains be laid and drains constructed in Roslyn avenue and Grosvenor avenue between Sherbrooke street and Western avenue.

Jan. 4, 1899 — By-law No. 100 to impose a building line of 14 feet on Grosvenor avenue was submitted and taken into consideration.

Sept. 5, 1899 — Read petition signed by **G. E. Blackwell, J. T. Bolt**, and a number of other proprietors on Grosvenor avenue, asking that a by-law establishing a building line on said avenue be amended by permitting steps and bay-windows to project over the said building line.

Oct. 2, 1899 — Councillor Redfern gave notice that at the next general Session of Council he would introduce a by-law to amend by-law No. 100 re Grosvenor avenue building line — either by a new definition of the "building line" or by altering the depth of the present building line on a portion of the street, or both as may be found necessary.

Nov. 6, 1899 — Having taken the said report concerning building lines into consideration, including a letter dated Nov. 6, 1899 from **John Stewart** inquiring as to the operation of the building line on Grosvenor avenue between Sherbrooke street and Cote St. Antoine road, the whole matter was referred to the committee.

June 2, 1902 — That a new 2000 c.p. arc light be placed on Grosvenor avenue below Sherbrooke street.

May 4, 1903 — That the Montreal Water and Power Company be notified to place a hydrant at the corner of Grosvenor and Western avenues.

March 29, 1904 — That a drain be constructed on Grosvenor avenue above Cote St. Antoine road sufficiently to serve the property of **William Reid**.

April 5, 1904 — Read letter from **James Hutcheson** dated April 4, 1904 concerning the opening of Roslyn and Grosvenor avenues above the Boulevard was referred to the Road Committee for

consideration on motion of **Councillor Galbraith**.

May 2, 1904 — That the Council provide the amount of \$4,443. for the construction of sewers in Roslyn and Grosvenor avenues and the sum of \$800. for the grading of the same avenues, the whole in accordance with the estimate of the Town Engineer.

May 1, 1905 — That new gullies be placed at the following points: one on the corner of the Boulevard and Westmount avenue, south side, east of Wood avenue; Dorchester street at Columbia avenue; two on Grosvenor

avenue midway between Sherbrooke street and Cote St. Antoine road.

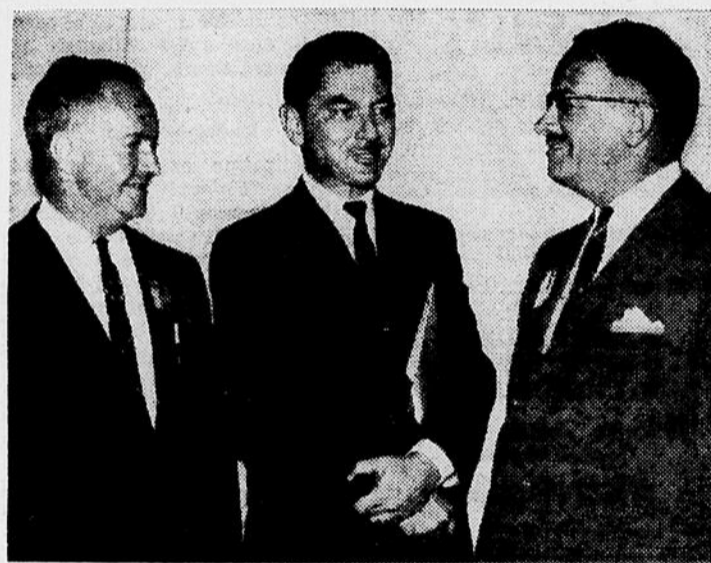
July 3, 1905 — That Grosvenor avenue be macadamized from Cote St. Antoine road to Westmount avenue and graded from Westmount avenue to the Boulevard.

April 2, 1907 — The report from the Police, Fire and Health departments recommended that new fire alarm boxes be erected at the following points: Victoria Hall; Grosvenor avenue midway between Cote St. Antoine road and Sherbrooke street.

Aug. 5, 1907 — It was recommended that the necessary funds be placed at the disposal of the Road Committee for the construction of a drain in upper Grosvenor avenue at the end of the present drain to the Boulevard.

Aug. 14, 1907 — That the sum of \$4,000. voted by the Council Aug. 5, 1907 for a sewer on Grosvenor avenue, be utilized for the purpose originally intended — the completion of sidewalks.

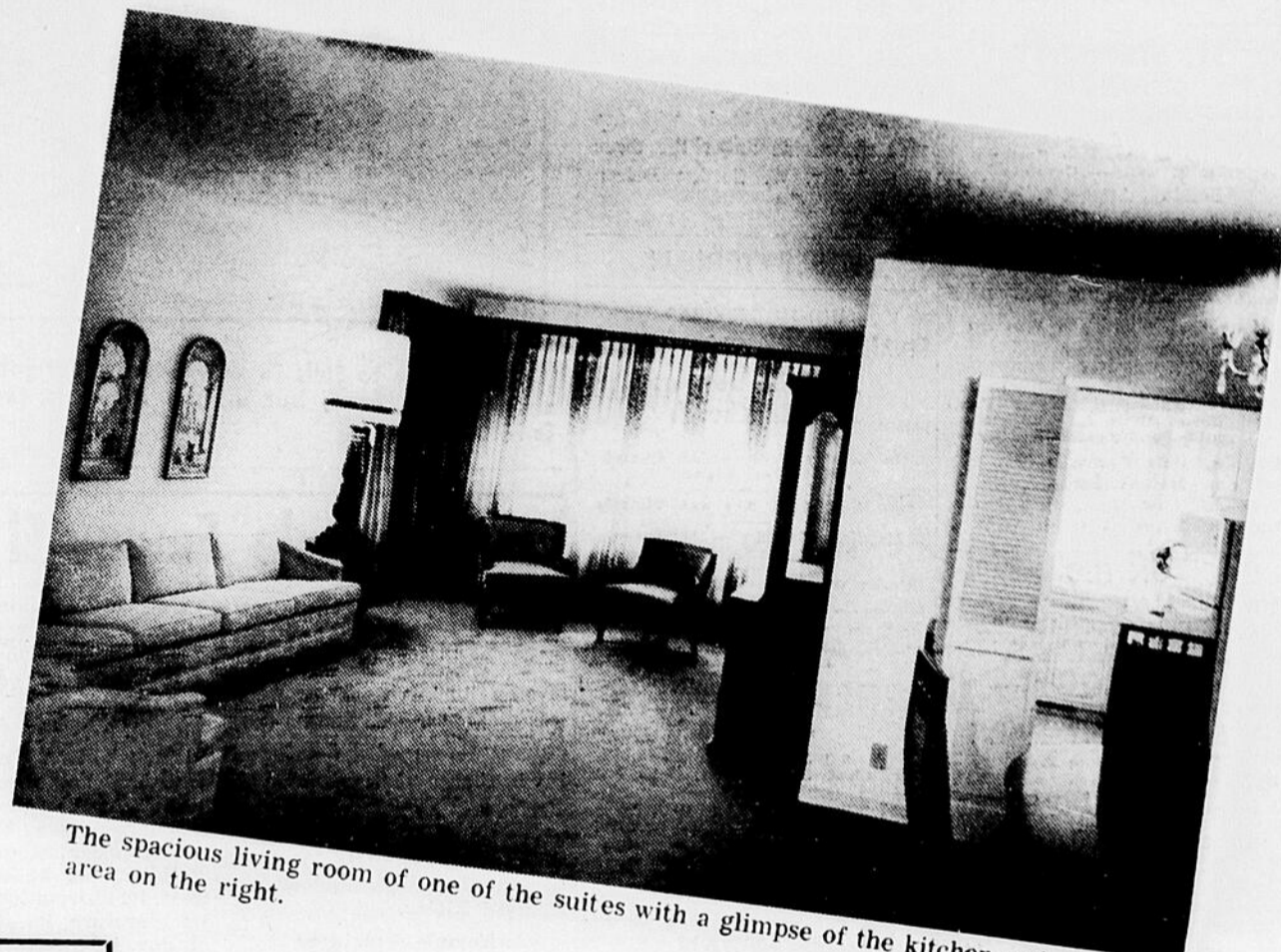

Obituary

Rev. E. C. Amaron

Rev. Errol C. Amaron, 68, the principal of Stanstead College, Stanstead, Que., for 23 years, died Saturday in hospital in Ottawa after a lengthy illness.

At Stanstead, the years 1931 to 1954 were known as the Amaron era and last year the United Church minister and his wife were honored when the college named its recreation centre the Amaron Gymnasium.

Mr. Amaron had resigned earlier this month from the Admaston Pastoral charge of the United Church of Canada because of ill health.

The hospital gave cause of death as a gastro-intestinal ailment. He had served the Admaston, Northcote and Haley congregation since 1954 when he came to Admaston from Stanstead.

During World War I, he served overseas with a field ambulance unit as a sergeant major, won the military medal and was mentioned in dispatches.

After the war, he majored in French, English and theology at McGill University, graduating with a Master's degree in Arts and a Bachelor of Divinity degree.

He was twice president of McGill University students' council and won 13 letters as an outstanding athlete.

In 1925 he went to Stanstead College, where he had received elementary schooling, as dean of boys.

The following year he became director of religious education at the Ridgeview Congregational Church in White Plains, N.Y. He later attended Union Theological Seminary in New York and United Theological College in Montreal.

From 1928 to 1931, he was associate minister of the American Presbyterian Church in Montreal, now the American-Erskine United Church.

In 1949, he was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Divinity degree by Montreal's United Theological College for his work of Stanstead.

Survivors include his wife Alice and brother Douglas of Toronto, general news editor of The Canadian Press.

Transportation — piggy-back style

Mrs. Merganser, her beautiful when two years old. Also a male Redstart still looks something like his mother in his second summer but the following year is like his father. Bald Eagles' heads turn white when they are five years old.

Gannets are very dark when first out of the shell. Each year, when they moult, they become lighter, until at the age of six they are entirely white. One may live to be 17.

Of course birds' wings take the place of hands, but we rarely see them used that way. However, before they are able to either fly or walk, baby Bitterns propel themselves along by holding on to the cattails with the tips of their wings, as though they were fingers. Juvenile Terns are unable to fly, but they can run.

Herring Gulls take several years to acquire their final plumage. At first it is uniformly dark; the immature in second year is whiter; in the final stage a Herring Gull has a white head, tail, and underparts, but its mantle is grey and the wing tips black. The average life span is 17, but one in captivity died at the ripe old age of 49.

Naturally, bird parents nearly always feed their children the food which they themselves prefer. Accordingly, young Kingbirds are fed flies, young Kingfishers fish, young Owls rodents, and young Robins worms. But young Cowbirds are not brought up by their own parents, Mrs. Cowbird desposits her eggs in the nests of all sorts of birds, and leaves the feeding of her children to their foster parents. And so a young Cowbird must be very adaptable, as its foods depends entirely upon whose nest it happens to be born in. If a Song Sparrow's it will be fed seeds; if a Vireo's, it must eat insects; if a Waxwing's, cherries are stuffed down its throat.

Corn loses flavor rapidly when held at room temperature. Ideally, corn should be used as soon as possible after picking. This is particularly true if it is to be frozen. If corn cannot be used at once, leave the husk on and wrap it in a damp cloth or place in a plastic bag and store in the refrigerator.

Each of the two apartment buildings will have its own indoor/outdoor swimming pool for year-round use by the residents.

As an added convenience, tenants will be able to use their own private special elevator to go directly down to the shopping concourse and parking area in the lower levels of each apartment building.

Shopping Mall
The completely air-conditioned shopping mall will contain many high-fashion boutiques as

well as gourmet food shops and specialty service stores. Each of these specialty boutiques has its own individual store front for leisurely window-shopping. The 700-seat theatre is also located in the shopping mall, for easy access by residents of Westmount Square, as well as by the general public.

Schedule Up-to-Date
The sod-turning ceremony, early in 1966, was performed by His Worship, Michael L. Tucker, mayor of Westmount, assisted by Donald E. Kerlin, president of Montreal Trust Company. The project is the undertaking of Westmount Centre Inc., an associate company of MonDev Corporation Ltd., the development subsidiary of Montreal Trust. Construction work started immediately after the sod-turning ceremony, and by mid-July the first phase of the complex had been completed up to plaza level.

On July 27 the contract for the construction of the second phase was signed in the office of Mayor Tucker in Westmount City Hall. The contract was awarded to Louis Donolo Incorporated.

The contract for the black, Durachron aluminum curtain-wall which will enclose the three towers of Westmount Square has been awarded to the Canarch Division of Canadair Limited for an amount of over \$2.2 million.

Contracts for elevators for the entire complex have been completed with the Otis Elevator Co. Ltd. for approximately \$1 million and recently the contract for rental for the 700-seat theatre was concluded with a leading film-showing company.

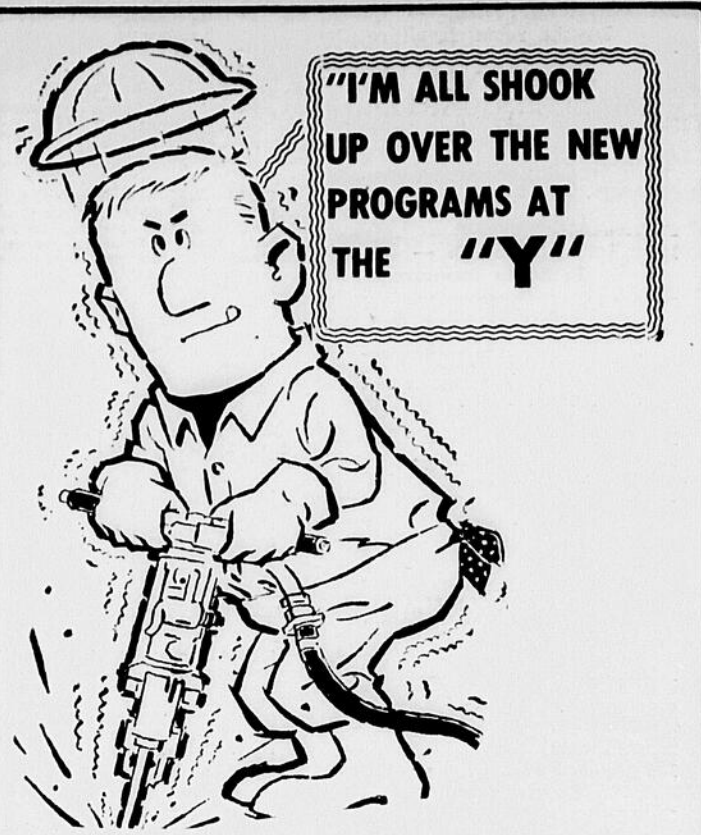
