Russell Taber is honoured at banquet in Quyon on Tuesday

The man of the hour this week was Mr. Russell Taber of Quyon. He was honoured by an overflow number of farmers and their wives Tuesday night at the Onslow Intermediate School Auditorium to mark his twentieth year as manager of the Quyon Farmers Co-operative.

Since its inception in 1945, Russell Taber has guided this organization through its startlingly successful career and this year turns over the reins to Ger-vase O'Reilly, who has been president of the Board of Directors for all those twenty years.

The dinner to honor Mr. Taber was presided over by the new president, Garth Graham, and attended by the staff of Quyon Creamery who gave Russell a standing ash tray and Mrs. Taber a beautiful plant; by the Board of Directors who presented him with a leather covered easy chair; by clergymen, teachers, friends and neighbors, Mr. Taber's daughter and son-in-law (Mr. and Mrs. Findlay McLennan of Ottawa); by County Agronomist Neil Drummond, Quyon Mayor and County Warden Billy Burke and Mrs. Burke, Hon. Paul Martineau, Pontiac Member of Parliament and many other well wishers.

The guest speaker was Pontiac County Economic Council President Father T. G. May of Vinton and his message was encouraging and, as always, optimistic. He reviewed the history and make-up of the Economic Council and said its function was to counsel the government and not to make laws or to execute them.

Father May told of the brochure on Pontiac County which is being sent to various prospective industrial settlers and said he had prospects for a possible industry for Quyon district which would employ a large number of men.

The overall aim of the Economic Council is to settle an industry in each of Pontiac's villages, or near enough to assure steady employment so the young people of this County don't have to leave home for work.

In introducing the guest speaker, Wyman MacKechnie said he was a man dedicated to the principal of co-operation, this being the theme of the evening. In his talk, Father May mentioned that Mr. Russell Taber has a great appreciation of human nature, always makes one feel at home, (signs of a perfect gentleman) and could indeed be called "Mr. Co-operator" of the County.

Russell's knack of always dealing with the public in a pleasing way was used by Father May as an example for all to follow. He urged emulation on the part of all and also said people should take more interest in public affairs.

Director Jos. Kennedy thanked Father May for his talk.

In accepting his gifts, the honored guest, Mr. Taber, said he wanted to give due where the due was due and he did just that, listing by memory all the past Directors and recalling their value on the Board.

Jean Lesage coming here Saturday

A sod turning ceremony will be held at the site of Consolidated Pontiac Inc. in Litchfield on Saturday morning. Prime Minister Jean Lesage will be flying in to take part in the event and is expected to arrive by plane at about 11 o'clock Saturday morning.

Help coming to those who can wait for it

In answer to a question from Hon. Paul Martineau in the House of Commons Tuesday, it has been ascertained by the Government of Canada that an agency for emergency assistance to drought ridden farmers is to be set up.

This has come out of the conference of Ministers of Agriculture of Quebec, Ontario and Canada which took place this week, a conference which was first proposed by Pontiac's Member several weeks ago.

There has been no word yet whether this new agency is to be made permanent but there is every hope that it will at least come to the aid of the agricultural community of the Ottawa Valley soon.

Within three days, they have promised, there will be an announcement of the form the assistance will take. A number of farmers in this area have informed The Equity that it is possible they will not be able to keep their cattle that long.

Pontiac apiarists have had to ship their bees to more suitable climates in the meanwhile, Reuben Smith having sent three truckloads to the Val Dor district and Clarendon dairyman, Robert Young, has installed his own irrigation system at a cost of over \$5000 to water his corn fields from a reservoir on his farm.

Country Notes

Reports from some areas of Quebec indicate a very serious feed situation coming up. In Pontiac County especially, winter-killing was bad; an ice sheet covered the ground for several weeks. And now it is drought.

I asked Dr. John Bubar of the Agronomy Dept. what he would do with a field of last year's seeding that had failed. This is his answer.

"The question is what to do when your new seeding is gone so badly this year that you have decided to plow up now. You are short of feed for this year and won't have the second-year hay you counted on for next year. And everything is awfully dry. I think the best approach this late in the season is to plan to seed oats in late July or early August. I would wait until a good rain is forecast, then seed three or four bushels oats per acre. We did an experiment to try this in 1960 and found that Garry or Glen oats seeded on a winterkilled pasture that was ploughed in June gave us one and one-half tons of oat hay per acre by October 21st. You need to seed heavy because birds may get a lot of your slow-germinating grain—this depends to some extent on how dry it will be after seeding. Also, I would expect quite a response to Nitrogen fertilizer (say 50 lb N per acre) but would want to be careful because of the risk of nitrate poisoning to livestock fed on this storage. This could either be grazed in late fall or put in as grass silage. You might even make hay if you got suitable weather in late October.

"I wouldn't want to seed sorghum-sudan or corn this late since I would count on getting a lot of my growth in the cool-moist (we hope) part of the fall after we have had too much frost for corn to continue growing. Millet is OK in warm weather, but I think oats are the best choice for latter growth.

"Possibilities for next year are to seed in the conventional manner after disking up the oat stubble. I would do this on alfalfa land. You could use DuPuits or Alfa without a companion crop. You could then use this field for hay or for a conventional grain crop. The alternative is to leave the oat stubble undisturbed and broadcast forage seed on to the frozen ground early in the spring. This will give

a fair hay and pasture crop next year. Timothy and trefoil establish quite nicely this way. I think Ladino and possibly red clover will also. I wish I had more experimental evidence to back up these ideas. This is the best I can do with the available evidence".

At Lachute Fair, I saw the controversial new dairy cattle judging classes in operation for the first time. And I liked what I saw.

From a spectator's point of view the judging was so much easier to follow; there were nine classes only in each breed and these were simple and straight forward.

The exhibitors I talked to liked them also. Restricted to entering nine animals, it gave each man a chance to put forward his best, and still left room for the new competitor.

And the fair manager, my namesake Ken Riley, liked them too. Entries were well up over last year. For instance four Jersey herds turned out, in place of last year's one herd. And Canadian cattle also were there this year.

But most important, will the new scheme improve our National Herd? I think it will.

Pastoral comment...

Rev. Marc Gauthier, Chapeau
You have learned the last chapter in the Catechism—the Christian Daily Exercise—and you know every answer, and the meaning of every word as well as ever you will know it.

And all this is very pleasing and just as it ought to be—pleasing to yourself, pleasing to your teachers of religion and pleasing to everyone who is interested in you.

It is a fine thing to know your Catechism well, and a still finer thing to understand it; not just know it just off by heart like a parrot does, but understand its meaning like a sensible, thinking person.

But there is a much finer thing than either knowing it or understanding it. A much finer thing, and an immensely more important thing, is doing it. You may know the answer to: "How should we begin the day?" Have you sanctified—made holy—your ordinary actions today? Are you going to sanctify them for the rest of the day? You know the Catechism answers. You know what to do—the great question is: Are you doing it?

Knowing your Catechism won't keep you out of Hell, but Doing it will certainly get you into Heaven. Not that we must make little of knowing; God made us to know Him, that is to know our Catechism as well as we can in the first place—but He also made us to serve Him. He wants us to learn, to think, to find out what pleases Him, but much more, He wants us to DO it.

As we go on in the knowledge of what is right, we increase our obligation to DO what is right.

An example: Last year—perhaps last week—you did not know the answer to: "How should you begin the day?" "If you did not know it, God did not expect you to DO it."

Remember: Knowing won't get you into Heaven: Doing will

There are lots of Saints in Heaven, and Saints on earth, too, who through no fault of their own did not, or do not know the answers to the questions we are talking about, but they DID those things that the answers mention.

Take the Seven Corporal Works of Mercy. They are taken from the Book of Tobias in the Bible. Tobias was a very good man who lived before the time of our Lord. The Seven Corporal Works of Mercy—the answer, I mean—is simply a statement of the things he did. If anyone had asked Tobias "What are the Seven Corporal Works of Mercy?" he wouldn't have known the answer as well as you know it; in fact, I don't suppose he'd have known it at all. He is in Heaven because He did these things—not knowing the answer did not keep him out of Heaven.

When we come to judgment, as you, and I, and all of us must some day do, we won't be asked Catechism. Our Lord Himself gives us the words He will say to those He takes to Heaven—"In as much as you DID it unto the least of these my little ones, ye DID it unto Me." And to those condemned to Hell—"In as much as you DID it not".

Remember, I am not making

little about knowing, because not to know, when you have a chance to learn, would be culpable ignorance, but the more we know, the more we must do.

We mustn't only learn all our Catechism, find out what to do, and then rest satisfied—that would be drifting. We must get the engines going, and set about DOING these things.

The savage who knows nothing about Catechism has a better chance of Heaven than the most learned Christian who knows it all, and understands it all, but does not DO it. He even has a much better chance.

God commands us to love one another. We know this and we even know just how to obey this command. But do we always DO it? We must love our enemies, wishing them well and praying for them. We must forgive injuries done to us. But do we always DO this?

Sometime you should, even if it be only out of curiosity, draw up a balance sheet in your mind. Put on one side the Catechism or Religious Instruction you KNOW, and on the other side, against it, the Catechism you DO. And always remember that, on the Day of Judgment, Christ's words addressed to us will not be: "in so much as you KNEW" but rather: "in so much as you DID".

REPORT**

Court was held at Campbell's Bay on June 23, 1965.

Denis Therrien, 26 yrs of age of Campbell's Bay, who on the 9th day of June 1965, poked a witness in the face while still in the Court room after the latter had testified at the trial where Therrien had to answer to charges of breaking and entering and receiving stolen goods, was sentenced this morning by District Judge Arthur Labbe to one month in jail. On a second charge of assaulting his escorting officer on the same occasion from the Court Room to the County Jail, he was given a 15 days in jail, sentence to be served concurrently with the first one.

In passing sentence, Judge Labbe told the accused that he considered the offence of assaulting a witness who had been called upon by the Crown to testify at a trial a very serious one.

He also said that this created one kind of obstruction to the carrying out of Justice, where witnesses must have full consideration for the civic duty they are rendering to the Community at large, and in order to set an example he had to give the accused a jail term.

Therrien will appear again in Court on the 7th day of July, before District Judge Avila Labelle to receive his sentence on an offence he was found guilty of, namely receiving stolen goods.
